COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.
The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Comptroller:

No. 548 (S. O. 62).

Comptroller—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$25,000, to Continue the Audit of Accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears.

The City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, May 18, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I herewith transmit a resolution for adoption by the Board of Aldermen, whereby the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will be requested to authorize the issuance of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$25,000 for the purpose of providing funds to meet the additional expenses entailed by the work of completing the audit of the accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears covering the period from January 1, 1917, down to March 31, 1918, on which date Mr. Daniel Moynahan, the late Collector, died.

The mandatory provisions of section 154 of the Charter imposed upon the Comptroller the duty of making an audit of these accounts, as may be noted from the following excerpt therefrom:

"Whenever a receiver of taxes or any deputy receiver, or a collector of assessments and arrears or any deputy collector shall cease to hold office, and within one year thereafter, it shall be the duty of the comptroller to examine the accounts of such receiver or collector or deputy, and if found correct to cause a certificate to that effect to be filed with the bond of such officer, and such certificate so filed shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the conditions of such bond and the lien or liens thereby created."

In a communication addressed to you, dated January 21, 1918, requesting the issuance of \$30,000 of special revenue bonds for the purpose of providing funds to meet the additional expenses necessary for the efficient prosecution and completion of the work of auditing the accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears covering the period from January 1, 1910, to December 31, 1916, I stated that:

"This work of audit is being conducted by means of a thorough detailed examination of all transactions within the period referred to as reflected on the tax rolls and assessment records, etc. * * * in all of the five Boroughs."

—and that it was also contemplated later on to carry the period of audit down to December 31, 1917.

Mr. Moynahan's death and the Charter provisions with respect to what must be done when a Collector of Assessments and Arrears shall cease to hold office, makes it now imperative upon the Comptroller to provide for such an examination of the late Collector's accounts, as will enable a certificate to be given which shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the conditions of the Collector's bond and the lien or liens thereby created. To enable this to be done most effectively and at the least possible cost, it is very desirable that the present organized staff or temporary employees, who have been engaged in this work during the past ten months, be continued. A close and careful estimate of the amount necessary indicates that approximately \$25,000 will be required. I therefore respectfully request the issuance, under subdivision 8, section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, of special revenue bonds for this purpose and to the amount stated. The attached resolution, if adopted, will provide for and meet the necessary requirements.

I also transmit herewith copy of a report made to me on this subject by Mr. Duncan MacInnes, Chief Accountant; Mr. Robert B. McIntyre, Supervising Statistician and Examiner, and Mr. H. H. Rathen, Auditor of Receipts of the Department of Finance. Respectfully,

Resolution providing for issuance of \$25,000 special revenue bonds to provide for continuing the audit of the accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears.

Report dated May 18, 1918, re audit of accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), the proceeds whereof to be used for the purpose of providing additional funds for the continuance of the audit of the accounts to March 31, 1918, of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears now being made to December 31, 1916, as required by section 154 of the Greater New York Charter. All obligations contracted for hereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1918.

Subject: Audit of the Accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears from January 1, 1917, to March 31, 1918.

Hon. CHARLES L. CRAIG, Comptroller:

Dear Sir—The undersigned Committee, which was appointed by you early in January to consider and report upon the continuance of the audit of the books and accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears, hereby respectfully reports that the audit of these accounts to December 31, 1916, is approaching completion in all of the Boroughs with the exception of the Borough of Brooklyn, as will be more particularly specified in a subsequent report which will fully describe the work that has been done and the period covered, which in many instances of taxes and also of assessments, has gone back for years prior to consolidation.

Mr. Moynahan Died March 31, 1918.

Mr. Daniel Moynahan, Collector of Assessments and Arrears, died on March 31, 1918. He was appointed to the office on August 20, 1906. Mr. Moynahan's death makes it necessary that the audit of the accounts of his office be continued covering the period down to March 31, 1918, inclusive.

Section 154 of the Charter provides that:

"Whenever a receiver of taxes or any deputy receiver, or a collector of assessments and arrears or any deputy collector shall cease to hold office, and within one year thereafter, it shall be the duty of the comptroller to examine the accounts of such receiver or collector or deputy, and if found correct, to cause a certificate to that effect to be filed with the bond of such officer, and such certificate so filed shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the condition of such bond and the lien or liens thereby created. * * *"

In the report which we made to you under date of January 15, 1918, we stated that the continuation of the audit then recommended contemplated the attainment of the following results:

(1) The verification of all transactions from January 1, 1910, to and including December 31, 1916, as shown on the tax rolls and assessment lists, and the absolute reconciliation of the lists and rolls transmitted during said period with the related accounts kept in the Borough ledgers. This means that with respect to all tax rolls (which also include water rents) and all assessment lists transmitted for collection to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears since January 1, 1910, not only will all the transactions affecting such rolls and lists be verified, but also that the amount of unpaid items will be absolutely established.

