Sir—I beg to submit herewith report showing the condition of the water supply in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond, for the quarter ending March 31, 1906; the expenditures provided for under the Tax Levy Budget, as well as under the appropriations made by Bond issues, and balances remaining on April 1, 1906.

The plan outlined in the first quarterly report made last year by the present Chief Engineer, of recording the work done sufficiently in detail to show its progress and the cost thereof, so as to determine the expenditures incurred in every case, and afford a basis of comparison, has been adhered to, and the tables of consumption, waste, storage, etc., are complete and accurately given. *Fifteen million gallons daily, equal to 457 million gallons of the flow of the old aqueduct, was used to fill up the west basin of Jerome Park reservoir.

The Borough of The Bronx consumes all the supply from the Bronx and Byram and also about 18,000,000 to 20,000,000 gallons daily of Croton water delivered through the old aqueduct.

The flow over the old Croton dam and that from the watershed included between the new and old Croton dams, filled the new reservoir up to elevation 148.95, which gives 1,635,000,000 gallons on storage above the invert of the new aqueduct and 6,123,000,000 gallons unavailable below the invert of the aqueduct.

During March the west basin of the Jerome Park Reservoir was filled from the old aqueduct up to elevation 127.45, equal to about 650,000,000 gallons of water, on March 31.

Water wasted over Kensico dam for twenty-nine days during the quarter, amounting to 577,000,000 gallons.

On March 3 the six gates at the Armonk tunnel were closed and the run-off of the Byram and Wampus rivers allowed to waste off the watershed.

The above calculations have been made according to the curves hitherto plotted. I intend shortly to take additional gaugings to verify these curves.

The regular maintenance and repairs in and around the Croton watershed along the lines of the old and new aqueducts, the Bronx river pipe lines and the distributing reservoirs have been continued as usual during the quarter.

The character of the work in the watersheds has been as follows: Building post and wire fences; building and repairing stone wall fences; collecting the samples of water from the storage reservoirs, lakes and streams, for the laboratory at Mt. Kisco.

Titicus and Muscoot (Amawalk) Reservoirs.

The necessary maintenance work, such as care of the gate houses; keeping the culverts along the highways open; cutting brush and burning same; cleaning screens,

collecting samples of water for the laboratory at Mt. Kisco. The sanitary patrol has been maintained, and the engineering corps has made satisfactory progress on the surveys in the watershed.

All meteorological data has been attended to and nuisances promptly reported.

Repairing of rail and post fences along the highway at Muscoot and Titicus reservoirs is under way.

East Branch Reservoir.

Cleaning gate houses, gates and stop-cocks, cleaning shores of brush and weeds of East Branch and Bog Brook reservoirs.

Cleaning gutters in front of city property in Brewster Village, opening and closing gates and collecting water samples.

West Branch Reservoir.

Cutting trees and brush in the Whang Valley at the north end of West Branch reservoir; cleaning gates and gate houses; patrolling streams and lakes from the West Branch Croton to the Westchester County Line, and collecting samples of water.

The work of building stone wall fences in the Village of Lake Mahopac, under contract with Twiname & Palmer, is still unfinished.

Boyd's and Middle Branch Reservoirs.

Patrolling streams that empty into the reservoirs and cutting brush, etc.

Electrozone Plant at Brewsters, N. Y.

This plant has been in constant operation during the quarter.

Contracts.

Contract for fencing Cranberry pond and outlet. Work suspended last fall has now been resumed and is being pushed vigorously and will be finished shortly.

Bronx River Pipe Line.

The work along the Bronx river pipe line has been as follows: Cleaning and clearing Rye reservoir of stumps, brush and bogs; riprapping the east side of Kensico reservoir from Cranberry Brook north to Ravines Brook; cleaning Bear Gutter Channel and clearing along the banks of the same from Blake's Corners to Schoolhouse; cleaning channels and culverts of ice and snow and patrolling reservoirs. The work along the aqueducts and around the reservoirs has been as follows: The care of Croton Dam, gate houses and machinery; cleaning shores of lake; painting iron work on the outside of new gate house; filling and grading; building, repairing and painting fences; cutting telephone poles, hauling and trimming same; setting telephone poles and cross-arms; laying tile pipe sewer.

During the quarter a considerable amount of work has been done in the old aqueduct between High Bridge and the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gate house. This section is now in very good condition. The line of aqueduct has been cleared of brush and weed, ice and snow. Culverts, gutters and crosswalks have been cleaned, and pipe lines and reservoirs patrolled.

In addition to this work hydrants and dead ends of mains have been blown off to improve the quality of the water, and all gates and hydrants in exposed locations, especially in the Borough of The Bronx, have been properly protected by covering. In all cases where the service pipes supplying premises have been found defective, the tap supplying the service has been shut off at the main and owner notified to repair.

In case of abandoned tap or service pipes, the owner has been sent bill to cover cost of shutting off the abandoned tap.

On the evening of January 5, 1906, a contractor named James Pilkington (who was tunneling through Fifth avenue, between Thirty-third and Thirty-fifth streets, under permit issued to Marc Eidlitz for the purpose of constructing a sewer to drain the new Altman Building in Fifth avenue, between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-fifth

streets), set off a blast which seriously injured one of our large water mains in Fifth avenue at that point. This injury, which seemed at first to be a slight one, developed into a very serious leak, and gangs of men from this Department, being hastily called to the scene, found it necessary to shut off a large main which was fractured.

As we have two 48-inch, two 36-inch, one 20-inch and one 12-inch main in Fifth avenue, there was serious difficulty encountered in determining which one of the mains was broken, and the only way to do this was to shut off each line in succession. When this was done, it was found that the easterly 36-inch main had been broken. Immediate steps were then taken for the purpose of repairing this main, and when it was uncovered, we discovered that the length of pipe just south of the south crosswalk of Thirty-fourth street had been split nearly the entire length. Further investigation showed that the tunnel excavated by Mr. Pilkington, instead of having been constructed upon the lines called for by his permit, had been allowed to swing over to the west, nearly to the center of Fifth avenue, so that the blast which was set off that afternoon occurred directly under the 36-inch pipe which was broken. A gang of men was placed on the work of repairing this 36-inch main, and the work was continued without ceasing night and day until the main was repaired and the water turned on.

On the afternoon of February 17, 1906, an extraordinary blast was set off by a cellar excavator named Antonio Pucci, in Convent avenue, east side, in the vicinity of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street. The blast was so heavy that it threw into Convent avenue large quantities of rock and stone, which broke through the paving and fractured two of our 48-inch water mains at that point. This was particularly unjustifiable inasmuch as letters had been sent to Pucci and to others blasting in the vicinity, warning them of the close proximity of our water mains and of the danger thereto incident to their blasting.

Water was promptly shut down at the One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street gate house by our men stationed in that location for such an emergency, but notwithstanding our promptness a great deal of property in the vicinity was flooded and damaged. Careful investigations were made to find out which of the eight lines had been damaged by the blasts, and those which were found to be unhurt were immediately again put into service.

Measures were taken at once to repair the damage done, and the employees of the Department and contractors worked day and night to hasten its completion, which was soon effected and the water turned on again in the main.

DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1906.

For the past three months very little trouble has been experienced in keeping the system in proper working order, for the reason that a more perfect understanding between the various other departments and ours has been secured. At this time, with the present working force at our disposal, the system is in fair order, but can be improved by securing the services of four additional Laborers to perform work in the Third Ward; two of these Laborers to be stationed as Watchmen in charge of the Corporation Yard, one on duty in the daytime and the other on night duty. This, with the installation of a telephone at this point, will enable the department to better guard the system generally. At the present time telephone communication in this vicinity is secured only at the house of the Supervisor of Mains, and when he is out on duty we find it difficult to reach him when needed. The remaining two Laborers suggested will be needed on the work generally, and especially in cleansing the ponds, before the formation of vegetable growth commences.

Another matter is the appointment of at least four Inspectors to supervise and report on the work and condition of the various private water companies operating in this Borough. Owing to the laying of the 20-inch main in the Third Ward, and the 12-inch mains in the First Ward, an improved service has been obtained, especially in the First Ward, adjacent to factories and ferry houses, etc. In view of the fact that additional supply may be obtained in the vicinity of the Flushing Pumping Station, I would recommend that the laying of a 20-inch supply main from Bayside Pumping Station to connect with the present 20-inch main at Cemetery lane and Broadway, thus providing for an additional supply from this station. I would also recommend that a 12-inch main be laid in Broadway from or near Pine street, Douglaston (at a point where the present 12-inch main ends), to the City line; this will supplement the present 6-inch main now existing, and will be 3,110 feet in length. The laying of this main will provide better service to the villages of Douglaston and Little Neck, which neighborhood is rapidly building up.

Plans are now being prepared for water main extensions for domestic service and descriptions of extensions and cost of same are being compiled. These will be forwarded as soon as completed.

Gaugings taken in the Ridgewood Heights section of Newtown, show that there has been a slight increase in pressure, varying from 5 to 8 pounds increase. Much improvement in this section will not be secured until larger mains are provided to furnish the supply needed.

