DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks held January 3, 1883.

Present—The full Board.

The minutes of the meeting held December 27th ultimo were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, laid on the table to await action, as stated, to wit:

From P. Sanford Ross—Enclosing bill for \$300 for services of dredging machine, scows, etc., provided for dredging the westerly half of the slip between Piers 18 and 19, East river, under Contract No. 163. Secretary directed to request the Counsel to the Corporation to give his opinion as to the right and power of this Board to audit the said claim, provided that the amount is considered reasonable and proper compensation for the services rendered.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Reporting as to pier and bulkhead lines on the East river, from Grand street to Thirty-fourth street, and submitting plans and estimates of cost, etc., in respect thereto.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, action being taken, where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. In reference to the possession of the Pier at Fortieth street, North river, by James McClenahan, and the proceedings requested to be taken to dispossess him therefrom. Secretary directed to have the same recorded in the Book of Opinions.

2d. Enclosing check for \$2,812.50, received from James McClenahan for two and a half quarters' rent of Pier at Fortieth street, North river. Secretary directed to advise that credit therefor was given on the books of this Department.

3d. Transmitting, with his approval indorsed thereon, the leases for twenty-six piers and bulkheads on the North river water-front.

4th. In reference to suit against Edward A. Moore and Forbes Holland, as sureties for William Bradley for \$3,600 for rent of Pier at Fortieth street, North river. Secretary directed to advise that the Board are not in possession of any additional facts relative to the matter, and have no further information on the subject to communicate.

From Pim, Forwood & Co., lessees—In reference to street approach to the Pier at Twenty-fifth street, North river. Secretary stating that by direction of the President he had replied thereto, his action was approved.

From New York, Ontario and Western Railway Co.—Requesting the use of the boring machine "Woodcock" for a few weeks. The Secretary stating that by direction of the Commissioners he had advised the company that the Board would loan to it the use of the said machine, together with the services of an engineer to operate the same and a watchman to take care of it when not in use, provided that the said company would agree to pay for the use thereof and services of engineer and watchman, the sum of \$12 for each and every day, Sundays and holidays excepted, and that they would return the said machine in as good condition as when received by them, his action was approved.

From the National Line of Steamships:

1st. Requesting permission to place two portable huts, temporarily, on Pier 37, North river, for keeping tackle, etc. Application denied, and Secretary directed to advise that the Board cannot permit the use of the pier for that purpose.

2d. In reference to the condition of roadway from Pier, new, 39, North river, to West street. Secretary directed to advise that the contractor has agreed to keep the approaches in order until the contract for paving is completed.

From J. Danforth and Charles Fingarr—Requesting permission to occupy office on Pier, new 43, North river. Application denied, and Secretary directed to advise as to action taken by the Board.

From Oscar Compton—Requesting permission to erect two coal hoppers on Pier 53, East river. Application denied.

From F. Perkins—Application for permission to erect a tally house on Pier 27, East river. Permission granted, and Secretary directed to issue permit therefor when erected in conformity to the rules.

From George F. Hastings—Application for permission to erect a tally house on the bulkhead north of Pier, new 26, North river. Application denied.

From Department of Street Cleaning—In reference to and stating that the bulkhead between Pier 54 and Corlears street, East river, had been directed to be cleaned.

From New York, New Haven, and Hartford Railroad Company—In reference to specification for repairing Pier 52, East river. Secretary directed to advise that the specifications therefor will be sent to them as soon as they are printed.

From Louis Stono and others—In reference to dirt, garbage, etc., which has accumulated at the foot of Twenty-ninth street, East river, from the use of the dump at that place. Corporation Wharfinger Butler to be directed to examine and report, and to abate any nuisance that may exist thereat.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Report of work done during the week ending December 23d ultimo.

From W. L. McConkey, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting as to condition of the bulkhead foot of Cherry street, East river.

From George W. Wanmaker, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting that a dangerous hole was in the deck of Pier, old 54, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and repair the same.

From William P. Prentice—In reference to conference to be held in regard to the Pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river.

Mr. C. H. Mallory and Captain Spicer appeared before the Board and were heard in respect to their application for permission to erect a shed on Pier 21, East river. After discussion on the subject, the Board informed the parties that further evidence to establish the legal right to shed the said pier would be required before action could be taken in the matter.

Judge Edgar M. Cullen appeared before the Board on behalf of the Brooklyn Trust Company, respecting the repairs ordered to be made to the bulkhead between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river, and was referred to Assistant Engineer Maclay for definite information as to the repairs required thereat.

Commissioner Woolsey Johnson, Emmons Clark, Secretary, and William P. Prentice, Counsel to the Board of Health, appeared before the Board, and were heard in respect to the use and occupation of the Pier at Thirty-eighth street, North river, for the removal of dead animals, offal, etc. After some discussion on the subject, the matter was laid over for further consideration.

