BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

Minutes of Meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, on Thursday, March 9, 1911.

FINANCIAL AND FRANCHISE MATTERS.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—William J. Gaynor, Mayor; William A. Prendergast, Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchel, President of the Board of Aldermen; George McAneny, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Alfred E. Steers, President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Cyrus C. Miller, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Lawrence Gresser, President of the Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. William J. Gaynor, presided during the consideration of the Franchise Calendar, after which he withdrew.

The President of the Board of Aldermen presided during the consideration of the Public Improvement and Financial Calendars.

The Franchise Calendar was the first calendar considered.

The minutes (Financial and Franchise Matters) of meetings held February 16 and 23, 1911, as printed in the City Record March 2 and 9, 1911, respectively, were approved.

FRANCHISE MATTERS.

South Shore Traction Company.

The hearing was opened on the order to show cause why a resolution declaring forfeited the contract dated May 20, 1909, granting a franchise to the South Shore Traction Company, and the contract dated December 31, 1909, modifying the aforesaid contract, should not be adopted.

By resolution adopted February 2, 1911, the Company and its Receivers were directed to show cause on March 2, 1911, why the aforementioned action should not be taken, and were notified that in case the Company or its Receivers failed to appear, action might be taken forthwith.

At the meeting of March 2, 1911, the hearing was continued until this day to afford the Counsel for the Receivers an opportunity to advise the Board if it could have access to the books of the Railway Traction Construction Company, the contractor for the construction of the proposed railway of the South Shore Traction Company, which books were said to be in the hands of the District Attorney of New York County.

Dear Sir—Your letter of the 2d inst. received. You state that the hearing to show cause why a resolution declaring forfeited the contract of May 20, 1909, granting a franchise to the South Shore Traction Company should not be passed, was adjourned until March 9 to afford counsel an opportunity to advise the Board if it could have access to the books of the Railway Traction Construction Company.

I regret that I am compelled to state that neither Paul T. Brady and Willard V. King, nor I, as their Counsel, have ever had any connection whatever with the Railway Traction Construction Company. I understand that Mr. Peter Alexander was appointed a Receiver in bankruptcy of that Company, his appointment being in this district. The Receivers of the South Shore Traction Company were appointed in the Second District. Neither they nor I have the slightest knowledge with reference to the books themselves, although we do know that they were delivered under subpoena by Mr. Jerome to the District Attorney of New York County. So far as the Receivers are concerned, they are only too anxious to facilitate the Board of Estimate in any examination which it may care to make. I shall, therefore, take up the question on Monday next, if possible, with President Mitchel, with a view of ascertaining some method for meeting the views of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as expressed by him at the last meeting, provided my information is correct. James M. Gifford, Counsel for the Receivers, appeared and stated he was using his utmost endeavors to secure the books and had a promise from the Receiver in Bankruptcy of the Company to furnish such books, and when received he would deliver same to the President of the Board of Aldermen.

The hearing was then continued indefinitely.

In the matter of the application of the South Shore Traction Company for an extension of time of six months from November 20, 1910, in which to select and designate its route in Jamaica, Borough of Queens, in accordance with the provisions of Section 2, First, of the contract dated May 20, 1909, granting said Company a franchise.

At the meeting of February 2, 1911, a report was received from the Franchise Committee, recommending the petition be denied, but at the request of the Attorneys for the Receivers action was deferred until February 16, 1911, when the matter was laid over until March 2, 1911, and on that date the matter was laid over until this day.

The matter was referred back to the Chief Engineer.

In the matter of the communication dated November 19, 1910, from the South Shore Traction Company, selecting and designating its route in the former Village of Jamaica, Borough of Queens, under and pursuant to Section 2, First, of the contract dated May 20, 1909, granting a franchise to said Company, and stating the route selected is subject to modification or amendment should the pending application of the Company for an extension of time to select such route be granted.

At the meeting of February 2, 1911, a report was received from the Franchise Committee, recommending that such designation be not accepted as a designation of route in accordance with the terms of the contract, but action was deferred until February 16, 1911, when the matter was laid over until March 2, 1911, and on that date the matter was laid over until this day.

The matter was referred back to the Chief Engineer.

