(At the meeting of the Board on April 3, 1913, the hearing in this matter was adjourned until April 24, 1913.)

*Public Hearing in the Matter of the Removal of Encroachments on Public Streets within 50 Feet from the Street Corner adjacent to Entrances to or Exits from Subway and Elevated Railroad Stations, Borough of Manhattan, except Newsstands of Types Approved by the Borough President (Cal. No. 2).*

(A resolution providing for this improvement was submitted to the Board on April 3, 1913, by the President of the Borough of Manhattan, and a hearing thereon was fixed for April 24, 1913.)

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been advertised.

No one appearing in favor of, or in opposition to, the proposed improvement, the hearing was closed.

On motion of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, the matter was referred back to him for further consideration.

*Public Hearing in the Matter of Omitting the Section of 6th Avenue, between 47th Street and 59th Street, from the Provisions of the Resolution Adopted on January 30, 1913, Directing the Removal of Encroachments on 6th Avenue, between 13th Street and 59th Street, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 3).*

The matter was withdrawn from the Calendar by the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

*Changing the Grade of East 138th Street, from Brown Place to St. Anns Avenue, and of Brook Avenue, from East 137th Street to East 139th Street, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 4).*

(At the close of the public hearing on April 10, 1913, this matter was laid over for two weeks.)

Mr. J. R. Halsey appeared and requested that action be deferred for two weeks.

On motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx the matter was again laid over for two weeks (May 8, 1913).

*Discontinuance of the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to West 168th Street, from Amsterdam Avenue to Jumel Place, Borough of Manhattan (Cal. No. 5).*

*Relief from Assessment in the Matter of the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to White Plains Road, from a Point Near Old Unionport Road to a Point Near Thwaites Place, and to the Area Between Bronx Park East and White Plains Road South of Bear Swamp Road, Borough of The Bronx (Cal. No. 7).*

(At the meeting of the Board on March 6 this matter was laid over for three weeks, on March 27 for two weeks and on April 10 for two weeks.)

The President of the Borough of The Bronx offered the following:

Whereas, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York is considering the advisability of amending the area of assessment in the proceeding instituted by said Board on December 30, 1909, for acquiring title to White Plains road, between a point near the old Unionport road and a point near Thwaites place, Borough of The Bronx, which proceeding was amended on May 4, 1911, so as to relate to White Plains road from a point near old Unionport road to a point near Thwaites place, and to the area between Bronx Park East and White Plains road south of the northerly line of Bear Swamp road, which had not previously been legally acquired.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, hereby gives notice that the following is the proposed amended area of assessment for benefit in this proceeding:

Beginning at a point on a line midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue distant 100 feet northerly from the northerly line of Mace avenue and running thence southwardly along a line always midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue and the prolongations of these streets as laid out immediately north and south of Bronx and Pelham Parkway to the intersection with the northwesterly line of the unnamed street adjoining the New York, Westchester and Boston Railroad on the west; thence southwardly in a straight line to a point on the southerly line of Bear Swamp Road where it is intersected by a line midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue as these streets adjoin Rhinelander avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Rhinelander avenue and Morris Park avenue as these streets are laid out between Wallace avenue and Barnes avenue; thence westwardly along the said line midway between Rhinelander avenue and Morris Park avenue and along the prolongation of the said line to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the prolongation of the westerly line of Unionport road as this street is laid out immediately north of Bronx Park East, the said distance being measured at right angles to Unionport road; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line of Unionport road and its prolongation to the intersection with the prolongation of a line distant 400 feet westerly from and parallel with the easterly line of Bronx Park East as this street is laid out between Brady avenue and Lydig avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Bronx Park East; thence northwardly along the said line parallel with Bronx Park East and along the prolongations of the said line to a point distant 100 feet westerly from the prolongation of the westerly line of Bronx Park East as this street adjoins Thwaites place, the said distance being measured at right angles to Bronx Park East; thence northwardly and always distant 100 feet westerly from and parallel with the westerly line

of Bronx Park East and its prolongation as laid out at Thwaites place to the intersection with a line parallel with Mace avenue and passing through the point of beginning; thence eastwardly along the said line parallel with Mace avenue to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That this Board consider the proposed amended area of assessment at a meeting of the Board to be held in The City of New York, Borough of Manhattan, in the City Hall, on the 29th day of May, 1913, at 10.30 a. m., and that at the same time and place a public hearing thereon will then and there be had.

Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board cause these resolutions and a notice to all persons affected thereby to be published in the CITY RECORD for ten days prior to the 29th day of May, 1913.

*Temporary Sewer in 15th Street, Between High Street and Schleicher Court, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 8).*

(At the meeting of the Board, on April 17, 1913, this matter was laid over for one week.)

On motion of the President of the Borough of Queens the matter was laid over for two weeks (May 8, 1913).

*Grading the Roadway of Belmont Place, from Vine Street to Fort Place, and Paving It with Bituminous Macadam, Borough of Richmond (Cal. No. 9).*

The Secretary presented the following:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, April 18, 1913.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on April 3, 1913, a resolution of the Local Board of the Staten Island District, Borough of Richmond, initiating proceedings to regulate and grade the roadway of Belmont place, between Vine street and Fort place, and to pave the same with preliminary bituminous macadam pavement, together with a report of the Chief Engineer of the Board upon this resolution, were referred to the Comptroller and the Chief Engineer for report on the advisability of authorizing the improvement, with the understanding that the contract to be made by the Borough President would include curbing and recurbing, the cost of which will be paid from the Repaving Bond Account.

The resolution of the Local Board makes no reference whatever to curb or recurbing or any work other than the regulating and grading and the paving of the roadway with bituminous macadam, although it appears to include "such other work as may be necessary to the completion of the work described." The quantities and estimated cost, however, include only excavation and bituminous macadam pavement. It appears, though, that it was the intention of the Borough authorities to curb and recurb the street and to charge that portion of the cost against the repaving bond fund, and the Borough President has stated that this is a practice which is usually followed in his Borough. We are informed that the present curbing on this street has been set from time to time by the abutting owners, and that, while the curb is not of the standard now used, it was of the quality which was in general use in the Borough at the time it was set.

The question involved in the carrying out of the plan proposed is a very important one, and the Board should make a determination as to its policy in such cases.

Section 948 of the Charter formerly forbade an assessment for the repaving of any street or portion thereof which had once been paved at the expense of the abutting owners, unless on petition of a majority of the owners of the property on the line of the proposed improvement. The various constructions which have been placed upon this provision have been more and more liberal to the abutting owners, and have gone so far as to say that the curbing and sidewalk flagging are pavements, and that the prohibition against assessment for repaving applies to the setting of new curb in place of old and to the reflagging of sidewalks, while it has even been stated that if a sidewalk were flagged for a very limited width, the laying of additional flagging or the flagging of the entire sidewalk would constitute a repaving, and that the cost of such repaving could not be assessed. In many cases where a roadway has been paved for a small portion of its width, it has been held that a complete pavement for the entire width of the roadway to take the place of the narrow strip of pavement formerly assessed is a repaving, and no portion of the cost should be assessed. Again, where roadways have been widened, the curb set back and pavements substituted for flagging, it has been held that this is all repaving, and that no portion could properly be assessed. The result of this policy has been to use an unduly large portion of the funds set aside for repaving for the paving of portions of the street which had not been previously paved according to the commonly accepted meaning of the word "pavement."

Chapter 484 of the Laws of 1912 amended section 948 of the Charter and authorized the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to determine what are permanent and what are preliminary pavements, with the provision that when a permanent pavement shall be substituted for a preliminary pavement which had been laid at the expense of the abutting owners, the difference between the cost of such preliminary pavement and the permanent pavement could be assessed. Acting upon the authority thus given, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 6, 1912, adopted a resolution classifying pavements. In this resolution neither curbing nor sidewalk flagging were defined as pavements, and it appears to us that they should no longer be treated as such, but that in the case under consideration, and in all other cases where in the improvement of a street pavement is laid upon any portion of the street not theretofore improved with any kind of pavement, the cost of the improvement of that portion of the street should be assessed upon the property benefited, and that the charges against the repaving fund should be limited in all cases to the replacement of a pavement already laid, while if the pavement already laid is a preliminary pavement as defined in section 948 of the Charter as amended, the difference between the cost of such preliminary pavement and the proposed new pavement shall be assessed.

We would recommend that the President of the Borough of Richmond present a new resolution which shall include all of the work which it is proposed to do in the improvement of Belmont place, between Vine street and Fort place, or that the improvement to be carried out under the present resolution be limited strictly to the work defined, that is, the laying of a preliminary bituminous macadam pavement. We would also recommend that in all boroughs wherever it is proposed to widen a roadway or to increase the width of pavement already laid by assessment, the cost of the additional pavement be met by assessment, and the use of the repaving fund be limited in all cases to the replacement of pavements already laid and assessed.

#### FRANCHISE MATTERS.

*Merchants' Refrigerating Company (Cal. No. 1).*

The public hearing was opened on the form of contract for the modification of contract dated October 21, 1910, granting the Merchants' Refrigerating Company a franchise to construct, maintain and operate conduits for the distribution of refrigeration in limited districts in the Borough of Manhattan, by increasing the minimum payments required thereunder so as to include those now required to be paid by the contract granting a franchise to the Harrison Street Cold Storage Company, which contract is to be surrendered; and increasing the security deposit so as to make such sum equal to the amount now on deposit by both Companies.

The hearing was fixed for this day by resolution adopted March 13, 1913.

Affidavits of publication were received from the New York "Times," "The Sun"

and the City Record. No one appeared in opposition to or in favor of the proposed modification and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The following was offered:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to certain modifications in the terms and conditions of the said contract of October 21, 1910, such modified terms and conditions being fully set forth and described in the following form of proposed contract, for the grant thereof, embodying such terms and conditions as modify or alter said contract of October 21, 1910, which said contract otherwise remains unchanged as to all the other terms and conditions expressed therein, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

This contract made this . . . day of . . . , 1913, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and the Merchants' Refrigerating Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseseth:

Whereas, The City by contract dated October 21, 1910, did grant to the Company the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate conduits in and under the surface of the streets in certain districts in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for the purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth, and

Whereas, The said Company has applied to the Board by a petition verified the 24th day of February, 1913, for a modification of the said contract, in accordance with said petition;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree, as follows:

Section 1. The City consents to such modification in and to the said contract, subject to the following conditions:

Section 2, Subdivision Second, paragraph (b) is hereby amended to read:

(b) From October 21, 1910, to the date of the execution of this contract by the Mayor, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than eight hundred dollars (\$800), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800).

From the date of the execution of this contract by the Mayor to October 21, 1915, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than sixteen hundred dollars (\$1,600), and which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of sixteen hundred dollars (\$1,600).

During the second term of five years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than twenty-four hundred dollars (\$2,400) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-four hundred dollars (\$2,400).

During the third term of five years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than three thousand dollars (\$3,000) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

Section 2. Subdivision 23, paragraph 1, is hereby amended by providing that the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500) shall be deposited with the Comptroller of the City in lieu and in place of the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000) named therein.

Section 2. This contract shall take effect on the date of the execution thereof by the Mayor.

Section 3. All the terms and conditions contained in the said contract dated October 21, 1910, shall remain unchanged, except as hereinabove modified.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In Witness Whereof, The party of the first part, by its Mayor, hereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed, and the corporate seal of said City, to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers hereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

The following was offered:

Whereas, By contract dated October 21, 1910, the Merchants' Refrigerating Company was granted a franchise to construct, maintain and operate conduits, with the necessary branches and connections therefrom leading directly into private property, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, in and under the streets, avenues and highways in the Borough of Manhattan within the district known as District No. 2, bounded and described as follows:

On the north by the centre line of Harrison street, between Greenwich and Washington streets; on the west by an irregular line formed by the centre lines of Washington street and Jay street, the westerly line of West street and the centre lines of Duane street, Washington street, Warren street and Greenwich street; on the south by the centre line of Murray street, between Greenwich street and West Broadway, and on the east by an irregular line formed by the centre line of West Broadway, the centre line of Hudson street, the centre line of Duane street prolonged in a straight line to the centre line of Hudson street, and the centre line of Greenwich street; and

Whereas, Section 1 of said contract provides that upon the written application of the said company, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may, by resolution, extend the lines of the district hereinbefore described to all or any part of the district specified in said contract and known as District No. 3, bounded and described as follows:

On the north by the centre line of Hubert street; on the west by the westerly line of West street; on the south by the centre line of Murray street; on the east by an irregular line formed by the centre lines of West Broadway, Franklin street, Varick street, Beach street and Hudson street; and

Whereas, The Merchants' Refrigerating Company applied to the Board, under date of February 24, 1913, for permission to extend the district within which it may operate, so as to include the territory now covered by the franchise heretofore granted by the Board, by contract dated December 27, 1909, to the Harrison Street Cold Storage Company; and

Whereas, Such territory is located within the boundary lines of said District No. 3, above described; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby extends the boundary lines of District No. 2, above described, so as to include therein the territory bounded and described as follows:

On the north by North Moore street, between West and Hudson streets, and by Franklin street, between Hudson street and West Broadway; on the east by West Broadway, between Hudson street and Reade street; on the south by Reade street, between West Broadway and Hudson street, Duane street, between Hudson and Greenwich streets, Harrison street, between Greenwich and Washington streets, and Jay street, between Washington and West streets; on the west by West street; and also the single block bounded by Duane street, Washington street, Reade street and West street;

—and be it further

Resolved, That this extension shall take effect and become operative on the date of the execution by the Mayor of the contract this day authorized by the Board amending and modifying as to amount of minimum annual payments and security deposit the said contract between The City of New York and the Merchants' Re-



frigerating Company dated October 21, 1910, provided the Merchants' Refrigerating Company shall duly execute an instrument in writing, to the satisfaction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, accepting such grant, and file the same in the office of the said Board within thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution, wherein said Company shall promise, covenant and agree that the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment so given to the extension of the boundary lines of District No. 2, as hereinabove specified, shall not in anywise change, alter or amend any of the terms, conditions and requirements in the original contract fixed and contained.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

#### Harrison Street Cold Storage Company (Cal. No. 2).

The public hearing was opened on the petition of the Harrison Street Cold Storage Company for the consent of the Board to surrender and have cancelled contract dated December 27, 1909, by and between the Company and the City, authorizing the Company to install, maintain and use pipes in certain districts in the Borough of Manhattan for the distribution of refrigeration to consumers.

