DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1908.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York,  
Foot of East Twenty-sixth Street,  
November 30, 1908.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

Sir—Herewith I have the honor to transmit pursuant to the provisions of section 1544, chapter 466, Laws of 1901, the report of the Department of Public Charities of The City of New York for the quarter ending June 30, 1908, together with the reports of the heads of the institutions under the jurisdiction of the Department for the corresponding period.

CENSUS.

In all the hospitals, schools for the feeble-minded, asylums, homes for the aged and infirm, and other institutions of the Department, the daily average census of patients and inmates for the quarter has been 8,656 as compared with 7,871, the daily average for the corresponding period of the preceding year and 566 less than the preceding quarter. The cause of this large decrease shown over the first quarter is the period of the year and the fact that the winter weather, especially during this first quarter, was very severe, the monthly census for the first three months of 1908 being as follows: January, 9,111; February, 9,328; March, 9,225.

The quarterly census of patients and inmates during the first and second quarters of the year shows as follows:

ADMINISTRATIVE IMPROVEMENTS GENERALLY.

On June 15, General Order No. 109 was issued re employment and compensation of mechanics, a much needed step in the right direction toward the improvement of the service of the Department, calling for the employment of mechanics at prevailing rates of wages in the place of Hospital Helpers receiving small salaries and performing work of a skilled nature.

On June 26, Special Order No. 171 re Course of Training at the Cumberland Street Hospital Training School for Nurses was issued reducing the course of training from three to two years following a two-months' probation term to take effect October 1, 1908. A post graduate course of one year for which a suitable certificate will be given may be taken by the graduates of this school when required by the Department.

NEW BUILDINGS AND PERMANENT IMPROVEMENTS.

Day Room for Male Inmates, City Home District.

Under date of May 12, proposals were opened—No. 1. "For providing all labor and materials required for the tearing down and removal, excavation and masonry, steel and iron, roofing and metal work, carpentry, glazing, painting, hardware and all other work (except electric heating and plumbing work, gas and electric fixtures and fitting up), for the erection and entire completion of a day room for male inmates in connection with the Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwells Island, The City of New York." No. 2. "For providing all labor and materials for the electric conduit, electric wiring and switchboard work, gas piping and all other work (except tearing down and removal, excavation and masonry, steel and iron, roofing and metal work, carpentry, gas and electric fixtures and fitting up) for the erection and entire completion of a day room for male inmates in connection with the Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwells Island, The City of New York." No. 3. "For providing all labor and materials required for the gas and electric fixtures and fitting up, and all other work (except tearing down and removal, excavation and masonry, steel and iron, roofing and metal work, carpentry and electric, heating and plumbing work), for the erection and entire completion of a day room for male inmates, in connection with the Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwells Island, The City of New York." Thirteen proposals were received, the lowest bidder under each title being:

- No. 1. Daniel J. Ryan, No. 273 Third avenue, Brooklyn..... \$23,700 00
- No. 2. George J. Wallace, No. 206 East Fifty-seventh street, New York City..... 5,653 00
- No. 3. Kelly & Kelley (Inc.), No. 45 East Forty-second street, New York City..... 370 00

—each of whom was awarded the contract on the respective titles on which they were the lowest bidder as quoted on May 13.

Hospital Pavilion, City Home District.

Under date of June 18, proposals were opened "For providing all labor and materials necessary or required for the excavation, masonry, roofing and metal work, carpentry, electric work, heating work, plumbing work and all other work (except certain kitchen, sterilizing and lighting fixtures and refrigerators) as set forth in the drawings and specifications for the construction and entire completion of a hospital pavilion in connection with the Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwells Island, The City of New York." Five proposals were received, the lowest being that of the Thomas B. Leahy Building Company, No. 1 East Forty-second street, New York City, amount \$44,323. No award was made during the quarter.

Staff House and the Extension of Two Tuberculosis Infirmaries, Metropolitan Hospital District.

Under date of May 28, proposals were opened "For providing all labor and materials necessary or required for the excavation, masonry, steel and iron work, carpentry, electric work, heating and ventilating work, plumbing work and all other work (except certain kitchen, sterilizing and lighting fixtures, refrigerators and vacuum sweeping machinery) as set forth in the drawings and specifications for the construction and entire completion of a staff house and the extension of two tuberculosis infirmaries for the Metropolitan Hospital District, Blackwells Island, Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York." Seven proposals were received but all were rejected and readvertised to be opened on June 15, on which date eight proposals were received, the lowest for the staff house being that of Daniel J. Ryan, No. 723 Third avenue, Brooklyn, amount \$61,850, and for the extension of two tuberculosis infirmaries, the lowest that of F. T. Nesbit & Co., No. 116 Nassau street, New York City, amount \$150,492, to which concerns contracts for the respective jobs were awarded under date of June 17.

New Male Dormitory, City Farm Colony, Staten Island.

Under date of June 11, proposals were opened "For furnishing all the labor and materials required for the erection and entire completion of a new male dormitory at the New York City Farm Colony, Borough of Richmond." Eleven proposals were received, the lowest being Samuel Weiss, No. 1826 Washington avenue, New York City, amount \$23,538, to whom the contract was awarded on June 12.

New Pathological Building, Kings County Hospital.

Under date of June 1, proposals were opened "For providing all labor and materials required for the erection and entire completion (with the exception of fitting up) of a new pathological building at the Kings County Hospital, Borough of Brooklyn. Six proposals were received, the lowest being that of Daniel J. Ryan, No. 723 Third avenue, Brooklyn, amount \$26,285, to whom the contract was awarded on June 2.

PROGRESS ON BUILDINGS BEING CONSTRUCTED ON BLACKWELLS ISLAND.

(CITY HOSPITAL DISTRICT.)

Superintendent's Building.

Trim about completed in entire building. All interior doors and rear exterior door hung and hardware set. First coat of paint applied to all trim, doors and front porch. Composite wainscoting laid in kitchen, pantry and toilets. Entire building plastered. Finished floor to be laid when interior is painted, after which plumbing fixtures and radiators will be connected up.

Staff Building.

Granolithic floor and base in cellar set and sleepers and concrete fill laid on floors of all halls and rooms in attic and third story. Plaster work completed except on soffits of stairs to second story. Work begun on composite wainscoting in kitchen, pantry and toilets on all floors. Trim set on second, third and attic floors and first coat of paint applied. Front porch roof and floor laid and columns and railings in course of erection. Roof tinned and painted.

Service Building.

Terra cotta partitions and linings complete with exception of two partitions on first floor and small sections of wall on second floor and third floor. Carpenters have set sash on first story and sleepers on roof. All floors, slabs, the roof slabs and fill and the bridge concreted. Felt and tin being laid on main roof. First coat of plaster being laid on second floor, walls and ceilings and first coat also applied in cellar. Soil, drain and supply lines and traps laid and being tested. Steam risers and returns, gas pipes and electric conduits nearly completed throughout building. Brine tank built and refrigerating elevator and dumb-waiter machines set. Elevator and dumb-waiter shaft and headwork near completion.

(METROPOLITAN HOSPITAL DISTRICT.)

Alterations and Extensions of Present Nurses' Home and Construction of New Nurses' Home.

Roofing entirely completed and first coat of paint being applied. Larger dormers have had galvanized iron sheathing applied and painted. Sleepers laid throughout building and concrete filling completed. Floor arches completed entirely and hoisting engine removed from building. Porch roof and trimming being built up. Entire building has had brown coat of plaster applied on all except metal partitions. All toilet and other rooms where terrazzo flooring occurs have been damp-proofed and ready for material. Two coats of paint have been applied to all exterior woodwork and metal work. Metal lathing completed throughout, electric conduits installed, but no wiring yet pulled. All rough plumbing completed ready for fixtures. Elevator machinery set in east shaft and work ready for car. West one not set but guides, sheaves, etc., in place. All vacuum cleaning system piping installed and ready for fixtures. All gas piping completed and ready for fixtures. Steam piping completed.

(CITY HOME DISTRICT.)

Operating Pavilion.

Roughing plumbing work, water piping, gas piping, and electric conduit work approximately completed and steam piping half hung. All the floor is damp-proofed and concrete base laid ready for finished flooring. Tin roof completed on the main building with exception of small portion on north side and this work has been started on the connecting corridors which are all framed and sheathed. Approximately half of hanging ceiling work is completed and the terra cotta partitions and furring are started.

Male Reception Pavilion.

All reinforced concrete work completed and tin roof all laid. All terra cotta furring and partitions built on second-floor. Plumbing roughing completed and half of the water supply piping erected, and gas piping and electrical conduit work three-quarters completed. First story is damp-proofed and concrete base laid ready for finished floor. Plastering started.

Female Reception Pavilion.

Reinforced concrete roof and second floor laid. Half of roof sleepers in place. Half of the plumbing roughing and electric conduit work completed. Tin roofing material, terra cotta work and gas piping at building ready for use.

NEW CONEY ISLAND HOSPITAL.

Main Building.

All walls completed up to level of water table. First tier of beams completed. Fire proofing progressing. Pipes laid for electric wiring on entire front of building. All window frames, limestone sills, arches and lintels set. Brick work to go on as soon as fire proofing building is completed.

Nurses' Building.

All walls completed up to water table except at side entrance which is held up for moulded brick. Limestone sills and basement window frames set. First tier of beams completed and steel lintels over each window bricked in. Fireproofing erecting forms on beams. Underground sewer system completed.

Help's Building.

All walls completed to top of basement window frames. Limestone sills and basement window frames set. First tier of beams about completed. Underground sewer system completed.

Stable Building.

All walls completed up to sill course. Bluestone water table set, also limestone sill course. Bumpers at both entrances set in position.

Morgue Building.

All walls completed up to water table. Bluestone water table completed.

Power House.

All outside walls excepting rear wall which butts against base of chimney carried about 4 feet above concrete footings. All boiler walls built up to within 8 inches of finished floor. Concrete base of chimney completed on floor and on side walls 3 feet above floor. Concrete 5 inches with expanded metal reinforcement and 1 inch of finish has been put on floor over water proofing.

ALTERATIONS, ADDITIONS AND REPAIRS.

Steamboat Service.

Under date of April 16, proposals were opened, No. 1 "For furnishing all the labor and material necessary to overhaul, drydock and paint the steamer 'Thomas M. Mulry,'" and No. 2 "For furnishing all the labor and material necessary to overhaul, drydock and paint the steamer 'Fidelity.'" Ten proposals were received, the lowest being that of James Shewan & Sons, foot East Houston street, New York City; amounts, respectively, \$1,349 and \$733; to whom the contracts were awarded on April 17.

Under date of May 26 the proposals were opened "For furnishing all the labor and materials required for repairing and painting the roof leaders, gutters and cornice of pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan." Seventeen proposals were received and all were rejected. It was readvertised on June 16. Six proposals were opened, the lowest being that of Jacob Levy, No. 1080 Lexington avenue, New York City; amount, \$771; to whom the contract was awarded on June 17.

CITY HOSPITAL DISTRICT.

Under date of April 29, proposals were opened "For furnishing all the labor and material required for general repairs to the New York City Training School for Nurses, Blackwells Island, The City of New York." Twelve proposals were opened, the lowest being that of Samuel Weiss, No. 1892 Washington avenue, New York City; amount, \$3,340; to whom the contract was awarded on April 30.

BROOKLYN INSTITUTIONS.

Under date of May 11, proposals were opened "For furnishing all the labor and materials required for laying new flooring and base throughout Cumberland Street Hospital, Borough of Brooklyn, The City of New York." Eleven proposals were received, the lowest being that of the Inter-City Contracting Company, No. 309 Broadway, New York City; amount, \$7,145; to whom the contract was awarded on May 11.

EMPLOYEES (GENERAL CHANGES).

During this quarter 2,262 changes occurred among a daily average census of 2,170 employees. The salaries of the positions among which the greater part of these changes occurred range from \$60 to \$240 per annum.

The following changes of importance among the employees of the Department took place during the quarter.

On May 22, per Special Order No. 145, promotion of Henry Jetter, Superintendent, New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island, from \$1,200 to \$1,500 per annum, action to date May 1, 1908.

On June 9, per Special Order No. 149, promotion of Henry A. Ball, Secretary to the Second Deputy Commissioner, Borough of Brooklyn, from \$1,950 to \$2,100 per annum, action to date June 1, 1908, as per resolution of the Board of Aldermen, adopted April 7, 1908.

A step in the right direction toward the raising of the standard of the employees of the Department was the elimination of cheap hospital help, who were performing labor calling for skill, by the appointment from lists certified by the Civil Service Commission of carpenters at \$5 per diem, plumbers at \$5 per diem, steam and gas fitters (pipe fitters) at \$5 per diem and painters at \$4 per diem to fill these positions. The amount of money necessary to bring about this betterment of the service was granted the Department by the adoption of a resolution on March 24 by the Board of Aldermen and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment under date of June 26, 1908, request for same having been made in a letter sent by this Department to the Board of Aldermen under date of March 2, 1908, same appearing in full on pages 35 to 42 in the first quarterly report of the Department for 1908.

#### SUPPLIES.

On April 1 bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering uniforms and uniform goods." Three proposals were opened on which awards were made in part on each, bidding being more "line" than "class" bidding.

On April 15 bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering window screens, oil, kumyss, ice cream, fire apparatus, seed and miscellaneous supplies." Forty-four proposals were received and awards made in part and in full, it being "line" and not "class" bidding.

June 30 bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering one safe and three pianos." Four proposals were received, the lowest being that of The Hall Safe Co., No. 393 Broadway, New York City, to whom the award was made.

On June 30 bids were opened "For furnishing and delivering medical and surgical supplies." Twenty-six proposals were received and awards made in part and in full, it being "line" and not "class" bidding.

During the quarter the invoices received at the Departmental Storehouse, Blackwells Island, amounted to \$133,573.68 and the disbursements \$129,649.67.

On April 1 1,270 sacks of flour were on hand and 4,551 sacks were received during the quarter, making a total of 5,821 sacks, of which 4,150 were consumed and 212 paid to the institutions, leaving on hand, July 1, 1,459 sacks; 819,341 pounds of bread were made from these 4,150 sacks of flour.

The more important foodstuffs consumed during the quarter were 401,692 pounds of meats, such as beef, mutton, lamb, pork and veal; 32,042½ pounds of fowl, chickens and turkeys; 57,971½ pounds of fish; 24,325 clams; 12,180 oysters; 23,574 quarts of condensed milk; 343,310 quarts of fresh milk; 800 quarts of buttermilk; 959½ quarts of cream; 48,170 dozen eggs and 51,110 pounds of butter.

