Resolutions.

Whereas, The weekly statements of the Comptroller, the last of which is dated August 14, do not contain the amount of \$21,067.43, transferred from the balances of 1872 and 1873 by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the relief of the Harlem Flats; and

Whereas, The work of improving this district cannot be executed by this Board until the Comptroller recognizes the appropriation; therefore

Resolved, That the attention of the Comptroller be again called to this matter, and that he be requested to place to the credit of this Board the above-mentioned sum.

Resolved, That a new copy of the letter of the President on this subject, which was sent to him July 30, and a copy of the opinion of the Corporation Counsel on this subject, be forwarded with the previous resolution.

That a copy of the report of the Sanitary Superintendent upon the condition of the dumps and scows used by the Street Cleaning Bureau be forwarded to the Board of Police. That the said Board be and are hereby requested to cause those dumps and scows which are in an offensive condition, as well as the material collected and deposited upon the scows, to be disinfected from time to time, as may be necessary; and that the Sanitary Superintendent be and is hereby directed to furnish, whenever requested, the necessary information as to the best materials and methods to secure a thorough and efficient disinfection of the dumps, scows, and garbage and street dirt collected above referred to.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed by the Sanitary Bureau during the week ending August 14, 1875: The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 1,909, as follows: 2 public buildings, 860 tenement houses, 134 private dwellings, 50 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 22 stores and warehouses, 82 stables, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 32 slaughter-houses, 11 fat-rendering establishments, 7 dumping grounds, 2 roadways, 1 pier, 4 public sewers, 44 sunken and vacant lots, 89 yards, courts, and areas, 164 cellars and basements, 79 waste-pipes and drains, 175 privies and water-closets, 83 street-gutters and sidewalks, 11 dangerous stairways, 3 dangerous chimneys, 2 cisterns and cesspools, 1 violation of the Sanitary Code, 22 other nuisances, and 22 visits to contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received was 825.

135 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

66 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes.

159 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 35 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 31 houses, together with clothing, bedding, etc. They have also disinfected 2,673 privy-sinks, 476 yards, and 192 cellars.

23 persons sick with small-pox were removed to Hospital.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending August 14, 1875: Typhoid fever, 16; scarlet fever, 20; measles, 14; diphtheria, 57; small-pox, 34; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 3.

11 tanks and 3,828 cans of night-soil were removed by the night scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city during the week ending August 14, 1875.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending August 14, 1875: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 9 carcasses; calves (case), 1 carcass; sheep, 10 carcasses; lambs, 11 carcasses; veal, 76 pounds; poultry, 354 pounds; and fish, 985 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending August 14, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 691 burial permits for city deaths, 44 for bodies in transitu, and 40 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 691 deaths, 118 marriages, 497 births, 40 still-births, 44 applications for transit permits, and 66 returns from Coroners. There were 22 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of marriage record, and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau. Two cases of death were referred to the Coroners.
