

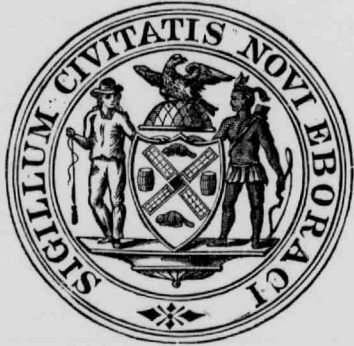

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Docks held April 6, 1883.

Present—The full Board.

The President announced to the Board that the meeting was called for the purpose of taking suitable action in respect to the death of Peter Cooper, which took place on the 4th instant.

On motion of Commissioner Voorhis, the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, The Board has heard with sincere regret of the decease, on the 4th instant, of Peter Cooper, one of New York's most beloved citizens, whose kindness and patriotism was rarely equaled and never excelled; and

Whereas, This Board desires to place on record its high appreciation of the many praiseworthy and imperishable acts of benevolence and charity so unostentatiously performed by the deceased, as also to unite in the universal expression of sorrow over the loss to all of the benefits derived from the living example of a great philanthropist residing and moving in the midst of an active business community; therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board hereby expresses in an unqualified manner its sincere sorrow at the decease of Peter Cooper, and tenders its heartfelt sympathy to the family and friends of the deceased at their irreparable loss.

Resolved, As a mark of respect to the worthy deceased, that the office of this Board be closed during the time appointed and set apart for the obsequies, and the national ensign be displayed at half-staff on the various works and buildings of the Department until after the removal of the remains from the city, and that the members of the Board attend the funeral services at the time and place appointed.

Resolved, That the foregoing preamble and resolutions be entered in full on the minutes of the Board, and a copy thereof properly engrossed and duly signed be transmitted to the family of the deceased.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held April 11, 1883.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held April 4th instant were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From Harvey P. Farrington—Demanding a renewal for the lease of Pier, old 40, North river.

From Henderson Brothers, lessees—In reference to their lease for Pier, new 46, North river.

From Case, Leland & Co. and others—Petition in reference to leasing Pier, new 37, North river, to the Providence and Stonington Steamship Company.

From Robert C. Martin—Enclosing protest against the leasing of Pier, new 37, North river, and requesting that the same be kept open for use by the public.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting the suspension of Watchman John Murray for being found asleep on night of April 8th instant while on duty.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation—Opinion as to the right of the Department to use its funds for the purpose of constructing sewer boxes to extend the sewers under and through piers to their outer end. Secretary directed to have the opinion recorded.

From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to dredging at the dumping board at Canal street, North river.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—In reference to the dangerous condition of the dock at the Charity Hospital, Blackwell's Island, and requesting that the same be repaired. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon.

From Compagnie Générale Transatlantique—In reference to repairs being made to Pier, new 42, North river.

From William P. Kelly—Requesting that the Department loan him the use of a bracing pile-driver. Application granted, provided that he pay therefor \$12 per day for the use thereof, and also pays for the engineer on the pile-driver 35 cents per hour for the time employed.

From New Haven Steamboat Company—Requesting permission to drive four spring piles between Piers 25 and 26, East river. Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had granted a permit therefor, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, his action was approved.

From John Gillies—Accepting contract for repairing the small pier between Piers 51 and 52, East river.

From the Municipal Gas-light Company—In reference to gas service pipes laid to Pier, new 36, North river.

From F. Alexandre & Sons—Requesting permission to drive three spring piles at the outer end of Pier 3, North river. Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had granted a permit therefor, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, his action was approved.

From H. S. Nichols, agent Western States Line—Application for permission to erect tally-house and two derricks on Pier 6, East river. Permission granted, provided that the same be constructed in accordance with the rules adopted by the Board.

From E. F. Murray—Application for permission to erect a tally-house on Pier 6, East river. Permission granted, provided that the same is constructed in accordance with the rules adopted by the Board.

From James H. Ferdon—Application for permission to erect a hoisting derrick on the bulkhead between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, East river. Application denied.

From George V. Hecker & Co.—In reference to permit heretofore granted to place a pipe along Pier 43, East river, and through the bulkhead, and stating that as they had not availed themselves of the same, they declined to pay compensation for the privilege thereby granted. Permit granted on the 14th day of December, 1881, revoked, and the Secretary directed to notify the parties to that effect.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending March 31, 1883.

2d. Reporting amount of material excavated by the Union Dredging Company with the dredges of this Department, during the month of March, 1883. Treasurer directed to make out bill therefor, and collect the same from the dredging company.

3d. Reporting in reference to taking down derrick and putting in a new mooring post on Pier 37, East river.

4th. Reporting as to the repairs required to the Pier at Thirty-fifth street, North river. Secretary directed to notify the lessees to commence to make repairs thereto, so as to put the pier in proper condition for the term of the lease thereof, within ten days, the work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

5th. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending April 7, 1883.

6th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2718, that the repairs to the bulkhead, between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river, were made under his supervision.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2764, as to condition of and repairs required to the Pier at Jane street, North river. Secretary directed to notify the lessees to commence to repair the same within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2871, as to repairs to the bulkhead between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2902, as to amount of dredging done between Sixty-first and Sixty-third streets, East river.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2924, that he had superintended the repairs made to Pier, new 42, North river.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2952, as to the removal of obstruction from Piers 21, 27, and 37, East river, and from the bulkhead, between Piers 28 and 29, East river.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2959, that the repairs to Pier 40, East river, had been superintended by him.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2964, that the water-pipe on Pier, new 46, North river, had been repaired under his supervision.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2965, as to the condition of and repairs required to Pier 24, East river. Secretary directed to notify the lessees to commence to repair the same within ten days, under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2987, that he had made repairs to Pier, old 54, North river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2991, that the obstructions on the bulkhead, between Piers 28 and 29, East river, had been removed.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2988, that he had superintended the driving of three fender piles at the outer end of Pier 3, North river.