#### FIRE PROTECTION.

During the quarter inspections were made and fire drills held at the following institutions by the First Deputy Commissioner, Hon. Richard C. Baker, and Mr. F. A. Ross, fire expert in the employ of the Department:

June 12, 1908.

##### Metropolitan Hospital.

Had a fire drill at the Metropolitan Hospital. Gave the fire signal from first floor of male T. B., at 10.13. The whistle blew at 10.13½. At 10.14 three men appeared; at 10.14½ thirteen men appeared; at 10.15 there were twenty-three men; at 10.16 there were thirty-three men; at 10.17 there were sixty men. They were in charge of Superintendent Stewart and Deputy Superintendent O'Neil.

The hose line was out and water on at 10.15½.

The men had extinguishers, stretchers, fire hooks and axes.

The hose test was made from the boiler room attached to the engine there, which showed as follows:

200-foot length—At boiler, 100 pounds; at nozzle, 100 pounds to inch, showing a flow of 366 gallons of water per minute.

250-foot length—At boiler 100 pounds; at nozzle, 90 pounds to inch, showing a flow of 349 gallons of water per minute.

150-foot length—At boiler, 110 pounds; at nozzle, 100 pounds to inch.

150-foot length—At boiler, 110 pounds; at nozzle, 110 pounds to inch.

200-foot length—At boiler, 110 pounds; at nozzle, 100 pounds to inch.

In all, 1,450 feet of hose. All this hose was from the female and male T. B. and boiler house.

Found the hose in A1 condition, with no leaks.

New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, Randalls Island.

Had a fire drill at Randalls Island. The signal was given by whistle from the engine house at 9.31½. At 9.33, nine men appeared; at 9.33½, sixteen men appeared; at 9.34, twenty men appeared; at 9.35, twenty-four men appeared. The men were in charge of Steward Fleming.

At 9.33 quite a number of the children were out of the school buildings and other ward buildings, coming out in good order.

Made a test on the cotton hose as follows:

At red house—150-foot hose; at pump, 80 pounds; at nozzle, 50 pounds to inch; one length leaks.

At Storehouse and Reception Hospital—100-foot cotton hose; at pump, 100 pounds; at nozzle, 50 pounds to inch; one length leaks badly.

At Morgue—25-foot cotton hose; at pump, 100 pounds; at nozzle, 90 pounds; this length is useless.

Examined new hose for Infants' Hospital, with one-half-inch nozzle:

150 feet of same; at pump, 120 pounds; at nozzle, 90 pounds to inch.

150 feet of same; at pump, 120 pounds; at nozzle, 90 pounds to inch.

150 feet of same; at pump, 120 pounds; at nozzle, 110 pounds to inch.

100 feet of same; at pump, 140 pounds; at nozzle, 110 pounds to inch.

Making in all 900 feet of new hose which stood the above test and has not yet been passed upon by the Finance Department.

(b) The above hose was part of the late new rubber hose supplied to this hospital. In my opinion, the test is not a proper one, as a heavier steam pressure at the pump could not be had yesterday.

(c) I therefore called off any further examination, and have instructed Superintendent Conklin and Engineer McVey that I would make this test some day next week when sufficient steam pressure could be had.

100 feet of the old selected rubber hose, 100 pounds at the pump; 98 pounds at the nozzle.

100 feet of the same quality rubber; 60 pounds at the pump; 60 pounds at the nozzle.

(b) The test of this hose was made from the pump in the laundry building, the same as made on the other hose in this hospital last week.

(c) Mr. Ross, Superintendent Stewart, Deputy Superintendent O'Neil, Engineer Murray and myself supervised this examination.

New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm, Blackwells Island.

(a) Alarm sent from the main office building at 11.05. Whistle blew at 11.06. Four men responded at 11.07; six at 11.07.20; eight at 11.08.40; ten at 11.08.42; twelve at 11.08.55, and sixteen at 11.09. Men were in charge of the Superintendent and Deputy Superintendent.

(b) This must be an improvement on the former tests, as Inspector Ross stated the men responded much better than heretofore.

(c) There being no hose at this institution, no further test was made.

June 23, 1908.

##### City Hospital.

Made a hose test at City Hospital, beginning at 9 a. m. Test of linen hose was as follows:

50 feet of hose from male dormitory, and 180 feet of hose from erysipelas, showed 60 pounds at pump, and 45 pounds at nozzle. Three lengths burst in the test.

240 feet of hose from female dormitory showed 60 pounds at pump and 45 pounds at nozzle.

50 feet of hose from Reception Hospital, and 52 feet of hose from Nurses' Home, showed 60 pounds at pump, and 50 pounds at nozzle; one length burst.

208 feet of hose from Nurses' Home showed 70 pounds at pump and 40 pounds at nozzle.

208 feet of hose from Nurses' Home showed 60 pounds at pump, and 45 pounds at nozzle.

Test of new rubber hose was as follows:

Main building, main hall—250 feet showed 100 pounds at pump, and 85 pounds at nozzle.

Main kitchen—200 feet showed 105 pounds at pump, and 90 pounds at nozzle.

Second floor—250 feet showed 110 pounds at pump, and 90 pounds at nozzle.

Third floor—200 feet showed 105 pounds at pump, and 95 pounds at nozzle.

Fourth floor—200 feet showed 110 pounds at pump, and 90 pounds at nozzle.

250 feet of the old rubber hose on reel wagon had pin holes throughout the entire length.

The water pressure made at hydrant in front of the Nurses' Home at 10 a. m., had nozzle placed directly on hydrant. One pound pressure was all that could be had. A 50-foot length of rubber hose attached to pump showed the same pressure as the above.

In this case the pump would be almost useless in case of fire. A better pressure should be demanded from the City.

All the above tests were made directly from the pump in boiler room.

Ordered, That hereafter until otherwise provided, all persons employed as mechanics following the trades hereinafter named in the Department must be taken from the eligible lists of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, where such are available, and receive pay at the following rates without maintenance.

Engineers (stationary), \$4.50 per day; Fireman, \$3 per day; Oilers, \$3 per day; Electricians, \$4 per day; Plumbers, \$5 per day; Steam and Gas Fitters, \$5 per day; Carpenters, \$5 per day; Painters, \$4 per day.

Those now receiving maintenance in whole or in part shall be paid as heretofore, 50 cents less per diem, than the foregoing maximum rates, such arrangement, however, to terminate on June 30, after which date no employee of the classes named shall receive maintenance of any kind or nature whatsoever, but shall instead be paid the full maximum rate as hereinbefore set forth.

Ordered, That upon the appointment of such mechanics and their assignment to duty at the several institutions, the hospital helpers now doing mechanical work of the same or a like nature be at once removed from the employ of the Department and the payroll of the institutions to which they are at present assigned; and further

Ordered, That with the better class of help hereby provided to take the place of Hospital Helpers it will be expected that much of the repair and other minor work about the institutions will be done by the mechanics assigned thereto, rather than by contract or through propositions as heretofore. This will apply particularly to the painting of buildings, both inside and out, whereby through the purchase and use of standard materials better results should be obtained than is at present possible.

The uniforms of such Enginemen shall consist of a cap of blue cloth with visor, with badge of white metal having the initials D. P. C., K. C. H., stamped thereon. A coat of Slater & Son's 16-ounce flannel, cloth finish, to be cut single-breasted, buttoned to neck with five black bone buttons, standing collar, square corners, two buttons on each sleeve, two outside and two inside pockets.

Vest of same material, without collar, five buttons, four outside and one inside pocket.

Trousers same material, medium cut, two hip, two side and one watch pocket.

Each Engineman shall be on duty subject to call daily, and especially from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., except that he shall have every other Sunday off duty. He shall be responsible for the entire care and condition of his auto-ambulance, and shall not permit anyone to manipulate his car except by order of the General Medical Superintendent, or other officer designated to act for him.

Each auto-ambulance shall be cleaned daily, inside and out, in a satisfactory manner. All brass parts and trimmings shall be polished, all bearing parts of the machine shall be kept in a condition of cleanliness and be well lubricated.

The bedding, including blankets, sheets and pillow cases, shall be changed as frequently as necessary to insure cleanliness. When a patient is brought in suffering from any infectious or contagious disease, the bedding shall be removed, disinfected and laundered before using again.

The Engineman shall be held responsible for the safety of the auto-ambulance and the safe transfer of such patients as may be in it, and at no time shall so speed the car as not to have absolute control of it. He shall slow up the car at all street corners and railroad and street railway crossings. He shall, as far as possible, avoid the possibility of a collision with any other vehicle. In fact, the safety of the patients and auto-ambulance must be the first consideration of the Engineman. He shall not maintain a speed rate which shall cause discomfort to the patient. The Enginemen at all times are subject to call emergencies.

## General Needs.

Necessary appropriation to carry out the work of improving and raising the standard of the employees of the Department. Good, reliable help cannot be obtained and retained for the salary now offered. During this quarter 2,262 changes occurred, more changes than there are employees, which is sufficient proof that if the service is to be raised to a higher efficiency and reliability the appropriation to be asked for in our estimate to be submitted in July should be granted in full.

New quarters are much needed by this Department for the Central Office and Bureau of Dependent Adults, located on the pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street, as both these offices are out of the general route of traffic and therefore inconveniently situated for the many who seek aid of the Department.

## THE PRINCIPAL OFFICE OF THE DEPARTMENT.

During the quarter the following letters were sent out from this office in reply to various questions and subject matter in which the Department is more or less directly interested or connected:

"New York, April 10, 1908.

"Mr. EDWARD J. CUDAHY, No. 644 Lexington Avenue, New York City:

"My Dear Mr. Cudahy—Mr. Baker, First Deputy, has informed me of the desire of the Grand Jury, of which you have the honor to be foreman, for information on some of the points noted by the members on their visit to Blackwells Island yesterday.

"It is a great pleasure for me to learn from Mr. Baker that the Grand Jury was favorably impressed with the cleanliness and good order prevailing in the institutions, and also with the general plans for the building up of the island and making it eventually into a hospital park for the sick poor of the City requiring prolonged care in institutions. Blackwells Island is a valuable piece of property and should be properly laid out and made beautiful.

"With reference to the particular points noted by the Grand Jury, I beg leave to state as follows:

1. "Poor Class of Hospital Helpers—The reason for this is that we are obliged to pay very low wages to such help, the great majority of them getting less than \$15 a month.

"In order to keep about a thousand of such places filled during the past year required over eight thousand actions on the part of the Commissioner and much vexatious bother to the heads of institutions.

2. "Maternity Hospital, City Hospital—This old wooden ramshackle building is not only unsuited for its purpose owing to its age and condition, but is a dangerous fire risk to the surrounding buildings. It should be replaced by a new building.

3. "The fiscal authorities of the City, mindful of the recommendations of previous Grand Juries, have granted money to put up a new day pavilion for old men at the City Home. The plans and specifications for this pavilion are all ready and will shortly be advertised. This greatly needed improvement should be all ready by next winter.

4. "The overcrowding at the Tuberculosis Infirmary at the Metropolitan Hospital, which the Grand Jury noticed, is one of the greatest sources of perplexity to us at present; over 800 patients are cared for in buildings intended for less than 600.

"For humanity's sake we felt obliged to take in all the dependent patients that applied, and because of this fact we were compelled to use the corridors and alcoves as dormitories. Beyond this overcrowding, which was felt to be the least of the evils of the situation, the patients were well cared for in every way, fed, clothed, doctored and nursed.

"In order to meet the needs of the situation new buildings for 300 patients are urgently required, which are estimated to cost \$600,000.

"Hoping that this explanation will be found satisfactory, but that you will inform me if anything further is required, I am, with full appreciation of your courtesy,

"Hon. A. VANDERVEER, M. D., No. 28 Eagle Street, Albany, N. Y.:

"My Dear Mr. Vanderveer—In answer to your letter of the 18th inst., which is at hand this morning, making inquiry with relation to the training of Nurses in the institutions of this Department, permit me to say that in my opinion the two-year term, with a post-graduate course of a year to those best fitted for it, is preferable to the straight three-year term. This is best for the institutions, inasmuch as it secures a larger number of Pupil Nurses, graduates and sends out those to whom it does not wish to give the higher training, and retains those best fitted for such training. On the other hand and for much the same reasons, it is better for the Nurses. It allows them to get into the field of private nursing earlier, where there is much demand for the trained nurse without the higher cult and pay, does not wear them out as the three-year term does, and, further, does not require them to learn many things for which they will never have any use before they are able to earn a living at their occupation. Beyond this, it is my impression that a good many young women do not wear well in a hospital atmosphere when such residence is prolonged to three years, and that it is not to the interest of such women to continue their work in such institutions too long.

"The post-graduate course is also a financial benefit to the nurses, inasmuch as it is proposed to increase the pay during the third year from \$15, as at present, to \$25 a month. My view of it is that the post-graduate course should be largely for the training of nurses for special work, such as the charge of surgical wards or the administration of other departments of the hospital or training school.

"Inclosed is a copy of a letter on this subject which I sent to Miss A. S. Rose, editor of 'The Trained Nurse,' on March 14 last, which gives some additional reasons for the changes made in this Department with relation to the period of training for nurses.

"As you doubtless know, the length of the term is being much discussed here as in other cities of the State where there are training schools. Professor W. Gilman Thompson, of Cornell University Medical School, and Mr. George P. Ludlam, Superintendent of the New York Hospital, have both made useful contributions to this subject, which, however, I suppose you have seen.

"Hoping that this satisfactorily answers your inquiries, but that you will let me know should anything further be desired, I am,

"Dear Mr. Mann—The pressure of many other matters has prevented me from sooner sending you the promised information with relation to my plans for the cure of patients suffering from tuberculosis. Permit me now to say:

1. "That I desire to secure at present authority to use the \$180,000 already voted, but requiring the further authorization of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to construct the building for the care of 100 surgical patients. Also \$600,000 requested in my letter of April 10 last to care for 300 additional patients at the infirmary connected with the Metropolitan Hospital on Blackwells Island.

2. "That later in the year I shall ask for the additional \$1,500,000 to complete the Sea View Hospital, designed to care for 1,000 patients. This will take about three years to complete.

3. "That for further provision for this class of patients I would advise that the present Workhouse Building be renovated and used as soon as the inmates can be removed to Harts Island, as provided by the Charter. This would care for approximately 1,000 patients at a cost of \$500 per capita for repairs.

"This might be ready in the next five or six years.

"Dear Dr. Thompson—In answer to your valued inquiry of the 20th inst., I beg leave to submit the following information:

"Question 2. Number of hospital buildings on Blackwells Island (a) existing; (b) contemplated?