At the meeting of April 24, 1913, the hearing was continued until this day so that this matter could be considered in conjunction with the application of the Merchants' Refrigerating Company for a modification of the contract granting said Company a franchise which Company proposes to operate in the territory covered by the grant to this Company.

An affidavit of publication of the notice of the continued hearing was received from the CITY RECORD. No one appeared in opposition or in favor and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The following was offered:

Whereas, By contract dated December 27, 1909, by and between The City of New York and the Harrison Street Cold Storage Company, the said Company was granted the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits, with the necessary branches and connections therefrom leading directly into private property, for the purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, in and under the surface of the streets in two specified districts in the Borough of Manhattan, known as the smaller and larger districts, respectively; and

Whereas, By resolution of this Board adopted and approved March 18, 1910, the smaller district named therein was extended, pursuant to the terms of such contract; and

Whereas, The said Company, under date of February 24, 1913, applied to the Board for its consent to the surrender and cancellation of said contract; and

Whereas, The Board adopted a resolution on February 27, 1913, fixing March 13, 1913, as the date for a public hearing on such application, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, notice of which hearing was published for at least two days in "The Times" and "Evening Mail," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the CITY RECORD for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of such hearing, and the public hearing was held on such date; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to the surrender and cancellation of the contract dated December 27, 1909, by and between The City of New York and the said Harrison Street Cold Storage Company, as modified by resolution of the Board adopted and approved March 18, 1910, and hereby accepts said surrender of the rights and privileges granted by said contract, to take effect on the date of the execution by the Mayor of the contract this day authorized, amending and modifying the contract heretofore entered into between The City of New York and the Merchants' Refrigerating Company, dated October 21, 1910, provided the said Harrison Street Cold Storage Company shall deliver up to the Board the duplicate original contract dated December 27, 1909, now in its possession; and be it further

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized to return to the said Harrison Street Cold Storage Company the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), heretofore deposited with him as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the said contract of December 27, 1909, upon the payment by the Company of all sums which may, on the date of the taking effect of this consent, be due to the City under the said contract.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

#### Electric Protection Company of New York (Cal. No. 3).

The public hearing was opened on the petition of the Electric Protection Company of New York for the consent of the Board to surrender contract dated March 1, 1911, by and between the Company and the City, granting said Company a franchise to construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in the Borough of Manhattan and the portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying west of the Bronx River for the purpose of electrically connecting its detecting and signalling apparatus to be located upon premises of subscribers with signal recording apparatus to be located at some suitable point or points and thereby maintaining and operating burglary and fire alarm systems.

The hearing was fixed for this day by resolution adopted March 27, 1913.

Affidavits of publication were received from the "Herald," "The Sun" and the CITY RECORD.

The Secretary presented the following:

Bureau of Franchises, April 19, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—The Electric Protection Company of New York, by a petition dated March 17, 1913, signed by Alfred J. Johnson, President, and presented to the Board at its meeting held March 27, makes application—

(a) That it be permitted to surrender, irrevocably, its franchise and contract with the City, dated March 1, 1911; and

(b) That upon the consummation of such surrender The City of New York repay to the Company the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), now on deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York, or such part thereof as may seem just and equitable.

This petition states that the Company has not commenced to avail itself in any respect whatsoever of the privileges granted to it by the said contract and that it finds itself unable to use the said privileges and benefits of said franchise and desires to surrender the same. It also states that it has no subscribers for the use of its proposed service, so that the termination of its franchise would not result in embarrassment or inconvenience to third parties, and that no competing companies have been deprived of the right to furnish a similar service by reason of the franchise granted to the Protection Company.

It is admitted in the petition that the Company has not made the annual payment due November 1, 1912, but the claim is made that inasmuch as the Company has made no use of the franchise, nor imposed any burden nor enjoyed any easement upon, in or under the streets of the City by virtue of said franchise, it is justly entitled to surrender the same, absolving the City from all liability whatsoever to the Company thereunder, and in return therefor should be refunded its security deposit of \$5,000.

Upon the presentation of this petition to the Board at its meeting held March 27, a resolution was adopted fixing a public hearing upon the said petition for Thursday, April 24, 1913, and providing for due publication of the notice of the said hearing.

The "Electric Protection Company of New York" was incorporated by a certificate of incorporation filed under the Transportation Corporations Law in the office of the Secretary of State on June 1, 1909, with a capital stock of \$5,000, later increased to \$100,000. On September 15, 1909, it petitioned the Board for the grant of the right or franchise to lay, erect, construct and maintain wires and other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes, conduits and appliances in, over and under the streets, avenues, highways, etc., within the territory of The City of New York, the wires to be used in the operation of electrical call boxes in connection with telephone, telegraph and other systems for providing calls and signals for electric protection service.

Upon due consideration of this matter and after various tests for the purpose of demonstrating the feasibility of the system proposed to be used, the Board, by resolutions adopted February 2, 1911, approved by the Mayor February 3, 1911, authorized the Mayor to execute a contract with the Company, granting it the privilege of

using the streets within the Borough of Manhattan and that portion of the Borough of The Bronx lying west of the Bronx River, and, in addition, authorized and required a supplementary agreement providing for granting the Company the privilege of making installations of its apparatus in either Fire or Police Headquarters. Both the agreement and contract were executed by the Company and by the Mayor and are dated March 1, 1911. The franchise contract so executed is the one which the Company now desires to surrender.

Under and in accordance with the provisions of the supplementary agreement executed on the date of the execution of the franchise contract, the Board, at its meeting held March 16, 1911, granted the Company permission to install signal recording apparatus in Fire Headquarters, upon condition that it obtain the additional consent of the Fire Commissioner to make such installation and connection. This consent was expressly stated to be revocable at any time by the Board. The Company had prior to this date and on July 23, 1909, obtained a similar permit from the then Fire Commissioner.

During the course of the proceedings had by the Board prior to the granting of the franchise, several protests were made by various interests, and notices were served upon the Board regarding alleged patent infringements by the Company in the system proposed to be used by it. Among other notices of this character, attention must be called to the fact that Alice M. Crooker, under date of December 7, 1910, addressed a communication to the Board, alleging that under date of January 8, 1909, an agreement was entered into between her and Albert Goldstein the President of the Electric Protection Company, under which two-thirds of all the rights and assets enjoyed and owned by the said Company were assigned to her, in consideration of advancing money for the development and perfection of such rights and assets, which money, it was claimed, she did subsequently advance. Her communication states that it

"is to notify you that I do not join in, and expressly disapprove the application now pending before you, and to further notify you that I have and claim under the said agreement \* \* \* a two-thirds interest of all of the assets and rights of the Electric Protection Company of New York and as such two-third owner I demand that no action be taken upon the said application until such time as the courts shall have an opportunity to pass upon the whole question \* \* \*"

She also stated in her communication that she had that day brought suit against Albert Goldstein and the Electric Protection Company to enforce her rights.

Notice was also served by T. H. S. Cone, as agent for the Aero Fire Alarm Company, Limited (American rights), to the effect that the Electric Protection Company had no authority to install any fire alarm system employing the Aero System (the one proposed to be used) and that all infringements upon the rights of the owners of the said Aero patents would be vigorously prosecuted.

The action of Alice M. Crooker involves the internal corporate management of the Company and did not necessarily affect the feasibility or desirability of granting it a franchise, and the question as to patent rights was, as stated in my report presented to the Board May 20, 1910, "one which must be determined between the parties interested. Should the applicant company exceed its patent rights and infringe upon the rights of any other company or patentees, then, no doubt, it can be restrained from operation, and the rights of the Aero Fire Alarm Company, Ltd., fully protected."

As the Electric Protection Company of New York is so intimately connected with the International Electric Protection Company, some record must be made here of this relationship.

Under date of December 21, 1911, and upon request from this Bureau, Mr. A. J. Johnson, the President of the Electric Protection Company, stated that out of the total of one thousand shares of the capital stock of that Company outstanding, 944 shares were owned by the International Electric Protection Company, 6 shares were held between the directors of the Company and the remaining 50 shares were outstanding in other names. This stock is stated to have been acquired by the International Company in the year 1910, and, of course, vests the International Electric Protection Company with the fullest possible measure of control of the Electric Protection Company. The latter Company does not appear to have any bonds outstanding and any property held by it is not therefore subject to foreclosure and sale following a possible default in the payment of interest. The International Company is also the owner of the patents which the Electric Protection Company had proposed to use.

The Electric Protection Company, as before stated, asserts in its petition for the surrender of its franchise that it has not conducted any operations under the same. This is emphatically the case. When the Company, under date of February 27, 1912, requested the Board to grant an extension of time for a period of twelve months within which to commence the operation of its system, pursuant to the franchise, this Bureau ascertained that the only observance of the provisions of the said franchise contract which had been made by the Company, itself, was the paying of the initial payment and the minimum sum due for the year ending September 30, 1911, and the deposit by it of the security fund of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) with the Comptroller, as required by the Twentieth subdivision of Section 2 of the contract. No apparent attempt had then been made to operate, nor has any attempt been made to this day. This Bureau has been in communication with the various departments to which application should be made for permission to use the streets for the purpose of installing electrical conductors or other structures therein, and has been advised by them that no applications were ever made by the Company, nor have any permits ever been granted to it. The Fire Commissioner also states in his communication that the Company has never availed itself of the permit granted to it to install apparatus in Fire Headquarters. The application for an extension of time made by the Company under date of February 27, 1912, was reported on by this Bureau in a report presented to the Board April 11, 1912, and it was therein recommended that the said application be denied. However, upon motion of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, the matter was laid over for one year. The reason for this application was the existence in the contract of a provision to the effect that if the Company should not conduct operations for a period of twelve consecutive months, the Board might declare the right and franchise and the contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity. At the time the application was reported upon, the Company was in default under this provision and remains in default to the present day. However, in view of its present attitude, it does not seem to be necessary now to take advantage of this provision, provided that the City can be fully protected and compensated for consenting to the surrender by the Company of its franchise contract.

The investigation made by this Bureau of the petition for such surrender has revealed the fact that under date of March 6, 1913, a formal demand was made by the Comptroller on the Company for the payment of the annual charge due for the year ending September 30, 1912, which had not theretofore been paid. This demand was made pursuant to subdivision Twentieth of Section 2 of the contract, but the only answer made thereto was an acknowledgment of such notification, signed by the President of the Company. The Comptroller on April 3, 1913, advised this Bureau that the Company had not made this payment up to that time.

The Company has also informed this Bureau that the action of Alice M. Crooker is still pending before the courts and has furnished a copy of the complaint and of the answer of the Company to the same. This action was brought against the Company and Albert Goldstein to enforce the agreement of January 8, 1909, heretofore referred to, and the complaint demands judgment that the plaintiff be declared to be the owner of and entitled to all inventions, patents and applications for patents, etc., useful in connection with the electrical service business, automatic fire alarm service, etc., which are owned by the defendants or either of them, and that said defendants be directed and ordered to assign the same to the plaintiff; that she be decreed to be the owner of and entitled to the transfer of one-half of the capital stock of the plaintiff and that the defendant, Goldstein, be directed and ordered to account to her for all moneys received by him from said plaintiff under the contract, and that she have such other and further relief as may be just. The answer of the Electric Protection Company denies the making of the contract as pleaded, and among other things asserts that the said agreement was entered into between defendant Goldstein and one Robert L. McElroy, by and through the plaintiff as his agent, and that later the said defendant Goldstein had compromised as to his liability under the said agreement with Robert L. McElroy, which compromise was still executory, not having been performed by the said McElroy, and the defendant demands judgment that the said McElroy be decreed and directed to perform his agreement, that the complaint be dismissed and that the defendant have such other and further relief as may be just. The defendant, McElroy, is joined in the action by an order of the court made and entered on or about January 27, 1913. The agreement which is the basis of the action is in the form of a letter addressed to A. M. Crooker by Albert Goldstein and dated January 8, 1909. Pursuant to this, it appears that the



defendant Goldstein is to devote his time and attention to the prosecution of the business in the development of an electrical signal business, consisting of automatic fire alarm service in New York, Philadelphia and Boston only, in improving municipal fire alarm equipments wherever situated, under the instructions of the plaintiff, assigning to her all United States patents or applications for patents, she to advance the necessary money. The amounts advanced were to be returned to her out of the first earnings and the amount remaining was to be divided into three equal parts, the plaintiff to take two parts and the defendant Goldstein to take the other part. The agreement provides for incorporation, etc., but does not in any particular refer to proposed operations of a nature requiring a franchise. The decision as to incorporation appears to have been lodged with the plaintiff.

I do not believe that upon consideration of the plaintiff's communication to the Board under date of December 7, 1910, of the agreement itself or of the action brought thereon, that the said plaintiff would be affected in any way were the present petition of the Company to be granted.

There is also one other action pending in the courts which indirectly affects this Company, and that is the matter of the Automatic Fire Protection Company against Albert Goldstein and the International Electric Protection Company, the same being in equity before the Circuit Court of the United States for the Southern District of New York. This action is also brought on an agreement made between Albert Goldstein and the Automatic Fire Protection Company under date of November 16, 1903, under which it is claimed that Goldstein agreed to transfer, assign and set over to the Automatic Fire Protection Company all inventions, improvements, patents and applications for patents relating to automatic and manual fire alarm devices and to sprinkler alarm and sprinkler supervisory devices, etc., then held by him or in which he had any interest, together with all inventions and improvements thereafter to be made by him in relation thereto. Under this agreement, the Automatic Fire Protection Company is attempting to obtain the assignment to it of practically every patent owned by the International Electric Protection Company, whether patented by Goldstein or by others. The answer of the defendant Goldstein is to the effect that the agreement contemplated only those patents and applications for patents at that time in existence or then being made and did not, either by its terms or as understood by the parties, refer to any future patents or applications for patents, and by other allegations denies or otherwise repudiates the allegations of the complaint. The International Electric Protection Company in its answer claims that it is a bona fide purchaser for value of the ownership and of the control of patents held by it and that it had no knowledge of the agreement alleged in the complaint.