(2) With respect to tax rolls and assessment lists transmitted to the Collector of Assessments and Arrears prior to January 1, 1910, and subsequent to January 1, 1898, the work contemplated will result in the verification of all transactions that occur between January 1, 1910, and December 31, 1916, and in addition thereto the securing, with respect to each separate list and roll, of a statement showing the unpaid liens as of December 31, 1916.

As previously stated herein, this work is drawing to a close, with the exception of the Borough of Brooklyn, where the complexities of the situation and the very large number of assessments have made the work more difficult and time-consuming. Attention was called to this situation in our previous report, wherein we pointed out that the additional time which would be required to complete the audit in the Borough of Brooklyn, was due to the records in use in that Borough being substantially different

in procedure from those used in any of the other four Boroughs, and to accomplish the same results as will be elsewhere attained, will require the greater time indicated. The reconciling and adjusting entries to bring the controlling ledger accounts into agreement with the outstanding taxes, assessments and water rates as established on the rolls would be subsequently completed by accountants of this Department.

Additional Appropriation of \$25,000 Needed to Complete Audit.

To complete the work of auditing the accounts of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears down to the date of Mr. Moynahan's death, an examination, which is made mandatory by the provisions of section 154 of the Charter, will require an additional appropriation of approximately \$25,000. It will only be possible to complete the work stated in the thorough manner in which it should be and keep within the appropriation stated by the use of the present organization, the personnel of which has become, through the experience gained during nearly twelve months past, expert in this particular and important work.

This approximation of the expenditure which will be required is based on a close estimate of the number of bookkeepers and machine operators, the number of machines, the cost of paper and cards, and the time which will probably be required to complete the audit. To do this work in the most effective and expeditious manner, and at the least possible cost, it will be necessary to augment the present temporary staff from 24 to 27 Bookkeepers, these to be paid \$4 per diem; to increase the number of Tabulating Operators from 10 to 19, to be paid \$2.50 per diem, and to rent 7 punching machines, 6 tabulating machines, and 6 sorting machines—an increase of 5 machines over the number at present in use. It is estimated that the work will take five months to complete, and the total personal service, the rented machines, the cost of paper and cards, etc., will approximate \$25,000.

Annual Collections Aggregate from \$27,000,000 to \$31,000,000.

During last year, the Collector of Assessments and Arrears was charged with accounting for \$79,224,485.20 of taxes, assessments and water rates, and the collections thereon, as reported by him and deposited with the Chamberlain, aggregated \$25,184,010.13, with approximately \$2,000,000 more for interest on these arrears. The cancellations of these liens reported during the year amounted to \$1,395,789.20.

In 1916, the collections of taxes, assessments and water rates reported by the Collector of Assessments and Arrears and deposited with the Chamberlain, amounted to \$29,139,721.27, and the cancellations reported aggregated \$2,221,298.05, with approximately \$3,000,000 additional as interest.

There are upwards of 8,200 assessment lists in the Collector's office in the different boroughs, and every year's tax levy since consolidation has still unpaid items, together with unpaid items of levies preceding 1898.

Comparatively Small Cost of Audit.

The foregoing figures will give some indication of the comparatively small cost of making a thorough audit, which, under all circumstances should be made, and which is evidently contemplated by the Charter, which provides that if, after the examination of the accounts of the Collector, the Comptroller finds these to be correct, he shall cause a certificate to that effect to be filed with the bond of the Collector:

"* * * and such certificate so filed shall be a full discharge and satisfaction of the conditions of such bond and the lien or liens thereby created."

This audit, when completed to March 31, 1918, will establish absolutely the outstanding and unpaid balances of taxes, assessments, and water rates appearing on the rolls as of said date; thus not only setting forth the assets of the City consisting of these liens, but determining the basic figures upon which future, and preferably continuing current audits of the offices of the Collector of Assessments and Arrears and also of the Receiver of Taxes should be conducted.

We therefore respectfully urge in the interest of economy that provision be made for continuing the present organization, which has been making the audit of these accounts, until the completion thereof by bringing the work down to the date hereinbefore stated, viz., March 31, 1918. Respectfully,

Commissioner of Police—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$7,000, to Pay Salaries of Ten Policewomen from June 1 to December 31, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, New York City, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—It is respectfully requested that special revenue bonds be issued in the sum of \$7,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, to pay the salaries of ten policewomen from June 1st, 1918, to December 31st, 1918, and to enable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by and with the consent of the Board of Aldermen, under the provisions of law, to establish the position of policewoman and to enable the Police Commissioner to appoint such policewomen when such position is established; the policewomen, when so appointed, to be exempt from civil service examination under the provisions of chapter 651 of the Laws of 1917. President, Borough of Queens—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$2,500, to Meet Deficit in Account "Contingent Expenses, Supreme Court, Queens County."

