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### DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, October 25, 1894, at 11 o'clock A. M.  
Present—President Cram.  
" Commissioner Phelan.  
" " White.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 18th instant were read and approved.  
Representatives of the New York Steam Company were present and submitted an application on behalf of said company for a lease of a portion of the bulkhead in the vicinity of Dey street, North river.

On motion, the matter was tabled for one week, and John H. Starin and the International Navigation Company requested to appear before the Board at said meeting.

Thomas Harrington appeared and submitted an affidavit that the stone used by him under Contract No. 476 had been cut within the State of New York, as required by chapter 277, Laws of 1894, and stated that the Comptroller had refused payment for said contract.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Counsel to the Corporation.  
A committee of merchants doing business in the vicinity of Piers 61 and 62, East river, were present respecting the setting aside of certain berths.

On motion, their application was tabled for two weeks.  
Representatives of the Dock Protective Association of the Nineteenth Ward appeared respecting wharfage facilities during the construction of the piers between Sixtieth and Sixty-third streets, East river.

They were informed that arrangements would be made to afford them every possible accommodation.

Edmund Dwyer, contractor, and Brown & Fleming, were present in response to the order of the 18th instant, respecting the employment of aliens under Contract No. 475, Class 4.

On motion, said matter was dismissed.  
The application of Francis A. Thayer, attorney, for a lease of certain land under water between Two Hundred and Sixteenth and Two Hundred and Twentieth streets, Harlem river, was tabled for one month.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 14337 respecting the application of James Flanagan to fill-in at One Hundred and Fiftieth street and Seventh avenue, was tabled for two weeks.

The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning reporting repairs required to the pavement at approach to Pier, foot of East Twenty-eighth street, was referred to the Department of Public Works.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:  
From Dock Master Stack—Respecting the assignment of space on the new-made land for the sale of Christmas trees.

From M. Goodwin—Requesting a five years' lease, with privilege of renewal, of the Pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street, and agreeing to pay therefor a rental of \$2,500 per annum.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Daniel L. Sturges—To rebuild wharves and construct a frame-house foot of East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, Harlem river.

Pennsylvania Railroad Company—To repair Pier 5, North river, the work to be kept within the existing lines.

The following permits were granted, to continue only during the pleasure of the Board:

Lehigh Valley Railroad Company—To place a derrick and scales on the open platform at Pier 3, North river, said structures to be erected under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

Henry Schrader—To land the steamer "Viking" at the Battery wharf, compensation to be fixed by the Treasurer.

Henry Cook—To locate a boat-house foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, Long Island Sound, compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The following permit was granted on the usual terms:

Consolidated Gas Company—To repair a leak in the gas-pipe in new-made land south of Pier, new 44, North river.

The following communications were received, read, and  
On motion, ordered to be placed on file:

From the Finance Department—Approving sureties on Contract No. 485.

From the Counsel to the Corporation:

1st. Transmitting forms of leases of the bulkheads between the north side of Pier, new 28, and a point twenty feet northerly of Pier, new 29, North river, to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company; also form of agreement with said company et al., for the improvement of the water-front between Vestry and Watts streets, North river, with his approval as to form indorsed thereon. The officers of the Board authorized to execute.

2d. Requesting information relative to the claim against H. B. Bailey, for damage to the Pier at One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, Harlem river, by the barge "American Eagle." The Secretary directed to furnish the information.

3d. Inclosing check for \$8,626.25, in settlement of judgments in the suits against the executors of the Roach Estate, entered in accordance with the terms of the compromise, approved by the Board August 30, 1893.

From Spearin & Preston, contractors, certifying that there are no persons employed on the work of Contracts Nos. 480 and 481, who are not citizens of the United States.

From the White Star Line—Requesting information respecting the building of new piers north of West Tenth street. The Secretary directed to reply.

From the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah—Requesting dredging at Pier, new 35, North river.

The Engineer-in-Chief directed to order dredging under Contract No. 474.

From Barth S. Cronin—Requesting a hearing on his application of the 11th instant for an extension of time to October 4, 1894, to complete the work of building a new timber basin near the foot of West Seventy-second street, under Contract No. 483.

Notify him to appear Thursday, November 8, 1894.

