A quorum not being present, the meeting was adjourned.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M. on Thursday, October 10, 1918.

Present—John F. Hylan, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Alfred J. Johnson, Chamberlain; Robert L. Moran, Acting President, Board of Aldermen; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held September 26, 1918, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD October 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 1).

Dock Department—Proposed Plan for the Straightening, Widening and Improvement of Coney Island Creek, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 2).

The Chair called for a continuation of the public hearings held June 27, July 12 and September 26, 1918, in the matter of the proposed plan for the straightening, widening and improvement of Coney Island Creek, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a ship canal 200 feet wide connecting Sheepshead Bay with Gravesend Bay, and for the marginal street, wharf or place, 100 feet in width on each side of said ship canal, made pursuant to the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1918, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks June 8, 1918, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

This matter was considered by the Committee of the Whole July 25, 1918. Mr. N. B. Kilmer and the Deputy Commissioner of Docks (Mr. Meyer) were heard in regard to the matter.

After discussion, the hearing was adjourned, to be continued at 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Tuesday, October 31, 1918.

Dock Department—Proposed Plan for the Improvement of the Waterfront Between Highland Avenue and Warehouse Avenue, Gravesend Bay, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 3).

The Chair called for a continuation of the public hearings held June 27, July 12 and September 26, 1918, in the matter of the proposed plan for the improvement of the water-front and harbor of the City of New York, between Highland avenue and Warehouse avenue, Gravesend Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks June 8, 1918, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

The proposed improvement consists in establishing a pierhead line 400 feet offshore of Bay View avenue; also pierhead and bulkhead lines 650 feet apart along the entrance to the proposed ship canal, laid out under provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1918, and then coincident with the lines prolonged of the ship canal.

The plan also provides for a marginal street 100 feet in width inshore of and adjacent to the proposed pierhead and bulkhead lines between West 37th and West 23d streets, on the southerly side, and between a point opposite West 32d street and West 23d street, on the northerly side of the entrance to the proposed ship canal.

This matter was considered by the Committee of the Whole July 25, 1918. On motion, the hearing was adjourned to be continued at meeting to be held at 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Thursday, October 31, 1918.

Dock Department—Proposed Amendment to the New Plan at Jamaica Bay in the Vicinity of Gerritsen's Basin, Between East 32d Street and Flatbush Avenue, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 4).

The Chair called for a continuation of the public hearings held June 6 and 27, July 12 and September 26, 1918, in the matter of the proposed amendment to the new plan at Jamaica Bay, in the vicinity of Gerritsen's Basin, between East 32d street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, showing Kimballs Basin, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law, March 13, 1918, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

The purpose of this amendment is to secure a water-front and access thereto to private property which has been deprived of access to Mill Basin through acquisition by the City of a portion of this private property for Flatbush avenue and a marginal street easterly of and lying between Flatbush avenue and Mill Basin.

This matter was considered by the Committee of the Whole July 25, 1918. On motion, the hearing was adjourned, to be continued at meeting to be held at 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Thursday, October 31, 1918.

Dock Department—Request of, for Approval of a Lease to the Scranton and Wyoming Coal Company, Inc., of Certain Bulkhead Between East 123d Street and East 124th Street, Manhattan, Together with 40,750 Square Feet of Upland in the Rear of Said Bulkhead (Cal. No. 5).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated September 30, 1918, requesting approval of a lease to the Scranton and Wyoming Coal Company, Inc., of 260 feet of bulkhead between East 123d and East 124th streets, Borough of Manhattan, together with 40,750 square feet of upland in the rear of said bulkhead, for a term of ten years from the first day of the month next succeeding the date upon which the lease is approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of \$13,350 per annum, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years, at a rental to be fixed by arbitration, but not less than \$14,685 per annum; the lessee to have the right to erect and maintain during the term of the lease coal pockets and other structures and appliances necessary for carrying on the coal business, all of which structures shall be constructed under the direction and supervision of the Chief Engineer of the Dock Department, and shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York at the expiration of the lease. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of water-front property now used by the Dock Department. The rent is fixed on a basis of \$20 per linear foot per year for the bulkhead and 20 cents per square foot per annum for the upland.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

Dock Department—Request of, for an Issue of \$33,000 of Corporate Stock for the Construction of a Landing Pier on the Meadows Between Barren Island and Mill Basin, Jamaica Bay (Cal. No. 6).

A communication was received from the Dock Department, dated August 13, 1918, requesting the adoption of a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock in the sum of \$33,000 to cover the cost of constructing a landing pier for the distribution of ashes on the meadows between Barren Island and Mill Basin by the Department of Street Cleaning, and that he be authorized to enter into a contract for the construction of the pier.

The Commissioner of Street Cleaning has submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for approval form of contract for the disposal of refuse for the period from January 1, 1918, to January 1, 1922, requiring the contractor to deposit at Jamaica Bay 20 per cent. of the material delivered to him in addition to the 20 per cent. required for Rikers Island.

The construction of a landing pier is necessary in order to receive and distribute these ashes on the meadows.

Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to the Construction of a Large Municipal-owned Dry Dock for the Port of New York (Cal. No. 7).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated September 30, 1918, transmitting copy of communication from the United States Shipping Board, urging the construction of a large dry dock, municipally owned, for the Port of New York.

Dock Department—Turning Over by, of the Recreation Structures at the Foot of Cedar Street, North River; East 3d Street, East River; East 112th Street, Harlem River, and North 2d Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 8).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated October 3, 1918, turning over as no longer required the recreation structures at the foot of Cedar street, North River; East 3d street, East River; East 112th street, Harlem River, and North 2d street, Brooklyn.

Which was referred to the Comptroller.

Board of Education—Lease for, of the Stores at Nos. 1645-1649 86th Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 9).

