Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

SIR—In regard to numerous communications recently addressed to the Comptroller by property owners, or their representatives, protesting against alleged overcharges by Plumbers employed by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the installation of water meters, which communications were referred by you to the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics for examination, I beg to report as follows:

On account of the large number of complaints received, the Comptroller detailed Inspectors from the Finance Department to closely follow the current work of the City's Plumbers. The Inspectors were under instructions to keep a record of the time occupied in the installation of meters and the number of Plumbers and Helpers employed. When a meter was finally installed the Inspector who had been keeping a record of the progress of the work, submitted his report to the Auditor of the Finance Department. This inspection was still in progress at the date of this report.

From May 8 to June 13 inclusive, the Inspectors filed reports on 64 meters, the work of installation having been begun and completed under their inspection. The results so far would seem to indicate a reduction of from 40 to 60 per cent. in the charge for labor as compared with the charges in bills rendered previous to the aforesaid close scrutiny.

According to the reports of the Inspectors of the Finance Department the work of installing meters in the Borough of Manhattan under direction of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, is now entrusted to J. J. McCarthy and T. J. Tuomey, who have been for some time doing similar work.

The following schedule shows the estimated charge for labor for the installation of the aforesaid 64 meters as fixed by the time record of the Inspectors of this Department:

The City Plumbers whose work has been under investigation appear to be able to install meters in much less time than it took City Plumbers to accomplish the same task when there was no such investigation. The Inspectors reports show that in a majority of the meter installations, less than two days were required for the work. In 14 cases only one day's work was required to install each meter. There is on file in this Department a large number of protests against the bills of City Plumbers where the charge for labor for the services of a Plumber and Helper averages seven days at \$8.50 a day for each meter installed.

In addition to the Inspectors of this Department who are investigating the installation of meters, the Comptroller has also employed an expert to examine work done by the City's Plumbers in cases where protests have been filed by property owners against alleged excessive charges.

WHAT HAS BEEN DISCLOSED IN A PARTIAL EXAMINATION OF ALLEGED OVERCHARGES FOR SETTING WATER METERS.

In addition to the complaints from property owners sent to the Comptroller, it appears from the examination which has been made to date that many similar allegations of excessive charges made by Plumbers employed by the City have also been filed during the past three months with the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. A number of the cases have been placed in the hands of attorneys for the property owners, who state that unless reductions are made in the bills they will contest the charges in the courts.

The 189 complaints listed in Schedule A, attached to this report, include, in addition to protests made to the Comptroller, a number which, as just noted, have been filed with the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the charges for the installation of the meters having been certified by said Department to the Comptroller for payment. In the thirty-two cases marked *, the bills for the same appear in vouchers amounting to several thousand dollars which are held in the Department of Finance for audit, and at the date of this report are unpaid.

Section 475 of the Greater New York Charter, provides:

"The Commissioner of Water Supply is authorized, in his discretion, to cause water meters, the pattern and price of which shall be approved by the Board of Aldermen, to be placed in all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, office buildings, public edifices, at wharves, ferry houses, stables, and in all places in which water is furnished for business consumption, and if authorized thereto by resolution or ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, in all apartment houses, tenements, flat houses and private dwellings, so that all water so furnished therein or thereat, may be measured and known by the said Department, and for the purpose of ascertaining the ratable portion which consumers of water should pay for the water thereon or thereat received and used." * * *

As a preliminary to a general inquiry in the Department of Finance into the justness of these claims, examination has been made to determine how some of the present claims compare with those made for similar services during recent years. For this purpose the bills rendered for eighteen jobs done during 1906 have been compiled and set up against those rendered for an equal number of jobs during 1902, as follows:

In making the above comparison it is here assumed that the same conditions attending the installation of water meters with respect to the character of the services required prevailed in 1906 as in 1902. The rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity governing the installation of meters by plumbers employed by the City or the property owners were, it appears, substantially the same in 1906 as in 1902.

A representative of one of the largest plumbers' supply houses in this City has informed your Examiner that the cost of supplies has advanced from 30 to 40 per cent. during the past four years. From this fact it would appear that the charges made for materials in the eighteen cases cited above for 1906 were, on the average, increased above those made in 1902 about in proportion to the advance in the market prices for supplies.