It appears that the Automatic Fire Protection Company is a Maine corporation which is affiliated in the furnishing of fire alarm service with the American District Telegraph Company of New Jersey, controlled by the Western Union Telegraph Company. Robert L. McElroy, who was made a party to the Crocker action, is also interested in the other action, as he is the President of the Automatic Fire Protection Company.

This action, relating as it does entirely to patents, cannot, of course, be affected by the conclusion which the Board may come to with respect to the requested surrender of the franchise contract of the Electric Protection Company.

An attempt was made to ascertain if either the Electric Protection Company or the International Electric Protection Company had at any time made representations concerning the franchise acquired by the Electric Protection Company for the purpose of disposing of stock in either of the two companies, and in this connection an inspection was made of the various pamphlets and documents which the International Company caused to be distributed. The Electric Protection Company itself advises that the International Company's stock was all issued against patents and other property not related to the franchise and that it never sold shares based on representations as to that grant, and that the stock of the Electric Protection Company itself was issued against patents and its floating debt, amounting at \$25,035.13, arose through advances made to it by the International Company in connection with payments under and other expenses necessary in the obtaining of its franchise.

The Electric Protection Company is stated to own one patent at the present time, the use of which it has given to the International Company, and the International Company's operations are stated to be mainly in isolated plants outside of the City and State.

So far as this Bureau could ascertain, none of the literature distributed by the last-named company requests or solicits subscriptions to stock, although extracts from the report of this Bureau upon the application of the Electric Protection Company and other official statements have been used in the nature of an endorsement of a system the patents for which are controlled by the said International Company. The only literature which appears to have been put out by the Electric Protection Company is a facsimile typewritten letter under the letterhead of the International Electric Protection Company, issued some time prior to March 20, 1911, stating that it had been authorized to operate in The City of New York under the patents of the International Company and that it was then ready to submit estimates for furnishing automatic or manual fire alarm protection with direct communication with Fire Headquarters. Whether the Company had permission to make this connection with Fire Headquarters is doubtful, as the consent of the Board was conditioned upon the additional consent of the Fire Commissioner, and the only consent which was obtained from the Fire Commissioner was one granted under date of July 23, 1909, already mentioned upon the express condition that the Company apply for and obtain a franchise from the City before using the same.

The Fire Commissioner, in a communication to this Bureau, under date of March 15, 1912, stated that as this permit was granted by a former Fire Commissioner, and that as no use of the same had been made during the tenure of office of the Commissioner granting it, he considered that the same had lapsed.

It would therefore appear that the present status of the Company is as follows:

1. The Company has defaulted in the observance of the underlying principle of its franchise in having failed to furnish or begin to furnish to the public the service contemplated in the same, this being the main consideration for a grant authorizing the use of public streets.
2. The contract is subject to forfeiture for non-operation under the express provision governing failure to operate contained in subdivision Seventeenth of Section 2 thereof.
3. The Company, on April 3, 1913, was in default to the City in the sum of Twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200), and there was an additional Six hundred dollars (\$600) justly due to the City as the proportion of the annual charge for the six months ending March 31, 1913.
4. The failure to use the consent granted by the Fire Commissioner appears to have worked a forfeiture of the same.

It would therefore seem that unless there is objection on the part of third parties who may have become involved in the matter through any acts of the Company, and regarding whom this Bureau has not obtained any information, the City (unless it desires to enforce the letter of the contract) can grant the petition of the Company and allow it to surrender its franchise contract. However, if such petition be granted, I would recommend that the Company be required, as a condition for the refund to it of its security deposit, to pay all moneys due from it to the City at the rate of Twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) a year up to and including the date of the approval by the Mayor of the consent to the surrender of the franchise contract, together with interest at the rate of six per cent. on the sum due November 1, 1912, which has not been paid by the Company, and that the Board, in addition to authorizing the Company to surrender its contract, revoke its consent to the installation of signal recording apparatus in Fire Headquarters, granted March 16, 1911, and direct the Fire Commissioner to expressly revoke the permit granted by his predecessor to the Company for the same purpose, on July 23, 1909.

It may be noted in connection with the recommendation regarding the payment of the sum of Twelve hundred dollars (\$1,200) per year, that the Company itself, by its petition of February 27, 1912, for an extension of time within which to begin operations, already referred to, affirmatively placed itself on record as desiring, and made such efforts as were possible to continue the life of the contract to the present time. It is therefore in accordance with its own request that the City has to this date kept itself ready to carry out the said franchise contract and authorize the Company, upon application, to use the streets in the operation of its proposed system.

Under the circumstances, the Company should be required to recompense the City to the extent fixed by the contract.

I am therefore submitting proposed forms of resolutions, granting the petition of the Company, on condition that it pay the sums due to the City before obtaining the surrender of its security deposit, and also revoking the consent of the Board to the installation of recording apparatus by it in Fire Headquarters and directing

the Fire Commissioner to revoke the consent of his Department for the same purpose. Respectfully,

No one appeared in opposition. Robert Walker, Counsel for the company, requested action be deferred for four weeks. The hearing was then continued until May 22, 1913.

#### Rapid Transit Railway—Park Avenue-Lexington Avenue Connection at 40th Street (Cal. No. 4).

The Board proceeded with the consideration of the communication from the Public Service Commission for the First District, transmitting resolutions as to route and general plan of construction for an additional rapid transit railway in the Borough of Manhattan, known as Park Avenue-Lexington Avenue Connection at 40th Street, and requesting the approval and consent of this Board thereto.

This communication was presented to the Board at the meeting of April 17, 1913, when the consideration was fixed for this day and the communication referred to the Transit Committee and to the Transit Conference Committee.

An affidavit of publication was received from the City Record.  
Hon. Jacob A. Cantor and a representative of the Forty-second Street Association requested a hearing before action was taken. The matter was referred to the Transit Conference Committee to act jointly with a committee from the Public Service Commission for the First District and afford a hearing to those interested and the consideration was continued until May 22, 1913.

#### Communications from the Mayor's Office (Cal. No. 5).

Communications were received from the Mayor's Office, returning duly approved by his Honor, the Mayor, on April 14, 1913, resolutions adopted by this Board April 10, 1913, granting certain privileges and designating newspapers as follows:

(a) Granting the consent of the City as an abutting property owner to a change of motive power by the Belt Line Railway Corporation from horse power to the storage battery system of electrically operated cars upon certain streets and avenues in the Borough of Manhattan.

(b) Granting the Brooklyn City Railroad Company permission to construct, maintain and operate by the overhead system a spur track from its northerly track in Flushing avenue, to and into the premises of Meurer Bros. Company, known as 575 Flushing avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

(c) Designating "The Sun" and the "Times" as the two daily newspapers in which the petition and notice of hearing thereon of the Union Railway Company of New York City for a modification of contract granting said Company a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway on 155th street, from 8th avenue to Broadway, shall be published prior to the hearing on May 8, 1913.

(d) Designating the "Evening Mail" and the "New York Press" as the two daily newspapers in which the petition and notice of hearing thereon of the Union Railway Company of New York City for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate certain extensions on 136th street, Willis avenue and 125th street and other streets, Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, shall be published prior to the hearing on May 8, 1913.

Returning duly approved by his Honor the Mayor on April 18, 1913, resolutions adopted by this Board April 17, 1913, granting certain privileges and designating newspapers as follows:

(e) Granting the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company permission to construct, maintain and use a single span steel bridge over and across Dey street, west of Church street, Borough of Manhattan, connecting the seventeenth floors of the Company's terminal buildings on opposite sides of said street.

(f) Designating the Brooklyn "Times" and the "Citizen" as the two daily newspapers in which the petition and notice of hearing thereon of the Seaboard Refrigeration Company for a modification of contract granting said Company a franchise shall be published prior to the hearing on May 8, 1913.

Which were ordered filed.

#### Stage Coach Companies—Operation and Control—Need of Legislation (Cal. No. 6).

Communications were received from the Secretary to the Lieutenant-Governor, and the Chairman of the Committee on Affairs of Cities, acknowledging receipt of resolution adopted by this Board April 10, 1913, requesting the Legislature to enact into law the Pollock-Walker bill for the control of stage coach companies. The latter communication states the matter is now before the Rules Committee. Upon receipt of this information a certified copy of the resolution was forwarded to the Chairman of said Committee.

The communications were ordered filed.

The President of the Borough of Manhattan offered the following:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York did on April 10, 1913, adopt resolutions reading as follows:

"Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York did, by motion duly adopted at the meeting of March 27, 1913, authorize its Franchise Committee, consisting of his Honor the Mayor, the Comptroller and the President of the Board of Aldermen, to confer with a committee appointed by the Public Service Commission for the First District on the advisability of requesting the State Legislature to enact into law the pending bill prepared by the Corporation Counsel of this City, under the direction of this Board, for the control of stage coach companies, known as the Pollock-Walker Bill, Assembly Int. No. 1176, Printed No. 1704, and Senate Int. No. 936, Printed No. 1175; and

"Whereas, The joint Committee fixed April 2, 1913, as the date for hearing to those in opposition and on that day heard the representatives of the railroad companies operating in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn; and

"Whereas, After mature deliberation the joint Committee decided that the best interests of the City required that said bill should be pressed for passage without amendment; now therefore be it

"Resolved, That the Cities Committees of the Senate and of the Assembly be and they are hereby requested to present a favorable report upon the Pollock-Walker bill for the control of stage coach companies at the earliest possible moment; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Legislature of the State of New York be and it is hereby requested to enact the Pollock-Walker bill, without amendment, into law, in the interests of Home Rule, to abate a legalized and uncontrolled monopoly and to place all applicants for stage coach franchises on equal terms so that it may be possible for the local authorities to determine the merits of each application and for the Public Service Commission to pass upon the convenience and the necessity of the same; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Secretary of this Board be and he is hereby directed to forward copies of these resolutions to the Chairmen of the Cities Committees of the Senate and of the Assembly, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the Assembly, the Hon. Robert F. Wagner, Temporary President of the Senate; the Hon. James J. Walker, the Hon. Henry W. Pollock and the Hon. Edward J. McGoldrick, Assistant Corporation Counsel, representing The City of New York, at Albany, New York; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York emphatically reaffirms these resolutions and is unequivocally in favor of the enactment into law of such remedial legislation; and

Whereas, Said Pollock-Walker Bill is in the Committee on Cities of the Senate and in the Committee on Rules of the Assembly, and unless said Committees report favorably on said bill immediately so that it may be enacted into law at the present session of the Legislature, a legalized and uncontrolled monopoly will continue to exist in the City of New York to the detriment of the interests of the City and contrary to the principles of Home Rule and Fair Play; now therefore be it

Resolved, That his Excellency, the Governor of the State of New York, be and he is hereby requested by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, acting for and in the best interests of said City, to prepare an emergency message to both Houses of the Legislature requesting immediate consideration and favorable action on the Pollock-Walker Bill so as to cure the defects in the existing law and place all applicants for stage coach franchises on an equal basis.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

#### Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company (Cal. No. 7).

In the matter of the operation of a street surface railway by the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company upon and along Utica avenue, from Church



avenue to Avenue N, Borough of Brooklyn, without authority.

By resolution adopted March 27, 1913, the company was directed to present an application in writing for the right to continue such operation on or before April 4, 1913, and in the event of its failure or neglect to comply therewith the Borough President was directed to remove the tracks.

At the meeting of April 10, 1913, a communication was received from the company stating the question of the validity of the franchise was being investigated by the Public Service Commission, but no decision had been reached, and requesting it be afforded a hearing before action was taken.

The matter was then laid over until this day and the Secretary directed to forward copies of the report of the Bureau of Franchises, the resolution of March 27, 1913, and the reply of the Company to the Public Service Commission for the First District with the request that it advise the Board if it is the intention of the Commission to determine the question at issue before it at an early date.

The Secretary presented the following:

State of New York, Public Service Commission for the First District, Tribune Building, 154 Nassau Street, New York, April 21, 1913.

Hon. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, 277 Broadway, City:

Sir—In reply to your communication of the 10th instant, transmitting certain papers relative to the franchise rights of the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company on Utica avenue, between Church avenue and Avenue N, I am directed to reply as follows:

The proceeding in Case No. 1253 was, like many other inquiries conducted by the Commission, merely an investigation to determine the facts, and the hearing order did not indicate that any action would be taken by the Commission. In this inquiry, the fundamental question was whether the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban had legal right to construct and operate a railroad on certain streets, including Utica avenue. It is obvious that if the Commission were to come to the conclusion from the evidence presented that the company did not have a legal right, such finding would not be conclusive, for the question would ultimately have to be determined by the courts. Hence, there is no matter awaiting adjudication in Case No. 1253 which could be finally settled by this Commission. If the Board of Estimate and Apportionment should determine to institute an action in the courts to test the company's rights, it would in no way conflict with the investigation made by the Commission but would aid in the settlement of the question which led to the inquiry. The Commission will be glad to furnish a copy of the record in the case, if your Honorable Board so desires. Respectfully,

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held March 27, 1913, resolutions were adopted directing the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company to present to this Board, on or before April 4, 1913, an application in writing, duly verified, for the right to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Utica avenue, from Church avenue to Avenue N, in the Borough of Brooklyn, and, in case of the failure of said Company so to do, the Secretary was directed to notify said Company to stop the operation of its cars over said line, and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to remove the tracks from Utica avenue between said limits.

At the meeting of April 10, 1913, a communication was received from the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company, asserting that this matter was in the hands of the Public Service Commission for the First District, which Commission was making an investigation as to the rights of the Company in said street, and submitting that the Board should take no action until this case should be determined. The Board thereupon communicated with the Public Service Commission, requesting to be advised if it is the intention of said Commission to determine the question at issue at an early date, and laid the matter over until to-day's meeting.

A communication has just been received from the Public Service Commission for the First District, in which it is stated that the proceeding in Case No. 1253 is merely an investigation by the Commission to determine the facts as to the legal rights of the said Company to construct and operate a railroad on certain streets, including Utica avenue, and that any conclusion reached by the Commission that the Company has not a legal right would not be conclusive, for the question would ultimately have to be determined by the courts, and stating further that there is no matter awaiting adjudication in this case which could be finally settled by the Public Service Commission. The communication concludes by stating that should the Board of Estimate and Apportionment institute an action in the courts to test the Company's rights, it would in no way conflict with the investigation by the Commission, but would aid in the settlement of the question which led to the inquiry, and that the Commission will be glad to furnish a copy of the report in the case if the Board so desires.