From George T. Stevens—Requesting an extension of time for closing the contracts with the executors of the estate of Moses Taylor, deceased, et al., to January 15, 1895.

The officers of the Board authorized to execute an agreement to that effect.

From the New York Building and Contracting Company—Requesting an extension of time to October 25, 1894, to complete the work of building a movable steam derrick under Contract No. 468, and submitting the written consent of sureties thereto.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of building and furnishing a movable steam derrick, with all appurtenances, under Contract No. 468, New York Building and Contracting Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to October 25, 1894, the consent of the sureties having been filed in this office.

From the Nassau Boat Club—Complaining of the dumping of refuse by the Roosevelt Organ Company, in the Harlem river, foot of One Hundred and Thirty-second street.

Notify said company to appear before the Board, Thursday, November 1, 1894, and show cause why a penalty of one hundred dollars should not be imposed for a violation of rule 12 of the Rules and Regulations of this Department.

From Edward W. Candee—Declining the offer of the 4th instant, for the purchase of one hundred and fifty-six feet four inches of water front north of Fifty-second street, East river.

On motion, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, The Board, on the 4th day of October, 1894, adopted preambles and resolutions offering to purchase, in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, in fee simple, all right, title and interest in or appurtenant to the following described premises, to wit: All that piece or parcel of land between East Fifty-second and East Fifty-third streets, lying easterly of the westerly line of the exterior street laid out by the Department of Docks, under chapter 286 of the Laws of 1889, and westerly of the original high-water line, as shown on the accompanying map in parcel "I," together with all right, title and interest in and to the land and land under water in front of the southerly one hundred and thirty-nine feet nine inches of the grant to John M. Dodd and others, July 30, 1853; and

Whereas, Said offer was on the 12th day of October, 1894, served upon Edward W. Candee, owner in fee simple of the above-described premises; and

Whereas, Said offer has been declined by said owner under date of October 18, 1894; and

Whereas, It is deemed that no price can be agreed upon between the owner of said property and this Department for the purchase thereof; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and hereby is requested to institute legal proceedings for the immediate acquisition of said property, together with all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, for the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, as required by law in such cases made and provided.

From the Treasurer—Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Hudson River Line for berthing the steamer "Albany" at the foot of West Fiftieth street, be fixed at the rate of \$2.50 per day, Sundays included, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master, and that the permit granted the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company October 4, 1894, be revoked. Recommendation adopted.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Phelan, submitted his report of receipts for the week ending October 24, 1894, amounting to \$12,418.81, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

2d. Reporting repairs required to the Pier at West Forty-sixth street, damaged by a mud scow. Notify P. Sanford Ross, owner, to repair.



3d. Reporting repairs required to the dumping board at Pier, old 42, North river. The Department of Street Cleaning notified to repair.

4th. Reporting completion of the work of building an extension to the pier at West Nineteenth street, pursuant to the resolution adopted April 20, 1894. The Dock Master directed to collect wharfage.

Recommendation adopted.

No. 14315. Recommending that the lessees be directed to repair the pavement under shed on bulkhead north of Pier, new 37, North river. Recommendation adopted.

No. 14270. Submitting cost of taking up and relaying pavement between Piers, new 27 and 28, North river, to enable the Consolidated Gas Company to repair gas-pipe. The Treasurer authorized to collect.

No. 14243. Submitting cost of taking up and relaying pavement, etc., between Charles and Perry streets, North river, to make an examination of the water-pipe thereat. The Treasurer authorized to collect from Samuel Hanna.

No. 14235. Submitting cost of taking up and relaying pavement to permit repairs to a leak in water-pipe at the approach to Pier, new 57, North river. The Treasurer authorized to collect from the Terminal Warehouse Company.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Carrol Box and Lumber Company to use and occupy, during the pleasure of the Board, commencing November 1, 1894, the Pier foot of East Eighteenth street, compensation to be paid therefor at the rate of three hundred (\$300) dollars per month, payable at the end of each month to the Treasurer of this Department.

