Superintendent's Report.

Doctor William Mabon, Superintendent of Bellevue Hospital, reported as follows:

In accordance with the request of your Board, the Commissioner of Police has detailed an extra Policeman to duty at Bellevue.

The work of the dispensary is progressing somewhat better than at the time of my last report. We have endeavored to confer with the contractor, but have been unable to reach him. His assistant says that the masons will probably be two weeks at their part of the work, and the carpenters and painters a month. In the meantime the furniture for the Out-Patient Department has been ordered from the prison.

Since writing the above all mechanics and laborers have been called on a general strike and no one is at present employed.

The lowest bid for awnings amounts to \$634, and this, added to the amount thus far expended for similar goods, namely \$61.75, makes a total of \$695.75, a sum safely within the limits. In view of the fact that these goods are needed at once, I would recommend their purchase in the open market. The original bids are herewith submitted for your information.

The Marquand Pavilion is now occupied and thus far no cases of diphtheria have arisen. At present all children are kept in the tents for ten days so as to avoid the danger of bringing into the wards proper children suffering from contagious diseases.

The American Laundry Machinery Company has very nearly completed the work of installing the machinery according to the contract.

The contractor for installing the electric light fixtures has not yet finished, owing to the delay in getting the fixtures. The old electric feeders around the sides of the building are now being taken down by the electric light company.

The plumbing has been installed in the Crane operating room and amphitheatre. The change was made in the latter place by putting in a marble back in front of a large window and having the slate of window sill reset.

The firm which has the contract for painting the cookhouse, brick walls and iron fence on First avenue has been delayed somewhat by reason of the weather, but has made fair progress.

The Supervising Engineer has prepared specifications for the furnishing, setting up and connecting hot and cold water lines, installing two iron-rimmed enamel sinks with 18-inch back, one to be set up in Ward 22 and one in Ward 21. These sinks are similar to the one erected during the first quarter of this year in Ward 28 to provide facilities for clinical examination of bodily secretions.

Gouverneur Hospital—In accordance with your instructions the matter of the application of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for an additional Orderly has been looked into, and it is found that one is not absolutely essential. The Supervising Nurse reports that there will be a large part of the time when his services will not be needed on the wards, and, in view of the fact that our appropriation for salaries and wages is insufficient to warrant this expense, it is recommended that the matter be deferred until another year.

Harlem Hospital—Metal ceilings have been put in the second story of the ambulance stable in place of the old plaster ceilings which have fallen. A new closet has been placed in the toilet room of the stable.

Considerable trouble was experienced recently with the main house sewer. The water backed up into the kitchen and we had to engage a plumber to dig down, open the pipe and clean out the sewer thoroughly. It appears from his report that the trouble was near the street connection and is due very largely to the tide bringing back sticks and other extraneous material which clogged it up.

Eight new beds have been ordered for the Maternity Ward, as those in stock were too low.

One of the members of the Medical Board requests that one of the rooms be assigned for septic cases, and if this can be arranged it would seem advisable to take the room at the northeast corner.

Fordham Hospital—The Supervising Nurse reports that the delivery of meat has been at times delayed and on a few occasions did not arrive in good condition. The contractor was notified that his delivery must be satisfactory not only in quality but also on time, and he has agreed to see that no further cause for complaint arises.

To the Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor:

Sir—Pursuant to section 27, chapter 230 of the Laws of 1898, I beg to submit the following report of the proceedings of my Bureau for the three months ending June 30, 1903:

Number of estates reported to and investigated by the Bureau.....	129
Number of estates upon which letters of administration were granted to the Public Administrator upon the application of creditors or next of kin....	41
Number of estates upon which letters were granted upon the application of the Public Administrator.....	21
Total number of estates upon which letters of administration have been granted.....	62

Four hundred and twenty estates are at present under administration.
The accounts of proceedings of the Public Administrator have been judicially settled and allowed by the Surrogate in twenty-six estates, and the estates distributed pursuant to the decree of the Surrogate.

Three hundred and fifty-one estates of little value were received from the Coroner's Office, Bellevue Hospital, and from the Commissioner of Public Charities.

