DEAR SIR—I inclose herewith copy of a communication from the President of the Borough dated January 14, 1901, in relation to the construction of a sewer in Gardner avenue, between Johnson and Flushing avenues.

I beg to report that the estimated cost of the construction of the above-mentioned improvement is \$4,000, and that the assessed valuation of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$2,048,110.

In regard to information requested in the communication from the President of the Borough, as to whether the street is legally open or not, I beg to report that proceedings for opening this street have advanced to such a stage that they will be confirmed by the Supreme Court within thirty days.

In regard to the advisability of building this sewer, information of which is requested by the President of this Borough, I beg to state that it is most important, as the construction of sewers have been authorized in Johnson avenue, from Knickerbocker avenue to Gardner avenue, and in Wyckoff avenue, from Flushing to Myrtle avenue. Thus it will be seen that the improvement above mentioned is a connecting link between sewers authorized. If the sewer in Gardner avenue, between Johnson and Flushing avenues, is not authorized, it will be necessary for this Department to care for many temporary sewers, which cross Wyckoff avenue, by carrying said connections through the Wyckoff avenue sewer, when the same is built. The authorization of the Gardner avenue sewer at this time would permit this Department to enter into contract and complete same at about the time that the Johnson avenue and Wyckoff avenue sewers are completed, thus caring for the temporary connections above mentioned and giving a complete sewer.

No other papers are submitted, but on inquiry at the Department of Health I was informed that plans are being prepared by Messrs. Horgan & Slattery for the work proposed.

Chapter 535, Laws of 1893, referred to in the first resolution, is as follows:

"Section 1. The board of estimate and apportionment of the city of New York is authorized and empowered to appropriate, in its discretion, an amount such as they may deem necessary for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses that may be required to be incurred by the board of health of said city for the preservation of the health of the community.

"Sec. 2. The expenses so incurred by the board of health shall, from time to time, as the same are incurred or required, be certified by said board to the board of estimate and apportionment, and upon its approval thereof it shall be the duty of the comptroller to pay the respective amounts so certified and approved to the parties entitled thereto, and to raise the amount necessary for the purpose from revenue bonds of the city to be issued in anticipation of the taxes to be levied in the year following the date of their issue."

The necessity for the additional pavilion is very fully set forth in all the papers submitted above, and present a strong case for immediate action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; several months must necessarily elapse before the pavilion can be ready for use, while the papers show that the pavilion even now is needed at this time.

I inclose a copy of a report dated March 9, 1901, which shows that there were only fourteen beds vacant in the five pavilions devoted to small-pox, and at present, I was informed, there are no vacant beds in those pavilions.

In my opinion, the emergency caused by the "sudden increase in the number of contagious diseases required to be cared for by the Department of Health," as stated in the report of the Sanitary Inspector, in the first and second preambles to the resolutions, justifies the certificate as given in the first resolution, and the request for \$10,000, for the purpose of defraying the necessary expenses to be incurred in "erecting and furnishing an additional pavilion."

No dimensions are given for the pavilion, or anything definite, except the request for the fixed sum of \$10,000.

All the particulars should have been given; the absence of them can only be disregarded, in view of the emergency which exists, and the length of time which must elapse before the pavilion can be completed.

The work must necessarily be done under contract, at public letting.

Under the circumstances, I would recommend that the issue of bonds to the amount of \$10,000 be authorized, to provide means for the erection and furnishing of an additional pavilion on North Brother Island.

Bonds, however, to the amount of \$20,000 were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on September 15, 1899, for planting Riverside drive, Ninety-sixth to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, and these bonds have not, as yet, been issued.

The total amount authorized under the provisions of chapter 666 of the Laws of 1897 is \$390,710.68, and the amount limited by the law is \$400,000.

Of the above sum \$90,600 is still unissued, the cause of which, as stated by the Commissioner in his letter, by reason of the failure of the Municipal Assembly to take action thereon.

Section 169 of the Charter provides:

"\* \* \* Corporate stock of The City of New York, issued in pursuance of laws already passed or which may be hereafter passed, or in pursuance of the provisions of this act, shall be, unless otherwise provided by this act, issued by the comptroller only to the extent to which he may be thereunto authorized by resolution of the municipal assembly and the board of estimate and apportionment, adopted by vote as provided for in this act; and provided, further, that whenever the amount of stocks or bonds required to be issued in pursuance of any law for any one purpose in any year shall not exceed the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, the comptroller may issue such bonds when thereunto authorized by the vote of a majority of the board of estimate and apportionment."

It is clear that a less sum than \$100,000 is available under chapter 666 of the Laws of 1897, and in consequence, I see no reason why the bonds may not be issued without the approval of the Municipal Assembly, as provided for in the section above quoted.

I would therefore recommend that the resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment

On September 15, 1899, authorizing an issue of .....

—planting Riverside drive, Ninety-sixth to One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street; .....

