DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR THE WEEK ENDING JULY 19, 1913.

ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE DISCHARGE OF DENSE SMOKE HELD UNCONSTITUTIONAL.

In a suit recently brought by the Department of Health against the New York Edison Co. in the Court of Special Sessions for infraction of section 181 of the Sanitary Code, which provides that "No person shall cause, suffer or allow dense smoke to be discharged from any building, vessel, stationary or locomotive engine or motor vehicle, place or premises within The City of New York," decision adverse to the Department was rendered, and the demurrer of the New York Edison Co. was allowed. Justice Russell handed down the decision, in which Justices Zeller and McInerney concurred. The opinion is too lengthy to be printed here in full, but the importance of the matter warrants the extensive quotation given below.

It is not the intention of the Department of Health to allow the question to rest with the decision above quoted. An appeal will be taken at the earliest possible moment, since the final adjudication of this matter is a matter of first importance to the community.

Decision.

"Every such ordinance to be a proper exercise of police power, must be reasonable and not a general restriction. In People ex rel. Winburgh Advertising Co. vs. Murphy (195 N. Y., 126), the Court said: 'The police power, so difficult to define but so frequently invoked, is confined to such reasonable restrictions and prohibitions as are necessary to guard public health, morals and safety, and to conserve public peace, order and the general welfare. * * * Compensation for such interference with and restriction in the use of property is found in the share that the owner enjoys in the common benefit secured to all. An ordinance which purports to legislate for public safety must tend in some appreciable way to that end. Unless there is a substantial connection between the assumed purpose of the ordinance and the end to be accomplished, such ordinance is unenforceable. (Matter of Jacobs, 98 N. Y., 98.) Judge Chase, referring to ordinances enacted to regulate the production and discharge of smoke, in the case of City of Rochester vs. Macauley-Fien Co. (199 N. Y., 207, at p. 213), says: if an ordinance so enacted is reasonable, it should be upheld, and if unreasonable it should be declared inoperative and void.' The ordinance, therefore, to be declared inoperative must be unreasonable upon its face and as a matter of law.

"The defendant contends that section 181 of the Sanitary Code is unreasonable and oppressive upon its face, because it prohibits the discharge of all 'dense smoke' from any building, place or premises within The City of New York irrespective of the color or the degree of soot, cinders or other injurious matter it may contain, if any; irrespective of the quantity or volume of the smoke emitted, and of the time or length of time the same is being discharged, and irrespective also of the locality or surroundings where the smoke is discharged.

"The ordinance upheld by the Court of Appeals in the case of the City of Rochester vs. Macauley-Fien Manufacturing Co. (199 N. Y., 207), is an example of a reasonable and proper ordinance regulating the emissions of smoke. That ordinance established a color scale determining by comparison the degree of darkness of smoke emitted, and forbade the emission of dark smoke from any fire not in motion for a period not exceeding five minutes whenever the successful operation of any fire necessarily required such escape. In writing the decision of the court in this case Judge Chase says: 'There is a great difference in the smoke, dirt and soot producing qualities of fuel, and in the furnaces where consumed and in the manner of stoking the fires, and as careless and unrestrained use of some fuels tends to produce and discharge into the atmosphere dirt and soot laden smoke that is disagreeable and injurious, the production and discharge of such smoke is of proper subject for reasonable police regulation.' The defendant urges that the said section 181 is unreasonable and oppressive, for the reason that it prohibits all dense smoke whether or not its emission be to the detriment or annoyance of the general public. In other words, it prohibits all dense smoke whether or not it actually constitutes a nuisance. This is clearly beyond the powers of the municipal authorities. The effect of such an ordinance is to make all dense smoke as a matter of law a nuisance, without adding the qualifying clause which would require such smoke to be a nuisance before falling within the operation of the law. In Commonwealth vs. Miller (129 Pa. St., 77), a conviction was reversed because the jury had not been allowed to receive evidence as to the location of the business, the length of time for which it had been carried on, its importance to the community, and the amount of capital invested, all of which, it was held, should have been taken into consideration in determining the question of nuisance.

"Further the said section 181 is unreasonable and oppressive because it applies generally to all emissions of dense smoke, and contains no qualifying clause

exempting from its operation cases where it might possibly be shown that no known fuel consumer, or device could have prevented such discharge. For the reason, therefore, that it makes no provision for cases where compliance is impossible, the ordinance is unreasonable and void. The City, in regulating lawful operations, and interfering with private property, must act reasonably, and cannot demand what is impossible. This ordinance, if unreasonable and oppressive, is necessarily unconstitutional and void. It is repugnant to the provisions of the Constitution of the United States and to section 6 of article 1 of the Constitution of the State of New York, which provides that no person shall be deprived of his liberty or property without due process of law. This ordinance, prohibiting as it does the emission of dense smoke, irrespective of reasonable definitions, limitations and qualifications, is a restriction upon the use of private property. The use of furnaces and boilers and the consequent emission of smoke is doubtless necessary to the enjoyment of the ownership of practically every building within The City of New York. A general and unqualified prohibition of the emission of all dense smoke under any and all circumstances, and at all times is such an unreasonable interference with the use of private property as to constitute a taking thereof without due process of law. In the case of *People vs. Transit Development Co.* (131 App. Div., 174), a business corporation had been organized to supply electric power for railroads. Hard coal was burned and particles of the same were emitted from the smoke stacks and blew into houses in the locality. The defendant was indicted for maintaining a public nuisance. Mr. Justice Miller, in writing the opinion of the Court, says: "The street railroads of New York City are a public necessity. While the defendant may not have legislative permission to run this power plant in the sense in which that term is now used, it does have the right to engage in the lawful business of supplying street railways with power; and mere discomfort arising therefrom to individuals which is only incidental, indeed it may be said necessary, to the existence of this great city, does not justify a public prosecution. Absolute rights cannot exist in organized society, and the denser the population the greater the city, the more the rules of give and take, of mutual sacrifice, come into play. Discomforts have to be borne in return for the advantages and conveniences of city life. Those living in manufacturing districts have to submit to what would not be allowed in strictly residential neighborhoods, and, in the mutual adjustment of things, find compensation in various ways." Whenever an ordinance is unreasonable and oppressive and interferes with the carrying on of lawful occupations and with the right of private property, and whenever it is repugnant to the Constitution, the court should declare the same to be inoperative and void."

