PROTECTION AGAINST FIRE.

Report of Committee on Insurance and Fire Regulations of the New York Board of Trade and Transportation.

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and hereby is requested to give earnest attention to the report on fire protection, etc., in The City of New York (Manhattan and The Bronx), issued by the Committee of Twenty from the National Board of Fire Underwriters, and that he also be urged to use his best efforts in having carried out such recommendations, contained therein, as the National Board of Fire Underwriters, in joint conference with the Fire Commissioner of New York and the Chief of the Fire Department may approve; and, further, that he be urged to give especial and earnest consideration to the following suggestions from the New York Board of Trade and Transportation.

That it should be the earnest endeavor of the City officials to eliminate politics from the Fire Department, as by so doing its efficiency and effectiveness will be greatly enhanced. No man should be appointed Commissioner who is not of the highest administrative ability, without entangling political alliances and thoroughly conversant with the City and its needs.

An improved water supply is absolutely necessary, but the City is now doing its utmost to secure the same, and hence no suggestions upon that matter are necessary, with the exception of calling attention to the fact that there is at present an enormous waste of water, which should be immediately stopped, and that the hydrants in use are antiquated and inefficient to the needs of the City. They should be immediately replaced, and in the new equipment the interchangeable couplings on both hydrants and hose should be provided. This essential was made manifest by the visit of the New York Department to Baltimore, and other instances where help has been asked from sister cities.

While the Board recognizes that the present fire alarm system is antiquated, unsafe and liable through its ineffectiveness to cause great loss by delays, etc., in notifying the Department of fires, yet it believes that no system should be adopted without consultation with well-known electrical experts and a careful investigation made of the systems adopted in other cities where new and up-to-date plans have been tested and tried.

The Board believes that the Chief of the Department should be the absolute head of the uniformed force; that the Charter should be so amended that delinquents shall be punished by him, as he is responsible for the discipline of the Department; that he should preside at all trials and mete out punishment where deserved. This duty should not devolve upon the Commissioner or his deputies.

The building laws now in existence are excellent, if they are enforced. We must take the reality of the City as we find it, however, including the antiquated structures which time alone will replace, but the building regulations must be strictly enforced to aid in the protection against fire losses.

The rule of the Fire Department requiring commanding officers of companies to visit the buildings in their districts in order to learn the character of their contents and to become acquainted with their interior construction, so that the lives of the firemen shall be protected against avoidable accidents and their work facilitated, should be rigidly enforced, and any officers neglecting this duty should be held strictly accountable.

The apparatus purchased should be of the best, and the selection of the men who are to be put in charge of the same as Engineers should be surrounded by every safeguard which will insure to the service the greatest ability and efficiency.

The character of the supplies, hose, etc., furnished under the present system of awards would not seem to be up to the standard, and all supplies, of whatever character, should be rigidly inspected and tested by experts before it is accepted by the City.

The personnel of the Department is good; to the individuality of the men is due in a great measure the efficiency shown, and with the eradication of politics from the Department the esprit de corps would be all that could be desired.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The City of New York,
Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn,
Brooklyn, January 29, 1906.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I am compelled to respectfully make application to your Honorable Body for the issuing of Revenue Bonds and the allotment of the proceeds thereof to the Borough President of Brooklyn, for use in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, to the amount of \$118,655.08. This amount is required for purposes as follows:

The item \$6,165 was asked for in the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices Budget for 1906, and cut out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It comprehends, among other things, salaries for employees of the new Duffield street interior bath building, which was opened in the latter part of 1905, and which salaries, by reason of the reduction by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is now being paid from the Bureau's inadequate budget.

Items \$4,162.50 and \$3,363, for prevailing rates of wages, explain themselves.

The items \$2,970 and \$1,375 represent amounts necessary for the salaries of additional help for the new addition to the Kings County Hall of Records—help that cannot be done without if the Bureau is to be properly cared for.

The items \$5,912.50 and \$4,125 are for the purpose of equalizing the salaries of Attendants in this borough with those in the Borough of Manhattan, where all male Attendants receive not less than \$900, and all female Attendants not less than \$750. We have some male Attendants at \$900 per year, some male Attendants at \$750 per year, and some female Attendants at \$750 per year and some female Attendants at \$600 per year.

The \$12,137.08 is for repairs and supplies contemplated during the year 1906, when the 1906 Budget was prepared, but which, for some reason not apparent, was cut out by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This amount should be provided for if absolutely necessary matters are to be attended to this year.

The \$50,000 item is the estimated cost of a new comfort station that has been requested to be erected on the Williamsburg Bridge plaza. It is a desirable proposition, and its necessity has been emphasized by a local board of trade.

