Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—In compliance with the requirements of Section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, the following report is submitted, showing the operations and action of the Department of Taxes and Assessments for the quarter ending September 30, 1906:

As authorized by sections 909 and 910 of the Charter, the Commissioners caused the work of extending the tax for the year 1906 to be performed by the clerical force of the Department, without additional expense to the City.

The total assessed valuation for taxation purposes of real and personal estate, in the several boroughs constituting The City of New York, for 1906, as transmitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Taxes and Assessments on the first Monday of July, under section 907 of the Charter, was \$6,305,794,185; of this amount the assessed valuation of real estate was \$5,738,487,245, and of personal estate \$567,306,940, divided among the several boronghs as follows:

State Tax.

The State tax rate for the years 1899 to 1906, inclusive, and included in the total tax rate given by boroughs, as above shown, and expressed in mills, was: In 1899, 2.49; in 1900, 1.96; in 1901, 1.20; in 1902, 0.13; in 1903, 0.13; in 1904, 0.13; in 1905, 0.13; in 1906, 0.11. It will be thus seen that the direct tax of the State, on one dollar of assessed valuation, has fallen from 2 mills and forty-nine hundredths of a mill, in 1899, to eleven hundredths of a mill in 1906.

SURVEYOR'S OFFICE.

The following is a summary of the work done in the Surveyor's office for the quarter ending September 30, 1906:

Lot Alterations.

Borough of Manhattan—Alterations were made affecting 554 lots in the 37 volumes of block tax assessment maps.

Borough of The Bronx—Alterations were made affecting 2,266 lots in the 31 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 6 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Brooklyn—Alterations were made affecting 1,727 lots in the 77 volumes of block tax assessment maps and in the 18 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Queens—Alterations were made affecting 1,645 lots in the 31 volumes of tentative maps.

Borough of Richmond—Alterations were made affecting 586 lots in the 13 volumes of tentative maps.

The duplicate copies of the tax maps used by the Deputy Commissioners in all the boroughs and the copies of the block tax assessment maps in the offices of the Bureau of Arrears and Water Registrar in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, were corrected to correspond with the alterations made on the original maps.

The number of volumes of tax maps in the different Departments now in actual use for purposes of levying taxes, water rents, assessments and arrears, is as follows:

Block Tax Assessment Maps.

The necessary searches, surveys, calculations and drafting for the preparation of maps were completed for sections 20 and 21, and commenced for sections 22, 23 and 24 of the Borough of Brooklyn during the quarter.

Lands Acquired for Public Purposes.

Lands acquired for streets and other public purposes in forty-five proceedings were properly shown on the tax maps; eight of the proceedings were in the Borough of Manhattan, fourteen in the Borough of The Bronx, fourteen in the Borough of Brooklyn, six in the Borough of Queens and three in the Borough of Richmond.

Street Openings.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment discontinued and closed two streets in the Borough of Manhattan and one street in the Borough of The Bronx, which were taken from the tax maps.

Miscellaneous.

Maps were prepared to accompany the publication of the Annual Record of Real Estate in the CITY RECORD of the Sections and Wards into which the City is divided, in compliance with the provisions of chapter 454 of the Laws of 1903.

Surveys were made of twenty lots in the Borough of Manhattan in order to reconcile discrepancies between record title and tax map dimensions.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

REPORT FOR THE THREE MONTHS ENDING SEPTEMBER 30, 1906.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—Herewith is transmitted quarterly report of the designs for improvement, work accomplished and finances of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, for the three months ending September 30, 1906.

Bronx Park.

In the general maintenance work of this park the grass was cut, tennis courts were marked and rolled and basins and gutters repaired. Roads, walks and paths were kept in fine condition.

During the last few weeks of the quarter the interiors of the greenhouses were whitewashed and otherwise prepared to receive the potted plants to be taken indoors during the cold weather. Palms, ferns and stovehouse plants were repotted; herbaceous plants were separated and transplanted; hotbeds prepared for pansy seeds and for bedding, and pansy seeds planted.

Fertilizer was carted from the Zoological Park to the greenhouses.

Seventeen cases of bulbs were received.

On the hill back of the greenhouses evergreen trees and shrubs, which were planted years ago, had grown so thick as to seriously interfere with the growth of other trees and herbaceous plants. These evergreens have been thinned out.

Botanical Garden, Bronx Park.

Blue Bridge—The working plans and specifications for the new bridge to take the place of the present Blue bridge, north of the Lorillard Mansion, have been prepared and printed, and the contract will be advertised in the course of a day or two.

Toilet Houses—The sketch plans for these two toilet houses have been approved by the Municipal Art Commission; specifications and working plans have been prepared for one of these buildings and the work will be let very soon.