Resolved, That by virtue of the power and authority vested in this Board, and in pursuance of the statutes in such cases made and provided, this Department hereby agrees to lease, assign and farm-let to the Carrol Box and Lumber Company all and singular, the wharfage which may arise, accrue or become due, in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, for the use and occupation of the Pier foot of East Eighteenth street, excepting that portion of said pier which may be designated by the Department of Public Works for the use of a free swimming-bath during the summer season, for a term of five years from May 1, 1895, at an annual rental of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer of this Department, with the privilege of renewal for a further term of five years, at a rental to be fixed by arbitration, one person to be appointed by the City and one by the lessee, and in case they are unable to agree a third person to be appointed by them; it being understood that this resolution shall not be binding or of any force or effect unless the said Carrol Box and Lumber Company shall, within ten days from receipt hereof, file in this office its written acceptance of the terms and conditions herein contained, and agree to execute a lease containing the covenants and conditions as at present embodied in the lease of wharf property now used by this Department.

The Secretary reported that the pay-rolls for the general repairs and construction force for the week ending October 19, 1894, amounting to \$7,891.60, had been approved and audited and transmitted to the Finance Department for payment.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, October 31, 1894, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon.

The Construction or Executive Committee recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the accompanying bills are hereby approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment, viz.:

1st. Of George Juengst & Sons, for labor and materials on gate slide at Sodom Dam, amounting to forty-five dollars (\$45).

2d. Of W. W. Weed, for two portable tool-boxes for use of party of machinists, amounting to nineteen dollars (\$19).

3d. Of James McCartney, for use of horse and for blacksmith's and plumber's bills, amounting to ninety-eight dollars and seventy cents (\$98.70).

4th. Of Samuel Hopkins, for board and transportation, amounting to forty dollars and eighty-seven cents (\$40.87).

5th. Of Bert Tompkins, for board and transportation, amounting to fifty-three dollars and forty-four cents (\$53.44).

6th. Two bills of R. D. Philbin, for board and transportation, amounting respectively to thirty-one dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$31.69), and twenty-seven dollars and twenty-nine cents (\$27.29).

On motion of Commissioner Cannon, the same was adopted.

The Committee also presented the following communication, received from the Chief Engineer:

NEW YORK, October 31, 1894.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction:

GENTLEMEN—In pursuance of the authority given me by your resolution of October 10, I beg to submit the bids received for the clearing of the land at Reservoir "M."

In my aforesaid letter I reported that I was not fully ready to make an accurate estimate of the cost of the work, but that it would, I thought, be under \$1,500.

I cannot state positively at present how many invitations were sent, but there were not less than six.

In answer to the said invitations, I received five bids, as follows:

John L. Merritt, Purdy's Station.....	\$3,900 00
John Twine, New York.....	2,940 00
George H. Bennett, Golden's Bridge.....	1,587 50
William Gilmore, Croton Falls.....	1,150 00
Freeman H. Merritt, White Plains.....	600 00

Mr. Freeman H. Merritt is a responsible person, and I recommend that the contract be given to him.

And recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the contract for clearing grounds of reservoir "M," near Purdy's Station, in the Town of North Salem, Westchester County, N. Y., be and the same is hereby awarded to Freeman H. Merritt, at his bid of six hundred dollars (\$600), it being the lowest received and less than the estimate of the Chief Engineer.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Cannon—4.

The Committee also recommended the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That, upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the superintendency of the construction of the receiving and distributing reservoir proposed to be constructed in the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, and known as the "Jerome Park Reservoir," is hereby put in charge of Division Engineer Alfred Craven; the duties of said superintendency to be in addition to the duties now required of him as Division Engineer in charge of the Titicus and Carmel Dams.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the same was adopted.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 9888 to 9895 inclusive, amounting to \$3,201.83.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