The work under contract in the First and Third Wards with D'Ambra & Tuccillo is progressing as rapidly as the weather will permit. The work under contract with Messrs. Norton & Dalton, begun July, 1905, is, except for resurfacing the roadways in the Third Ward, and a few minor details, practically completed, water having been turned on the final section of this work March 22, 1906.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Field work was done in the matter of taking levels on roads, in connection with the proposed introduction of water from the State of New Jersey. All notes were plotted.

In looking up the owners of land where the proposed pipe line will pass, I had to contend with the fact that Mr. Brown, who owns the plot at the entrance of the strip required, is in Cuba and is not expected home for some time. I have seen the other owners and am conducting negotiations with them.

The numerous recommendations for new hydrants received from time to time from the Fire Department, cannot be acted upon until a new fund is created for hydrant rentals.

The maps showing all mains and hydrants in the Borough of Richmond, which were asked for by the Fire Department, have been started, and one copy will be made for the Richmond office.

MECHANICAL DIVISION.

Report for the Quarter Ending March 31, 1906.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

Ninety-eighth Street Pumping Station.

Pumping Engine No. 1—The engine has been repacked, the discharge pipe has been scraped and painted and the lagging has been oiled.

Pumping Engine No. 2—The engine has been repacked, and discharge pipe has been scraped and painted, and the lagging has been oiled.

Pumping Engine No. 3—The extensive repairs on this engine, which were begun in January, 1905, were brought to a close during the quarter, and the engine was started up. It was found necessary to spend considerable time in adjusting and balancing the engine, and this was done upon the day watch only, so that it would be entirely under the supervision of the Engineman in charge. All leaks in the jacket piping were corrected, the lubricator to the air compressor was connected up, joints in low pressure cylinder heads were made up, and the accumulator stuffing boxes were repacked. Crossheads were drilled and tapped for oil cups. The lubricator and oil pump were overhauled. Keys of the valve spindles were driven home and cut off.

Trouble was experienced with the metallic packing from the date of its installation in the engine, and after the engine was put under steam it was found to leak badly and endeavors were made to correct this by shutting down the engine and refitting the packing. On putting the engine again under steam it was found that but very little improvement was made and the makers of the packing were notified and given an opportunity to make this packing satisfactory. To date, this had not been done. In the meantime, the engine was covered, lagged with canvas and painted. This required that the engine should be idle, although at all times it was possible to throw it into regular service if same were necessary.

Boilers Nos. 1 and 2—On these boilers the main stop valves were repaired, gauge glasses and manhole and handhole gaskets were renewed, the boiler fronts and Russia iron lagging were oiled and the breechings and flue were painted.

Boilers Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8—On these boilers the outer walls of the settings of the back connections were repaired and the brickwork in the furnaces was renewed. Repairs were made to the grates and firing tools, and the blowoff pipes and valves, pipes and valves in the feed lines, and gauge glasses were renewed. The stop valves were repacked.

The tunnel leading from the coal house to the boiler house was whitewashed.

A new bulkhead was built in the coal house and the coal house windows were boarded up to enable the storing of the amount of coal contracted for.

The oil vault was cleaned up and whitewashed.

The large coal scales were repaired.

The steam piping to the oil pump was renewed. Renewal was also made of the ash hoisting tackle in the coal house.

The main steam lines in boiler rooms were cleaned, as well as the tops of boiler settings.

Feed pumps were repacked and gauges tested.

Boilers were regularly taken out and cleaned during the quarter.

One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station.

Pumping Engine No. 1—The plunger rod boxes were repacked, jacket piping repaired and the governor belt was renewed.

Pumping Engine No. 2—This engine was started up for a trial on January 20, after being put in repair, and in order to determine the necessary adjustments and shortcomings that are impossible to foresee. A great delay was occasioned on account of the slow progress made on the wooden lagging on this engine, but on March 20 it was put in regular service.

This engine was regularly put into service on February 7 and run until February 15, when the arm on the low pressure exhaust valve broke on account of the valve stem cutting in stuffing box. This was immediately repaired and the engine since then has been regularly in service.

Pumping Engine No. 3—High, intermediate and low pressure piston rod boxes were packed.

Pumping Engine No. 4—High, intermediate and low pressure valve stem stuffing boxes, jacket piping, jacket pipe valves and plunger rod boxes were repacked. New studs, springs and valves were replaced where necessary and drain pipes renewed.

Pumping Engine No. 5—Jacket piping was repaired.

Pumping Engine No. 6—Accumulator repacked. New studs, springs and valves were placed in water ends, where necessary. Twenty-four valve stem boxes, four compensating cylinder boxes, and low pressure piston rod boxes were repacked.

Boilers Nos. 1 and 2—Rivets cut out and redriven in shell and dome. Furnace arch blocks and cheek rebuilt. Main and auxiliary stop valves repacked.

Boilers Nos. 3 and 4—Rivets cut out where defective, tubes expanded. Back wall and bridge walls of No. 3 boiler were rebuilt, and parts of grates renewed. Bonnets of blow-off valves, feed pipe and water column nipples were renewed. Bolts in boiler fronts were renewed.

Boilers Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8—Combustion chambers and back connections cleaned and clinkers cut out of side walls. Bridge walls and back walls were rebuilt and grates and steam lines repaired. Blow-off pipes and valves were renewed.

Boilers Nos. 9, 10 and 11—Combustion chambers and back connections, uptakes and flues were cleaned. Bridge walls and back walls were rebuilt, main stop valves and water columns repacked and injectors were connected. Automatic damper regulators were repaired and connected to tower service.

During the quarter the boilers have been regularly cut out and thoroughly cleaned, except at times when others were undergoing repairs or it was found necessary to hoist coal.

Coal Conveyor—Steam line to coal conveyor engine at head and dock was repaired. In order to store coal, on account of the threatened coal strike, it was necessary to put it in the north court and west of boiler house.

BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Jerome Park Pumping Station.

Boilers were regularly cut out and cleaned.

Nothing of importance occurred to machinery.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Tottenville Pumping Station.

Boilers—Safety valves were replaced on boilers Nos. 1 and 2. Bridge wall was rebuilt in furnace of B. & W. boiler. Boilers were regularly cut out and cleaned during the quarter.

Wells—New strainer and sucker rod replaced on well No. 3. The valve in No. 6 well dropped off and was fished out and replaced.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

First Ward—Pumping Station No. 1.

Engines Nos. 1 and 2—Cylinders of engines Nos. 1 and 2 were lagged with a covering of 85 per cent. magnesia. Valve rods for engine No. 2 were in stock and were put in place. All necessary changes in drip, lubricator and indicator connections were completed on these engines. Suction piping from condensers was lowered under the floor. The feed pump and piping were overhauled.

Boilers—The boilers were regularly cut out and cleaned, as well as the feed water heater and purifier.

Pumping Station No. 3.

Necessary repairs were made on engine No. 2 and its vacuum and air pumps.
The water pipe line, 1½ inches in diameter, was run from engine No. 1 to front of boiler room for the tube cleaner.
Feed pump repaired and all gauges tested and corrected.

Third Ward—Flushing Pumping Station.

Crank pin on high pressure side of engine No. 2 ran hot and as a result the box was cut. This was duly repaired and the engine put in service.
The steam piping of boiler and feed pumps were repaired.
A 12-inch line of pipe set on brick piers from the gravity line of the well system to the intake.

Bayside Pumping Station.

The hard wood ordered last quarter was received, and is now being placed in the windows and walls.
The Holly engine has been painted and varnished.
Bridge walls in both boilers have been reset.
The engine room floor has been shellacked and varnished.
Walls of the dwelling house have been plastered and finished.

Third Ward—Whitestone Pumping Station.

Vacuum and air pumps were repaired, as well as the blow-off piping valves.
The boilers of this station were regularly cut out and cleaned, necessary small repairs being made as they were needed.
The lumber ordered to close up doors and windows for abandoned pumping station No. 2 has been received and put in place.
The paint supplies and the Rex fire extinguishers which were ordered have also been received.

High Pressure Fire Service.

Under the contract for furnishing and laying the high pressure fire mains with the Continental Asphalt Paving Company, the pipes and specials are being cast at the foundries, and the contractors expect to begin the work of laying towards the latter part of April or beginning of May.

The Allis-Chalmers Company have submitted, in accordance with the terms of their contract, the general plans of motors and pumps, which have been approved, and work of construction at the shops is progressing.

Filtration.

On February 28 the Mayor referred to you a communication addressed to him on February 26 by the Aqueduct Commissioners, requesting to be advised as to whether:

(1) The suspension of work on the easterly division of the Jerome Park Reservoir shall continue indefinitely under the resolution above recited, pending the ultimate determination of the filtration problem; or

(2) Whether, in the absence of an immediate plan of filtration, the Aqueduct Commissioners shall direct that the work be resumed on the easterly basin and hastened to completion, —and, after consultation with his Honor, the Mayor, and the decision by the latter that this Department would take charge of the necessary plans for filtering the Croton supply, a communication was addressed by you on March 6 to the President of the Aqueduct Commissioners advising them of that fact, and adding that the work on the easterly division of the Jerome Park Reservoir by the Aqueduct Board should be suspended. On March 28 I reported to you as follows:

"Immediately on receipt, a few days ago, of your verbal directions to make arrangements for the preparation of plans and specifications for filtering the water supply from the Croton Watershed, I took steps to ascertain what had been done in the matter.