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 4, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—At a meeting of the Sinking Fund held September 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 14-G), there was referred to the Comptroller a resolution adopted by the Board of Education August 14, 1918, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and to consent to the execution by the said Board of a lease of the stores at Nos. 1645-1647-1649 86th street, Brooklyn, occupied as an annex to School No. 163, for a period of two years from July 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,500, otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

These premises have been occupied since September 1, 1913, for this purpose at an annual rental of \$1,350. The owner insisted on a renewal at \$1,500 per year, as stated in the resolution of the Board of Education, but after negotiations by the Appraiser of Real Estate of this Department, he has consented to renew this lease for a period of one year from July 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,350.

There is no City owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose.

The nearest City owned property is on Benson avenue and Bay 14th street, and is occupied as Public School No. 163.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rental is the same as paid by the City for the past five years, and is at the rate of 48½ cents per square foot.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City. The buildings were erected by the owner in accordance with plans submitted to and approved by the Board of Education.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

The City is also a hold-over tenant.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease of the stores at Nos. 1645-1647-1649 86th street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Board of Education for a period of one year from July 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,350; the lessor to pay taxes and make outside repairs; the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such inside alterations or repairs during occupancy as it may deem necessary.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Board of Education—Lease for, of the Premises at the Northeast Corner of State and 27th Streets, Upper Flushing, Queens (Cal. No. 10).

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

September 27, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held September 26, 1918 (Calendar No. 14-M), there was referred to the Comptroller a resolution adopted by the Board of Education on August 14, 1918, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease of the plot of ground 100 feet by 140 feet, on the northeast corner of State and 27th streets, Upper Flushing, Borough of Queens, for a period of three years from September 1, 1918, with the privilege of renewal for an equal term, at an annual rental of \$201, payable quarterly, the City to pay any taxes which may be levied upon the property other than the special taxes for the construction of sewers or special local improvements.

This is a proposed new lease.

The property in question is a vacant plot of land and is known on the tax maps of the Borough of Queens, as Lot 1, Block 39Z, Ward 3, and is assessed for the present year at \$3,350. The rental asked is at the rate of 6 per cent. on the assessed value, the City to pay the taxes.

It is proposed to place on this land a portable school building to serve the needs of this district.

There is no City owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose.

The nearest City owned property is at the southwest corner of Mitchell avenue and 15th street, and is occupied by a standpipe of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

The application is therefore submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their consideration, and in the event of favorable action thereon, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease of the plot of ground 100 feet by 140 feet at the northeast corner of State and 27th street, Upper Flushing, Borough of Queens, for a period from October 15, 1918, to September 1, 1921, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of three years, at an annual rental of \$201, payable quarterly; the City to pay any taxes which may be levied on the property, other than special taxes for the construction of sewers or special local improvements, the property being bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly side of State street and the easterly side of 27th street, and running thence easterly along the northerly side of State street 100 feet; thence northeasterly and parallel with 27th street 140 feet; thence westerly and parallel with State street 100 feet; thence southeasterly along the easterly side of 27th street 140 feet to the point or place of beginning.

—for a period from October 15, 1918, to September 1, 1921, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of three years, at an annual rental of two hundred and one dollars (\$201), payable quarterly; the City to pay any taxes which may be levied on the property other than special taxes for the construction of sewers or

special local improvements; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

Dear Sirs—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held September 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 14-1), there was referred to the Comptroller a resolution adopted by the Board of Education on August 14, 1918, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of a plot of land at the northeast corner of Church avenue and East 48th street, Borough of Brooklyn, on which is located a one-story temporary eight-room frame building occupied by Public School 135, for a period from July 1, 1918, to July 1, 1919, on a month-to-month basis, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

July 1, 1917-July 1, 1918, \$900 a year; July 26, 1917.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City-owned property is at the corner of Clarkson and Albany avenues and is occupied by the Kings County Hospital.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The approximate assessed value of the premises in question is \$5,800, which, at the rental of \$900 a year, is equivalent to a return of 15.5 per cent. The owner has refused to renew at any less rental. In view of the necessity for continued occupancy of the premises and the fact that negotiations are pending for the acquisition of a school site in this vicinity, I am of the opinion that a renewal of this lease at \$75 a month is desirable.

Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of the following described premises in the Borough of Brooklyn:

"Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Church avenue with the easterly line of East 48th street, and running thence northerly along the easterly line of East 48th street 93 feet 5½ inches; thence easterly and parallel, or nearly so, with Church avenue 120 feet; thence southerly and parallel, or nearly so, with East 48th street 96 feet 6 inches to the northerly line of Church avenue; thence westerly along the northerly line of Church avenue 120 feet to the easterly line of East 48th street to the point or place of beginning, on which are erected the portable buildings designated as Public School 135, Brooklyn."

—for a period from July 1, 1918, to July 1, 1919, on a month-to-month basis, at a rate of \$75 per month; the lessors to pay taxes; the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such inside and outside repairs to its buildings as it may deem necessary, it being understood that, if Church avenue be physically widened at the point above mentioned during the term of occupancy by the City, the lease shall thereupon terminate, the Board of Education to have the right to remove all improvements erected thereon at the expiration of the lease or any renewal thereof. Lessors, Church Avenue Real Estate Association of New York, 261 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan. Respectfully,

—for a period from July 1, 1918, to July 1, 1919, on a month-to-month basis, at the rate of seventy-five dollars (\$75) per month; the lessors to pay taxes; the lessee to pay water rates, furnish heat, light and janitor service and make such inside and outside repairs to its buildings as it may deem necessary, it being understood that, if Church avenue be physically widened at the point above mentioned during the term of occupancy by the City, the lease shall thereupon terminate; the Board of Education to have the right to remove all improvements erected thereon at the expiration of the lease or any renewal thereof; lessor, Church Avenue Real Estate Association of New York; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the said rent fair and reasonable and that it will be for the interests of the City that such lease be made.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Board of Education—Renewal of Lease for, of Lots 1 to 10, Inclusive, on Avenue P, Between West Street and West 1st Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 16).

