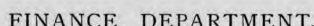

Six—There were 539 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 23, 1883, which is a decrease of 12, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 122 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1882. The actual mortality for the week ending June 16, 1883, was 557, which is 15.2 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.01 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,316,110.