"Answer—Existing buildings are twenty-two in number, as follows:

"City Hospital—Main Building, Maternity Hospital, Erysipelas Pavilion, Solarium (Gerry Pavilion), Reception Building.  
 "City Home—Pavilion A and B (for male patients), Pavilion C and D (for male patients), Pavilion E and F (for female patients), Pavilion G and H (for female patients), Male Incurable Building, Female Incurable Building.  
 "Metropolitan Hospital—Main Hospital Building, Annex to Main Hospital (known as T and E), Male Tuberculosis Infirmary, Female Tuberculosis Infirmary, Solarium (for tuberculosis patients), Pavilion X and Y (for tuberculosis patients), Pavilion W (for male nervous patients), Pavilion U and I (for male and female erysipelas), Pavilion V (for children's Orthoepoedic), Pavilion for Lepers.

"Contemplated new buildings are seventeen in number, as follows:

"City Hospital—New Maternity Hospital Building.  
 "Metropolitan Hospital—Tuberculosis Infirmary, six new buildings; New General Hospital, consisting of eight buildings.  
 "City Home—New Pavilion for Neurological Service; Operating Pavilion.

"In this connection it is to be remembered that a number of the contemplated buildings are intended to be modern structures, taking the place of some of the antiquated and dilapidated buildings at present in use, and that service buildings will have to be constructed in connection with them, such as Nurses' homes, staff houses, power plants, laundries, and the like, making in all about forty new buildings; also that the central part of the Island is not yet laid out, although the planning of it will soon be under way.

"Question 3. Average number of patients treated by the Department—(a) total annual number; (b) number on Blackwells Island?

"Answer—Total annual number treated during 1906 was 33,040; number treated in hospitals on Blackwells Island was 16,125.

"Question 4. Number and site of proposed new ferries to Blackwells Island?

"Answer—Two new ferries are now proposed, in addition to the three already existing from foot of East Twenty-sixth street, East Fifty-second street (soon to be removed to a new dock at foot of East Fifty-third street) and East Seventieth street. These two proposed ferries are to run from the foot of East Twenty-sixth street, covering practically all Boroughs of the City, and from the foot of East Eighty-sixth street. Besides these, it is hoped ultimately to have connection with the Island by means of the bridge and the subway (Steinway tunnel).

"Question 5. Acreage of the Island?

"Answer—One hundred and twenty-four acres.

"Question 6. Probable date of removal of Island penal institutions?

"Answer—This depends largely upon the agitation of the subject. Under favorable conditions, probably between five and ten years.

"Accompanying this letter I send a copy of a photograph of a map of the Island, with a copy each of the proposed layouts of the City Hospital district and the Metropolitan Hospital district. I have also ordered a layout made of the central part of the Island by Mr. Almirall, in conference with you, which will join together the two districts above named. In my opinion, part of the central portion should be given to the City Hospital, covering where the Penitentiary is now situated, and part to the Metropolitan Hospital, covering the ground of the Workhouse. The other portion should, I think, be used in part for a neurological hospital and in part for an infirmary for chronic cases. The more able-bodied inmates I would remove to the Farm Colony at Staten Island.

"Randalls Island should, in my opinion, be made into a hospital park for sick children, the feeble-minded being removed to the new State Colony at Thiells, near Haverstraw, for which the Legislature has just appropriated the full amount asked for, over \$188,000.

"I am also arranging to have grading and planting plans made covering the City Hospital district and the Metropolitan Hospital district, in order that trees, shrubbery, plants and vines may be planted according to a definite system. In this I am having the co-operation of the National Plant Flower and Fruit Guild.

"It will give me much pleasure to have the members of the Committee of the Academy of Medicine visit the Island and see something of the work and of the plans proposed for enlarging and improving the facilities.

"Dear Sir—Will you please to hurry along as rapidly as possible the survey and layout of the Farm Colony? In my opinion, the Colony should be laid out in a manner to house eventually 2,500 people, with the necessary service buildings, shops and accessories, so so as to care for all the relatively able-bodied who can by labor contribute to their own support. The plan should be drawn so as to permit of extension from time to time from a capacity of five or six hundred to the maximum.

"The women will probably not number more than one-third of the total census at any time.

"I would prefer to have the buildings in two groups, as widely separated as possible, with a service building, including kitchen and dining room, for each group. In order to enable inmates to avoid the inclemency of the weather there should be covered passageways between the buildings.

"In my opinion, two-story buildings, with sleeping rooms on the second floor and day rooms and light workrooms on the first floor, are preferable for this class of dependents.

"The laundry should be a one-story building, and there should be one power house.

"I would like to get the preliminary sketches of the layout for this plant as soon as possible.

"2. Continue provision for the care of the relatively able-bodied poor at the Farm Colony, Richmond Borough, at the Municipal Lodging House, or elsewhere in the Department.

"3. Continue provision also for the feeble-minded pending their removal to appropriate State institutions.

"4. Establish separate courts for the hearing of abandonment cases dealt with by the Department.

"5. Make provision on a definite taxation basis for the maintenance of the Department (and also for that of the proposed 'Department of Public Hospitals'), which should help materially in keeping the institutions out of politics. (In Great Britain those who manage the institutions have the further duty of levying the taxes for their support.)

"6. Make provision on a definite basis also for the issue of Corporate Stock to these Departments to pay for needed improvements.

Patients from the City and Metropolitan hospitals, Home for the Aged and Infirm, and children from Randalls Island were taken on different days. Usually twice a week the band from Randalls Island accompanied the boat, thus giving the trip a genuine air of "an excursion." The trips were varied between Harts Island, Staten Island and up the North River, as conditions would permit. Nurses and Doctors were always in attendance, and all were supplied with lunch on board. They were, therefore, much enjoyed by all, for in this way even the old people at the Home for the Aged and Infirmary, who have been there for years, were enabled to see something of what is "doing" about New York City, even if they are wards of the City in the Poorhouse on Blackwells Island.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:

Gentlemen—In order more efficiently to meet the needs of this Department that are immediately urgent and pressing and to provide for the requirements of the early future in the way of new buildings and apparatus, and additions, alterations and extraordinary repairs to buildings and apparatus, it becomes my duty to request an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$4,553,830 to be expended for the uses and purposes and for the reasons hereinafter specifically set forth. In submitting this request it seems but proper for me to state that the expenditure of the large amount requested has become necessary not only by reason of the rapid growth of the City, with its constantly increasing volume of dependency, but because of the additional fact that for many years the needs of this branch of the City Government were apparently overlooked and neglected. For these reasons the time has come when the requirements of the situation can no longer be disregarded, but insistently demand attention. The present administration has granted more moneys for this purpose than ever before and has given considerate attention to the requests of the Department for the issue of Corporate Stock, but the further sums hereinafter specified are urgently required to place the equipment in a proper condition for effective work.

The last general request of the Department for the issue of Corporate Stock was dated April 2, 1907, and contained the following paragraphs which it is timely to repeat:

"In making this request I assume that it will continue to be the policy of the City to care for the more continued as well as the chronic and incurable class of public dependents in the island hospitals and related institutions of the Department of Public Charities where they are maintained at a minimum of expense. The land already belongs to the City, and it is proposed to erect buildings, which, while good and substantial and necessarily commodious, will be of the most simple and economical form of construction.

"So rapid is the increase in the growth of the population of the City and particularly in the number of new comers having small and at times uncertain incomes, that it is my profound conviction that much want and suffering are likely to ensue unless there is prompt and adequate extension of the facilities of the hospitals and other institutions of this Department. The advent of bad times, from which, for various reasons, we periodically suffer, will greatly add to the seriousness of the situation. As a matter of fact, so pressing is the need for most of the items specified in this request that the work of construction should long ago have been fully accomplished."

The experience of the past winter has made it too clearly evident that the facilities of the institutions of the Department were in important respects inadequate to meet the additional strain caused by the financial depression. The hospitals and homes were overcrowded and patients and inmates were obliged to sleep in large numbers in the halls, corridors and alcoves of their respective institutions, never intended for sleeping quarters, not only greatly to their discomfort, but in some cases, doubtless, to the risk of their health and lives. A more acute or a long continued financial depression would be productive of most serious results.

It must be obvious that in making substantial additions to hospitals, the capacity of the service buildings connected with them must likewise be increased, such, for example, as power plants, service buildings, laundries, employees' dormitories and the like. Otherwise the increased number of patients cannot be given the care they require.

#### The Metropolitan Hospital District, Blackwells Island.

**Tuberculosis Infirmary**—The greatest need at this institution continues to be a substantial increase in the facilities for the care of patients suffering from tuberculosis. The Infirmary buildings for this class of patients, with the adjacent tents and pavilions, have a normal capacity of less than six hundred patients. Notwithstanding this fact the census of these buildings has shown as many as 800 patients during the winter, the halls and alcoves being used to meet the urgent demands of the situation. As the other hospitals of the City receiving patients suffering from this disease were also overcrowded, some of them having long waiting lists, they were unable to relieve the Department from this condition of congestion at the Infirmary. Nor was the Department able to remove patients as promptly as desirable from the wards at Bellevue Hospital, as contemplated by the provisions of the Charter, or from the Kings County Hospital, thereby causing an undue congestion there also. As the Sea View Hospital, at Staten Island, the contract for the construction of which has in part been let, is to care for a different class of patients and will not be ready for some years, it is evident that further provision for the care of patients should be made at the Infirmary without further delay. In the request for the issue of Corporate Stock transmitted to your honorable body by this Department on April 2, 1907, application was made for the sum of \$600,000 to pay for the construction of new buildings, with accessories, to provide for the care of three hundred patients suffering from tuberculosis. This, it was confidently believed, would relieve the pressure for admission and probably enable patients to be taken from the tents where they cannot be properly cared for in winter. Further than this it was intended to mark the beginning of a series of modern buildings for the care of patients, thereby gradually superseding the present inadequate and unsuitable structures originally designed for other purposes. The sum of \$180,000 was subsequently allowed by your Board, with the approval of the Board of Aldermen, for the extension of the infirmary buildings, the approved plans and specifications for which are ready for letting as soon as permission is received to commence the work.

In view of the present conditions and the prospective demands of the more immediate future, application is respectfully renewed for the means necessary to pay for the construction of additional buildings, with accessories, to be located in accordance with plans already approved by the Municipal Art Commission, to care for 300 patients at a cost of \$600,000.

There should be additional accommodations provided at this hospital, through the extension of its general wards, in the near future, in accordance with the plans approved by the Municipal Art Commission, but in view of the urgency of the other needs no request for such accommodations will be made at present.

**New Ferry Launch**—A new ferry launch is needed to cover the projected ferry service from the Metropolitan Hospital to the foot of East Eighty-sixth street, thereby avoiding to a great extent the Work House associations of the present ferry service. The estimated cost of this boat is \$30,000.

The extension of the facilities of this hospital, such as have been provided, together with those in prospect, makes necessary a considerable increase in the size of some of the service buildings connected with the institution.

**Power Plant**—The power plant requires immediate enlargement in order to meet the demands upon it. It is proposed to extend the present building and to add to its equipment at an estimated cost of \$200,000.

**Laundry**—The present laundry is inadequate to meet in a satisfactory manner the present demands upon it and the prompt extension of its facilities is, therefore, urgently necessary. The estimated cost of this work is \$100,000.

**Kitchen—Service and Storage Building**—The present kitchen and service building is an old dilapidated structure, inadequate and otherwise unsuitable for the purpose of this large and growing hospital, as well as badly located. The building is lacking in proper storage and refrigerating capacity and is without employees' dining rooms and other desirable accessories of a modern service building. It is proposed to erect in a more suitable locality on the hospital grounds, a new service building with refrigerating plant, kitchen, dining-rooms and adequate storage capacity. Such a building should obviously be constructed with a view to the future needs of this great hospital, and its estimated cost, with accessories, is approximately \$300,000.

**Reception Building**—The Metropolitan Hospital has no adequate reception building. Such a building is greatly needed in order that proper provision may be made to receive, bathe and examine patients, to detain those thought to have contagious diseases, and to fumigate and store the personal effects of both male and female patients. Such a building must, of course, be constructed so as to provide for the complete separation

of the sexes while under care. The estimated cost of the proposed reception building is \$60,000.

**New Nurses' Home**—So rapid has been the growth of this Hospital, from a daily census of 811 patients in March, 1903, to a daily census of 1,370 patients in March, 1908, that the facilities of the New Nurses' Home, which is now nearing completion, will require extension by the addition of the proposed wings, as soon as it is ready to be occupied. Their estimated cost is approximately \$99,800.

**Dormitory for Male Employees**—In order to move the male employees from the old and unsanitary shacks where a large number of them are obliged to live at present, as well as to provide for future needs, it is proposed to erect an additional male dormitory intended to accommodate 100 employees. The estimated cost of this dormitory is \$100,000.

**Electric Lighting**—The several buildings of the Metropolitan Hospital are inadequately lighted with gas. Many of the rooms are without any artificial light whatever and hand lanterns have to be used at night. Plans have been prepared for wiring the buildings of the hospital, and for the installation of electric lighting fixtures. An appropriation is therefore requested for this purpose, the estimated cost of the work being \$62,000.

**Grounds and Walks**—The plan for the improvement of the Metropolitan Hospital District approved by the Municipal Art Commission, December 10, 1907, contemplates the making of new roads and walks, the planting of trees and shrubs, and the general improvement of the grounds of the district along definite lines. This is intended to be the beginning of a plan to make Blackwells Island a hospital park for the sick poor of the City, and the thousands of friends who annually visit them. In this connection it should be stated that the National Plant, Flower and Fruit Guild has promised its active co-operation with the Department toward this end. In order to commence this work and to proceed with it as far as seems practicable at present, will, it is estimated, cost \$10,000.

**Furniture and Fixtures**—The New Nurses' Home, which should soon be ready for occupancy, will require new furniture and fixtures throughout, inasmuch as the present furniture and fixtures will continue to be used in the old building upon its conversion to the uses and purposes of a female helpers' dormitory. The estimated cost of the furniture is \$25,000, and of the fixtures \$30,000, making in all \$55,000.

**Extraordinary Repairs, Additions and Alterations to the Male Tuberculosis Infirmary**—The plumbing in this building is old and requires renewal throughout, at an estimated cost of \$10,000.

**Elevators** are also needed in this division of the infirmary to carry the most feeble patients to the grounds of the hospital, where they may have the benefit of the fresh air and the sunlight, and back to their rooms. The estimated cost of this improvement is \$20,000.

It is desired to add balconies for the use of patients on the south side of the two principal buildings of the tuberculosis infirmaries, which should greatly add to their value. The estimated cost of this improvement is \$7,500.