"I find on page 270 of the Report of the Commission on Additional Water Supply, known as the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission, dated November 30, 1903, the following report on this subject, which I quote in full:

"Filtering water from the Croton Watershed.

"In the course of an investigation for filter sites for a low level supply—that is, for delivering water at the height of Jerome Park Reservoir—examinations were made in detail of all available sites for sand filter plants below the present Croton shed, and it was found that there were only two sites available; these sites are situated respectively at Gould's Meadows, about two miles southeast of Tarrytown, and at Elmsford, about three miles southeast from Tarrytown.

"By raising the hydraulic grade line of the New Croton Aqueduct from the Croton Reservoir to this point, thereby running the aqueduct under a 20-foot head, it will be possible to utilize Gould's Meadows as a site for a filter plant of a capacity of 250,000,000 gallons per day, on a basis of a rate of filtration of 3,000,000 gallons per day per acre of sand surface. The water would pass through the filters by gravity, and would then return into the lower portion of the aqueduct. By this proposition, the lower 20 feet of the storage of the new Croton Reservoir could not be utilized without pumping; this, however, would still give a gravity yield of 242,000,000 gallons per day in an extreme dry year, and it would be only a small matter to install temporary pumps to obtain the balance if required.

"The cost of installing a 250,000,000-gallon plant at Gould's Meadows would be about \$8,500,000, and the total cost of operation, including interest, Sinking Fund and extraordinary repairs and depreciation, would not exceed \$766,000 per year.

"The Elmsford site is similarly situated to that of Gould's Meadows. The water would have to be backed up in the present new Croton Aqueduct about 40 feet in order to flow by gravity to filters on this site, and would then return to the aqueduct below the filters. It would also be necessary at this site to turn the Sawmill river from its present course into a tunnel discharging into the Hudson river near Tarrytown.

"At the Elmsford site a plant having a capacity of 500,000,000 gallons per day on a basis of 3,000,000 gallons per acre per day can be installed.

"To build a plant of 500,000,000 gallons daily capacity would cost about \$15,000,000, and the operating expenses, including interest, Sinking Fund and extraordinary repairs and depreciation, would be about \$1,500,000 per year.

"I have also learned that there are some topographical maps of the sites mentioned in that report, which were among papers filed in this office, which, at their request, I sent some months ago to the Board of Water Supply, and which I have asked to have returned to me for examination. I shall carefully go over the work done by the Burr-Hering-Freeman Commission and report on the plans presented by them later on.

"In their report above quoted, the Commission states that a detailed examination was made of all the available sites below the present Croton shed; that only the two they mentioned were available, and they also discussed some of the difficulties of installation in each case. In the one at Gould's Meadows provision is only made for a 250,000,000-gallon plant, which would be inadequate. In the Elmsford site they consider that a capacity of 500,000,000 gallons daily could be secured, which would be more than ample to filter the maximum safe supply to be expected from the Croton Watershed after it is fully developed.

"In both cases, however, the backing up of the conduit is necessary, i. e., at Elmsford, not less than 40 feet, thus presenting, therefore, the alternative of either losing all the storage water below the level thus raised at the reservoir, or installing a pumping plant, with the attendant first cost and the expenses of maintenance and operation.

"I believe, however, that it may be practicable to build the proposed filter beds above the eastern division, not yet built, of the Jerome Park Reservoir, using the roof of the latter, when covered, as the bed of the filters, in which case, in addition to other advantages, a very large saving in cost (including that of the extensive tract of land otherwise required) would be effected, tedious and expensive condemnation proceedings avoided, and the time required for the completion of the work materially shortened. The simplicity of this plan is obvious, but before making a more positive statement I need additional data, especially as to the conduit grades, reservoir levels, etc., which I am endeavoring to gather as speedily as possible.

"In order to proceed with this work expeditiously, we need an additional force, especially of expert men trained in this class of work. I beg, therefore, to recommend that an appropriation, say of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) be granted for the employment of this force and the other incidental expenses needed to complete the plans, form of contracts and specifications. With an adequate force, and especially if it be found practicable to construct the filter beds at the Jerome Park Reservoir, as above mentioned, it is probable that we shall be able to advertise all the main items of this work by the end of the present year."

The recommendation was made by you to the Board of Estimate to grant the appropriation of \$50,000 asked in that communication, and that application is now before the Board.

Force and Office Room.

It would be desirable to appoint, and I recommend the appointment of two Assistant Engineers experienced in the work of distribution and prevention of waste, to take charge of that branch of our work, which has hitherto been neglected, and to which I called particular attention in the annual report.

The office room allowed to this Bureau is inadequate, both as regards space and location. Our men are crowded both in the fifteenth floor and in the additional space occupied in the sixth floor by the division on high pressure fire service work, and the division of the force on two floors is inconvenient. With the increase of the work demanded by the investigations as to waste and remodeling of the distribution system, and particularly that of the filtration of the supply, considerable additional space will be required. The change might be initiated by moving the force now on the sixth floor to some other locality in the building, and arrangements made for location in the same

floor of the offices now occupied in the fifteenth. That the present quarters are restricted and that this subdivision of the force on various floors is strictly inconvenient scarcely needs any demonstration.

Hon. JOHN H. O'BRIEN, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith first quarterly report for the quarter ending March 31, 1906, of the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting, for each separate borough. This is the first time this report has been made up and submitted by the Chief Engineer of Light and Power to the Deputy Commissioners and then to you. The form of reporting is changed from that of previous years, and I think presents the matter in a more concrete form.

The report for each borough shows respectively the following:

First—The cost of lighting public street lamps (electric, gas and naphtha) by companies, with the number of lamps and the rate per year.

Second—The cost of lighting public buildings, showing same by departments and by companies, and giving separately the gas and electric lighting of these buildings; also the rate per kilowatt hour and the rate per thousand cubic feet of gas, charged for lighting public buildings.

Third—The cost of supplying electricity for power to public buildings by departments and by companies, with the rate charged for same.

Fourth—The Bureau expenses, being the cost of the general expenses of the office of the Bureau of Lamps and Lighting in the respective boroughs.

Fifth—The employees of the Bureau, with salaries and changes in same during the quarter.

Sixth—A summary showing the expense of these items and the respective appropriations for same, giving the balance left available of each appropriation at the end of the quarter.

Under all the different headings the cost is given by months and under the heading of the respective appropriations. The above form meets the increased requirements recently requested by the Finance Department, and this will be still further amplified during the year 1907.

I regret to state that these reports are very much delayed, on account, first, of the fact that the bills from the companies were not received for the first quarter of 1906, in many cases, until within the past six weeks; also on account of the changes and work necessary in devising the new system of the quarterly report, and further on account of the great demand on the time of the Chief Engineer of Light and Power made by other departments during the year, and the necessity of getting the lighting of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond changed and amplified before the winter set in. The second and third quarters will, however, follow very rapidly.

The important events of the quarter were about as follows: During the preceding year the Legislature had reduced and restricted prices that could be charged to the City for gas and electricity for lighting and so on, to a point that appeared reasonably fair to the City, and it was deemed advisable that revised specifications be drawn in order to advertise for contracts for lighting for the year 1906. This Department therefore took the matter up very carefully with the Corporation Counsel's office, and after many consultations the forms of proposals, contracts, bids and specifications used for the year 1906 were drawn up with the approval of the Corporation Counsel and submitted to the Mayor by the Commissioner of this Department. On receiving the Mayor's approval contracts were advertised for and bids were opened on February 1. The bids, after being opened, were submitted to the Chief Engineer of Light and Power, and a Board of Advisory Engineers of the Corporation Counsel's office, for analysis and consequent approval or rejection.

After careful consideration of same unanimous recommendations were made by the Advisory Board of Engineers and the Chief Engineer of Light and Power as to the various prices submitted, and in some cases a change of form of the contract accepting same.

Certain bids were rejected and revised bids obtained from the companies, all of which tended to save the City a considerable expenditure. Some bids were rejected in toto, and one bid is still held up for consideration.

On March 14, the Commissioner of this Department ordered the Chief Engineer of Light and Power to take charge of all five boroughs, he having previously acted only in Manhattan and The Bronx, and a revision of the lighting, necessary changes and improvements in same, as well as a reorganization of the office methods and office force in the various boroughs were taken up. Reports of progress made will be shown in the reports of the ensuing quarters of the year.

The Water Revenue Budget has not been prepared as yet, owing to the pressure of other work. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized, on January 19, 1906, \$500,000 to be set aside for the maintenance of the system. The Budget will unquestionably be large, owing to the increased work in the distribution system and also to the necessity of purchasing water under contract, and of establishing temporary stations. With the consolidation of stations and the extension of the system along broad lines, the expense of maintenance will be greatly reduced.

The item for salaries has been decidedly increased, owing to the number of temporary stations which it will be necessary to operate until the general scheme of consolidation of stations is accomplished, and also owing to the large amount of work which has had to be done by our men in connection with both the furnishing and distribution of the water supply.