Two hundred and eight estates heretofore received from the Coroner's Offices of the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, from Bellevue Hospital, from the Department of Health and from the Commissioner of Public Charities have been paid directly into the City Treasury.

In thirteen cases citations were served on the Public Administrator to attend the probate of a last will and testament, and his appearance noted.

All reports and returns to the Comptroller, Municipal Assembly and to the Supervisor of the City Record have been rendered.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

PART III.

Regulations Governing the Manufacture, Storage and Sale of Ammunition.

CHAPTER I.

Manufacture.

1. No ammunition or loaded cartridges shall be manufactured or loaded for sale in The City of New York except by persons, firms or corporations duly licensed therefor by the Fire Commissioner.

2. Application for a license and permit shall be made in writing to the Fire Commissioner upon a blank to be furnished by the Department, containing the following information:

(a) Description of the premises on or in which the said manufacture is to be carried on, and in case more than one building is to be used for the purpose, a plan in detail, drawn to a scale of an eighth of an inch to the foot, in duplicate.

(b) The character of the building or buildings in which said fabrication is to be carried on, and if occupied for other purposes, the details of same.

(c) The name and quantity of explosive or combustible materials for which permit is desired. In case fabrication is to be carried on in more than one building the amount of explosive or combustible material to be stored in each to be clearly marked on plan.

(d) The name of person under whose charge the fabrication is to be carried on.

3. No ammunition or loaded cartridges shall be manufactured in The City of New York unless said manufacture is in charge of a person or persons holding a certificate or certificates of fitness, issued by the Fire Commissioner after an examination for the purpose of ascertaining the fitness and experience of said person or persons to conduct said fabrication.

4. A fee of five dollars shall be paid for each license, and one dollar for each certificate of fitness or permit, all of which shall expire one year from the date of issue.

5. Following the application for permit, the Fire Commissioner shall cause a survey of the premises to be made, and if the conditions are found satisfactory a permit, good for one year, may be issued, describing the place of manufacture and the amounts of explosive or combustible material permitted to be stored.

6. The maximum amounts of explosive or combustible material for which permit shall be issued for the purpose of loading cartridges shall be as follows:

Black powder, ten pounds.

Smokeless powder, twenty-five pounds avoirdupois.

7. The Fire Commissioner may, in case of violation of these regulations or whenever, in his opinion, the public interest demands it, revoke any license, permit or certificate of fitness.

8. In case of retail stores licensed to load shells, the explosive shall be stored (excepting what may be at the moment required) in the same manner as provided for storage of powder in Part II, Chapter VI., Section 69 of these regulations.

9. Permits shall not be issued for the manufacture of metallic ammunition of larger calibre than .45 of an inch.

CHAPTER II.

Storage and Sale.

10. No ammunition or loaded cartridges or primers shall be stored or sold in The City of New York without a permit for the same issued by the Fire Commissioner.

11. Permits for the storage or sale of ammunition, loaded cartridges and primers may be issued by the Fire Commissioner after the receipt of a written application made on a form furnished by the Department, accompanied by a fee of two dollars and containing the following information:

(a) A description of the premises on or in which the ammunition, etc., is to be stored.

(b) The kind and amount of said ammunition to be stored.

12. A careful survey of the premises shall be made, and a permit may be issued for not more than the maximum amount of material required at that particular place of business. And in no event shall a permit be issued for a greater number than as follows, viz.:

300,000 loaded paper shot shells.

2,500,000 metallic cartridges for pistols.

500,000 metallic cartridges for rifles.

2,000,000 primers for central fire ammunition containing metallic anvils.

6,000,000 percussion caps or primers without anvils.

In cases where loaded paper shot shells are not at any time stored on the premises or asked for in the permit, the permit for pistol cartridges may be increased to 4,500,000.

13. All primers with anvils shall be packed in wooden or paper cases having non-metallic cellular packing.

14. No permits shall be issued for the storage or sale in The City of New York of metallic ammunition larger than .45 calibre, excepting for calibres from .50 to .58, of which 10,000 in all may be stored.