A communication from the Suburban Rapid Transit Company, accepting the terms of the resolution adopted by the Board on April 4th instant, was received, read, and laid over for consideration, the following resolution in relation thereto being offered by the President:

Resolved, That the Secretary be and hereby is directed to notify the Suburban Rapid Transit Company that their acceptance of the terms of the resolution adopted by this Board on April 4th instant is not deemed satisfactory, and to request that it be made to meet the views of the Board.

Commissioner Voorhis moved, as an amendment, that the communication be placed on file.

A vote being taken on the amendment, it was lost by the following vote:

Aye—Commissioner Voorhis—1.

Noes—The President and Commissioner Vanderpoel—2.

The question then recurred on the original resolution, which was adopted by the affirmative votes of the President and Commissioner Vanderpoel, Commissioner Voorhis voting in the negative.

A communication from John Dorschell, requesting permission to anchor a bath at the foot of west Eighty-first street, North river, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to John Dorschell to locate and maintain, during the months of June, July, August and September, 1883, unless sooner revoked, in the waters of the North river, at about the foot of West Eighty-first street, a floating bath of the dimensions of about twenty-five feet by seventy-five feet, the permission hereby granted being on the express condition that the said bath be located or placed under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief, and that the said Dorschell pay \$30 monthly, in advance, during the said period, for the use of the land under water and occupied by him.

Commissioner Voorhis reported orally on the applications made by Thomas L. Sturges for permission to build a platform on piles south of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Harlem river, and for filling in thereat; and also on the report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2981 in respect thereto, which were referred to the President and Commissioner Voorhis for examination and report, that there was no objection to granting the permission desired.

On motion, the report was received and the respective communications were ordered [on file, and the following resolution, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Thomas L. Sturges to erect and construct platforms on piles on land under water south of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, on the north side of Harlem river, in accordance with the plan submitted therefor, and which is hereby approved; and also that permission be granted to the said Sturges to fill in, with clean earth filling and stone, the area as shown in the said diagram, and extending about 200 feet westerly from the west side of River avenue and about 206 feet south of the southerly line of One Hundred and Fiftieth street; all of the said work to be done under the supervision and direction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and the said structure to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board.

Commissioner Voorhis offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to extend the new sheathing recently laid on easterly half of Pier 51, East river, for a distance of about seventy-five feet, or to within about fifty feet on the outer end of said pier.

Commissioner Voorhis also offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That this Board deem it advisable to make an alteration in the width and location of the proposed new Piers Nos. 58, 59 and 60, North river, from the lines therefor as laid down upon the plans adopted by the Department April 13, 1871, and to that end do hereby fix and establish, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as provided by law, the location and width of the proposed Pier, new 60, North river, to be as follows, viz.: The northerly line of said pier to be on a line with the northerly side of West Thirtieth street, and the southerly line of said pier to be on a line with the southerly side of West Thirtieth street, the width of the pier to be 60 feet, and the northerly line of proposed Pier, new 59, North river, to be located 155 feet distant southerly from the northerly line of West Thirtieth street, and the southerly line of said proposed new Pier No. 59, to be located 60 feet south of the northerly line thereof; the northerly line of proposed Pier, new No. 58, North river, to be located 370 feet distant southerly from the southerly side of West Thirtieth street, and the southerly line of said proposed Pier, new No. 58, to be located 60 feet south of the northerly line thereof, the length of said piers to remain as heretofore established.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and hereby are respectfully requested, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 738, Laws of 1872, to consent to and approve of the width and location of the said proposed new Piers Nos. 58, 59 and 60, being altered and changed as above described and set forth.

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare, at his earliest convenience, the necessary plans of the foregoing proposed changes, for submission to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Which was adopted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Vanderpoel and Voorhis. President Laimbeer voting in the negative.

On motion, the resolution offered by Commissioner Vanderpoel in relation to dredging for the sites of piers to be built between Pier, new 57, and Thirtieth street, North river, was taken from the table and placed on file.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of twenty bills or claims, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$11,391.51, which was,

On motion, accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to enter the same in full in the minutes, as follows:

The Board took up for consideration the list of piers and bulkheads to be sold at public auction, and the following were ordered to be placed on the list for sale.

ON NORTH RIVER.

For and During the Term of One Year, from 1st May, 1883.

Lot 1.—Pier 21, and bulkhead adjoining, south side.

Lot 2.—Pier, old 35. (These premises will not be repaired or dredged by the Department, and the purchaser of this lot will be required to take the premises in the condition in which they may be on 1st May, 1883.)

Lot 3.—Pier, old 36. (These premises will not be repaired or dredged by the Department, and the purchaser of this lot will be required to take the premises in the condition in which they may be on 1st May, 1883.)

For and During the Term of Three Years, from 1st May, 1883.

Lot 4.—South-half Pier, old 29, including whole surface of pier.

Lot 5.—Pier at West Eleventh street, including 160 feet of bulkhead on south side of West Eleventh street, extending easterly from inner end of pier.

For and During the Term of Ten Years, from May 1, 1883.

Lot 6.—Pier, new 37. (The lease for this pier will covenant for a renewal term of ten years at an advanced annual rental, such increase to be five per cent. on the rental for the first term; the right to shed the said pier will be granted by the Department, and the same will be appropriated for special kinds of commerce as required by law.)