Gentlemen—In reference to a request from the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, dated February 11, 1911, for the transfer of \$5,600 within appropriations to the Department for the year 1910, I report as follows:

The transfer is from No. 598, Fuel, Manhattan and The Bronx, to the following accounts:

594. Apparatus, Machinery, Vehicles, Harness, etc., including Care and Storage, Manhattan and The Bronx..... \$1,100 00

The appropriation for No. 598 was \$150,000, which was reduced by transfer to \$144,584. The consumption of fuel during 1910 was less than the amount estimated when contracts were awarded, and it is stated there will be a saving of at least \$10,000 in the account.

Gentlemen—In reference to a request from the Commissioner of Records of Kings County, on January 20, 1911, for the transfer of \$51 within appropriations to the office for the year 1910, I report as follows:

The request is to cover a deficit in the account for telephone service, for which the appropriation was \$324. It is proposed to transfer the \$51 from an unencumbered balance in the salary account. Whereas, The Legislature of the State of New York passed a bill which became section 693, chapter 551 of the Laws of 1910, empowering the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to deal with this problem comprehensively by making provision for:

1. A Board of Inebriety.
2. Release of first offenders without arraignment.
3. Adequate investigation with probation and parole supervision by field officers.
4. A carefully graded series of remedies.
5. A hospital and industrial colony.

—now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That a special committee of two be appointed to consider the advisability of carrying this law into effect, and to report its conclusions and recommendations to this Board.

Gentlemen—On February 7, 1911, the Secretary of the Department of Health transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a request for approval of plans, specifications and estimate of cost (\$2,500) for a hot-water heating system in the physicians' residence and in the new annex to the Tymeson House at the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, at Otisville, New York.

The cost of the work is to be charged to an issue of corporate stock made on June 3, 1910, to the amount of \$40,000, described as C-DH-7r, to be used as provided in the resolution for the "construction of various frame sheds and other structures, etc." on the grounds of the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, at Otisville, New York. The estimate of cost is liberal, but as local contractors may not bid the amount named may not prove too much.

The specifications provide that radiators shall be placed in the various rooms. The contractor shall guarantee that these will be capable of heating the rooms to a temperature of 70 degrees Fahrenheit when the thermometer is at zero outside. The specifications do not provide, however, that the contractor shall be held in any bond after the completion of the work to make the guarantee effective.

As it is altogether probable that the work will be completed and paid for during the coming summer, when the opportunity for the test described will be lacking, I am of the opinion that a bond to be continued for at least one year from the date of completion should be required.

Also, I think it should be included in the specifications that if the radiators called for under the contract, or any of them, should fail to develop sufficient capacity to heat the rooms for which they are intended, the contractor should be required to furnish others that will be satisfactory without extra cost to the City, so that the contract requirements as to the degree of heat to all of the rooms may be complied with. The plans and specifications otherwise are satisfactory.

Gentlemen—On February 15, 1911, the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, transmitted for approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment plans, specifications and estimate of cost (\$19,830), for constructing Bushwick playground, bounded by Putnam avenue and Woodbine street extension, between Knickerbocker and Irving avenues, Borough of Brooklyn.

On June 3, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution authorizing the sale of corporate stock to the amount of \$31,860, for the construction of a playground at the location described.

The work will consist of grading, laying a cinder and gravel pavement, the construction of a concrete retaining wall, the erection of a wrought iron picket fence, setting bluestone curb, laying drain pipes, catch basins, cement sidewalks, putting down top soil and sod, and other work necessary to put the playground in order.

The estimated cost, \$19,830, is based on quantities of labor and material that will be required, and estimated prices therefor. The amount stated is considered reasonable.

The plans and specifications (as amended) are satisfactory.

Of this amount \$275,000 was to meet the expense of purchasing two driven well stations at Parkville and Flatlands, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

It now appears that the land in the Parkville district which the Department intended to develop, lies a short distance outside of the boundary of this local district or subdivision of the Borough of Brooklyn, and is properly within the bounds of the district known as Mapleton.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution dated September 23, 1910, authorized the purchase of four parcels of land in the Flatlands section.

In order that the funds which are to be used for the purpose of driven well stations shall apply to the lands to be acquired, I would respectfully recommend the amendment of the resolution of July 2, 1909, by striking therefrom the word "Parkville" and substituting "Mapleton." Yours truly,

In a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment (page 3709, Minutes of 1909), authorizing corporate stock to the amount of \$623,356.70 for the purpose of providing means for an additional supply of water for the Borough of Brooklyn, this item appears:

Two driven well stations, Parkville and Flatlands, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with their equipment..... \$275,000 00
I am informed by the Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, that it is the Department's intention to develop for well stations the same two sites as he contemplated when the request of May 11, 1909, was made by the Commissioner for the funds to purchase the plots and install the equipment, but through an error the districts were designated as "Parkville" and "Flatlands." It now appears that one of the sites should have been designated within the "Mapleton" district, and not within the "Parkville" district.