The \$1,000 item is intended to pay for changes in the construction of the two upper floors in the old Montauk Theatre building for Municipal Court Justice Bayles' court room. In providing funds for Judge Bayles' necessities, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment did not take into consideration the cost of repairs to the building in which the court was to be located, for the reason, perhaps, that the Board did not know at the time just where the Sixth District Municipal Court was to be provided with quarters. The City owns the property, and, if it is to be made habitable as a court room, improvements necessitating an expenditure of a thousand dollars are absolutely necessary.

The item \$10,655 is to pay for the new metallic furniture for the county officers located in the Hall of Records—furniture that was not provided for in a contract arranged when the order was given to the Van Dorn Iron Works Company, of Cleveland, Ohio, and which contract was paid for out of a special appropriation for enlarging and furnishing the building. This fund is now depleted, and if the county officers are to be provided with furniture to answer their requirements, this appropriation should be made.

The item \$15,000 is asked for to defray the cost of very necessary repairs, such as painting, tiling, electrical and carpentry work for the Borough Hall, the building in which the Borough President's offices are located, and which has not received any extensive consideration in the repair relation in over two years.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Sirs—I am in due receipt of a communication from your Honorable Board adopted January 16, but not received at this office until January 20, which is in the form of a resolution, as follows:

"Whereas, The revised Greater New York Charter requires the enactment of a number of general ordinances upon important subjects theretofore covered by special ordinances; and

"Whereas, The individual members of this Board, occupied in their official duties and personal callings, have not the leisure necessary for the careful preparation of such general legislation; and

"Whereas, The failure to enact general ordinances providing for licenses for certain sidewalk privileges and other private uses of the public streets is continually depriving the City of a large amount of revenue; be it

"Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel is respectfully requested and urged to assign one of his assistants to the preparation of the general ordinances above mentioned and generally to advise this Board and its committees regarding the form and effect of proposed legislation."

I have given to this communication careful consideration, and I have to advise you as follows:

Of course, it is quite important that the general ordinances you mention should be carefully drafted by your Honorable Board in conjunction with the Law Department, which will be called to enforce them, and it will give me pleasure to render any assistance I can in the furtherance of the object of your communication.

It will not be possible, however, for me to assign permanently any one assistant to the preparation of ordinances, for the reason that the office force in this Department is not sufficient in numbers to even keep abreast of the ordinary everyday work, and, therefore, I would not be able to assign any one of the senior members of the staff permanently for the purpose suggested.

However, it seems to me that upon a conference between this Department and your Honorable Body by means of interviews between such committee, or chairman thereof, as may have more immediate charge of the subject, and one of my senior assistants whom I will designate for that purpose, that a plan of action can be laid out by which the preparation and codification of the ordinances can be arranged for, by assigning various subjects to various assistants having special knowledge, and by means of conferences with the proper Departments, or with citizens having special experience in regard thereto.

I further suggest that these ordinances should in their final form be embodied in and form part of the General Revised Ordinances of the City.

If you will designate some person having authority to act on behalf of your Honorable Board, I will cause the matter to be taken up and a general scheme of preparation arranged.

AN ORDINANCE governing sidewalk widths in the Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. In carrying out street improvements in the Borough of Queens, where the regulation of sidewalks and curbing is affected in all new streets and in old ones, where possible, unless serious difficulties interfere, to be then determined by the President of the Borough, the sidewalks between street lines and curbs shall be of widths as follows:

A—Where street is less than forty (40) feet wide, to be determined by the President of the Borough, as each special case may require, special.

B—Where street is forty (40) feet wide and less than fifty (50), 10 feet.

C—Where street is fifty (50) feet wide and less than sixty (60), 12.5 feet.

D—Where street is sixty (60) feet wide and less than seventy (70), 15 feet.

E—Where street is seventy (70) feet wide and less than eighty (80), 17.5 feet.

F—Where street is eighty (80) feet wide and less than one hundred (100), 20 feet.

G—Where street is one hundred (100) feet wide and over, to be determined by the President of the Borough, as each special case may require, special.

Sec. 2. For all new sidewalk pavement the footway shall be not less than five (5) feet in width, with either flagstone or artificial stone, in full accordance with or better than called for in the standard specification for this work, on file in the office of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Sec. 3. All sidewalks shall be laid on a grade rising from top of the curb one-half (½) of an inch to each foot where only five (5) foot width of pavement is laid, and of one-third (⅓) of an inch where the whole sidewalk width is to be paved.

Sec. 4. All ordinances or parts thereof now in effect conflicting with these are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

This additional sum is necessary to meet the present jail pay-roll.

While it is true that the population of the County Jail is small, nevertheless the Sheriff is compelled to provide as complete an equipment in the respect of day and night watchers, keepers, etc., as though the jail were full. As a matter of fact, the present working schedule is based on twelve-hour shifts, seven days in a week.