Road System—The road system under way in the Botanical Garden has been completed and is ready to be thrown open to the public. On portions of these roads the lights have not as yet been placed, although application for same has been made to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Grading—The grading has been completed on the entrance to Scott avenue bridge and the telford laid, and the work of placing the traprock thereon will be completed by the middle of October.

Zoological Park, Bronx Park.

Baird Court Improvement—John V. Schaefer Company, contractors. This work is nearly finished, and the contract should be completed during the present month, or early in November.

Glass Court for Bird House—George L. Walker, contractor. This contract has been satisfactorily completed and accepted, and final estimate will be rendered in a day or two.

Feed Barn—Wm. H. Wright & Son, contractors. With the exception of a little detail work this building is completed, and final estimate will be rendered in the course of a week.

Deer House—Guidone & Galardi, contractors. The building is erected, the roof is in place and the total contract is about one-half completed. The work is progressing satisfactorily.

Terrace Wall and Steps—The contract for this work was awarded to Leslie McHarg & Co. on July 26. The wall is built, the steps are set and the job is practically completed, except as to the setting of the copings and the east end of the wall, where a change was made to conform to the gatehouse.

Boat House—Guidone & Galardi, contractors. The foundation is completed, the framework erected and the roof is being placed. This building will probably be completed during the present year.

Southeast Entrance Gate—Wm. Horne Company, contractors. The work on this gate is progressing very slowly, owing to some changes being required, and the contract is only about one-third finished.

Comfort Station—The contract for this building has not yet been readvertised, but settlement has been made with the contractor who originally had the job for the work completed by him on the building, and specifications have been prepared for reletting the contract for the full completion of the work.

Concourse and Approaches—A contract for this work was awarded to John V. Schaefer Company on September 6, and the work has just been begun.

Concourse Entrance—The original bids for this work were rejected by the Park Board, and the work was readvertised and finally awarded to John V. Schaefer Company on September 27. The work will be commenced during the present month.

Moshulu Parkway.

Drip Pans—The work of laying drip pans over the sidewalk under the bridge over Webster avenue and Moshulu Parkway has been practically completed, all work being done by Park labor.

Completion of Improvement—John B. Malatesta, contractor. This work is progressing satisfactorily and rapidly. No payment has as yet been made, but a payment is now due. Fully one-half the work of excavation has been completed, the culvert is all laid and some of the topsoil is in place. The contract was awarded on August 13 of this year.

Van Cortland Park.

The Sullivan Memorial Fountain has been completed. The bronze relief medallions and the inscription have been placed and the fountain is now in use.

Gun Hill Road—The widening of this road from eighteen to thirty feet has been finished, and the road is now in fine shape and thrown open to the public.

Lake—Since preparing plans for the construction of this lake south of the colonial garden, the question has been raised as to whether the water from the lake will flow into the twin sewer or pass under it through a culvert below the sewer. As soon as this has been determined the work will be advertised.

Excavation—Most of this work of excavation at the point where the roads pass under the railroad at Van Cortlandt station has been done without expense to the City by giving the material excavated to the contractor who removed it, but considerable trimming is required, which will be done by Park labor, and the road will be widened and macadamized, also by Park labor.

Planting, etc.—Along the road from Van Cortlandt Mansion to the deer paddock, on the east side of the parade ground, dead trees and shrubs were removed and the ground thoroughly ploughed and harrowed in preparation for planting with new trees and shrubs this fall. The ground is now ready for topsoil, contract for which was awarded to Charles L. Doran on September 27. All the work of placing will be done by Park labor.

Twenty acres of trees and shrubs were kept free from insects and fungus, and all the all flowering shrubs, of which one-half the nursery is composed, were pruned.

Fifteen thousand herbaceous plants were planted and cultivated.

The woodland road extending from the aqueduct to the end of the nursery was cleaned and repaired; also the road from the city line to Mount Vernon avenue.

The bank along the entrance to nursery has been graded and seeded.

A small greenhouse, which was presented to the City, was sent to the nursery and prepared for the propagating of shrubs during the winter.

The colonial garden has been cleaned and cultivated, and herbaceous plants transplanted as occasion and season required.

The polo field and parade ground were kept in good condition, as were also the baseball diamonds.

Tennis courts were rolled and marked and the golf course properly cared for.

Comfort Station—Plans and specifications have been prepared for the erection of a comfort station near the polo grounds in this park. The specifications have been printed and the contract will be advertised in the course of a few days.

Widening Road—Appropriation has been granted for widening the road along the golf links, regrading and macadamizing. The work is being done by Park labor, and about five hundred feet of the road is graded.

Bronx and Pelham Parkway.

Asphalto Pavement Trial—During the past month the Sicilian Asphalt Paving Company has laid on this parkway, without expense to the City, ten thousand yards of Asphalto pavement as a trial. This has not yet been used long enough to give it a thorough test, but it looks as if it might prove to be a very satisfactory pavement.