As the present request is only to correct a clerical error, and is necessary to carry out the original intention of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, I recommend that the request be granted, and herewith forward a resolution for adoption by the Board to permit the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to carry out its original intentions. The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requesting, and report of the Comptroller relative to a further appropriation of \$32,988 from the water revenues in Brooklyn, for account S-217, Salaries and Wages, to provide for expenses contingent upon a reorganization of the Bureau of Water Registration, involving an increase in the clerical and inspection force and increases in salaries of certain employees to equalize their salaries, with the compensation for similar services in the Borough of Manhattan, stating that the preliminary allowance of \$44,500 from the water revenue for salaries, Office of Water Register, made on December 22, 1910, was at the rate of \$178,000 per annum; that no further appropriation is necessary at this time for either the additional force or the proposed increases; that as no record exists in the Department of Finance of the establishment of three of the positions in the list submitted, recommending that, pending the establishment of said positions, no action be taken thereon, and submitting a resolution which, if adopted, will approve of the increase in salaries of four Clerks, one Messenger and one Inspector of Hydrants and Stop Cocks, in accordance with resolution adopted September 30, 1910:

(On February 2, 1911, the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the above appropriation was referred to the Comptroller.)

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Bureau of Water Register, 13 to 21 Park row, New York, January 23, 1911.

Mr. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, Manhattan:

Sir—The Bureau of Water Register in the Borough of Brooklyn was insufficiently staffed to keep the records up to date even under the lax methods in operation prior to the recent reorganization of the Bureau.

The records of collection in the Registrar's Office, which heretofore have been conducted merely as cash receipts and without any accounting control over the accuracy of the liquidation of the related charges, have now been brought under a system and procedure similar in purpose to that already established in the corresponding office in the Borough of Manhattan, and in consequence of the primitive methods that formerly obtained giving way to the greater exactions which attach to accuracy and thoroughness of method, it was necessary to effect a reorganization of this Bureau with respect to the personnel of the clerical and inspection force.

The house-to-house re-examination about to commence under the new inspection system renders it imperative that every available Inspector shall be assigned to inspection duties which will make it necessary to replace, by Clerks, certain Inspectors who have been doing clerical work for some time past. The re-examination will also greatly increase the need for additional Clerks, as it will undoubtedly cause much extra work; the expenditure involved, however, is slight compared with the increase in revenue obtained by these means.

The additional Stenographers are needed to more efficiently carry on the work in the several divisions. The three now on the payroll of the Bureau being inadequate to cope with the present conditions, Clerks are now doing by hand what could be done on a machine in at least one-half of the time.

The proposed increase in the salaries of the Clerks, Inspectors and Measurers is for the purpose of equalizing the remuneration for the same grade of position long since established in the Borough of Manhattan. The increase for the Messenger is strictly on its merits, and will then be less than paid in some of the other Boroughs for the same service.

The reorganization of this Bureau has been perfected and the increase of \$32,988 for the ensuing year over the salaries and wages for 1910, based on the December payroll, is given in detail on the list attached, and it is therefore requested that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriate the further sum of \$32,988 out of the water revenue of the Borough of Brooklyn, and credit it to S-217, Salaries and Wages. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 23, 1911, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested a further appropriation, in the amount of \$32,988 from the water revenues in Brooklyn for account S-217, Salaries and Wages, to provide for expenses contingent upon a reorganization of the Bureau of Water Registration in the Borough. In connection therewith I report as follows:

The Commissioner states that the new system of inspection and accounting being installed in the Bureau makes it necessary to increase the clerical and inspection force. He also proposes increases for certain employees, to equalize their salaries with the compensation for similar services in the Borough of Manhattan.

The annual cost of the proposed increases in compensation and additional employees is \$32,988. The annual cost of salaries in the office of the Water Registrar, based on the December, 1910, payroll, is \$144,752. Increasing this amount by \$32,988 gives a total of \$177,740. On December 22, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment made a preliminary allowance of \$44,500 from the water revenues of Brooklyn, for Salaries—Office of Water Registrar. This allowance was for three months, and was at the rate of \$178,000 per annum. It is therefore apparent that no further appropriation is necessary at this time for either the additional force or the proposed increases.

