Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

Carpentry. Queens County Court House-General repairs as required throughout building. putting, up shelving in vaults, repairing furniture, etc. Borough Hall-General repairs to building and offices of the various bureaus, re-

pairs to furniture, etc. Magistrate's and Municipal Courts, Long Island City-Making necessary repairs

and alterations to court rooms, Judges' chambers, etc., and repairing furniture. Town Hall, Jamaica-Repairing gutters for tinsmith, window frames, front and rear porches, closet tanks, replacing sash cord in windows, building entire new side stoop, repairing furniture and making general repairs throughout the building.

Comfort Station, Jamaica—Putting on door checks, easing doors, filing keys, etc. County Building, Jamaica-Taking down office partitions, Judges' desks, railings, etc., in County Clerk's and Surrogate's offices and removing same to Jamaica Town Hall; making alterations for plumbers.

Town Hall, Flushing-Easing doors, replacing sash cord, repairing furniture, locks, putting on new door knobs, etc.

Painting.

Borough Hall-Painted, grained and varnished wood work in President's private office, lettered eight office doors, bulletin board and two Local Board room signs: painted and finished tables, closets and shelves; painted side walls in laboratory; painted and puttied sash on first and second floors; glazed windows, 36 by 57 1-2 replaced four lights, 18 by 28 1-2.

Fifth Street Courts-Finished painting, graining and varnishing Court room,

cleaned, scraped and refinished two cabinets and two large tables. Queens County Court House-Finished scraping, priming and second coating all sheet iron work on dome, skylights, cornice, leaders and flanges on roof; cut out cracks in ceiling and side walls, plastered and painted four coats on the Grand Jury room, Jury room and Clerk's room; finished seven radiators with aluminum; chairs and oak panels scraped, stained and varnished in District Attorney's Office: lettered in gold on doors of Deputy City Clerk's Office and County Clerk's Office.

Jamaica Town Hall-Cut out and replastered cracks in walls and ceilings, painted ceilings two coats, side walls three coats, wood work two coats, grained and varnished in the Special Sessions Court Room; scraped rust from 516 feet of iron fence; painted same one coat of red lead and one coat of dark green; painted new stoops on side of building three coats, also new wood work on front and rear proches; work under way painting roofs.

Comfort Station, Jamaica—All wood work painted two coats, doors grained and varnished, cracks replastered, wall painted and wainscoting varnished; iron railings and steam pipes painted; thirteen flush tanks painted inside:

Electrical Work.

Installed wiring, buzzers and button connections in offices of Public Works Commissioner, Mailing and Payroll Divisions; installed new metal molding wiring, switch and receptacle plugs for fan motor outlets, third floor, Borough Hall; removed old telephone lines from tops of partitions, changing lines and reinstalling same to meet new locations of telephones at Borough Hall; installing and connecting new fan motors, periodical cleaning of forty-five fan motors, tabulating generating set and switchboards; general repairs to laboratory equipment and addressograph machines; recharging and installing new batteries for bell system; general repairs and supervision over lighting and power equipment; drawing of plans and specifications and cabinets, new service feeders and service panel box, setting and connecting motor in connection with testing machine equipment in the basement of Borough Hall.

Supervision and repairs to branding iron, grinding motor and lighting equipment, Bureau of Weights and Measures, Long Island City.

Installing new light outlet and fixtures in the Deputy City Clerk's Office, County

Court House; charging of thirteen cells of batteries, repairs to panel boards, bell system and lighting equipment; cleaning, repairing and adjusting parts of elevator machinery general supervision of repairs to lighting equipment, fan motors and private telephones lines and instruments; taking private telephone lines from County Building to temporary offices and installing telephones in new locations in the County Building.

Repairs to Bell system in Jamaica Town Hall and periodical inspection and

supervision of new electrical installation.

Repairs and supervision of equipment in the Comfort Station, Jamaica. Repairs to wires, fixtures and panel boards in Flushing Town Hall. Keeping all buildings supplied with lamps.

Plumbing.

Took down marble slabs and repaired checks of shower valves behind same, and reset slabs at interior bath, Long Island City.

Put in water supply pipe at College Point Corporation Yard; set up new closet and urinal, with water supply, waste, vent and soil pipes at Corporation Yard foot of

Nott Avenue, Long Island City.

Took down all old gas fixtures and capped outlets at County Building, Jamaica put in new fire hose valve and repaired closet and urinal flushometers at Queens County Court House; cleaned closets, waste pipes and soil lines, and repaired faucets, waste pipes, closets and urinal tanks, etc., and kept same in order in the following buildings Borough Hall, Magistrate's Court, Interior Bath, Long Island City; Queens County Court House, Long Island City; Town Halls, Flushing and Newtown; Town Hall County Building and Comfort Station, Jamaica, and the Magistrate's Court. Far Rockaway.

Steamfitting.

At the Borough Hall installed new radiator with risers and all connections on second floor; repaired main stop valves on both boilers and overhauled all valves that needed to be repaired; put on new radiator air valves.

Installed two radiators, one in the storeroom and another in the toilet and repaired boiler where necessary in the Magistrate's Court, Far Rockaway.

