Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding five hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$550,000), to provide means for improving, permanently bettering and equipping public school buildings in The City of New York, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding five hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$550,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York City, December 23, 1904.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Friday, December 23, 1904, at 4 p. m. All the Commissioners were present.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of Civil Service Rules VII. and IX. The Commission was addressed by George McAneny, Esq., George R. Bishop, Esq., Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., and Albert De Roode, Esq., representing the Civil Service Reform Association, in favor of the amendment of the rules, and John F. Dooling, Esq., appeared in opposition to the same. The hearing then closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, it was

Resolved, That clauses 4 and 5 of Civil Service Rule IX. be and the same are hereby amended by substituting therefor the following:

"4. The Secretary, as early as practicable after the completion of an examination, shall notify each candidate therein of the rating he has received and, if such rating be above the required minimum, of his comparative standing. He shall likewise notify any candidate who, though admitted to the examination, has been rejected for reasons other than failure to receive the required minimum, stating such reasons specifically. Any candidate receiving any such notice may personally inspect his examination papers at any time, during the office hours of the Commission, and in the presence of such officer or employee as the Commission from time to time may designate.

"5. No examination paper or any part thereof, and no record of the results of a physical test, or any other record or statement rated as part of an examination, or in connection therewith, shall be subject to review, alteration or rerating, after the marks of the Examiners have been registered or attested as required hereunder; except that the Commission, at any time within a year from the date of the certification of an examination, may correct any manifest error or mistake of marking or rating appearing in any such paper or record, the nature of which shall be set forth in its minutes; such correction, in any case, to be without prejudice to the status of any person previously appointed as a result of such examination."

And further

Resolved, That Clause 11 of Civil Service Rule VII. be and the same is hereby amended by substituting therefor the following:

"11. No candidate shall be granted a second or special examination or any second or special trial or test, either written or physical, preliminary to or in connection with any examination held hereunder, unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the Commission that his failure to appear for, or to gain admission to, or to complete such examination or test, was due to a manifest error or mistake for which the Commission is responsible, the nature of which shall be set forth in its minutes, or that such failure was due to compulsory attendance before any court or other public authority having the power to compel such attendance."

Upon a statement made by Charles T. Terry, Esq., Counsel for David H. Ray, Esq., and the presentation to the Commission of a certificate from D. B. Spence, M. D., certifying to the illness of Mr. Ray, the hearing in the matter of the charges preferred against David H. Ray, Examiner, was adjourned for one week, and the Secretary was instructed to notify Mr. Ray to appear on Friday afternoon, the 30th inst., at 4 o'clock.

A letter was presented from Adolph Goessel, Esq., requesting that his name be restored to the eligible list for Temporary Clerk. Mr. Goessel stated that his name appeared on the lists for Temporary Clerk and for Senior Clerk; that he had been temporarily appointed in the Board of Elections from the latter list, but supposed it was from the former; that for that reason, when he was certified from the Temporary Clerk's list he supposed he was already serving in such capacity and did not respond to the notice sent him and his name was therefore dropped from the list. After considering the facts in the case, the Secretary was instructed to restore Mr. Goessel's name to the list for Temporary Clerk.

A letter was presented from Louis D. Koop, Esq., requesting that his application for the position of Chairman and Rodman be accepted. It appearing that the application was not presented until December 19, while the receipt of application for that position had closed on the 14th, the request was denied.

The Commission then adjourned for the day.

The following permits were granted:

November 18. D. Grieme Coal Company—

To lay sewer connection at the foot of Forty-eighth street, North river, in so far as the area is under the jurisdiction of this Department, no pavement to be disturbed under this permit.

November 18. Consolidated Gas Company—

To open the granite pavement at the foot of West One Hundred and Thirtieth street, North river, for the purpose of extending gas service thereat, pavement to be relaid by this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

November 18. Bush Company, Limited—

To reconstruct its Pier, No. 7, and freight shed thereon, between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with plans filed for the original structure.

November 18. Michael F. Burns—

To erect shelter for scales maintained at the foot of One Hundred and Thirty-third street, North river, during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

November 18. Burns Brothers—

To erect an extension to the inshore end of the existing coal pocket between Thirty-first and Thirty-second streets, East river, in accordance with plans submitted as amended, it being understood, as per communication filed by the applicants, that the permit is to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner and that the structure will be removed whenever so ordered.

November 19. A. G. Foster—

To open granite pavement at the foot of Twenty-second street, East river, for the purpose of repairing Croton water pipe thereat, the pavement to be relaid by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of the applicant.

November 21. William McGrory—

To deposit filling to grade, easterly of First avenue and high-water mark, between One Hundred and Twenty-fifth and One Hundred and Twenty-sixth streets, Harlem river.

November 21. McAllister Bros.—

To locate an old abandoned barge at the southwesterly corner of Riker's Island, between the established bulkhead line and the line of mean high water, the exact location to be designated by the Engineer-in-Chief.

November 21. Willard Hawes & Co.—

To dredge in the slip on the southerly side of the Pier at the foot of Eighth street, East river.

November 21. James Shewan & Sons—

To maintain temporarily a derrick on the bulkhead between Stanton and Rivington streets, East river, the derrick to be so placed as not to interfere with access to the bulkhead, and rental to be paid therefor at the rate of \$20 per month, payable monthly in advance to the Cashier, the privilege to continue until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked.

On November 21 a rental of \$300 per annum was fixed for the suction pipe maintained by Peter Doelger at the foot of Fifty-fifth street, East river, commencing from November 1, 1904, such rental to be payable quarterly in advance to the Cashier, the Auditor reporting that the pipe was placed and maintained thereat without permit from this Department; the privilege of maintaining the pipe to continue until April 30, 1905, unless sooner revoked.

On November 22, after due advertisement that bids would be received for obtaining about 3,000 cubic yards of sand under Contract No. 883, but one bid was received, namely, from Murray & Co., at 75 cents per cubic yard. The contract was awarded to the said bidders November 22, subject to the approval of Henry Schnier and John Kroog as sureties by the Comptroller.

On November 21 an extension of time was granted Cunningham & Kearns Contracting Company to and including November 23, 1904, within which to complete the work of paving between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river, under Class II. of Contract No. 866.