Moneys are needed to move and put in repair pavilions for the temporary care of patients pending the installation of permanent improvements. This is estimated to be \$5,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements desired at the Metropolitan Hospital is \$1,359,300.

#### The City Hospital District, Blackwells Island.

**Maternity Hospital**—One of the greatest needs of this hospital at the present time is a new maternity hospital building to replace the present dilapidated old wooden structure, which is not only unsuited to its purposes, but is a dangerous fire risk to the adjacent buildings. It is estimated that the cost of a new building, with its accessories, having accommodation for at least fifty patients at a time, will be \$125,000.

**Wing to Female Helpers' Dormitory**—This dormitory is now taxed beyond its capacity, making it necessary to construct a wing for additional employees. Such an addition, designed to house 50 employees, will, it is estimated, cost \$50,000.

**Convalescent Patients' Dormitory**—Another urgent need of this hospital is a convalescent patient's dormitory, and means are desired for the construction of such a building, designed to accommodate 50 such patients, at an approximate cost of \$60,000.

**Laundry**—A new laundry building is a further need at this hospital, the present building being inadequate and unsuitable to meet the growing needs of the institution as well as of the Nurses' Home connected therewith. The estimated cost of the proposed new building with its additional equipment is \$83,000.

**Pathological Laboratory**—The generous endowment by Mrs. Russell Sage of the "Russell Sage Pathological Institute," in the sum of \$300,000, the income of which is to be used to meet the running expenses of the institute, has greatly stimulated and encouraged the work of pathological research carried on at the City Hospital and the City Home, particularly in the study of the diseases of old age. The present laboratory at the City Hospital, where this great work is carried on, is too small to permit of its proper extension. It is accordingly proposed to erect an additional wing or extension to this building, at an approximate cost of \$50,000.

**Passageway to Reception Building**—In order to protect patients carried from the boats to the reception building, from inclemency of the weather, the Department desires to erect a covered passageway that will effect this purpose, the estimated cost of which is \$6,000.

**Electric Lighting**—The buildings of this hospital are also poorly lighted with gas, and it is desired to substitute electricity for this purpose, in accordance with plans and specifications that have already been prepared. The estimated cost of this very desirable improvement is \$70,000.

**Grounds and Walks**—The plan for the improvement of the City Hospital District, also approved by the Municipal Art Commission, on November 12, 1907, likewise contemplates the improvement of the grounds of this institution along definite lines as an important part of the plan to make Blackwells Island into a hospital park. In order to commence this work and to proceed with it so far as seems practicable at this time will, it is estimated, cost \$5,000.

**Furniture and Fixtures for New Buildings**—Furniture and fixtures are required for the new buildings now nearing completion at this hospital. These consist of the new service building, the staff house and the Superintendent's residence. The estimated cost of the furniture and fixtures for these new buildings is as follows: service building furniture, \$5,000; fixtures, \$18,000; staff house, furniture, \$7,500; fixtures, \$7,000; Superintendent's residence, furniture, \$2,500; fixtures, \$3,000; the total cost being \$43,000.

**Extraordinary Repairs, Additions and Alterations to the Hospital**—The removal of the kitchens, the members of the Medical Staff and the family of the Superintendent from the main hospital building, which will be effected as soon as the new buildings, now nearing completion, are ready for use, will afford much additional space for the care of patients, but before such additional accommodations can be provided, many repairs, additions and alterations will be necessary. In order to make these in a suitable manner it is estimated that the sum required will approximate \$50,000.

**Repairs to Sea Wall**—Repairs to the sea wall on the east side of the island, in close proximity to the Erysielas Pavilion, are an urgent necessity in order to support the foundations of the building and to prevent it from slipping into the river, the approximate cost of such work being \$5,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements required at the City Hospital is \$547,000.

#### City Home, Manhattan Division, Blackwells Island.

**Staff House**—A Staff House should be provided at this home with its growing medical service, the quarters used at present being most unsuitable. The estimated cost of such a building, with accessories, is \$50,000.

**Out-patient Pavilion**—An out-patient pavilion for the care of walking patients is one of the most urgent needs of this home. The estimated cost of such a building, with accessories, is \$10,000.

**Inclosed Veranda for Blind Ward**—This is desired to enable the inmates of the ward to work at basket making and the like, their present quarters in the building itself being poorly ventilated and overcrowded. The estimated cost of the veranda desired is \$5,000.

**Hospital Pavilion**—The amount appropriated for this pavilion, \$40,000, is not sufficient for the purpose, and a further sum will be required. This is estimated to be \$30,000.

**Dormitory for Male Employees**—A dormitory to accommodate 150 male employees who are unsuitably housed at present is greatly needed. The estimated cost of such a building is approximately \$150,000.

**Dormitory for Female Employees**—A like building is for the same reason greatly needed for the female employees, numbering 150. The estimated cost of this building is approximately \$150,000.

**Electric Lighting**—The buildings of this home are at present inadequately lighted by gas. Plans have been prepared for wiring and the installation of electric lighting fixtures at an estimated cost of \$90,730.

**Furniture for New Buildings**—Furniture and fixtures are needed for the new buildings at this home, which are now under course of construction. The estimated cost of such furniture and fixtures is as follows: Operating pavilion, furniture, \$500; male reception building, furniture, \$500; female reception building, furniture, \$500. The total cost of the furniture of these three buildings is estimated to be \$1,500.

The total estimated cost of the improvements needed at the City Home, Manhattan, is \$487,230.

**General Storehouse, Blackwells Island.**

**Addition to Storehouse**—An addition to the present storehouse building is much needed in order that all goods not of a perishable nature may be kept in stock until distributed on monthly requisition. At present a considerable part of the annual supply of such goods, particularly dry goods, is sent directly to the institutions to be used by them without the supervision that seems desirable. The estimated cost of the desired addition which is intended to remedy this state of affairs is \$24,000.

**Stables**—The storehouse stables are located in an old dilapidated wooden building erected just north of the Metropolitan Hospital, where it has been ever since the Civil War. It is desired to demolish this building with others like it constituting a serious fire risk to the buildings of the hospital and to erect new stables in a locality more convenient to the storehouse. The estimated cost of the proposed new building is \$79,300.

**Shop Buildings**—The present shop buildings of the storehouse are adjacent and similar in construction to the stable building, and a new shop building is desired for the same reason. The estimated cost of such a building is \$87,500.

The total estimated cost of the improvements needed at the general storehouse, Blackwells Island, is \$191,800.

**Children's Hospitals and Schools, Randalls Island.**

**Industrial Building**—A new industrial building for the employment and industrial training of the children of this institution is greatly needed. The present building is inadequate for this purpose and has to be propped up in order to keep it from falling down and injuring the children. It is estimated that a suitable building for this purpose can be constructed at an approximate cost of \$50,000.

**Kitchen, Dining Room and Service Building**—A new kitchen, dining room and service building is one of the greatest needs of this institution. The present building is not only too small and inadequate but it is lacking in a dining room and other facilities for caring for the employees and inmates. The estimated cost of this new service building for this large institution is approximately \$150,000.

**Ice House**—A new ice house is also greatly needed at this hospital, the estimated cost of a suitable building being \$10,000.

**Green House**—A new green house is also needed, the estimated cost of such a structure being \$3,000.

**Electric Lighting**—Electric lighting has been installed in some of the buildings of this hospital and should be used in all of the other buildings as soon as possible. The estimated cost of the wiring and fixtures is \$35,000.

**Fire-escapes and Balconies**—Additional fire-escapes have been ordered by the Department of Buildings and should be put in place as soon as possible. New balconies are also required to replace those in an unsafe condition. The estimated cost of the new fire-escapes and balconies required at this institution is \$35,000.

**Extraordinary Repairs, Additions and Alterations**—Many repairs, additions and alterations are required at this institution, which is made up of thirty different structures, many of them old and in a condition requiring a great deal of attention. New roofs and metal gutters are required at the school for feeble-minded, the day school, laundry, dormitory 2, wards 11, 14 and 15, old pavilion F, old portions of pavilions A, B and C and the office building. The estimated cost of these necessary repairs is \$5,000.

New plumbing is required for wards 21 to 28, and additional plumbing fixtures for the school for the feeble-minded, day school, pavilions A, B and C and the north and south hospitals. The estimated cost of this work is \$15,000.

The cellars of wards 11 to 15, 21 to 28, dormitory 2, old pavilion F, the school for feeble-minded, nurses' and male orderlies' old dormitory buildings and three quarantine buildings require concreting in order that they may be put in a dry and sanitary condition. The estimated cost of this work is \$5,000.

The painting and striping of ten brick buildings is also very necessary inasmuch as it is a long time since they have been painted and they present a dilapidated appearance. The estimated cost of painting and striping these buildings is \$10,000.

Metal ceilings are required in many of the buildings in which the plaster is insecure. The estimated cost of such ceilings is \$15,000.

A new steam heating system is urgently required for the north hospital and for pavilions A, B and C, inasmuch as the present system will not heat these buildings properly in extreme cold weather. The estimated cost of such improvement is \$3,000.

**Grounds and Walks**—The grounds and walks of this institution are in such a condition as to call for much attention. The estimated cost of putting them in good condition, as far as practicable at present, and of planting trees and shrubs is \$10,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements needed at the children's hospitals and schools is \$346,000.

**The Municipal Lodging House, Manhattan.**

**Furniture and Fixtures**—Furniture and fixtures will be necessary to equip and open this lodging house. The estimated cost of the furniture is \$15,000 and of the fixtures \$35,000, making the estimated total amount \$50,000.

**The Dock at the Foot of East Twenty-sixth Street.**

This large covered dock is in urgent need of repairs which should be promptly made in order to avoid the still greater expenditure that will be caused by delay. The estimated cost of such repairs is \$6,000.

**Dock at the Foot of East Fifty-third Street.**

**Waiting Rooms**—As soon as the new dock for the Department at the foot of East Fifty-third street is ready for use, new waiting rooms will be necessary. The estimated cost of such rooms with accessories is \$2,500.

**Kings County Hospital, Flatbush, Brooklyn.**

While the public hospital system in Manhattan and The Bronx has been very greatly augmented and improved in recent years and further large improvements are projected, comparatively little has been done in the Borough of Brooklyn and nothing in the Boroughs of either Richmond or Queens.

The rapid growth of the Borough of Brooklyn, which will be still further augmented when the new bridges and additional rapid transit facilities are completed, makes the early extension of the public hospital facilities of the Borough of Brooklyn an imperative need which cannot be safely overlooked or neglected.

**Repairs to Annex Building**—The sum of \$75,000 for extraordinary repairs at this building granted in 1907 on the estimate of the Department was found to be insufficient when the bids were opened, the lowest bid being \$157,417. This is a most urgent piece of work inasmuch as it will provide accommodations for 250 additional patients at the Kings County Hospital at a minimum of cost per patient and greatly relieve the overcrowding there. The additional sum required is \$85,000.

**Extension of Psychopathic Ward**—The facilities of the psychopathic ward of this hospital is an urgent necessity for the reason that not only are they inadequate but they do not admit of the proper classification and separation of patients. The cost of such extension designed to provide for 25 additional patients is \$50,000.

**Extension to Staff House**—The present facilities of the staff house at this hospital, with the great and constantly growing demands upon it, are also inadequate. Their extension is desired by the construction of a new staff house at an estimated cost of \$60,000.

In the relatively near future a new children's hospital should be provided for Brooklyn, preferably on the Ocean parkway site of the Department close to Coney Island, but no request will be made for its construction at present.

**Maternity Hospital**—A new maternity hospital is much needed at this institution, the estimated cost being \$60,000.

**Bakery**—The facilities of the bakery at this hospital are insufficient to meet the heavy and constantly increasing demands upon them, and an addition to the present building is an urgent need. The estimated cost of such addition is \$20,000.

**Shop Building**—The present shop building is also too small for the work that is required at the hospital. A new building is required at an estimated cost of \$25,000.

**Grounds and Walks**—The grounds and walks of this hospital are greatly in need of repair and improvement. Trees and shrubs should be planted in order to make the valuable grounds more attractive to the sick and the public. It is estimated that very much can be done in this direction by the expenditure of \$10,000.

**Extraordinary Repairs, Additions and Alterations**—A number of extraordinary repairs, additions and alterations are required at this hospital. The most important of them, with their estimated cost, are the following: Repairs to electric lighting and power cable and conduit, estimated cost, \$2,500.

New flooring and side walls where required throughout the main building, at an estimated cost of \$5,000.

New and improved fire alarm system, \$3,000.

Iron fence around the grounds, \$25,000.

Repairs and improvements to roofs where required, \$6,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements most urgently required at the Kings County Hospital is \$351,500.

**City Home, Brooklyn Division.**

The facilities of this home were very greatly overcrowded during the entire winter, several hundred inmates were obliged to sleep on improvised beds placed in the corridors of the home, while many others were cared for on inclosed verandas of the institution, and in two of the wooden annex buildings recently released to the Department by the authorities of the Long Island State Hospital. To meet the needs of this situation new facilities beyond those already provided at the Farm Colony in Richmond are urgently needed.

**Extension to Male Branch of the Home**—It is recommended that an extension to the male branch of the home, where the crowding is greatest, be erected to accommodate 200 additional inmates. If the able-bodied men are later removed to the Farm Colony this will provide additional hospital accommodations for the feeble or infirm, or the neurological patients in Kings County. Estimated cost of such extension is \$185,000.

**Kitchen Dining Room and Service Building**—A new kitchen, dining room and service building is one of the most important needs of this home, the present facilities being entirely inadequate to meet the rapidly increasing needs of the institution. The estimated cost of such building is \$150,000.

**Plumbing in Male Branch of Home**—Additional toilet facilities are needed in the male branch of this institution, at an estimated cost of \$10,000.

**Plumbing in Female Branch of the Home**—New plumbing is also greatly needed in the female branch of the home, the estimated cost of the same being \$7,000.

The total estimated cost of the improvements considered necessary at the City Home, Brooklyn Division, at this time is \$352,000.

**Cumberland Street Hospital, Brooklyn.**

**Additional Ground**—Additional ground is greatly needed at this hospital upon which to construct a new Nurses' Home and other required buildings. The estimated cost of sufficient additional ground for these purposes is \$100,000.

**New Nurses' Home**—A new Nurses' Home is needed at this hospital, thereby releasing the present quarters for the use of patients. The cost of such a home, to accommodate 75 Nurses with their Helpers, is estimated to be \$150,000.

The total cost of the improvements desired at the Cumberland Street Hospital of the Department is \$250,000.

**Bradford Street Hospital.**

**New Buildings**—Means are required to construct the proposed Bradford Street Hospital, for which a site has been selected by the City. The estimated cost of this hospital, with its accessories to care for 100 patients to commence, is \$350,000.