The item for supplies is always low in the first quarter, as the charges for coal do not commence until the second quarter, the contracts expiring on April 30 and being charged to the appropriation for the previous year. The supplies purchased on requisition are also mainly paid for after the end of the quarter, although the requisitions are drawn during the first three months of the year.

The rainfall for the quarter has been somewhat above the average, and, owing to the mild winter, there has been very little loss by surface run-off, the greater part of the precipitation finding its way through the sands to the underground level and replenishing the springs.

General Condition of the Supply.

The mild weather of January and February reduced the winter consumption below what would be normally expected and enabled the Department to meet the demands of the consumers and to provide water somewhat in excess of the consumption, so that the total amount of water stored in the distribution reservoirs increased slightly during the quarter, while there was a steady increase in the water stored at Hempstead. Even with the mild winter, we were, for a portion of the time, unable to pump the amount required to meet the demands of the consumers, and had there been the normal severe weather in January and February, we would have been unable to pump sufficient water to keep up the level of our Ridgewood basins to the necessary height to insure reasonable reserve in case of an accident to any of our pumps. The increase in the supply from the temporary stations installed under the emergency appropriations has made it possible to provide for the needs of the Borough, but without those stations, instead of a net gain of about 500,000,000 gallons in stored water, we would have had a loss. These temporary stations gave us an additional supply of 1,161,962,000 gallons during the quarter, which was 2.3 times the amount gained in stored water.

The Board of Aldermen on December 19 authorized the expenditure of \$20,000 for emergency plants and \$20,000 for operating the same, and on December 26 passed a further appropriation of \$30,000 for constructing three temporary stations. A large portion of the work to be done under this authorization had been actually done when the authority was granted by the Board of Aldermen. The work of construction was actively carried on and a contract has been entered into with Mr. M. J. Dady to operate the six temporary stations along the line of the Massapequa Infiltration Gallery. The work on the emergency stations has not progressed as rapidly during the quarter as was originally expected, owing to unfavorable weather conditions. Had it been necessary to utilize the water we could, however, have pushed the completion of the stations, but it would have been at an increased cost, which was not warranted by the condition of the supply.

The work done under the emergency authorizations and in connection with the temporary increase of the supply was as follows:

- Installation of complete pumping plants and wells at Culverts D, L and N.
- Six new wells at the Gravesend station, connected to the Worthington pump.
- Four new tile wells at the Jameco station, connected with the Davidson pump.
- New wells at the Forest Stream and Clear Stream stations.
- New wells at the Matowa station.
- Five 18-inch tile wells at the temporary stations along the Massapequa infiltration gallery.
- Six temporary stations along the line of the Massapequa infiltration gallery.
- Removal of the Shetucket pumping plant and erection of the same at the Oconee station.

Temporary pumping plant purchased for the New Lots station, but not yet erected. The above work has, as already stated, materially increased the supply, and, in addition, we are beginning to obtain a supply from the deep wells at the Jameco station, which are being overhauled by Mr. S. W. Titus under a contract, the terms of which provide for payment to be made for the amount of water actually delivered by the contractor over and above that at present being obtained by the City.

The increased supply obtained from the Queens County Water Company has now been discontinued, the company having been ordered to reduce the amount delivered from and after April 1 to 3,000,000 gallons per day, as called for in their contract, we having received about 5,000,000 gallons per day since the first of the year from this company.

Frequent reference has been made in previous reports to the necessity of testing the validity of the so-called Burr Law, preventing the City from entering Suffolk County, and to test this law a pumping station was erected on land owned by the City just east of the Suffolk County line. The necessary boiler, pumps and five 6-inch wells were installed and a flume and pipe line built to connect this station with the Massapequa infiltration gallery station. About 1,000,000 gallons a day has been pumped from this station since it was started, on March 14, at 12.15 p. m., but so far no attempt has been made by the county officials to prevent the continued operation of the station. The operation of the station will not be necessary unless it be used as a means of testing the constitutionality of the Burr Law, and it will therefore probably be shut down in the near future.

It has not been necessary to draw on the Hempstead storage reservoir during the quarter, except for a very short period on January 1, 2 and 3, February 28 and March 1 and 2. We have had all the driven well stations, both on the new and old watershed, in operation for the greater part of the quarter, and the amount of water wasted was as follows:

A large portion of this waste on the old watershed was due to the shutting down of the Forest Stream filter beds to enable the placing of a drain pipe, which will be used in connection with the washing of the beds. This pipe has now been completed and the wash planks placed in the bed so that we can wash the surface instead of scraping it, as has been done heretofore. This should result in a decided reduction in the cost of operating the beds, with an increased efficiency.

As has been shown in past reports, the conduit capacity is unequal to carry the supply necessary for the borough, even without any margin at all for safety, and the Ridgewood station is not equipped so that an additional supply could be pumped were it available. Under these conditions, every effort has been made to complete the plans and specifications for a new conduit line, together with the necessary maps for the land. The first sheets of the map, showing the land necessary, were forwarded on January 12, and the remaining sheet, covering all the land required up to practically the Nassau County line, was forwarded on February 15. The maps were approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 9 and have been forwarded to the Corporation Counsel so that condemnation proceedings may be instituted. The plans and specifications for the 72-inch pipe line were entirely completed, ready for advertising, on February 21, but the Corporation Counsel refused to approve the advertising of the contract until both the money and the land were available. It was not the intention of the Department to advertise this contract before the money was available, and, owing to it being held necessary to resubmit to the Board of Aldermen the bond issue which was requested by this Department last April, and which was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 23, 1905, we were unable to get the money necessary for the pipe line until this issue was favorably acted upon by the Board of Aldermen on March 13, 1906. The resolution was signed by the Mayor on March 20 and provided for \$3,390,000 for the Borough of Brooklyn, the amount originally requested being \$5,090,000. Up to the present time the Corporation Counsel has refused to allow the contract to be advertised. This delay in advertising the contract for the steel pipe line may result in a shortage in the supply for which this Department cannot be held responsible, but, to avoid such a condition, every effort is being made to increase the pumping plant at the New Lots station so as to provide a temporary addition to the supply to make up somewhat for the deficiency in conduit capacity. If the land for the Canarsie station is obtained in time, it will probably be possible to complete the station sufficiently to utilize it before next winter by installing temporary pumps, and an additional supply will thus be obtained within the City limits and still further relieve the existing conduits. Studies are being made for another plant within the borough limits and negotiations are pending to furnish an additional supply from deep well sources within the borough limits.

The installation of temporary plants is an expensive one and one which could have been avoided had proper provision been made in the past for the needs of the Department as outlined by this Bureau.

At the Ridgewood station it is necessary to place a temporary boiler plant while the old Bigelow boilers are being removed, as it would be unsafe to attempt to operate this station without additional boilers under the present condition of the supply. A contract has been drawn and forwarded for the necessary temporary plant, which will be used during the time that the water tube boilers are being installed to take the place of the Bigelow boilers.

There has been practically no complaint of lack of pressure during the quarter, and the pressure during the day time has been equal to or above normal. During the late night and early morning hours the pressure has been somewhat reduced so as to avoid needless waste of water.

The utilization of a large percentage of naturally filtered water, obtained from the various driven well stations, has resulted in our being able to furnish an improved supply to the consumers, and on January 20 the Clear Stream Pond, which is located alongside of the Merrick road, the waters of which are liable to serious contamination, was abandoned. The water from this pond flows down past our Clear Stream station, a large proportion of the flow being absorbed by this station. The brook adjoining the station, which had been dry except in times of heavy rainfall, is now filled with water and, in spite of an increased pumping at this station, the water level has risen in the test wells near the brook.

Coal.

The coal situation has assumed such a serious aspect, and the danger of a strike, both in the anthracite and bituminous regions, has, according to press reports, become so imminent that every effort has been made to store sufficient coal to meet the demands of the stations for some time to come. At the Ridgewood Station we are very short of storage capacity and, owing to the necessity of reducing the amount of coal to be furnished under the contract in order not to exceed our budget, we will only have a small amount in store at Ridgewood upon the completion of our contracts on April 30. If a strike is declared, it will be necessary to buy coal in the open market and obtain the authorization of the Board of Aldermen to purchase the same without public letting. As preference is given to municipalities in distributing coal during a time of strike, there should be no serious difficulty in our obtaining a sufficient supply to keep all of our stations operated as might be required to meet the demands of the service.

DISTRIBUTION SYSTEM.

Extension.

The mildness of the winter made it possible to continue the extending of distribution mains, and Mr. Isaac Harris, who held the contract for this work, has laid the following mains:

During the quarter, petitions for fifty-six (56) streets and avenues were received and six (6) reported on unfavorably. The petitions which were reported on favorably covered the laying of the following pipe:

To meet the demand for additional mains, a contract was drawn and forwarded for laying about 98,000 feet of 20-inch, 16-inch, 12-inch, 8-inch and 6-inch pipe throughout the outlying sections, including the necessary gates, hydrants and other appliances, and contracts for the pipe, hydrants and gates to carry out this work, together with other work of extending and improving the distribution system, were prepared and forwarded. In order to prevent a shortage of water in the Bay Ridge, Fort Hamilton and Dyker Heights sections, a contract was prepared for laying large mains in Fort Hamilton avenue, Gravesend avenue, etc. This contract has just been advertised and bids are to be received on April 4. The contract called for the completion of the Fort Hamilton avenue main in fifty working days, and it is expected that the mains will be completed early in July, although there will unquestionably be some complaint from lack of pressure and quality of the water on account of our being unable to complete this main at an earlier date.

