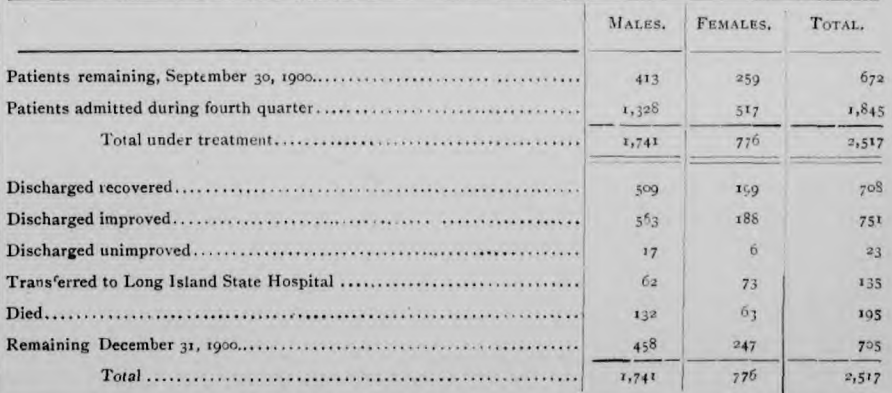

Exhaust and steam-drips to sewer, Hospital—Stock used, 1 three-quarter-inch check valve, 1 one-inch brass union, 4 three-quarter-inch elbows, 1 one and one-quarter-inch ell, 5 three-quarter-inch nipples, 2 three-eighths-inch nipple, 3 one-half-inch nipple, 1 one-inch by one-inch by one-quarter-inch tee, 1 one and one-quarter-inch tee, 1 three-eighths-inch globe valve, 1 one-half-inch angle valve, 1 three-quarter-inch by three-eighths-inch reducer coupling.

Repairs on main steam to sterilizer, Hospital—Stock used, 1 one and one-half-inch tee, 1 one and one-half-inch brass union, 12 feet 1½-inch pipe, 12 feet ½-inch pipe, 1 one-half-inch angle valve, 1 one and one-half-inch by three-quarter-inch bushing, 1 one and three-quarter by one-half-inch bushing, 3 one-half-inch elbows, 2 one-half-inch nipples, 1 one-half-inch R. & L. coupling.

Repairs on return to Nurses' Home—Stock used, 2 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe, 2 one-half-inch ells, 1 one-half-inch brass union.

Putting up storm-shed at Infants' Hospital—23 ceiling boards $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch by 9 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch by 13 feet, 40 square feet $\frac{3}{8}$ -inch white pine, 20 square feet $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch white pine, 50 square feet $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch white pine, 128 square feet $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch narrow ceiling, $2\frac{1}{2}$ -inch N. Fitting up water-closet, bath-tub and basins in Infants' Hospital—5 feet 4-inch extra heavy iron pipe, 8 feet $1\frac{1}{2}$ -inch waste, lead pipe; 2 feet 2-inch waste, lead pipe; 2 feet 4-inch waste, lead pipe; 9 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch aa lead supply pipe; 50 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch galvanized-iron pipe; 6 feet $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch galvanized-iron pipe; 1 four-inch by two-inch Y branch; 1 four-inch by four-inch tee branch, extra heavy; 2 four-inch one-eighth bends, extra heavy; 1 three-inch double hub; 1 two-inch double hub-light iron; 1 clean-out screw ferrule, brass, extra heavy; 1 two-inch brass ferrule; 1 four-inch brass ferrule; 1 one-half-inch globe valve; 1 two-inch Debois lead S trap; 1 one and one-half-inch Debois lead P trap; 8 pounds solder; 1 one and one-quarter-inch Ricketts' rubber connection; 2 three-quarter-inch 45° galvanized elbows; 1 one-half-inch galvanized tee branch; 6 one-half-inch galvanized elbows; 1 three-quarter-inch by one-half-inch tee branch; 5 one-half-inch brass female soldering nipples; $\frac{1}{2}$ -bag charcoal.

The Committee appointed at the meeting of the Armory Board on January 14, 1901, to whom was referred the communication from Deputy Commissioner Kirwin in relation to a defect in the Forty-seventh Regiment Armory Building in the Borough of Brooklyn, made the following report :

"NEW YORK, January 22, 1901.

"Honorable ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, and Chairman, Board of Armory Commissioners :

"DEAR SIR—Referring to a resolution adopted by the Armory Board at a meeting of January 14, referring to Brigadier-General James McLeer and myself for examination and report a communication that I addressed you on the 12th instant, calling the attention of the Armory Board to certain defects requiring immediate attention in the Forty-seventh Regiment Armory, Borough of Brooklyn, etc.

