LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

CHAPTER 582.

AN ACT to amend chapter four hundred and forty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, as amended by chapters twenty-eight and five hundred and sixteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, and as thus amended, entitled "An act to provide a further supply of pure and whole-some water for the city of New York, and to provide for prefecting and per-petuating the right and title of the city of New York to property, water, waterrights, and privileges heretofore taken or used, or which may be hereafter taken or used, by said city to increase the supply of pure and wholesome water for the use of said city, and to provide for the payment and extinguishment of all claims or damages growing out of such taking or using."

Passed June 24, 1881 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

follows: Section I. Section four of chapter four hundred and forty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, as amended by chapters twenty-eight and five hundred and sixteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-nine, and, as thus amended, entitled "An act to provide a further supply of pure and wholesome water for the city of New York, and to provide for perfecting and perpetuating the right and title of the city of New York to property, water, water-rights and privileges heretofore taken or used, or which may be hereafter taken or used, by said city to increase the supply of pure and wholesome water for the use of said city, and to provide for the payment and extinguishment of all claims or damages growing out of such taking or using," is hereby amended by adding thereto the following subdivision : o. Whenever there shall be one or more of the estates, enumerated in article one of title two of

the following subdivision : g. Whenever there shall be one or more of the estates, enumerated in article one of title two of chapter one of the second part of the Revised Statutes, entitled "Of the creation and division of estates," in any real estate, as the term real estate is defined in this act, required by the city of New York for the purpose of this act, such estate and real estate may be acquired by said city by means of

The special proceedings authorized by this act. In every such case the commissioner of public works, in addition to the statements now required by the said act, shall set forth and state in his petition the facts, so far as the same can with reasonable diligence be ascertained, in relation to any such estate, and the person, persons, or class of persons then in being or not in being, who are or may become entitled in any contingency class of persons then in being or not in being, who are or may become entitled in any contingency to any estate as aforesaid in such real estate, and may pray that such estate may be acquired and such persons may be bound by the said proceedings; and thereupon the court to whom such peti-tion is presented, if there be no attorney appearing in their behalf, shall appoint some competent and disinterested attorney or officer of the court to appear in such proceedings and represent the rights, interests, and estate of the person, persons, or class of persons aforesaid in such real estate, and to protect the same on the appraisal and proceedings aforesaid; and it shall be the duty of the court, on or after the confirmation of the report of appraisal, to ascertain by such report or by a reference for that purpose or otherwise, in its discretion, the rights, interest, and estate of such person, persons or class of persons, in the real estate so appraised and in the compensation awarded therefor, and to make an order determining the amount of share of such compensation to which such person, persons, or class of persons are or may become entitled on account of such estate, as therefor, and to make an order determining the amount of share of such compensation to awarded therefor, and to make an order determining the amount of share of such compensation to which such person, persons, or class of persons are or may become entitled on account of such estate, as the same shall arise or become vested in them respectively, and to direct and to provide for the payment, investment or securing thereof, for the benefit of the person, persons, or class of persons aforesaid, who are or who may, in the contingency upon which such estate arises, become entitled thereto; upon the payment or deposit by the comptroller of the city of New York of the sums to be paid for the acquisition of such real estate in the manner provided in section eight of this act, and in the manner directed by order of the court the said commissioner of public works, for and in behalf of the said the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city of New York, shall be entitled to enter upon, take possession of, and use the said real estate for the purposes indicated in this act, and such person, persons, or class of persons as are or may become entitled to such estate shall be barred of and from all right or claim in and to such land adverse to its use and occupation by the said commissioner or by the said, the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty. Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately, and the provisions hereof shall apply to all special proceedings heretofore brought, under chapter four hundred and forty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, and the various acts amendatory thereof, and which shall not be completed at the date of the passage of this act.

CHAPTER 587.

AN ACT to amend chapter three hundred and sixty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act for the better laying out and improving of that portion of the city of New York between Tenth avenue and Avenue Saint Nicholas and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, continued, and the lands of the Academy of the Sacred Heart, and One Hundred and Thirtyfifth street continued," and to extend the area embraced within the provisions of said act, to One Hundred and Forty-third street continued on the north, and One Hundred and Thirty-third street continued on the south.

And he shall cause to be made a map of the said street, which in addition to said street shall show such changes and alterations of streets, avenues or roads, or portions thereof, as may be required as aforesaid. The said map shall be signed by said commissioner and filed in the department of public works of said city, and copies thereof certified by said commissioner shall be filed in the office of the secretary of state and of the register of the city and county of New York, and from the day of its filing it shall be conclusive upon the mayor, aldernen and commonalty of the city of New York, and any and all persons whomsoever.

The street shall be opened and the lands necessary therefor acquired upon the applica-tion of the commissioner of public works, who shall make such application immediately upon the filing of said map for and on behalf of the mayor, aldermen, and commonalty of the city of New York in like manner as is now provided by law for opening other streets, avenues or roads in said city, but nothing in said laws contained shall authorize the discontinuance of such proceedings. The streets, avenues and roads, and the portions thereof designated on said map as closed and abandoned may be closed by order of the supreme court upon the application of the commissioner of public works for and on behalf of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York in like manner as is now provided by law for closing streets, avenues and roads in said city, and it shall be lawful to unite in one application or proceeding the opening of the said street, and the closing of any and all streets, avenues and roads designated upon said map as closed, or such parts thereof as it may be deemed best to close, and which intersect or lie adjacent to the said new street or avenue proposed to be opened in said proceeding.