**Proposed Greenpoint Hospital.**

**New Ground and Buildings**—The hospital facilities of Greenpoint are most unsatisfactory. This part of the City has a daily estimated population of 80,000 people, and contains many shops and factories in which serious industrial accidents frequently occur. To and from parts of this territory a drive of several miles is necessary before the ambulance can deliver injured patients to the nearest hospital. Because of these conditions the citizens of that part of the City are insistent that the Department provide better facilities for the sick and injured of that locality. Believing the request to be a reasonable one, it is accordingly recommended that an emergency hospital be established by the Department in that section of the City known as Greenpoint. It is estimated that suitable grounds and buildings, including a stable for the ambulance, can be had for \$50,000.

**New York City Farm Colony, Richmond.**

**Additional Dormitories**—To relieve the overcrowding at the City Home, Manhattan, and the City Home, Brooklyn, additional accommodations besides those already provided should be made at the Farm Colony, where the more able-bodied inmates can be required to work, thereby affording a labor test. Two dormitories, to hold 100 each, should be provided, at an estimated cost, with accessories, of \$150,000.

**Ice House**—A new ice house is required at this institution. Its construction at a moderate cost will enable the Colony to store its own ice and will prove a saving investment. The cost of an ice house with sufficient storage capacity is estimated to be \$6,000.

**Vegetable Cellar**—The construction of a vegetable house and cellar at the Farm Colony is required to store the vegetables raised on the Farm and should also prove to be a source of saving to the Department by enabling it to keep a larger supply of the products of the Farm for winter use. The estimated cost of this building is \$9,800.

**Fire House**—As the Colony is at a distance of several miles from a fire company and has a number of nonfireproof buildings with aged and infirm inmates, it is necessary for it to maintain its own fire-fighting apparatus. A building is desired in which such apparatus may be safely stored and kept from freezing during the cold weather. The estimated cost of a suitable building for this purpose is \$7,500.

**Fire Escapes**—Fire escapes are needed on the male dormitory in order to insure the safety of the inmates. Their estimated cost is \$1,500.

**Morgue**—The unclaimed dead of Richmond County, as well as deceased inmates of the Colony, are cared for at the institution pending their final disposition. The building at present used for morgue purposes is a dilapidated old shack entirely unsuited for such work. A new building is desired at an estimated cost of \$31,200.

**Electric Pump**—Much of the water used at this Colony has to be pumped from the reservoir to a distant point, but the force and volume are entirely insufficient for fire-fighting purposes. For this reason it is desired to install an electric pump of sufficient size and capacity to meet this urgent need.

The cost of installing such a pump is estimated to be \$4,500.

The total estimated cost of the improvements at present needed at the Farm Colony is \$210,500.

Recapitulating the requests for additional moneys for new buildings and apparatus and additions, alterations and extraordinary repairs to buildings and apparatus, as hereinbefore set forth in detail, it will be seen that the amount considered necessary and for which the issue of Corporate Stock is desired for the several institutions and divisions of the Department are as follows:

While fully aware that the total amount requested will seem to be a very large sum to make application for at this time of commercial depression, it should be remembered that it is always at such a time that the demands upon the Department of Public Charities are more serious and urgent. These demands require to be fully and promptly met if the sufferings of the sick and infirm poor of the City are to be satisfactorily relieved. They can only be met when the facilities and machinery of the Department are in effective condition, and they cannot be kept in such a condition unless the necessary means are forthcoming to so maintain them. It is my confident belief that all the moneys herein requested, as well as those previously authorized in answer to former requests, will be required to meet the demands of the situation in a prompt, effective and satisfactory manner.

At this time, when the plan for making Blackwells Island into a hospital park for the sick poor of the City and their friends is under consideration, and the question of easier access to the island is an important consideration, it seems to me expedient to call attention to the possibility of the extension of Blackwells Island in its southerly extremity to and including the island occupied by the New York and Long Island Railroad Company.

The present pierhead and bulkhead line as established by the War Department provides for the extension of the island to a considerable distance, and I feel convinced that no opposition would be encountered in having the lines as established extended in accordance with my suggestion.

My reason for the suggestions are that some eight acres of ground would be added to the City hospital district in a most needed direction, and that direct subway transportation could be established by means of elevators to and a station in the tunnel with the several Boroughs.

The expense to the City would probably be limited to the cost of sea wall, to the building of the station and the installation of the elevators in the shafts of the tunnel now existing. This expense would, I judge, be compensated for in considerable part by selling the privilege to dump excavated materials resulting from the proposed subways or other constructions in the City, such as are now generally dumped at sea.

This is a matter of vital importance to the usefulness and accessibility of Blackwells Island, and I recommend the subject for most careful consideration.

Gentlemen—As supplemental to my request of April 10, 1908, for an issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$4,553,830, to be expended for new buildings and apparatus and extraordinary repairs to buildings and apparatus, I would respectfully request that the sum of \$30,000 be added to my former request, this amount to be expended for the uses and purposes and for the reasons hereinafter specifically set forth:

The Metropolitan Hospital District, Blackwells Island.

To build a conduit and extension of the steam, return, hot and cold water lines from the Metropolitan Hospital to the Nurses' Home, now in course of construction. The distance necessary to extend said lines will be approximately 1,500 feet, and the estimated cost of same is \$15,000, making the total estimated cost of the improvements desired at the Metropolitan Hospital \$1,374,300, instead of \$1,359,300, as requested April 10, 1908.

The City Hospital District, Blackwells Island.

Steam Plant—To increase the steam plant at this institution by the addition of a 250-horsepower boiler, alterations to the piping in the basement of the old building and improving the laundry building by moving the unused boilers in the old boiler house. The entire cost of this work is estimated at \$15,000, making the total estimated cost of the improvements at the City Hospital \$562,000, instead of \$547,000, as requested, thus making the total amount requested for Corporate Stock as \$4,583,830.

"I would therefore respectfully request that you kindly cause a rack of piles to be placed at the outboard end of the north side of this dock, similar to the rack which the steamer 'Brennan' at present lies against, as it will be necessary for the 'Brennan' to lie outside of the gangway instead of as at present.

"I would also respectfully request the privilege of landing our boat at the dock at the foot of East Eighty-sixth street, Manhattan, and South Fifth street, Brooklyn. Also permission to erect on each of these docks a small waiting room for the convenience of patients and passengers.

"Trusting that these requests will be granted, I am,

To which, under date of June 20, we received the following reply:

"Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities, Foot of East Twenty-sixth Street, East River, Manhattan:

"Sir—Referring to your request of the 23d ultimo, I beg to advise that the Commissioner has issued orders to the Chief Engineer of this Department to move the ferry rack toward the outer end of the pier at the foot of East Twenty-sixth street, East River, in order to permit the use of the inner end, north side, for your new steamer 'Lowell.'

"Your application for landing at the foot of East Eighty-sixth street, East River, has been denied, as this pier is only 100 feet long, and should barges or lighters over this length be moored thereat on either side it would be impossible to make a landing at the outer end, and to erect a structure whereon would entirely destroy the facilities for general wharfage. Moreover, the Eighty-sixth street pier is the only pier between Seventy-seventh and Ninety-first streets on the East River where cargo can be discharged.

"With reference to the South Fifth street pier, Borough of Brooklyn, in view of the fact that L. Boyer's Sons Company occupy the north side of this pier under a permit, and have an office on the south side of the outer end of the pier which takes up a good portion of the pier, together with the fact that the demand for berths under ordinary conditions are quite frequent, the Commissioner deemed it advisable to deny this application also.

"The Commissioner, however, requests me to state that he thinks he would be able to grant you landing privileges at the pier foot of East Ninety-first street, East River, and at the pier foot of Noble street, Borough of Brooklyn. If you care to consider the matter of using these two piers, he will be glad to hear from you.

#### THE STEAMBOAT SERVICE.

During the quarter 313,554 passengers were carried on the five boats of the Department.

The number of dead transported on the steamer "Fidelity" to Harts Island for interment was 1,601, and the disinterments 11.

#### CHANGES.

During the quarter 66 changes occurred among a daily average of 75 employees of this branch of the Department.

#### IMPROVEMENTS.

The addition to the service of the new steamer "Lowell," which was launched from the shipyard of the Frederick A. Verdon Company, at West New Brighton, Staten Island, on May 25, and which is expected to go into commission the latter part of next August.

#### THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS, MANHATTAN.

During the quarter 14,942 cases were passed upon for indoor relief. Transportation was afforded to 128 sick and destitute persons to reach their homes; 48 sick of the same class were committed to the State Almshouse on Blackwells Island for care and action by the State Board of Charities. The homeless were lodged and fed, epileptics sent to Craig Colony, feeble-minded to the State Custodial Asylum, the Syracuse State institutions and Rome State Custodial Asylum, and tuberculosis cases to Raybrook.

Three hundred and thirty-eight requests were made for examination as to the sanity of such cases, 32 deaf mutes were admitted to institutions for same, and 529 tickets for meals given. This Bureau has taken 360 complaints of abandonment, of which 238 were granted requisitions and 122 treated at this office. There were sent to the Court of Special Sessions 157 bastardy cases and 72 settled without being sent to court. 149 non-support applications of aged people received.

Eighteen thousand one hundred and ninety-two passes were issued during the quarter to relatives and friends to visit patients and inmates of the institutions of the Department.

The receipts and disbursements during the quarter in the Alimony Department, one of the chief divisions of this Bureau, were as follows: Receipts, \$36,346.85; disbursements, \$36,397.15. As compared with the receipts and disbursements of the corresponding quarter for the preceding year there shows a decrease in receipts of \$4,313.89 and disbursements of \$5,761.43. At the end of the quarter the balance on hand in this fund amounted to \$17,168.81.

#### CHANGES.

During the quarter 46 changes took place among a daily average of 65 employees, including therein the employees of both the Manhattan morgues.

#### NEEDS.

Additional floor space. New steampipes necessary throughout office, present plant being old and wornout. One Clerk, one Office Boy and one Stenographer and Typewriter.

#### THE CITY MORGUE.

During the quarter 1,617 adult and 1,199 infant bodies were received at the Morgue from Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the institutions of this Department, making in all 2,816 bodies received. The number of bodies remaining in the Morgue at the beginning of the quarter was 147, of which 80 were adults, making a grand total in all of 2,963 bodies. Of these, 1,003 adults and 87 infants were buried by friends and 501 adults and 1,123 infants were buried by the City; 146 bodies were distributed among nine medical institutions for anatomical purposes, leaving 103 bodies remaining in the Morgue at the end of the quarter.

#### THE HARLEM MORGUE.

This branch of the City Morgue received during the quarter 96 adult and 188 infant bodies from the Harlem Hospital and Fordham and other hospitals of the City, making a total of 284 bodies in charge of this Morgue during the quarter, all of which were sent to the City Morgue, foot of East Twenty-sixth street. The number of adults buried by friends, 8; by the City, 88, 188 infants being buried by the City also, a total in all of 276 bodies interred.

#### THE CHILDREN'S BUREAU, MANHATTAN.

##### Statistics.

Many of the cases handled are of children whose parents are able to pay in part for their care when committed by the Department. The total amount of money received through this channel reached the sum of \$7,496 during the quarter, as against \$8,240.97 during the corresponding period of 1907.

There were 2838 children proposed for commitment as public charges, of which 138 were recurrent cases; of the number proposed, 915 were accepted as public charges, and 1,879 disapproved; of which 23 were referred to private charities and 1,856 unconditionally disapproved; 44 children were approved and sent to institutions with their mothers. These figures show an increase of 570 in the number of children proposed for commitment over the corresponding period for the year 1907.

The reinvestigations made during the quarter of children in institutions amounted to 1,575, of which 752 were approved to remain one year, 431 for a period less than a year; 305 not located at address given and 87 disapproved for further retention as public charges.

There were 269 applications made and investigated for the discharge of children, of which 230 were approved and 39 disapproved for the several reasons covering such cases, and as noted in the report of this Bureau. The number of children placed in families by indenture and under the supervision of the Department through this Bureau was 68, all of whom at the end of the quarter remained under supervision.

Transportation to homes was afforded to one man, two women and fifteen children, thereby relieving the City of any further expense.

##### Changes.

Two changes took place among the employees of this Bureau during the quarter as follows:

April 30, resignation, Mary Fay, Clerical Assistant, \$420 per annum.

June 10, appointment, Nora T. Burke, Clerical Assistant, \$420 per annum.

#### THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS, BROOKLYN.

##### Statistics.

The statistics of this Bureau during the quarter shows steady growth over that of the previous one. The number of cases investigated during this period amounted to 4,888.

Three hundred and seventy-seven ambulance calls were received at the office, of which 362 were sent to Kings County Hospital and 15 to the Cumberland Street Hospital; 333 petitions were received for cases for examination and observation as to their mental condition. The number of lunacy examinations made was 724; 42 cases of feeble-minded and epileptics were committed to Randalls Island and 14 to deaf and dumb institutions; 34 applications were received for deportation of dependents to their respective homes, and respectively referred to the Department of State and Alien Poor; 28 persons being returned to their respective homes by this branch of the State Board of Charities; 11 foundlings were received and cared for during the quarter; 288 permits and orders for burial in the City cemeteries of Brooklyn and Queens were issued and 277 applications received for relief of the blind.

The receipts in the Alimony Department amounted to \$8,571 and the disbursements to \$8,635. Balance on hand June 30 in this Court Fund amounted to \$5,243.43. There were 671 warrants issued for abandonment and bastardy cases, of which there were 36 abandonment and 19 bastardy convictions.

##### Needs.

Additional Examiners, or a Clerk and Clerical Assistant.

#### THE CHILDREN'S BUREAU, BROOKLYN.

##### Statistics.

During the quarter the number of children proposed for commitment was 1,617, of which 975 were approved and 642 disapproved. The number of applications received for the discharge of children under commitment was 197, and after being investigated 180 were approved for discharge and 17 disapproved. The total number of reinvestigations made of children in institutions was 1,197, with the result that 958 were approved to remain for a year or longer, 35 for a period less than a year and 204 were disapproved for further retention as public charges.

During the quarter 65 children were committed, for whom part payment was required. The amount received as part payment for these children was \$272.16. The total amount received for county wards was \$1,529.41. The total number of inmates committed amounted to 1,590 distributed among forty institutions; 7,876 were remaining in these institutions at the end of the last quarter and 1,318 discharged during this quarter, leaving 8,148 remaining at the close of the second quarter ending June 30.

##### Changes.

Two changes occurred in this Bureau during the quarter, being the resignation of a Pupil Examiner at \$480 per annum, action to date March 31, and the appointment of a Pupil Examiner at \$360 per annum, action to date April 1.

