An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 6 of Section 149 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Stands Within Stoop Lines and Under Elevated Railroad Stations."

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

That Section 1, Subdivision 6 of Section 149 of Article 13 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "stands within stoop lines and under elevated railroad stations." is hereby amended to read as follows: 6. Restrictions:

a. Every stand, other than a stand or booth under the stairs of an elevated railway station, must be strictly within the stoop line, and shall not be an obstruction to the free use of the sidewalk by the public. It shall not exceed the space of 10 feet long by 4 feet wide; except that, in the case of bootblack stands, a space not more than 3 feet long and 4 feet wide may be occupied by each chair of the stand. The enforcement of the provisions of this paragraph is hereby suspended until October 1, 1915, in the case of stands erected and maintained prior to March 14, 1914, where the resctriction of the dimensions of the stands would. in the opinion of the commissioner, entail a severe burden on the owners thereof. but this provision shall not be construed to permit the erection of any new stand of dimensions exceeding those hereinbefore specified;

b. No person shall be permitted to sleep in any portion of a stand; nor to hold more than one license;

c. No bootblack stand shall be provided with more than 3 chairs.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

2. Passenger stops. Street surface railway cars when signaled to take on or discharge passengers shall come to a full stop, in such a position as not to obstruct the crosswalk, before crossing any intersecting or connecting street; except that, with the written consent of the police commissioner, and upon the installation of "Trolley Stop" signs by the railway company, street surface railway cars may stop:

At other points on unpaved streets;

In the centers of blocks over 400 feet long; On the far side of any street containing an intersecting street railway.

The provisions of this subdivision shall apply also to omnibuses, except that omnibuses when signaled to take on or discharge passengers shall come to a full stop, in such a position as not to obstruct the crosswalk, after crossing any intersecting or connecting street, and provided that the provisions of clause (c) when applied to omnibuses shall have reference to the near side instead of the far side of any street containing an intersecting street railway. "Bus Stop" signs to be used instead of "Trolley Stop" signs.

3. Intersecting streets. Street surface railway cars may cross an intersecting | §240. 9. Responsibility. The master builder who shall complete or begin the construction of a vault, and the owner or person for whom the same shall be excavated or constructed shall be liable to the provisions, payments and penalties of this article,

No person shall remove or insecurely fix, or cause, procure, suffer, or permit to be removed or to be insecurely fixed, so that the same can be moved in its bed, any grate or covering or aperture of any vault or chute under any street; but nothing herein contained shall prevent the owner or occupont of the building, with which such vault shall be connected, from removing such gate or covering for the proper purpose of such vault or chute; providing he inclose the opening or aperture and keep the same inclosed, while such grate or covering shall be removed, with a strong box or curb at least 12 inches high, firmly and securely made, and provided that openings of more than 2 square feet of superficial area shall be inclosed at such times with strong railings not less than 3 feet high, to be approved by the borough president, and further that such grates or coverings shall not be removed until after sunrise of any day and shall be replaced before one-half hour after sunset. §243. Vault covers must afford secure footing.

The police commissioner shall report to the president of the borough having jurisdiction the name and address of the owner or occupant of any store, dwelling of other building having a vault under the sidewalk in front thereof, the cover of which is broken or presents a slippery surface. Subdivision 2 of section 13 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to peddlers, and particularly to restricted streets, is hereby amended by inserting therein, under the caption "Brooklyn" and in their appropriate place, the following words and figures:

5th avenue, between Prospect avenue and 18th street; Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately. Adopted by the Board of Aldermen June 27, 1916. Approved by the Mayor July 12, 1916.

No. 346. An Ordinance to Amend Subdivisions 2, 4 and 8 of Section 149 of Article 13 of Chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Stands Within Stoop Lines and the License Fees Therefor.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Subdivisions 2, 4 and 8 of section 149 of article 13 of chapter 23 of the

Code of Ordinances are hereby amended to read as follows:

2. Licenses. Stands within stoop lines may be permitted and licensed, with the consent of the owner of the abutting premises, for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, fruits, soda water, cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, candies, confectionery articles and the blacking of boots, but such licenses for the sale of soda water, cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, candies and confectionery articles shall be limited to stand licenses and locations thereof in effect on May 18, 1916. All licenses for such stands shall be granted and issued by the Commissioner of Licenses. Any person desiring to erect a stand or booth for the sale of newspapers and periodicals underneath the stairs of any of the elevated railroad stations shall file an application in the department of licenses, in which the applicant shall specify the location for such stand.