I am creditably informed that it was only through a misapprehension of the actual conditions that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment last year reduced the appropriation for the New York County Jail by the amount of six thousand dollars for the year 1906. Unless this sum is made available for the purpose I have set forth it will result in great hardship to the unfortunates who, although not criminals, must be confined in the jail, and the result cannot be but discreditable to the entire community.

Colonel Kipp, the Chief Clerk of the Police Department, appeared before the Committee, and the Committee received a letter from the Police Commissioner, which is appended to this report. The proposition is to create a new place of Executive Clerk to the Police Commissioner at a salary of \$2,100—the same salary as that received by the Secretaries to the Deputy Police Commissioners. If the resolution establishing the place is adopted the Commissioner intends to apply to the Civil Service Commission to place it in the exempt class. It is the intention of the Commissioner to employ this clerk in some of the work now done by the Secretary to the Commissioner, and also in connection with some of the Commissioner's administrative duties, especially regarding departmental supplies. The Committee is not convinced that there is any need for this additional position, and is inclined to the opinion that if its creation would not lead to conflict with the regularly organized clerical force of the Department it would almost certainly lead to a duplication of functions. The Committee does not wish to criticize the Commissioner, and does not wish to take the position of refusing to help him in his sincere and earnest desire to improve conditions in his office, but we think that he will be a better judge of those conditions and better able to advise the Committee upon the needs of his office after the lapse of a few months.

REPORT:

The Corporation Counsel appeared before the Committee and made a full explanation of the items of this resolution. In addition, through the Assistant Chief Clerk in his office, he afforded the Chairman of the Committee an opportunity for a minute examination of the situation which, it is claimed, calls for the creation of these additional places. By the regulation of the State Civil Service Commission the Corporation Counsel is allowed 75 exempt places; he now has 68. The first seven places provided for by the resolution will be in the exempt class. It is the Corporation Counsel's intention to fill the first four places by promotion of deserving assistants, and to leave the lower grades for new appointments. The resolution provides for a salary of the Assistant Chief Clerk at \$4,000. This is an increase of \$400 to a man who has been in the employ of the office for twenty years, and has not had an increase for several years. The Committee inquired especially as to the item of 30 Special Process Servers to be paid at the rate of \$1.15 for each summons or process actually served, the compensation not to exceed \$100 per month in any individual case, and the Committee approves this as a particularly practical measure. The Committee believes that the legal business of the City has so increased in volume that the creation of the additional positions is necessary, and the practical result to the City will be measured by the efficiency and competency of the additional employees whom the Corporation Counsel may select. Attention is called to the fact that appropriation has already been made in the last Budget for these positions.

In view of the foregoing, the Committee recommends the adoption of the resolution.

The Committee on Salaries and Offices desires to submit to the Board its views upon the subject of systematizing the fixing of salaries, which, since consolidation, has been always haphazard, often ill-considered and sometimes plainly a matter of favoritism. In a well-regulated business house the general subject of salaries is considered once a year, usually in January, and increases are allowed upon a basis of length and quality of service. The clerks confine their expectations and anxieties to that period of the year, and at other times are not disturbed by intrigues and wire-pulling. In the City's business there is no such system. At any time that a departmental head is impressed with the desirability of raising a salary he sits down and writes to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment asking for a resolution for the increase. When a new Commissioner takes office he is prone to look about for opportunities to make new places and to increase salaries. If he were a new chief in a business office he would wait until he was familiar with the routine and the employees before he made any departures, and then his first thought would be for measures of economy.

It seems desirable to introduce into the administration of the City's business a rule limiting consideration of salary increases to stated periods only. As salary resolutions originate in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, such a rule, if deemed wise, should be laid down by that Board. Your Committee believes such a rule to be desirable, and therefore asks the Board of Aldermen to adopt the following resolution:

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen believes that the creation of new positions in the City's employ and the fixing of salaries generally should be considered in a manner both systematic and comprehensive.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to establish a rule requiring applications for the creation of new positions and grades and the fixing of salaries to be made in conjunction with the submission of departmental estimates for the purposes of the Budget; and that said Board is further requested to advise the several departmental heads that such applications will not be considered at any other time except upon extraordinary cause shown.

No. 83.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on January 16, 1906 (Minutes, page 270), the annexed communication from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, requesting an issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$225,995.70, for use of his Department, respectfully

REPORT:

That it has given full consideration to the matter, and after hearing M. J. Kennedy, Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, who explained that the money was needed for the purposes set forth in the annexed letter, and that he would not be able to prosecute any of the work if he did not have this money as requested.

He urged upon this Committee the necessity for early action, and from his statements your Committee feels this to be a proper request, and therefore recommends the adoption of the annexed resolution.

Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens,
Litchfield Mansion, Prospect Park, Borough of Brooklyn,
January 15, 1906.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I am again compelled to respectfully make application to your Honorable Body for the issuing of Revenue Bonds and the allotment of the proceeds therefrom to this Department for the sum of two hundred and twenty-five thousand nine hundred and ninety-five dollars and seventy cents (\$225,995.70). This amount is required to make up the deficiency between the sum actually needed for the maintenance of the parks, parkways and playgrounds as well as the care of the street trees in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens which are now under the jurisdiction of this Department, and the amount granted by your Honorable Body in the annual Budget.

The actual expenditures in the Department during the year 1905 were equal to the amount allowed in the Budget, four hundred and ninety thousand dollars (\$490,000), plus an allowance of Revenue Bonds amounting to seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), bringing the grand total to five hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars (\$565,000).

A number of parks which were under construction during the year 1905 are now practically completed, and money for their maintenance must be secured. These parks are Sunset Park, McKinley Park, Institute Park, Highland Park, Fourth Avenue Park Plots, Fulton Park, Amersfort Park, Rainey Park, McLaughlin Park.

It is estimated that the amount necessary to adequately maintain the same will be seventy-one thousand three hundred and ninety-eight dollars (\$71,398).

For a number of years past this Department has endeavored to secure money for the establishment of a Bureau of Tree Culture, as provided by chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902, but no specific amount has been allowed, and this important work could not receive the attention it deserves. The courts have held in several instances that the City authorities are responsible for the condition of the street trees, and the City is liable for any damage that may be done persons or property by reason of trees or limbs of trees falling upon the public highways. The Department is also constantly importuned and called upon to clean trees of insects, and while some work has been done last year in that direction, the complaints that could not be attended to on account of the lack of appropriation have been very numerous and urgent. A careful estimate of the amount required to establish this Bureau and put it on a proper footing is fifty-seven thousand nine hundred and fifty-five dollars (\$57,955).

An amount of thirty-four thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$34,927.50) has been put in the Budget for the year 1906 to pay for an increased number of laborers and female cottage attendants. It has been estimated on account of the increased use by the public of our park system we will require during the year 1906 forty additional laborers, the pay amounting to twenty-six thousand two hundred and seventy-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$26,279.50), and twelve female cottage attendants to take care of nine new buildings, some of which have already been completed, and three attendants for buildings now in use, requiring an additional expenditure of eight thousand six hundred and forty-eight dollars (\$8,648). From this amount of thirty-four thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$34,927.50), however, twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) can be deducted which has already been allowed by the Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment over and above the amount allowed for the year 1905. This will require a net increase of fourteen thousand nine hundred and twenty-seven dollars and fifty cents (\$14,927.50).

An item of sixty-three thousand five hundred and forty-five dollars and twenty cents (\$63,545.20) which this Department made plain was needed for the re-soiling of the plantations in Prospect Park, was apparently not allowed. The trees in this park have for some years shown the effects of the long and severe winters. The soil surrounding them has become vitiated, and after a thorough investigation

and examination by the experts of the Park Department, it was decided that in order to save a great many of the trees which are already showing signs of stagnation and decay and to also prevent the healthy trees from deteriorating, it would be necessary that the soil around these trees should be entirely replaced with new mould and fertilizer. It has been estimated that it will take two years to do this work, and that the total cost will be one hundred and twenty-seven thousand and ninety dollars and forty cents (\$127,090.40), one-half of which, amounting to sixty-three thousand five hundred and forty-five dollars and twenty cents (\$63,545.20) is asked for to begin this work during the year 1906.

An item of ten thousand one hundred and seventy dollars (\$10,170) has been asked for in order to take care of the increases made necessary in the pay of mechanics, etc., under the prevailing rate of wages act.

An item of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) has been asked for additional supplies made necessary by the greatly enlarged park area. This is but a very small amount in the total of supplies of one hundred and nineteen thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$119,150) estimated to be required for this year.

I am constrained to ask your Honorable Body for the issuing of Revenue Bonds in the above amount at this time for the reason that the allowance made in the Budget for the year 1906 is not sufficient to permit of the retention of all the employees now on our pay-rolls, and if immediate relief is not granted or at least assured, it will become necessary to dispense with the services of some two hundred laborers and a corresponding number of teams and carts.

Briggs, Esq., Chief Engineer for the Borough of The Bronx, who explained that this proposed tunnelling of Mosholu parkway under Jerome avenue was for the purpose of doing away with the grade crossing at the junction of these two streets, by reason of which many collisions of Jerome avenue trolley cars with crossing vehicles have occurred, and will probably more frequently occur as the Mosholu parkway is becoming more popular for automobiles and driving purposes. He further presented at the request of the Committee a detailed statement (hereto annexed) of the proposed work, which to your Committee seems reasonable.