##### Needs.

Two additional Examiners, a new filing cabinet, additional waiting room for applicants, as present office is too small.

#### BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS, RICHMOND.

##### Statistics.

At the beginning of the quarter the number of children in institutions and family homes was 176. At the close of this quarter 186 were remaining; 20 children being committed, of which 6 were discharged to custody of parents, one to a free home and 4 deported to the State of Massachusetts by the State Board of Charities during the same period.

The number of cases investigated during the quarter was 672, comprising reinvestigations for acceptance of patients in hospitals, of children in institutions and abandonment and bastardy proceedings; 36 permits for admission to the Farm Colony were issued, as were 20 burial permits for interment in Richmond Potter's Field.

The receipts during the quarter for abandonment and bastardy cases, part payment for support of dependent children and the aged and infirm, insane examinations and clothing furnished patients were \$1,147.16 and the disbursements \$1,005.41, leaving a balance on hand June 30, \$222.25. Compared with the corresponding quarter of the preceding year the receipts were \$752.25 and the disbursements \$757.25, leaving a balance of \$108.

THE INSTITUTIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT,  
BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

NEW YORK CITY CHILDREN'S HOSPITALS AND SCHOOLS, RANDALLS  
ISLAND.

(Mrs. M. C. Dunphy, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This institution on April 1, 1908, had a census of 1,277 patients and 383 employees, a total of 1,662. On June 30 it had a census of 1,390 patients and 385 employees, a total of 1,775. The total number of patients received during the quarter was 323, and the daily census of patients during the same period was 1,330.

Changes.

During the quarter 600 changes took place among a daily average of 391 employees of this institution.

Improvements.

Potato peeling machine and an ice cream freezer operated by an electric motor, fitted up in main kitchen. Nine hundred feet of hose placed in position in Infants' Hospital; new cast-iron enamel sink in kitchen of Dormitory No. 2. New laboratory in main office. New six foot enameled wash trough erected in Central Power House. New gas fixtures and tips in School for Feeble Minded. New partition and other necessary carpenter work done in Dormitory No. 2. Reception Hospital, Summer Houses and Pavilion "F." Much needed painting, roofs and gutters repaired and plastering done in buildings of institution.

NEW YORK CITY HOME, MANHATTAN, BLACKWELLS ISLAND.

(Robert Roberts, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This institution on April 1, 1908, had a census of 2,695 patients and 200 employees, a total of 2,895. On June 30 it had a census of 2,557 patients and 204 employees, a total of 2,761. The total number of patients received during the quarter was 1,053, and the daily average census of patients during the same period was 2,603.

Changes.

During this quarter 108 changes took place among a daily average of 205 employees of this institution.

Improvements.

General repairs throughout the wards, hospital wards A, E and G entirely repainted.

Needs.

An additional building for male inmates.

METROPOLITAN HOSPITAL, BLACKWELLS ISLAND.

(Dr. George Taylor Stewart, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This institution April 1, 1908, had a census of 1,372 patients and 196 employees, a total of 1,568. On June 30 it had a census of 1,293 patients and 192 employees, a total of 1,485. The total number of patients received during the quarter was 2,002, and the daily average census of patients during the same period was 1,301.

Changes.

During the quarter 314 changes took place among a daily average of 194 employees of the hospital.

Improvements.

Electric irons placed in laundry. Repaired roofs of the kitchen, wards T and S, the main hospital building, and Superintendent's cottage. Grounds laid out and sown in grass. Flower beds laid out and seeds planted, all hot water pipes around buildings repaired as also radiators. The room formerly used as a storeroom has been floored and made into an Information Bureau. As also telephone booth installed therein and three extra telephone extensions added in annex to main building.

THE METROPOLITAN HOSPITAL TRAINING SCHOOL, BLACKWELLS  
ISLAND.

(Miss Agnes S. Ward, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This school, on April 1, 1908, had a census of 115 nurses and 100 employees. On June 30 it had a census of 107 nurses and 103 employees. The average census during the quarter was 220.

Changes.

During this quarter 334 changes took place among the employees of the school.

Improvements.

Work on new home progressing rapidly and will probably be ready for occupancy in about three months.

THE CITY HOSPITAL, BLACKWELLS ISLAND.

(Albert M. Conklin, Deputy and Acting Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This hospital on April 1, 1908, had a census of 541 patients and 238 employees, a total of 779. On June 30 it had a census of 538 patients and 238 employees, a total of 776. The total number of patients received during the quarter was 1,667 and the daily average census of patients during the same period was 562.

Changes.

During this quarter 279 changes took place among a daily average of 238 employees of the hospital.

Improvements.

Installation of a kitchen and butcher shop; interior of hospital and exterior of female dormitory being painted and nearing completion. Repairs to roofs and gutters progressing also. Screens installed in windows of main hospital and also in male and female dormitories. Grounds being laid out, new roads made, concrete runway and stoop built in front of shop buildings and other general improvements made.

THE NEW YORK CITY TRAINING SCHOOL, BLACKWELLS ISLAND.

(Miss Jane M. Pindell, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This school on April 1 had a census of 99 nurses and 41 employees and 8 probationers, a total of 148. On June 30 it had a census of 105 nurses, 42 employees and 10 probationers, a total of 157. The average census during the quarter was 157.

Changes.

During this quarter 54 changes took place among a daily average of 143 employees of this school.

Improvements.

General repairs, including roof. Painting of interior and exterior of Jones, Rice and Schuyler Halls.

Needs.

Extra employees, repairs, new buildings and general improvements.

THE MUNICIPAL LODGING HOUSE, NO. 398 FIRST AVENUE, MAN-  
HATTAN.

(Wm. C. Yorke, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This institution on April 1, 1908, had a census of 0 inmates and 22 employees, a total of 22. On June 30 it had a census of 0 inmates and 18 employees, a total of 18. The total number of inmates received during the quarter was 19,387 and the average daily census during the same period was 270.

Changes.

During this quarter two changes took place among a daily average of 19 employees of this institution.

Improvements.

No improvements of any particular consequence other than sufficient painting, kalsomining and regular repairs to keep institution in its general good condition.

Needs.

New building, which is nearing completion, which should be finished by December, 1908. The work is progressing rapidly and \$50,000 has been granted the Department by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen to buy new furniture necessary to furnish this new Municipal Lodging House, and a request has been made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for \$25,000 to equip building with a complete fumigating plant.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

THE NEW YORK CITY FARM COLONY, MANOR ROAD, STATEN ISLAND.

(Henry Jetter, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This institution on April 1, 1908, had a census of 334 inmates and 33 employees, a total of 367. On June 30 it had a census of 315 inmates and 39 employees, a total of 354. The total number of inmates received during the same period was 89.

Changes.

During this quarter 25 changes took place among a daily average census of 38 employees of this institution.

Improvements.

Completion of road leading to cottages, 2,300 feet long and 20 feet wide. New sidewalk laid 515 feet long of flagging collected around the Colony, beginning at main entrance and ending at the back road. New entrance of stone built at the Manor Road entrance of Colony with name of institution thereon. General repairs, painting, etc., have taken place on buildings of Colony during quarter.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

KINGS COUNTY HOSPITAL, FLATBUSH, BROOKLYN.

(Dr. John F. FitzGerald, General Medical Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This hospital on April 1 had a census of 554 patients and 238 employees, a total of 792. On June 30 it had a census of 474 patients and 244 employees, a total of 718. The total number of patients received during the quarter was 2,711 and the daily average census of patients during the same period was 519. Ambulance calls made were 616, and the dispensary afforded treatment to 1,414 cases.

Changes.

During the quarter 174 changes took place among a daily average of 241 employees of the hospital.

Improvements.

Interior of a number of wards painted and put in good condition. Addition to ambulance service of two auto ambulances, one for conveying the insane from the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the observation wards; the other for transferring patients from their homes and other hospitals to the Kings County Hospital. Minor repairs made as needed.

Needs.

New floors badly needed in main hospital front corridors. Shower bath on operating room floor for benefit of the Visiting Surgeons.

NEW YORK CITY HOME, BROOKLYN DIVISION.

(Dr. John F. FitzGerald, General Medical Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This institution on April 1 had a census of 1,736 inmates and 74 employees, a total of 1,810. On June 30 it had a census of 1,636 inmates and 73 employees, a total of 1,709. The total number of inmates received during the quarter was 871 and the average daily census of patients during the same period was 1,638.

Changes.

During this quarter 44 changes took place among a daily average of 73 employees of this institution.

Improvements.

Painting and repairs to roofs and painting of buildings.

Needs.

Electric motors in sewing rooms to run machines thus relieving the old people of labor.

Steel ceilings should be installed in different wards of the home and the Neurological Hospital.

Replumbing and additional plumbing, new floors in toilet rooms.

CUMBERLAND STREET HOSPITAL, NO. 109 CUMBERLAND STREET,  
BROOKLYN.

(Dr. Charles B. Bacon, Superintendent.)

Statistics.

This hospital on April 1 had a census of 189 patients and 74 employees, a total of 263. On June 30 it had a census of 141 patients and 67 employees, a total of 208. The total number of patients received during the quarter was 610 and the daily average census during the same period was 486. The number treated in the dispensary during the quarter amounted to 5,535. Ambulance calls made, 416.

Changes.

During this quarter 68 changes took place among a daily average of 71 employees of the hospital.

Improvements.

New floors and base being laid throughout hospital. Repairs and alterations going on on passenger elevator. When complete will afford direct elevator service to roof garden. Halls and stairways of Nurses' Home recarpeted. Floors stained and bedside rugs provided. New ventilating skylight provided for operating room. Painting and repairs made throughout.

Needs.

Acquisition of additional site for building and area purposes. Home for the administrative staff, Doctors and Nurses. Paid Resident Pathologist, paid women in diet kitchen. Painting of hospital. New ambulance.

**BRADFORD STREET HOSPITAL, NO. 113 BRADFORD STREET, BROOKLYN.**

(Miss Mary O'Connor, Trained Nurse in Charge.)

**Statistics.**

This hospital on April 1 had a census of no patients and 8 employees—a total of 8. On June 30 it had a census of 1 patient and 8 employees—a total of 9. The total number of patients received during the quarter was 25, and the daily average census during the same period was one (1).

This is a small emergency hospital with a capacity for only eight patients. The census is small compared with the other hospitals of the Department. Two hundred and eighty-one ambulance calls were made during the quarter, and the dispensary connected with the hospital treated 2,329 cases during the same period.

**Changes.**

Ten changes took place among a daily average of eight employees of the hospital during the quarter.

**Improvements.**

Minor repairs and painting as required.

**Needs.**

None recommended, in view of the erection of a new hospital to replace present one.

**CONEY ISLAND RECEPTION HOSPITAL.**

(Margaret McDiarmid, Supervising Nurse in Charge.)

**Statistics.**

This also is a small emergency hospital. The census on April 1 was no patients and 9 employees, a total of 9. On June 30 the census was 21 patients and 10 employees, a total of 31.

The total number of patients received during the quarter was 55 and the daily average census during the same period was 8.

The dispensary connected with this hospital treated during the quarter 2,062 cases. Number of ambulance calls made was 273.

**Changes.**

Fifteen changes occurred during the quarter among a daily average of ten employees.

**Improvements.**

Painting and general repairs.

Acknowledgment is made to the Department of Health for its kind co-operation in regard to the inspection of milk supplied to this Department, and in removing from the hospitals of this Department patients who developed contagious diseases; to the Department of Docks and Ferries for making repairs to the several docks when requested to do so; to the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for granting our requests for the betterment of the condition of the water and gas supply on Blackwells Island, and for many other minor changes; to the Department of Correction for detaining gangs of prisoners to unload our lumber and other supplies from barges alongside our Storehouse and Bakery docks, and also for the help of these prisoners in numerous ways on Blackwells and Randalls Islands, such as building and repairing sea walls, roads, and in handling a large quantity of freight which goes to the islands in the Department's boats; and to the State Board of Charities for its prompt assistance in returning alien and nonresident cases that become public charges in this City, thus relieving this City from their care and support.

**REPORT OF THE FIRST DEPUTY COMMISSIONER.**

October 23, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I have the honor herewith to submit to you my quarterly report for the period ending June 30, 1908:

The numerous bureaus, offices and institutions of the Department have been regularly visited and inspected by me, recommendations being made toward improving existing conditions that would tend to place on a higher plane the efficiency of the employees and the working of the institutions under your jurisdiction to your entire satisfaction.

The heads of the different institutions of the Department have shown a marked interest in bettering conditions, when called to their attention, and have been more than willing and anxious to carry out and correct defects found to exist, especially matters of small import, called to their attention while on the tours of inspection, as embodied in over 32 reports made during this quarter; treating therein over 234 subjects, all tending toward the betterment and welfare of the Department and its patients and inmates so necessary, especially in a Department of the nature of Charities.

The following are the regular bureaus, offices and institutions visited in the Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond during the above mentioned period:

- City Hospital Dock, Blackwells Island.

Regular inspections of the boats of the Department, namely, "Thomas S. Brennan," "Fidelity," "Thomas M. Mulry," "William H. Wickham," "The Bronx," and the new Departmental boat "The Lowell," have been made during the quarter. I have made numerous trips on each from the Twenty-sixth street pier, the new East Fifty-third street, East Seventieth street, East One Hundred and Twentieth street and East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street landings to Blackwells Island and Randalls Island and the New York City Farm Colony, Staten Island.

The delivery of supplies at the East Twenty-sixth street pier for distribution to the respective institutions on Blackwells and Randalls islands have been regularly inspected and supervised by me. Many mornings I have been on hand early to make these inspections, seeing that the supplies arrived on time, that the employees were on duty, and that the supplies were correct as to weight, quantity and quality. Regular visits have been made also to the different landings on said islands to await the arrival of supplies, seeing that the proper persons in charge of deliveries were on hand when the supplies arrived, that they worked quickly and handled everything with care and despatch.

When the boats of the Department were undergoing repairs I have also inspected them and the progress of the work being done on them.

Several trips were made to the yard of the builders of the new steamer "The Lowell," to see how she was progressing, until launched on May 25.

During the overhauling and repairing of the "Brennan," after her collision on May 25 with the steamer "Maraval," after returning from the launching of the new steamer of the Department, "The Lowell," I made numerous trips to the yard where such repairs were going on, inspecting them and noting the progress being made to getting her into early commission.

All new buildings undergoing construction, Superintendent's residence, staff house (Janeway Hall), kitchen and service building, City Hospital district; operating room, male reception building, female reception building, City Home district; new Nurses' home, Metropolitan Hospital district; new Municipal Lodging House, East Twenty-fifth street; Sea View Hospital, Staten Island, and the numerous repairs and improvements that were made on the other buildings of the Department during this period have been regularly inspected and reported upon by me.