On September 30, 1910, your Board adopted a resolution for the heads of departments to grant no increase of salary or wages to any employee paid from other than budgetary accounts, unless such increase was approved by the Board. The Commissioner requests increases ranging from \$100 to \$300 per annum. The yearly cost is \$1,938 for eleven employees, an average increase of approximately \$176 per annum. In the list are the following positions:

Chief Inspector, from \$1,800 to \$2,100 per annum.
Inspector of Taps, from \$1,000 to \$1,100 per annum.
Measurer, from \$1,000 to \$1,100 per annum.

No record exists in the Department of Finance of the establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of these three positions at the increased rates. Pending the establishment, I recommend that no action be taken on the items.

The remainder of the request calls for an increase of \$150 per annum each for two Clerks and a Messenger. Another Clerk is to be increased from \$300 to \$540, another from \$1,350 to \$1,650, and an Inspector is listed for an increase of \$248 per annum.

I transmit herewith a resolution, which, if adopted, will grant the request.

The estimated cost of this work is \$7,500.

The plans and specifications, when presented for approval by the Board of Education, did not bear the approval of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in accordance with the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 18, 1910. In order to save time, I had the plans and specifications submitted to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for examination, and they now bear the proper approval of that Department. The three new school buildings and one addition provided for in 1910, and now under construction in The Bronx, are all north of 167th street, in school districts Nos. 25 and 26, as follows:

School No. 44, district 25, Prospect avenue and 176th street, 48 classrooms and assembly; school No. 46, district 26, Bainbridge and Briggs avenues and 196th street, 49 classrooms and assembly; school No. 47, district 26, Randolph street, St. Lawrence and Hammond avenues, 49 classrooms and assembly; school No. 40, addition, district 25, Prospect avenue and Jennings street, 12 classrooms.

The corporate stock estimate of the Board of Education for the year 1910 requested funds for the construction of one new school building and one addition, and for the purchase of one parochial school building south of 167th street, as follows:

School No. 39, addition, district 24, Longwood avenue, Kelly and Beck streets, 24 classrooms; school No. 48, district 24, Spofford avenue, Coster and Faile streets, 49 classrooms and assembly; school No. 43, addition, district 23, parochial school on 137th street near Alexander avenue, accommodations for 500 children.

No provision was made in the Corporate Stock Budget for these additional accommodations.

It was the plan in the Corporate Stock Estimate to purchase the parochial school in 137th street near Alexander avenue, to relieve the congestion in Public School 43, which school now has 657 pupils on part time. This plan was not approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the Board of Education on December 15, 1910, rescinded its action for the purchase. An alternative request for funds to build an addition to No. 43 was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on December 1, 1910, as follows:

At the suggestion of the Comptroller, the Building Committee of the Board of Education subsequently decided to increase the proposed addition to No. 43 from twelve to sixteen classrooms. This can be done without the acquisition of additional land, and will provide the larger number of sittings necessary. The revised estimate for the addition to No. 43 has been submitted by the Superintendent of School Buildings, as follows.

The greatest congestion in The Bronx at present is in No. 39. In this school 1,300 pupils are on part time, which form of instruction now obtains throughout the fifth year. The school was opened in September, 1905, with 350 pupils, and the number has increased to more than 1,800. The Board of Education owns a plot 50 by 200 feet in the rear of the school upon which it was planned to construct an addition of 24 classrooms at an aggregate cost, exclusive of furniture, of \$189,400. Upon further investigation it was found practicable and advantageous to build two wings of sixteen rooms each. A revised estimate which also includes provision for a new assembly room has been submitted, as follows:

In public school No. 20, Fox, Simpson and 167th streets, 1,241 pupils are on part time. Many large apartment houses are under construction in the immediate vicinity, and the proposed sixteen room addition on the present site is necessary. The original estimate for the addition to No. 20 was submitted on December 1, 1910, as follows:

This estimate has since been revised to include expenses for excavation of earth and rock on the site and for increased heating capacity and new electric equipment for old building. The revised estimate is as follows:

Approximately 20 per cent. of the elementary school children in the Borough of The Bronx are on part time, against 8.4 per cent. for the entire City. The school population in the Borough is increasing at the rate of 6.3 per cent. a year, against 2.2 per cent. for the City as a whole. More than 29 per cent. of the total increase in the elementary school register for the year beginning September, 1910, was in The Bronx.