At the Queens County Court House, repaired boiler blow-off pipe, feed water pipe, steam trap, valves on top of boilers and radiators in the building.

County Building, Jamaica—Repairing roofs of extension, relining closet tanks and miscellaneous repairs.

Corporation Yard, Long Island City-Put on new tin roof on closet shed and made minor repairs.

Interior Bath, Long Island City.

All necessary repairs have been made as required and the bath maintained for the convenience of the public for the quarter. The attendance during the quarter was: July, 5,669 males, 2,259 females; August, 7,480 males, 3,923 females; September, 4,215 males, 2,205 females; Totals, 17,364 males; 8,387 females.

The grounds adjoining public buildings have received regular attention, flower beds maintained, the grass cut, etc.

All the necessary cleaning materials have been supplied the Janitors of the various buildings, and the buildings have been kept in a cleanly condition.

Topographical Bureau. The work of the Bureau falls naturally into two divisions: First, to quote from the Greater New York Charter, "To prepare a map of that part of the territory embraced within the Borough, of which a map or plan has not heretofore been finally established and adopted," and, second, make the surveys and maps required by Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment.

For the better prosecution of this work, the force of this office is similarly divided into two divisions, one division charged with the preparation of the final map of the Borough, the other division charged with all work incidental to street opening pro-

ceedings. The division charged with the preparation of the final map of the Borough is

divided into three corps: 1. Monumenting Corps-Charged with all the surveys and field work incidental

to the preparation of the final map and the monumenting of the Borough. 2. Computing Corps—Charged with all the computations incidental to the preparation of the final map of the Borough.

3. Draughting Corps—Charged with all draughting work required to prepare the final maps.

The division charged with the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment is subdivided into two corps:

1. Surveying Corps—Charged with all the field work necessary to the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

2. Office Corps—Charged with all the computations and draughting necessary for the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

In addition to the several corps mentioned above, we have a small corps engaged in gathering data and making reports concerning the legal status of the various streets in the Borough.

The following detailed description of the work done by this Bureau is arranged according to the work performed by these several corps, and in the order in which they are mentioned above.

Bureau of Substructures and Franchises.

The purpose of this Bureau is to accurately locate and map all substructures in the streets and public places of the Borough and to keep on file a complete record of all franchise data and essential matters relating to the various corporations which have hertofore been granted, or to which may hereafter be granted, franchises to operate within the Borough of Queens.

When the Division of Substructures became a bureau under the title of "Bureau of Substructures and Franchises," the work of obtaining all franchise data relative to the Borough of Queens was begun, and all available franchise data is being obtained.

The work is divided into two sections—Office and Field.

OFFICE WORK.

Consists of accurate mapping on durable record maps all notes of the field force, together with plans and data submitted to this office by other City Departments and Public Service Corporations.

These maps are to a scale of 20 feet=1 inch and are kept constantly up to date as to changes and additional subsurface construction. The various pipes and duct lines are shown in colors which greatly facilitate tracing out the location of any structure in a congested district.

All notes are indexed and filed in loose-leaf form in such a manner that data turned in for any section of the Borough is constantly ready for use.

All applications for permits relative to subsurface installations are sent to this Bureau, together with two prints of proposed work, for approval as to the proper position in the street for installation. When approved, a print is retained and application is presented to Bureau of Permits. In this way the proposed work is installed in a definite and somewhat permanent position within the streets, thereby preventing wasteful utilization of valuable subsurface space.

In several instances in Long Island City the Water Department and the Gas Company have materially benefited by data from this Bureau in selecting routes for new work at a minimum cost of construction.

A color index map is kept up to date showing just what streets in Long Island

City have substructures that have been located in the field. As the record maps are never really completed, they are revised continually. Changes at the Queensborough Bridge Plaza and the Belmont Tunnel are good examples of the changes and additions affecting the record maps.

Franchise data has been kept up to date and each franchise has been indexed

graphically in colors on a large wall map showing limits and nature of grant. The work of compiling boring data throughout the Borough is now under way and through the co-operation of the Building Department it will be possible to obtain boring data taken in the construction of new buildings throughout the Borough. A complete system of indexing and filing of this data has been established, and much valuable data is now contained in our records. With a systematic method of obtaining and filing boring information throughout the Borough, it will not be long before this information will save thousands of dollars in borings which otherwise would be neces-

sary without this data at hand. FIELD WORK.

Consists of the location of all substructures exposed in street openings, surveys and detail measurements of all sewer manholes, water gates, conduit boxes, poles, hydrants, vaults; in fact all surface indications of existing substructures.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held November 24, 1914, the following resolution

was adopted:
Resolved, That Section 182 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows: Section 182. No opium, morphine, chloral, or

cannabis indica, or any other substance giving a physiological reaction similar to than of opium; or any salts, alkaloids, or derivatives, of any of the said drugs or substances; or any preparation, compound, or mixture, containing any of the said drugs or substances or their salts, alkaloids, or derivatives; shall be sold at retail or given away in the City of New York except upon the written prescription of a duly licensed physician, veterinarian, or dentist inarian, or dentist.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or become interested, directly or indirectly, as con-tracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties mak-ing the estimate that the several matters stated

herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered untess, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any cottra issued by The City of New York any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