Drinking Fountain—Plans and specifications have been prepared, and have been accepted by the Municipal Art Commission, for the erection of a stone drinking fountain on this parkway. The work will be done by contract, and will be advertised very shortly.

Trees and shrubs have been planted along the parkway.

Pelham Bay Park.

Orchard Beach—The work of improving the beach is in progress. Rock and earth are being removed. The beach is to be widened to twice its present width, the work being done by Park labor.

Toilet House; Wm. Horne Company, contractors. The toilet house near the bath houses at Orchard Beach is practically completed, and has been in use for some time, but the work has not yet been accepted by the City, nor final payment rendered.

Paths—During the summer the work of constructing a path leading to Baychester road, and graded out to the entrance to the athletic field, was completed.

A bicycle path was also constructed from the Eastern Boulevard to the railroad bridge.

Eighteen hundred yards of stone was carted and broken for the construction of new roads and paths.

On the golf links, the tees and putting greens were repaired.

The athletic field was kept in first-class condition.

Athletes' Lodge—The contract for the erection of this building was awarded to Peter Kieran on July 26. The foundations are completed and the roof is now being placed. The logs for the rustic work have been purchased by the contractor, and were sent to the mill to be sawed and shaped.

Addition to Public Comfort Station Already Erected; Wm. Horne Company, contractor. This building is practically completed and has been in use for some time; but there is some trimming up which the contractor has not yet done, hence the final payment has not been rendered.

Macadamizing Road Along Pelham Bay—Crushed stone has been laid on this road, in addition to which the road leading from Orchard Beach to the City Island road, and the one leading from City Island road past the Hunter Inn, have been covered with stone crushed by the City Crusher, all the work being done by Park labor. A boatload of screenings to complete these roads has just been received. This work will probably be completed by the middle of October.

Crotona Park.

The toilet house near the Municipal Building has been completed, and final payment rendered to Wm. Guggolz, the contractor.

The toilet house in the southern part of Crotona Park, Ryan & Golden, contractors, has also been completed and thrown open to the public. Final payment was rendered September 7.

Widening Roads—The road from Wendover and Fulton avenues, in this park, has been completed and thrown open to the public; also the road leading from Prospect avenue.

Comfort Station—The repairs on the comfort station have now been completed, and the building is now in use.

Running Track—A contract has been let by the Board of Education for building this track. The plans and specifications have been prepared at this office, but the work will be done under the supervision of the School Board.

Entrance—The entrance to this park at Wendover and Fulton avenues has been completed, and adds greatly to the appearance of the park.

Improvement Near the Municipal Building—Bids were received for this work, but very much exceeded the amount of money that had been appropriated. The sum asked for was not granted by the Department of Finance, and it will be impossible to do the whole of this work with the funds available. The amount on hand is sufficient to cover only the removal of the rock.

Terracing North Side of Park—The park employees have commenced the terracing of the north side of the park, and the work is progressing satisfactorily.

Draining—An appropriation has been made for draining portions of this park, and the work will be pushed rapidly to completion.

Filling—Contractors are furnishing fill and carting it to the low ground in this park, free of all expense to the Department.

Franz Sigel Park.

Alteration to the Toilet House—A third attempt has been made to get bids for furnishing the materials for this work; but this also has been unsuccessful, owing to the unusual number of buildings now being erected in The Bronx, and the consequent scarcity of material. There seems to be a prospect of a lull in a very short time, and it may then be possible to secure the material by contract.

St. James' Park.

Comfort Station, Wm. Horne Company, contractors. Final estimate for this contract was rendered on August 16.

St. Mary's Park.

Asphalting—Contract for asphalting the walks in this park was awarded to the Asphalt Construction Company on August 16, and work will be commenced at once.

Grading—An appropriation has been made for grading still required to be done in this park. The work will be done by Park labor.

Old Passage Road—All of the Old Passage road has been widened and graded, and the telford all laid and napped. The necessary trap-rock and screenings are now under contract and will be delivered early in October, when the work will be completed.

Macomb's Dam Park.

Filling—The filling of the low lands in this park is still continued; but the material, which is brought in without expense to the City, is coming in very slowly at present.

Roadway and Paths—The new carriageway and paths from One Hundred and Sixty-first street to One Hundred and Sixty-second street, are about finished. There was a shortage of twenty-five loads of trap-rock. However, this trap-rock is now at the Fordham dock and will be delivered at once, and the road will be completed within a week.

General Improvement—An appropriation of \$20,000 has been granted for the improvement of this park. On this appropriation a large force has been at work, making general improvements, including several new paths, grading and general embellishment. The work is still progressing, but will take considerable time to complete.

The athletic field has been regraded and resurfaced.

Claremont Park.

Addition to the toilet house, Wm. Horne Company, contractors. This contract was completed, and final payment was rendered on August 11.