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 3, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held September 26, 1918 (Cal. 14-E), there was referred to the Comptroller a resolution adopted by the Board of Education on August 14, 1918, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by the said Board of a renewal of the lease of Lots Nos. 1 to 10, inclusive, in Block 6631, located on the south side of Avenue P, between West street and West 1st street, Borough of Brooklyn, on which are erected portable buildings occupied as Public School No. 177, for a period of one year from July 1, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

July 1, 1914, July 1, 1916, \$500 a year, June 10, 1914.

July 1, 1916, July 1, 1917, \$500 a year, May 18 and July 13, 1916.

July 1, 1917, July 1, 1918, \$600 a year, June 28 1917.

The nearest City owned property is located on Avenue P and extends from East 4th street to Ocean Parkway. This land is vacant and was acquired by the old town of Gravesend as a gravel pit.

On the leased premises the Board of Education has erected three portable school buildings and installed plumbing and sanitary fixtures at considerable expense. To remove the portable buildings to the City owned land would be an expensive proposition, which would more than offset any saving in rental by using the City owned land.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The property is assessed for the present year at \$6,500, and the rental of \$600 is at the rate of 9.3-13 per cent.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

The City is also a hold-over tenant.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of

Education of a renewal of the lease of Lots Nos. 1 to 10, inclusive, in Block No. 6631, located on the south side of Avenue P, between West street and West 1st street, Brooklyn, for use of the Board of Education, for a period of one year from July 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$600, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes; the lessee to pay water rates, supply heat, light and janitor service.

*Lessor, Brooklyn Development Company, 261 Broadway, Manhattan.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Health, dated August 7, 1918, stating that he has had several interviews with the authorities of the Louisa Minturn Hospital, and as a result the trustees of that institution desire to terminate the lease and return the property to the Sinking Fund Commission in order that it may be turned over to the Health Department for use of the Willard Parker Hospital.

The Louisa Minturn Hospital occupies premises at the foot of East 16th street, Manhattan, under a lease entered into July 1, 1896, for a period of ninety-nine years at a nominal rental.

The Commissioner suggests that such action be taken as will transfer the use of the property to the Health Department on the termination of the lease. The reason the Commissioner asks that this action be taken before the lease is actually terminated is because the Minturn Hospital Trustees have a certain endowment fund that he is urging them to turn over to the City or to use in putting the Minturn Hospital in first class repair before it is turned over to the City. The Trustees are anxious to have the original purposes of the gift and endowment carried out and these can be carried out only by the use of the building for contagious diseases.

No. 17), there was referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Department of Health, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises occupied by said department in the building at Bay and Sands street, Stapleton, S. I., for a period of two years from November 1, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose at the same rental since November 1, 1909.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose.

The nearest City-owned property is on Wright street, between Water and Canal streets, and is occupied by Municipal Departments.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease, compared with other rents in the vicinity, is as follows: The United States Postoffice occupies the first floor at a rental of \$1,800, or 72 cents per square foot. The rental paid by the City is at the rate of 43 cents per square foot.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of the lease of the second floor in the Masonic Temple Building (a total area of 3,500 square feet), located at the northwest corner of Bay and Sands streets, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of two years from November 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$1,500, payable quarterly. The lessor to pay taxes and water rates and supply heat, light and janitor service. The lessee to make such inside alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary.

Dear Sirs—On September 26, 1918, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Acting Secretary of the De-

partment of Health, dated September 3, 1918, requesting that a resolution adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on April 25, 1918, with reference to lease of premises No. 3731 3d avenue, Borough of The Bronx, be amended by substituting the period of renewal for two years in place of one year.

On April 25, 1918, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund authorized a renewal of the lease from Jacob Frank, Hannah Frank and Isadore Reins, executors under the last will and testament of Bernard Frank, deceased, for premises known as 3731 3d avenue, Borough of The Bronx, for use of the Department of Health, for a period of one year from April 30, 1918, at a rental of \$2,425 a year, payable quarterly, the same as being paid under the existing lease.

The Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, Municipal Building, Manhattan:

Gentlemen—On the shore of the Kill Van Kull at Port Richmond in this Borough, immediately west of the land of Henry Meyer, formerly land of Dr. William C. Walser on the north side of Richmond Terrace, is a tract of land and land under

water with a width of 150 feet on Richmond terrace, and extending northerly by converging lines to the pierhead and bulkhead line of the Kill Van Kull belonging to The City of New York. It was the handsome property of Mr. Lothar Faber, now of Manhattan. Later it was the property of Mr. Charles E. Griffith, and by him sold to The City of New York for \$55,000, and there has been no large expense upon it by the City since the purchase.

It is described on page 158 of a book entitled "Real Estate Owned by The City of New York Under the Jurisdiction of the Presidents of the Boroughs," January 1, 1908, of the Department of Finance. It is known as Lot 87, Block 37, Ward 3, Volume 1, on the tax maps of the Borough of Richmond. It is particularly described in the descriptions in the deed by Charles E. Griffith and wife to The City of New York, dated January 8, 1906, and recorded March 5, 1906, in liber 317, Conveyances, page 19, in the office of the County Clerk of Richmond County. It is shown on plate 20, volume 1, of Bromley's new atlas of the Borough of Richmond, published in 1917, designated "City of New York."

This tract of land is very much needed by the large population of Port Richmond as a public park, and application is hereby made to you that it be transferred to the Department of Parks and placed under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Parks for the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

Records in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond show that the land is the property of The City of New York and exempt from taxation.

It is located in a beautiful section of Port Richmond, and on a picturesque shore front, directly opposite the part of the City of Bayonne that is set apart for amusements. It will add to the attractiveness of the City of New York if this part is reserved by the City from factory sites, which would otherwise be its ultimate use because of the deep waters of the Kill Van Kull at this point.