Protesting property owners claim that in some instances proper notices were not served upon them to install meters, but in the cases so far examined the records of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity show that thirty-day notices were served either upon the owners or their representatives on the premises. Other owners claim that the Department has been unreasonable in insisting upon the installation of meters in small shops and offices in which little or no water was used for business purposes. What the property owners seem especially to complain of are the alleged excessive charges for labor made by the plumbers employed by the City.

Certain of the City's Plumbers employed during 1906 claim, in defense of their charges for labor, that the item of superintendence by a Foreman is considerable, and that when their workmen visit a place to be metered and are refused admission by owner or janitor, the time lost is chargeable to the job.

The Department reported 3,000 violations of its rules by plumbers employed by property owners privately during the year 1906 in installing meters, all which defective work had to be charged or done over at additional cost to the owner.

It is charged that water meters are sometimes wilfully or maliciously displaced or damaged by owners or others to prevent registration of water used or to give plumbers more work. The expense of repairing the meter or connections then falls upon the owner. Under the rules at present the Department is not responsible for damage or breakage after the installation of the meter has been duly inspected and passed upon by the Department Inspector.

Following is a summary of unpaid bills for installing water meters awaiting audit in the Department of Finance, showing the charge for labor and materials for setting 499 water meters in Manhattan and The Bronx to be \$34,604.98:

The cost of water meters, which runs from \$8 up, does not appear in any of the above statements. These are supplied by the City, after the selection of certain patented meters by the Board of Aldermen, and charge for the same is made to property owners in connection with the bill for labor and materials.

It appears that it is much more expensive to install a water meter to cover a "store floor and basement" than for the "entire premises." This has been offered as an explanation for the disproportionate charges between Manhattan and Brooklyn, it being alleged that in Brooklyn meters were installed for the "entire premises." The large majority of meters are installed in Manhattan and The Bronx in "store floor and basement," but inquiry at the office of the Water Register in Brooklyn discloses the fact that at least 50 per cent. of the meters in Brooklyn are in the "store floor and basement" class of installation.

It may seem superfluous to say that much of the contention against alleged overcharges by City Plumbers might have been avoided if property owners had complied with the orders of the Water Supply Department to place meters in their premises. Owners are allowed thirty days in which to comply, but many of them seem to have paid no attention to the notification from the department. In some cases the department did not have the meters installed until over ninety days after notice had been given to place meters in the buildings.

It appears that frequently notice to install meters is served upon a janitor or occupant of a building instead of upon the owner. While this course is unavoidable when the owner of the building cannot be found, it seems also that, if the Water Supply Department made proper effort, a larger percentage of the owners might be found and service be made upon them. Affidavit of service should be required of the Inspector.

As may be seen by reference to Schedule A, over 30 per cent. of the complaints presented have been made through attorneys for the protestants. Many of the complainants have announced that they will take the matter into court and insist that liens consisting of the alleged extortionate charges shall be removed from premises

affected. These are cases in which the bills have been paid to the Plumbers. The Corporation Counsel has advised that legal proceedings may be inaugurated to obtain refunds of money paid by the City where there is evidence of excessive charges.

In addition to bills aggregating \$34,604.98 for installing meters, at present awaiting audit in the Department of Finance, I am informed that there are in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity about 300 additional protests from property owners, covering bills which have not yet been certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The earnest and determined protests made by the large number of property owners who have already asked for relief, I think justifies presenting this partial report as to charges now under examination. Additional complaints are being received daily.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:
From May 19 to May 25, inclusive, 34 operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital, 2 at Gouverneur Hospital, 14 at Harlem Hospital and 8 at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the attending surgeons or their assistants were present.

Four estimates on carpenter work at the new Harlem Hospital have been received, the lowest being that of C. W. Klappert's Sons, at \$210, for 42 sections of North Carolina pine flooring to cover the balconies so that the flooring will be properly protected. It is recommended that this estimate be accepted.

The lowest bid for a cypress partition, with caps and moulding, in the oculist department of the new Harlem Hospital is that of C. W. Klappert's Sons, at \$16, and it is recommended that it be accepted.

The lowest estimate received on a shower bath for the surgeons of the new Harlem Hospital is from Joseph Miller, at \$218, and it is recommended that it be accepted.

