The 737 deaths represent a death-rate of 22.70, against 25.00 for the previous week, and 20.63 for the corresponding week of 1890.

The decrease of 74 deaths was mainly due to a decrease of 13 in the deaths from typhoid fever, of 26 from diarrhoeal diseases, of 8 from cancer, of 30 from phthisis, and of 14 from pneumonia. There was an increase of 6 in the deaths from diphtheria.

The deaths from diphtheria were most numerous in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards, from scarlet fever in the Seventeenth Ward, and from typhoid fever in the Twelfth, Eighteenth and Twenty-second Wards.