In addition to the requests from the Board of Education, communications in relation to increased school accommodations in South Bronx have been made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as follows:

1. Resolution, Board of Aldermen, December 13, 1910, requesting issue of corporate stock for addition to public school No. 39.
2. Communication from chairman, Mothers' Club, public school No. 39, relative to inadequate school accommodations.
3. Resolution of local school board, district 23, urging speedy action toward relieving congestion in the South Bronx section.
4. Resolution from the Patrick Keenan Association urging immediate action for the relief in the vicinity of public school No. 39.
5. Resolutions from the North Side Board of Trade urging immediate attention to school situation in the Borough of The Bronx as a whole, and to the need of additions to public school Nos. 20 and 39 in particular.

We recommend that corporate stock in the sum of \$517,400, as requested, be authorized for the construction and equipment of additions to public schools Nos. 20, 39 and 43, by the adoption of the attached resolutions. Respectfully,

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

The following resolution was offered:

Resolved, That pursuant to the provisions of section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding one hundred and six thousand two hundred dollars (\$106,200), the proceeds whereof to be applied to defraying the cost of constructing and equipping an addition to and installing electric work in Public School No. 20, Fox, Simpson and 167th streets, Borough of The Bronx.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

The Secretary was directed to transmit a copy of the report of the Corporate Stock Budget Committee to the parties interested.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity recommending an agreement with Edward H. Floyd-Jones and others providing for giving them a quit claim deed to certain lands at Massapequa, title to which appears to have been vested in the City through an error in the proceedings to acquire property for the 72-inch pipe line and infiltration galleries, and also to pay them \$1,500 in lieu of damages, legal expenses and interest, together with a report of the Select Committee, consisting of the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board, to whom on January 12, 1911, this communication was referred, stating that the situation is a very complicated one, and was caused by the substitution of a new damage map omitting a large amount of property after title had vested in the City. That the Appellate Division has reversed the order confirming the report of the Commission, the awards of which were based upon the taking of the smaller area. The owners of the property are unable to give title to the land which it was intended to exclude from the proceeding, and have been subjected to considerable expense and damage, and stating further that the Committee has examined the matter very carefully and believes that the proposed adjustment is an advantageous one, and recommending the adoption of a resolution prepared by the Corporation Counsel, and also that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be advised of such action:

Dear Sir—In the proceedings to acquire certain real estate at Massapequa, in the towns of Hempstead and Oyster Bay, Nassau County, for purposes of water supply, awards have been made of certain parcels amounting to \$11,672.50 belonging to Edward H. Floyd-Jones, Louise F. J. Thorn, Walter R. T. Jones, Helen Stewart, Townsend Jones, Caroline L. Bleeker, Frances M. Moore, William E. Jones, Sarah E. Jones, Florence L. Jones, Abbie E. Jones, Walter R. Jones, Elizabeth V. C. Jones and Esther M. Jones, upon the basis of an amended map, dated July 11, 1905, made by a former Commissioner of this Department, which purported to change the interest to be acquired by the City designated upon the original map as a fee in a certain pond and adjoining land, to an easement to draw down the waters of said pond under certain conditions. The owners of the lands affected took an appeal to the Appellate Division. The Court sustained their claim and held that the amended map was invalid.

The claimants have now offered to allow the awards already made to stand, the City retaining only the easement mentioned in the proceedings, with the slight modification that the pipe line intended to keep the water at a certain level shall be constructed on lands belonging to the claimants and not along public roads. A further condition of their settlement is that they are to receive \$1,500 in full for all additional claims for counsel fees, interest or damages of any kind.

The settlement on this basis is, in my opinion, for the best interests of the City and the Corporation Counsel also has the same view.

I am advised by the Law Department that, pursuant to the provisions of section 507 of the Charter, it is necessary for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve of this agreement. I enclose a draft of resolution which has been prepared by the Corporation Counsel, which effectuates this agreement, and I would recommend its adoption.

For the purpose of eliminating any possible defect in the claimants' title to the property, they are desirous of obtaining from the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a quit claim deed, which shall further evidence the intention of the parties in interest. The form of this deed has been prepared and approved by the Corporation Counsel, and I would respectfully request that on the adoption of your resolution the proposed deed be certified by your Board to the Sinking Fund Commission with copy of resolution.