"The matter has been investigated and we have to advise you as follows :

"The building is located at the corner of Marcy avenue and Lynch street, Borough of Brooklyn, and was erected in three sections, the first in about 1885, the second or middle section in about 1888 and the third in 1889. The defects exist and the repairs are required in the middle section. The imperfect condition in this portion of the building is attributed largely to natural vibration. From this cause it appears the galleries have been literally torn apart from their fastenings. It would appear that the injury to the building is partly due to the fact that the floor beams were not properly braced and secured to each other, as well as the masonry, when the structure was erected. It does not appear that the trouble is due to any settlement of the walls or buttresses.

"We would recommend that about 90 feet of the galleries on each side of the building (about 180 feet in all) be taken down and rebuilt, at the same time having the stringers, beams, etc., properly tied together, well braced and firmly secured to the masonry, and that all nuts of the suspension rods be properly set up.

"There are indications of settlement in the middle section drill floor, but it is not considered of a dangerous character, and is in no need of immediate repair. The Armorer is authority for the statement that this floor has been in its present condition for years, and we do not see that it requires immediate attention.

"To carry out the above recommendation would cost approximately \$400, which we respectfully recommend be authorized for that purpose.

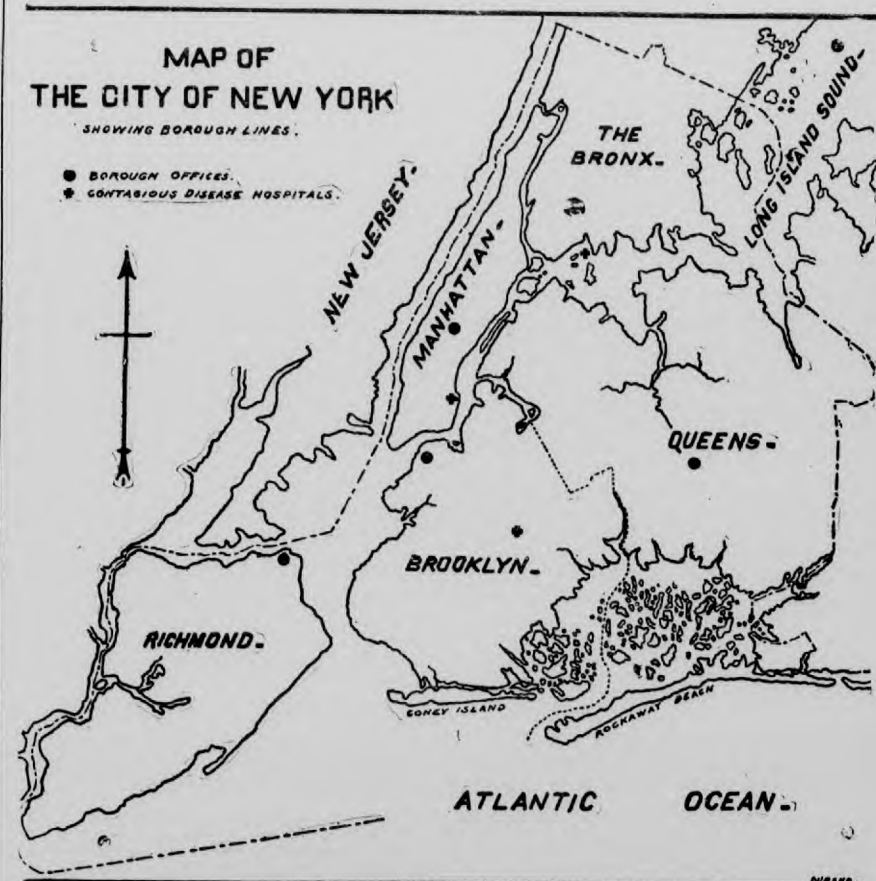

AN ORDINANCE authorizing the laying of water-mains in Meeker avenue and in Sixtieth street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 18th day of July, 1900, be and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, viz.:

"Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the laying of water-mains in Meeker avenue, from Kingsland avenue to Newtown creek, and in Sixtieth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, both in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the making of a contract for the same by the Commissioner of Water Supply, be and the same is hereby authorized and approved, the cost of said public work or improvement to be paid for from the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York."

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of the City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to

redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand and five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of the City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

CHAPTER 630.

AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.

Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
