BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVE-MENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, May 5, 1893, at 11 o'clock A. M., pursuant to the usual notice. The roll was called, and the following members were present and answered to their names : The Mayor, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—5. Absent—The Comptroller—1. Hon. Abraham B. Tappen, having been elected President of the Department of Public Parks, and, Hon. Louis F. Haffen, having been appointed Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, took their seats as members of the Board. In the matter of discontinuing Brook Avenue West the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards offered the following preamble and resolutions: Whereas, The Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York has prepared, adopted, established and submitted to this Board for its concurrence and approval the following map or plan entitled: "Map or plan showing the discontinuance of the avenue between Brook avenue and Third avenue, bordering on and west of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and of the widening of German place, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to Third avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York."

Resolved, That in pursuonce of the provisions of chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890 the Board does hereby give its concurrence and approval to the discontinuance of the avenue between Brook and Third avenues, bordering on and west of the Port Morris Branch of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and of the widening of German place, between East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth and John streets, also change of grade of Brook avenue, from East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street to Third avenue, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, established by the Commis-sioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, under chapter 545 of the Laws of 1890, dated New York, November 7, 1892, and signed Louis A. Risse, Chief Engineer. Resolved, That the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards be and he is hereby designated and directed to cause three (3) similar maps or plans of the above map or plan to be made, to be certified by him and to cause the same to be filed in the manner now prescribed by law, one in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York, one in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York and one in the office of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-fourth Wards of the City of New York.

The following petition for the opening of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Tenth avenue to the Boulevard, was presented, and on motion, was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works for report thereon.

To the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York : The undersigned owners of property and residents upon or in the vicinity of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, respectfully request your Honorable Board to open said street from Tenth avenue to the Boulevard. The said street is now open and graded from the Harlem river to St. Nicholas avenue of the width of one hundred feet, and is the main cross street north of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street. It is also open between Tenth and Convent avenues of the width of sixty feet, and proceedings are now pending to open the same from St. Nicholas to Convent avenue. At Eighth avenue is a station of Sixth and Ninth Avenue Elevated Railroads, and a recent extension of the surface roads from Madison to Eighth avenues assures early communication with the easterly section of the city and the Mott Haven Station of the New York Central Railroad. Access is needed from property both on Convent Hill and west of Tenth avenue to these several railroads as well as to the easterly side of the city. Your petitioners believe that the opening and extension of the to the easterly side of the city. Your petitioners believe that the opening and extension of the street to St. Nicholas avenue will be of great benefit to all the property west of the last named avenue, and especially to the property west of Tenth avenue, and possessing adequate facilities of communication with the lower part of the City, and will induce substantial improvements in this section

dred and Twenty-eighth street, south of One Hundred and Thirtieth street have been established in a manner as to render the convenient improvement of said property impossible or the use of the same advantageous for purposes of business or residence. According to the present established streets access to the said property is by way of One Hun-dred and Twenty-eighth street, from St. Nicholas avenue, and thus by Academy place northerly. The present grade of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street rises from thirty-five feet at St. Nicholas avenue to sixty-three feet at Academy place, and is at the rate of thirteen and three-tenth per cent., in fact the steepest grade in the upper part of the city, and one that renders the use of the street practically worthless for ordinary street uses. The lines of Academy place run also in such a direction as to cut the blocks in an irregular manner, making irregular fronts to the property thereon, which, when divided into lots, would be a great disadvantage thereto for purposes of sale or improvement. Your petitioners are desirous of so arranging the streets and avenues intersecting the said property as to put the same in the best possible shape for these purposes, so that the same may be of benefit not only to your petitioners but to the adjacent property and to the city. The plan which is hereto annexed, it is believed, will, upon examination, be found to answer fully these requirements. Your petitioners further show that the City of New York is now the owner of the portions of land included within the lines of Academy place and St. Nicholas Terrace and One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, as are colored gray upon the annexed map, which it is desired to close while your petitioners are the owners of the parcels of land colored red which will be required for the proposed extension. The City of New York acquired said land, colored gray as follows :

The portion in St. Nicholas Terrace was acquired by the confirmation of the report of the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment on the 30th day of December, 1892, for which compensation was allowed for the land so taken, but such cost was assessed upon your petitioners' remaining property, which assessment has been paid. Your petitioners propose, should your Honorable Board deem the proposed changes in the lines of the street advisible and conducive to public convenience and benefit, to convey to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York the parcel of land which may be required for the extension of the said St. Nicholas Terrace shown upon the annexed map, and which is colored red, in exchange for the parcels of land within the lines of Academy place, St. Nicholas Terrace and One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street to be closed, which upon said map are colored gray. This proposition is made to your Honorable Board in pursuance of section 1009 of the Consoli-dation Act, as amended by chapter 129, Laws of 1892, which provides for and authorizes such exchange under and by direction of your Honorable Board. A committee of lumbermen appeared and requested that the Pier foot of West Twenty-third street, when built, to be set aside for public use. Daniel A. Lord, attorney, appeared on behalf of the Cunard Steamship Company, Limited, and requested a lease of the half bulkheads adjoining Pier, new 40, North river, together with per-mission to shed the same.

GENTLEMEN—The Female Academy of the Sacred Heart respectfully request your honorable Board to extend St. Nicholas Terrace as heretofore laid out upon the map or plan of the City of New York in direct or straight lines southerly from One Hundred and Thirtieth street to One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and to close so much of Academy place, St. Nicholas Terrace and One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street in connection therewith as the extension of said Terrace will render necessary and to fix and establish appropriate grades for the said terrace and intersect-ing streets. A map of which proposed change is herewith submitted.

Your petitioners respectfully show that they are the owners of all the lands on both sides of said St. Nicholas Terrace and Academy place, and extending easterly to Avenue St. Nicholas and westerly to Convent avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street and One Hundred and Thirtieth street, within which limits the proposed changes are to be made.
