REPORT:

That, having examined the subject they recommend that the annexed amended ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to prohibit peddling and hawking on Fulton street, between Broadway and Pearl street, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be It Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 530 of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York of 1897 is hereby amended by inserting after the words, "between Broadway and Centre street" and before the word "from" the words "or in Fulton street, between Broadway and Pearl street."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, A petition has been received by this Board from property-owners and merchants doing business on Fulton street, between Broadway and the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan and The City of New York, concerning the occupancy of said street by push carts, lawbers and vendors, and representing the same to be a public nuisance;

Be It Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall peddle or hawk any wares in Fulton street, between Broadway and the East river, in the Borough of Manhattan and The City of New York.

Sec. 2. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or by competent testimony, may be fined for each offense any sum not less than one dollar or more than ten dollars, and in default of the payment of such fine, may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed ten days.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the construction, improvement and equipping of school buildings, and for the acquisition of sites therefor, in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and to authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to provide means to defray the expenses thereby incurred. Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Municipal Assembly hereby concurs in and approves of a resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted February 1, 1900, as amended May 1, 1900, reading as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000), to provide means for the payment of the following expenses to be incurred by the Board of Education:

For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (including \$300,000 for sites).....	\$1,000,000 00
For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the Borough of Brooklyn.....	1,200,000 00
For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the Borough of Queens.....	250,000 00
For constructing, equipping and improving school buildings and acquiring sites therefor in the Borough of Richmond.....	150,000 00
Total.....	\$3,500,000 00

—and that the Comptroller be authorized, when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Municipal Assembly, to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, in an amount not exceeding three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000), the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 2. Pursuant to the authority conferred upon the Municipal Assembly by section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to issue from time to time, as may be required, Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount of three million five hundred thousand dollars (\$3,500,000), bearing interest at a rate not exceeding four per cent. per annum, and redeemable in not less than ten nor more than fifty years from the

date of issue, the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the payment of expenses authorized to be incurred by the first section of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. The proceeds of the bonds authorized to be issued by the second section of this ordinance shall be paid into the following funds created on the books of the Corporation by the ordinance of the Municipal Assembly, approved by the Mayor, March 7, 1899:

- "School Building Fund—Borough of Manhattan and The Bronx;"
- "School Building Fund—Borough of Brooklyn;"
- "School Building Fund—Borough of Queens;"
- "School Building Fund—Borough of Richmond;"

—as and when such proceeds may be, in the judgment of the Comptroller, required to provide for the liabilities to be incurred chargeable against said funds as in the next section provided; the aggregate amount of such proceeds to be credited to the said funds not to exceed, however, the amounts respectively set forth in the first section of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. Whenever the Board of Education, by resolutions adopted in conformity with law and the by-laws of said Board, shall make requisition on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the application of the proceeds of such sales of bonds for purposes set forth in said resolutions, and said requisitions shall be approved by a majority of the members of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the manner provided by chapter 740 of the Laws of 1897, the said amounts shall be deemed appropriated to the purposes described in said requisitions, and the said Board of Education shall thereupon become authorized to incur liability for and on behalf of The City of New York, in respect to such purposes; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall be construed to limit or affect the provisions of section 149 of the Greater New York Charter relating to the certification of contracts by the Comptroller of The City of New York.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM DEPARTMENTS AND CORPORATION OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Council the following communication from the Comptroller:

No. 1084.

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
May 31, 1900.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly:

Section 247 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the comptroller of said the city of New York to prepare and submit to the municipal assembly, at least four weeks before their annual meeting, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement, setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, or for city purposes within said city, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts by the city treasury during the then current year, from all the sources of revenue of said general fund, including surplus revenues from the sinking fund, available in accordance with law, other than surplus revenues of the sinking fund for the payment of the city debt, and the said municipal assembly are hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order, and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised, by tax only, the balance of said aggregate amount, after making such deduction."

