4th. Submitting specifications and form of contract for dredging on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the Borough of Manhattan. Approved and ordered printed as Contract No. 870.

5th. Reporting that Contract No. 846 for construction of ferry-boats was commenced June 28, that Contract No. 854, Class II., for rip-rap stone, was commenced June 24, that Contract No. 859, Class I., for sand, was commenced July 21, and that Contract No. 859, Class II., for broken stone, was commenced July 15. Filed.

6th. Recommending that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to adopt a resolution vesting in the City the title to property between West Twentieth and West Twenty-second streets, North river, from the easterly line of Eleventh avenue to the easterly line of the proposed marginal street thereat. Commissioners of the Sinking Fund so requested July 30.

7th. Stating that a quantity of books and papers removed by the Department from the building formerly occupied by Conran & Co., at No. 27 Tenth avenue, are owned by L. Zeckendorf & Co., who now request possession thereof, and recommending that he be given an order to turn over the property to the claimants. Order issued July 30.

8th. Recommending that the Corporation Counsel be requested to advise the Department whether the Department can legally place filling between the present bulkhead and the established bulkhead-line between Ninth and Tenth streets, on the East river. Corporation Counsel so requested.

9th. Reporting that the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company are placing filling along the Hudson river, between Spuyten Duyvil and Riverdale, without permit, and recommending that said Company be directed to discontinue the work immediately until such time as permit shall have been obtained. Company so notified.

10th. Reporting that the tug "Richmond," while lying at the southerly side of the Pier foot of Stanton street, East river, sank on July 25, that the boat has been raised, and that necessary repairs are now being made. Filed.

Fourth—That our report herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof, for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court-house, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 6th day of December, 1904, at the opening of the Court on that day.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, inclosed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 450 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there