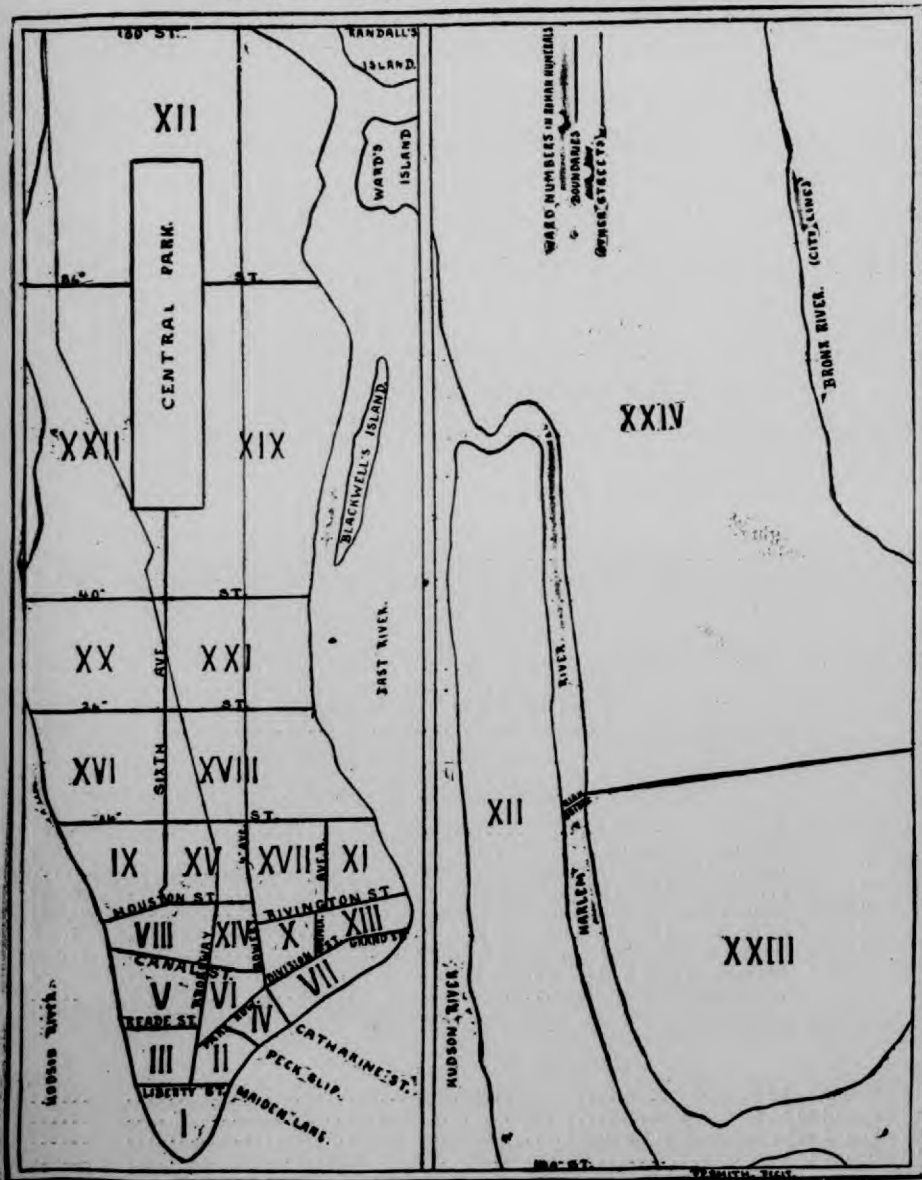

—The 626 deaths represent a death-rate of 16.50, against 17.94 for the previous week and 17.62 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 79, 10, 61, 23 and 7, against 130, 30, 40, 30 and 2 for the previous week, a total of 180 against 232. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh Ward, and the decrease in the Tenth, Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Fourteenth Ward, and the decrease in the Seventh and Tenth Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Seventh and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Eighteenth Ward. Twelve of the 23 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 7 of the remaining 11 were below Fourteenth street, mostly on the east side. Five of the 7 cases of small-pox were above Eighty-sixth street.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of he proposed improvement.



The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereat.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

Third—That the limits of our assessment for benefit include all those lots, pieces, or parcels of land situate, lying and being in the City of New York, which taken together are bounded and described as follows, viz.: Northerly by the centre line of the blocks between One Hundred and Eightieth street and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, from the easterly line of Kingsbridge road to the westerly line of Amsterdam avenue; easterly by the westerly line of Amsterdam avenue; southerly by the centre line of the blocks between One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street, from the westerly line of Amsterdam avenue to the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; and westerly by the easterly line of Kingsbridge road; excepting from said area all the streets, avenues and roads or portions thereof heretofore legally opened, as such area is shown upon our benefit map deposited as aforesaid.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, at a Special Term thereof, to be held at the Chambers thereof, in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the 17th day of December, 1894, at the opening of the Court on that day, and that then and there, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, a motion will be made that the said report be confirmed.