Upon it is the former home of Mr. Faber, and the mansion is surrounded with choice trees and shrubbery, and pretty lawns of greensward in terraces to the water of the important stream. The view of the thousands of revolving lights of the amusements on the Bayonne side in the evening with their reflections in the shimmering waters of the Kill Van Kull make the Faber land unusually attractive.

It is in a residential section along the shore left untouched by industrial enterprises. It would make an ideal public park, and should be preserved for the pleasure of the people. Any other use of it would be an injustice not only to the citizens of Staten Island, but to the people of the whole City. Any other use of it would depreciate its value as an asset of the City, and inflict a great injury upon the surrounding land.

The handsome dwelling house can always be leased, and some return received by the City. Yours respectfully

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held September 26, 1918, authorizing a lease to the State of New York of 732 square feet of space in Room 5, Hall of Records, Borough of Manhattan, be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby authorize a lease to the State of New York, through its Trustees of Public Buildings, of 732 square feet of space on the easterly side of Room No. 5 in the basement of the Hall of Records in the Borough of Manhattan, for use of the State Commission for the Blind, for a period of one year from November 1, 1918, at an annual rental of three hundred dollars (\$300), payable in equal monthly installments of twenty-five dollars (\$25) each, with the privilege of renewal for an additional year at a rental to be hereafter agreed upon.

Which resolutions were severally unanimously adopted.

Hester A. Denton—In the Matter of the Request of, for a Release of the City's Interest in a Strip of Land in Front of Her Property at No. 120 Power Street, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 36).

The Comptroller submitted a report made to him by the Deputy Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, from which it appears quite obvious that this application cannot be granted.

The map which accompanies the application, shows that a three-story brick building encroaches from eight to nine inches on the street. From its present condition it would seem reasonable to assume that the building was erected subsequent to the acquisition of the street by the City. The release is desired in order to perfect the

title of the petitioner to all of the area occupied by the building and thus make it marketable.

At the present time jurisdiction over the area encroached upon is vested in the President of the Borough, and before action could be taken by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, it would be necessary for the Borough President to prepare a map for and secure the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment providing for changing the street lines in such a way as to clear the area now encroached upon, and leave it outside of the street system.

From information at hand it appears that an adjoining building to the east similarly encroaches upon the street lines, and that a building to the west has been properly set back. It seems evident that the carrying out of such a change in the street plan as would be necessary to clear the way for favorable action on the application, would have not only the effect of introducing an abrupt offset in the line of the street, but would also be prejudicial to the interests of the adjoining owner on the west who would be blanketed to the extent of the offset and placed in a position to collect damages from the City.

The Deputy Chief Engineer therefore recommends that the application be denied. Mr. L. F. Hollenbach, attorney for Mrs. Denton, was heard in regard to the matter.

Laid over, and Mr. Hollenbach advised to take the matter up with the Corporation Counsel.

Margaret L. Kerrigan—In the Matter of the Release to, of the City's Interest in Property on 16th Avenue and Bennett's Lane, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 37).

At meeting held December 20, 1917, a resolution was adopted authorizing a release to Margaret L. Kerrigan of the City's interest in a portion of Bennett's lane in consideration of the sum of \$1,060, plus the additional charge of \$12.50 for the preparation of the necessary papers.

On August 1, 1918, this resolution was amended by substituting \$772.91 as the consideration in place of \$1,060, upon condition that the consideration be paid within fifteen days from the date of said resolution, otherwise to be of no force or effect.

The Comptroller presented a report calling attention to the fact that the grantee has failed to comply with the terms of said resolution of August 1, 1918, providing for the payment within fifteen days from date.

Laid over.

Applications for the Cancellations of Assessments, Pursuant to Section 221-A of the Charter (Cal. No. 38).

Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to Pier 75, North River (Cal. No. 39).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated October 4, 1918, with reference to Pier 75, North River, as follows:

The pier at the foot of West 35th street, North River (No. 75), is at present an open pier for general wharfage purposes, from which collections are made aggregating about \$3,500 per annum, a portion of the outer and southerly side being occupied as a berth for the fireboat and sleeping quarters for the firemen.

The pier is very much in need of repairs and the slips on each side require dredging in order to make them available for use by deep sea vessels.

Several applications have been received for leases of the portion of this pier not used by the Fire Department, and the question to be decided by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is:

First: Shall the pier be repaired, the slips dredged and a shed erected thereon by The City of New York at an expense of about \$150,000 and leased for a term of five years at a rental of about \$55,000 per annum?

Second: Shall the pier be leased for a term of ten years with privilege of renewal for a further term of ten years at a rental of \$40,000 per annum; the lessee to take possession of the pier in its present condition, repair it, dredge the slip, and erect a shed at the expense of the lessee, said shed to revert to the City at the expiration of the lease?

If the first proposition is decided upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, then I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock in the amount of \$150,000 for the cost of repairing and erecting a shed upon said pier and dredging the slips adjacent thereto.

If the second proposition appeals to the members of the Commission, I will prepare at once a recommendation that a resolution be adopted by your Commission approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease of said pier upon the terms set forth in said proposition.

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock A. M. on Thursday, October 17, 1918.

Present—John F. Hylan, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Robert L. Moran, Acting President Board of Aldermen, and Francis P. Kenney, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held September 28, 1918, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD October 8, 1918 (Cal. No. 1).

Dock Department—Communication from, with Reference to Pier Old 46, East River (Cal. No. 2).

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated October 5, 1918, with reference to Pier Old 46, East River, as follows:

"Pier Old 46, East River, near the foot of Jefferson street, is shedded property maintained at the present time for general wharfage purposes, for which collections are made aggregating about \$13,000 per annum.