15. These regulations shall go into effect thirty days after their approval by the Mayor.

PART IV.

Electric Fuses, Detonators and Blasting Caps.

CHAPTER I.

1. No person, firm or corporation shall manufacture, transport, store or sell

for use in The City of Greater New York any electric fuses, detonators or blasting caps of any sort except as provided in these regulations.

2. No manufactory of electric fuses, except as already existing, shall hereafter be permitted in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, and only in such parts of the boroughs of Queens and Richmond as will permit of a safety limit of 500 feet from the nearest building not controlled by the licensee.

3. The manufacture of detonators or blasting caps in The City of New York is hereby prohibited. This shall not, however, be construed to prohibit the manufacture of electric fuses in accordance with the terms of these regulations, provided the caps therefor are brought from some point without the City.

CHAPTER II.

Manufacture.

4. Any person, firm or corporation desiring to manufacture electric fuses shall first file with the Fire Commissioner an application for a license and for a permit, which application shall specify the following, viz.:

(a) Proposed or present location of manufactory.
(b) The distance from adjoining buildings, streets and public places; nature and use of adjoining buildings; place and manner of keeping raw material; place and manner of storage of the finished product, and quantities of explosives or highly combustible substances proposed to be stored.

(c) A detailed plan drawn to a scale of $\frac{1}{8}$ of an inch to the foot, showing the arrangements of the various separate buildings of the proposed manufactory and the nature of the work to be carried on in each, together with the largest number of persons proposed to be employed on each floor of each building, and the barricades or other methods to be employed to limit the area of destructive effects of explosions.

(d) The number and proposed employment of persons for whom certificates of fitness should be obtained, as hereinafter provided.

(e) The practical experience of the persons for whom certificates of fitness should be obtained.

5. Previous to the issue of a license as herein prescribed the applicant shall furnish and file with the Fire Commissioner a bond in the penal sum of \$5,000, approved by the Comptroller, conditioned for the payment of any loss, damage or injury resulting to persons or property by reason of the work carried on in such manufactory.

6. Following the receipt of the application the Fire Commissioner shall cause a survey of said premises to be made, and in his discretion shall issue a license and permit authorizing such manufacture on the payment of a fee of fifty dollars, which license and permit, unless sooner revoked by the Fire Commissioner for cause, shall be and remain in force for the period of one year from date of same.

7. All supervising employees and those actually engaged in such manufactories in handling fulminate in bulk, either wet or dry, shall make application to the Fire Commissioner and obtain a certificate of fitness authorizing them to perform such duties. Said application shall set forth the following facts regarding the applicant, viz.:

(a) Age of the applicant.
(b) Ability to read and understand the English language.
(c) Previous experience of applicant, familiarity with the risks incident to the service to be performed, and such data as would tend to show fitness for position to be filled.

8. The fee for granting a certificate of fitness shall be one dollar in each case, said certificate to remain in force for one year from date of same unless sooner revoked by the Fire Commissioner for cause.

9. The entire manufactory shall be inclosed with a suitable fence and have such arrangements for entering as will enable the management to have control of all persons entering the premises.

10. The building in which the wet fulminate is stored, together with its corresponding building or dryhouse in which the fulminate is dried for use, shall be within a separate enclosure, the entrance to which shall be securely locked, and this enclosure shall only be entered by persons holding certificates of fitness.

11. Only such quantities of the wet fulminate shall be spread out in the drying room as will permit sufficient of the dried fulminate to be on hand as required for actual use, and the maximum amount required shall be stated in the permit.

12. The floors of all buildings where dry fulminate is stored or used shall be covered with rubber matting. Said buildings shall be heated by hot water pipes and the source of heat shall be in an exterior building. The wearing of shoes with metal nails by workmen having access to such buildings is prohibited.

13. No fulminate shall be manufactured on the premises.

14. All naphtha barrels or packages shall be stored in a separate enclosure and the empty packages removed each day. Naphtha, bitumen, sulphur and chlorate of potash shall not be stored in close proximity to one another, but shall be so separated that they cannot react upon one another in case of fire.