The Corporation Counsel, upon the consummation of this settlement, will prepare orders to be entered on consent in accordance therewith at Special Term and in the Appellate Division. He will then be able to certify to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to section 205 of the Charter, that the interests of the City in the real estate to which the release is sought, if any, are mere clouds upon the title of the claimants. To the Honorable, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on January 12, 1911, a communication was presented from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity submitting for approval, pursuant to section 507 of the Charter, an agreement to pay to Edward H. Floyd-Jones and others the sum of \$1,500 in addition to the amount awarded by the order of the Court in the proceedings to acquire title to certain lands at Massapequa which were required for water supply purposes, and the matter was referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer of the Board for consideration and report.

The proposed payment to Edward H. Floyd-Jones and others is to adjust a situation growing out of an irregularity in the proceedings to acquire title to the land which the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has acquired or attempted to acquire for an additional pipe line, infiltration galleries, etc. On December 1, 1903, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved a map showing lands situated in the towns of Hempstead and Oyster Bay, in Nassau County, to be acquired for the purpose of maintaining, preserving and increasing the supply of pure and wholesome water for the use of The City of New York. Proceedings for the acquisition of these lands were instituted, and title to the same was vested in The City of New York on January 18, 1905, upon the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners appointed by the Court. The map referred to showed not only a strip of land 200 feet in width lying immediately south of the Long Island Railroad, but it also included a strip running southwardly along both sides of Unqua Stream and Unqua Pond, extending to the Merrick road, and another area also extending southwardly to include what is known as Carman's Pond. The Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity subsequently concluded that it would be unnecessary to acquire the land including these two ponds and the stream above referred to, and on July 11, 1905, the said Department amended the damage map showing the property to be acquired and which had been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by omitting the land including the ponds and stream referred to and substituting therefor an easement permitting the City to draw down the waters of the Unqua Stream and pond under certain designated conditions. Under the proceedings to acquire the property shown on the amended map there was awarded for Parcels known as No. 21, 22 and G-1, the sum of \$11,672.50, and the report of the Commissioners was approved and the final order entered at a term of the Supreme Court on June 28, 1906, the awards and the order approving them being based upon the amended map. The claimants took an appeal, and the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the Second Department held that the amending map was invalid and by order entered January 7, 1907, reversed the order confirming the awards. The situation which has arisen is briefly this:

The original damage map upon which the Commission was appointed in January, 1905, showed a considerable area of land which the Commissioner of Water Supply afterward concluded he did not want, and attempted to exclude, but title to which was vested in the City on the date of the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners, although the awards made were predicated upon the taking of the much smaller area which the Commissioner of Water Supply believed to be sufficient for the purposes of the City. There is, therefore, a serious cloud upon the title of the owners of the land which the City did not intend to take, and while title is vested in the City, the proceeding, owing to the substitution of an amended map, was, upon the objection of the claimants, declared by the Court to be irregular. Anticipating that there might be protracted litigation, the Corporation Counsel advised that the amount of the original award, namely, \$11,672.50, be deposited with a trust company, so that the City would not be compelled to pay the usual six per cent. interest on these awards for the six years which have elapsed since the vesting of title. We are advised that the owners of the property have claimed substantial damages, which have finally been reduced to the sum of \$1,500, which they agree to accept in full for all additional claims for counsel fees, interest, or damages of any kind imposed, together with a deed from the City conveying whatever right, title and interest it may have in the land which was shown on the original map but omitted from the amended map, the City, however, reserving the easement which it desires to draw down the Unqua Stream and to lay a pipe line alongside the stream in order to maintain the level of the water in the pond provided it is drawn down by any infiltration galleries which the City may construct.

The Corporation Counsel with a letter to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity dated December 20, 1910, has forwarded a form of resolution for adoption by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment which will provide for such an adjustment, together with a form of deed, approved by him as to form, which would be given by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, this being a mere quit-claim deed to quiet the title to the lands which the City does not want and payment for which was not included in the awards made by the Commission, but which appears to have been vested in the City upon the filing of the oaths of the condemnation commission in January, 1905.

The Corporation Counsel states that upon the consummation of this settlement he will prepare orders to be entered on consent in accordance therewith at Special Term and in the Appellate Division. He then expects that the Appellate Division will, with the consent of both parties, vacate its order reversing the action of the Special Term in confirming the report of the condemnation commission so that their report will stand confirmed and the proceeding will be closed.

