MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, }
November 25, 1904. }

To the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, an ordinance passed by you on Tuesday last, November 22, 1904, entitled "An Ordinance in relation to bicycle races, and other tests of speed or endurance in the City of New York."

The ground upon which I base my disapproval is that this ordinance constitutes an unwarrantable interference with the ordinary exercise of personal rights of citizens in this City. It is very broad in its character and terms, and embraces so many subjects and constitutes such a general range of restriction upon the actions of individuals, that I am convinced the full effect of it could not have been brought to your knowledge at the time you passed it.

Aside from the consideration that it would add, in its practical working, a large and unnecessary burden to the already heavily taxed Police and Health Departments of this City, it purports to protect the public health in matters that are now under the jurisdiction of competent authorities. It is, therefore, unnecessary.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to which was referred on November 15, 1904 (see Minutes, page 395), the annexed ordinance in relation to bicycle races and other contests of skill, speed or endurance in The City of New York, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, after a public hearing held thereon, at which all present and interested spoke in favor thereof, it is recommended that the said ordinance be amended in the following particulars: By striking therefrom the word "skill" wherever it may appear and by striking out the word "proprietor" in the first line of section 4, and inserting in lieu thereof the word "owner."

They therefore recommend that the said ordinance, as so amended, be adopted. AN ORDINANCE in relation to bicycle races and other contests of [skill,] speed or endurance in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Hereafter, in any bicycle race, or other contest of [skill,] speed or endurance held within the limits of The City of New York, wherein one or more persons shall be a contestant or contestants, it shall be unlawful for any contestant to continue in any such race or contest for a longer time than three hours during any twenty-four hours. Further, no such race or other contest shall be held excepting between the hours of 7 o'clock A. M. and 11 o'clock P. M.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Health Commissioner to assign to the place in which any such race or other contest is to be held an Inspector or Inspectors, for the purpose of the better enforcement of such statutes bearing upon the question of the unlawful use of drugs, which, in such event, may be employed for the continuation or success of such undertaking. A report of such Inspector or Inspectors shall be filed in, and made part of the record of, the Health Department.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Police Commissioner to assign to the place in which any such race or other contest is to be held, an Officer or Officers, for the purpose of properly computing the time of each contestant while engaged in any such race or other contest. A report of such Officer or Officers shall be filed in, and made part of the record of, the Police Department.

Sec. 4. The owner, [proprietor,] occupant or lessee of the place where such race or other contest takes place, consenting to, allowing or permitting any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any Magistrate, either upon confession or by competent testimony, shall be fined in the sum of one hundred dollars for each offence, and in default of the payment of such fine shall be committed to the City Prison until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed thirty days. The manager or superintendent of such race or other contest consenting to, allowing or permitting any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall likewise be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and subject to the fine and conditions herein imposed.

Sec. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Gentlemen—The undersigned, citizens and residents of the Borough of Queens, respectfully petition your Honorable Board to refuse the application known as Petition No. 605, being "Petition of the Cemetery Association of the Jewish Soldiers and Sailors of the Spanish-American War" for leave to acquire land for cemetery purposes in the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Queens.

For many years attempts have been made to acquire lands in this section for the use of cemetery associations.

We view with genuine alarm any attempt to increase the barrier which burial grounds have in times gone by erected in the western sections of the Borough of Queens—a practically insurmountable wall between us and the rest of the City.

If cemeteries are to be permitted, let their location be sought far east, to areas where a cosmopolitan development is not destined within a generation to fix itself.

Ours is a home community, bordering directly upon the easterly boundary line of the Borough of Brooklyn.

The proposed site is in close proximity of the Spring Creek Pumping Station, which furnishes in part the water supply of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Wherefore, your petitioners pray that said application shall not be granted.

Red Cross Life Savers, }
Brooklyn, N. Y., November 28, 1904. }

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Gentlemen—We, the undersigned, have been appointed as a committee by the Red Cross Life Savers organization to respectfully beg you to grant us permission to hold our semi-monthly evening meetings in one of the rooms of any public building located in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Our organization has been incorporated for the purpose of rendering such assistance as may be necessary in the matter of rescue and resuscitation of any person or persons whose life or lives may be in danger from any cause, and particularly those in danger of drowning, and to teach and cause to be taught the art of swimming and method of resuscitation at the different water resorts in and around New York and also at the free floating baths.

During the season just passed we have had members stationed at the free floating baths for this purpose as well as at the water resorts. The majority of our members have graduated from the Red Cross Society and have received diplomas from the same authorizing them to render first aid to the injured.