CHAPTER III.

Transportation.

15. No shipping case delivered in The City of New York shall contain more than 25,000 caps or detonators, nor more than 5,000 electric fuses. Each shipping case of caps or detonators, in addition to the name and address of the consignee, shall bear the words "Explosive Caps, handle with care," and each shipping case of electric fuses, in addition to the name and address of the consignee, shall bear the words "Electric Exploders, handle with care."

16. Only licensed persons, firms or corporations shall be permitted to transport electric fuses or detonators and caps through The City of New York in quantity exceeding 5,000 electric fuses or detonators or caps at a time. All wagons used for distributing such products packed in shipping cases shall contain no other explosive merchandise or material, and shall be in charge of drivers holding certificates of fitness. No other person shall be allowed to ride on such wagons.

CHAPTER IV.

Storage and Sale.

17. No electric fuses, detonators or caps shall be removed from the place of manufacture and stored either temporarily or otherwise in a store or salesroom until a permit has been obtained for said premises.

18. An application shall be made to the Fire Commissioner for such permit, who will cause a survey of the premises to be made, and if the conditions are satisfactory will issue a permit authorizing the storage and sale of such articles. The fee for said permit shall be ten dollars, and unless revoked for cause it shall be in force for one year from the date thereof.

19. The manager or foreman of such place of business shall hold a certificate of fitness as provided herein.

20. Not more than 10,000 electric fuses, detonators or caps shall be stored at places other than the manufactories, and the electric fuses, detonators or caps so authorized by permit shall be kept in iron receptacles of such size that not more than 2,000 electric fuses are contained in each. These receptacles shall have iron covers covering same closely and be on wheels so placed as to be readily run into the street in case of fire.

21. In addition to the 10,000 electric fuses, detonators or caps authorized to be carried in a store, the permit may authorize the having temporarily in such store not more than 25,000 electric fuses, detonators or caps in packing cases which are in process of being shipped to points outside the City.

22. These regulations shall go into effect thirty days after their approval by the Mayor.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for a further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railway by itself, and shall not include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successors in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Third—Upon the termination of the said franchise, right or privilege, whether original or renewal, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, or its successors in authority shall so desire, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the grantee necessary for traction purposes upon the said streets and highways and bridges, including equipment, tracks and appurtenances, which plant and property shall be and become the property of The City of New York at the option of the said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, on the termination of this grant and the payment to the grantee of such valuation. Fifth—The said annual charge or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the franchise hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway company providing for payments for street railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or franchises hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this grant, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives, so far as this franchise is concerned, any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this grant.

Sixth—The railway and other structures constructed by the grantee, its successors or assigns under this ordinance, shall in all respects comply with the provisions of chapter 686 of the Laws of 1894, as amended.

Seventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall cause to be laid, under the supervision of the municipal authorities having jurisdiction in such matters, upon and along the public highway known as the Boulevard, as hereinbefore described, a good and sufficient macadamized pavement of a depth of not less than eight inches, to extend from either side of the present macadamized pavement to the curb line on the north and south sides of the said Boulevard.

The grantee shall pay the entire cost thereof, together with the cost of the necessary inspection, and no cars shall be operated under this franchise over any part of the route hereby granted, until the said pavement is fully and completely laid.

Eighth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Ocean Electric Railway Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Ninth—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power, substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use by the New York and North Shore Railway Company, or by the underground electric system now in use by the Interurban Street Railway Company in the Borough of Manhattan, and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse-power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Tenth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of the City.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of said company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Twelfth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five cents between Far Rockaway, and any point westerly thereof.

Thirteenth—The cars on the said lines as proposed shall run at intervals of not more than one hour, both day and night, and as much oftener as the reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the City ordinances; provided, however, that said railway company during the first five years of this franchise shall not be required to operate its cars on any of its lines within The City of New York between the hours of 12:30 and 4:30 o'clock a. m., each day between the first day of May and the first day of November in each year, and between 12 o'clock midnight and 6 o'clock a. m. during the balance of the year, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of its cars during said hours.