DEATH RATE FOR THE WEEK.

There were 1,250 deaths, and a rate of 12.14 per 1,000 of the population reported during the week just passed, as against 1,309 deaths, and a rate of 13.20 for the corresponding week of 1912, a decrease of 59 deaths, and 1.06 points; if the increase in population be taken into consideration, the decrease is represented by 109 deaths.

The deaths from measles and scarlet fever were practically the same during the two weeks under comparison. Diphtheria increased from 14 to 23 deaths, an increase of about sixty per cent., while that from whooping cough was double that of last year. Typhoid fever showed a decreased mortality in harmony with the decreases reported every week since January 1, 1913. The most noteworthy decrease was that of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases under five years of age, the figures being 129 during the past week, against 186 in the corresponding week of 1912. The number of deaths reported from heat stroke was 3, as compared with 27 for the same week of 1912. There were 259 deaths reported of infants under one year of age, as against 328, a decrease of 69 deaths; there were 406 deaths reported of children under five, as against 453, a decrease of 47 deaths. At the ages of 65 years and over, there was a decrease of 17 deaths, and between five and sixty-five years of age an increase of 5 deaths.

The death rate for the first twenty-nine weeks of 1913, was 14.75, as against 14.89 per 1,000 during the corresponding period of 1912.

The average daily census of patients and inmates in the hospitals, schools for the feeble-minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm and other institutions of the Department for this quarter has been 11,203, as against 11,235 for the corresponding period of the preceding year.

The average daily census of employees in the Department during the quarter was 2,852, including therein the Nurses of the different institutions, their average daily census being 359.

REPORT OF THE SEA VIEW HOSPITAL, CASTLETON CORNERS, STATEN ISLAND.

April 1, 1913.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner:

Sir—I beg to submit the following report of this hospital for the quarter ending March 31, 1913:

No patients have yet been received and, therefore, no statistics are yet available for presentation.

The past three months have been of course the worst period of the year for construction work, which has been materially retarded, despite the winter season having been so mild. The inside work has also slowed down, partly owing to the necessity of carrying it on in connection with work on the outside, and partly to difficulty in deliveries in the winter season and bad condition of roads. Despite these interferences with progress on the contracts, considerable advance has been made.

Those of the buildings which have been substantially completed for some time past do not show much change, as the final finishing and cleaning work on them is not being done until arrangements are made for their acceptance by the department. On the other buildings and corridors not only has the rough work been fairly well completed, with which the steam, electric and plumbing installations have kept pace; but, with the exception of the Nurses' Home and Staff House, the painting, tile work, fitting up and placing of hardware and apparatus, and general finishing are well forward.

The rough grading work has recently been resumed, and foundations of all the roads have been made.

Owing to delays over which I understand the contractor has no control, work on the generating plant and switchboard remain at a standstill. The laundry machinery, however, is all in place and practically ready to operate.

Considerable difficulty has developed with dealers, who wish to make deliveries of equipment for which contracts were awarded them. By withholding official orders for delivery and inducing them to store the goods, we have managed up to the present

time without accepting anything but furniture from State Prison and the Penitentiary, for which orders were given about five months ago, and which they refused to hold longer. Even this has taxed the storage capacity of the farm kindly placed at my disposal by Mr. Flick, Superintendent. I fear that longer delay on our part in accepting goods from contractors will result in many cases in putting them to considerable loss, and that we may gain their ill will and have trouble when we are finally ready to accept deliveries. Regular and special requisitions for medical and surgical supplies have been filled for the following institutions, viz.: City Hospital, Blackwells Island, \$6,151.94; New York City Home for the Aged and Infirmary, Blackwells Island, \$1,386.87; Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwells Island, \$5,142.42; Randalls Island Hospitals, Randalls Island, \$1,195.16; Kings County Hospital, \$5,757.47; Bradford Street Hospital, \$5.07; Coney Island Hospital, \$655.26; Cumberland Street Hospital, \$1,107.09; Richmond Farm Colony, Staten Island, \$163.35; Municipal Lodging House, \$162.19; minor institutions, \$70.25; totals, \$21,797.07.

The repairs to surgical instruments and apparatus amounted to \$220.52.

The manufacturing bureau has prepared for the several institutions a large variety of pharmaceutical preparations, comprising 508 gallons fluid extracts and tinctures, 857 gallons elixirs and syrups, 1,736 gallons liniments, 713 gallons mixtures and solutions, 630 pounds ointments, 155 pounds powders, and numerous other articles.

The bureau of disinfectants has manufactured for the various City departments 6,100 gallon phenol disinfectant and other insecticides.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

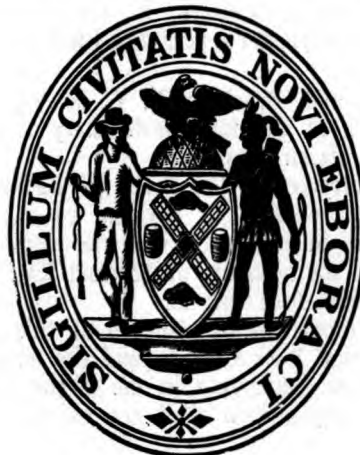

Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