We have also had members stationed at the camp of the American Volunteer Cadets at Sea Cliff, L. I., during the summer for the purpose of teaching the cadets to swim and also to protect them from any accident during the bathing hours. For this service we have received the indorsement of the gentlemen in charge of the American Volunteer Cadets.

We have also been honored with the indorsement of Miss Clara Barton of the Red Cross Society, who endowed us with our incorporated name.

All our services are rendered voluntarily.

From this you will see at once that anything which you may see fit to do for us in the aforementioned matter will be in a humane cause.

At present we are paying upwards of \$100 per year for our meeting rooms, which money we could invest in a much better way by the purchase of life-saving paraphernalia with which to extend our work.

Should it be found necessary to present this plea before your Honorable Board in person, the chairman of this committee would be pleased to obey your command.

Trusting this entreaty will be met with your kind consideration and favor, in view of the circumstances, and thanking you in anticipation, we beg to remain,

The purpose for which such contingent fund is required is to pay the laborers who may be temporarily employed to remove snow and ice from said structures and their approaches immediately after a snow storm; and the necessity is perfectly apparent to your Board that the men so temporarily employed should be paid from such contingent fund immediately upon the completion of their work.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed improvement to be necessary.

They therefore recommend that the annexed resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That, in accordance with the provisions of section 419 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity be and he is hereby authorized to purchase without public letting certain patent devices for connecting water main, at an expense not to exceed \$10,000.

Making Connections with Old Mains—Approved by Engineer—Where the Engineer decides it is necessary, connections with the present mains shall be made without shutting off the water; a cast-iron sleeve in two parts, a stop-cock, both with flange joints and a piece of pipe with flange on one end to connect with stop-cock, etc., regular spigot on other end, all as per plans to be furnished by the contractor and approved by the Engineer. The sleeve shall be set and run solid with lead around pipe, the stop-cock attached to the sleeve with gaskets and bolts, and with a proper cutting apparatus, a hole bored in the present main the size of the new connecting main, care being taken to remove the piece of old main cut out and the cuttings and borings from same. The stop-cock, shut-down and the connection made with the new pipe laid, all to be included in price bid for connection; all materials used to correspond with those prescribed in the specifications for stop-cocks, hydrants, etc.

The Committee on Railroads, to which was referred, on November 22, 1904 (Minutes, page 610), the annexed communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, setting forth the terms and conditions under which John S. Sills & Sons may be permitted to lay and maintain a spur railroad track across Thirty-seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, respectfully

REPORT:

That having examined the subject, they believe the proposed terms and conditions impose adequate compensation to the City for the privilege sought and therefore offer, in connection therewith, the accompanying ordinance, which it is recommended be adopted:

AN ORDINANCE granting permission to John S. Sills & Sons to lay, maintain and operate one spur railroad track across Thirty-seventh street, between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 18, 1904, granting permission to John S. Sills & Sons to lay, maintain and operate one spur railroad track across Thirty-seventh street, between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, upon the terms and conditions therein contained, to wit:

Resolved, That the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to John S. Sills & Sons to lay, maintain and operate a single spur railroad track across Thirty-seventh street, between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues, in the Borough of Manhattan, as shown and indicated upon a map marked "Map showing proposed track crossing West Thirty-seventh street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to accompany the application of John S. Sills & Sons for the right to construct and operate same." Note.—Track for which application is made shown by red lines. Dated October 11, 1904, and signed John S. Sills & Sons, by Howard L. Sills for the firm. Copy of which map is annexed hereto and which is made a part hereof, upon the following terms and conditions:

First—Such consent shall be for a term of fifteen (15) years from the date when this consent is approved by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal for ten (10) years; provided, however, that The City of New York, acting through either the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or the Board of Aldermen, may cancel such consent upon one year's notice in writing.

Second—The said John S. Sills & Sons, their successor or assigns, shall pay into the treasury of The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first five years the annual sum of.....	\$63 00
During the second five years the annual sum of.....	66 00
During the third five years the annual sum of.....	70 00

Such sums shall be paid into the treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year; provided, however, that the first payment shall be only that proportion of \$63 as the time between the approval of this consent and November 1 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Third—The terms for the renewal term shall be fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment six months prior to the expiration of the third term of five years as above, and shall not in any event be less than the amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually during the third term of five years as above, and no renewal of this consent shall provide for a further renewal.

Fourth—Upon the revocation or termination of this consent the said firm, its successor or assigns, shall forthwith remove the plant and property, with its appurtenances, from the street, and the surface of the street shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface or pavement. In default of the performance of this condition by the said firm, its successor or assigns, the proper local authorities may cause such track, property and plant to be removed from the street aforesaid and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described, at the expense of the said firm, its successor or assigns, and such expense to be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

Fifth—The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of John S. Sills & Sons, their successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—The said railroad track may be used and operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power.