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Queens, Long Island City, May 21, 1918.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—Application is hereby made, with the approval of your Honorable Board, for the issuance of Special Revenue Bonds in the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), proceeds of which are to be applied to contingent expenses of the Supreme Court in the County of Queens.

In support of this application, I am in receipt of a letter from Mr. John D. Peace, Special Deputy Clerk, in charge, a copy of which follows:

"In looking over our expenses incurred under Code No. 734, Contingencies, Care of Supreme Court, I find that the fund is about exhausted for the year 1918.

"I respectfully suggest that your office make an application for the transfer of \$2,500.00 from some other fund or the issue of Special Revenue Bonds for said amount.

"It is necessary that this amount be appropriated for the use of the Supreme Court, Queens County.

"I estimate that this money will be needed as follows:

For meals furnished to jurors from May 1 to December 31, 1918 \$1,000 00

For printing calendars, both of trial and special 1,000 00

A rearranged calendar is to be issued as of October 1, 1918, which will probably contain over 200 pages and about 500 copies will be needed.

For supplies of all kinds 500 00

\$2,500 00"

Supplementing the above letter, I wish to state that for a few years prior to 1918, payment for meals furnished to jurors has been paid out of an account entitled "Funds and Expenses of Jurors, Sheriff of Queens County." This year, however, and by direction of the Comptroller's office, payment for meals furnished to jurors has been paid out of a contingency appropriation of \$2,000 and included in the budget appropriations of this department. When the budget was being considered, this item was not included nor was any allowance made therefor; hence the lack of sufficient money to meet this unexpected contingency.

Gentlemen—The President of the Borough of Manhattan on March 20, 1918 (No. 103, Calendar, March 28, 1918), presented a request from the General Secretary of the International Union of Rammermen and Pavers for an increase in the wages of Rammermen from \$4 to \$5 per diem and for Pavers from \$5 to \$6 per diem, and asked that the higher rates be fixed if on investigation they should be found to be the prevailing rates.

The rate for Rammermen was fixed at \$5 per diem and the Pavers at \$6 per diem, January 1, 1918, by agreement entered into by 36 firms and individuals engaged in paving work in Greater New York and the authorized representatives of the International Union of Rammermen and Pavers.

The Secretary of the General Contractors' Association states that all members of that organization are paying the rates of \$5 per diem for Rammermen and \$6 per diem for Pavers and that they employ fully 80 per cent. of those classes of workmen.

The General Secretary of the International Union of Rammermen and Pavers states that every member of that organization is receiving the higher rates except those employed in City departments. He further states, however, that, although the \$5 and \$6 rates became effective January 1, 1918, the Rammermen and Pavers employed by the City will accept the prevailing rates from April 1, 1918.

The change in the rates for Rammermen and Pavers employed in all the City departments, effective as of April 1, 1918, will involve an increased cost for this year of \$34,795.00. Authority to establish the new rate is vested in the Board of Aldermen under Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter.

The Committee recommends the adoption of the attached resolutions fixing the rate of Pavers at \$6 per diem and Rammermen at \$5 per day, in all City departments, effective as of April 1, 1918. Respectfully,

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, April 2, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—For upward of four years prior to March 2, 1918, the firm of Dailey & Ivins had a contract with the City for the final disposition of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish from the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Under this contract it was their duty to furnish vessels at the various water-front dumps in these Boroughs to remove such refuse and to dispose of the same.

During the last week of December, 1917, and the first week of January, 1918, unprecedented weather conditions prevailed in New York City and vicinity, the temperature during most of the time being below zero. As a result enormous quantities of ice formed in the rivers and harbor and as far out as Sandy Hook, and in consequence river transportation was practically suspended during the months of January and February, 1918. It was impossible for Dailey & Ivins to remove loaded scows from the dumps or to return empty ones. It was likewise impossible to reach the unloading points, so that the unloading machinery was useless. Little, if any, sea dumping was carried on, due to the inability of tugboats to break the ice. As the result of all this by March 1, 1918, about one hundred and ninety (190) loaded scows were lying around the City dumps, awaiting removal. Dailey & Ivins also had considerable trouble in obtaining tugboats, due to the demands of the War and Navy Departments, who commandeered most of the available tow-boats in New York Harbor.