In view of the foregoing, I would suggest that the action previously taken by the Board in calling upon the Company to submit a petition for the right to operate and, in case of failure so to do, that it be notified to stop operation of the cars, which was deferred on account of the communication received from the Company at the meeting of April 10, be again taken, and I submit a resolution to that effect, calling upon the Company to submit such verified petition on or before May 2, 1913.

Whereas, The Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company has constructed and is operating a street surface railway upon and along Utica avenue, from Church avenue to Avenue N, Borough of Brooklyn, without first having obtained proper legal authority therefor; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company be and it is hereby directed to present to this Board, on or before May 2, 1913, an application in writing, duly verified, praying for the right to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Utica avenue, from Church avenue to Avenue N, Borough of Brooklyn; and be it further

Resolved, That should the said Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company fail or neglect to submit such application to this Board on or before said date, the Secretary of this Board is hereby directed to notify said Company to stop the operation of cars over said line, and the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to remove the tracks from within the limits of Utica avenue, between Church avenue and Avenue N.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

Union Railway Company of New York City (Cal. No. 8).

A communication was received from the Union Railway Company of New York City transmitting consents of abutting property owners to the construction, maintenance and operation of its street surface railway upon and along Morris avenue, from 161st to 167th streets, Borough of The Bronx, under and pursuant to section 2, first of the contract dated February 11, 1913, granting said Company a franchise.

Which was referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

Union Railway Company of New York City (Cal. No. 9).

A communication was received from the Public Service Commission for the First District transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by said Commission directing a hearing upon the application of the Union Railway Company of New York City for the approval of the exercise of its franchise on 230th street, from Bailey avenue to Broadway, Borough of The Bronx.

A communication was received from the Public Service Commission for the First District transmitting certified copy of an order adopted by said Commission discontinuing the proceeding for the approval of street railroad extension on 230th street; also certified copy of order adopted by the Commission determining the grade of crossing of street railway extension on 230th street with the tracks of the Putnam Division of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company.

Which were ordered filed.

Union Railway Company of New York City (Cal. No. 10).

In the matter of the consents of abutting property owners to the construction, maintenance and operation of a street surface railway by the Union Railway Company of New York City on 230th street, from Bailey avenue to Broadway, Borough of The Bronx, as an extension to its existing system.

These consents were presented to the Board at the meeting of April 10, 1913, and were referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

The Secretary presented the following:

Bureau of Franchises, April 17, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—The contract dated January 3, 1913, between the City of New York and the Union Railway Company of New York City for the construction, maintenance and operation of a street surface railway extension upon and along West 230th Street from Bailey Avenue to Broadway, Borough of The Bronx, provides in Section 2—First thereof, as follows:

"First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months, or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine."

Pursuant to this provision, the Company on April 3, 1913, filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment certified copies of the consents of abutting property owners along the route of the grant.

An examination of the consents shows that the total assessed valuation of the property abutting on the route is \$452,000; 50 per cent. of this amount is \$226,000, and consents have been obtained to the value of \$344,500, or an excess over the required amount of \$118,500. It would, therefore, appear that the Company has complied with the requirements of the contract relative to obtaining and filing property owners' consents.

Section 2—Eighth of said contract provides that construction of the extension shall be commenced within three months from the date of filing property owners' consents, and that such construction shall be completed and the railway placed in full operation within six months from the date of filing consents. Under this provision, the dates for the commencement and completion of construction are respectively, July 3 and October 3, 1913.

Rails have already been laid on the bridge over the tracks of the New York and Putnam Railroad Company, and I am advised by the President of the Union Company that the work of grading 230th Street, although not fully completed, is sufficiently advanced to permit of laying the tracks thereon and that such work will be commenced at an early date.

It is recommended that the consents of abutting property owners as filed by the Company be accepted, and that the Secretary of this Board be directed to forward a copy of this report to the Company, calling attention to the dates for the commencement and completion of construction.

A resolution to this effect is herewith transmitted. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the copies of consents of abutting property owners to the construction, maintenance and operation of a street surface railway, upon and along West 230th Street from Bailey Avenue to Broadway, Borough of The Bronx, as an extension to the existing system of the Union Railway Company of New York City, filed by said Company with this Board on April 3, 1913, be and they hereby are accepted; and be it further

Resolved, That the attention of the Company be invited to the fact that construction of the extension should be commenced July 3, 1913, and the railway should be completed and in full operation October 3, 1913.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

New York and Queens County Railway Company (Cal. No. 11).

A communication was received from the President and General Manager of the New York and Queens County Railway Company transmitting consents of abutting property owners to the double tracking of certain portions of the Flushing—College Point and Flushing—Jamaica Lines of the Company under and pursuant to section 2, first of contract dated February 6, 1913, granting said franchise.

Which was referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery Railroad Company (Cal. No. 12).

A communication was received from the Public Service Commission for the First District transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by said Commission directing a hearing upon the application of the Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery Railroad Company for the approval of the exercise of its franchise on Canal and Church streets, Borough of Manhattan.

Which was ordered filed.

Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation (Cal. 13).

The Secretary presented the following:

Bureau of Franchises, April 18, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—The Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation has, under date of April 17, 1913, petitioned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for two extensions to its existing street surface railway in the Borough of Queens, as follows:

First—A single track in, upon and along Campion Avenue or street from Carl Street to Archer Place or Street, and thence by double track in, upon and along said Archer Place or Street to private property.

Second—A double track extension from the intersection of Thomson Avenue and Van Dam Street in, upon and along Van Dam Street to a point approximately 300 feet south of the southerly side of Nott Avenue, and also a double track on Nott Avenue from Van Dam Street westerly for a distance of approximately 90 feet.

The contract granting the South Shore Traction Company a franchise, which was subsequently assigned to the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation, included a route for a single track on Campion Avenue from Fulton Street to Carl Street and the route for the second track on Centerport (Rose) Avenue from Fulton Street to Archer Place. I am informed that it has been impossible to secure the consents of property owners on Centerport (Rose) Avenue, and as construction is well under way from the end of the line now in operation to Fulton Street in Jamaica, the Company decided to make the application for this extension of one block on Campion Avenue and for a double track on Archer Place between Campion Avenue and Sutphin Road (Guilford Street) in order that the work of constructing the railway to the Long Island Railroad Company station in Jamaica may be expedited.

The second extension applied for is for the purpose of connecting the main line of the Company on Thomson Avenue with a proposed car-barn to be located at the southwest corner of Van Dam Street and Nott Avenue, where the Company has purchased property.

Sir—The Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation has, under date of April 17, 1913, petitioned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for two extensions to its existing street surface railway in the Borough of Queens, as follows:

First—A single track in, upon and along Campion avenue or street from Carl to Archer place or street; thence by double track upon and along Archer place to private property.

This application is made in order to overcome certain obstacles in relation to securing property owners' consents on that portion of the Company's route on Centerport avenue, and in order that the work of constructing the railway to the station of the Long Island Railroad Company in Jamaica may not be impeded.

Second—A double track extension from the main line of the Company on Thomson avenue, upon and along Van Dam street and Nott avenue to a proposed car-barn at the southwest corner of Van Dam street and Nott avenue.

Accompanying the petition is a communication from the President of the Company requesting the permission of the Board to the immediate construction of the above described extensions, and agreeing to enter into a contract with the City for such extensions under such reasonable terms and conditions as the Board may impose, and further agreeing that, if such contract is not entered into, the Company will,

at its own cost and expense, remove all of its tracks, poles, wires and other appurtenances laid or constructed in the streets and avenues named in the petition.

The petition for the extensions has been presented to the Board simultaneously herewith, with the recommendation that May 8, be fixed as the date for the preliminary public hearing thereon. As at least six weeks must elapse between the preliminary and final hearings, it can readily be seen that it would be approximately the middle of June before a contract for these extensions could be authorized.

I am informed by the President of the Company that it is the expectation to have that portion of the Company's line on Thomson avenue and Hoffman boulevard from the Queensboro bridge to Fulton street, Jamaica, completed and in operation on or before June 1. As the line cannot be extended to the Long Island Railroad station in Jamaica without the construction of the first described extension, and as the second extension is necessary for facilitating the operation of the Company's cars, it is recommended that the President of the Borough of Queens be requested to issue the necessary permits for the construction of the two extensions. This action is not without precedent, in that a similar procedure was followed in the case of an extension on Fort George avenue, Borough of Manhattan, by the Third Avenue Railroad Company.

There are transmitted herewith, two resolutions requesting the President of the Borough of Queens to issue temporary permits to the Manhattan and Queens Traction Corporation to open Campion avenue and Archer place for the purpose of constructing its railway thereon, and to open Van Dam street and Nott street for the purpose of constructing the connection with its proposed car-barn. These resolutions each contain a provision that the Company shall execute and file with the President of the Borough an instrument in writing, in which it agrees to remove the tracks and appurtenances at its own cost and expense and restore the streets to their original condition should the Board fail to grant the franchise or deny the application therefor, or should the President of the Borough of Queens revoke the permit.

Sir—Pursuant to an opinion of the Corporation Counsel, holding that the Compagnie Francaise Telegraphique de Paris A New York, otherwise known as the French Telegraph Cable Company, was operating in the streets without proper authority and must secure the consent of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 73 of the Greater New York Charter, to legalize such operation, the Board at its meeting held Thursday, April 10, 1913, called upon the said Company, which is a foreign corporation, to procure the organization of a properly incorporated telegraph company and to have such Company submit to the Board on or before Saturday, May 10, 1913, a verified petition for permission to use the streets of the City. The resolution further provided that the French Telegraph Cable Company notify the Board on or before Saturday, April 26, as to its intentions.

In reply, a communication has been received, signed by the Manager of the French Telegraph Cable Company, requesting an extension of time to allow the Company an opportunity to study the situation before reaching a decision.

The situation with respect to this Company and the other companies considered by the Board on April 10, is novel in view of the fact that the said companies are cable companies and their operations international in character. Under the circumstances, I believe it is reasonable to allow the Company an opportunity for proper consideration and I am willing to recommend the granting of the request of the French Telegraph Cable Company for that purpose.

Sir—Under date of February 7, 1912, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity called the attention of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to a pole line maintained by the Brooklyn Eastern District Terminal Company for the purpose of supplying electric current from a plant at the foot of North 10th street and the East River, in the Borough of Brooklyn, to its buildings between North 10th and North 5th streets, and on Kent and Wythe avenues. The matter was referred to this Bureau and an examination showed that the cables were in existence crossing said streets without proper authorization.

The matter was taken up with the Company and a report presented to the Board at the meeting held December 19, 1912, advising that the Company had made arrangements to purchase its current from the Edison Company and the pole line would shortly be removed, and a copy of the report was forwarded to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity with a request that the Board be advised after a reasonable length of time as to such removal.

Under date of April 7, 1913, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has addressed the Board, advising that the pole line has now been removed.

This entirely closes the matter, and I would suggest that the communication be filed. Respectfully,

*Ocean Electric Railway Company (Cal. No. 20).*

In the matter of the franchise granted the Ocean Electric Railway Company to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway from the existing tracks on Washington avenue in Rockaway Park, upon and along Eastern avenue to the Boulevard, to Park avenue, to the existing right of way and railroad tracks of the New York and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, in what is known as Hammels, in the 5th Ward, Borough of Queens.

This franchise was granted by ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen August 18, 1903, approved by the Acting Mayor August 26, 1903.

The Secretary presented the following:

Bureau of Franchises, April 18, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—In the year 1903, the Ocean Electric Railway Company obtained a franchise by ordinance of the Board of Aldermen for the right to construct, maintain and

operate a double track street surface railway, beginning at the termination of the existing railroad tracks on Washington avenue in Rockaway Park; thence in an easterly and southerly direction, along Eastern avenue to the Boulevard; thence along the Boulevard to Park avenue; thence along Park avenue to the existing right of way and railroad tracks of the New York and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company in what is known as Hammels, all in the 5th Ward of the Borough of Queens.

The ordinance was adopted by the Board of Aldermen August 18, 1903, and approved by the Acting Mayor August 26, 1903, and became effective upon the latter date. The term of the franchise is twenty-five years, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of twenty-five years upon a revaluation. The compensation is fixed by the terms of the grant during the first ten years of its existence, but for the remaining term of fifteen years of the original twenty-five year grant is to be fixed and determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at least three months prior to the expiration of the first ten years of the franchise. The provision referred to is contained in section 2, fourth, which is as follows:

"Fourth—The Ocean Electric Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$500, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts from the route constructed under this ordinance, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$500. During the next term of five years an annual sum which shall not be less than \$1,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts as above, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$1,000; during the remaining fifteen years of the term a sum of money not less than \$1,000 per annum, and which shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority at least three months prior to the expiration of the first ten years of this franchise. The gross receipts to be computed in the manner provided in section 95 of the Railroad Law."

This form of grant differs from others which have been made since the enactment of the Greater New York Charter in that it only fixes the compensation definitely for a portion of the original term; whereas other franchises granted since 1908 definitely fix the compensation for the entire original term.

The company has since it began operation been paying the percentage required by the franchise upon the portion of the gross receipts derived from the operation of the railway authorized by the franchise. The sum so paid to the City for the year ending September 30, 1911, was \$1,756.75, and for the year ending September 30, 1912, was \$2,027.18. Five per cent. of the gross receipts which has been paid during the last five years, is the minimum required by the Railroad Law and is the percentage which is commonly used in fixing compensation for street surface railway companies after the first five years of the grant. It is therefore suggested that the compensation be fixed at five per cent. of the gross receipts for the remaining period of fifteen years of the original grant with appropriate minimum annual payments. In view of the fact that the company during the last year paid over \$2,000, it would seem that \$2,000 would be a fair minimum to fix for the first five years and that could reasonably be increased \$250 each period of five years thereafter. It is therefore recommended that the minimum for the first five years be \$2,000, for the succeeding five years \$2,250, and for the remaining five years \$2,500.

These figures have been presented to a representative of the company, who has accepted the same on its behalf.

A resolution has been prepared and is transmitted herewith, which if adopted by the Board will fix and determine the compensation as herein recommended.