The adjustment is considered an advantageous one, and we would recommend that the Board adopt the resolution prepared by the Corporation Counsel and advise the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of its action. Respectfully,

Whereas, The City of New York on January 18, 1905, acquired in a condemnation proceeding entitled "In the Matter of the Application of The City of New York to acquire certain real estate at Massapequa in the Towns of Hempstead and Oyster Bay, in the County of Nassau, for purposes of water supply" from Edward H. Floyd-Jones, Louise F. J. Thorn, Walter R. T. Jones, Helen Stewart, Townsend Jones,

Caroline L. Bleecker, Frances M. Moore, William E. Jones, Sarah E. Jones, Florence L. Jones, Abbie E. Jones, Walter R. Jones, Elizabeth V. C. Jones and Esther M. Jones, the property known as parcel number twenty-one and parcel number twenty-two and G-one upon the damage map in said proceeding, which included the fee of a certain pond known as Unqua pond and property adjoining a stream feeding it; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity on the 11th day of July, 1905, purported to amend the damage map theretofore duly adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by providing in substance that the City should acquire, not the fee of the property with regard to the said pond and property, but an easement to draw down its waters under certain designated conditions; and

Whereas, Upon appeal by the claimants to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court an order affirming the awards of commissioners made upon the basis of said amended map for the said property, aggregating \$11,672.50, was reversed and the said awards set aside; and

Whereas, The said claimants or their legal representatives have offered that the entire controversy between themselves and the City be settled and adjusted by allowing the said Special Term order and the awards made thereby with certain modifications agreed upon by stipulation between the parties to the effect that a pipe line intended to keep up the claimants' pond, as in said order mentioned, shall be constructed on land remaining to the claimants north of said pond instead of along public roads, to stand, and by the payment by the City to the said claimants of the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) in addition to said sum awarded by said final order in full for any and all additional claims for counsel fees or interest or damages of any sort or kind; and

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity of The City of New York, pursuant to the provisions of section 507 of the Greater New York Charter, has agreed with the said claimants interested in said real estate with regard to the said compensation, as heretofore provided, subject to the approval of this Board; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board does hereby approve of said agreement of the said Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity to pay the claimants above mentioned or their legal representatives the sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) in addition to the said sum awarded by said final order, in full of all claims for counsel fees, interest or damages of any sort or kind upon the modifications to be made to the said final order as hereinabove specified; and the Comptroller is directed to pay the said sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) accordingly.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—13.

Consideration of the resolution adopted June 3, 1910, relative to approval of plans and specifications presented to the Board and referred to the Comptroller for examination and report, and the question of the extent of the Comptroller's obligation and responsibility thereunder, was deferred one week.

(On February 16, this matter was ordered placed on the Calendar for meeting of February 23, and on said date was laid over one week.)

(On March 2, the matter was referred to a Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the President of the Borough of The Bronx, to report in one week.)

The Secretary presented the following report of the Comptroller, relative to the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, for a modification of salary schedules supporting the appropriation made in the Budget for the year 1911 for his Department in order that the schedules may agree with payroll force as it existed last year, stating that the schedule changes involve the positions and grades of Attendant at \$1,050, Pilot at \$1,200, Foreman at \$1,000 and \$900, Axeman at \$900 per annum and Assistant Foreman at \$4 a day, which have not been established pursuant to section 56 of the Charter, and, therefore, cannot be approved for modification, and recommending the adoption of resolutions granting the modification, as amended, which involves a total transfer of \$2,608:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 31, 1911, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested modification of nineteen schedules supporting appropriations to his department for the year 1911. The request has been orally amended for four schedules, and for a total transfer within the accounts of \$2,921. In connection with the amended request I report as follows:

The schedule changes involve the following positions and grades: Attendant at \$1,050, Pilot at \$1,200, Foreman at \$1,000, Foreman at \$900 and Axeman at \$900 per annum; and Assistant Foreman at \$4 a day. These positions and grades have not been established pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, and therefore cannot be approved for modification. Changes are asked for in three budgetary part allowance schedules for salaries as follows:

It is proposed to transfer \$1,515 to the account from No. 483, a Budget schedule for wages, regular employees. The \$1,515 is the full allowance for a Carpenter. The budgetary part allowance in No. 506 was based upon 80 per cent. of the total of the schedule. I recommend, therefore, the transfer of 80 per cent. of \$1,515, or \$1,212, the balance of \$303, to be scheduled in No. 483 as "Accrued balance of transfer to account No. 506," this amount to go into the general fund at the end of the year and no longer available for or at the disposal of the Department, as this modification enables them to spend a like amount from other funds.