There being no other outlet for the daily collection of ashes and rubbish our carts were obliged to deposit this refuse in the marginal streets adjacent to the dumping boards. About 251,000 cubic yards of such materials was deposited at fifteen (15) different points along the North and East Rivers, in the Borough of Manhattan, with the expectation that Dailey & Ivins would remove them when weather conditions would improve. Instead, on March 2, 1918, this firm abandoned its contract with the City, having first transferred its fleet of sea-going scows to New Jersey, where a petition in bankruptcy was filed against the said firm by its creditors. Our inability to obtain the use of these scows seriously handicapped us in our efforts to keep up the disposal of the daily output of refuse from the City, to say nothing of getting rid of the accumulations in the streets. With the advent of warm weather these accumulations may seriously affect the health of the community.

At present the Department is attempting to carry on the work abandoned by Dailey & Ivins by using the plant and unloading machinery belonging to said firm, but said plant is not sufficient to unload the scows which carry away the daily output from the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx. Many loaded barges are still lying at the water-front dumps awaiting unloading.

The only alternative method for disposing of these accumulations of refuse in the streets is by placing them upon motor trucks and removing them to distant points in the Borough of Queens, where they may be used to fill in marsh land. For this purpose a contract was prepared, and on March 18, 1918, sealed bids for furnishing vehicles to carry away these accumulations of refuse were received and opened. The lowest bid received was that of Jacob Fradus Contracting Co., Inc., of No. 447 East 53rd street, New York City, whose bid was ninety cents (90c.) per cubic yard. A contract was entered into with the said Company, whereby the City rented its plant by the day for sixty (60) days, beginning March 25, 1918, payment to be made according to the actual number of cubic yards of material removed, at the price bid per cubic yard. The Contractor is now engaged in removing this material.

This Department is without funds to meet this emergency, no provision having been made in our annual budget, as such conditions were entirely unforeseen. It is estimated that the Department will require the sum of \$250,000 to cover the expense of removing these accumulations of refuse.

I respectfully request that the Board of Aldermen pass a resolution authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds amounting to \$250,000, pursuant to subdivision 8 of section 488 of the Greater New York Charter, to cover this expense. Yours truly,

Sir—Under date of April 2, 1918, this Department requested the Honorable Board of Aldermen to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$250,000 to dispose of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish deposited on the marginal streets adjacent to the City's dumping boards, amounting, approximately, to 251,000 cubic yards.

On March 22, 1918, a contract was entered into by the City with Jacob Fradus Contracting, Inc., to dispose of this material at ninety cents (90c) per cubic yard, but before entering into this contract the estimated amount of material to be disposed of was reduced by eliminating Delancey Street location, which approximated 12,000 cubic yards, thereby reducing the estimated amount of material to be disposed of to about 239,000 cubic yards, at ninety cents (90c) per cubic yard, or \$215,100.

This contract has been registered on the books of the Department of Finance as No. 49,382 and temporarily charged to the Account No. 2388.

In view of the above facts I would recommend that my request for special revenue bonds be reduced to read \$215,100, instead of \$250,000 formerly requested.

No. 488—Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Reduction of Issue of Special Revenue Bonds \$250,000 to Dispose of Ashes, Street Sweepings, Etc., by Reducing the Amount to \$215,000.

Hon. FRANCIS P. KENNEY, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—In accordance with your request I have investigated the above matter and report thereon as follows:

On March 2, 1918, Dailey and Ivins who had a contract for the final disposition of ashes and rubbish in Manhattan and The Bronx for a period terminating on January 1, 1919, abandoned their contract. Owing to the failure of the contractors, both before and after March 2, 1918, to provide scows to receive the refuse, the City was obliged to dump piles of ashes at various places in the marginal streets along the North and East Rivers. These piles of ashes are now being removed by the Jacob Fradus Contracting Company, Inc., under a contract made by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning on March 23, 1918.

In his letter dated May 3, 1918, the Commissioner reduces his former request to \$215,000 on the ground that piles of ashes deposited on the marginal streets at Delancey, Spring and Varick streets were removed by department employees thus reducing the quantity to be removed by the contractor, Jacob Fradus Contracting Company, Inc., from 251,000 cubic yards to 239,000 cubic yards.

The quantity of ashes and rubbish has been still further reduced by several fires which have occurred in the piles and by settlement of the rubbish. It is now believed that the quantity to be removed will be less than 160,000 cubic yards.

The cost of removing these piles of ashes is, however, only one of the extra expenses due to the failure of Dailey and Ivins and chargeable against their unfinished contract.

The Department of Street Cleaning is carrying on the work of disposal of ashes and rubbish by hiring tugs, scows and laborers. It is, however, paying laborers \$3.00 per day where the prices of the contract made in 1913 were based on wages of \$1.75 per day for laborers; it pays \$15 per day for hired scows where the prices of 1913 and 1914 were from \$4.50 to \$5 per day. Coal, rope and other supplies have doubled or tripled in price.

The appropriation in the budget for 1918 for final disposition was based on the prices to be paid under the contract and it is evident that much more than the amount of \$215,000 requested will be necessary to make up the deficiency in the budget for final disposition of ashes and rubbish in 1918.

