Superintendent's Report.

Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, re-

ported as follows:
Doctor Walker of the First Surgical Division requests tables and apparatus for the operating rooms in Wards 7 and 9, the cost of which would be about \$177. The article on the list most urgently needed is an instrument sterilizer.

In connection with this matter of expense your attention is called to the increased cost of coal for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the quarter ending March 31, 1903, as well as the estimated increase for the remaining nine months of the year. 1902. The total amount for the year, however, will probably be higher, inasmuch as there has been an increase of over two hundred dollars a month since the first of January. Putting it in another way, the drug and liquor bills for the first eleven months of 1902 did not go over \$528 in any one month, but when it came to December we found the bill had increased to \$758. For January the amount was \$608.91; for February, \$724.84; and for March, \$855.42. If the cost of the surgical instruments were added to these figures the bills would exfurnished by the Drug Department were added to these figures the bills would exceed \$900 a month. The number of cases treated at the dispensary is constantly

ceed \$900 a month. The number of cases treated at the dispensary is constantly increasing, and the patients are supplied not only with quarters, nursing and assistants, but also with drugs and dressings. Each case is given a piece of gauze, and, with the vast number, the aggregate of this amounts to a considerable sum. The report of the Consulting Chemist on the drug stores of the various hospitals has received attention. But two recommendations were made, viz., the equipment of the Harlem Hospital with new shop bottles, and the employment of an additional Apothecary at Gouverneur Hospital. The new equipment for Harlem has been provided, and one of the Apothecaries who was formerly employed in the Bellevue Dispensary has been temporarily assigned to Gouverneur Hospital.

Repairs—Owing to the strike among the carpenters, the remodeling of the old college building is not progressing favorably.

The United Electric Light and Power Company has turned on the current from the old feeders to the new ones throughout the building.

The New York Telephone Company has completed the installation of the interior system.

rior system.

The American Laundry Machinery Company is now installing the machinery, and, with one or two exceptions, the work is progressing satisfactorily.

Owing to the strike among the carpenters the contractors are unable to proceed with the work of putting in girders in the basement, first, second and third floors, which were very weak and which the Department of Buildings condemned.

Gouverneur Hospital—A letter from Doctor Erdman, Chairman of the Committee of Inspection of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital, concerning dis-
