

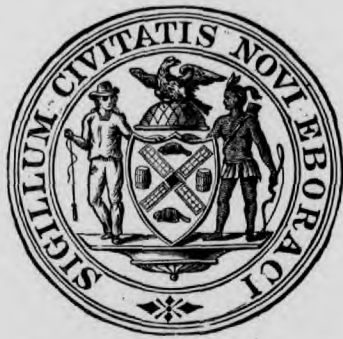

THIRD DISTRICT, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Meeting in Room 11, Borough Hall, at 4.30 P. M., Friday, January 19, 1900.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names :

Edward M. Grout, President, in the chair; Councilman Conly and Aldermen Downing, Bridges and Wafer.

The President submitted the following :

(No. 25.)

Petition for altering the map of The City of New York by laying out a park to be bounded on the south by the centre of Grace court, on the west by Furman street, on the north with the exception of one lot on Remsen street, by the centre of the block between Remsen street and Grace court, and on the east by the easterly boundary of the property known as the Prentice property. Along with the petition there was laid before the Board a report of the Chief Topographical Engineer, recommending that if it is determined to lay out a park in the vicinity, Montague terrace be extended from Remsen street to Grace court or to Columbia place, and that the park be bounded then by Remsen street, Montague terrace, Grace court and Furman street.

An additional petition for acquiring the property described above for park purposes provided the cost of the property and said extension should be borne by the borough at large, was presented by S. V. White and 33 others.

Protest filed by John B. Holland and 95 others.

Alderman Wafer offered the following :

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 19th day of January, 1900, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, that the map of The City of New York be changed in accordance with the provisions of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, by extending Montague terrace, from Remsen street to Joralemon street, and laying out as a park the property bounded by Remsen street, Furman street, Joralemon street and Montague terrace as extended, on condition that, when the property within the lines of said proposed park and said proposed street is taken for said purposes, it be acquired at the expense of the city at large.

A vote was taken which resulted as follows :

Affirmative—Councilman Conly and Alderman Wafer.

Negative—The President and Alderman Downing.

Not voting—Alderman Bridges.

Alderman Bridges moved that the matter be laid over until Thursday, January 25, at 4.30 P. M., which was carried.

(No. 28.)

Alderman Bridges offered the following :

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, hereby rescinds the following resolution, which was passed on January 4, 1900 :

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby directs that the sidewalk opposite the lots lying on the north side of Front street, between Pearl street and Jay street, known as Lots Nos. 6 and 7, Block 10, Second Ward Map, be flagged with bluestone flagging, five (5) feet in width, at the expense of the owner or owners of the said lots.

Resolved, That this resolution be forwarded to the Board of Public Improvements for its approval.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote :

Affirmative—Councilman Conly and Aldermen Bridges, Wafer and Downing and the President.

Meeting in Room 11, Borough Hall, at 4.30 P. M., Thursday, January 25, 1900.

The roll was called, and the following members answered to their names :

Edward M. Grout, President, in the Chair; Councilman Conly and Aldermen Downing, Bridges and Wafer.

The President submitted the following :

(No. 25.)

Petition for altering the map of The City of New York by laying out a park and for acquiring the property described in the proposed park, to be bounded on the south by the centre of Grace court, on the west by Furman street, on the north, with the exception of one lot on Remsen street, by the centre of the block between Remsen street and Grace court, and on the east by the easterly boundary of the property known as the Prentice property. Along with the petition there was laid before the Board a report of the Chief Topographical Engineer recommending that if it is determined to lay out a park in the vicinity, Montague terrace be extended from Remsen street to Grace court, or to Columbia place, and that the park be bounded then by Remsen street, Montague terrace, Grace Court and Furman street.

The President announced that the first business before the Board was the consideration of the following motion made by Alderman Wafer at the meeting on January 19, 1900, and laid over to be voted upon on January 25 :

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 19th day of January, 1900, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York, that the map of The City of New York be changed in accordance with the provisions of section 436 of The Greater New York Charter, by extending Montague terrace, from Remsen street to Joralemon street, and laying out as a park the property bounded by Remsen street, Furman street, Joralemon street and Montague terrace as extended, on condition that, when the property within the lines of said proposed park and said proposed street is taken for said purposes, it be acquired at the expense of the city at large.

Alderman Bridges moved that the petition filed by S. V. White and others on January 19, favoring the acquisition of the property in question for park purposes, providing the cost of the property and the extension of Montague terrace be borne by the borough at large, be amended by striking out "borough at large" in the last line and inserting the words "city at large."