The lowest estimate on rearranging the urinals in the new Harlem Hospital is from Joseph Miller, at \$146, and it is recommended that it be accepted.

A uniform time system is a necessity in every hospital. In Bellevue Hospital each ward has its clock and we have to employ a man whose sole duty is to look after the clocks. A standard electric clock system was introduced in Gouverneur Hospital some years ago and it has been very satisfactory, insuring regular time in all parts of the building. Estimates have been received on a standard electric time system for the new Harlem Hospital, the lowest of which is \$720, from the Standard Electric Time Company. It is recommended that it be accepted.

The lowest estimate on placing wire mesh guards on the windows of the toilet and hallway of the male prison ward is from the Estey Wire Works Company, at \$40, and it is recommended that it be accepted.

The Night Superintendent reports that Edward Johnson and Charles Daly, Hospital Helpers acting as Clerks on night duty, intend to leave on account of inadequate remuneration. They are receiving \$25 a month each, and Assistant Superintendent McHale speaks very highly of them and requests \$30 a month for them. It is recommended that this amount be allowed.

Dr. Joseph D. Bryant, president of the American Medical Association, has requested that the Pathological Department of Bellevue Hospital have an exhibit at the coming meeting of the American Medical Association at Atlantic City. It is recommended that authority be granted to prepare such an exhibit and pay the express charges, which would probably not be very high.

Whereas, The Kings County Refrigerating Company has, under date of July 13, 1905, made application to this Board for a grant of a right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a pipe line under and along Hall street and across Flushing avenue to the lands of the Wallabout Market, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for the purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers therein; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance to such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on July 14, 1905, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as September 29, 1905, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the Brooklyn Daily "Eagle" and the Brooklyn "Citizen," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Kings County Refrigerating Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Kings County Refrigerating Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Kings County Refrigerating Company the franchise or right applied for and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York as follows, to wit:

KINGS COUNTY REFRIGERATING COMPANY.
Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 190 , by and between The City of New York, party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and Kings County Refrigerating Company, a domestic corporation of the State of New York, hereinafter called the Company, party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City of New York hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a conduit not to exceed twelve inches in diameter, with the necessary branches and connections therefrom, leading directly into private property, and also into the lands of the Wallabout Market, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigerant to consumers, said conduits and branches to be beneath the surface of each of the following-named

streets, avenues and highways, between the points described in the following route, all situate in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, to wit:

Route—Beginning at a point in Hall street, about 325 feet north of the northerly line of Park avenue; thence northerly in, under and along Hall street to Flushing avenue; thence still northerly in, under and across Flushing avenue to the lands of the Wallabout Market, together with such branches from the pipe laid in the above-described route leading directly into private property or lands of the Wallabout Market as may be necessary for the purpose of supplying patrons of the Company with cold air or refrigerant, said route being shown on a map entitled "Map showing the proposed pipe line of the Kings County Refrigerating Company, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated July 13, 1905," signed by James J. Phelan, Secretary, copy of which is annexed hereto and made a part of this grant.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—The said right to lay one conduit line in each of the streets, avenues or highways, and between the limits as hereinbefore described, and the privilege to maintain and operate the same shall be held and enjoyed by the said Company, its lessee or successors, for a term of fifteen years from the date of the signing of this contract, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of ten years upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the said Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient, if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or such other authority in its place. If the Company and the Board, or such other authority in its place for the City, shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this grant, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board or such other authority in its place) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with such other authority, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The value of the franchise, as ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last year of this original grant. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this grant, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—Upon the termination of this contract, or if the same is renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted, or for any other cause, all conduit lines and appurtenances thereto, constructed pursuant to this contract, shall be and become the property of The City of New York, without compensation therefor, and the same may be used by the City for any purpose whatsoever. If, however, at the termination of this grant, as above, the City, by its Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, shall so order by resolution, the said Company shall remove, at its own expense, said conduit line and all appurtenances thereto, and shall restore the streets and pavements to their original condition.