"The pier, together with the shed thereon, are in a dilapidated condition and the slips on each side require dredging in order to make them available for use by deep sea vessels. Several applications have been received for leases of this pier and the question to be decided by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is:

"1st. Shall the pier and shed be repaired and the slips dredged at an expense to the City of about \$34,000 and leased for a short term of years at a rental of \$25,000 per annum.

"2d. Shall the pier be leased for a longer term of years, with privilege of renewal, at a lesser rental, the lessee to take possession of the pier in its present condition, repair the pier and shed, and dredge the slips.

"If the first proposition is decided upon by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, then I beg to recommend that a resolution be adopted recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock in the amount of \$34,000 for the cost of repairing the pier and shed and dredging the slips adjacent thereto.

"If the second proposition appeals to the members of the Commission, I will prepare at once a recommendation that a resolution be adopted approving of and consenting to the execution of a lease of said pier upon the terms above set forth."

Which was referred to the Committee of the Whole.

Board of Education—Renewal of Lease for, of Premises at No. 418-424 East 68th Street, Manhattan (Cal. No. 3).

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 3, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held Sep-

tember 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 14-J), there was referred to the Comptroller a resolution adopted by the Board of Education on August 14, 1918, requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to approve of and consent to the execution by said Board of a renewal of the lease of the six-story basement building at Nos. 418-424 East 68th street, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of two years from July 1, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

These premises are used as a depository for the Bureau of Supplies, and have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

November 1, 1903-November 1, 1908, \$6,000 a year; November 18 and December 2, 1903.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The property leased by the City is assessed for the present year at \$65,000, and the rental of \$6,000 a year is at the rate of 9 3-13 per cent.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

The City is also a hold-over tenant.

Dear Sirs—On September 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 18), your Board referred to the Comptroller a communication dated September 17, 1918, from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, requesting the execution of a lease of the store and cellar in the premises No. 73 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use as a section station for a period of two years and seven months from October 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$300.

These premises are to take the place of those at 86 Fulton street, leased by the City, at the same annual rental of \$300, but which have been sold to the Cameron Machine Company, which company desires immediate possession of the premises and to cancel the existing lease.

The new location at No. 73 Fulton street has the advantage of light and air on three sides and are better suited to the needs of this department than the old quarters, and the station was moved to the new location on October 1, 1918.

One hundred dollars (\$100) was provided in the Budget to renew lease of old quarters at No. 86 Fulton street, with the expectation that the station could be moved on May 1, 1918, to a City building, which has since been found impracticable.

There is no City-owned property in the vicinity available for this purpose.

The nearest City-owned property is at No. 49 Fulton street, rented for \$600 a year.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use, or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease. The rent of \$25 a month for the new location is the same as paid by the City for the old quarters at No. 86 Fulton street, which are dark and inferior in every way. The premises at No. 73 Fulton street, having light and air on three sides, are the most desirable at the price in the vicinity.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing the execution of a lease upon the following terms and conditions:

Of the store and cellar at No. 73 Fulton street, Borough of Brooklyn, for the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of two years and seven months, from October 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$300, payable quarterly, the lessor to pay taxes and water rates, and make inside and outside repairs and furnish janitor service, and place the premises in tenantable condition to the satisfaction of the Department of Street Cleaning, and widen the front door of the store if required by the Department, also to furnish lighting fixtures; the lessee to furnish heat and light.

Lessor—Nicola Molinari, 49 Main street, Brooklyn.

Sir—On March 28, 1918, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution authorizing the renewal of the lease to the City for the use of this department the premises known as Nos. 42-46 Hamilton street, Borough of Manhattan, for a period of one (1) year from April 1, 1918, at an annual rental of \$7,000, payable quarterly, from Philip F. Collins, Helen Collins, John E. Collins, Elizabeth I. V. Murphy, Annie F. A. Leland, as General Guardian for Genevieve K. Collins, and Hugh J. Christie, as receiver.

On May 16, 1918, the Sinking Fund Commission adopted another resolution amending the former one by substituting as the term of the lease "three years from April 1, 1918" in place of "one year from April 1, 1918."

Request is, therefore, made for a further amendment of resolution dated March 28, 1918, by eliminating the names of all parties mentioned as lessors with the exception of Hugh J. Christie, receiver.

Dear Sirs—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held September 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 40), there was referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated August 13, 1918, requesting a renewal of the lease of premises in the Corn Exchange Bank Building, 26 Bay street, Borough of Richmond, occupied as a Photometric Station for a period of one year from September 1, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows:

September 1, 1915-September 1, 1916, \$440 a year.

The premises in question contain approximately 341 square feet, and the rental is at the rate of \$1.28 per square foot. The rentals in this building vary from \$1.25 to \$1.50 per square foot.

Under the circumstances, the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

The buildings and equipment are no longer required or necessary for the purposes of this department.

The said real estate, including the two frame buildings, a description of which is given in the memorandum attached and the map herewith submitted, are hereby transferred to the jurisdiction and control of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The standpipe and the pumping equipment the department will endeavor to sell or exchange for needed supplies or materials, subject to the conditions as set forth in the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of February 25, 1913.