With the rapid growth of the borough, it will be very difficult for this Department to keep up with the demands for new mains, and ample appropriation should be made to cover this work, so that a contract can be made in advance of the demand and the mains laid by the time that the water is needed.

As our contract for extending the distribution mains did not provide sufficient 8-inch pipe to lay mains in all the streets where houses had been commenced, or where the water was urgently needed on account of the corroding and consequent failure of private services, it was necessary to lay quite a number of blocks under requisition. Our experience has shown that in general the work done under requisition has far exceeded the cost of contract work, and the plan was therefore adopted of drawing the requisition to cover the actual cost of the work plus 15 per cent. profit. The cost of work done in this way has compared very favorably with that done under contract and we were able to lay mains where they were absolutely required, and still the City did not pay any additional cost over and above that which would have been entailed had the mains been laid under contract.

Removing and Relaying of Mains.

No work was done on removing and relaying mains during the quarter, but the Contractor, Mr. T. O'Connor Sloane, has continued the casting of the pipe and special castings necessary for this work so that it can be actively prosecuted the next quarter. Another contract is being prepared covering about 33,000 feet of mains, mainly 16 inches in diameter, but, unfortunately, the lack of necessary appropriations makes it impossible to contract for additional work.

Maintenance of System.

In previous years very little attention has been paid by the Department to the protection from freezing of the fire hydrants, and, as already stated in the annual report, inspectors were placed on this work and continued until March 15, when, owing to their services being required on other work, it was necessary to discontinue the inspection. The results of the inspection this winter have shown the necessity of inspectors being placed on the work of inspecting the hydrants during the winter months, and it is expected in the future to systematically inspect all hydrants during the winter months. The five portable boilers purchased for thawing hydrants and using kerosene as fuel have proven very successful and are used both for thawing out the hydrants and for pumping them out after they are thawed. One of our large hydrants frozen solid can be thawed and pumped out in a very few minutes' time. Our having these boilers has prevented the necessity of utilizing fire engines for this purpose, and the work has been done more economically than could be done by the firemen. We have received efficient and cheerful co-operation from the Fire Department in our efforts to take care of the hydrants, and a monthly report has been forwarded by the Fire Department showing the repairs needed to the hydrants in the City. These repairs have been made by our men as soon as possible after the report was received.

The men employed in the various repair yards were unable to replace and repair all the hydrants and gates that were out of order and requisitions were therefore drawn covering the cutting out and replacing of both hydrants and gates, together with the placing of some additional hydrants. This work was satisfactorily completed and the fire service conditions in various sections improved.

There were two serious breaks during the quarter, the 48-inch main at the corner of Central avenue and Stockholm street splitting on Saturday morning, January 13. In spite of the storm and difficulty occasioned in operating gates, this main was shut down, the broken piece removed, a new piece and sleeve placed and water turned on by Sunday night, this work being done entirely by the men at the repair yards. There was no damage done by this break and no inconvenience caused by the reduction in pressure due to the shutting down of the main. On March 23 the 24-inch main which had been relaid from a point on Water street, just south of Pearl street, to the corner of Adams and Water streets, broke near the gate located on Water street, at the first bend required on account of the new Manhattan Bridge anchorage. This break occurred about 10 o'clock at night and all the gates in the vicinity, with the exception of the one on Water street at Pearl street, and on Water street at Adams street, were within the enclosure of the Kosmos Engineering Company, who are the contractors for the Manhattan Bridge anchorage. When the men from the Portland Avenue Repair Yard arrived on the ground, shortly after the break, it was impossible to locate the gates on account of the work on the anchorage obliterating street lines, and it was found that several of the gates were completely covered by ties, rails, switches, etc., while an electric rail added to the difficulties of the work. In some parts of the enclosure the water was approximately 20 feet deep, and it required from 10 o'clock p. m. until 5.30 a. m. before the water was entirely shut off, although the flow was greatly reduced about two hours earlier. Under the conditions, the men are entitled to praise for the way in which the shut-off was made, but the accident shows the necessity of all the Departments exercising care in carrying out their work so as not to cover up water gates and make them inaccessible in case of a break. Some damage was caused to property in the vicinity due to the flooding of cellars, but the bulk of the water found its way to the river without doing serious damage.

In addition to these two breaks, two breaks occurred on the 30-inch force main leading from the Mount Prospect Engine House to the Mount Prospect Reservoir, which were repaired by our men. This main splits frequently in the central part of a length without any apparent cause. The iron in the main, while somewhat brittle, shows a reasonable tensile strength, but the main, although working under low pressure, is continually giving trouble.

We have had in the past trouble in locating the gates in winter weather on account of snow, ice and mud covering the gate boxes and thus making it necessary to clean the surface of the street before the gate box could be found. While the present work of definitely locating these gate boxes and showing the location on the map will obviate, to a great extent, this difficulty, nevertheless our caulkers are frequently puzzled to correctly interpret a map. I therefore consider that to satisfactorily provide for quickly locating a gate during the winter it will be desirable to have them referenced to fixed points which can readily be found and measurements taken therefrom. These points could be marked on the corner of buildings, where convenient and the consent of the owners can be obtained, and where this system could not be used a plain post, set back of the curb line near the gate, could have stamped on it the distance from the curb to the gate and from the post to appoint on the curb opposite the gate. Where hydrants are located near a gate the distance could be stamped on the hydrant.

PUMPING STATIONS.

Mount Prospect.

The average amount of water pumped per day at the Mount Prospect Pumping Station was as follows:

The reservoir service increased somewhat from last year owing to the remodeling of the Davidson boilers, requiring the shutting down of one of the units of the David-

son engines, which are now pumping directly from Ridgewood into the Mount Prospect Reservoir system. This station has been using pea coal during the quarter in place of the egg coal previously used, and a decided economy has been shown by the use of the smaller size coal. Trouble has been experienced with the steam main leading to the reservoir engines, and it is expected to replace this line, bids having been asked under requisition for this work.

Gravesend and New Utrecht.

The New Utrecht Station has been run steadily and only minor repairs made, owing to its expected abandonment.

The work on the new building for the Gravesend Station has been prosecuted as the weather permitted, and the building is now approaching completion. The Snow Steam Pump Works, who are the contractors for the engine, have been granted an extension of sixty days, but the engine will unquestionably be in place before the boilers are ready. There has, unfortunately, been difficulty in starting the work on the boilers, owing to financial troubles of the United Heating Company, who have the contract for this work, and the time of starting the station will be determined by the date of completing the boilers. The castings for the wells have been ordered and are now being manufactured, and the wells will be put in by our own men. As already stated, six wells have been put in at this station as part of the emergency work. These wells consist of six iron bands attached to a 6-inch perforated pipe and covered with brass gauze, 20 feet in length, and surrounded by a cylinder of gravel 12 inches in diameter; a 6-inch casing is carried to the level of the suction main and a 6-inch connection made between the suction main and the well. The wells were put in by Mr. F. W. Miller at a total cost of \$3,150. A 12-inch suction main was laid by Mr. Frank Gallagher, under requisition, at a total cost of \$643.61, this suction main being connected to the suction leading to the Worthington pump. The wells were operated for a few days, but, owing to the settling of the wells and the consequent cracking of the cross-connecting arms, it was necessary to shut down the plant, and we are about to re-connect the wells and build manholes over the same to prevent a recurrence of the trouble. The work of laying the 30-inch force main is progressing and should be completed in a few days' time. The work on the boilers has been delayed by the contractors, the United Heating Company, having business difficulties and being placed in the hands of a receiver. The matter is now before the Corporation Counsel, but no decision has been rendered as yet. The work on the steam fitting cannot be carried on until the boilers are received.

New Lots.

The building for the new pumping station is nearly completed and the boilers are at the freight yard and are ready to be placed as soon as the foundations have been set. The work on the engines has been commenced, and the steam mains will be installed as soon as the boilers have been placed, the steam mains being used for connection with a temporary plant prior to the installation of the new engines. The contractor for the steel-concrete coal shed is ready to commence work, and this building should be put up within the contract time. It was planned to put low lift pumps at this station as a portion of the emergency work, if the needs of the service required, but as the supply has been greatly augmented by the comparatively heavy rains, it will not be necessary to install the low lift pumps, and these pumps will probably be used along the line of the Massapequa gallery for a temporary station. In place of the low lift pumps, two high pressure Worthington pumps have been purchased at an agreed price of \$2,300 for the two pumps, complete, free on board, Brooklyn. These pumps will operate under the normal distribution pressure and can pump about 2,500,000 gallons each. They will be located in a temporary building alongside of the permanent building and connected to the driven well system. They will also be held as emergency pumps if it is found practicable to deliver water from the new 72-inch pipe line to the New Lots Station, and thus relieve the Ridgewood Station by several million gallons daily. The buildings of the old plant at New Lots are in a bad condition, especially the coal shed and chimney, but only such repairs as are absolutely necessary will be made pending the completion of the new plant.