Fourteenth—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said railway a proper fender and wheelguard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fifteenth—All cars on said railway shall be heated through the cold weather in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Sixteenth—The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said streets, free and clear from ice and snow.

Seventeenth—The said railway company, as long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets and highways and bridges, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of said streets and highways and bridges, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street and highway and bridge, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper city officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Eighteenth—The said railway company, its successors and assigns, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and highways and bridges hereby granted, shall cause the entire roadway of each of the same to be watered at least three times in every twenty-four hours when the thermometer is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, except that when the width of any roadway between curb lines shall exceed 60 feet, then a roadway of but 60 feet shall be watered as above.

Nineteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this grant may be forfeited and avoided by The City of New York, by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Twentieth—If any of the streets and highways and bridges above referred to, or described, shall not now be open or in use as public highways, no right or franchise therein shall vest in the grantee by virtue of this ordinance until after such streets and highways and bridges shall be legally opened as a public highway, and such right or franchise shall expire at the end of the term created by this ordinance as above set forth. Nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as an obligation on The City of New York, in respect to the opening of such streets and highways and bridges, nor as in any manner granting property or rights of any kind in or upon its lands now owned or occupied by it under any title, except only the public streets and highways and bridges in the usual acceptance of such terms, which are specifically referred to above.

Section 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 4 of the Railroad Law, as it existed at the time of the adoption of this ordinance applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted hereafter affecting the surface railways operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Section 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that at any time after five years from the commencement of the operation of any portion of the railway hereby granted, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, if it deems it necessary in the public interest so to do may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, in case the railway upon any portion of the routes above described shall consist of a single track, to construct and operate a second track upon any or all of the routes hereby granted, whether on streets, highways and bridges or upon any private property or right-of-way included in any of such routes so as to make a double-track railway.

Section 5. Said grantee shall commence construction within three months from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments, and shall complete the construction of a single track railway upon all of the route hereby granted on or before July 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be thereupon forthwith and immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. If upon the route above described, or upon any portion thereof, there shall not be constructed and in actual operation by July 1, 1904, a railway properly equipped and operated as provided by this ordinance, the said route or portion thereof shall be conclusively taken to have been abandoned by the company, and so much of the rights and franchises hereby granted as pertain to such route or portion thereof, not then constructed from and after immediately forfeited, without judicial or other proceedings. Provided that such time may be extended upon the same conditions as to forfeiture under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, and by a properly executed instrument in writing; and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may similarly extend such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year, if, in their discretion, it seems best so

to do, and that the city officials or departments who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said streets and highways and bridges, may similarly extend, by properly executed instrument in writing, such time for a period or periods not exceeding one year further, if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Section 6. If for any reason the right or franchise of the grantee in any of the streets, highways and bridges above described shall cease, or if for a period of six successive months the railway tracks upon any of such streets, highways and bridges shall not be operated as provided for in this ordinance, the Comptroller of The City of New York may require the grantee, its successors or assigns, to remove its tracks and other structures upon such streets, highways and bridges within thirty days after notice, and in default of their removal pursuant to such notice, the proper local authorities having jurisdiction may cause them to be removed and the City of New York may recover the cost and expense of such removal, either by deducting them from the fund deposited as required in section 7 hereof, or by action; and the rights and franchises of the grantee, its successors or assigns, in such portions of the streets, highways and bridges, in case any such exist, shall forthwith and immediately cease upon the removal of such tracks or structures and without judicial or other proceedings.

Section 7. This grant is upon the express condition that the Ocean Electric Railway Company, within thirty days after the said company has been duly authorized to operate said railway and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred thereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of two thousand dollars, either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by such company of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railway, and, in case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company. Or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this grant relating to the headways of cars, fenders and wheel guards and the heating of the cars and the watering of the streets, the said company shall pay a penalty of \$50 a day for each day of violation, and the further sum of \$10 a day for each car which shall not properly be heated or supplied with fenders and wheel guards in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of two thousand dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Section 8. This grant shall not become operative until said railway company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within ten days after the adoption of this ordinance.

Section 9. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, to which it relates, a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