Section 302 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the municipal assembly as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings and Richmond, respectively, and the sum or sums which should be paid for like purposes by that part of Queens county included within the city; and the municipal assembly is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties and part of county, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county or part of county; in the end that each of said counties and said part of Queens county shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the county or part of county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statements as follows:

1. The Budget in detail for the year 1900.

2. The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said budget, and to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by said section 302 of the Charter.

In this connection your attention is called to the fact that since the enactment of the Charter the County of Queens has been so divided that the whole of said county as now existing lies within the territorial limits of The City of New York.

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 247 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the municipal assembly to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 309 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the Assessment Rolls, and also to the provisions of section 311 of the same act, designating the first day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said city.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be kept so as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other funds of such institutions, and all institutions shall keep an exact record, to be corrected from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates; and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.
2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by each institution only for the actual recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the examination and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.
4. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be in the public interest to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.
5. No payment shall be made by inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been approved by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioners of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York:

SIR:—In accordance with the action taken by this Board at the meeting held on the 29th day of May, I inclose herewith copy of an amendment to the form of ordinance transmitted to your Honorable Body for action under date of April 23, entitled "An Ordinance Regulating Traffic in the Public Streets."

DEAR SIR:—On May 12 the Secretary of the Board transmitted to this Department for investigation and report, a resolution adopted by the Municipal Assembly recommending that the cartway of East Eighth street, from Avenue B to the East river, Borough of Manhattan, be repaved with asphalt.

In reply, I beg to report that Eighth street, from Avenue B to C, is already paved with asphalt, and from Avenue C to Avenue D with oblong trap blocks, and from Avenue D to the East river with Belgian blocks. The Belgian and trap blocks are considerably worn, and have numerous depressions. From Avenue C to Avenue D the street is built up with tenements, and from Avenue D to the river there is a factory on the north side and tenements on the south side. A part of the street is within the limits of grants of land under water.

The estimated cost of repaving with asphalt on the present pavement relaid as a foundation, and with a guarantee of maintenance for ten years, Eighth street, from Avenue C to a point 90 feet more or less east of Lewis street, so far as the same is not within the limits of grants of land under water, is \$115,000.

The estimated cost of paving the section of Eighth street, beginning at a point 90 feet easterly from the east line of Lewis street, and extending thence to the East river, so as to include the section of the roadway within the limits of grants of land under water, with asphalt on the present pavement relaid as a foundation, and with a guarantee of maintenance for five years, is \$3,500, payable by assessment, and the assessed value of the real estate within the probable area of assessment is \$75,500.

The improvement cannot be recommended at this time because there is no money to pay for the section not within land grants.

SCHOOL BOARD, BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Whereas, The appropriation of Corporate Stock of The City of New York for the purpose of the erection of new school buildings which has been made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and approved by the Board of Aldermen, has been for some time under consideration by the Council of The City of New York and now awaits its favorable action; and

Whereas, Said appropriation carries an item of three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000) for the erection of new school buildings in the Borough of Queens; and

Whereas, The statement has been made to the representatives of the press and on the floor of the Council that the appropriation for new school buildings in the Borough of Queens is entirely unnecessary and that the school accommodations are now far in excess of the requirements; and

Whereas, Such statements are evidently based upon misinformation and are not in accord with the facts; therefore be it

Resolved, That the School Board of the Borough of Queens, deeply impressed with the necessity of immediate action leading to the provision of additional school accommodations in this borough, and cognizant of the crowded condition of the schools in many portions of the borough, respectfully requests the attention of the members of the Council to the facts related in the accompanying affidavit, and petition that body to take affirmative action upon the proposition to appropriate funds for the erection of new school buildings.

STATEMENT.