On motion of Commissioner Voorhis, the minutes of the meeting held November 15th ult., were amended by adding the words "per day" after the words "the sum of \$5," where they occur in the resolutions adopted in reference to loaning the use of mud scows to William H. Taylor & Son.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify Frank Phelan to remove from Pier 54, East river, within five days, the two coal-hoppers now incumbering said pier, and belonging to him, or this Department would remove the same at his cost and expense.

Captain Babcock appeared before the Board on behalf of the Stonington Line, and urged that some action be taken by the Board to provide for that line proper accommodations, if they are not permitted to remain at Pier, old 33, where now located.

Messrs. Tremper and Coykendall also appeared before the Board, and were heard on the subject of wharf accommodations for the North River Steamboat Lines, which they represent, and which are now located at Pier, old 34, North river.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to request Mr. S. A. Frost to meet with the Commissioners on the 4th inst., at 1.30 o'clock P. M., to confer in respect to acquiring the title to the westerly half of Pier 20, East river.

Commissioner Vanderpoel, the Treasurer of the Board, presented his report of receipts for the week ending January 3d instant, which was received, read, and,

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending January 6, 1883.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 6, 1883.—STATED MEETING—9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, Olliffe.

Commissioner MacLean in the chair.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copies of ordinances adopted by said Board and approved by the Mayor.

From the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting a copy of a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to issue stock for the payment of damages, etc., in the matter of the opening of Webster avenue.

From the United States Illuminating Company, desiring permission to erect poles along north side of Fortieth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

From the Supervisor of the City Record, stating that the requisition of this Department for printing and binding minutes, etc., had been rejected by the Board of City Record.

From the American Salt Company, relative to exhibiting a large block of salt.

From Julius Pollock, desiring permission to remove trees from in front of his premises on Boston avenue.

From Morris K. Jessup, President American Museum of Natural History, enclosing a plan for constructing a walk in connection with the roadway recently finished at Eighth avenue and Seventy-seventh street.

From Thomas S. Dick, applying for a renewal of his license for boat service on the Central Park.

From the Commissioner of Public Works, relative to remedying the gully on Riverside Drive, and Twelfth avenue at One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street.

From the Supervisor of the City Record, making requisition for a list of subordinates, etc., as required by section 111, chapter 335, Laws of 1873.

From the Secretary of the Board of Assessors, enclosing a copy of an objection of Thomas Rae, to the proposed assessment for constructing receiving-basins, culverts, etc., in Third avenue, between Harlem river and One Hundred and Forty-seventh street.

From Assistant Engineer S. S. Haight, asking for a leave of absence.

From William E. Meissner, applying for the privilege of erecting a carrousel on the Central Park.

From the Superintendent of Parks, reporting the suspension of laborers, carpenters and painters on account of want of work.

A copy of an injunction granted by the New York Supreme Court, restraining this Department and Department of Public Works from interfering with the erection of a station at Battery place by the New York Elevated Railroad Company.

The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Police Department and state that persons are cutting and removing trees from Westchester avenue and Boston road, as lately opened and widened; that such cutting and removal is without authority or consent of this Department, and that as said trees are the property of the city, to respectfully request that orders be given to prevent such destruction and removal of the city property.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved that a respectful representation is hereby made to the Board of City Record that this Department learns with regret that the requisition for printing the minutes and documents of this Department has been denied; that to discontinue such printing at this time would destroy the history of the Central Park and the works of laying out the city north of Fifty-ninth street, and be the cause of serious embarrassment, and respectfully and urgently request that the requisition above referred to may receive the favorable consideration of the Board of City Record.

Cash to the amount of \$3,773.43 was deposited with the Comptroller.

Bills amounting to \$5,854.95 and pay-rolls amounting to \$18,028.39 were audited and sent to the Finance Department for payment.

GENTLEMEN—I have the honor to inform you that the following work has been done during the last week upon the bridge, viz.:

There has been erected 397 main truss pins, 36 over floor stays, 40 pieces top chords, 1 supporting truss for promenade, 4 main truss diagonals, 6 knee braces, 2 intermediate floor beams, 1 promenade floor beam, 1 post, and 5,570 rivets were driven.

The main span is complete as far as posts, pins, and diagonals, and the over floor stays for the New York tower are all cut and put in place on the tower.

The ballasting of the railroad on the New York approach is nearly completed.
The planking of the carriage ways and also of the promenade has been commenced.

Section 5 of the said act provides that, "If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment."

The above assessments are payable to the Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears, at the "Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Water Rents," from 9 A. M. until 2 P. M., and all payments made thereon, on or before January 12, 1883, will be exempt from interest as above provided, and after that date will be subject to a charge of interest at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of entry in the Record of Titles of Assessments in said Bureau.