The franchise requires that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment fix the compensation at least three months prior to the expiration of the first ten years of the franchise. The Board has until May 26, 1913, to determine this question.

Whereas, By an ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen August 18, 1903, and approved by the Acting Mayor August 26, 1903, the Ocean Electric Railway Company was granted a franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track street surface railway beginning at the termination of the existing railroad tracks on Washington avenue, so-called, in Rockaway Park, upon Rockaway Beach, in the 5th Ward, Borough of Queens; running from thence in an easterly and southerly direction along Eastern avenue to the Boulevard; thence easterly along the Boulevard to Park avenue; and thence northerly along Park avenue to the existing right of way and railroad track of the New York and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company in what is known as Hammels, in the 5th Ward of the Borough of Queens and City of New York; and

Whereas, The first paragraph of Section 2, Subdivision Fourth, of said franchise reads as follows:

"Fourth—The Ocean Electric Railway Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money: During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than \$500, and which shall be equal to three per cent. of its gross annual receipts from the route constructed under this ordinance, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$500. During the next term of five years an annual sum which shall not be less than \$1,000, and which shall be equal to five per cent. of its gross annual receipts, as above, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of \$1,000; during the remaining fifteen years of the term a sum of money not less than \$1,000 per annum, and which shall be fixed and determined by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority at least three months prior to the expiration of the first ten years of this franchise. The gross receipts to be computed in the manner provided in section 95 of the Railroad Law,"

—and

Whereas, The first ten years of the term of said franchise will expire on August 26, 1913; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to said franchise, hereby fixes and determines the compensation to be paid for said franchise, right and privilege during the fifteen years succeeding August 26, 1913, as follows:

During the first term of five (5) years of said period an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

During the second term of five (5) years of said period an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twenty-two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-two hundred and fifty dollars (\$2,250).

During the remaining term of five (5) years of said period an annual sum which shall in no case be less than twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of the gross annual receipts of the company, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500).

The gross receipts mentioned above are to be computed in the manner provided by the Railroad Law.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

*David Shannon Company (Cal. No. 21).*

In the matter of the consent granted to David Shannon Company to install, maintain and use a salt water pipe under and along the northerly sidewalk of West 40th street, from the Hudson River to a point about 200 feet east of the westerly line of 12th avenue, Borough of Manhattan.

This consent was granted by resolution adopted by this Board March 30, 1911, approved by the Mayor April 6, 1911.

The Secretary presented the following:

Bureau of Franchises, April 18, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—Under date of April 10, 1913, the David Shannon Company addressed a communication to this Bureau, requesting a reduction in the annual charge of four hundred and seven and ten one-hundredths dollars for the year ending October 31, 1913, for salt water pipe maintained by it under and along the northerly sidewalk of West 40th street, from the Hudson River to a point about 200 feet east of the easterly line of 12th avenue. The communication recites that the building with which the pipe connects was destroyed by fire on April 4, 1912, and, in consequence, the pipe



has been of no service since that date, but will again be made use of upon the completion of a new building in the place of that one destroyed.

This pipe was authorized by a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 30, 1911, and approved by the Mayor April 6, 1911. The resolution provided that the grantee should pay to the City the sum of four hundred and seven and ten one-hundredths dollars per annum, in advance, on November 1 of each year during the life of the consent.

I caused an examination to be made which disclosed that the building was entirely destroyed by fire, as stated, on April 4, 1912; that since then the pipe has been of no use, the Company not being in a position to reconstruct the building until a longer lease of the ground could be secured. I am informed that such a lease has lately been executed, and the walls of the old building are now being razed to prepare for the erection of the new building.

As required by the consent, the Company paid the annual charge in advance up to October 31, 1912. At this writing it has been unable to make use of the pipe for a year past, and it will be several months before the new building can be constructed and the pipe again put in service.

In view of the facts, and as the present conditions are due to causes over which the Company had no control, I would suggest that the City accept the sum of one hundred dollars for the current year, to October 31, 1913, in lieu of the four hundred and seven and ten one-hundredths dollars due under the terms and conditions of the grant. Such reduction is equivalent to the compensation the City receives for the pipe for a period of nine months or a little more than one-half the time the grantee will have been unable to use the pipe.

The matter was taken up with the Company, and it expressed satisfaction with an adjustment as above suggested, and I therefore submit herewith a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to accept one hundred dollars instead of the four hundred and seven and ten one-hundredths dollars, as payment for the year ending October 31, 1913. The following was offered:

Whereas, By resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 30, 1911, and approved by the Mayor April 6, 1911, consent was granted to the David Shannon Company to continue to maintain and use an existing 5-inch pipe under and along the northerly sidewalk of West 40th street, in the Borough of Manhattan, connecting its premises at a point about 200 feet east of the easterly line of 12th avenue with the Hudson River, for the purpose of obtaining salt water; and

Whereas, Section 2 of the said consent provided that the grantee should pay into the City Treasury the sum of four hundred and seven dollars and ten cents (\$407.10) per annum, as compensation for the privilege; and

Whereas, It appears that the building of the said grantee was destroyed by fire on April 4, 1912, and since that date the said grantee has been unable to make any use of the said pipe, all as more fully recited in a report from the Bureau of Franchises presented to the Board at the meeting held this day, and, in view of such fact, the David Shannon Company has requested a reduction in the rate of compensation for the year ending October 31, 1913, now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he hereby is authorized to accept from the David Shannon Company the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) as compensation in full to the City for the privilege of maintaining a 5-inch salt water pipe under and along the northerly sidewalk of West 40th street, Borough of Manhattan, during the year ending October 31, 1913, said amount being in lieu of the sum of four hundred and seven dollars and ten cents (\$407.10) reserved to the City as compensation for the same period, by the resolution granting consent for the said pipe, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment March 30, 1911, and approved by the Mayor April 6, 1911.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

*Rapid Transit Railway—Flushing Route. Revocation of Resolutions Adopted by the Public Service Commission for the First District, February 4, 1913, and Establishment of Route and General Plan of Construction for an Additional Rapid Transit Railway Known as "Flushing Route" (Cal. No. 22).*

The Secretary presented the following:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York:

On February 4, 1913, the Public Service Commission for the First District transmitted to your Honorable Board for your approval and the approval of the Mayor of the City a certified copy of resolutions adopted by it on that date determining and establishing a route and general plan of construction for a rapid transit railroad in the Borough of Queens, in the City of New York, known as the Flushing Route. Under date of April 3, 1913, your Honorable Board directed the return of the communication from the Commission transmitting the certified copy of said resolutions, without having approved the said route and general plan of construction.

The Commission now transmits to your Honorable Board for your approval and the approval of the Mayor of the City, as required by law, a certified copy of resolutions adopted by it on the 22d day of April, 1913, rescinding and revoking its said resolutions of February 4, 1913, and establishing a route and general plan of construction for an additional rapid transit railroad in the Borough of Queens to be also known as the Flushing Route. This route will begin at a point over Roosevelt Avenue at or near Prime Street where it will connect with the Roosevelt Avenue Route, extending thence easterly and northeasterly over private property, the Flushing River and intersecting streets to private property in the block bounded by Amity Street, Delong Street, Redwood Street and Lawrence Street, where the route passes from an elevated structure to a subway or tunnel; extending thence northeasterly and easterly under Amity Street and private property to a point in private property in the block bounded by Marston Avenue, Murray Street, the right of way of the Long Island Railroad and Dunsing Street where the route begins to emerge from the ground; continuing thence northeasterly through private property in said block and along Matthew Place to a point in Matthew Place at or near Eagles Street, where the route becomes an elevated structure; and extending thence easterly and northeasterly over Matthew Place, Lucerne Place, Station Road and Warburton Avenue to Bayside Boulevard.

The route adopted on April 22, 1913, is substantially the same as the one adopted on February 4, 1913, which, however, provided for an elevated structure for the entire length of the route, whereas the route adopted on April 22, 1913, provides for a subway on that portion of the route which passes through Amity Street.

The necessity for the establishment of a route through this part of the Borough of Queens has already been called to the attention of your Honorable Board.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—The New York Railways Company as lessee of the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company desires to make a connection at the corner of Canal and Vestry streets between the tracks owned jointly by the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company and the Sixth Avenue Railroad Company in Canal street and the tracks of the Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery Railroad Company in Vestry street for the purpose of operating a through line of cars from Fulton street, Brooklyn, to the North River, Manhattan, the motive power in Manhattan being by the underground system of electricity.

The New York Railways Company has petitioned the Board for its consent and in which petition the Dry Dock, East Broadway and Battery Railroad Company joins.

This is a similar application as that acted upon by the Board on December 19, 1912, when the Dry Dock Company applied to connect with the Third Avenue Railway Company at the corner of Canal street and the Bowery and which application was granted.

I would therefore recommend a similar resolution in this case, granting the consent of the Board and authorizing the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the Borough President to issue the necessary permits therefor, such consent of the Board to be revocable at will. Respectfully,

Resolved, That such consent is to continue only during the pleasure of the Board and is revocable at will.

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

*New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company (No. 24).*

In the matter of the communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, stating the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company had constructed a single track across Mosholu avenue in Van Cortlandt Park without authority, and advising, he submitted the matter to the Board in order that it might consider whether an invitation should be extended to the Company to apply for the proper consent to maintain this track or whether summary action should be taken towards removing it.

This communication was presented to the Board at the meeting of April 10, 1913, and was referred to the Bureau of Franchises.

Bureau of Franchises, April 23, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—On April 10, 1913, there was presented to the Board a communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated April 3, 1910, calling attention to the fact that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company had recently laid a single track across Mosholu avenue in Van Cortlandt Park, on its Putnam Division, and that no permit had been issued, either by his department or any other department, and that the Corporation Counsel had advised him in an opinion dated March 27, 1913, to submit the entire question to this Board for proper action.

Upon referring this communication to this Bureau, an investigation was immediately commenced for the purpose of ascertaining the right of the company to construct not only this additional track, but also the original track, as no consents of the local authorities or order of the Supreme Court authorizing the latter track could be found by this Bureau.

In his opinion to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, the Corporation Counsel stated as follows:

"It was clear to me from the outset that if Mosholu avenue had been acquired in fee prior to the establishment of the railroad, such occupancy by the railroad, in the absence of a consent from the local authorities having control of the highways, would be illegal."

"The status of this street is therefore material."

On this point the Bureau of Street Openings reported as follows to the Corporation Counsel:

"Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment were appointed on the 14th day of December, 1869, in the matter of widening, making, extending and improving Midland avenue and other highways in the town of Yonkers and Eastchester under the authority of chapter 272 of the Laws of 1869. The report of said commissioners was confirmed by an order entered April 12, 1870."

"Chapter 272 of the Laws of 1869 provided for the acquiring of a right of way and from the language of said chapter I am of the opinion that only an easement was acquired under that authority by the City of Yonkers."

The Corporation Counsel further stated to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity:

"If the railroad had been constructed prior to the acquirement of the easement in the highway, such easement would possibly have been subject to the right of the railroad, but there is a question whether the street easement, was not acquired prior to the easement or right of way of the railroad."

Upon this point, after a thorough search of the records, this Bureau finds that it was not until 1872 that the right of way was secured by the railroad at the point in question, and that operation of the railroad was not commenced until 1881.

A further search made by this Bureau fails to reveal any order of the Supreme Court to cross any highways in towns, or consent of the local authorities in cities, as required under the provisions of the Railroad Law (section 28, subdivision 5, chapter 140, Laws of 1850, as thereafter amended).

It would seem, under the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, that the railroad company was without legal authority in constructing not only the additional track, but the original track as well.

I would therefore recommend that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company be called upon by the Board to furnish proper proof of its authority to maintain and operate both the original and additional tracks across Mosholu avenue in Van Cortlandt Park, on its Putnam Division, on or before Friday, May 2, 1913, or to file within the same time, a proper application for a franchise to cross the above street.

A form of resolution to that effect is herewith submitted for adoption, if the Board so sees fit. Respectfully,

Whereas, The Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity has, by a communication dated April 3, 1913, called the attention of this Board to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, which is maintaining and operating two tracks across Mosholu avenue in Van Cortlandt Park, on its Putnam Division, without apparent authority, and that the Corporation Counsel has advised him in an opinion dated March 27, 1913, that the Railroad Company was without legal authority in laying such tracks and to submit the entire question to this Board for proper action; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company be called upon to file proof, on or before Friday, May 2, 1913, of its legal authority to maintain and operate two tracks across Mosholu avenue in Van Cortlandt Park, on its Putnam Division, or to file within the same time, a verified petition for a franchise for the same.



Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16.

*New York Railways Company, Lessee New York and Harlem River Railroad Company (No. 25).*

In the matter of a franchise to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway by the New York Railways Company, lessee of the New York and Harlem Railroad Company over the Madison Avenue Bridge, between the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx.

At the meeting of March 27, 1913, a communication was received from the President of the New York Railways Company, declining to apply for a franchise as public convenience did not require such operation and the Company had received few complaints since such operation had ceased.

North Side Board of Trade, in The City of New York, 3d Avenue and 137th Street and Lincoln Avenue, Borough of The Bronx, N. Y., April 23, 1913.

Hon. HARRY P. NICHOLS, Chief Engineer, Bureau of Franchises, 277 Broadway, New York City:

Dear Mr. Nichols—For some time our Board of Trade has been taking up the matter of the resumption of the shuttle service on the Madison Avenue Line, over the Madison Avenue Bridge, between 135th street and Madison avenue and 138th street and Park avenue, which ceased running on December 31, 1912, owing to the fact that the New York City Railways Company had no franchise for operation of this shuttle service.

The business men who are members of our Board of Trade, as well as residents in that vicinity, are very anxious to have this service resumed, as it was of considerable accommodation to them, especially those who were desirous of taking the Madison Avenue Line downtown; they are now compelled to walk to 135th street and Madison avenue before taking the cars. The cost for operation would be comparatively small, as I believe they only used a couple of cars, which, of course, necessitated the using of only four men, and I am sure that the convenience to the public would be appreciated if the New York City Railways Company would secure a franchise for the resumption of this service.

Enclosed, please find copy of a petition, the original of which I have in my possession, which speaks for itself. Also find copies of letters in reference to the matter.