It would therefore seem that this appropriation of \$215,000 should not be for the specific purpose of removal of piles of ashes, but should be for the purpose of providing, in part, to meet the anticipated deficit in the budget appropriation for the final disposition of ashes and rubbish. AN ORDINANCE governing conditions of labor among certain employees of the Street Cleaning Department.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. This ordinance shall apply to all employees of the Department of Street Cleaning who are at present or hereafter may be included in the Labor Class as provided for in the rules and regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Section 2. The legal day's work of such employees shall be of eight hours' duration.

Section 3. No such employee may be required to work longer than eight hours in any one day of twenty-four hours except that he be compensated for such overtime at the rate of time and one-half, such overtime rate to be calculated on a basis of a working day of eight hours and of three hundred and thirteen (313) working days in one year.

Section 4. No such employee shall be required to work more than six days in any consecutive seven.

Section 5. No such employees shall be in any way prohibited or restrained from

forming organization for their mutual interest and advancement as employees of the said Department of Street Cleaning.

Section 6. The duly accredited representatives of such employees' organizations, in their capacity as such, shall in no way be prevented from communicating or making trade agreements with the Commissioner of Street Cleaning in regard to any matter affecting the employment of those they represent.

Section 7. All moneys paid by any such employee to any pension fund, sick or accident benefit or other insurance fund carried by the said Department, which payment is by its rules made compulsory, shall be repaid to the said employee in full should he at any time and for any reason leave the service of the said Department without having received any payment from such funds and without existing legal claim to any such payment in the future.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

REPORTS:

That Mr. Steinert, representing the Street Cleaning Department, appeared before the Committee and stated that sections 2 and 4 of the proposed ordinance conflict with section 536 of the Charter; that as to sections 5 and 6, there is no cause for complaint, as there are no restrictions against the men organizing, and the Commissioner has set aside Thursday afternoons to hear any complaint or grievance the men may wish to present.

It is the sense of your Committee, therefore, that whatever cause there may be for complaint, the Board of Aldermen is without jurisdiction, and relief rests with the State Legislature and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It therefore recommends the matter be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to amend chapter 16, article 1, of the Code of Ordinances by inserting therein a new section in relation to conditions of labor among certain employees of the Department of Street Cleaning.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Chapter 16, article 1, of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

Sec. 4. Hours of service and other conditions of labor in the Department of Street Cleaning. 1. This section shall apply to all employees of the Department of Street Cleaning who are included in the "Labor Class" as provided for in the Rules and Regulations of the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

2. The legal day's work of such employees shall be of eight hours' duration.

3. No such employee shall be required to work longer than eight hours in any one day of twenty-four except that he be compensated for such overtime at the rate of time and one-half, such overtime to be calculated on the basis of a working day of eight hours' duration and of 313 working days in one year.

4. No such employee shall be required to work more than six days in any consecutive seven, except in case of snowfall or other emergency when such extra work on the seventh day shall be compensated for at the said rate of time and one-half.

5. No such employees shall be in any way prohibited, or restrained from forming organizations for their mutual interest and advancement as employees of the said Department.

6. The duly accredited representatives of such employees' organizations in their capacity as such shall in no way be prohibited or restrained from communicating or making trade agreements with the Commissioner of Street Cleaning in regard to any matter affecting the employment of those they represent and within the jurisdiction of the said Commissioner.

7. This section shall take effect immediately.

Accordingly, the firm of James Tregarthen & Son Company was prevailed upon to make room upon their drydock so that the repairs could be made.

They agreed to do this at a sacrifice to themselves, because they had performed many previous repair jobs for both departments and felt that undertaking a repair job under such conditions would prove that they were ready and willing to accommodate The City of New York in any emergency.

The bill for the above work amounted to \$26,224.22, and in addition there was a smaller invoice for new piping, etc., amounting to \$88.41, which comprises the total amount before mentioned.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Gentlemen—As provided by subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, we take the liberty of laying before you a request for an appropriation of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$3,600, to provide for the correction of a clerical error which caused the reduction of that amount in the Budget allowance made to the Central Museum of the Brooklyn Institute by the Board of Estimate at its meeting on the 19th of October, 1917.

At the executive meeting of the Board on that occasion a request was presented on behalf of the Central Museum, the Children's Museum and the Brooklyn Botanic Garden to increase certain salaries. After full discussion the Budget Committee ordered an increase of \$60 a year in salaries below \$1,200, making a total increase for the Central Museum of \$3,600. A memorandum to that effect was prepared and handed to the Clerk who had charge of making the changes in the Budget. Through carelessness or come inadvertence not explained he failed to make the change in the items relating to the Central Museum. The consequence was that the Budget, as delivered to the Secretary of the Board on the night of the 20th of October, 1917, did not contain this change.