When title to such lands for the new street to be laid out under the provisions of this act, necessary therefor, shall have been acquired, the commissioner of public works shall as soon as practicable proceed to open said new street, and render and make it fit for travel by regulating, grading, paving or macadamizing or otherwise improving it or in any way or by any other process or means which he may deem best for the convenience of the public, and m his discretion curb, gutter, and flag the same and the sidewalks thereof, and at the earliest practicable time throw the same open for public use, and no ordinances of the common council, or other authority than such as is conferred by this act shall be necessary to authorize him to proceed forthwith with such work, all such work, and the materials thereof, to be done and procured by one or more contracts made at public letting in the manner provided by section ninety-one, chapter three hundred and thirty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-three, except that the said commissioner is authorized to appoint such engineers or such other persons as he may deem proper to make the necessary surveys, estimates, plans, and specification, and supervise the construction of the works to transmit to the board of assessors of said city of New York, upon the completion of said works, or any portion thereof, as the said commissioner may deem advisable, his certificate of the expenditures incurred upon the same by him under the provisions of this act, and the proceedings of laying and collecting assessments for local improvements in said city ; assessments which are authorized for the expense of any work so certified shall be pursuant to the laws now or hereafter in force for laying and collecting assessments for local improvements in said city; assessments of this

An Act relating to the right of benevolent, charitable, religious, scientific and missionary societies to take and hold real and personal estate.

Section one of chapter three hundred and sixty-seven of the laws of eighteen hundred and eighty, entitled "An act for the better laying out and improving of that portion of the city of New York, between Tenth avenue and Avenue Saint Nicholas, and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street continued, and the lands of the Academy of the Sacred Heart and One Hundred and Thirty-

The commissioner of public works of the city of New York shall, within two years from the date of this act, lay out and establish a street of the width of not less than sixty feet running from Tenth avenue at or opposite One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to Avenue Saint Nicholas, with such windings and turnings, courses and directions as in his judgment may best serve to promote the interest of the city and the owners of property affected thereby, in that section of the city bounded northerly by a continuation easterly from Tenth avenue to Avenue Saint Nicholas of the northerly line of One Hundred and Forty-third street, westerly by Tenth avenue, easterly by Avenue Saint Nicholas, and southerly by the northerly and north-easterly line of the lands of the Female Academy of Sacred Heart and the southerly line of One Hundred and Thirty-third street extended and continued westerly from the Avenue Saint Nicholas until it meets the said north-easterly

ws: Section 1. All corporations already formed or which hereafter may be formed under and in pur-Section 1. All corporations already formed or which hereafter may be formed under and in pur-suance of chapter three hundred and nmeteen of the laws of eighteen hundred and forty-eight, being "An act for the incorporation of benevolent, charitable, scientific and missionary societies," and the several acts amendatory thereof, and their successors, by their corporate name, shall in law be capable of taking, receiving, purchasing, and holding real estate for the purposes of their corporation to an amount not exceeding the sum of two hundred thousand dollars in value, and personal estate for like purposes to an amount not exceeding the sum of two hundred thousand dollars in value, but the clear annual income of such real and personal estate shall not exceed the sum of fifty thousand dol-lars, subject, however, to the restrictions upon devises and bequests contained in an act entitled "An act relating to wills," passed April thirteen, eighteen hundred and sixty. The commissioner of public works of the city of New York, the counsel to the cor-poration and the chief engineer of the Croton aqueduct are hereby authorized and directed, within four months after the date of the passage of this act, to ascertain and determine the work heretofore per-formed in or in connection with the regulating and grading of First avenue, from Ninety-second to One Hundred and Ninth streets, in said city, the proportion thereof performed by the city, and the proportion thereof otherwise performed, together with the fair, just and reasonable value of the work so otherwise found by them to have been performed, with whatever amount of interest they consider in fairness and equity should be paid thereon ; and it shall be the duty of the said commissioners to certify their proceedings to the comptroller of the city, who shall, on such certification, pay to Charles

Waterbury, his executors or administrators, on obtaining his or their release in favor of the city as assignee and as surety of all claims arising on or in relation to the contract for the execution or performance of said work, the amount certified to him by the commissioners as aforesaid, in the same manner as other works of local improvement in said city are paid. Sec.^{*} 2. After the said commissioners shall certify their proceedings, as in the preceding section provided, it shall be the duty of the said commissioner of public works to proceed, in the manner provided by law, and complete the regulating, grading, curbing, guttering and flagging of said First avenue, from Ninety-second street to One Hundred and Ninth street. Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 650.

An Acr to extend the operation and effect of chapter forty of the laws of eighteen hundred and forty-eight, entitled "An act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical and chemical purposes."