Section 2. 4. License Fees; Term. The annual license fee for a stand under the stairs of an elevated railway station shall be \$10. All stands within the stoop line shall be classified, and the annual license fee therefor shall be fixed and col-

lected as specified in the schedule following: (a) Stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both. \$5:

(b) Stands for the sale of fruits, or soda water or both, \$10; (c) Stands for the sale of cigars, or cigarettes, or tobacco, or the three, \$5;

(d) Stands for the sale of candies or confectionery articles, or both, \$5:

(e) Boot black stands, each chair, \$5. A license may be issued, in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this sec-

tion, and in the discretion of the commissioner, covering the sale of any combination of the classes of goods mentioned above, to be sold, however, from only one stand not exceeding the legal size hereinafter prescribed in this section; except that where boot black chairs are included in the combination, the space hereinafter prescribed for boot black chairs may be allowed in addition to the stand for the sale of other articles. The fees to be paid for such combination licenses shall be calculated in accordance with the above schedule for each kind of article permitted to be sold, or for each boot black chair to be operated.

No license shall be required for stands within stoop lines for the sale of newspapers, periodicals or both, in cases when such stands are conducted by dealers

Licenses for stands within stoop lines or under the stairs of any elevated railway station shall be issued as of December 1, and shall expire on the 30th day of November next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

Sec. 3. 8. Licenses not transferable. No license issued under any provision of this section shall be transferable, with or without consideration. Any license transferred to another person shall immediately thereupon cease and determine, and the privileges thereunder come to an end; provided that the commissioner of licenses may transfer a license to another location for the period of its unexpired term, in case the application for such transfer shall be accompanied by the consent of the owner of the premises to which the proposed transfer is to be made; and provided further, that such transfer is not sought for a license to sell articles other than newspapers, periodicals, and fruit at a location which was not duly licensed and in effect on May 18, 1916, but shall be in accordance with the provisions of subdivision 2 of this section. Any person who shall be guilty of a violation of the provisions of this subdivision shall not thereafter be granted a license, permit or other privilege to keep a stand within the stoop line or under an elevated railroad station, for the sale of any of the articles as hereinbefore provided in subdivisions 2 and 4 of this section, nor for the blacking of boots. Further, any person found guilty of violating any provisions of this subdivision, by a court of competent jurisdiction, shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500. The commissioner of licenses shall have the language of this subdivision printed in bold type on all applications for licenses and on all licenses granted, under the provisions of this article.

Stands duly licensed for the sale of fruits and soda water on May 18, 1916, shall not be required to obtain any new license to sell cigars, cigarettes, tobacco, candies and confectionery articles until the expiration of the license in force on that date. Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE.

Report on the Maintenance and Operation of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Years 1914 and 1915.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller, The City of New York:

Dear Sir—Under date of September 15, 1915, there was submitted to you by the

Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, pursuant to subdivision 6 of section 151 of the City Charter, a report upon the cost of maintaining and operating the Department of Docks and Ferries in 1913 and 1914. This report dealt with:

1. The Acquisition and Early Development of the New York Waterfront.

The Establishment of the Department of Docks.

The Commerce of The City of New York.
Improvements Progressing or Under Consideration.
The Laws Pertaining to the Department.

The Financial History of the Department. Having gone quite fully into these matters in the first report, it is proposed to confine this second report to a statement of the progress of the department in 1915, and to compare the financial results of the activities of 1914 and 1915.

The City's waterfront is about 577 miles in length; 55 miles in Manhattan, 68 in The Bronx, 201 in Brooklyn, 196 in Queens and 57 in Richmond. About 103 miles have been developed either by the City or by private owners, and 26 miles have been reserved for parks and 10 miles for the purposes of the Federal Government. The City of New York owns 127 miles, or 22 per cent. of the entire waterfront. This property has been acquired by state grants, by cessions from private owners, by purchase under agreement and by condemnation.

Improvements. By the Federal Government: East River—There is an appropriation of \$200,000

now pending in Congress for the deepening of the East River.

Jamaica Bay-The improvement of Jamaica Bay progressed during 1915 under a joint expenditure by the City and the Federal Government. The City has appropriated \$1,000,000 and the Government \$850,500 for this work. During 1915 the Mill Island Inner Channel was completed and deepened to a depth of 18 feet and width of 125 feet. In connection therewith a pier 400 feet in length by 30 feet in width has been built near the junction of Flatbush avenue and Avenue U. It is expected

that this locality will become an important centre for building materials.

