The Committee on Bridges and Tunnels, to which was referred on January 10, 1905 (Minutes, page 316), the annexed communication from the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, transmitting a certificate in the matter of the construction of a tunnel railroad by the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, respectfully report:

That, having examined the subject, and after a public hearing held thereon, the Committee on Bridges and Tunnels recommends that the petition and certificate of the New York and New Jersey Tunnel Company be referred back to the Rapid Transit Commission and recommends the following amendment to paragraph 11, section 5, page 13: "The method of construction shall be generally as follows: The tunnels under streets shall be constructed in whole or in part of masonry or of steel or of iron or any two or more thereof combined. Excavations necessary in the course of construction by the tunnel company shall be made without disturbing the surface of the streets; provided, however, that the Board and the President of the Borough of Manhattan may, by resolution or permit, wherever local conditions make excavations from the surface necessary for efficient construction, grant the right to make such excavations from the surface, subject to such conditions and regulations as the Board may

prescribe, and all permits shall be granted and all work shall be done under the supervision of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

He submitted the following letter and resolutions, and asked that the Board give his people an opportunity to suggest another plan for the solution of the problem in question:

I may add that the sentiment against the proposed extension of elevated transit on the lower east side is very strong, as shown by the expression of persons present.

Resolved, That we, citizens of the lower east side, are unalterably opposed to elevated communications between the Manhattan terminals of the bridges, as proposed by a body of Brooklyn citizens in a recent communication to the Rapid Transit Board. Elevated transit in crowded cities is antiquated and abominable. The day of the triumphant subway is already here.

Resolved, That, while we concur with the Brooklynites in heartily demanding relief from the dreadful congestion at bridge terminals, we radically differ with them as to the method of relief, and insist that if a bridge loop be built, it shall be a subway.

At the end of this hearing (there being still others desiring to be heard on other projects), the President announced a final hearing as to rapid transit extensions on the following Thursday, at the usual hour.

President Orr reported that the Committee on Contracts had had a conference with representatives from the Committee of Twenty-five, appointed in Brooklyn Borough, to secure relief from congestion at the Manhattan terminals of the Brooklyn bridges, on Tuesday, the 31st of January, and that further conferences would be held. At that time the following letter from the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company was read:

JANUARY 31, 1905.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, Chairman, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 320 Broadway, Manhattan:

DEAR SIR—In the report relating to the presentation to your Commission of the letter addressed to it by the Committee of which Colonel Willis L. Ogden, of Brooklyn, is Chairman, urging the construction of an elevated connection of the Manhattan ends of the bridges, and stating the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company had announced its readiness to lease the same at 4½ per cent. on the estimated cost of \$3,000,000, I notice it was suggested that something more direct and in writing should be had by your Commission from this company, and in view of the uncertainty in the cost of some parts of the proposed work, that the company's committal to the arrangement should not be conditioned on the maximum cost of \$3,000,000.

Your Commission will, no doubt, agree with me that while no definite sum can now be named which will represent the actual cost of the work—indeed an effort now to fix the amount would probably tend to enhance the item of land damages—it is our duty to give due consideration to this important feature of the question. Nevertheless, the railroad company does not intend to dispute at this point over the maximum cost, for we desire to co-operate with your Commission in the solution of a problem which is important alike to the public and this company.

I therefore beg to advise you that the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company stands ready to bid for the construction and operation of said structure and pay the 4½ per cent. required by law.

As to the question of land damages we, like the City, must take our chances as to how much they will be. When the contract is finally drawn we shall ask that it provide that we have the right to settle land damage claims or defend against them.

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of a copy of a resolution adopted by your Board January 26, 1905, reading as follows:

"Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to write the Interborough Rapid Transit Company that this Board is advised by its counsel that the company has no right to maintain in the subway stations slot machines, weighing machines, or stands for the sale of cigars or flowers, and that this Board accordingly requests the company to take steps to remove them."

In reply I beg to say that this company is advised by its counsel that it has a right to maintain in the subway stations slot machines, weighing machines, or any similar articles which do not interfere with the convenience of the passengers, or the proper maintenance and operation of the road.

The lease of the subway is silent on the subject of such matters, but the right to maintain them is, we are advised, one of the incidents to the lease of the railroad and its appurtenances. We had, however, prior to the adoption of your resolution, directed that the sale of cigars or flowers in the subway stations be prohibited. The slot and weighing machines, in our opinion, do not in the slightest degree interfere with the proper maintenance or use of the stations or the convenience of passengers. On the contrary, they are patronized to a large extent by passengers; they occupy very little space, and we see no reason why they should be removed.

MY DEAR SIR—On Saturday night last the contractor for the tunnel under the East river stopped work as usual at 11 o'clock, and on Sunday morning a fire was discovered in the north heading of the tunnel. On account of the density of smoke, access to the heading was impossible. The contractor proceeded immediately to inject water into the heading, and thus extinguished the fire.

To-day an examination was made by means of a boat, the heading having been flooded. It was found that the timber of the heading had been destroyed by the fire, the cause of which at the present time is not known, but it is probable that some workman left a lighted candle which ignited the timber. From the examination made the roof was found to be intact, and no damage appears to have been done except to the timbering. By to-morrow the water will be forced out and another examination made.

It is hereby ordered that no prisoner under the age of twenty-one years in any of the City Prisons shall be allowed to smoke cigarettes, or to have them in his possession.

Visitors to young prisoners are strictly forbidden to bring cigarettes to such prisoners, and any one who knowingly and wilfully violates this order shall be denied admittance to the prison.

To Wardens of Workhouse, Blackwell's and Riker's Islands, and Headkeeper, Hart's Island—Directing that certain record books be kept "neatly and in ink," as follows:

(1) Assignment of each prisoner to work, and under whose charge he is working; if not working, where each prisoner is, and under whose charge.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits, thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