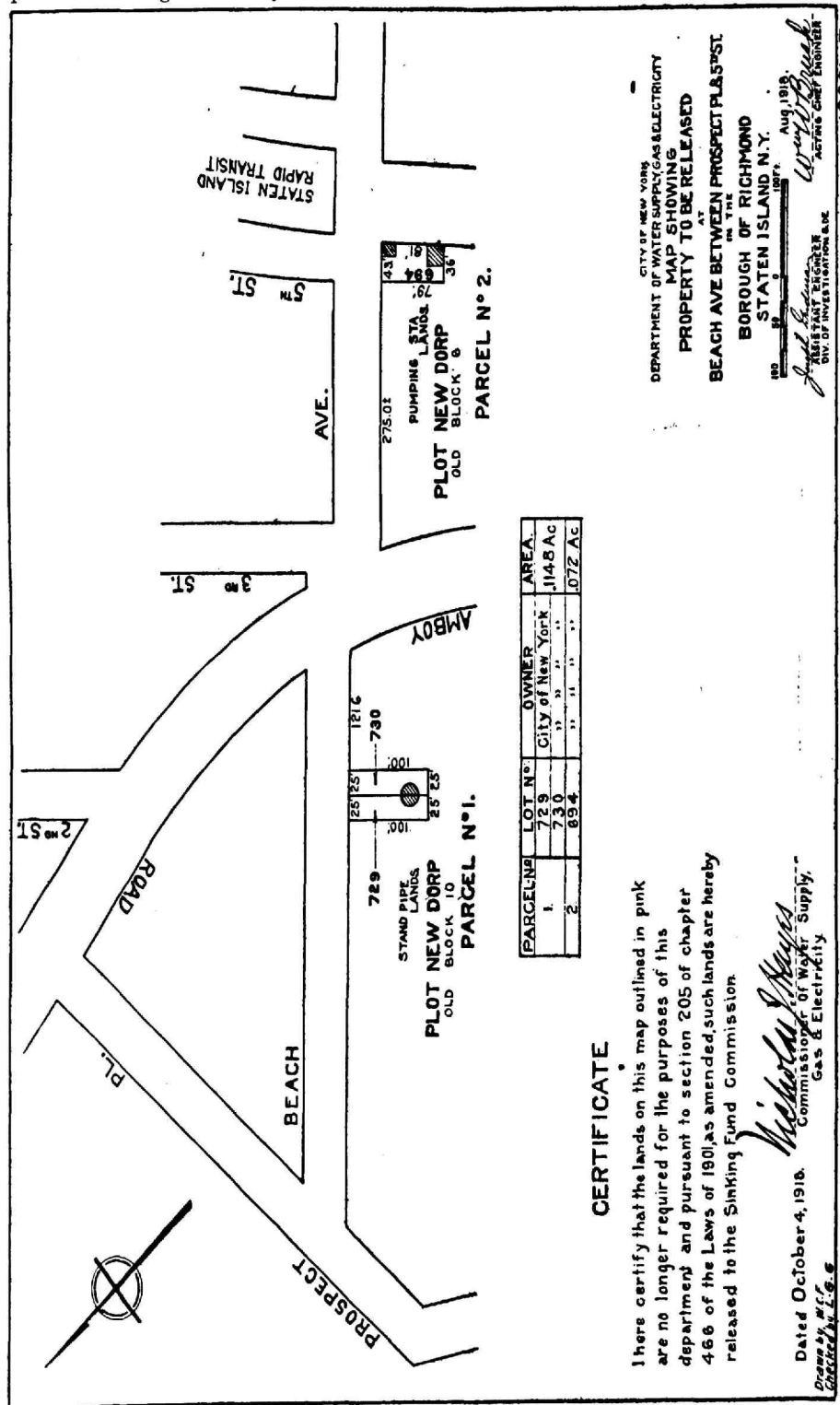

Health Department—Request of, for Authority to Rent a Tract of Land at Otisville, New York (Cal. No. 14).

A communication was received from the Department of Health dated October 7, 1918, requesting authority to rent a tract of land lying along the railroad track at Otisville, N. Y., for the storage of coal in order that the delay in unloading coal at the Municipal Sanatorium and the increased cost of demurrage on coal cars may be eliminated in the future.

Health Department—Communication from, in Regard to the Louisa Minturn Hospital (Cal. No. 15).

A communication was received from the Health Commissioner, dated August 7, 1918, stating that he has had several interviews with the authorities of the Louisa Minturn Hospital, and as a result the Trustees of that Institution desire to terminate the lease and return the property to the Sinking Fund Commission in order that it may be turned over to the Health Department for use of the Willard Parker Hospital.

The Louisa Minturn Hospital occupies premises at the foot of East 16th street, Manhattan, under a lease entered into July 1, 1896, for a period of 99 years at a nominal rental.

The Commissioner suggests that such action be taken as will transfer the use of the property to the Health Department on the termination of the lease. The reason the Commissioner asks that this action be taken before the lease is actually terminated is because the Minturn Hospital Trustees have a certain endowment fund that he is urging them to turn over to the City or to use in putting the Minturn Hospital in first class repair before it is turned over to the City. The Trustees are anxious to have the original purposes of the gift and endowment carried out and these can be carried out only by the use of the building for contagious diseases.

Dear Sir—The War Camp Community Service of Mount Vernon and New Rochelle has made application to this department for a lease of the old Tallapoosa Inn, in Pelham Bay Park.

The War Camp Community Service is an organized governmental agency, with an appropriation from the government for its use.

Its stated object in seeking the lease of the building in question is to have a place where mothers or wives of the sailors at the Pelham Naval Training Station may have shelter temporarily while visiting their sons or other relatives.

The house is a basement, two-story and attic, brick, 49 feet 6 inches by 55 feet, with porch. There are about 20 rooms in the house, and an outside shed.

The building was formerly used by a club known as the Tallapoosa Club, and it was subsequently rented for the sale of refreshments, liquors, etc.

The last tenant threw up his lease a year ago, and the condition of the building has operated against its tenancy ever since.

In March last, our Architect reported that it required at least \$7,000 or \$8,000 to make suitable repairs.

I enclose herewith a copy of communication from the War Camp Community Service, dated September 26, 1918.

I might add that Executive Secretary Milton W. Brown has called at this department several times in relation to the leasing of some suitable place near the Naval Training Station for the purposes above stated. The Tallapoosa Club house is the only available place to be had.

Under the circumstances, I recommend the authorization of a lease to the War Camp Community Service of the War and Navy Departments' Commission on Training Camp Activities of Mount Vernon and New Rochelle, for the duration of the war, of the Tallapoosa Club, with rental at one dollar per year, with the privilege of a subsequent term after the war, for a period to be determined later, at a rental of \$50 per month. Charles Bast—Petition of, for a Release of the City's Interest in a Portion of the Old Brooklyn and Newtown Turnpike (Cal. No. 24).