As the "Brooklyn Eagle Almanac" well states, "Jamaica Bay is a physical fact of compelling proportions; it is one of the dominating geographical features of Greater New York. Its size and location make it impossible to ignore; its proper use is obviously of great importance."

By the State: The Barge Canal being constructed by the State is about 90 per cent. completed. Its entire length is 790 miles, of which 540 miles represent canal construction and 250 miles the utilization of natural streams and lakes. It is expected that this new waterway will add very greatly to the volume of business of the Port of New York. The State has thus far appropriated \$154,000,000 for the construction of this canal and its terminals.

By the City: Brooklyn Marginal Railroad-Most of the land necessary for the proposed marginal railroad along the waterfront and for transfer yards at the Erie Basin has been acquired by the City. In connection with this improvement the City will also make use of the site at 39th Street originally acquired for the 8th Ward Market. This railroad will cost the City approximately \$3,800,000. It is proposed that it shall be operated by the railroads, the City to receive a sum sufficient to pay the interest on its investment and to establish a sinking fund to retire at maturity the bonds issued for the improvement.

Manhattan West-Side Terminals-Under a proposed agreement between the City and the New York Central Railroad for the removal of the railroad tracks from the street surface on the west side of Manhattan Island, the City will obtain a great deal of land along the waterfront from the railroad company in return for a number of easements and rights. By the removal of the surface tracks the entire waterfront from 30th Street south will be left free for a comprehensive plan of terminal development for the use of all the railroads entering the metropolitan district. The City will also be able to extend Riverside Park at all points to the Hudson River.

Pier Extensions—A number of piers on the Hudson River between the Battery and Gansevoort Street were lengthened in 1915. On the East River, Pier No. 27 has

heen lengthened, as well as the pier at Dover Street.

One Thousand Foot Piers—Work on the 1,000-foot piers at 44th and 46th streets, Manhattan, progressed very rapidly in 1915, and it is hoped to complete them in the fall of 1917. They will probably cost about \$4,000,000. Also nearing completion is a 1,300-foot pier for the landing of passengers at Dreamland, Coney Island. Rapid

progress is also being made on the 29th, 30th and 35th Street piers, under construction at the Gowanus Terminal. These last named piers have already been leased upon terms advantageous to the City.

2. Organization of the Department.

In 1915 the recreation piers were maintained by the Department of Parks, so that in order to make the above figures comparable, the number of employees that were employed on the recreation piers should be deducted from the 1914 total as follows:

Temporary Attendants, 51; Temporary Cleaners, 20; total, 71.

The budget allowance for personal service was further decreased in 1916, the allowance for that year being \$968,387.20, as against an allowance in 1915 of \$1,498,861.70, a decrease of \$530,474.50. Part of this decrease was due to the emergency appropriation of \$150,000 to carry for the first four months of 1915 a large number of employees otherwise unprovided for in the 1915 budget.

These results are not absolutely correct, because the Miscellaneous Receipts for the respective years contain items not applicable to those years. The net revenues, too, take no account of the interest on the City's investment, the loss in taxes by reason of municipal instead of private operation of these utilities, depreciation, etc. The lighting and printing expenses, etc., of this department are also borne by the other departments

In the report of the Department of Taxes and Assessment for 1915 the property of the Department of Docks and Ferries is exempted in the sum of \$171,483,790. The

"net revenues" of 1915 represent a return on this sum of 2.63 per cent. Section 10 of Article VIII of the State Constitution, treating of the limitations upon the indebtedness which may be incurred by counties, cities, towns and villages of the State, provides that any indebtedness theretofore "incurred by the City of New York * * * for dock investment may be so excluded proportionately (from the limitation of ten per cent of the assessed valuation of the real estate of the City subject to toyotion) to the real estate of the City subject to toyotion) ject to taxation) to the extent to which the current net revenue received by said city therefrom shall meet the interest and amortization installments thereof * * * *"

Under this provision there was exempted by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court on January 31, 1913, dock bonds in the sum of \$69,943,053.55. The net revenues from the docks, as shown above, \$4,285,265.37, capitalized at 5½ per cent to cover interest and amortization charges, would represent a possible exemption of \$80,000,000 as against approximately \$70,000,000 now exempted. Although these figures are rough, they are believed to be conservative. In connection with the present narrow borrowing margin of the city, this possibility of a further exemption of dock bonds may be worth considering.

4. Expenditures, 1914 and 1915.

Below are shown in comparative form the expenditures of the Department of costs follows:

The tabulation above shows a decrease in the expenditures of 1915, as compared with those of 1914, of \$1.152,912.08, or 25.62 per cent. This was due, roughly speaking, to a general contraction of the department's activities, the consolidation of several bureaus, and the reduction of the personal service.