The Museum increase was allowed to a class of employees who are especially suffering under the high expense of living and who had been compensated much below the standard adopted by the City and less than is paid the same class in similar institutions. It was not, therefore, through want of merit in their appeal, nor was it through the action of the responsible City authorities, but it was on account of an unfortunate accident that they were deprived of the increase.

We respectfully ask that you grant us a hearing that we may substantiate this statement and place the matter more clearly before you. Very truly yours,

Steamboat Inspection Service ordered that the Department steamboat "Franklin Edson" be placed in dry dock for examination prior to issuing of license. After considerable difficulties, owing to rush of government work, a dock was finally secured in Hoboken, N. J. After docking of boat and further inspection by the U. S. Inspector, the following items of repair were ordered done before certificate of inspection could be issued by the U. S. Steamboat Inspection Service:

"Three approved fire extinguishers.

"Lock nut to be placed on drip pipe between guards on starboard side as explained.

"Office to be notified when this vessel is on dry dock in order that further examination of hull may be made.

"Lower corner in back of port furnace (as marked) to be reinforced by approved welding.

"Star port furnace in lower corner in back end to be reinforced by same process.

"Joint on bottom blow to boiler to be renewed, outside shell to be painted, also scale removed inside of boiler.

"Engineer's report on fusible plugs to be sent to this office."

It was not anticipated that the work involved would exceed \$1,000, and furthermore, no definite estimate was obtainable, either from the Tietjen and Lang Company, at whose plant the boat was docked, or from other shipyards, as they all had more work than they could possibly handle. The boat was urgently needed at that time for transporting sailors suffering from contagious diseases from the Navy Yard and other cantonments to the various hospitals of the Department of Health, and as the time for the use of the dry dock was limited to six days, the firm was requested to proceed with the work under the direction of the U. S. Inspector. The cost of this work when completed amounted to \$1,220.18.

As this is in violation of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, which provides that no work shall be done in excess of \$1,000 without public letting, and as this was entirely unforeseen, the Honorable Board of Aldermen is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the expenditure of \$2,500 for necessary repairs to the Department steamboat "Franklin Edson" without public letting, this sum to include additional repairs that will be ordered by the U. Sir—It is requested that the Board of Aldermen authorize a special revenue bond issued to the amount of \$142,770, for the purchase of 94,950 feet of fire hose of various sizes as shown in the subjoined table, which also gives the estimated cost per foot, estimated cost for each size and total estimated cost:

The hose situation in the Fire Department for some time back has been in somewhat perilous condition. During the past winter there were times when grave danger existed and serious fire loss was narrowly averted. Unless adequate provision is made to procure hose, and at once, a situation will develop that may be a source of very great danger. At the present time there is a shortage of 94,950 feet, taking into account that hose more than eight years old is unsafe for further use.

Long experience of the Fire Department has shown that after hose has been in use for eight years it is no longer safe or reliable. There are, of course, many instances where hose has been serviceable for more than eight years. This long service, however, is more than offset by the fact that many lengths, of hose on which the guarantee has expired, do not last eight years.

Up to about seven years ago hose manufacturers guaranteed their product against defective material and workmanship for a period of four years. Thereafter this department found it necessary to reduce the guarantee period to three years as contractors would not bid if a longer guarantee were exacted.

When it is remembered that the Fire Commissioner is willing to assume that hose is serviceable for a period of five years beyond the time which contractors consider it safe to guarantee hose, it will be admitted that fixing the service limit at eight years is about as far as it is wise or safe to go.

Getting fire hose is becoming more difficult every day. Manufacturers are confronted with many difficulties in procuring material, and skilled labor is at a premium.

No matter how willing manufacturers may be, procuring fire hose will become more of a problem daily for Fire Departments.

The United States Government is a very large user of fire hose and its orders are commands and must be cared for by manufacturers to the exclusion of all other business; hence the importance of trying to procure deliveries, or at least make a contract at the earliest moment so as to reduce to a minimum the probabilities of being set back because of Federal Government orders or prior orders from other sources.

Assuming that favorable action on this request be taken at the next meeting of your board, it would be at least a month before bids could be opened for furnishing hose. The very earliest delivery that could be hoped for would be sixty days thereafter, and then only in limited quantities; thus it would be three months before any hose would be delivered and three months hence the shortage will be greater than it now is.

The general opinion among hose manufacturers is that the price of hose will continue to rise and that the procuring of yarn for making the hose jackets will become increasingly difficult. Some manufacturers are of the opinion that it will be necessary, within a short time, to procure a United States Government certificate before any yarn can be obtained from the mills.