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 1, 1918.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of The Sinking Fund:

Dear Sirs—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on July 25, 1918, there was referred to the Comptroller a communication from Messrs. Winne & Frey requesting a release to Charles Bast of the City's interest in so much of the premises as lie within the north half of what was formerly known as the Brooklyn and Newtown turnpike, abutting certain premises owned by him on the south side of Jefferson street 91 feet 1 inch west of the southwest corner of Jefferson street and Wyckoff avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

The Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the same meeting was instructed to submit a report to me in connection therewith. In his report he states that the application relates to the northerly half of the old Brooklyn and Newtown turnpike, which crosses diagonally property on the south side of Jefferson street, located between points 91 feet 1 inch and 111 feet 7 inches west of Wyckoff avenue and is probably of Dutch origin; the portion described was closed pursuant to Section 2, Chapter 674 of the Laws of 1868; he further states that an inspection of the ground discloses no trace of the old road, and that a building has been erected within its former lines. He further states that the land for which a release is requested lies outside of the area reserved for street purposes on the City map.

Whereas, Thompson & Binger, Inc., on be-
half of Continental Can Co., Syracuse, N. Y.,
filed a petition dated May 16, 1918, for a vari-
ation from the provisions of Section 79-a-2 of the
Labor Law, re required exits, in the proposed
Machine Shop Building, of Continental Can Co.,
Syracuse, N. Y., and

Whereas, a public hearing was held on the
17th day of July, 1918, at Albany, N. Y., at
which opportunity for all interested persons to
be heard thereon was given; and

Whereas, an examination of the plans of the
said proposed building was made and a report
of such examination is on file in the offices of
the Commission, from which examination it ap-
pears that the said proposed building will be of
concrete construction, three stories high and
approximately 43 feet, 10 inches by 64 feet,
10 inches; first floor used as private garage and
repair shop, second and third floors as machine

Whereas, the Bureau of Inspection has sub-
mitted to this Commission appeals filed by the
appellants herein from orders issued by the
Division of Factory Inspection against the prem-
ises noted, the granting of which appeals would
necessitate a variation of law; and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspec-
tion has had a re-inspection made of the prem-
ises in each case and upon the reports submitted
gives the conditions existing and recommends as
follows:

1. Premises affected, Adams Center; appel-
lant, E. C. Maxson & Son. Provide a sanitary
watercloset, etc., inside of building for use of
employees. This firm has purchased and has
on the premises a chemical closet of the "Rowe
Type," which type has not been approved by the
Industrial Commission. They have a place on
the 2d floor of building where the closet can be
installed; the father and son are both actively
engaged at the mill and employ regularly one
man and part of the time two men; the appel-
lants seem to think that if they look after the
toilet themselves it will prove satisfactory.

Recommendation: Installation of chemical
closet of "Rowe Type" permitted with the dis-
tinct understanding that when same fails to be
satisfactory, it will be removed and an approved
type installed.

2. Premises affected, Geddes; appellant, Hal-
comb Steel Co. (75101) 7—Prohibit occupancy;
8—2 fireproof stairways; (71550) 4—washing

Recommendation: Waiver of order while conditions remain unchanged.

5. Premises affected, Port Chester, 48-50 Westchester ave.; appellant, Port Chester Baking Co. Provide additional means of exit. Premises consist of a 1, 2 and 3 story building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; main building measures 78 feet by 98 feet; 3-story section measures 21 by 38 feet; one interior spiral stairway from 1st to 3d floors in 3-story section and an interior stairway from 1st to 2d floors in 2-story section; occupancy of building, 8; above the 1st floor, 1 man employed about two hours each day on 2d floor and 1 man employed half-hour or less each day on 3d floor to oil machinery.

Recommendation: Accept present exits while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

Whereas, the Bureau of Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following appeals from orders issued by the Division of Factory Inspection against the premises noted—and

Whereas, the said Division of Factory Inspection has had a re-inspection made in each case and upon the reports submitted gives the conditions existing and recommends as follows:

1. Premises affected, Oakfield, 1 Mill Warehouse; appellant, United Gypsum Co. 5—Additional means of exit from 3d floor. (Sept. 6, 1918.) Two and three-story nonfireproof building; open lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy, 56; above 1st floor, 6; above 2d floor, 1; exits: one interior stairway extending from 1st to 3d floor and one interior stairway extending from 1st to 2d floors only; three imperfect horizontal exits from 3d floor, two in the form of a bridge, one at each end leading to adjoining buildings and one consisting of a passageway over the roof of the 2-story building with access to stairway leading to ground.

Recommendation: Acceptance of present means of exit from third floor while conditions and occupancy remain unchanged.

2. Premises affected, New York City, 48 West Houston st.; appellant, Atanley R. Rigby. 2—ventilate watercloset compartment to outer air by a ventilating duct with an area of 144 square inches for one closet. (July 25, 1918.) Order refers to waterclosets used by males and females and located in 3d floor hallway. There is a large opening in upper part of front enclosure of waterclosets used by males. A solid partition, covered with metal, separates waterclosets used by males and females. An irregular opening, approximately 12 by 18 inches, is made in upper part of partition between males' watercloset and vestibule of waterclosets used by females, which vestibule is provided with window to outer air.

Recommendation: Accept present means of ventilation on condition that order No. 2 to properly enclose males' watercloset in hall, 3d floor, be complied with at once by enclosing large opening in front enclosure of watercloset used by males.