The decreases in the various items of expenditure shown above are explained below.

General Administration, Decrease \$27,772.53.

This is accounted for by the reduction of personal service in the Commissioner's office, in the Division of Audit and Accounts and in the General Office Building. In 1915 also it was unnecessary to make extensive repairs to automobiles, and to the office building chargeable to this expense classification. The decrease in the 1915 charges for automobile service, as compared with 1914, was \$5,057.29, or 35.2 per cent.

Receiving, Storing, Issue and Distribution of Supplies, \$55,139.87.

The diminution in cost here was mainly caused by the laying off of storekeepers' helpers, dock builders and laborers. There was also in 1914 a charge of \$2,900 for the purchase of an auto truck, which was not repeated in 1915.

A comparison of the cost of handling the various materials, supplies, etc., for the years 1914 and 1915, follows. The percentages of cost of handling are figured on the value of the materials, etc., issued

Note-The Whitehall Street Storehouse was started in the latter part of 1914, and the Sherman's Creek activity was discontinued about the same time.

While there has been a substantial curtailment of the stores, etc., issued and of the cost of handling them, the percentage of the cost of handling to the value of the stores issued has decreased but slightly. Efforts are being made, it is understood, to further reduce this cost. How necessary this is can be grasped by a perusal of the detailed cost of this service in 1915:

The West 80th Street storehouse was discontinued in 1916, and it is proposed also to discontinue the West 57th Street storehouse as soon as space can be found at Whitehall Street or at St. George for the supplies, etc., stored there. It would appear that the cost of maintaining the concrete and granite plant at East 24th Street is also too high, the more so because the rates of expense to the value of the materials issued was in 1914 but 27.98 per cent., as against 46.16 per cent. in 1915.

Superintendence of Waterfront, Decrease, \$34,794.80.

Part of the decrease was owing to the elimination of laborers in the Dock-

masters' offices and to the elimination of watchmen. More extensive repairs were made, too, in 1914 than in 1915 to the wharfage offices and to the launch "Jamaica." This launch was transferred in 1915 to the Police Department. Engineering Supervision and Maintenance and Operation of Plant. Decrease

\$114,412.65. This large reduction was secured by transferring the activities of the West 57th Street and South Brooklyn repair shops to the yard at St. George. There was also a reduction in the personal service. A more detailed comparison of the 1914 and 1915

Although a very substantial reduction has been made in the percentage of the cost of engineering, etc., to the amount of work done (19.89%), it still seems high. Operation and Maintenance of Floating Plant, Decrease, \$79,945.30.

Considering the increasing cost of all sorts of commercial service, it may not be amiss to recommend the consideration of an increase in the wharfage rates charged by the City.

Care and Maintenance of Water Front Properties, Decrease \$315,141.56.

Several elements enter into this large decrease: 1. In 1915 the Department of Street Cleaning carted away the street sweepings and refuse of the marginal streets instead of the Department of Docks and Ferries, as was the case in 1914.

2. The Department of Parks in 1915 bore all the expenses of the recreation piers, music, attendance, watchmen, etc., except repairs. In 1914 all these expenses, including repairs, were borne by the Department of Docks and Ferries. The latter department in 1915 also did less work than in 1914 for private concerns and for other City departments. The cost of repairs and of personal service was also largely reduced. The details of the expenditures under the above caption follow:

As shown in a previous statement the decrease in the cost of "Care and Maintenance of Waterfront Properties," as per the Expense Reports of the Dock Department was 41.05 per cent. There was an even greater decrease in the additional charges for superintendence, floating plant, stores and repair service, 50.32 per cent., so that on the entire cost of caring for these properties there was a decrease of 42.70

Construction. Reconstruction and Improvement of Waterfront Properties. Decrease,

\$108,351.21. A considerable decrease in the volume of work undertaken permitted large reductions in the cost of labor and materials.

In 1915 the percentage relationship of the overhead costs, \$145,377.91, to the direct costs, \$1,352,821.58, was 9.7. In 1914, the corresponding items were \$288,131.57, \$1,543,271.15 and 18.6 per cent.

In the report made upon similar expenditures in 1914 attention was directed to the expenditure of the proceeds of corporate stock for the expenses of operation and maintenance, and the entire elimination of this practice was recommended.