Improvement of Clay Avenue Side—Preliminary surveys are being made for the improvement of the Clay avenue side and entrance of this park, for which an appropriation of \$15,000 has been granted. This work will probably be done by contract.

Miscellaneous.

Fencing—A contract was awarded to John Simmons Company on September 20 for furnishing and delivering 12,000 linear feet of two-pipe iron fence for inclosing each of the small parks in the borough. The material will be delivered early in October, and the work will be commenced at once. It will be done by Park labor.

Tree Guards—One thousand tree guards, contract for furnishing which was awarded to John Fox & Co. on August 16, will be erected by Park labor, around the trees in the streets of the borough, street trees being under the jurisdiction of this Department.

Trees—During the latter part of the quarter thirty-five men were engaged in cutting down dead trees in streets and avenues throughout the borough. One hundred dead trees have been removed, and about fifteen hundred trees pruned. The spraying machine has been made use of in spraying the street trees infested by insects.

In addition to the foregoing the usual general maintenance work has been carried on in all the parks and parkways and in the small squares and gores under the jurisdiction of this Department.

Roads and paths have been spread with screenings where necessary. Washouts have been filled in, lawns mowed, tennis courts rolled and marked, new baseball diamonds laid out and flower beds arranged and cared for.

Trees have been planted on Bronx and Pelham parkways.

In the workshops carriages and signs were repaired and painted; two sets of harness were made and old harness repaired. All tools used in the work of the Department were kept sharpened and in good repair.

The Acting President presented a communication from the Secretary of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, to the effect that the contract for laying water mains on Edgecombe avenue, between One Hundred and Fiftieth and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets, was being advertised, and that the work would be undertaken as soon as the contract was awarded. Resolution recommending the laying of water mains on Edgecombe avenue was adopted by this Board on October 23, 1906, and forwarded to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

The communication was ordered on file.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of constructing receiving basin on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Lenox avenue.

Estimated cost, \$300. Assessed value of the property affected, \$420,000.

On motion of Alderman Meyers, the following resolution was introduced and adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Manhattan; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of the Washington Heights District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To construct receiving basin on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Eighteenth street and Lenox avenue; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out an alteration in the lines of Buena Vista avenue, from the first bend in the old street, which is about 400 feet north of Haven avenue to the centre of the bend in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street; and laying out One Hundred and Seventy-second, One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets, between Fort Washington and Buena Vista avenues, and a new street between the proposed extension of One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets.

Mr. Louis H. Moos, representing Mr. Fogel, appeared in support of the petition to lay out a change in the lines of Buena Vista avenue.

Mr. James A. Deering, Mr. Brown and Mr. M. S. Auerbach appeared in opposition to laying out a change in the lines of Buena Vista avenue, but in favor of laying out One Hundred and Seventy-second, One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets, between Fort Washington and Buena Vista avenue, and a new street between the proposed extension of One Hundred and Seventy-third and One Hundred and Seventy-fifth streets.

On motion of Alderman Grifenhagen, both matters were laid over, to be taken up in executive session.

The Acting President presented for the Board's consideration the matter of laying out a widening of Boulevard Lafayette, between One Hundred and Seventy-seventh and One Hundred and Eighty-first streets, and a widening of One Hundred and Eighty-first street, between Boulevard Lafayette and Buena Vista avenue.

Mr. Joseph A. Flannery appeared for the petitioners, in favor.

On motion, this matter was laid over for two weeks, awaiting report of Alderman Grifenhagen.

On motion, the Board adjourned for two weeks.

Objection having been raised as to the dimension of the one-story extension intended to be constructed in rear of the main building, we beg to submit that the main building is only three stories high and constructed a few years ago in a most substantial manner for market purposes. It was leased to the City for school purposes and occupied as such six years. Then the lease expired, the building was altered into stores, with workrooms on second and third floors, and, though originally one building, there are now four separate business stores in it.

We have filed application for permit to build extension in the rear of part of the building, which extension will be only one story high, and to all intents and purposes a shed with brick walls, as the easterly end will be open. Considering that the main building is only three (3) stories high and the extension applied for only one story high, we respectfully petition to be permitted to construct such extension, basing our petition upon the last subsection of section 32 of the Building Code.

There is now a frame shed in rear of the building and it is intended to substitute therefor a shed with brick walls, which will certainly be superior construction, and as the easterly end of the shed will be open and the whole structure only 14 feet high, it is petitioned that the walls be permitted 8 inches thick, with piers to carry roof girder ends, as shown on plan.

Thus the 8-inch walls become curtain walls between these piers, and have no weight to carry.

On motion, laid over, the appellant being instructed to file plans before the next meeting.

The Chairman instructed the Clerk to post notices that the next meeting of the Board will be held on Wednesday, November 7, Tuesday being Election Day.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
