

SIR—There were 5,986 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the three months ending Saturday, March 31, 1877, which is an increase of 174, as compared with the number reported the preceding three months, and 1,688 less than were reported during the corresponding three months of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the three months ending March 31, 1877, was 6,002, which is 1,298.8 below the average for the corresponding three months of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 22.28 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,077,228.