Passed July 16, 1881 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

follows : Section I. Any three or more persons may, and are hereby authorized, to organize and form themselves into a corporation in the manner (except as hereinafter provided) specified or required in or by the act entitled "An act to authorize the formation of corporations for manufacturing, mining, mechanical or chemical purposes," passed February seventeenth, eighteen hundred and forty-eight, or any amendment or amendments thereof, for the objects and purposes of carrying on the business and operations of owning, constructing, maintaining, using and operating warehouses, elevators, docks, wharves and basins. Every corporation so formed shall have and may exercise any and all powers and privileges necessary or proper in carrying on or connected with such business or opera-tions, or any part or parts thereof, and all the capacities, powers, benefits and privileges mentioned in or conferred by the aforesaid act, passed February seventeenth, eighteen hundred and forty-eight, or any amendment or amendments thereof; and shall be subject to all the duties and obligations imposed by, and the provisions of the said act as amended, except as herein otherwise provided. Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 706.

AN ACT to provide for the publication of the registry of voters in the city and county of New York.

Passed August 22, 1881 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :

Section I. It shall be the duty of the inspectors of election in each election district in the city and county of New York, on each day of general registration or revision of registration, and before adjourning, to copy from the registers the names and residences of all persons registered upon that day, so that the names of those persons having the same residence shall appear together in the form and manner following, namely:

And they shall append thereto a certificate, signed by each of them, in the words and figures following, namely: "We, the undersigned inspectors of election, in the election district, of the assembly district, of the city and county of New York, do jointly and severally certify that the list hereunto annexed is a true and correct copy of the names and residences, upon the registers, of all persons who have been registered by us as qualified voters in the said election district, this day of , in the year

And it shall be the duty of the chairman of the board of inspectors of election, in each election district of the city and county of New York, to deliver such list, copy and certificate, prepared in the manner herein prescribed, immediately upon the completion thereof, to the captain of the police precinct in which the election district is situated ; and it shall be the duty of such captain to deliver the same without delay, and within twelve hours after the close of each day of general registration or revision of registration, to the supervisor of the CITY RECORD to cause the lists of registered voters, made and delivered as directed in the first section of this act, to be arranged by assembly districts, and by election districts of assembly districts, commencing with the first, and in such man-ner that the names of all registered voters residing at any given number of any street shall appear together, and those of each street in each election district shall appear arranged by house num-bers, in consecutive order, each street separately. And as soon as the entire registry of voters shall be completed, and the copies thereof made and delivered as herein provided, the said super-visor shall forthwith cause the same to be printed and published in the CITY RECORD as herein-alter provided, and in the form and manner herein prescribed ; and such publication shall be made within eighty-four hours after the close of each annual registration. The registry of each assembly district shall be printed separately as a supplement to the CITY RECORD, and each said supplement containing the registry of one assembly district shall be sold separately to persons wishing to pur-chase the same at not less than five cents per copy. And all money received therefor shall be paid into the city treasury and applied toward the payment of the cost of such publication; and the board of estimate and apportionment of said city and county shall make such appropriations as may be necessary to provide for the compilation and publication of herein directed.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the chief of the bureau of elections to prepare and furnish to the inspectors of elections in each election district in the city of New York the necessary blanks and

inspectors of elections in each election district in the city of New York the necessary blanks and forms as prescribed in the first section of this act. Sec. 4. Any inspector of election in the city and county of New York, who shall neglect or refuse to comply with the requirements of this act, shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars, recoverable by the board of police by civil action, in any court of record, in the name of the treasurer of the board, and for the use and benefit of the police fund. Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 20, 1881:

August 20, 1881 : The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1835, as follows, viz. : I public building, 418 tenement-houses, 63 private dwellings, 59 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 38 stables, 28 slaughter-houses, I ash and garbage dump, I railroad, 13 sunken and vacant lots, 68 yards, courts, and areas, 82 cellars and basements, I46 waste-pipes and drains, 238 privies and water-closets, 22 streets, gutters and side-walks, 4 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns, 3 smoky chimneys, 19 other nuisances. The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 521. During the past week 193 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors. Permits have been granted to the consignees of 88 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port. 139 permits have been granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

 The Disinfecting Corps have visited 109 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 99 houses, 99 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The certificates of 566 births, 34 still-births, 219 marriages, and 683 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, August 20, 1881; this shows an increase of 6 births and 86 marriages, and a decrease of 7 still-births, and 166 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was an increase of 27 births, 80 marriages, and 82 deaths, and a decrease of 7 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the pre-ceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 2; diptheria, 6; erysipelas, 3; typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhocal diseases, 95; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 3; pneumonia, 2; heart diseases, 8; marasmus, tabes mesen-terica and scrofula, 4; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 9; direct effect of solar heat, 32; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 50; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; sucide, 2; drowning, 4; while the deaths from croup increased 7; whooping cough, 1; malarial fevers, 2; inanition, 3; cancer, 1; phthisis pul-monalis, 5; anuerism, 1; apoplexy, 2; Birght's disease and nephritis, 14; premature and preter-natural births, 8. 

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

SIR—There were 683 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, August 20, 1881, which is a decrease of 169, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 80 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending August 13, 1881, was 733, which is 132.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.57 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,246,894.