This appears to be a necessary and urgent improvement, and your Committee therefore recommends the adoption of the said ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of one hundred and fifteen thousand dollars (\$115,000) for the purpose of providing means for the construction of a bridge to carry Jerome avenue over the Mosholu Parkway drive and approaches in the Borough of The Bronx.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Sir—Inclosed herewith is a copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Health at its meeting held Wednesday, January 17, 1906, requesting the Board of Aldermen to authorize the Board of Health to contract for and purchase in the open market, without public letting, at the lowest price obtainable, 12,115 tons of white ash anthracite coal of various sizes, as required for the use of the Department of Health in its steamboats, hospitals for contagious diseases and office and other buildings located in the various boroughs of the City.

At a recent opening of bids for this coal the prices asked were greatly in excess of the price paid by the Department in the open market, and comparison of the bids with such prices revealed a difference of something over four thousand dollars over what the same amount of coal can be purchased in the open market. Options have been given the Department by certain dealers to supply all the coal required for immediate delivery at a difference in price ranging from thirty cents to sixty cents per ton for the various sizes. Dealers generally seem to dislike to execute a contract for future delivery owing to the present uncertainties regarding the prospects of a strike among the coal miners.

It is believed that prompt and favorable action on the request of the Board of Health by the Board of Aldermen will result in a saving of from three to four thousand dollars in the purchase of 12,000 tons of coal, and remove the danger of a shortage of coal in the contagious disease hospitals should a strike among the miners occur.

Whereas, It is currently announced that the recent steady progress toward an absolute monopoly in the providing of passenger transportation in The City of New York has reached or is about to reach its consummation by the merger of practically all the street car lines into one gigantic and grasping corporation to exploit for its own purposes this great City of New York; and

Whereas, The individuals and interests who have joined forces for this purpose have, for some time, been in practical control of the transportation service of the City and have conducted that service without the slightest regard to the public convenience, but with an evident intention of exacting as heavy a tribute as possible from the public in order to make valuable stock issued which represents at present no real or legitimate investment; and

Whereas, It is made plain that to this great over-capitalization these individuals and interests intend to add a stock issue of one hundred and eight million dollars, representing little or nothing in the way of real value except the privilege of extorting from the public through a car-fare tax; and

Whereas, These individuals and interests now combined either practically control or are about to obtain the control of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company's system, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and intend to do all of these things without respect to and in utter defiance to public opinion, as is made evident by the recent rally of eminent counsel to defend in the courts the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company's insolent claim to the right to extend franchises by injunction, contending as they do under a sweeping order of the court, obtained by them four years ago and held in abeyance for use in a crisis, that the City and not the railroad company shall be compelled to produce proof as to the validity of any franchise or any use of the public streets, and boldly asserting, as their counsel did this morning to the Hon. Justice Kelly, of the Supreme Court, in Brooklyn, that this preposterous claim is one of the company's fundamental rights; be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of five members be appointed to investigate into all the circumstances of the reported merger of the street railroad interests of The City of New York and all matters relating thereto; and be it

Resolved, That the said Committee shall have all the powers given by law to this Board with regard to the summoning of witnesses, and are hereby authorized to employ special counsel for the purposes of this investigation.

Alderman Wafer moved that this preamble and resolution be amended by striking from the resolution the words "A Special Committee of five members be appointed to" before the word "investigate," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "Committee on Railroads," and also by striking out after the word "investigate" the word "into."

Gentlemen—I have received, under date December 7, 1905, a communication from the City Clerk and Clerk of the Board of Aldermen transmitting an order in the matter of the application of the Ocean and Bay Front Improvement Company, directing the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York to refund certain taxes levied by the Town of Hempstead in the year 1895, and I am asked to advise your Honorable Board as to the rights, powers and duties in the premises.

It is provided by section 16 of the County Law (chapter 686, Laws of 1902), that the Board of Supervisors may correct any manifest clerical or other error in any assessment or returns made by any one or more town officers to such board, or which may or shall have properly come before such Board for its action, confirmation or review, and cause to be refunded to any person the amount collected from him of any tax illegally or improperly assessed or levied, and upon the order of the County Court it shall refund any such tax.

Under this provision of law an application was made to the County Court of Queens County by the Ocean and Bay Front Improvement Company for an order directing the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York to refund the amount of taxes, viz., \$237.96, paid upon premises described in the assessment roll of the Town of Hempstead as bounded north by Jamaica Bay, east by land of Downing estate, south by Long Island Railroad Company, District 21, 40 acres, together with interest thereon from February 24, 1905.

The powers of the Board of Supervisors of Queens County would devolve upon the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York by section 1586 of the Greater New York Charter.

The order in question has been duly entered and was granted in pursuance of the act referred to.

I advise you, therefore, that it is your duty to pass a resolution directing the Comptroller to refund the amount of said taxes, together with interest thereon.