The amount so misapplied in 1914 was about \$100,000. The following table

There was a decrease of \$8,149.58 in the value of property acquired in 1915, as compared with 1914, but in 1915 certain kinds of equipment were charged to this account which in 1914 were distributed to other accounts. Of the entire amount expended in 1915 under this caption, \$14,818.57, it is stated that \$6,914.89 was for the acquisition of real estate and \$7,903.68 for equipment. It is understood that most of this equipment is represented by small articles and tools. Under these circumstances it would appear to be better accounting practice to charge this equipment to the functions benefited by it than to couple it with a permanent asset like real estate.

Operation and Maintenance of Municipal Ferries, Decrease, \$308,329.45.

An interesting report issued by the Department of Docks and Ferries, under date of February 21, 1916, states that this total decrease in cost was chiefly due to a saving of \$111,963 on coal, a saving of \$98,770 by cutting down the crews on the 39th Street Ferry, \$25,989 in repairs and \$38,723 saved by not insuring the ferryboats against accident.

Although the financial results for 1915 are very satisfactory as compared with those of 1914, it is estimated that the revenues from these ferries for 1915 would have been \$116,000 greater had the city not entered into a transfer agreement, calling for a division of the passenger fares.

How this arrangement has worked can be gathered from the following quotation from the Dock Department report of February 21, 1916, above referred to:

"On September 14, 1914, there went into effect a contract with the New York Railways Company whereby passengers upon the payment of a five-cent fare could transfer between the ferries and the surface lines of the railroad company terminating at the foot of Whitehall Street. The contract provided for a division of the fare upon the basis of two cents to the city and three cents to the street railway

"According to the Department of Docks and Ferries, 'there has been no material stimulation of traffic to Staten Island brought about by the transfer agreement.' In the year 1915 the St. George division showed an increase in passengers carried of 1,132,584, against an increase of 992,931 between the years 1914 and 1913, or a gain of 139,653. The percentage of increase, however, was approximately the same for the two years, being in each case 8.2%. The gross revenue from passenger traffic decreased during the year 1915 \$59,102.62. If the same passenger traffic had been carried and the city had received the full five-cent fare it would have meant a difference in revenue of approximately \$116,000, which can fairly be taken as the approximate annual cost to the city of the transfer agreement.

While, as stated, the net results of the operation of the municipal ferries for 1915 as compared with 1914, is very creditable, yet as a financial proposition the ferry system is far from attractive. If to the deficit of \$24,860.92 in 1915, shown above, is added interest on the city's investment in boats and terminals, and the loss of taxes by reason of public instead of private operation, the deficit would be much larger.

Subsidy for Roosevelt Street Ferry. There was no change in the amount of the subsidy granted by the city to this

As pointed out in last year's report the city is obligated to pay to the Brooklyn and Manhattan Ferry Company on account of the maintenance and operation of the ferry from Roosevelt Street, Manhattan, to Broadway, Brooklyn, \$11,000 per month, the city to receive in return, after the deduction of certain expenses and allowances, one-half of the net earnings. The amounts contributed by the city since this arrangement became operative, March 16, 1911, to December 31, 1915, and the city's share of the net earnings are shown below:

These figures may be somewhat changed if a disagreement between the city and the company as to the propriety of certain deductions made by the company for depreciation is decided in the city's favor.

Besides the direct loss to the city of the \$396,354.71 set forth above, there is also the loss to the city of the rental values of its waterfront properties used by this ferry

5. General Remarks.

In the report upon this department for the years 1913 and 1914, particular stress was laid upon the comparatively meagre net revenues of the department, and suggestions were made looking both to an improvement in the gross revenues and the elimination of unnecessary expenses. The net revenues show an increase in 1915 over 1914 of \$985,251.58. This net increase is made up of an increase in gross revenues of \$173,-691.31, and a decrease in the cost of maintenance and operation of \$811,560.27. Further extensive reductions in the cost of maintenance and operation will be made in 1916, and doubtless there will also be an increase in the gross revenues.

It is recommended that the charges made by the city for the use of its water

front properties should be sufficient at least to provide for:

1. Interest on the amount of its investment. 2. The loss of taxes, due to municipal instead of private operation of such properties.

Depreciation and obsolescence.

It is submitted that to lease these properties for less is in effect subsidizing the steamship lines that use them, thereby imposing additional burdens upon the taxpayers generally and also depreciating the value of other similar public and private property.

The making of repairs for lessees at less than the total cost of such work to the department (direct and overhead) is disapproved. It is felt, too, that the dock department should not pay out of its appropriations for improvements and repairs for other city departments. If the dock department has employees in excess of its needs it should dispense with them.

