That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the stable yard be cleaned and disinfected and all manure and refuse removed therefrom; that hereafter all manure be kept inside the stable, and removed from the premises daily, unless pressed in bales, barrels or boxes so as to reduce it to not more than one-third the original bulk; that the wooden floors of horse stalls and stable and the saturated earth beneath same be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected, and the floors of the stalls be cemented and so graded as to discharge all liquids into a water-tight, properly-trapped, sewer-connected valley drain; that each stall be provided with a movable rack.

Whereas, The premises Hempstead road, near Maiden lane, Maspeth, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the report of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating

thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the keeping of cows thereat without a permit be discontinued forthwith; that the floor of cow stable be repaired and made water-tight, and proper drains to carry all liquids to the cesspools be provided; that the cesspools be disinfected, emptied and cleaned by a licensed scavenger, and all the offensive liquid and other matter on ground be removed; that the walls and ceilings of stable and milk-house be whitewashed; that the milk-house be repaired so as to be dust proof, and the cooling tub therein be cleaned and the cooling of milk be done in fresh, clean water; that the manure boxes be repaired and tight covers provided therefor; that additional openings be made in the stable to provide sufficient ventilation for cows.

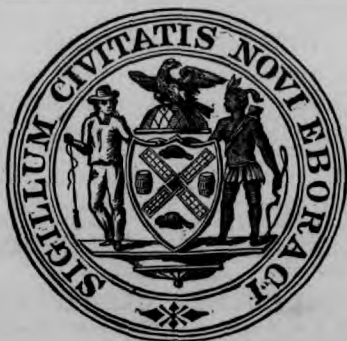

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety, or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