3. Premises affected, Vise Building, Watertown; appellant, Bagley & Sewell Co. 12—Additional exit. 13—Prohibit occupancy. (April 5, 1918.) Three-story nonfireproof building erected before Oct. 1, 1913; divided lofts; sprinkler installed; no combustibles carried; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy of building, 30; above 1st floor, 10; above 2d floor, one or two occasionally; 3d floor used for storage purposes with no permanent occupancy. Exits: one interior stairway from 1st to 3d floors along the northerly wall; westerly end of 2d floor used for factory purposes, easterly end partitioned off for office purposes; at westerly end of 2d floor is horizontal exit with self-closing fire door leading to adjoining building; the wooden partition separating factory from office is provided with door and on easterly side of this partition is an interior wooden stairway extending from 1st to 2d floors, and an imperfect horizontal exit leading from this building to two-story office building; from 3d floor is window leading to roof of two-story section, with ladder from office roof to bridge between two-story office building and two-story factory building and an entrance from bridge to stairs in both buildings.

Recommendation: Inasmuch as there is no regular occupancy above the 2d floor, except as means of exit from this 3d floor access to roof of two-story office building by means of window, provided said window is kept free and unobstructed at all times and a sign placed thereon marked "EXIT," with ladder to bridge and access to stairways in both office and factory buildings, which stairways lead to open area.

4. Premises affected, Yonkers, Ft. Point st.; appellant, Habirshaw Electric Cable Co., Inc. 7—Provide safe passageway to street from foot of all fireproof stairways. (April 9, 1918.) Three-story fireproof building erected since Oct. 1, 1913; sprinkler installed; combustibles carried; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy of building, 478; above the 1st floor, 173; above the 2d floor, 48; sprinkler has two sources of water supply. Exits: 5 interior fireproof enclosed stairways, doors to which open outwardly and are self-closing; one perfect horizontal exit on each floor. This is the main building of the Company's plant; other buildings are one and two-story structures, and are all connected with this 3-story building; buildings located on steep hill between the New York Central tracks and the Hudson River, main entrance to plant being by means of bridge over the railroad tracks at level of 3d floor. Exit from foot of stairways is as follows: From stairway in southeast corner of building to railroad loading platform at 2d floor level; (platform at this point removed at date of inspection for the purpose of replacing some machinery). Same is to be promptly replaced. From southwest stairway to dock at river front. No adequate passageway to street. From two stairways along the westerly wall of the northerly wing, through one and two story sections of plant. From stairway to the northeast corner of the northerly wing at bridge over railroad track, the 1st and 2d floors at this point being below the level of the main entrance.

Recommendation: Railroad platform to be replaced so as to provide egress from foot of stairway in the southeast corner of the southerly section at 2d floor level. A runway not less than five feet wide to be provided from foot of stairway at southwest corner of southerly section, said runway to extend to grade at front of building with free access to this stairway and runway to be maintained at all times.

Accept present exits from other three stairways.

And it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardship in complying with the strict provisions of law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises noted herein and that in granting the variations set forth in each case, the spirit of the law and of the code rules will be observed and public safety secured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants herein has been advised that he would have an opportunity to appear at this time and place and be heard by the Commission, if he so desired, and such of the appellants who appeared having been given a hearing; therefore,

Be it resolved by the State Industrial Commission that the appellant in each case be and he hereby is granted the variations specified for the premises appealed for by him with the understanding that said variations be effective only so long as the conditions remain as of this date.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, held in the said City on the 17th day of October, 1918, the following resolution was duly adopted:

Resolved, That Article 12 of the Sanitary Code be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 225, to read as follows:

Section 225. *Heating of Occupied Buildings.*—It shall be the duty of every person who shall have contracted or undertaken, or shall be bound, to heat, or to furnish heat for any building, or portion thereof, occupied as a home or place of residence of one or more persons, or as a business establishment where one or more persons are employed, to heat or to furnish heat for every occupied room in such building, or portion thereof, so that a minimum temperature of sixty-eight (68) degrees Fahrenheit may be maintained therein at all such times. Provided, however, the provision of this section shall not apply to buildings, or portions thereof, used and occupied for trades, businesses, or occupations where high or low temperatures are essential and unavoidable.

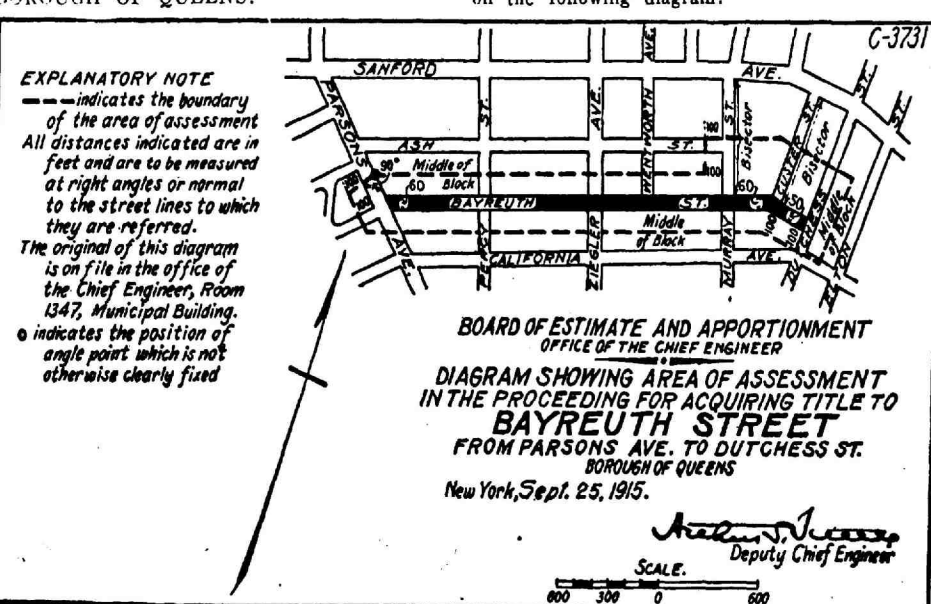

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause, or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.