The Borough of Queens covers an area of seventy-nine thousand (79,000) acres. Children residing in the borough, if they are to enjoy school facilities at all, must attend in buildings within a radius of a few miles from their residences. In the First Ward of the borough, formerly Long Island City, and in the greater part of the Second Ward of the borough, formerly the Town of Newtown, the schools are greatly overcrowded. Several thousand children are attending but half a day and hundreds who have applied for admission have been excluded because there is no more room. There are also hundreds who are not in school who have never applied for admission.

In the territory in which are now located Schools 68, Evergreen; 71, East Williamsburg; 74, Metropolitan, and 75, Metropolitan, there were employed eight years ago but six teachers; to-day there are employed in this territory over forty (40). Every class-room is crowded, and from this group of schools there were turned away in the month of April five hundred and fifty (550) children. The ratio of growth will be greater during the next few years than it has been during the past five. A new building was opened in September, 1899, viz., 75, and inside of a month its eight rooms were filled.

In Long Island City, now the First Ward of the Borough of Queens, there are over one hundred (100) classes on half time and between two thousand (2,000) and three thousand (3,000) children who cannot be accommodated in the public schools at all.

In the Town of Jamaica, now the Fourth Ward of the Borough of Queens, sites which have been designated cannot be used nor buildings erected because of the delay in the appropriation of funds for the year 1900.

In the Third Ward of the Borough of Queens, formerly the Town of Flushing, were it not for the renting of buildings, equally serious conditions would prevail. There are now occupied in the borough thirteen (13) rented buildings, the rental of which amounts to about twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000).

In conclusion, it should be noted that of the total number of children on the register in the month of April about twenty-four thousand (24,000), three thousand six hundred and ninety-nine (3,699) were on half time, a percentage of half-day instruction which is greater than that of any other borough in the city.

DEAR SIR—In reply to your letter of recent date asking for a change of grade of Station place at Williamsbridge yard of the New York and Harlem Railroad, and inclosing a blue print of East Two Hundred and Tenth street, from Webster avenue to the Bronx river, in the Borough of The Bronx, I have to report as follows:

The grades, as established on the final maps and profiles of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth wards of East Two Hundred and Tenth street, from Webster avenue to Station place, do not allow the complete use of the railroad yard between the two (2) avenues. A road bridge over the main tracks of the New York and Harlem Railroad only is provided for, and from there to Station place the height between the tracks and the future viaduct is insufficient to allow the cars to pass under the same.

In order to overcome this defect, and not make the adjoining streets too expensive on account of excessive filling, a sketch was prepared in the Topographical Bureau reducing the width of East Two Hundred and Tenth street, between Webster avenue and Station place, from 60 to 30 feet, with the intention to provide only a foot bridge, and connect the same by steps at Station place with the street, the grades of Station place to be lowered from the filled grades and to conform more closely to the surface of the ground.

Should the railroad company and the adjoining property-owners agree upon this project, a petition to the Board of Public Improvements will have to be presented by them. I transmit herewith a sketch showing the proposed amendment to the present lay-out of East Two Hundred and Tenth street and Station place.

DEAR SIR—Pursuant to the request made by telephone in your behalf the other day, I beg to report that the work of improving Hudson Park can be done on the request of the Department by favorable action upon a resolution authorizing a bond issue by the Board of Estimate and Aldermen and Council. It requires no action by the Board of Public Improvements.

Under the provisions of the Charter, the Park Department is not represented on the Board of Public Improvements, nor has that Board jurisdiction over its work.

Last year an estimate was made out by our Engineer of the cost of the necessary work to put Hudson Park in proper shape. The estimate includes the asphalted of all the walks in the park, the building of proper basins in place of those now in use (sandpikes, with small square heads), the furnishing and setting of about 5,000 feet of bluestone edging, the laying of about 400 extra feet of drain-pipe, increasing the depth of mould, which at present is about 4 inches, to 1 foot, and resodding the lawns.

It is found that the sum of \$15,000 will be required for this work, and the Park Department will be glad to have your assistance in obtaining favorable action from the Board of Estimate and the City's legislative bodies upon this question.