Ridgewood, North Side.

The triple engines were operated continuously, with the exception of No. 3, which was shut down for two days early in March. The Beam engine and Davidson engines were also operated practically for the entire time. In the Davidson plant, however, only three of the four engines were run, on account of lack of steam. We are compelled, owing to inadequate pumping capacity, to operate all these engines under unsafe conditions, and effort is being made to facilitate as much as possible the preparation of the contracts and specifications and advertisement of the same for the remodeling of the North Side station. Work on repairing the Morris boilers and the Davidson boilers has been continued, and the Davidson boilers are now practically completed. Specifications were drawn to install a blower system for the Davidson and West Side boilers, so that buckwheat coal could be used in place of the broken coal now burned in these boilers.

Ridgewood, South Side.

The Worthington engines have all given more or less trouble, and Engines Nos. 3, 4 and 5 should be thoroughly repaired. The old engine, No. 49, was put into service on February 23 and has run satisfactorily since that time. This engine is to be replaced by a 20,000-gallon engine being built by the Lawrence Machine Company for the Borough Construction Company, who have the contract for the building and engine to be located on the site of the present No. 49 engine. As there has been delay in carrying out the work on this engine, and also in the letting of the contract for the water tube boilers, which was re-advertised, it will probably be necessary to postpone the installation of the new pump until the fall, after the heavy draft of the summer has ceased. A contract has been prepared and forwarded for a battery of boilers located to the west of the pumping station, to be used during the time that the new water tube boilers are being installed. Upon the completion of this work, these boilers can be used for emergency work along the line.

Line Stations.

General repairs have been made to the engines and boilers at the line stations, as required, but, as it is expected to install central stations and abolish the existing stations, the work of repairs will only be those which are necessary to keep the plants in fair running order.

At Ozone the engine and boiler which were formerly at the Shetucket Station have been set up and connected, and this station shows about 750,000 gallons increase in delivery when operating the two pumps. As there is an additional underground supply at this station, wells will be installed to increase the yield.

At the Jameco Station the four vitrified wells put in by Mr. A. C. Lockwood have been connected up to the suction main of the deep well plant, and showed, under test, over 1,500,000 gallons daily. These wells consist of an 8-inch vitrified pipe, surrounded by a cylinder of gravel 18 inches in diameter. They are sunk to a depth of slightly over 50 feet and have about 40 feet of slotted pipe for the points. In order to properly measure the yield from this station, a cross connection was made between the two discharge mains leading from the Worthington-Davidson pumps and the connection made to a new weir box which was built at the gate house. This weir has been used in testing the delivery from both pumps. A contract was entered into with Mr. Silas W. Titus to overhaul the deep wells at this plant, as their yield had materially reduced, due to corrosion and frequent cleaning of the wells. The contract provided that Mr. Titus was to be paid \$40 per million gallons pumped over and above the amount that was previously being obtained from the deep wells, and after the wells were overhauled this contract was to run for a period of four months. Provision was made whereby a contract could be made with Mr. Titus for two years at \$30 per million gallons, this price to include payment of a permanent air plant and necessary piping to pump the wells by the air lift system. Owing to various legal complications, this contract was not actually signed until March 26, but Wells Nos. 3a and 4a were turned over to Mr. Titus on December 29, 1905; Well No. 2a was turned over to him on February 19, 1906; Well No. 1b on March 3, 1906, and Well No. 5a on March 5, 1906. Mr. Titus also commenced work on Well No. 1a, which was located in the swamp south of the suction main and had not been used by the City. On February 27 water was first pumped by Mr. Titus into the conduit, the water being drawn from Wells Nos. 3a and 4a, and the rate of pumping being somewhat over 2,000,000 gallons daily, the water being measured by a weir built adjoining the branch conduit.

At the Forest Stream Station four 6-inch wells and one 4-inch tile well have been placed and connected. Two of the wells have cluster strainers composed of 2-inch

strainers about 28 feet long; one has a 6-inch Johnson brass strainer and one a 6-inch Edwards brass strainer, the brass strainer in each case being about 20 feet long. The yield from these wells varied from 300 gallons per minute up to 600 gallons per minute when tested separately, in each case the wells being surrounded by a 12-inch cylinder of gravel. The vitrified well has about 30 feet of slotted pipe, also surrounded by gravel, and the yield was 600 gallons per minute when tested separately. The cost of the strainers used was as follows:

The tile well shows a much lower cost for material and gives a yield equal to that given by any of the other strainers.

At the Clear Stream station seven new wells have been placed, of which three have cluster strainers, one a Johnson strainer and three 4-inch tile strainers. These wells have increased the yield of this station from about 2,100,000 gallons to about 2,900,000 gallons daily. Additional wells will be placed so as to bring the yield of this station up to about 3,500,000 gallons daily.

At the Matowa station, on 18-inch tile well was placed by Messrs. Elliott & Marren, this well consisting of vitrified tile resting on a shoe and perforated about 12 feet above the shoe. The well is sunk without any casing and attempts were made to work some gravel around the outside of the well. This well yielded about 400,000 gallons per day when connected to the suction main. A 4-inch slotted vitrified pipe well was placed at this station by our own men and carried through a bed of clay, which was found running from 40 to 50 feet below the surface. The strainer for this well was placed in comparatively fine material and yielded only 350,000 gallons per minute when pumped separately. Additional wells are being placed at this station so as to bring the total yield up to over 4,000,000 gallons per day.

Ponds, Conduits and Reservoirs.

During the quarter especial attention has been given to the nuisances existing on the Baiseleys stream, and active steps have been taken toward securing the co-operation of the Health Board in abating these nuisances. Remson's Pond, on this stream, is being filled in and a good deal of rubbish is dumped, which is liable to contaminate the supply. Furthermore, the site of this pond is surrounded by dwellings inhabited by low grade foreigners, who have very little, if any, idea of sanitation. Unless it is possible to improve conditions through the co-operation of the Health Board, it may be necessary to temporarily shut off the Baiseleys supply and by-pass the polluted brook, as it is not advisable to take the chances of using a highly polluted water, even after filtering, unless it is absolutely necessary to do so.

The Clear Stream Pond, which is small and so located, adjoining the Merrick road, that the dirt from the road is blown into it, was abandoned, as already stated, on January 20, the water being allowed to flow down stream, a considerable portion being absorbed by the Clear Stream pumping station. This pond was fed by a stream which was exposed to danger of pollution, and it was therefore advisable to abandon it, especially as the Clear Stream station can be so developed as to utilize practically the full flow of the stream, which is small.

The following schedule gives a summary of the work done on cleaning closets and cesspools to prevent surface pollution of the supplies:

The total cost of this work during the quarter was \$1,136.64.

The usual work of patrolling the streams and ponds and making a regular inspection on the watershed to prevent pollution of the source of supply, has been carried on, and as already stated, special effort made to improve conditions on the Baiseleys stream. As stated in previous reports, we have a comparatively small appropriation available to purchase land, but, if the streams are to be protected, this question will have to be taken up vigorously in the near future.

At the Mount Prospect reservoir, the contractor has commenced work on replacing the fence, and it should be completed in a short time.

The New Lots reservoir was abandoned on February 4, the high ground near the reservoir being placed on the Mount Prospect reservoir system. This change made it possible to give a much more adequate pressure on the high ground along the Highland boulevard and vicinity, and also to do away with many of the boundary gates, improving thereby the distribution of water for domestic and fire purposes. The New Lots reservoir should be filled in and probably the land on which the reservoir stood, together with the waste land back of the reservoir, now under the control of the Water Department, could best be utilized by the City as a portion of Highland Park.

At the Ridgewood reservoir, night gangs have been continued to operate the gates so that the pressure during the early morning hours would not be above the normal day pressure. In this way the supply has been conserved, some waste prevented, and no inconvenience has been felt by the citizens. The grounds around the Ridgewood reservoir should be graded and seeded, as they are at present in a comparatively rough condition and detract from the appearance of the Highland Park grounds.

The temporary pumping plant installed at the storage reservoir was not needed on account of the rainfall, and the contractor was ordered to remove the plant on January 21.

Trouble has been experienced in the past from a leak under the waste weir at Conselyea's pond, and while the Forest stream drain pipe was being laid, the lower pond was emptied and the waste weir thoroughly repaired by placing a heavy floor of concrete between the side walls. No leak has developed since the pond was refilled.

Filter Plants.

At the Forest stream beds, the work of laying the 20-inch drain pipe so that the beds can be washed was completed on January 31, and during March the necessary plank was placed to form the channel ways for washing. No opportunity has yet been given for washing these beds, but it is expected to considerably reduce both the time and cost of cleaning by the washing process. The bacterial results from the beds, while fair, have naturally not been as good since the beds were disturbed, but the bacterial efficiency is improving, the beds acting the same as the Hempstead beds after the planks were placed in the latter beds.