That there will be much difficulty in procuring sufficient to meet the needs of this department, even under the most favorable conditions that may exist, cannot be questioned. It is therefore urged that prompt and favorable action be taken on this request to assure having a supply sufficient to meet any contingency that may arise and be protected against the possibility, in fact the probability, that six months hence hose manufacturers may be declining orders no matter how attractive a price the City may be willing to pay.

My experience during the past four months has convinced me that the procuring of any high grade manufactured product is one of the most serious problems that this department will have to contend with at least during the period of the war.

While this request is only for funds to take care of the current yearly requirements, I am strongly of the opinion that it would be a very wise precaution for your board to authorize an issue of \$100,000 in addition to the amount requested, which would insure the department's being well equipped in this important respect for the next three years.

This department is beset with so many problems and difficulties which require constant and, in many cases, immediate attention that it would greatly relieve the situation if the hose problem were properly covered for a long period and other pressing matters could receive the attention that their importance demands.

Not only would this very important requirement be properly cared for as stated, but a great saving would also be effected. From the information I have been able to gather, it is possible to assure your honorable board that \$100,000 available now will permit contracting for a quantity of hose that would cost at least \$125,000 if making a contract were delayed a year. Sir—In accordance with your request of May 17, 1918, and an assignment to me on May 23, 1918, I have examined into the above matter and report thereon as follows:

The Budget request for 1918 submitted by the Department of Docks and Ferries included \$38,250 for dredging. This amount was allowed in Code 2862, based on proposed dredging as follows:

115,000 cubic yards, North River, at 30 cents	\$34,500 00
7,500 cubic yards, East River, at 50 cents	3,750 00

No allowance was requested nor was any made for dredging at the St. George coal pocket.

A contract in accordance with the above estimates has been advertised for which but one bid was received and this so greatly in excess of the estimate that the contract has not been awarded. It is probable, therefore, that all of the above fund will be required for the purposes for which it was provided.

I have examined the soundings made by the Engineers of the Department of Docks and Ferries at the coal pocket in question. These show that there is now an average depth of about 9 feet at mean low water while loaded barges draw from 12 to 14 feet. It is necessary now to bring loaded barges to the wharf and do shifting at high tide, which necessitates extra labor.

The amount requested is based on dredging 4,200 cubic yards of soft and hard material over an area 60 feet by 300 feet, as follows:

3,500 cubic yards (mud), at 50 cents	\$1,750 00

The quantities are in accordance with requirements and the prices are reasonable.

The dredging is necessary and funds should be provided for the work.

Unless otherwise provided by law, ordinance or these rules, the roll shall not be called upon a vote unless two members demand it before the question is put to a viva voce vote. [If a viva voce vote has been taken upon any question and the result has been announced by the presiding officer, a division by roll call shall be ordered upon the demand of two members.]

3. That Rule 33 of the Rules of the Board of Aldermen be amended so as to read as follows:

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances, Relating to "Stands Within Stoop Lines and Under Elevated Railroad Stations."

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on April 2, 1918 (Minutes, page 16), the annexed ordinance to amend section 149, article 13, chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "stands within stoop lines and under elevated railroad stations," respectively

REPORTS:

Your Committee believes that this ordinance exempting veterans of any war in which the United States was or is engaged from an annual license fee for the stands under the stairs of elevated railway stations is a small recognition of the patriotic services performed by that class of citizens, and therefore recommends the adoption of the ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 149 of article 13 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "stands within stoop lines and under elevated railroad stations."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 4 of section 149 of article 13 of chapter 23 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "stands within stoop lines and under elevated railroad stations" is hereby amended to read as follows:

4. License fees; term. The annual license fee for a stand under the stairs of an elevated railway station shall be \$10. All stands within the stoop line shall be classified and the annual license fee therefor shall be fixed and collected as specified in the schedule following:

- (a) Stands for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, or both, \$5;
- (b) Stands for the sale of fruits or soda water, or both, \$10;
- (c) Stands for the sale of cigars, or cigarettes, or tobacco, or the three, \$5;
- (d) Stands for the sale of candies or confectionery articles, or both, \$5;
- (e) Boot black stands, each chair, \$5.

A license may be issued, in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this section, and in the discretion of the commissioner, covering the sale of any combination of the classes of goods mentioned above, to be sold, however, from only one stand not exceeding the legal size hereinafter prescribed in this section; except that where boot black chairs are included in the combination the space hereinafter prescribed for boot black chairs may be allowed in addition to the stand for the sale of other articles. The fees to be paid for such combination licenses shall be calculated in accordance with the above schedule for each kind of article permitted to be sold, or for each boot black chair to be operated.