All requisitions for supplies, repairs, alterations, etc., coming to my office daily during the quarter have only been approved by me after personal inspection and attention as to the absolute necessity of such requisitions, and then often not approved until I made personal investigation why such a request was made.

The large number of cases of insane committed through Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have been reviewed and approved by me during the quarter, as also the large number of commitments of children that came to my office daily for my approval during the same period, these children being committed to different institutions of their faith.

The fire fighting system of all the institutions of the Department has been greatly improved during this period by the addition of new fire fighting paraphernalia, drills of the employees of the different institutions by organizing them into companies, and drills being held frequently and unexpectedly, in which the volunteers have shown much ability in handling a fire of an emergency nature.

The more important fire fighting apparatus, good hose, has been supplied throughout all the institutions, the old being tested and, where found to be old or rotten or not up to the standard of quality necessary for absolute action, discarded and replaced by new.

All anonymous communications and other complaints made to the Department, being referred to me for investigation, have been thoroughly investigated and the necessary action taken where called for.

**REPORT OF THE SECRETARY.**

July 15, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:  
Dear Sir—Herewith I submit my report for the quarter ending June 30, 1908.

**Statistics.**

The daily average census of all the employees in the Department during the quarter was 2,170, the Nurses of the different institutions being included therein, their daily average census being 280 during this period.

There appeared 2,262 changes on the 30 payrolls rendered monthly during the quarter, the same being verified and O. K'd by me. Every one of this large number of changes must be noted and recorded on our card system, involving, therefore, a great amount of work to keep the records correct and fully up to date.

The following table shows in detail the causes and number of changes during this quarter, also those during the first quarter for 1908, the latter being shown for comparison:

The figures of the second quarter show a marked increase over those of the first quarter. The salaries of the positions among which this vast number of changes occur range from \$60 to \$240 per annum, and will continue to exist and increase until sufficient money is granted the Department to pay higher salaries, thus insuring competent help.

**Changes.**

On April 6 a Clerical Assistant receiving \$420 per annum and detailed in the Examining Physician's office resigned.

On May 1 a Stenographer and Typewriter connected with this office was increased from \$600 to \$750 per annum.

**Improvements.**

The office furniture has been added to by the installation of another filing cabinet for the keeping therein of papers over two years old, thus giving more space in the ones previously installed and in which current papers, such as correspondence, reports, requests, etc., are kept for ready reference.

**In General.**

During this quarter 1,928 letters were written and sent out by this office (of which 340 were signed by the Commissioner and 27 by the First Deputy Commissioner), covering the business transactions of this Department with other City departments, the public, private charitable societies and institutions, hospitals and the State.

There were 11 general and 38 special orders issued during this period, and 35 propositions accepted and awarded for work costing not over \$1,000 in each case.

On April 21 the fourth quarterly report of the Department, ending December 31, 1907, was sent to his Honor the Mayor, and published in the CITY RECORD of May 9, 1908.

Needs.

Increasing official business and duties pertaining to this branch of the Department service require the services of another Clerk and a Stenographer and Type-writer.

The space allowed this office is overcrowded, and can only be enlarged by extending this building about twenty feet to the west, allowing the room now occupied by the Supervising Engineer to be added to my office.

REPORT OF THE GENERAL INSPECTOR.

July 2, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I beg leave to submit my second quarterly report, ending June 30, 1908: During the quarter I made the usual monthly inspections of the institutions of the Department. Over forty-six reports were made, covering one hundred and thirty-eight subjects.

Over forty examinations were made of inmates of the institutions under the jurisdiction of the Department as to their sanity, twenty-four of whom were found to be insane and sent to the Psychopathic Ward, Bellevue Hospital.

Twelve visits were made to the homes of applicants for admission to the Farm Colony, to see as to their eligibility for admission to the home cottages, of which seven were approved.

I have made the usual visits to the homes of the employees of the Department who were absent on sick leave.

I have examined over thirty of the indigent and sick at the City Hospital and the Metropolitan Hospital for admission to the New York City Home, Blackwells Island.

All matters referred to me for examination and report thereon have been attended to and the proper action taken where necessary.

Remarks.

Since the first of the year, owing to the condition of the building market, the competition has been extremely sharp, and work has been undertaken considerably below cost, in a few cases so ridiculously low as to cause re-advertising, as the surety companies would not bond the contractors. In many of the contracts which were let, the general contractors have sublet to irresponsible subs, and it was therefore a difficult task to make the frequent inspections necessary. Many times work performed was condemned and caused to be done over. Labor has been another cause of annoyance by reason of the low prices, as contractors and subcontractors are employing men both union and non-union on the same work. The delegates have complained of this, but it is impossible to ascertain positively whether or not the prevailing rate of wages is paid. I have interrogated the journeymen, but in each case they would either pretend not to understand or else declare they were receiving the full union wage. While I believe they were not telling the truth, I know of no way to procure positive evidence. All of the work above itemized has been performed for very little cost to the Department, but it has required a great deal of additional work on my part to have same satisfactorily completed, and I therefore trust that the calibre of contractors will improve.

REPORT OF EXAMINING PHYSICIAN.

June 30, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I have the honor of submitting the second quarterly report for 1908.

Five thousand one hundred and twenty-nine (5,129) applicants were examined to determine their physical disabilities and offer such relief and assistance as appeared to be indicated. Four thousand and twenty-seven (4,027) were sent to hospitals and nine hundred and three (903) applicants for admission to hospitals were found unsuitable or not requiring hospital care and treatment. Of the latter number the majority were sent to their homes or referred to dispensaries for treatment. Two hundred and forty-six (246) were referred to the Bureau of Dependent Adults for further consideration, or in order that they might make application for admission to the New York City Home for Aged and Infirm. Of twenty-eight (28) applicants who claimed to be blind five (5) were found to be not totally blind.

A considerable number of patients transferred by Bellevue were discharged here for various reasons, viz., because they were unwilling to go to the Island and refused to be sent, because they were not in need of hospital care, or because they were able to pay for treatment. Twenty (20) patients were returned to Bellevue for the reason that they were "too ill for transfer" or "too ill for discharge."

Ninety-five (95) applicants were examined for the Children's Bureau and a written report was sent in regard to each case. These persons had made application to that Bureau to have the City board their children (two is the average number) in "homes" or "asylums" free of charge for a year. Lay investigation having disproved their claims they were referred here to determine whether they were able to work and support their children. Sixty-nine (69) of these parents were not disabled and the City was, therefore, saved the expense of maintaining about one hundred and thirty-eight (138) children at \$2 per week for fifty-two (52) weeks or about fourteen thousand three hundred and fifty-two dollars (\$14,352). Only twenty-six (26) applicants were disabled or partly disabled.

Dorothy E. Bauer resigned as Clerical Assistant on April 5.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT DIETITIAN.

June 30, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department Public Charities:

Dear Sir—Herewith is transmitted my report for the second quarter of the current year:

Organization.

From May 12 to June 20 Miss E. C. Nickerson, Assistant Dietitian at the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, was off duty, owing to illness.

On May 25 Miss Alison Hamilton, Pupil Dietitian, New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools, resigned to accept a permanent position elsewhere.

On May 28 Miss Ethelwynne Adamson, graduate of Smith College and Teachers' College, Columbia University, was appointed Pupil Dietitian to succeed Miss Hamilton at the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools.

On June 1 Mrs. Ulia Pullman was appointed Matron of the Kosher Kitchen, to be opened at the City Hospital, she to be responsible to the Dietitian of that institution.

On June 15 Miss Essa B. Lucas, Acting Dietitian at the New York City Home for Aged and Infirm, left for her annual vacation of one month.

Owing to the continued ill health of Miss Strowger, recently Acting Dietitian at the New York City Training School for Nurses, I have been obliged to endeavor to secure a candidate for this position, but so far have been unsuccessful. It has also been difficult to secure Pupil Dietitians willing to substitute for Dietitians on vacation during the summer months, the domestic science graduates feeling that their school work during the year has been too heavy to make it advisable for them to take up any summer work.

A second report has been made to you by myself upon the urgent need for an examination for Dietitians to be held by the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Records and Accounting.

General Order No. 103 (Exhibit "A") provides for Stewards of institutions to employ special manifold report books provided for the purpose of reporting to the Dietitian the receipt of all food supplies at the institutions. This enables the Dietitians to be acquainted with all stock on hand at all times, to make more intelligent requisitions upon the store, and to be more responsible for the distribution of food supplies than had before been possible.

Food Supplies.

A report has been made by myself upon the urgent need of more careful regulation of the handling of food supplies in transit from stores to kitchens and dining

rooms and of the cooked food supplies from kitchens to dining rooms; also upon the necessity for the protection of bread from dust in transit from the bakery to institutions.

**Dietaries.**

With the appointment of the Matron of the Kosher Kitchen at the City Hospital it is expected soon to establish a dietary at the City Hospital which will provide kosher food for orthodox Jewish patients.

**Teaching of Nurses.**

At the New York City Training School for Nurses arrangements were made to relieve the Department Dietitian of the teaching of nurses, owing to the arduous nature of her other duties. No classes were taught during this quarter by the Dietitian at this institution. Considerable time was given to the proposed revision of the course of training for nurses in the subject of dietetics.

At the Metropolitan Training School for Nurses the Dietitian of the Metropolitan Hospital completed a course of lessons in dietetics for nurses.

At the New York City Children's Hospitals and Schools the Dietitian gave eight lessons in dietetics and cookery for sick children, thus completing the course for nurses begun earlier in the year.

The work in the Employment Department for the past three months has been very strenuous, and the number of applications considerably in excess over the corresponding quarter for 1907. Many of the applications recently received are from men and women of the better class who have lost their positions through the closing down of several of the mercantile houses or reduction in the force of employees, many of whom were able to furnish testimonials of good character and of having served their previous employers creditably and faithfully for several years.

The grade of personal and referred applications received directly at this office has greatly improved, and but very few of the down-and-out class are noticeable. In the latter class I refer to the male and female Helpers who are accustomed to applying or working for a short period in one or the other of the hospitals or institutions on Blackwell's Island or Randalls Island, and after securing one month's pay leave on pass, with no intention of returning to work. I will say, however, that for the past six months—in fact, since the month of October, 1907—many of the Hospital Helpers, both male and female, who have been known previously to have remained a short period are retaining their work and continuing on for from six to eight months consecutively. In most cases this is due to the very dull season and to the fewer opportunities offered at many of the seaside resorts.

In conferring with the heads of the several hospitals and institutions under your supervision, I would mention that the recent increase in salaries of a few of the Helpers throughout the Department has been beneficial in retaining the more competent and making it less difficult in securing a more efficient class of Helpers.

Several new employment agencies have been located and investigated as to the quality of help which they may be able to refer to this Bureau.

Three transfers have been made, after investigation as to the inability of the applicants to perform the work assigned them.

Several requests for female Helpers have been received through the Board of Health for Riverside and Willard Parker Hospitals, North Brother Island. These requests have been granted only when I have had a surplus of applications, after supplying the various hospitals and institutions under your supervision. Frequent requests have also been received from hospitals and institutions located in Manhattan and The Bronx.

**REPORT OF THE BUREAU OF DEPENDENT ADULTS, BOROUGHES OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.**

New York, August 6, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—In forwarding the report of this Bureau (Morgues included) for the quarter ending June 30, 1908, I beg to call your attention to the following facts:

During said quarter 3,486 applicants for admission to hospitals were sent to the Examining Physician of this Department for examination as to their eligibility for admission to the hospitals connected with this Department, 320 children were sent to institutions for children on Randalls Island, 1,070 persons were sent to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm.

There were 218 children discharged from the institutions on Randalls Island; 1,191 persons were discharged from the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm.

No applications for admission to the New York City Home for the Aged and Infirm were disapproved.

There were 48 sick and destitute persons committed to the State Almshouse, Blackwell's Island, for care, awaiting the action of the State Board of Charities.

There were 423 persons sent to the Municipal Lodging House. Requests were made for examination as to the sanity of 181 men and 157 women. Thirty-two deaf mutes were admitted to institutions for same. Five hundred and twenty-nine tickets for meals were given.

There have been sent from this Bureau 23 patients to the Craig Colony for Epileptics, Sonyea, N. Y.; 6 to the State Custodial Asylum for Feeble-minded Women, Newark, N. Y.; 1 to the Syracuse State Institutions for Feeble-minded Children, Syracuse, N. Y.; 19 to the Rome State Custodial Asylum, Rome, N. Y.; 50 to the New York State Hospital for the Treatment of Incipient Pulmonary Tuberculosis, Raybrook, N. Y.

In addition, this Bureau has examined 6,751 cases of applicants for admission to hospitals and homes other than our own, to be cared for there at the expense of the City and County of New York, of which 1,280 were rejected as improper charges.

This Bureau has taken 360 complaints of abandonment, of which 238 were granted requisitions and 122 treated at this office; 147 non-support applications (aged parents); 157 bastardy cases sent to the Court of Special Sessions; 72 bastardy cases not sent to court.

Payments in abandonment and bastardy cases during the quarter ending June 30, 1908, amounted to \$36,346.85, and disbursements in same, \$36,397.15, thus saving that much to the taxpayers of the City and County of New York.

Total number of cases (including the passes issued to visit Blackwell's and Randalls Islands) handled by the Bureau of Dependent Adults for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, during the quarter ending June 30, 1908, 33,134.

This Bureau has charge of the Morgue, foot of East Twenty-sixth street, Borough of Manhattan, and the Harlem Morgue, foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, Borough of Manhattan. The total number of bodies received at the foot of East Twenty-sixth street was 2,816, of which 1,000 were buried by friends. The Harlem Morgue received 284 bodies, of which 8 were buried by friends.

During the quarter ending June 30, 1908, this Bureau has handled over 33,000 cases, of which the lower office handled over 27,000, which necessitated great detail and labor with the small force employed.

We have also received the two Typewriters which were ordered some time ago, and the work is done better and cleaner than before.

I would again call your attention to the additional floor space necessary to relieve the crowded condition of the office.

Notwithstanding the letter of Secretary Borden, June 23, 1908, which was directed by you, it is of the utmost importance and necessity that we have an additional Stenographer and Typewriter, a Clerk and an Office Boy to facilitate the great amount of work done at this Bureau.

REPORT OF THE CHILDREN'S BUREAU.

New York, June 30, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner, Department of Public Charities:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit herewith the report of the Children's Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1908.

