FOURTH QUARTERLY REPORT, 1900.

Hon. A. H. GOETTING, Commissioner Public Charities, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, Brooklyn, N. Y.: DEAR SIR-Herewith is submitted the fourth quarterly report for 1900 of the institutions

Dear Sire—Herewith is submitted the fourth quarterly report for 1900 of the institutions in this Department.

A summary of the four quarterly reports for 1900 emphasizes again the need of a law authorizing the commitment of chronic alcoholic habitues for a term of at least one year, and the establishment of a suitable institution for their care and treatment.

During the year 1900 there were 796 admissions to the Hospital and 86 to the Almshouse for alcoholism direct, that is to say, there were in all 882 patients admitted suffering from acute alcoholic poisoning. The patients are treated for the acute attack, and when recovered are immediately discharged, and the majority of them "repeat" from two to eight times a year. They will not remain in an institution for curative treatment unless committed.

During the year there were 69 feeble-minded children admitted, who should have been sent to the State institutions, and if this is impossible, an extended system is required here at once to properly care for and teach such cases.

The per capita cost per diem for maintenance of hospital cases of all kinds during the year was \$0.55479, which includes ordinary repairs to building, salaries and every other item of expense.

The same number of cases maintained by the City in private hospitals would have cost \$173,027.40, or \$38,700.25 more than the cost here, and there is no private hospital in these boroughs that supports its public patients on the amount now allowed by the City.

The additions and improvements allowed by the Honorable Board of Estimate last year are progressing satisfactorily, and when completed will add greatly to the economical administration of the affairs here; but other improvements (already mentioned in the yearly estimate) are absolutely essential to the proper management of the institutions.

"Dear Sir—Referring to a resolution adopted by the Armory Board at a meeting of January 14, referring to Brigadier-General James McLeer and myself for examination and report a communication that I addressed you on the 12th instant, calling the attention of the Armory Board to certain defects requiring immediate attention in the Forty-seventh Regiment Armory, Borough of Brooklying atte

certain defects requiring immediate attention in the Forty-seventh Regiment Armory, Borough of Brooklyn, etc.

"The matter has been investigated and we have to advise you as follows:

"The building is located at the corner of Marcy avenue and Lynch street, Borough of Brooklyn, and was erected in three sections, the first in about 1885, the second or middle section in about 1888 and the third in 1889. The defects exist and the repairs are required in the middle section. The imperfect condition in this portion of the building is attributed largely to natural vibration. From this cause it appears the galleries have been literally torn apart from their fastenings. It would appear that the injury to the building is partly due to the fact that the floor beams were not properly braced and secured to each other, as well as the masonry, when the structure was erected. It does not appear that the trouble is due to any settlement of the walls or buttresses.

"We would recommend that about 90 feet of the galleries on each side of the building (about 180 feet in all) be taken down and rebuilt, at the same time having the stringers, beams, etc., properly tied together, well braced and firmly secured to the masonry, and that all nuts of

the same time having the straight, at the same time having the straights, beams, etc., properly tied together, well braced and firmly secured to the masonry, and that all nuts of the suspension rods be properly set up.

"There are indications of settlement in the middle section drill floor, but it is not considered of a dangerous character, and is in no need of immediate repair. The Armorer is authority for the statement that this floor has been in its present condition for years, and we do not see that it requires immediate attention. requires immediate attention.

"To carry out the above recommendation would cost approximately \$400, which we respectfully recommend be authorized for that purpose.



AN ORDINANCE authorizing the laying of water-mains in Meeker avenue and in Sixtieth street,
Borough of Brooklyn.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:
That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Public Improvements, adopted by that Board on the 18th day of July, 1900, be and the same hearthy is conveyed and the public work or improvement, therein provided for is and the same hereby is approved, and the public work or improvement therein provided for is hereby authorized, viz.:

"Resolved, by the Board of Public Improvements, That, in pursuance of section 413 of the Greater New York Charter, the laying of water-mains in Meeker avenue, from Kingsland avenue to Newtown creek, and in Sixtieth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, both in the Borough to Newtown creek, and in Sixueth street, between Fifth and Eighth avenues, both in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the making of a contract for the same by the Commissioner of Water Supply, be and the same is hereby authorized and approved, the cost of said public work or improvement to be paid for from the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York."

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for the comptroller of the city of New York, in his discretion, to provide for the extension of all or any part of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, as the same may from time to time mature. Certificates of stock or bonds so extended shall bear interest at a rate not exceeding three and one-half per centum per annum, and shall be stamped across their face with the terms of such extension, which shall be for a period not exceeding twenty years.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately. Proposals will be received by the Comptroller at his office, No. 28. Broadway, New York City, from the holders of six per cent Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1001, for extending the maturity of all or any part of the respective amounts of such stock held by them to the following dates:

Gentlemen—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, and the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 able from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.