It is understood that the department this year, following out the recommendations made in last year's report, is doing a greater part of its construction work than heretofore by contract.

Perhaps a matter of even greater importance at the moment than the direct financial results of this department is the question of adequately providing for the growing commerce of the City and the retention and expansion of its manufacturing industries.

In February, 1914. The Merchants' Association of New York, in urging the adoption of a comprehensive plan for the development of the Port of New York, stated: The need of a comprehensive plan rests primarily in the facts:

"A. That no general plan or movement has ever been made to utilize many acres of the Port that possess economic and physical advantages; and

"B. That the competition for sites within certain restricted areas has raised the value of the land, wharf and terminal sites to an amount where the interest and rental charges thereon are increasing the cost to the shipper and consumer beyond economical necessities;

"C. That the efforts of the authorities and private interests have heretofore been directed solely toward the remedying of and planning for restricted areas which comprise only a few of the units of the entire Port problem.

'The ideal conditions for industrial development, especially in localities

otherwise favored by nature like New York, are:

"a. Cheap lands for industrial sites and low rental charges; "b. Close proximity and easy access to rail or water carriage;

"c. Reasonable proximity to labor markets and homes, and easy access thereto for cartage:

"d. Readily and always obtainable food supplies with economical facilities for

"With perhaps one exception, in previous plans made for the amelioration of specific localities, little or no attempt has been made to co-ordinate rail and water traffic, to minimize cartage, and no general application of economic engineering principles has been applied to the general terminal facilities and rail or water transportation interests.'

In "The Problem of Greater New York," by Harry Chase Brearley, 1914, occurs the following:

"It is interesting to cross the Hudson and find suburban New Jersey studded with great factories of a type hardly to be found in Greater New York. Clustering thickly along the railroads and waterways leading to this City they are located to command the City's market while paying taxes and bringing property to another State.

"These factories are monuments to New York's lost opportunities. They tell of concerns forced out of New York or those that would have come here had opportunties permitted. They represent hundreds of millions of capital and scores of thousands of hands. They are a direct loss to the revenues of the entire city."

Speaking in the the World's Work, 1915, of the diversion of the City's credit to building of subways, Willard C. Brinton says:

"Probably not one citizen in ten thousand realizes that, though new subways affect the comfort of the citizens, the very future of the City itself depends on the proper development and enlightened management of its harbor." The New York Sun of June 20, 1916, says editorially:

"For months past the commercial imagination of travelers has been stirred by the sight of fleets of carriers lying in the upper bay awaiting opportunity to take on cargo and scurry back to Europe, while nearby a long stretch of shore lies practically unused. Why not, then, reclaim the marshes, dredge channels, build piers and warehouses, and so relieve the congestion at the broad neck of the bottle?"

The Evening Sun of the same date points out to the City officials and organizations the importance of supporting the "effort to secure the adoption by Congress of a comprehensive plan for the development of the Port of New York." It points out that "New Yorkers themselves are most to blame for unsatisfactory shipping conditions here," because "they have failed in a persistent and insistent manner to show Congress why it is of vital interest to the United States as well as to this city that New York harbor shall be made all that it is capable of being." * * * "The adoption of the proposed plan will not mean millions in appropriations now, but it will mean that all the moneys appropriated in the future will be spent toward a definite end, not haphazard, which will eventually make the maximum out of the Port of New York.'

With the new business that will doubtless be created by the utilization of the Panama Canal and the new Barge Canal, nearly completed, and possibly by the improvement of the intracoastal waterways, it would seem highly important that every effort be made to secure to New York at least its natural share of this increased

In this connection it is suggested that the possibility of securing an additional exemption of dock bonds for the purpose of the further improvement of the City's water-front and the consequent facilitation of its commerce and manufactures be given

earnest consideration. As an alternative to this last suggestion, thought might also be given to the plan of permitting waterfront improvements to be made by private capital upon lines approved by the city, the property to be subject to recapture by the city or to revert to it without cost at the end of an agreed period.

Chapter 502 of the Laws of 1916, providing that the Mayor may appoint a Director of the Port, was doubtless enacted in order that the problem of developing the commerce and industries of the port might be given the systematic and comprehensive study it deserves.

All that is needed, apparently, are plans adapted to the City's needs and the funds to permit of their execution. Respectfully, ROBERT B. McINTYRE, Supervising Statistician and Examiner.

The amount shall be as specified in the pro-posals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

n excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Depart-ment, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, to-gether with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
