### MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

CITY OF NEW YORK, November 13, 1902.

At a meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of The City of New York, held November 12, 1902, it was

Resolved, That the Municipal Civil Service Rules of The City of New York be amended by striking therefrom the present Rule 40, and substituting therefor the following:

#### RULE 40.

##### Transfer.

Any person who has been permanently appointed to a position in the competitive class may be transferred, without examination, to a position in the same grade of such class in any other municipal department or office; provided that for original entrance to the position proposed to be filled by transfer there is not required by these rules in the opinion of the Municipal Commission an examination involving tests or qualifications essentially different from or higher than those required in the examination for original entrance to the position with which transfer is sought; or provided he shall have passed the examination or obtained a place upon the eligible list in force for the position to be filled by transfer; and provided that if such person entered the service without competitive examination and prior to the requirement thereof in the case of the position held by him, he has served with fidelity for at least three years in such position or in a similar position.

The Municipal Commission may authorize a transfer from a position in one class to a position in another class, or from a position in any grade in the competitive class to a different grade in that class, subject to the foregoing provisions, and provided also that the person to be transferred has served for at least one year in the position from which transfer is sought. A person who, by promotion or transfer from a competitive position, is holding a position in another class or in another grade, and has served continuously therein from the date of said promotion or transfer, may be retransferred, without the application of the foregoing restrictions, to the position which he originally held, or to any position to which transfer could be made therefrom.

Upon the written request of an appointing power, stating the facts with reference to any proposed transfer, accompanied by the consent, also in writing, of the appointing power of the department from which the transfer is to be made, the Commission will, if such transfer be in accordance with the law and the provisions of this rule, and not inconsistent with the rules governing promotion, issue its certificate to that effect; but no transfer herein authorized shall be made or recognized until after the issuance of such certificate.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with indication to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with or collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