No license shall be required for stands within stoop lines for the sale of newspapers, periodicals, or both, in cases where such stands are conducted by dealers who are the owners or occupants of the premises or stores in front of which the same are situated. Licenses for stands within stoop lines or under the stairs of any elevated railway station shall be issued as of December 1 and shall expire on the 30th day of November next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

No fee, however, shall be charged on applicant for a license hereunder who is a veteran of any war in which the United States was or is engaged (having served under the American colors), satisfactory evidence thereof having been presented to the Commissioner.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Orders issued on file No. 62944, Nos. 3, 4, 7, 8. File No. 62937, No. 5; No. 62920, No. 5; 62942, Nos. 3 and 4, require the guarding of belts on shapers and slotters; the belt referred to in each case runs on overhung cone pulleys, and it is necessary to manipulate belt by hand. The guarding of these belts is necessary, but the condition is not dangerous and the method of guarding will be covered by Paragraph "C" of proposed Rule 892 of Dangerous Machinery Code if adopted as now formulated.

File No. 62948, Order 5, refers to belt at Motor Driving Line Shaft in Cleaning Department of foundry. This motor is in small room separated from cleaning room, and it is necessary for an employee to enter this room and oil motor bearings. Order No. 6 on same file number requires the placing of a guard rail in front of five tumbling barrels used for cleaning castings; present conditions dangerous and order should be complied with. It is because of the fact that the tumbling barrels are loaded by means of overhead crane, a stationary guard is found impracticable, a sliding, hinged or removable guard may be used. If this method is used, then guard should be so attached to belt shifter to prevent operation of barrel when guard is not in place.

File No. 62946, Item 6, 62935, Order No. 2, refers to guarding of belts at pipe cutter in boiler shop and two grinders in frame and bolt shop; in each case belt in question is less than 3 inches wide and travels at such speed that guarding will not be required if the present provisions of Rules 889 and 892 of the Dangerous Machinery Code are adopted.

File No. 62937, Order No. 2, requires guard on small circular saw used for cutting magnesia slabs; the fact that it is necessary to saw the ends and edges of large slabs while same are held upright renders the use of an ordinary saw guard impracticable; however, a large amount of dust is created at this saw, and an effective exhaust system should be provided with hoods both above and below the saw table. If the hood to be placed above the saw table be properly designed and so arranged as to be adjustable, according to the size of the piece being worked, it will act as an effective guard as well as removing the dust created.

File No. 62937, Order No. 4, requires the placing of hoods for the purpose of removing dust at buffing wheels in pipe shop; these wheels are used for polishing belt pipe; the work is of such a nature that the placing of a hood is impracticable; these wheels are used not to exceed two hours per day and only a small amount of dust is created.

Recommendation: Pending the adoption of the Dangerous Machinery Code, hold in abeyance Orders 3, 4, 7, 8, File No. 62944; Order 5, File 6, 937; Order No. 5, File No. 62920; Order Nos. 3 and 4, File No. 62942; Order No. 6, File No. 62946; Order No. 2, File No. 62935; Order 5 and 6, File No. 62948, to be complied with, except as compliance with Order No. 2, File No. 62937, installation of an exhaust system with proper hoods above and below saw table, hood above table to be so designed that same will act as a guard. Order No. 4, File No. 62937, to be waived.

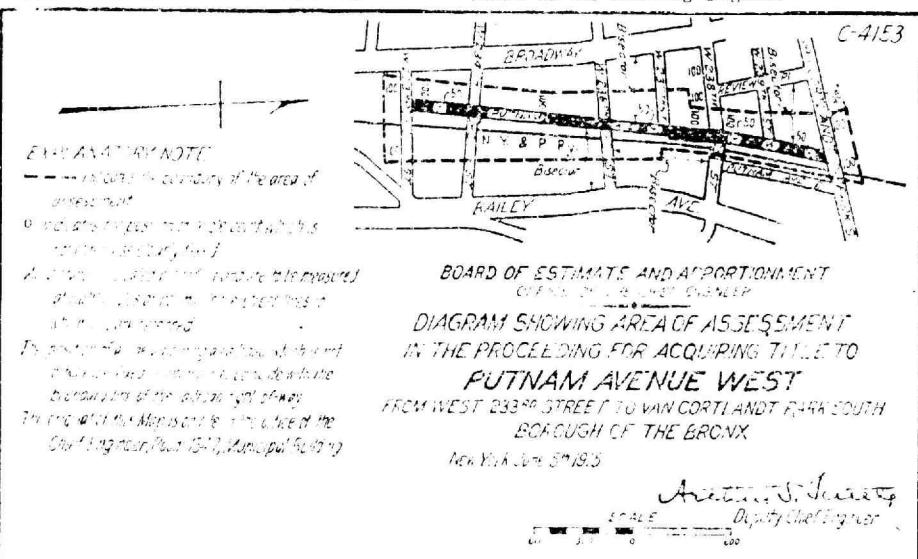

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue from the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale shall be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste remaining from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
