SIR:—In compliance with section 1344 of the Greater New York Charter I have the honor to present herewith my report on the transactions of the Department of Water Supply for the three months ended December 31, 1900.

BUREAU OF MANHATTAN AND THE BROS.

EXTENSIVE WATER SUPPLY.

The rainfall in the Crown watershed, as recorded by rain gauges kept by the Department at many of the storage reservoirs, was as follows:

AVERAGE FOR THE QUARTER, 15.01 inches.

There were only thirteen days when the natural flow of the Croton river was sufficient for the daily supply for the population of Manhattan and the auxiliary supply furnished the Borough of The Bronx by small temporary pumping plants. On average days, the flow in the river had to be supplemented by distilling apparatus, amounting in the aggregate for the quarter to 12,400,000 gallons, which is over 31 per cent. of the entire supply received during the quarter.

CRITIC AND HYDRAULIC SUPPLY.

The rainfall as recorded by the rain gauge at the Kensico Reservoir was: For October 4.40 inches; for November 5.20 inches; for December 5.04 inches; total, 14.64 inches.

At the beginning of this quarter the storage reservoirs at Rye Point and Hyman Pond were practically empty, two-thirds of the reserve supply in the Kensico Reservoir had been used and the receiving and distributing reservoir at Williamsbridge had been drawn down to two-thirds of its capacity. A shortage of the small reserve supply thus remaining had to be continued throughout the quarter, while the entire supply from these sources was reduced from 17,000,000 gallons in September to 14,000,000 gallons in October and November, and 14,000,000 gallons in December. The consequent reduction of pressure in the distributing mains affected the entire borough west of the Bronx river, and at times actually cut off the supply to tenements in Wardslaw Heights, Bardonia Heights and University Heights, and to a lesser degree in the Bedford Park section and Kew-Forest section of the borough. Limited and inadequate relief was given to the Kew-Forest section by the installation of a temporary pumping plant at the old Croton Aqueduct, through which about 500,000 gallons of water per day were pumped into distributing mains west of the aqueduct. On November 20, I applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the adoption of a resolution calling upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority the use of special revenue funds under section 168 of the City Charter, in the amount of \$10,000 for the installation and operation of a temporary pumping plant at the old aqueduct near Glen Hill road to pump about 1,000,000 gallons of water per day into the distributing mains in the Borough, the work to be done without contract by public letting, in order to expedite the amount of relief. The Assembly, however, passed a resolution which required that the work must be done and expenditure incurred by contract of public letting, and the final authorization of the bond issue was not obtained until after the close of the quarter.

As another and larger measure of relief a contract was made for laying a 48-inch water-main from the Croton Aqueduct through Madison parkway and the Southern Boulevard to the lower section of the borough and the work was begun in the latter part of December. This measure, when in operation, this large main will be completed next October. It will fully supply the densely built-up section of the Twenty-third Ward, and give opportunity to the Bronx and Hyman supply for distribution with adequate pressure to the higher grounds.

SUBSIDIARY AND INCIDENTAL.

The usual work in the care and maintenance of the new and old Croton Aqueducts and the Bronx and Hyman river intakes and their appurtenances, and adjacent grounds have been diligently performed. All the supply for the Borough of Manhattan amounting per day to 200,000,000 gallons in October, 255,000,000 gallons in November, and 250,000,000 gallons in December, has been received through the two aqueducts. The old aqueduct has been used only to supply the water required in the construction of the Croton Dam and Reservoir under the Aqueduct Commission's (the Big Croton Dam) and the small auxiliary supply to the Borough of The Bronx.

DISTRIBUTION OF MAINS.

During the quarter 12,400 linear feet of mains were laid in extending and improving the water service:

Total 5,400 linear feet of mains.

In connection therewith 17 new stopcocks and 10 new fire-hydrants were placed.

In consequence of repairs in the tracks of streets and avenues in the Borough of The Bronx about 4,000 linear feet of watermains, with 6 stopcocks and 12 fire-hydrants had to be rebuilt.

The following are the principal items of work done in the maintenance and repairs of the distributing system by the district repair companies and two repair companies at large.

- 1,124 linear feet of new watermains laid.
- 16 new stopcocks placed.
- 10 new and improved fire-hydrants placed.
- 50 leaks in watermains repaired.
- 2 old stopcocks replaced by new.
- 10 old fire-hydrants replaced by new.

Borough of Richmond.

RAINFALL.

The rainfall in the Long Island watershed, from which the Brooklyn water supply is obtained, as recorded by the rain gauge at the Hempstead Reservoir, was 9.00 inches, which is 1.07 inches below the average for the same quarter in preceding four years.

CONSUMPTION OF WATER.

The average daily consumption from the several systems of supply, was as follows:

This shows a reduction of 5,580,936 gallons in the consumption from the Reservoir system, as compared with the fourth quarter of 1899, and an increase of 2,402,733 gallons in the consumption from the Gravesend and New Ulster systems.

At the close of the quarter the reserve supply in the Hempstead Storage Reservoir, the annual capacity of which is 1,000,000,000 gallons, had been drawn down to 34,277,000 gallons, and the supply in the Ridgewood and Mount Prospect Reservoirs, the normal capacity of which is 225,000,000 gallons, had been drawn down to 171,300,000 gallons. The entire reserve supply was therefore equal to only two and one-half days' supply at the existing rate of consumption.

DISTRIBUTING SYSTEM.

In extending the water service into new streets and districts, 13,678 linear feet of 12-inch mains, 22,024 linear feet of 8-inch mains, and 7,048 linear feet of 6-inch mains were laid; total new mains laid, 42,750 linear feet, or 8.13 miles. In connection with these new mains 95 water-gates or stopcocks, and 89 additional fire-hydrants were placed.

The following are the principal items of work performed by the force employed in the maintenance and repairs of the distributing system:

- 50 leaks in water-mains repaired.
- 60 drinking-hydrants repaired.
- 1,405 fire-hydrants repaired.
- 65 stop-cocks repaired.
- 580 new taps in water-mains placed and inspected.
- 25 houses-service pipes cut off on account of leaks.

The water-meter system has been extended by the placing of 105 additional meters, making a total of 3,514 meters in use at the close of the quarter.

In the latter part of November, the contractor for the new 48-inch pipe conduit from Mill-burn to Spring Creek, began active operations, by procuring the pipes and special loadings from the hauleries, and the work of building or laying the conduit is now rapidly progressing.

Borough of Queens.

There has been an increase of complaints during the quarter of insufficient pressure in delivery water in adequate quantity and sufficient elevation to houses on the higher grounds, the complainants generally attributing this to the large drafts on the water supply by factories. For obvious reasons, however, the Department cannot curtail the water supply for manufacturing and industrial purposes.

The pumping stations and plants at Flushing, College Point and Whitestone, are in good condition, and furnish the normal quantity of water for distribution. The three pumping plants and well stations in the First Ward, Long Island City, are still in need of improvements which could not be made under the regular annual appropriations, but will soon be made under the special revenue bond issue of \$75,000, granted for this purpose.

The average daily supply, pumped and distributed from the several pumping stations, and the supply received under contract with the Citizens' Water Supply Company, during the quarter, are as follows:

- 1 stop-cock repaired.
- 54 hydrants repaired.
- 64 stopcocks boxes repaired.
- 0 new hydrants placed.

The small pumping plant at Totinville, owned by the City, furnished an average daily supply of 88,375 gallons.

Having recently obtained an appropriation of \$10,000 for the additional water and appurtenances of this station, the work will be begun as early as practicable, in the spring, and the Department will then be able to meet demand upon this water service which exceed the present capacity of the plant.
