## Weekly Report.

147, June 29, 1908, and 148, July 6, 1908, were filed.

## Contract B.

2566, July 11, 1908, forwarded four pamphlets of this contract for furnishing and delivering supplies for the Engineering Bureau, and forms of advertisement. The Secretary reported that on July 11, 1908, he had transmitted these pamphlets and forms of advertisement to the Corporation Counsel for approval as to form, and that the same had been received, so approved. On motion, the fixing of the date for the opening of the bids for this contract and the selection of the papers in which the advertisement should be published were referred to Commissioner Shaw with power.

## Real Estate, Possession.

2598, July 3, 1908, recommended that the Corporation Counsel be urged to hasten the steps necessary to procure title and possession of the real estate shown upon the taking maps of Northern Aqueduct, Section 6, Kensico, Sections 11 and 12, and Southern Aqueduct, Section 13, and, on motion, was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

## Real Estate, Kensico, Section 9, Parcel 596.

## Real Estate, Highways.

2608, July 9, 1908, forwarded map, Acc. N-687, showing change in highway to be reconstructed as a State road near Ireland Corners, Town of Gardiner, Ulster County, N. Y., known in the file of the State Engineer's office as Highland-Gardiner Road, State Road No. 351. On motion, the Secretary was directed to write to the State Engineer, requesting his approval of this map.

## Police.

2609, July 10, 1908, reported that arrangements would be made to bring water to the police buildings near Browns Station, and, on motion, was referred to Commissioner Benschel with power.

## Real Estate, Fences.

2610, July 13, 1908, recommended that all fencing of the aqueduct line be done at the expense of the City, so as to be uniform and of such character as may be necessary for the protection of the City's property. On motion, this matter was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

## Real Estate, Northern Aqueduct, Section 6.

2622, July 13, 1908, reported that the only parcels in this section over or through which the acquisition of a permanent easement should be considered were Parcels Nos. 289, 296 and 297, and that all the other real estate in this section should be acquired in fee. On motion, this matter was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

## Real Estate, Taxes.

2623, July 14, 1908, called to the attention of the Board the question of the assessment for taxation of the real estate acquired by the City in the Town of Gardiner, and, on motion, was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

## Contract No. 22.

2565, July 13, 1908, transmitted four pamphlets of this contract for the construction of the Bull Hill tunnel in the Town of Phillipstown, Putnam County, and also forms of advertisement. The Secretary reported that on July 14, 1908, these pamphlets and forms of advertisement had been submitted to the Corporation Counsel for approval as to form, and that the same had been received, so approved. On motion, the fixing of the date for the opening of the bids and the selection of the papers in which said advertisement should be published were referred to Commissioner Chadwick, with power.

## COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE LAW DEPARTMENT.

## Contract No. 12.

327, July 8, 1908, advised that steps would be taken immediately to pay one-half the assessed valuation of Parcels Nos. 157 and 160, Northern Aqueduct, and that the Board of Water Supply should enter into negotiations with the Ellenville and Kingston Railroad Company, with a view to making an agreement with said Company for the title and possession of Parcel No. 162, Northern Aqueduct, said agreement to be similar to the one already entered into with the Wallkill Valley Railroad Company as to Parcel No. 215, Section 5, Northern Aqueduct. On motion, this opinion was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

Communication 2615, July 13, 1908, was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending that immediate steps be taken to procure possession, not merely of said Parcel No. 157, but also of Parcels Nos. 144 and 174.

332, July 11, 1908, transmitted copies of orders of the Supreme Court, directing the deposit of one-half the assessed valuation of Parcels Nos. 144, 147, 156, 157, 158, 159, 160 and 174. The Secretary reported that he had on July 11, 1908, transmitted said copies of orders, and the original of said opinion to the Auditor, with instructions to prepare and forward to the Comptroller at once the necessary vouchers. On motion, this action of the Secretary was confirmed.