The President ruled the motion out of order on the ground that the Board had no right to alter a petition filed by property-owners.

Alderman Bridges offered the following as a substitute to the resolution offered by Alderman Wafer on January 19 :

Whereas, The Local Board of the Third District of Local Improvements, Borough of Brooklyn, has taken into final consideration the purchase of certain lots on Brooklyn Heights in the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of a public park ; and

Whereas, After careful consideration of the subject said Board is led to earnestly recommend the acquisition of such lots for such use involving the ownership of a magnificent water-front unequalled in its commanding and extended view, comprising great natural beauties of land and water ; and

Whereas, At a public hearing in relation to the proposed acquisition of the said premises for such park purposes it was found that the only opposition thereto was confined to residents in the immediate vicinity, who complained that a public park at that locality would make it less desirable for residence, but aid Board being of the opinion that the benefits to the general public would far outweigh any seeming detriment to the adjoining property ;

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that the map of The City of New York be changed in accordance with the provisions of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, by laying out as a park the property bounded and described as follows, to wit :

Beginning at the intersection of the easterly line of Furman street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, with the southerly line of Remsen street, as laid down on the Commissioners' map, and running thence southerly along the easterly line of Furman street one hundred and eighty (180) feet to Grace court, as now laid out and used as a public street ; thence easterly along Grace court as so laid out and used two hundred and twenty-two (222) feet to a point ; thence northerly eighty (80) feet ; thence westerly along the rear of the lot fronting on Remsen street and known on the Tax Commissioners' map as Lot No. 36, Block 251, First Ward Map, to the westerly line of said lot ; and thence northerly along said line sixteen (16) feet, more or less ; thence westerly along the southerly line of the lots fronting on Remsen street one hundred and fifteen (115) feet ; thence northerly eighty-four (84) feet, more or less, to the southerly side of Remsen street ; thence westerly along the said southerly side of Remsen street eighty-seven (87) feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning.

And the Local Board further recommends that when the map of The City of New York is altered by laying out said park as described above, the property within the lines of said proposed park be acquired at the expense of the city at large.

The Secretary read the following communication :

JANUARY 24, 1900.

Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn :

GENTLEMEN—In view of the public favor with which the suggestion made at the last meeting of the Local Board was received that a new park be laid out, to be bounded by Columbia street, Baltic street, Harrison street and the East river, I wish to recommend to the Local Board that if it determines that a new park is desirable along the water-front in the First or Sixth Wards, it recommend the laying-out of a park as described above rather than the proposed park in the vicinity of Remsen street and Grace court. Such a park being in the congested section of the city would be far more accessible to the people for whom it would be most beneficial than the one proposed on Columbia Heights and it would have the additional advantage of having a water-front, thereby making possible the construction of a recreation pier. The cost would be no more than that of purchasing the Prentice property and the adjacent property on Remsen street, together with the property necessary to continue Montague terrace, while the size of the park would be double that of the one proposed on the heights.

I suggest, therefore, the adoption of the following resolution as an alternative to and substitute for the Prentice scheme :

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that the map of The City of New York be changed in accordance with the provisions of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, by laying out a park to be bounded by Columbia street, Baltic street, Harrison street and the East river, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The President offered the following as a substitute to the resolution offered by Alderman Bridges :

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Third District, Borough of Brooklyn, hereby recommends to the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York that the map of The City of New York be changed, in accordance with the provisions of section 436 of the Greater New York Charter, by laying out a park to be bounded by Columbia street, Baltic street, Harrison street and the East river, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Alderman Bridges raised the point of order that the resolution offered by the President was out of order on account of there having been no advertisement that the Board was to consider the proposition of laying out a park to be bounded by Columbia street, Baltic street, Harrison street and the East river.

The President ruled the point not well taken on the ground that, as the altering of the map of The City of New York involves no expenditure of money, and as there is an advertisement by the Board of Public Improvements before final action can be taken, there is no necessity for an advertisement before the matter can be considered by the Local Board.

The substitute offered by the President was discussed by Aldermen Wafer, Bridges and Downing. It was adopted by the following vote :

Affirmative—The President, Alderman Downing and Alderman Wafer.

Negative—Councilman Conly and Alderman Bridges.

Alderman Wafer moved to reconsider the above vote.

Before the vote on the motion to reconsider was taken, on motion of Councilman Conly the meeting adjourned.
