Authorizing a lease of the above ferry to the Clason and College Point Ferry Company, together with the following described property: All the land and land under water which is now owned or which may hereafter be acquired by the City as will be covered by and is, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Docks, necessary for the construction and maintenance of ferry structures, racks, platform and other structures as shown and indicated upon the plan or plans annexed to the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks. The term of the lease to be ten years from June 1, 1910; the company to pay as rent for the franchise and for the land and land under water aforesaid, a sum equal to two per cent. of the gross receipts yearly; the lessee is to build, erect, make and furnish and at all times well and sufficiently uphold, maintain and keep in good order and substantial repair, the necessary ferry structures, floats, racks, fenders, bridges and other fixtures at the landing places in The City of New York; the lessee at the commencement of the lease to dredge, as required by the Commissioner, the slips adjacent to the wharf property and under the platforms, and to keep dredged such slips. The lessee is to have the privilege of renewal of this lease for a further term of ten years, the rental to be fixed by arbitration, but said rental shall in no case be less than the rental provided for in the first term. In case the ferry is not in operation on or before September 1, 1910, the lease shall be void and of no force or effect. Filed.

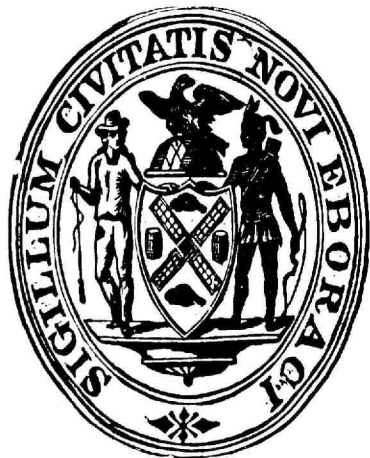

That no captain, agent, or person having charge of or attached to any ferryboat, sailing or other vessel, nor any person in charge of any car, stage, or other vehicle, or public or private conveyance, shall convey or allow to be conveyed thereon or by any means aforesaid, nor shall any person convey or allow to be carried or conveyed, in any manner, from, through, into or within The City of New York, the dead body of any human being, or any part thereof, without a permit therefor from the Board of Health. And the proper portion for that purpose attached to any such permit, when issued, shall be preserved and returned to this Department, as its regulations may require, by the proper officer or person on each boat or vessel, and by the proper person in charge of any train of cars or vehicle on which any such body may be carried from said city. Provided, however, that the same effect shall be given, under this section, to a transit permit issued by Boards of Health, Health Officers, Registrars or other duly authorized persons, in any State of the United States, whose rules and regulations for the transportation of the dead are in material accord with those at present in force in The City of New York, or which may be hereafter adopted, approved and enforced by the Board of Health of the Department of Health of said City.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