On May 1, 1900 .....

—planting around Grant's Tomb and One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-seventh streets; .....

On October 1, 1900 .....

—grading and reconstructing the surface of roadway of Riverside drive, be rescinded, and that new resolutions be adopted providing for the issue of the said amounts, and for the specific purposes, in the total sum of \$90,600, to be issued by the Comptroller, without the concurrence of the Municipal Assembly.

The proposed site is on the northerly side of Avenue C, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets, having a frontage of 216 feet 3 inches on Avenue C, 285 feet on East Thirteenth street, and 200 feet on East Fourteenth street.

The location is good for a school site, and is required to relieve Public Schools 89 and 90.

2. Fifteenth avenue, Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets:

200 feet on the easterly side of Fifteenth avenue and 195 feet on Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets. A new school (Public School 127) with 20 class-rooms, which will be finished on or about April 1, 1901, will accommodate the children in the vicinity of the proposed new site.

The neighborhood is not very thickly settled, but the distances are so great that I would advise the acquisition of the site requested, which is well located. When a school building is erected on the same, it will allow the City to vacate the building leased at \$1,500 per year for school purposes (Public School 112) on the same corner of Sixty-seventh street and Eighteenth avenue.

2. Avenue U, Van Sicklen and Lake streets:

This site, having a frontage of 206 feet  $4\frac{3}{4}$  inches on the northerly side of Avenue U, 203 feet 6 inches on Lake street and 254 feet  $5\frac{1}{2}$  inches on Van Sicklen street, is within 250 feet of Public School 95, which is a small frame school building, with a seating capacity of only 249, but located on a plot 150 feet by 150 feet; therefore I cannot see the necessity of acquiring the site proposed. At present Public School 95 has no part-time classes, but if the neighborhood in the future should warrant a larger school, it can be built on the property of the present school site.

Of the three school sites selected, in my judgment the first two are well located and necessary, and I consider that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can properly approve of the action of the Board of Education in their selection of the following sites:

1. Avenue C, East Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets;

2. Fifteenth avenue, Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets;

—and, by the concurrent vote of all the members of the Board, approve of the institution of condemnation proceedings by the Corporation Counsel to acquire title to the same.

It is now proposed to acquire the plot, 46 feet by 86 feet, to square the premises. This I consider advisable, as the entire site is required to relieve Public Schools 18 and 20.

2. Humboldt street, between Engert street and Meeker avenue—  
This site, an irregular plot on Humboldt street, north of Public School 51, is required to enlarge the present school, which has 117 part-time classes. The selection I consider good and necessary.

3. McKinley, Railroad and Lincoln avenues—  
This site has a frontage of 202 feet on the northerly side of McKinley avenue, and 230 feet on Railroad and Lincoln avenues.

In my opinion, this site is not necessary at present. Public School 108 is not full, and a new school, Public School 64, with 25 class-rooms, has just been opened. Public Schools 59 and 64, Borough of Queens, are near enough to accommodate some of the children from the neighborhood of the proposed site, and as this locality is not thickly settled nor growing, I do not consider that a new school is needed for some time.

In my judgment, the first two sites are required in order to give more school accommodations, which are greatly needed in the respective neighborhoods, but Site No. 3, in my opinion, is not needed at present, and I consider that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can properly approve the action of the Board of Education in their selection of the following sites:

1. Metropolitan avenue, near Manhattan avenue.  
2. Humboldt street, between Engert street and Meeker avenue;  
—and by the concurrent vote of all the members of the Board, approve the institution of condemnation proceedings, by the Corporation Counsel, to acquire title to the same.

I would also recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of \$9,500 of the amount appropriated by the Board of Education, as sufficient to pay the awards, costs, charges and expenses and expert witnesses' fees in the proceedings to acquire title to the two sites above recited and hereinbefore described.

IN BOARD OF BUILDINGS, MARCH 6, 1901.

The minutes of the meeting of February 27, 1901, were read and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were submitted for approval, as follows:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:  
 GENTLEMEN—Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in

the year 1899, the said stock is exempted, for the debt-restrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage would be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.

Whereas, Six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), matures July 1, 1901, and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897;

Whereas, the Comptroller proposes, under the authority of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, to extend for periods not exceeding twenty years the maturity of as much of said stock as he may be able to so extend upon terms advantageous to the City; therefore

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to pay out of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), such portion of the six per cent. Gold Consolidated Stock of the County of New York, payable July 1, 1901, as he may be unable to extend upon terms deemed by him to be advantageous to the City.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

For the reasons set forth in the foregoing report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller of The City of New York will avail himself of the provisions of chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, which reads as follows:

**CHAPTER 630.**  
 AN ACT to authorize the extension of the funded indebtedness of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond.

**ACCEPTED BY THE CITY.**  
 Became a law April 23, 1900, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, a majority being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

**Sec. 2.** This act shall take effect immediately.