It is proposed to transfer \$750 to No. 561 from No. 592, a budgetary part allowance schedule. The transfer is necessary to correct two clerical errors in the 1911 Budget. The compensation of a Clerk was \$2,100 per annum in 1910. Of this amount \$750 was paid from corporate stock funds. The Clerk now is entirely on maintenance work. A request was made in the Departmental estimate for the full salary for 1911. Through a clerical error only \$1,350 was provided, as in 1910.

The tentative schedule for No. 592 included a Draftsman at \$1,500 per annum, \$750 to be charged to Budget funds. In the final Budget schedule the position was omitted without decreasing the budgetary part allowance. The total for No. 592 is, therefore, \$750 in excess of the requirements.

From preliminary bids received from reputable dealers, it will require a maximum sum of \$1,500 for this purpose. As the amount is over \$1,000, sealed bids will be advertised for in the City Record when this money is appropriated.

Permit me to say, in this connection, that these are the only Courts in the City and County for which no law library has been provided. As all cases appealed from the Magistrates' Courts now pass through this office, it is a constant necessity to consult authorities, and having secured sufficient space at these headquarters for the library, it will be found most convenient for the Magistrates to come here and use it when required. As it is now, the Magistrate having a proposition of law before him

about which he is doubtful, has to go to some public library to get the information desired.

The location of this small but efficient library at this office will also add in every way to the efficiency and consistency of the Magistrates in their decisions, and will make for the interchange of opinions of the many legal questions that come before them. Very respectfully yours,

It is proposed to locate the library in the office of the Chief City Magistrate, 300 Mulberry street. The Chief City Magistrate states as follows:

"The City Magistrates' Courts are the only courts in the City and County for which no law library has been provided. As all cases appealed from the Magistrates' Courts now pass through this office, it is a constant necessity to consult authorities, and, having secured sufficient space at these headquarters for the library, it will be found most convenient for the Magistrates to come here and use it when required. As it is now, the Magistrate having a proposition of law before him about which he is doubtful, has to go to some public library to get the information desired.

"It is my earnest endeavor to have the Magistrates agree upon the construction of laws presented to them, and especially upon the many questions that arise under chapter 654, Laws of 1910, which reorganized the Inferior Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction. I believe the library will prove exceedingly useful in this respect. The City Magistrates hold frequent meetings in my office, and a library at hand is needed when difference of opinions arise on questions of law and evidence.

A Committee of the City Magistrates selected a minimum number of text books and reports, and recommended the purchase of 669 volumes. The lowest bid on the list fixes the cost of the library at \$1,500. The Chief City Magistrate states that, in his opinion, the amount is reasonable.

All materials and supplies and the labor and assistance required, including the hiring of such room or rooms as may be necessary in the preparation of the said block map and copies thereof, shall be provided, hired and employed by the said Commissioners, and the compensation to be paid therefor shall be such as they, in their discretion, may determine and agree upon. In connection therewith, we report as follows:

The \$2,400 grade is requested for F. Kleeberg, who has been employed at the rate of \$1,800 per annum since 1903. Mr. Kleeberg is a graduate of the Sheffield Scientific School, and for two years was instructor in chemistry at Yale University. It is stated that he is an expert chemist, general analyst and bacteriologist. He has charge of the laboratory work for the borough. The duties of this position have greatly increased during the last seven years. During 1910 over 1,800 tests of pavements and 660 analyses of pavements were made by Kleeberg or under his supervision.

The Chief Chemist of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity receives \$3,500 per annum. A Chemist in the Department of Charities receives \$2,550, and the compensation of Chemists in the Department of Health ranges from \$1,200 to \$2,100 per annum. The President states that the \$2,400 grade will give Kleeberg compensation commensurate with his fitness and service.

Abstract of the Minutes of March 7, 1911. The Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present, Health Officer of the Port and Police Commissioner.

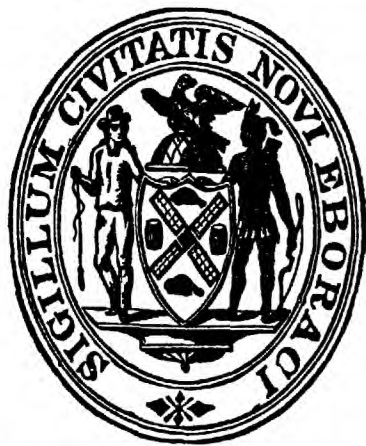

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs of adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureau or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