No car, motor or engine shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of Thirty-seventh street at any time, and no loading or unloading from said cars shall take place while the same are within the limits of the said street.

Seventh—The railroad track constructed under this consent shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Eighth—Such railroad track shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the President of the Borough of Manhattan. Such railroad track of the said firm, its successor or assigns, shall be maintained in good and safe condition throughout the terms of this consent.

Ninth—Such railroad tracks shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

Tenth—The said firm, its successor or assigns, shall, during the existence of this consent, keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the said street between the rails of its track and two feet in width outside of such rails, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the said street, and in that event the grantee, its successor or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Eleventh—The said firm, its successor or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the rails of its track and two feet in width outside thereof free and clear from ice and snow.

Twelfth—Said firm shall be liable for all damages to persons or property and to the street by reason of the construction or operation of said railroad track, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either persons or property on account of this consent.

Thirteenth—This consent is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York, shall be strictly complied with.

Fourteenth—The said firm, its successor or assigns, shall commence the construction of the railroad track under this consent and complete the same within one

year from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and departments, and on or before November 1, 1905; otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings either at law or otherwise for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding six months.

Fifteenth—This consent is upon the express condition that the said firm, within thirty days after it has been duly authorized to construct, maintain and operate its railroad track hereunder and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City of New York the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the consent, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality or construction of the railroad track. In case default in the performance by said firm of such terms and conditions, the City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said firm.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund the said firm shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150), and in default thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sixteenth—This consent shall not become operative until said firm shall duly execute an instrument in writing wherein said firm shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the signing of this resolution by the Mayor.

Seventeenth—The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date of the approval of this resolution by the Mayor.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Resolution adopted at a stated meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the Headquarters of the New York City Fire Department, Wednesday, October 5, 1904.

Resolved, That Part 1 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be amended by a new section, to be known as Section 23, and to read as follows:

Section 23. All explosives, explosive compounds or mixtures of explosive articles, fireworks, fireworks composition, signal composition, signals, or any article, the use, sale or keeping of which within The City of New York is prohibited by these regulations shall be subject to seizure, and after seizure, shall, upon three (3) days' notice to the owner or claimant, be sold, and the proceeds of such sale, after deducting all expenses, shall be forfeited and paid over to and for the use and benefit of the Relief Fund of the Fire Department of The City of New York; or all said articles shall be destroyed if, in the discretion of the Fire Commissioner, the public interest or safety should so demand.

Resolution adopted at a meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission, held at the Headquarters of the New York City Fire Department, Monday, October 31, 1904.

Resolved, That section 57, Part 5 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be amended so as to extend the prohibition of the use or discharge of fireworks without a permit to the entire city, thereby including that portion of the city not within the fire limits in said prohibition, and to read as follows:

Section 57. Except on Independence Day, or the day celebrated as such, and during the twelve hours preceding and the six hours following, the use or discharge of fireworks or firecrackers in the city, without a license or permit from the Fire Commissioner, is prohibited. No license or permit shall be issued for the discharge of fireworks within the city until the person, firm or corporation desiring to secure said license shall have made written application for same and deposited with the Fire Commissioner a bond in the penal sum of five thousand dollars, approved as to sufficiency by the Comptroller, and conditioned for the payment of any loss, damage or injury resulting to persons or property by reason of the discharge or use of said fireworks, and for the strict observance of sections 731, 771 and 773 of the Greater New York Charter and the ordinances adopted by the Board of Aldermen May 13, 1902, and approved by the Mayor May 19, 1902, amending sections 763 and 769 of the Greater New York Charter and of these regulations.

58(b). No roman candles shall be fired anywhere in the city except from a box or frame or other contrivance, arranged so as to hold the candle or candles firmly in an upright position so that the discharge will be straight up in a line perpendicular to the plane of the horizon.

58(c). No contrivance, frame or box for firing roman candles and no mortar shall be placed under any elevated structure or under any overhead wires, or in any place where an elevated structure or any overhead wires would be in the line of fire.

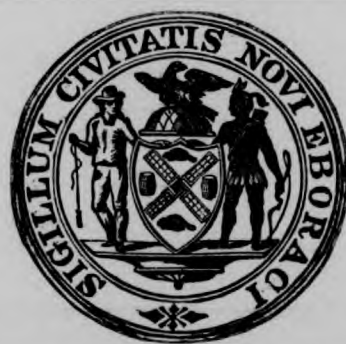

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him (herein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