The Hempstead beds have run steadily during the quarter and given excellent results, as have also the Springfield and Baiseleys mechanical plants. It has been found at the Baiseleys plant that there is an accumulation of muck in the gravel, and the tanks are being cleaned, the gravel washed and new strainers placed. This work is being done by our own men as rapidly as the force available permits.

The total amount of water filtered by the four plants during the quarter has been 847,638,768 gallons, and the total cost for operating the plants, including all charges, has been \$5,663.98, making the cost per million gallons filtered \$6.88.

Water Analyses.

During the quarter there have been 1,991 samples of water for the Brooklyn supply analyzed, while the total number of samples of water analyzed at the different laboratories has been 3,328. The following miscellaneous analyses have been made:

The chlorine in the water has risen slightly, but is still low, and the general quality of the supply has been excellent, there being, for the greater part of the quarter, a large percentage of naturally or artificially filtered water in the supply. The quality of the water during this quarter has been better than that of the corresponding quarter for last year.

Contracts.

The following contracts have been prepared and forwarded during the quarter:

- January 10—For furnishing and delivering cast iron pipe and special castings.
- January 12—For hauling and laying water mains and appurtenances in the Borough of Brooklyn.
- January 15—For operating six or more temporary pumping stations along the line of the Massapequa infiltration gallery.
- February 17—For furnishing and delivering semi-bituminous and anthracite coal.
- March 6—For furnishing, delivering and erecting a temporary boiler plant, with its connections, at the Ridgewood South Side Pumping Station.
- March 13—For furnishing and delivering stop-cocks.
- March 19—For setting, replacing and hauling six (6) inch hydrant service pipe, fire hydrants and appurtenances in various streets in the Borough of Brooklyn.
- March 22—For removing all ashes from various pumping stations.
- March 26—For furnishing and driving deep wells.
- March 26—For Architect's services for remodeling and enlarging the Ridgewood North Side Pumping Station.

Emergency Work for Increasing the Supply.

The work outlined to temporarily increase the supply to meet the emergency caused by the non-completion of the Wantagh and Massapequa galleries was as follows:

1. Six stations along the line of the Massapequa gallery.
2. Temporary pumping plant at the Hempstead Storage Reservoir.
3. Additional wells at Clear Stream Station.
4. Additional wells at Forest Stream Station.
5. Driven well station at Culvert N.
6. Driven well station at Culvert L.
7. New shallow wells at Jameco.
8. Development of deep wells at Jameco by air lift.
9. New wells and pump at Oconee.
10. Driven well station at Culvert D.
11. New wells and operating temporary plant at Spring Creek.
12. Temporary pumping plant at New Lots.
13. New wells at Gravesend Station.

The installation of the six temporary plants along the line of the Massapequa gallery has been carried on by the contractor, although the progress has been somewhat slow, owing to weather conditions and difficulty in obtaining the machinery. The supply from these temporary stations has reached, however, about 8,000,000 gallons daily and a further increase in supply could be obtained if necessary. Near Station 26 three Elliott & Marron 18-inch tile wells were placed, and each of these wells, when tested separately, showed a discharge of about 300,000 gallons per day. Near Station 39 two of these wells were placed, and they also showed about 300,000 gallons per day when pumped separately. These wells were put in to help meet any deficiency that might be caused by a lack of rainfall during the winter months, but fortunately we were not compelled to draw upon the wells to any extent, owing to the increased supply due to heavy rains.

The pumping plant at the Hempstead Storage Reservoir was installed at a time when the reservoirs had reached the lowest point to which it was safe, even under emergencies, to draw them, with the expectation that the water would be pumped from the storage reservoir into the conduit and thus tide over the supply, to some extent, during the time that the temporary stations were being constructed. This plant was not needed, on account of the rainfall coming just at the period when the plant was started, the plant actually being run for about twenty-four hours. When the conditions of the supply in January showed that the plant would not likely be required, the Borough Construction Company, who owned the plant, were ordered to remove it. The cost of the plant, including placing, rental, running and removing the same, was \$4,062.67.

At the Clear Stream and Forest Stream Stations, wells were placed by our own men, as has been already detailed, and the available increase in the supply from these two stations has been about 1,250,000 gallons.

The stations at Culvert L, known as St. Albans Station, and at Culvert N, known as Rosedale Station, are similar to the station at Aqueduct, hereafter described, except twenty wells are driven in place of the fifteen at Aqueduct. The station at St. Albans was completed so as to run during the latter part of 1905, and ran practically continuously up to March 23. On this date, while our men were placing the second engine on its foundation, it fell against the engine which was in operation, and damaged both engines so that it was necessary to shut down the station. The necessary repairs are being made, and the station will probably soon be again in operation. The total cost of the St. Albans Station was about \$17,000, while that of the Rosedale Station was about \$15,500. The work at the Rosedale Station was delayed on account of the men being employed on the Amityville Station and other emergency work, but it is expected that the station will be ready to run before the end of April. Both the St. Albans and Rosedale Stations can each readily deliver 3,000,000 gallons of water daily.

At the Jameco Station four 8-inch tile wells were sunk by Mr. A. C. Lockwood at a total cost of \$3,302.67. These wells have already been described, and yielded about 1,500,000 gallons daily. At this station, as has already been stated, a contract was made with Mr. S. W. Titus to increase the yield from the deep wells, and this work has

progressed so that the wells are at present yielding about 1,500,000 gallons daily in excess of what was previously being obtained. It is expected that a much greater quantity of water will be obtained in the near future.

At the Oconee Station we have placed the engine and boiler from the abandoned Shetucket Station, which will increase the yield at this station by about 750,000 gallons daily. It is expected to put in more wells at this station to increase the shallow well supply as soon as the driven well gangs can be utilized for this work.

The new station at Culvert D, known as the Aqueduct Station, has been completed and has shown a capacity of over 3,000,000 gallons daily. The water was first pumped on February 17, and since that time the station has been in practically constant operation. This station consists of fifteen wells, two boilers and two centrifugal pumps directly connected to the engines, and cost complete, including all material and labor of the City's men, but exclusive of land, about \$13,500.

The running of the temporary plant at the Spring Creek Station was continued until March 14, and, as the water was not needed and as only a small increase in the supply was obtained by running this plant, the station was shut down and the crew utilized for other work.

Two low lift pumps were purchased for the temporary plant at the New Lots Station, but the increase in the supply made this expensive expedient unnecessary, and these pumps will be utilized for a temporary plant along the line of the Massapequa gallery. The two pumps were purchased from Wickes Brothers at a cost of \$796. Provision is being made for two high pressure pumps to be installed in a temporary building adjoining the new pumping station and using steam from the new boilers. These pumps will be connected to the new driven well system and used prior to the completion of the new pumps. The cost of these two pumps f. o. b. Brooklyn is \$2,300.

The six new wells at the Gravesend Station were sunk by Mr. F. W. Miller and connected to a new suction main by Mr. Frank J. Gallagher. These wells have given trouble on account of the weight of earth filled in over them, and it will be necessary to disconnect the tee forming the head of the well and put in drop suction. The wells will probably increase the discharge from the Gravesend Station by about 1,000,000 gallons daily. The cost of this work was about \$4,600.

The emergency work has yielded a supply equal to and, in fact, exceeding the estimates of the Department, and prevented any shortage in the supply for the present. To provide against an extremely dry summer, a contract is being made to sink deep wells along a portion of the line of the Wantagh and Massapequa galleries, and deep wells at Rosedale, St. Albans and Aqueduct Stations. This will probably be the last of the emergency work, as the supply will be sufficient until the more comprehensive plan of development from Spring Creek to Massapequa is carried out.

HIGH PRESSURE FIRE SERVICE SYSTEM.

Coney Island.

This station was finally tested on January 9 and 10, and the contract fully completed on February 14. There were no alarms received at the station from the protected district during the quarter, but the station was ready to respond at all times, as it has been since September, 1905.

Main System.

The lawsuit which held up the contract for the motors and pumps was finally decided on April 20; the award of the contract will probably soon be made, and the contractor will take up the work of building the pumps and motors. The first hydrants under the contract made with the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company were delivered on February 20, and up to the end of the quarter 150 hydrants were delivered. The work of laying the mains and appurtenances was resumed by Mr. John J. Cashman on March 19, but up to the end of the quarter only about 270 feet of pipe have been laid. The contractor has been notified that he must actively prosecute this work, so that all the mains can be laid by the latter part of the summer. Some progress has been made in the contracts for feeders, ducts, salt water suction mains, etc., but this work can readily be done prior to the completion of the station. The plans and specifications for the buildings have been remodeled and are now being put in final shape for printing and advertising.

Infiltration Galleries.

The work on the Wantagh gallery was discontinued during the winter months, but the pumps were kept going continuously, and a supply of about 9,000,000 gallons daily obtained. The New York Continental Jewell Filtration Company, the contractors for this work, have commenced work on setting up the plant so as to resume pipe laying.