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and providing for the acquisition, construction and establishment of a public wholesale market, partly in the Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and authorizing the issue of bonds to pay for the same.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Provision is hereby made for the acquisition and establishment of a public wholesale market partly in the Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon lands hereinafter described, which are hereby selected for a public wholesale market in said Borough of Brooklyn, and surveys and maps thereof are hereby directed to be made and filed as provided by law. Said lands shall be acquired for said purposes by purchase or by condemnation proceedings, as required by law, provided, however, that this matter be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and that no further proceedings be taken until the acquisition of said lands is approved and authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as required by law.

Sec. 2. The lands so selected shall be set apart for use as a public wholesale market, provided, however, that said lands or any part thereof, whenever they shall no longer be required for the purpose of a market, may be assigned by the Commissioners of the

Sinking Fund for use for any other public purpose, or may be sold by said Commissioners in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 3. For the purpose of paying for the acquisition of said lands, whether such lands be acquired by purchase or by condemnation proceedings, and for the purpose of paying for the construction of said market, the Comptroller, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in the manner provided by law is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York. Such Corporate Stock shall be issued from time to time upon the requisition of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to the amount of such requisition or requisitions, and the proceeds thereof shall be paid into the City Treasury and shall constitute a fund for the purpose aforesaid.

Sec. 4. The lands hereinbefore mentioned and referred to are described as follows: All that certain plot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being partly in the Twenty-sixth and Twenty-eighth Wards, Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City and State of New York, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point at the intersection of Fulton street and Broadway and running thence westerly along the northerly side of Fulton street to the easterly side of Conway street, thence northerly along the easterly side of Conway street to the southerly side of Broadway, and thence southeasterly along the southerly side of Broadway to the point or place of beginning.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 184.

By Alderman Hann—

Resolved, That it be and it hereby is respectfully recommended to his Honor, the Mayor, Mr. George B. McClellan, that he direct the Hon. John McGaw Woodbury, Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, to appoint a Deputy Commissioner of Street Cleaning in and for the Borough of Brooklyn, for the following reasons:

1. That there is no Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning for the Borough of Brooklyn, nor has there been for the past four years, while the Charter of The City of New York expressly provides for such an appointment; and for the further reason:

2. That the individual who performs some of the duties of Deputy Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning is one Mr. William Clark, who holds the title of Section Superintendent under the classified Civil Service rules and regulations, and has never officially been designated as Deputy Commissioner and therefore cannot perform the duties of the office, with the result that all official matters of any importance must be referred to Hon. John McGaw Woodbury, the Commissioner of said Department for The City of New York; and for the further reason:

3. That as a result of the facts stated in this resolution, the citizens of the Borough of Brooklyn are sadly neglected, inconvenienced and delayed in obtaining thorough and prompt action upon the matters which they bring to the attention of the office of the Department of Street Cleaning in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the reason, as previously stated, that all matters of any importance are referred by the said Section Superintendent to the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning for the City before official action can be taken upon the same, thus necessitating undue delay and neglect, while if a Deputy Commissioner was appointed in name and with authority thereby conferred, speedy and thorough action could be taken upon all petitions brought to the attention of said Deputy Commissioner of the Street Cleaning Department for this borough; and for the further reason:

4. That there is no person to hold responsible as the head of the said Department of Street Cleaning in this borough for the filthy and unkept condition of the streets in this borough, while if there was a Deputy Commissioner of Street Cleaning for this borough there would be some individual directly responsible to the citizens, to whom to make their complaints and hold him responsible for failure to improve the situation; and for the further reason:

5. That, whereas, the population of the Borough of Brooklyn amounts to upwards of 1,500,000, and, whereas, the citizens of this borough contribute one-third of the taxes levied annually in the entire Greater City of New York, they should have, and, as a matter of right, are entitled, to receive full representation in all of the various Departments as provided by law, and, more specifically, that they are entitled to the appointment of a Deputy Commissioner of Street Cleaning in and for this borough, to be appointed as such with the right to exercise all the duties and functions of the office.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Offices.

No. 185.

By the same—

Resolved, That it be and it hereby is respectfully recommended to the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning in and for The City of New York, that he assign men to assist the cart drivers in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City, in lifting and dumping ash cans into the said carts for the reasons as follows:

1. That if said additional men should be assigned it would cause a sufficient greater number of loads to be hauled by said horses and carts to more than cover the increased cost in salaries of such additional men assigned to this duty, and for the further reason:

2. That for a long time prior to the initiation of the present system, now in vogue for several months, it was the custom of the Department of Street Cleaning to have additional men assigned to the work of assisting the cart drivers in the lifting and dumping of ash cans, and for the further reason:

3. That the system now in effect is inhuman and results in overtaxing the cart drivers who are compelled to lift the ash cans alone, and has resulted in a great number of them being laid up at the present time and suffering from strained backs, and some of them in all probability injured for life, while others will suffer a long time from the said strains, and the adoption and putting into effect of this resolution hereby recommended will result in remedying the evils complained of.