Anything you can do in the matter will be fully appreciated I am sure by the business men and residents in The Bronx. Yours very truly,

Communications were also received from Frank D. Skeel, Edwards & Co., Francis Rogers & Sons, Edward Polak and S. Trimmer & Sons, in favor of the resumption of said service.

Bureau of Franchises, April 23, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—On December 7, 1911, the Board adopted a resolution, pursuant to the advice of the Corporation Counsel, requesting the New York and Harlem Railroad Company and its then lessee, the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, to apply for a franchise to legalize the operation of cars on the Madison avenue bridge over the Harlem River.

On December 21, 1911, the Board extended the time within which the application might be presented.

Instead of applying for a franchise, the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, through its Receiver, commenced injunction proceedings to restrain the City from interfering with its operation. This litigation was finally decided against the company. In order to save inconvenience to the public, the operation of cars was not interfered with by the City pending the litigation and the New York Railways Company, as successor to the Metropolitan Street Railway Company, voluntarily abandoned such operation on December 31, 1912.

A report setting forth the above was presented to the Board by this Bureau on January 30, 1913, and in this report it was also pointed out that the abandonment of the service was causing much inconvenience to the former patrons of the road, and that the operation by the company and its predecessors for upwards of twenty-seven years had created an obligation on its part to continue the service. A copy of this report was sent to the company, and, under date of March 22, 1913, a communication was received from its president, Mr. T. P. Shonts, in which he declined to present an application for a franchise, on the ground that the shuttle service over the Madison avenue bridge between 135th street and Madison avenue, Manhattan, and the Mott Haven station of the N. Y. C. & H. R. R. R. Company, The Bronx, was no longer necessary, and that since the service had been discontinued only half a dozen individuals had complained of the cessation of the service. Under date of April 23, 1913, however, the North Side Board of Trade, through its secretary, Mr. Charles E. Reid, has transmitted to the Board a copy of a petition presented to the New York Railways Company, signed by some 300 individuals who reside or do business in the Mott Haven section, requesting that the company resume the shuttle service. It may be that this position will be the means of causing Mr. Shonts to change his position in the matter, as it makes it apparent that a considerable portion of the public is being inconvenienced by its abandonment.

I believe, therefore, that the matter should be again taken up with the officials of the New York Railways Company, to the end that this service be restored to the residents of this section. As the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company has in contemplation a union station at or near 149th street and Park avenue, it would appear that this station should be the logical terminus of the railway, rather than the present Mott Haven station at 138th street—not only that, but the extension of the railway to 149th street would be a material adjunct to the transit facilities of this section, which at the present time are inadequate, and it might be operated at profit to the company.

I would suggest, therefore, that the whole matter in its broader aspect should be gone over with the company, and for this purpose I submit herewith a proposed resolution which, if adopted, will permit of negotiations which may lead to a favorable settlement of the matter, both to the company and to the residents of this section.

Sir—I wish to again direct the attention of the Board to the importance of the provision of funds for the establishment of the bacteriological laboratories in connection with the Municipal Sanatorium for Tuberculosis at Otisville. The recent developments, with reference to the reputed cure for tuberculosis in Berlin, have given renewed emphasis to this matter.

The City of New York is now supporting nearly four thousand cases of pulmonary tuberculosis in hospitals and sanatoria and within a short time provision for the care of one thousand more cases will be available. It is supervising the treatment of many thousands more cases in their homes. No provisions have been made or are being made for the study of this disease from the standpoint of practical treatment.

By a special act of the Legislature, the proceeds derived from the sale of surplus antitoxic serum are specifically set aside for the work in connection with the production and administration of specific treatment in various infectious diseases. Conditions at Otisville are peculiarly favorable for such work and buildings admirably adapted for this purpose are available.

I cannot too strongly urge that the Board take immediate action looking to the establishment of special laboratories at Otisville for the study of tuberculosis and its specific treatment. Very respectfully,

Prior to 1912 the receipts from bacteriological products were expended for salaries and supplies for the Research and Vaccine Laboratories, in the preparation of the Budget for 1912 was mutually agreed between the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Commissioner of Health that full provision should be made for salaries and supplies for the Research and Vaccine Laboratories; the receipts from sales of antitoxins and vaccine virus to be turned over to the Sinking Fund.

The General Medical Officer states the following:

"A vaccine stable and a serum laboratory have been built at Otisville and are in partial use. We have no technical staff. There are ample laboratory facilities for workers. The recent developments with reference to the reputed cure for tuberculosis in Berlin have given renewed emphasis to this matter.

"It is, in my judgment, most important that the medical work in connection with the treatment of tuberculosis at Otisville shall be placed on a highly scientific foundation and this is impossible without a well equipped laboratory and the services of competent bacteriologists.

"The work at the Research Laboratory has so greatly increased that the laboratory is overcrowded, and some form of relief is urgently needed."

The total receipts from sales of antitoxin and vaccine virus vary each year, so that it would be difficult to estimate in full the amount to be charged against the funds. Full provision was estimated to have been made in the Budget for the maintenance of the Research and Vaccine Laboratories, in order that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may exercise control over expenditures.

It is not a satisfactory plan to attempt to cover expenditures for the Research Laboratory in the Budget, and later allow the Board of Health to draw upon the Antitoxin Fund, when the Board may decide upon a change in method of operation. Under such a plan the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may lose proper control of expenditures for the laboratory.

In the preparation of the Budget estimates for 1914, therefore, a sufficient amount should be requested by the Department to maintain the Research and Vaccine Laboratories during the year. I also am of the opinion that the Board of Health should agree that receipts from the sales of antitoxin and vaccine virus shall not be used during 1914 for the purpose of the laboratories.

The present request is for funds to extend research work, especially in tuberculosis. There is a public demand for enlarging the field of investigation in this direction.

In view of the foregoing I recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions, providing for salaries and supplies to the end of the year and allowing the \$2,700 for equipment. Respectfully,

The cost of one wagon to "C. F. D. 10A, Fire Department, New Apparatus, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond."

The cost of two wagons to "C. F. D. 13A, Fire Department, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of Richmond."

The cost of seven wagons to "C. F. D. 15, Fire Department, Purchase of New Apparatus, Borough of The Bronx."

In the matter of claim No. 67,251 of William J. Hart, under chapter 447 of the Laws of 1912, for \$6,051.02, balance alleged to be due for furnishing certain labor and materials in connection with the construction and decoration of the interior of the American Museum of Natural History, New York City.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—Under date of the 6th of May, 1912, William J. Hart addressed to you a communication, in which he stated:

"During the years 1899 and 1900, at the direction of the President of the American Museum of Natural History, I furnished certain labor and materials in connection with the construction and decoration of the interior of that building. For the services rendered and materials furnished I was paid on account certain sums of money amounting, in the aggregate, \$5,397.02. The balance earned by me, however, viz.: \$6,051.02, was never paid and is now due and owing. I, therefore, now make claim for such sum with interest. This claim is filed by me pursuant to the Relief Act passed by the Legislature this year, known as Senate Bill No. 1236 (Chap. 447, Laws of 1912). It allows the City, in considering the merits of my bill, to disregard the Statute of Limitations."

At a meeting of your Board on the 16th of May, 1912, that communication was addressed to me for consideration and report.

Chapter 447 of the Laws of 1912, which went into effect on the 16th day of April, 1912, authorized the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in its discretion, to hear and determine the claim of William J. Hart in the sum of \$6,992, for work, labor and service done or furnished in or for the construction and repair of City buildings in the City of New York in or about the years 1899 and 1900, with the same effect as if such claim had not been barred by the Statute of Limitations.

The application of William J. Hart has been the subject of investigation, from which it appears that on file in his department are 20 vouchers for the payment to William J. Hart and Company of various amounts, aggregating \$13,704, for the construction and decoration of the interior of the American Museum of Natural History; that the labor and material for which claim is made is the same as that described in the said vouchers, and that the claimant, under the name of William J. Hart and Company, has been paid in full for such labor and material, and nothing remains due therefor.

For these reasons I recommend that the claim be wholly disallowed.

Dear Sir—In accordance with resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on April 1, 1913, establishing the grade of \$4.75 per day for steam roller Engineers, I enclose herewith proposed modification of salary schedule No. 2959 for our Bureau of Highways. By this modification we intend to use the money already appropriated for stationary Engineers at \$4.50 per day, and use this as far as it will go. Later on in the season it may be necessary to make further modification to replenish this account or apply for revenue bonds.

It is my intention to employ these men in the remodeling of the golf links, the widening and straightening of the present driveway and the construction of footpaths for pedestrians throughout Forest Park. Portions of the golf links as at present in use are in a location adjoining a rapidly growing residential district. Women and children entering the park have to cross these portions of the links and there is great danger of their being hit by flying golf balls. It is a cause of loud complaint.

The present driveway was designed and constructed before the automobile became a factor in road traffic and it requires widening and straightening in certain parts, so as to become safe for auto and carriage travel.

There is an absolute lack of footpaths in the park at the present time, pedestrians being compelled to use the driveway.

Linden Park has been partly graded and sodded, the work being interrupted by winter weather.

Rainey Park requires slight grading and filling back of the concrete sea wall completed last fall.

A considerable portion of Kings Park remains unimproved, and I contemplate the completion of the same during the spring and early summer.

Owing to the peculiar nature of the work contemplated, it is not feasible to prepare plans and specifications, and I propose to carry on operations by park labor.

In view of the fact that the request is for a temporary force of employees, and as Schedules Nos. 1866 and 1867 are for regular employees, recommendations are made covering the schedules for temporary employees, Nos. 1873 and 1874, and for Transportation, No. 1910.

In Forest Park it is proposed to widen and straighten the present driveway along certain sections, construct footpaths and relocate parts of the golf links. I am of the opinion that no changes in the present driveway should be made until action is taken by your Board on the proposed new road plan for the park, which is now under consideration in the Department of Finance. The relocating of the golf links along Ashland avenue is properly a maintenance charge. I recommend, therefore, that these two items in the request be not approved. At present there are no footpaths in the parks, pedestrians being compelled to use the driveways, in danger from automobiles and other vehicular transportation. It is proposed to lay out about three miles of paths.

I recommend that this item in the request be approved and that the sum of \$8,509.50 be approved for the work.

In Rainey Park it is proposed to change the grade slightly, sod and fill in behind the concrete sea wall erected last year. This park is the only resort for the residents

of a large part of Long Island City and Astoria, and is in an uneven state at present.

I recommend the approval of this item in the request.

In Linden Park it is proposed to continue the work of grading and sodding started last year, and discontinued on December 31, 1912, until the winter season was over. This park is the only recreation ground of the residents in a large built-up section in Corona, and is the playground for a large public school facing it. At present it is in an uneven condition.

I recommend approval of this item in the request.

In Kings Park, Jamaica, it is proposed to lay a walk, grade the bank slightly and do a little sodding at the north end of the park. At present there is no path at this end of the park and persons going east or west walk across the lawn. In order to save the lawn from destruction it is proposed to construct a path. I recommend the approval of this item in the request.

#### Municipal Efficiency Exhibit—Organization of (Cal. No. 47).

The Secretary presented:  
Communication from the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee on Organization of Municipal Efficiency Exhibit, submitting the following questions for decision and action by the Board:

First—Shall each exhibit be held in the month of October?  
Second—Shall such exhibit be held during the last two weeks of November and the first week in December?

Third—Shall special features, including those of general educational value, which do not also reflect improvements in efficiency, be exhibited for the purpose of attracting popular attention and interest, or, shall such features be eliminated and the exhibit confined to matters dealing with efficiency in a strictly technical sense?

(On February 27, 1913, the Board adopted a resolution authorizing the appointment of a Committee to prepare a Municipal Efficiency Exhibit during the current year, the intent of said resolution being understood that such exhibit be held prior to the summer months.)

Which was referred to the Budget Committee, consisting of the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Park Board, Department of Parks, Borough of Queens, Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor—Transfer of Jurisdiction of Site in Seaside Park, Rockaway, and Approval of Preliminary Plans for Erection of Hospital Thereon (Cal. No. 48).

(On July 15, 1912, the Board adopted a resolution accepting the offer of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, to erect a hospital on a site owned by the City at Seaside Park, for the care of children suffering from non-pulmonary tuberculosis, etc.)

The Secretary presented the following:

April 14, 1913.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:  
Dear Sirs—At a meeting of your Board, held on July 15, 1912, a report was

received from the Special Committee of your Board recommending favorable action upon an offer of the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor to erect and equip, at a cost approximately of \$250,000, a hospital for children suffering from non-pulmonary tuberculosis, upon the condition that the City provide a suitable and adequate seashore site for such hospital, and that the City assume the maintenance and conduct of the said hospital, whereupon it was resolved by this Board to accept this offer by virtue of the authority vested in it by chapter 456 of the Laws of 1906, and the Special Committee of this Board was authorized to confer with a Special Committee of the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, to approve plans for the proposed hospital, to select a suitable and adequate site on the seashore at the new Seaside Park at Rockaway, and to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the withdrawal of said site from the jurisdiction of the Park Board, pursuant to the provisions of section 4, chapter 456 of the Laws of 1906.

Your committee has had a number of conferences with the representatives of the association, and after a thorough study of the needs of a hospital such as is contemplated, and bearing in mind the need of access to the shore front by the City at large, has come to the conclusion that the amount of shore front that will be eventually required by the proposed institution is one thousand (1,000) feet, and that this plot of ground should be located at the easterly end of the park and extend back to Washington avenue as at present laid out on the map.

Under the provisions of the Act, the property may be transferred either to the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, to the Department of Public Charities or to the Department of Health. Taking into consideration the purely hospital use to which this institution will be put, and the nature of the cases that will be cared for, the committee is of the opinion that jurisdiction over this site and the hospital to be placed hereon should be transferred to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

The project contemplates the ultimate erection of a hospital containing one thousand beds to be devoted to sufferers from joint and bone tuberculosis. The architects of the first section, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, have submitted a sketch showing roughly the proposed lay-out, from which it appears that the buildings will be four stories in height, that the completed institution will consist of eight ward buildings, containing 240 beds, in addition to the central dining room and recreation rooms and the other necessary administration buildings.