On the Massapequa Infiltration Gallery, Mr. M. J. Dady, the contractor, has continued throughout the winter, the following pipe being laid:

An agreement was made with Mr. Dady whereby he was to operate the six temporary plants constructed under a previous agreement made with him, and these plants have been operated as required during the quarter, the supply from the plants reaching at times about 8,000,000 gallons daily. An additional supply could have been obtained had the weather conditions warranted it. The 48-inch cast iron discharge pipe has been laid from the engine house to the point where it is to cross the railroad, but as the Long Island Railroad has not taken the necessary steps to protect its tracks, the laying of this main has been discontinued. There has been considerable delay in placing the pumps and engines, but they have now been delivered and the boilers are being set up. A wooden flume was built from Station 99 to the Central Station, this flume being part of the work to be done in constructing the temporary stations. As it was considered advisable, owing to the experience obtained in building the Wantagh gallery, to have the lower portion of the trench sheeting left in place, a contract was made with the Brooklyn Lumber Company on January 15 for furnishing the necessary lumber, and a contract was entered into with Mr. Dady to haul and place this lumber, Mr. Dady being allowed the use of the lumber and being paid for the cost of hauling the same.

Suffolk County Station.

In order to test, if possible, the Burr Law, the Commissioner decided to have a pumping station erected on a section of land within the boundaries of Suffolk County lying at the easterly end of the strip purchased by the City for the Massapequa Gallery. Orders were given to sink the necessary wells, install the pumps and boilers and build a connecting flume and pipe line from the station on the Suffolk County road to the wooden flume built by Mr. M. J. Dady from Station No. 99 of the Massapequa Gallery. The work was commenced on February 19, and by working our men as many hours as possible and doing part of the work under requisition, we were able to complete the wells, station, pipe line and flume so as to commence delivering water on March 14. An arrangement was made with Mr. M. J. Dady to furnish the necessary labor to run the station, and it has been operated practically continuously since that time, pumping a little over 1,000,000 gallons daily. The plant consists of five 6-inch wells sunk to a depth of about 50 feet, the strainer being 20 feet long and surrounded by a 12-inch cylinder of gravel. Five of these wells are connected up to 8-inch suction pipe, which, in turn, is connected to a Davidson direct-acting engine which we had on hand at the Ridgewood Station. One of the boilers from the Spring Creek Station was utilized for this plant and the water discharged into a 12-inch line which runs from the station to about Station No. 162 of the Massapequa Gallery. At this point a weir is built and the water discharges into a flume 18 inches wide and 9 inches deep, formed of galvanized sheet iron plates bent into a rectangular shape. The flume runs to Station 146 + 50, where it connects with a 12-inch pipe laid across the Unqua stream. The 12-inch pipe again discharges into the flume at Station 138, which runs to the wooden flume at Station 99. So far no action has been taken by the Suffolk County authorities, and it may be necessary to take further steps in order to force action by the county authorities.

Office Room and Force.

The work of this Bureau is rapidly growing, and is now many times greater than it was a few years ago. We have had little, if any, additional space allotted in which to carry out the work of the Bureau, and it is impossible now to do the work economically under our present crowded condition, and practically impossible to utilize a larger force, which is necessary if the new work planned is to be carried out and the records kept in proper shape for ready reference. It is therefore imperative that additional space be provided for the work of this Bureau, if we are to carry out the work in an efficient and systematic manner.

The employees of the Department have generally shown a keen interest in properly performing their duties, and the large amount of work done is the most convincing proof of the zeal shown by the men in carrying forward the plans prepared by the Department. With the increased work and responsibility there should come increased compensation, and I trust that this matter will receive favorable consideration in the near future.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted,
to wit:

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—
1 (69914). Recertifying the name of Patrick J. Kane as being eligible for appointment to the position of Marine Stoker. Kane appointed, with compensation at the rate of \$90 per month, to take effect upon assignment to work.
2 (69833). Giving notice of a hearing to be held on October 31, 1906, in relation to the request of this Department for an amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class by including therein two additional Assistant Superintendents of Ferries. Filed.

3 (69844). Stating that James F. Sullivan has successfully passed the non-competitive examination for the position of Attendant. Sullivan transferred from the service of the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company to that of the City and appointed to the position of Attendant, with compensation at the rate of \$55 per month, to take effect November 1, 1906.

4 (69874). Authorizing the reinstatement of John Crosson to the position of Marine Stoker in this Department. Crosson reinstated, with compensation at the rate of \$90 per month, to take effect upon assignment to work.

From the Department of Street Cleaning (69753)—Requesting that it be furnished with 100 printed schedules showing the snow dumps for the winter of 1906-1907. Filed, the lists having been furnished.

From S. R. Rosaffy (69837)—Requesting permission to use the bulkhead foot of Division avenue, Brooklyn, for the purpose of dumping cellar dirt on scows. Permit granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, and to expire by limitation of time three months from date, compensation to be at the rate of \$500 per annum, payable monthly in advance to the Cashier of this Department, it being understood that the consent of the owners of the property adjoining the foot of the street will be obtained in the event of its being necessary to occupy any of such property in connection with the use of the bulkhead covered by this permit.

From the Snare & Triest Company (69714)—Requesting an extension of time within which to complete the work of building the ferry house and structures appurtenant thereto at St. George, Borough of Richmond, under Contract No. 942. Extension granted to and including February 1, 1907.

From the F. V. Smith Contracting Company (69497)—Requesting an extension of time within which to complete the work of paving between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, under Contract No. 1006. Extension granted to and including December 1, 1906.

From J. H. Barklage's Son (69871)—Stating that he is being charged \$2 per day for wharfage on a registered boat, the Dockmaster claiming that as the correct amount because the tonnage is not indicated on the boat, and asking to be advised in relation thereto. Copy of rates of wharfage sent.

From the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company (69875)—Stating that Augustus H. Kruse should be taken over into the service of the City, he having served in the capacity of Deckhand for about five years. Municipal Civil Service Commission requested to give Kruse non-competitive examination required by law.

From the Engineer-in-Chief (69876)—Recommending that a peremptory order be given G. B. Spearin, contractor for building the pier foot of Canal street, Stapleton, Borough of Richmond, under Contract No. 1002, to commence the reinforced concrete deck of the pier at once, and that if the work is not commenced within a week from date the contractor be notified that the penalty called for in the contract will be imposed for overtime. Spearin notified as recommended.

From the Secretary, Auditor, Superintendent of Ferries, Superintendent of Docks (69823), and Engineer-in-Chief (69873)—Recommending promotion examinations in the positions of Clerks, Stenographers and Typewriters and Collectors. Municipal Civil Service Commission requested to hold examinations as follows:

Junior Clerk (\$600 per annum) to Second Grade Clerk (\$900 per annum).
Junior Clerk (\$600 per annum) to Fourth Grade Clerk (\$1,200 per annum).
Clerk, fifth grade (\$1,500 per annum), to sixth grade (\$1,800 per annum).
Clerk, fifth grade (\$1,500 per annum), to seventh grade (\$2,100 per annum).
Clerk, seventh grade (\$2,100 per annum), to eighth grade (\$2,400 per annum).
Clerk, eighth grade (\$2,400 per annum), to tenth grade (\$3,000 per annum).
Stenographer and Typewriter, fourth grade (\$1,200 per annum), to fifth grade (\$1,500 per annum).

The Commission was also requested to permit Collectors at \$1,800 per annum to enter the examination for promotion to Seventh Grade Clerkship (\$2,100 per annum), and that the Stenographers and Typewriters, fifth grade, at \$1,500 per annum, be permitted to enter the examination for promotion to Sixth Grade Clerkship at \$1,800 per annum; also that an examination for promotion from Oiler to Marine Engineer be held.

Peter J. Nilsson and P. H. Nannery were appointed to the position of Cartmen for the purpose of furnishing horses, harness and drivers as required, compensation in each case to be at the rate of \$3.25 per day for each set furnished, carts to be provided by this Department.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve the establishment of a ferry to and from a point between Desbrosses and Watts streets, North river, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to and from Weehawken, in the State of New Jersey, and, in the event of such approval, that the Commission adopt, by unanimous vote, a resolution authorizing the leasing of the franchise of the ferry by private agreement to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for a term of two years from September 9, 1906 (the date upon which the company commenced to operate the ferry from the foot of Desbrosses street), at a rental of \$3,500 per annum, the remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of ferry franchises now in use by this Department.

The Union Ferry Company of New York was advised that insurance in the sum of \$15,000, covering marine risks but excluding fire risks, has been effected in the Atlantic Mutual Insurance Company on account of The City of New York, to cover its interest as lessee in the ferryboat "Mineola" from the first day of November, 1906, at noon, for a term of one year, or until the termination of the lease of the said ferryboat to the City; the New York and South Brooklyn Ferry and Steam Transportation Company was similarly advised that insurance in the sum of \$25,000 had been effected with the same company to cover the ferryboats "South Brooklyn" and "West Brooklyn" for a term of one year.

The compensation of John A. Greegan, Stenographer and Typewriter, as recommended by the Engineer-in-Chief (69737) was fixed at the rate of \$1,500 per annum, to take effect November 1, 1906, subject to the approval by the Municipal Civil Service Commission, if such approval be necessary.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