No. 186.

By the same—

AN ORDINANCE in relation to vehicular traffic on the Ocean parkway, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle over the easterly side road or bridle road of the Ocean parkway between Prospect Park and the Coney Island concourse, except as it may be necessary to cart or convey supplies to the residences along said easterly side road, or in case of buildings being erected fronting on said side road, when it shall be lawful to cart building materials thereon. In all cases, however, vehicles must enter said side road from the street nearest to said residence or house in course of construction, and must leave the same at the next following intersecting street.

Sec. 2. Any violator of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either by confession or by competent testimony, shall be fined in the sum of _____ dollars for each offense, and in default of the payment of such fine shall be committed to the City Prison until the same be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed _____ days.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

No. 187.

By Alderman Herold—

Resolution Adopted by the United Civic Associations of the Borough of Queens, January 18, 1906.

Whereas, The New York Connecting Railroad Company seeks to build a bridge between the Boroughs of The Bronx and Queens over Ward's and Randall's islands for its private use; and

Whereas, Such bridge would occupy a very prominent site and the best route between the two boroughs, and would thus be in the way of the construction of a bridge by the City, and doubtless be the only one to be constructed between the two boroughs for many years to come,

Resolved, That while there is no disposition to obstruct such railway from all proper facilities, the bridge should be constructed and owned by the City, not only to insure its architectural sightliness and durability, but in order to provide over the structure accommodation for all kinds of traffic, pedestrian, vehicular, trolley and rapid transit, leaving also room for the New York Connecting Railroad Company to pass over it on tracks leased from the City, and to maintain the principle of City

ownership of all such important interborough bridges, each of which should be not like the average ugly railroad structure, but an ornament to the Greater City; and

Resolved, That our Borough President, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Board of Aldermen and the Rapid Transit Commission be requested to act in accordance with the spirit of this resolution.

No. 189.

By Alderman Jacobson—

AN ORDINANCE to add to the provisions of the ordinance governing the use of nitro-glycerine dynamite with explosive base, like dynamite or giant powder.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

1. The Municipal Explosives Commission shall preserve in proper form a record of inspections of all magazines made under its directions, and of the amount of explosives allowed in each case, and in cases where any magazine or any apparatus or appliances connected therewith shall be deemed by the Commission after inspection to be insecure or dangerous.

The Commission shall prescribe such alterations as may render such magazines, apparatus or appliances secure and devoid of danger, and in the meantime, and until such changes and alterations are made and such appliances attached, such magazine, apparatus or appliances may be taken under control of the Municipal Explosives Commission and all persons prevented from using the same, and in cases deemed necessary the appliances, apparatus, or attachments for limitations of the amount of dynamite taken under control of the Municipal Explosives Commission; and no owner or agent of such owner of any magazine to carry dynamite shall employ any person to handle dynamite unless such person shall first obtain a certificate as to the qualifications therefor from a board of practical blasters, detailed as such by the Municipal Explosives Commission, such certificate to be countersigned by the Fire Commissioner.

2. In order to be qualified to be examined for and to receive such certificates of qualification as a blaster a person must comply to the satisfaction of said Board with the following requirements:

(a) He must be a citizen of the United States and over twenty-one years old.

(b) He must, on his first application for examination, fill out, in his own handwriting, a blank application to be prepared and supplied by the said Municipal Explosives Commission, and which shall contain the name, age and place of residence of the applicant, the place or places where previously employed and the nature of employment, for five years prior to the date of his application, and a statement that he is a citizen of the United States.

(c) He must be a person who has been employed as blaster's helper or a general assistant under the instruction of a licensed blaster in any building in The City of New York, for a period of not less than five years.

(d) The application shall be verified by him and shall, after the verification, contain a certificate signed by three blasters employed in New York City, and registered on the books of said Municipal Explosives Commission as blasters working at their trade, certifying that the statements contained in such application are true.

3. Any person or persons found blasting within the limits of The City of New York without a certificate from the Municipal Explosives Commission shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and when convicted thereof shall be fined \$100 or six months' imprisonment, or both.

Which was referred to the Committee on Laws and Legislation.

No. 190.

By the same—

Whereas, There is now pending in the Assembly of the State of New York a bill known as "Bill No. 43," introduced by Hon. Thomas Rock, a member of the Assembly.

Whereas, The above described bill is an Act to amend section 837 of the Greater New York Charter to setting aside piers for recreation.

Whereas, This bill authorizes the Commissioner of Docks to set apart a pier at or near the foot of East Forty-ninth street, on the East river; said pier at or near the foot of East Forty-ninth street on the East river shall be so set aside and the reconstruction or rebuilding thereof begun within six (6) months after the passage of this Act.

Whereas, The purpose of this section is to afford the inhabitants of a most crowded neighborhood greater opportunity for healthful recreation than they now possess.