The first section to be erected by the association in accordance with its offer to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, will consist of two ward buildings complete with service portions, and so much of the power house as will be required to operate these two buildings. The plant as delivered to the City will be complete and self-contained, so that it can be operated for an indefinite length of time without further additions on the part of the City.

Herewith are submitted elevation and ground plans of the proposed institution, and a sketch showing the proportion of the entire park which will be occupied when completed. These plans are necessarily roughly drawn and will no doubt be amended in detail.

Your committee recommends:  
First. That under the provisions of section 456 of the Laws of 1906, a site be transferred from the Park Department to the Department of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, the plot being as above described, about one thousand feet along the shore front, and running back to Washington avenue, a distance of about 700 feet.

Second. That the plans herewith submitted be approved, and the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor be authorized to proceed with the erection of the building; final plans and specifications to be submitted to the Special Committee of this Board having had the matter in charge up to this time.

The Budget for 1913 made provision for the salary of Mr. James A. Hogan, a Stenographer and Typewriter, at \$1,350 per annum, representing an increase of \$200. Under the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Mr. Hogan was not eligible for promotion until he had passed a promotion examination. On January 30, 1913, your Board adopted a resolution modifying this schedule, changing the salary to \$1,150 per annum to conform with the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission. Mr. Hogan, having since passed a promotion examination, is not eligible for the increased salary, and request is made to increase the salary to \$1,350 per annum, using the \$200 which was previously transferred to unassigned balance available for salary increases.

The proposed transfers are principally for a reapportionment of existing allowances to permit of charging specific expenditures against the proper fund, with a few increases and decreases to meet the changed conditions, as shown in the following summary:

Accounts Nos. 747 and 768.  
The Budget allowance for Office Supplies and Equipment is \$1,750. The requested amount of \$1,900 covers items for maps, atlases, filing cases and typewriter not included in the original estimate.

Accounts Nos. 780 and 885.  
The Budget allowance for Motor Vehicles, Supplies and Repairs is \$550. The requested amount of \$950 appears to be no more than will be required for the operation and maintenance of three automobiles and three motorcycles during 1913.

Accounts Nos. 763 and 790.  
The total allowance for General Plant Supplies and Equipment is \$3,450. The requested allowance of \$3,900 covers fuel for photometric stations and rubber gloves for Inspectors, not included in the original estimate, and for certain supplies improperly included in the allowance for Account No. 747.

Accounts Nos. 863, 864, 865, 889 and 890.  
The total allowance for Carfares and Contingencies is \$8,100. The requested amount is \$7,630. Items for supper money, expressage, etc., were included in the departmental estimate under Carfares and Disbursements, but cannot be paid from the appropriation for Carfares.

Accounts Nos. 877 and 878.  
The allowance for General Plant Service is \$11,480. The requested amount of \$11,525 covers notarial fees, etc., not included in the original estimates.

Accounts Nos. 799 and 807.  
The allowance for these two accounts for General Plant Materials and General Repairs is \$1,225. The requested amount is \$650. The reduction in the allowance for General Plant Materials is possible for the reason that the present allowance covers provisions for articles properly chargeable to other accounts.

The Commissioner's representative states that these requests are made in an attempt to keep the total expenditures within the amount appropriated in the 1913 Budget, instead of requesting special revenue bonds to replenish the insufficient accounts.

*Department of Docks and Ferries—Plans for Terminal Facilities and Equipment Thereof and Therefor, in the Dutch Kills Creek Section, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 53).*

(On March 27 and April 17, 1913, said plans and the amendment thereof were referred to the Committee on Terminal Facilities).

The Secretary presented the following:

City of New York, Department of Docks and Ferries, April 4, 1913.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir—I submit herewith proposed plans for terminal facilities and equipment thereof and therefor to be located upon the following described lands and lands under water, situate, lying and being in the Borough of Queens, City of New York, and bounded and described as follows: Bounded by Borden avenue, Van Dam street, Hunters Point avenue and the centre line of Dutch Kills Creek, and includes water and carfloat connections on Dutch Kills Creek, between Borden avenue and Hunters Point avenue.

The terminal area is served by a transfer bridge situated along the bulkhead on the easterly side of Dutch Kills Creek, near Borden avenue. Adjoining the transfer bridge are storage tracks, with the necessary turn-outs, switches, bumpers, etc., with tracks leading from them to the various blocks within the terminal zone.

These plans for terminal facilities and equipment thereof and therefor are hereby submitted by me, pursuant to chapter 776, of the Laws of 1911, and I request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to adopt said plans according to said law. Yours respectfully, R. A. C. SMITH, Commissioner of Docks.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, April 18, 1913.

To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on April 17, 1913, there was referred to the Terminal Committee of the Board a communication from the Commissioner of Docks submitting, under the provisions of chapter 776 of the Laws of 1911, a plan for a freight terminal within the territory bounded by Hunters Point avenue on the north, Borden avenue on the south, Van Dam street on the east, and the centre of Dutch Kills Creek on the west. This communication and plan were substituted for a previous communication from the Department of Docks which was on March 27, 1913, referred to the same Committee.

The area covered by the proposed terminal was included in an earlier plan submitted by the Commissioner of Docks, which, upon the recommendation of this Committee, was returned to him for revision for the reason that it included not only a large number of local streets, but also Hunters Point avenue, a street of considerable importance, which, under the provisions of the Law of 1911, would have been discontinued and closed as public streets by the adoption of the plan. Acting on the advice contained in the report of this Committee, the Dock Commissioner divided his plan into two separate terminals, one lying north of Hunters Point avenue and the other south of this street. The former plan has already been approved and finally certified by the Board. The plan now under discussion covers the remainder of the territory which it was originally proposed to include. It provides for a transfer bridge on the easterly side of Dutch Kills Creek immediately north of Borden avenue and a series of railroad tracks in the middle of the blocks into which this territory is at present divided. These tracks are directly in line with similarly located tracks in the terminal north of Hunters Point avenue, already adopted, and in order to establish direct connections with the Long Island Railroad other than by

means of car floats, it will be necessary for the individuals or corporation who undertake the development and operation of this terminal to connect one or more of these tracks with those to be constructed in the terminal north of Hunters Point avenue.

In the opinion of the Committee the plan for the creation of a great industrial centre in this part of the Borough of Queens is an admirable one, and we are advised that the present owners of the property are ready and anxious to organize a terminal company under the provisions of the New York City Freight Terminals Act.

We would recommend that, after the public hearing required by the statute, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Dock Commissioner to adopt the plan which he has submitted. Respectfully submitted,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 25, 1913, the Board of Aldermen requested \$375 in special revenue bonds to provide for the Tax Levy portion of the salary of Cornelius J. Burns, an Inspector at \$1,500 per annum, in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. In connection therewith I report as follows:

The resolution of the Board of Aldermen was adopted, pursuant to the following request from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, under date of March 3, 1913:

"In the Budget for 1913, through an error made in setting up the schedules, the position of one Inspector at \$1,500 per annum, under 'Distribution—Salaries, Tax Levy and Corporate Stock Force' was omitted. This position is held by Cornelius J. Burns, who, for some years, has been a regular employee in the Borough of Queens. The tax levy portion of his salary is \$375, and I, therefore, ask that your Honorable Board request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of revenue bonds in the said sum of \$375."

Mr. Burns has been employed in the Commissioner's Department as Inspector of Pipe Laying since April 20, 1904. His rate of compensation, since September 7, 1909, has been \$1,500 per annum. He is attached to the Engineering Bureau in the Borough of Queens, and is employed on the maintenance and extension of the water distribution system of that borough.

Mr. Burns was provided for in the 1912 Budget schedule entitled "Personal Service—Water Supply—Administration—No. 457—Salaries, Regular Employees—Tax Levy and Corporate Stock Force." His position was requested in the Commissioner's 1913 Budget estimate in the 1912 account entitled "Personal Service—Water Supply—Distribution—No. 468—Salaries—Regular Employees—Tax Levy and Corporate Stock Force" and marked "Transferred from No. 457."

No provision was made for this employee, either in the Executive Division of the Engineering Bureau, where the position was carried in 1912, or in the Distribution Division, where it was requested for 1913. In consequence he has received no compensation for his services during the year 1913.

Three-quarters, or \$1,125, of Mr. Burns' salary is properly chargeable to Corporate Stock Funds now available. The \$375 in special revenue bonds requested is to provide for the balance of his compensation. Provision for this employee should be made in the 1913 Budget schedule entitled "Personal Service—Salaries, Regular Employees—Water Supply—Distribution—No. 678TC, Tax Levy and Corporate Stock Force." The Budget appropriation for Account No. 678TC is \$45,000, apportioned as follows: Tax Levy Allowance, \$29,435, and Corporate Stock Allowance, \$15,565.

The payroll charges for the first three months of 1913 against the tax levy allowance amounted to \$6,674.99, or approximately at the rate of \$26,700 per annum. On the basis of the Budget apportionment, the requirements against the tax levy allowance for the remaining nine months would be \$22,076.25, or for the entire year the cost would be \$28,751.24, leaving a balance of \$683.76. The present balance in account No. 678TC will, therefore, probably be ample to provide for the tax levy portion of Mr. Burns' salary, and provision for this employee can be made by adding his position to the existing schedule for the administration of Account No. 678TC and increasing the corporate stock part allowance by \$1,500 to balance the addition to the schedule total. The requested revenue bond issue, therefore, appears unnecessary.

I recommend that no action be taken at this time upon the request of the Board of Aldermen, but recommend instead the adoption of the attached resolution, modifying the existing schedule, to provide for the payment of Mr. Burns' salary during the year 1913. ## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.

March 10, 1913.

Hon. MICHAEL J. DRUMMOND, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I herewith submit the report of the Secretary for the quarter ending December 31, 1912:

## Census.

The average daily census of patients and inmates in the hospitals, schools for the feeble-minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm and other institutions of the department for this quarter has been 10,053, as against 10,369 for the corresponding period of the preceding year.

The average daily census of employees in the department during the quarter was 2,818, including therein the Nurses of the different institutions, their average daily census being 350 during this period.

The following shows the causes and number of changes among the employees during the quarter. Appointments, 1,236; promotions, 125; resignations, 594; transfers, 54; dismissals, 555; totals, 2,564. Total number of changes for year 1912, 10,985.

## Budget for 1913.

On October 31, 1912, the budget for 1913 was adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The amount allowed this department was the sum of \$3,621,826.38, being an increase of \$437,128 over the total amount allowed the department for the year 1912.

## Payment of the Blind.

The accepted applicants for the annual payment to the Blind for 1912 amounted to 1,122, each receiving the sum of \$49, a total for all boroughs of \$55,000. In the Borough of Manhattan payments of the donations were made to 507 approved applicants on November 12. On November 29, 16 additional were paid from a supplementary roll and on December 23 50 sick blind were paid, making in all 573.

In the Borough of Brooklyn 536 in all received the donation, 488 being paid on November 14, the balance of which there were 34 sick blind, receiving the donation. In the Borough of Richmond 12 approved applicants received the donation on November 12.

## In General.

There were one general and twenty-four special orders issued during this quarter, and twenty-one propositions accepted and awarded for work costing not over \$1,000 in each case.

On October 16 and December 16 the second and third quarterly reports for periods ending June 30 and September 30, 1912, were sent to his honor, the Mayor, and published respectively in the City Record of November 7 and December 30. The department report for the year ending December 31, 1911, was sent to his honor on October 30, 1912.

Regular and special requisitions for medical and surgical supplies have been filled for the following institutions, viz.: City Hospital, Blackwells Island, \$5,368.52; New York City Home for the Aged, Blackwells Island, \$1,631.53; Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwells Island, \$4,730.93; Randalls Island Hospitals, Randalls Island, \$2,447.15; Kings County Hospital, \$5,201.53; Bradford St. Hospital, \$10.51; Coney Island Hospital, \$966.01; Cumberland St. Hospital, \$1,579.16; Richmond Farm Colony, Staten Island, \$309.16; Municipal Lodging House, \$88.47; minor institutions, \$67.21; General Drug Department, \$183.05. Total, \$22,583.23.

The repairs to surgical instruments and apparatus amounted to \$211.42.

On October 10, 1912, the new Building Operation Permit was made effective. It combines four old permits, i. e.: (1) Placing building material on street, (2) crossing sidewalk, (3) placing boiler on street, (4) placing tar kettle on street.

The new permit requires the filing of a bond insuring the City against accidents and an additional cash deposit for pavement which may be disturbed.

On November 1, 1912, the new corporation permit went into effect. The applications of the different companies, however, are all made "under protest."

On November 15, 1912, a Stenographer, Mr. M. L. Stoneham, was added to the Permit Division force. An Elliott-Fisher typewriter was secured, so that now all inspection forms are made out on the machine.

The closed season for opening pavements was made November 1. No permits were issued after this date, except in cases of extraordinary emergency, and then only after an inspection had been made.

#### REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF SEWERS.

January 16, 1913.

Hon. E. V. FROTHINGHAM, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to present the following report of the operations of the Bureau of Sewers for the quarter ending December 31, 1912:

On December 31, 1912, the sewerage system of the borough consisted of 517.85 miles of sewers and 6,432 receiving basins.

During the quarter 4,442 linear feet of sewer and 5 receiving basins were built as new work and 802 linear feet of sewer were built as reconstruction, alteration and improvement work.

The following works were completed during the quarter:

Sewer in 128th street east of Convent avenue (built under permit).

Sewer in 177th street between Audubon and Saint Nicholas avenues.

Sewer in Arden street between Sherman and Nagle avenues.

The amount earned on the above work payable out of the Street Improvement Fund amounted to \$10,663.73.

The work under construction December 31, 1912, payable out of the Street Improvement Fund, was:

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 47th street between 10th and 11th avenues.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in 72d street between Amsterdam and Columbus avenues.

Sewer in Bennett avenue between Broadway and 181st street.

Sewers in Park Terrace East between 218th st. and 100 feet south of 215th st.  
Extension to Barrel sewer foot of 36th st. and North River.

Sewers in Amsterdam ave., between 179th and 181st sts. and in 181st st., between Amsterdam ave. and Laurel Hill Terrace, and in Laurel Hill Terrace between 181st st. and Amsterdam ave. at 188th st.

#### DISTRICT PRISONS, WARDEN'S REPORT.

New York, April 7, 1913.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at District Prisons for the three months ending March 31, 1913.

