### ORDINANCES, RESOLUTIONS,

&c., &c.,

PASSED BY BOTH BRANCHES OF THE  
COMMON COUNCIL

AND

APPROVED BY THE MAYOR,

DURING THE WEEK ENDING AUGUST 1, 1874.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to regulate permits for street-stands, sheds, cases, signs, stairways, hoistways, and deliveries," approved February 24, 1866.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 5 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

§ 5. Every grantee of a privilege under this ordinance for a show-case, signs, stairways, or hoistways, shall pay a sum of one dollar for each, and grantees of all other privileges the sum of one dollar, towards the expense of executing this ordinance, to be accounted for among other fees of the Mayor's office. It is hereby understood and expressed that for the receiving and delivering of goods no fee shall be charged. And the Corporation Attorney shall not hereafter institute suits for alleged obstructions occasioned by the receipt or delivery of merchandise in the ordinary course of business;

\* \* \* \* \* but no person shall deposit any article or articles upon any street or sidewalk in this city in such manner as to obstruct the free use thereof by the public. The aggregate sum for any one permit containing all or any portion of the privileges expressed in this section shall not exceed the sum of three dollars, and all may be granted for that fee; but in no case is permission to be given to use the street beyond the stoop line.

SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The said release shall not impair, alter or affect in any wise the lease now existing between the City of New York and the said Nursery and Child's Hospital.