Third—The Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this privilege to The City of New York the following sums of money, to wit:

- Five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the signing of the contract.
 - During the first five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750), and which shall be equal to 5 per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).
 - During the second five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and which shall be equal to 6 per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).
 - During the third and remaining five years of this contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300), and which shall be equal to 7 per cent. of the gross receipts of the Company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300).
- The gross receipts as above shall be the total receipts of the Company from all business of furnishing refrigerant to consumers outside of its warehouse at No. 30 Hall street, and outside of the lands of the Wallabout Market. The minimum sums provided to be paid annually shall include the percentages of such gross receipts as above and also such sums as may be paid under any agreement made with the Comptroller for privileges in the lands of the Wallabout Market.
- An annual payment of twenty-five (25) cents for each linear foot of conduit line and two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue or highway. The sums due shall be calculated from the day when permit is obtained to open the streets for any section of the work.
- All sums herein provided for shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.
- Any and all payments made by the terms of this franchise to The City of New York by the Company shall not be considered in any manner

in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of The City of New York or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of the privilege hereby granted, whether original or renewal, as hereinbefore provided, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company, providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant. Nothing herein contained shall apply to any mortgage or mere lienor, but shall apply to any purchaser upon foreclosure, or under or by virtue of any provision of a mortgage or lien.

Fifth—The rights and privileges granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein pass to, or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations, or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents. This provision, however, shall not apply to the making of a mortgage, but shall apply to a sale under foreclosure.

Sixth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways on the route heretofore described.

Seventh—The Company shall complete the entire conduit line along the route hereinbefore described, and have the same in operation within one (1) year from the date of the signing of this contract; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said pipe line, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets, avenues and highways described in the route.

Ninth—The said Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the pipe line and its appurtenances.

Tenth—The said Company shall bear the expense of inspection, which may be required by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, of all the work of construction required, or removal of the said pipe line, which shall be done under this grant.

Eleventh—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes laid under this grant before said pipes shall be used for the conveyance of gas or fluid under pressure for refrigerating purposes. The pipes so tested shall be submitted to a pressure of 450 pounds per square inch, and such test shall be made under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipes shall be executed by an officer of the Company, indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Twelfth—During the term of this contract the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority shall have absolute power to regulate the maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person or corporation located along the routes herein authorized, shall extend its conduit to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigerant at the prices which may be hereafter fixed; otherwise this contract shall cease and determine at the option of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Thirteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the Company, showing the exact location of all the conduit lines and manholes laid with reference to the curb lines of the streets and the street surface, and the same shall be furnished on the first day of November of each year until all pipe lines which are authorized by this grant are constructed, or until the right hereby authorized to construct pipe lines along the routes described have ceased by limitation, as herein provided.

Fourteenth—The grant of this privilege shall not affect in any way the right of The City of New York to grant a similar privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions to any other person or corporation.

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability by reason of the construction and operation of the conduit line, and the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property by reason of its construction.

As a condition of this grant the Company, its successor or assigns, hereby agrees to repay to the City any damages which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company, its successor or assigns.

Sixteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, except as otherwise herein specifically provided, this contract may be forfeited or avoided by The City of New York by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the said Company.

Seventeenth—The conduit line hereby authorized shall be used only by the Kings County Refrigerating Company, and for no other purpose than for supplying refrigeration by the ammonia process, or such other process as may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of accounts of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract. The Company shall, on or before November 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigerant to consumers outside of its warehouse at No. 30 Hall street, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require.

The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall comply with the existing provisions of Article V. of chapter 566 of the Laws of 1890, and future amendments thereto, except in so far as the same are inconsistent with the provisions of this contract, and provided that all powers of the Company shall be limited by the provisions of this contract.

Twentieth—If the said Company, its successors or assigns, shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed or fails to maintain its structures in good condition throughout the full term of its occupancy of such streets, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York may give written notice to the said Company specifying any default on the part of said Company and requiring said Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time, and upon the failure of the Company to remedy the said default within a reasonable time, said company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to The City of New York a sum of \$50, as fixed or liquidated damages, or the said City, in case such structures, which may affect the surface of the streets, shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the said Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund herebefore provided.

Twenty-first—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty days after the execution of this contract and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the privilege and the penalties herein provided, and in case of default in the performance by said Company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right, after due notice, to collect the same from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest from said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said Company. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said Company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof, the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Twenty-second—The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed, and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed, and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