At Second District Prison repairs were done in placing the plumbing system throughout the building in first-class condition; this work was done under the supervision of the Department Inspector on recommendation of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and all leaks in faucets, urinals and closet tanks have been repaired and the work is now completed to the satisfaction of the Department. Repairs done by staff to the boiler system is continually progressing, and the material furnished thereto is furnished by the Department; new parts, such as petcocks, gauges and steam pipes are added in place of the old worn ones.

The Third District Prison has been inspected by the Department Inspector, subject of making repairs to the plumbing plant, but upon investigation it is found that the plumbing is virtually past repairs and to make the old prison again inhabitable for prisoners would entail a large appropriation for new plumbing. As the matter of construction of a new prison on the old site is still under consideration by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, these repairs have been, upon recommendation of the Department Inspector, temporarily dispensed with.

The Fourth District Prison is now in course of being renovated, by reason of the court room nearing completion of being entirely remodeled, the prison has been closed pending the practical completion of this work, and in the meantime the prison has been painted and walls pointed, all furniture painted and varnished and everything kept in good condition for the opening of the Court and the receiving of prisoners in the new constructed court building.

At Fifth District Prison considerable repairs were done to plumbing, the gas-heated house pump, which supplies the water to house tank has been repaired and placed in fair serviceable condition. The Boynton-Richardson range has been repaired and new parts were added in place of the old parts, which were found to be worn and old.

At Sixth District Prison, the prison part has been renovated and the lock on main gate has been repaired and put in good working condition.

At Seventh District Prison the locks on main gate and cell doors were repaired and put in good working order.

The female prisoners transferred from the Workhouse to the District Prisons to serve their sentences are employed in cleaning, scrubbing, cooking and doing some laundry work in the institutions.

The male prisoners are employed in cleaning, painting, cooking, plumbing and general utility work.

Attached herewith you will find statements showing the disposition of prisoners received for the three months ending March 31, 1913; also the amounts of moneys collected from fines and telephone receipts from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the City Chamberlain, the Board of Health and the General Bookkeeper and Auditor of the Department in liquidation of monthly telephone bills. #### BRANCH WORKHOUSE, RIKERS ISLAND.

New York, April 7, 1913.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith a report of the work accomplished by the prisoners under my care in the several departments on Rikers Island for the quarter ending March 31, 1913. Very respectfully yours,

JOHN J. MURTHA, Head Keeper.

The following is an account of the work accomplished by prisoners during the quarter:

One thousand cubic yards of refuse, etc., was removed from the west end of the island, where it had been placed by the contractors during work at that part as a bank

for their railroad tracks. In removing this material about seven acres of ground was reclaimed, part of which dirt was used to level off that portion of the new made ground which was formerly used by the contractors filling in as their headquarters. This was made possible owing to a fire a short time ago which destroyed fifty small shacks, the ruins of which were removed to permit this leveling off process. Top soil has been spread over this ground and the lawn seed sown. The banks along the front of the island have been terraced and sods placed on same. Two drains have been put in, one on each side of the dock, to carry off rain water which previously run down the dock carrying with it dirt, ashes, etc. A new walk was laid running parallel with the road opened at the west end of the island. This walk was covered with ashes and screenings, rolled and tamped, and at present is in first class condition. The hotbed at the head of the island has been entirely rebuilt, and such seeds as tomatoes, lettuce, radishes, celery, cabbage and peppers sown in same, to be transplanted in proper season. Eight hundred cubic yards of back fill has been dumped behind sea wall at the east end of the island. This filling in has added one-quarter of an acre of ground to the island. To repair the main sewer at this side of the island it was necessary to dig a cut 70 feet long, 20 feet wide and 22 feet deep. Twelve lengths of 24 by 24-inch earthen pipe were laid to replace the old pipe which had been broken, around which a brick arch was built for protection. The beaches have been cleared of refuse and the large stones around the main dock were removed and a bulkhead built of them under this dock to strengthen same. The old platform dock which had been abandoned by the contractors has been stripped of all loose timber and several spiles removed from the river at this point. Three hundred and fifty loads of ashes have been unloaded from the department steamers and screenings from the same were spread over the roads and walks, all of which have received constant attention and are in good condition. About 100 tons of rock have been drilled, blasted and excavated from the center of the island where it interfered with the work of grading. Work has been started on the farm ground, such as clearing the same of weeds, refuse, etc. The report of the following quarter will contain a detailed statement of the farm and vegetables received from it. Along the front and east end of the island designs are being laid out in which plants are to be set when the weather permits. The above work will have a decided effect in the general appearance of the island when completed. At the present time there is a marked improvement.

The laundry has been completed and is a great addition to the island, both in economical and serviceable manner. In the past quarter, although we have been without hot water supply for one-half the time, over 20,000 pieces have been laundered.

What was known as the hospital (although it has never been used as such, the custom being to return persons who needed that class of treatment to Blackwells Island) has been converted into a prison known as the Annex. This will allow a separate prison for such prisoners as cooks, kitchenmen, etc., where they can get out early in the morning without disturbing the others on opening the larger prisons.

Painters—Dormitory No. 1 painted and trimmed, ceilings, side walls, door and window frames two coats; painted and trimmed front of buildings, two coats; painted roof and leader pipes, one coat; bathroom painted and trimmed, ceiling, side walls, door, window frames and wash trough, two coats; varnished partitions in bathroom, one coat. Dormitory No. 2, painted and trimmed ceiling, side walls, doors and window frames two coats; painted roof and leader pipes one coat; painted front of building two coats. Dormitory No. 3, painted and trimmed ceiling, side walls, doors and window frames, two coats; painted roof and leader pipes, one coat. Dormitory No. 4, painted front of building two coats; painted roof and leader pipes one coat. Mess hall, the ceilings, side walls, window frames, etc., of the Keepers' dining room and kitchen, prisoners' mess hall and kitchen were washed down, scraped, painted and trimmed two coats, the legs of the benches painted, three tables and fifteen chairs grained and varnished, front of building painted and trimmed, two coats. The roof and leader pipes painted one coat. Storehouse, front of building painted two coats, painted roof and leader pipes one coat. Painted the picket railing from mess hall to dormitory No. 4 two coats. Laundry, painted and trimmed ceiling, side walls, window frames and doors of wash room and ironing room two coats; painted floors of same one coat; painted and trimmed outside of building two coats; painted roof one coat. Whitewashed foundations of following buildings: Dormitory Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, mess hall, storehouse, hospital and doctors' quarters, Keepers' quarters and Keepers' house. Whitewashed lower trunks of trees.

Carpenters—Dormitory No. 1, repaired door leading to bathroom, put two pairs hinges on front door, put in six lights of glass and ten sash cords. Dormitory No. 2, put in eight lights of glass and three sash cords. Dormitory No. 3, repaired skylight, put in eleven lights and four sash cords. Dormitory No. 4, removed partition in bathroom, put in twenty-six lights of glass. Mess hall, repaired six benches, six chairs, five tables, two meat benches, put one pair of hinges on front door and one pair on rear door. Rebuilt hotbed and frame around same; removed, puttied and reset 216 lights of glass in frames. Laundry, connected two small buildings together, removing one window in each building and building up passageway; laid two floors, one in ironing room and one in wash room; built a large washing trough with six compartments; removed, repaired and rehung two doors, repaired four window frames, put in fourteen lights of glass and three sash cords, built subbase about this building.

Plumbers and Tinsmiths—Dormitory No. 1, repaired four faucets and three flush tanks. Dormitory No. 3, repaired three faucets, cleaned sewer, repaired two hoppers, put new 1½-inch trap under wash trough. Laundry, run 2 1½-inch galvanized supply pipes from basement of No. 2 dormitory, one for hot and one for cold water; made fourteen connections to same, laid sewer line from this building to the mess hall building, a distance of 110 feet; lined six tubs with galvanized iron sheeting, side of house with old roofing tin, put new roof on both ironing house and wash house.

During the quarter a daily average of twenty-five prisoners were sent to North Brother Island, excavating for laying a water main and back filling, under the direction of the Water Department. The following will show the amount and class of work accomplished during that period: Cubic yards earth excavated, 1,400; cubic yards earth back filled, 1,000; pipes hauled and handled, 1,605 feet; hauled and handled nine large hydrants and twenty-seven large fittings.

The daily average census during the quarter, 221 prisoners, and they were employed as follows: Stablemen and drivers, 7; carpenters, 3; tinsmiths and plumbers, 2; painters, 2; shoemaker, 1; kitchen and mess hall men, 10; utility men, 6; cleaning building and outdoor men, 190—221.

Census—On hand December 31, 1912, 136; received during the quarter, 249; returned during quarter, 174; on hand March 31, 1913, 211.

Dear Sir—I most respectfully submit a report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter commencing December 31, 1912, and ending March 31, 1913.

The three (3) dumbwaiters in the female prison have been overhauled and repaired. Two (2) kalamein doors, complete with frames, have been furnished and installed in doorway opening leading to kitchen floor and in doorway to stairway leading up to the chapel, both in the east hall leading to female prison. The Remington typewriter has been repaired and overhauled. Prison Van No. 16 has been repaired, painted and lettered and renumbered 10. One hundred (100) sets of cot hangers have been installed in cells in the male prison by prison labor. The walls and ceilings in one hundred and fifty (150) cells in the male prison, all windows and sashes in the new building, east hall leading to female prison and Matron's office and female counsel rooms have been painted by prison labor.

The female prisoners, under sentence here, are employed in laundry work and cleaning and scrubbing in and around the female prison and in the administration building.

The male prisoners, under sentence here, are employed in cleaning about the male prison, kitchen and stable and in repairing and painting about the institution.

Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, the number received, transferred and discharged; the amount of fines received from the County Court, Court of Special Sessions and ten City Magistrates' Courts, all of which has been paid over to the City Chamberlain as section 1550 of the Greater New York Charter requires.

Dear Sir—I most respectfully transmit herewith quarterly report of the City Prison of Queens for the period ending March 31, 1913, showing work done by contract or prison labor, statement of prisoners received and disposed of; also amount

of fines collected or cash bail received and deposited with the City Chamberlain, from prisoners committed from the Magistrates' Courts and the Court of Special Sessions of the Borough of Queens, respectively.

## Work Done by Contract or Open Market.

Repaired roof on passageway between the administration building and the men's prison; removed 70 old iron cots in cells in the female prison, replacing same with new iron cell cots with wire mattresses; continuously repairing the toilets, flushometers, hot and cold water supply and steam pipes, etc., throughout the entire institution; removed steel bar in cell No. 425 in men's prison, recently sawed through by one of the inmates in an attempt to escape, and replaced same with vertical tool steel bar; installed window shades throughout the entire administration building, including the female prison; installed the intercommunicating system, placing twelve telephone stations within the prison buildings.

## Work Done by Prison Labor.

The female prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and about the women's prison, mending clothing, bedding and doing such other work as may be deemed advisable.

The male prisoners under sentence here, besides being employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and about the men's prison, kitchen and lower portion of the administration building, have done other work as follows: Gave the interior side of the brick wall surrounding the prison three (3) coats of whitewash; painted the interior of the female prison in its entirety, giving it three (3) coats of paint; spaded and graded the entire prison yard, preparing for sodding, flower beds, and cement walks to be used for driveways and exercise accommodations for the prisoners; graded the land surrounding the exterior of the prison wall, from the wall to a distance of about fifteen feet. Band and Violin Class: About 210 inmates are profiting by the instructions in the ordinary band instruments and the violin. There are fifty boys in the regular band, sixty in the second band and thirty in the violin class.

Orchestra: There are about fifteen boys in the orchestra, under the leadership of one of the inmates.

Scholastic Education: The regular classes are held daily. There are both morning and afternoon sessions. Library and reading from 7 to 8 p. m.

Military Drill: Calisthenic exercises and military drill from 7.30 to 8.15 a. m. daily.

Shoe Department (Repairing): Those in this branch of the work are employed solely in repairing.

Tailoring Industry: The inmates employed in this department prepare clothing for the institution, making new suits, shirts, etc., and at the same time repairing and pressing the old work.

Plumbing Industry: The work of the plumbing class has been confined to the repairs in the different buildings of the Reformatory and in any new work necessary.

Painting Industry: The inmates of this department are occupied in practice work for beginners, at the same time receiving elementary instructions; and, as advanced, are put on work such as painting the interior of the school building, dining rooms, kitchen, pantries, etc.

Tinsmith Industry: The inmates of this department have been occupied at their usual work under the instructors' care, also making new articles for this and other institutions of the Department, and repairing old work.

Carpentry Industry (Manual Training): In this department the boys are taught the use of tools and begin practice work. As advanced, they are put on the general work of the institution, which comprises new and repair work required in the different buildings.

Electrical Industry: Daily classes are held in the shop where, under the tutelage of the Electrical Instructor, they are put through a course in the various elements of magnetism and electricity. They are first instructed in the theory, of which they then make practical application, under the guidance of the Instructor. They are given daily lessons, whenever possible, in the repairing of all electrical work of the institution.

Bricklaying and Plastering Industry: In our bricklaying class we are now giving instruction on an average to 50 boys, who, in nearly every case, show daily improvement in their practice work.

Printing Industry: Our printing department is now doing all the printing matter for the Reformatory, also for other branches in the Department of Correction.



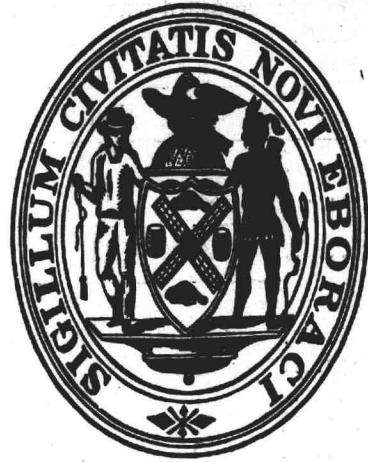
The Instructor of this department is daily giving instructions to the boys as to how to set up type, and how to distribute same in cases, also proofreading.

Gardening Industry: The general instruction in the gardening class is as follows: Sowing grass, flower and vegetable seeds, also transplanting flowers, and planting flowers in beds and boxes.

Health of Inmates: The general health of the inmates has been good. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damages and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of, or resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly shored and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and it is further

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