Resolved, That the Board approves the above described bill, and respectfully urges the early passage of the above described bill in the Assembly, to the end that the inhabitants of The City of New York may be able to gain the benefit of healthful recreation as soon as possible.

No. 191.

By Alderman Kline—

AN ORDINANCE to amend "A general ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 40 of "A General Ordinance in relation to business requiring a license and the regulation thereof in The City of New York," which became approved May 22, 1899, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Common Shows.

Sec. 40A. Common show shall be deemed to include a carousel, Ferris wheel, gravity steeplechase, chute, scenic cave, bicycle carousel, scenic railway, striking machines, switchbacks, merry-go-round, puppet show, ball game, moving pictures, and all other shows of like character, but not to include games of baseball or to authorize gambling or any games of chance.

No. 192.

By Alderman Meyers—

Whereas, It has been estimated by competent authorities that the waste of water in The City of New York exceeds fifteen per centum of the daily consumption of the water in said City; and

Whereas, Said waste is believed by competent authorities to be caused by defective plumbing fixtures and by carelessness on the part of the users of said water; and

Whereas, It is believed by competent authorities and affirmed by the experience of other municipalities, that the exact measuring of the water supplied to each and every consumer by meter tends to and does actually obviate said waste.

Resolved, That the Committee on Water Supply, Gas and Electricity is requested to consider with great care the accompanying proposed ordinance, to hold public hearings thereon and to report its conclusions to this Board with all convenient speed.

AN ORDINANCE increasing the powers of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, respecting water meters.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of The City of New York, in pursuance of section 475 of the amended Greater New York Charter, is authorized, in his discretion, to cause water meters to be placed in all apartment houses, tenements, flat houses and private dwellings, in the said City of New York, so that all water furnished thereat may be measured and known by said Commissioner, and for the purpose of ascertaining a ratable portion of the cost of supply and distribution which consumers of water should pay for the water therein received and used.

Which resolution was adopted.

No. 193.

By Alderman Mulligan—

Whereas, It has recently come to light that the New York and Long Island Railroad Company has attempted to take by stealth a franchise worth to the City not less than ten million dollars, and with no pretense of a right, save some expired permits granted a generation ago to one John Steinway, the said company has secretly constructed a subway half a mile or more in extent beneath the City streets; and

Whereas, For several months past it has been repeatedly asserted at the office of August Belmont & Co. that work on the tunnel was being confined to private property, and was publicly announced by the Mayor and President of the Borough of Manhattan that all permits to said company for excavation under the streets had been revoked, pending the establishment of the validity of the said Steinway permits; therefore be it

Resolved, That a Special Committee of five be appointed by the Board to inquire if any official of the City administration, or of any of the boroughs, has given any consent or permit of any nature for this unlawful seizure of the streets; and said Committee is further directed to report to this Board in case it should develop that no such permits have been issued, who was negligent in not enforcing the law against blasting without the consent of the Fire Department and who allowed the erection of sheds and other obstructions in Forty-second street for the use of said railroad in its unlawful purpose.

No. 194.

By Alderman Murphy—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Robert Beerlis to erect and maintain a retaining wall four feet in height within the stoop line in front of his premises on the south side of Two Hundred and Fifth street, 72 feet west of Concourse in the Borough of The Bronx, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

No. 195.

By Alderman Olvany—

Whereas, The street surface railways of The City of New York have and are being operated in total disregard of the rights and comfort of the passengers riding upon the cars of said railways; and

Whereas, Passengers riding on the cars of said surface railways have in all kinds of weather been arbitrarily ordered by some officious hiring of the railroad company to leave the car in which they were riding and to take the car ahead in total disregard of the destination or terminus marked on the signboard or placard upon such car; and

Whereas, The interests of the passengers suffering such inconvenience and discomfort should be looked after and protected and such practices immediately stopped, therefore be it ordained as follows:

AN ORDINANCE in relation to car transfers in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. That every car operated, owned, managed or controlled by a street surface railroad company in the streets or highways of The City of New York shall carry throughout its route on the outside, in front and on top of each and every car so operated a signboard or placard upon which shall appear conspicuously the destination of the said car, under penalty of \$100 for each offense, recoverable against the company so offending in an action to be brought in the name of The City of New York.

Sec. 2. That every such street surface railroad company must carry for a single fare upon such car, without change therefrom, each and every passenger to any regular stopping place desired by him upon said car's route in the direction of the destination so designated, under a penalty of \$100 for each offense, recoverable against the company so offending by the person affected by the violation.

Sec. 3. That the preceding section of these ordinances shall not apply to a transfer made to a connecting line, going in a different direction from that in which such car may be going, nor where by reason of disability of the car compliance with the ordinance is rendered impossible.

Sec. 4. That all ordinances or parts of ordinances contrary to or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