During this quarter there were twenty-eight hundred and thirty-eight (2,838) children proposed for commitment as public charges; of this number, after investigation, nine hundred and fifteen (915) children were accepted as public charges for periods varying from one month to one year; forty-four (44) children were sent to institutions with mothers; twenty-three (23) children were referred to private charities for care and eighteen hundred and fifty-six (1,856) children were disapproved unconditionally.

During the same period application was made for the discharge of two hundred and sixty-nine (269) children, of which two hundred and thirty (230) were approved and thirty-nine (39) disapproved for the reasons stated in the statistical portion of the report.

During the quarter we received seventy-four hundred and ninety-six dollars (\$7,496) in part payment for children committed to institutions.

These figures show an increase of five hundred and seventy (570) children proposed for commitment over the corresponding period of the year 1907 and are no doubt due to existing industrial conditions. Many of our applicants claimed, and it was borne out by investigation, that they have had no steady employment since last fall, and in many cases have had no employment at all since that time.

Desertion of husband continues to play a very prominent part in our work. There are hundreds of children in institutions to-day supported by public funds for the sole reason that their fathers have deserted them. When that occurs it quickly follows that the mothers of the children apply for their commitment to institutions. Some of the desertions are of the most heartless character; the men invariably leave their wives when they are most needed at home, frequently when the woman is again to become a mother, and strange to say 75 per cent. of these offenders are men of foreign birth, men who have been in this country only a few years, and it would seem that the majority of these men leave their wives for the express purpose of getting their children into an institution. At least, that has been my observation of the matter. That there is, at times, collusion between husband and wife there is not the slightest doubt, in fact, our investigations have not infrequently proved this, but that the great majority of desertions are bona fide I have likewise no doubt. When such men are found they are haled to court and prosecuted by this Department and compelled to remove their children from institutions, but the difficulty is that they generally leave this State and settle elsewhere, and are lost sight of and frequently their children must be maintained at the public expense for many years, in many cases until they reach the wage earning age.

Institutions for children have a peculiar attraction for the foreign-born element of our population; it seems to be the height of their ambition to send their children to such places.

In the majority of these cases there seems to be a total absence of parental responsibility and it is this condition that makes the work of this Bureau so difficult and arduous.

Relatives of children proposed for commitment rarely do anything for them, notwithstanding the fact that they may be in a position to do so. There are many cases on our records where relatives could, if they would, relieve the City of the expense of caring for children in institutions. Men throw off the responsibilities of their families with as little concern as the average law abiding citizen discards an old shoe, at least so it would seem.

Ward 2, for scarlet fever, from April 16 to May 5 and from May 19 to June 10; Ward 16, for scarlet fever, from April 12 to May 3; Ward 17, for measles, from May 10 to June 15; Dormitory 2, for scarlet fever, from May 5 to May 22; Dormitory 4, for measles, from May 24 to June 23; Ward 22, for diphtheria, from April 5 to April 26; Ward 25, for scarlet fever, from May 8 to May 27; Ward 28, for measles, from April 11 to May 25; Wards 9 and 10, for measles, from May 15 to June 12. At the Reception Hospital, Wards 41 to 44, for scarlet fever, from April 12 to June 10; Ward 38, for scarlet fever, from May 23 to June 15, and Ward 44, for erysipelas, from June 3 to June 24. At the Infants' Hospital, Ward 52, for measles, from May 16 to June 22; Ward 53, for measles, from May 16 to June 7; Ward 54, for scarlet fever, from May 7 to May 28; Wards 55 and 56, for measles, from May 16 to June 19; Wards 57 and 58, for measles, from May 15 to June 6, and Ward 59, for measles, from May 22 to June 12.

During the quarter Ward 35 has been used exclusively for the treatment of measles from April 11 to June 30; Ward 34 for scarlet fever from May 2 to June 30; Ward 37 for scarlet fever from April 1 to May 26, and Ward 38 for scarlet fever from May 8 to June 30.

Changes.

During the quarter 600 changes took place among the employees.

Improvements.

A potato peeling machine and an ice cream freezer, operated by an electric motor, have been fitted up at the main kitchen; placed in position 900 feet of fire hose, which have been furnished for the Infants' Hospital Building, all of which has been tested to 100 pounds pressure; a cast iron enamel sink has been fitted up in the kitchen of Dormitory 2; the lavatory in the main office being in a dilapidated condition, was taken down and replaced by a new one; placed four gashouse retorts in position; placed one set of arch blocks in position at the Crematory; thoroughly cleaned boilers Nos. 3 and 4 internally; erected a 6-foot enameled wash trough at the central power house; laid a new waste pipe for wash trough at Female Helpers' Dormitory; put up new gas fixtures and tips on same at School for Feeble-Minded, and recharged fire extinguishers in the building; packed pump rods and valve stems at central power house and put new faucet in feed line of pump No. 3; cleaned out toilets and main sewer at Male Helpers' Dormitory; packed piston rods, valve stem and steam valves on engine at laundry, Infants' Hospital, and repaired the steel cable at dock.

Erected one pine partition, made one window opening and one pair of new sashes with inside and outside casings in Dormitory 2; also put down 60 linear feet of floor base, cut one door opening and fitted same with door jambs and casings. In Ward 11 altered and reconstructed 140 linear feet of stationary benches and 80 linear feet of balustrade, gates, etc., at the Reception Hospital. Repaired the shingle roofs of the five summer houses located near Wards 25 to 28, inclusive. Made new one pair of pine doors, 4 feet wide by 5 feet long, for the cellar of Pavilion F, and replaced two pairs of strap hinges and one padlock with hinge hasp and staple.

Painted the ceiling and sidewalls of playroom, Ward 6, in two coats; painted, grained and varnished all woodwork and alumined all pipes and radiators; painted the exterior of the building. Painted the interior of Wards 7 and 8 throughout in two coats; painted sash, doors and frames; painted, grained and varnished all the woodwork; cleaned and varnished the partitions and alumined all steam pipes and radiators; painted the ceilings and walls of toilets and bath rooms in two coats. Painted the ceilings and sidewalls of Dormitory 2 in two coats; painted, grained and varnished all the wainscoting and woodwork and alumined all steam pipes and radiators. At the School for Feeble Minded, painted the ceilings and sidewalls of playroom in two coats, and painted, grained and varnished all the woodwork; enameled all pipes and radiators. Painted the exterior of the Laboratory in two coats; also, the ceiling and sidewalls of the interior. At the cow barn, painted three small rooms throughout in two coats; painted 96 iron beds, one coat paint and one coat enamel; also 220 bed blocks. Painted the new extension to the main kitchen, inside and outside, in two coats. Replaced 412 lights of common glass and 26 lights of ground glass in the various buildings.

The most important repairs in plastering have been made in Dormitory 2, cow barn, Wards 6 and 15, School for Feeble Minded, Industrial School and Pavilions A, B, C and F.

The roofs and gutters of the following buildings have been repaired during the quarter: Tin shop, Female Helpers' Dormitory, Wards 4, 6 and 15, Reception Hospital, Laboratory, School for Feeble Minded, South Hospital, Drug Store, Paint Shop and Pavilions A, B, C, E and F; placed a new roof on the Fire Engine House; made 150 feet of leaden pipe, and repaired 926 feet of wire fencing.

Among the articles made at the Tin Shop during the quarter, the following are the most important: 3 dozen dishpans, 6 four-quart sprinkling cans, 1 dozen tin basins, 1 dozen dustpans, 1 dozen six-gallon cans, 2 dozen saucepans, with covers, 1 ten-quart pail, 1 two-quart funnel, 1 double tray, 1 three-quart tea kettle, 1 galvanized iron box; lined one refrigerator and strengthened and numbered 24 forty-quart milk cans.

In addition to the foregoing many minor repairs have been made in the various labor branches during the quarter.

Improvements.

The work on the new Nurses' Home is progressing. The partitions have been placed, and the rough mortar has been set. The gas company has run their pipes through the main street to the Nurses' Home.

The Catholic Chapel has been repaired, plastered and painted both inside and out. Electric irons have been placed in the laundry room, and an extension to the vapor pipe has been placed upon the roof above the ventilator.

The work of the tinsmith who had the contract for the repairing of the roofs and gutters is progressing rather slowly, but the work is so much in excess of what was calculated, that more could not be accomplished in the given time. They have repaired the roofs of the kitchen, Wards T and S, the main hospital building, the Superintendent's cottage, and have done general painting over the roofs, but have not finished that as yet, neither have they finished the cornices.

The grounds round about the male dormitory and on the west side, where the old pavilions were torn away, have been laid out and sown in grass. Flower beds were laid out and seeds planted in a garden which was made for the purpose of giving work to such patients as were capable of attending to same, and, at the present time, the garden is flowering, and a few patients are interested in the work of keeping it in good shape.

Repairs have been made to the hot water pipes round about the building, consisting of the opening up of conduits and the bricking up of same. Radiators and pipes are being examined and placed in good working order, and the same are being painted with aluminum.

The operating rooms and the furniture of same have been painted and put in good repair.

A sink has been placed in the diet kitchen, and repairs have been made to the food carriers.

Steps have been constructed in front of Wards T and S building, in order to have an entrance to the basement which will hereafter be used for clothes rooms and tailor shop as soon as the electric lights have been installed.

One end of the building formerly occupied by the paint shop has been reconstructed and, at the present time, a sorting room for the clean clothes is arranged therein. By this plan, more room has been given to the sorting room where the laundry from the wards is received.

The room formerly occupied as a store room has been floored and put in shape for an information bureau, the telephone booth from the main office having been located therein. This will remove a good deal of the noise from the upper office, which was formerly due to the constant running in and out of different individuals to use the telephone.

Mechanics were put upon the payroll at the prevailing rate of wages at the end of this quarter.

The old Nurses' Home has been painted by contract upon the outside in imitation of stone, and the roofs have been placed in proper repair and also painted. The interior of the building has been painted throughout by the regular hospital painters.

The interior of the building known as the Annex of the Main Hospital has been painted.

Three extra telephone extensions have been added to those formerly in use.

New coffee and tea urns have been installed in the staff pantry.

Owing to the poor facilities for bathing, rearrangement of barber shops, toilets, etc., in tower leading from Ward M should be arranged, and it should be planned to remove barber shop to the further end of the ward with proper hot and cold water connections.

The school advertisement was inserted in the "Outlook," "The Christian Herald," "The Sunday School Times" and the "School" with excellent results, and it is to be continued in the "Outlook" and "Christian Herald" during July and August.

Circulars of the new home and "Annual Reports" were received and a large number have been sent out principally to physicians, ministers and teachers.

Several newspapers and the journals of nursing published a short article referring to the school. All these have been helpful in bringing applicants.

Screens and awnings were supplied for the annex to the home.

The piano was thoroughly overhauled and repaired.

Books, magazines and newspapers have been supplied for the library.

General Report.

During the quarter four Pupil Nurses completed their course and three returned for post graduate work. Two Head Pupil Nurses resigned, having completed their post graduate course.

Two Pupil Nurses resigned; one, to go west with her brother, and the other resigning by request.

Seventy-nine applications were received during the quarter. Twelve entered on probation, one failed on the entrance examination, one took the entrance examination and is to enter with a later class, and one left after a short time, thinking the work too hard. Nine were appointed Pupil Nurses on July 1, but one has since left for an indefinite rest.

Classes and lectures were conducted as usual. Examinations were held early in May, and the results showed that good hard work had been done by all.

On May 27 the class had a class dinner, followed by class exercises during the evening. The graduating exercises were held on May 30. The Egbert Guernsey prize of fifty dollars, which was established by Miss Guernsey for general excellence during the entire course, was won by Miss Eleanor Lynch. Announcement was also made that next year a prize of equal value would be established by a friend for excellence in practical work during the entire course.

The work on the new home has progressed rapidly. The plastering is nearly finished, and we will probably be able to move in in about three months.

Improvements.

The installation of a Kosher kitchen and butcher shop, the fitting up of which is progressing.

The painting of the interior of the hospital is being continued and nearing completion. The contractor has finished the repairs to the roof and gutters, and the work seems to be properly done.

The painting of the exterior of the female dormitory is progressing. The contractor is now putting on the last coat, after which he will line it off in blocks to imitate granite.

Screens have been placed in all the windows on the first floor of the main building, and all the windows and doors of the dining rooms of the main building; also the male and female dormitories. This adds greatly to the comfort and cleanliness of these rooms.

The Gardener seeded the plots in front of the male and female dormitories; also the ground next to the Maternity Hospital. The grass has come up nicely, and adds to the appearance of these buildings.

Have had a new road made, extending the west side main road from the Solarium down along the sea wall to the female dormitory, where it connects with the road running east across the island. This gives access for fire apparatus into this group of buildings. The roads in general have been repaired with broken stone.

Have built a concrete runway and stoop in front of the building used as shops. Increased size of tennis ground, and built a wire fence around same. Repaired frame and put new glass in green house.

Superintendent's Building.

Is completed with the exception of painting, setting hardware and laying the finished floors, and minor repair work. The contractor is now removing his material and the debris from around this building.

Janeway Hall.

This building has been plastered throughout, concrete roof, sheathing and tin have been placed thereon and painted, all partitions have been erected, and the grounds for chair rails, picture mouldings have been set, and the doors and trim on the two upper floors have been placed, rough plumbing, steam, gas and electric work has been completed and will be ready for fixtures in the near future when the finished floors will be laid. The elevator work has been nearly completed and the frame of the car, also machinery, have been installed.

Service Building.

All floors, the roof and the bridge have been concreted and on the roof the sleepers, concrete fill and sheathing have been laid and is now ready for the trim. The terra cotta partitions throughout the building are nearly completed; concrete floor has been laid in the cellar, and damp proof. The plasterers have begun work in the cellar. The stairs in the front and rear have been erected and the railings are now being built. The elevators and dumb waiter work has been completed and the machinery set in place; the men are now working on the car frames. The rough plumbing, steam, gas, electric work is being completed. The brine tank has been built and the sheathing is now being erected. The refrigerating machine and its coils have been set.

Needs.

The sea wall on the side of erysipelas pavilion is still in a very dangerous condition and badly in need of repairs; the portico of the building is gradually sinking and separating from the main building.

All the window sash, doors and jams in the main building need repairing. When the present officers' dining room is vacated I would suggest that this room be fitted up as a record room, such a room is badly needed for the filing of histories, and for the use of the visiting and resident staff, who frequently desire to look up the back record of patients.

The usual amount of painting, plumbing, plastering and carpentry and repairing of all descriptions have been done as in former reports.

Improvements.

Needs.

It is sincerely hoped that our new building on East Twenty-fifth street will be ready for use ere another winter sets in. The Thomas B. Leahy Company, who received the contract to complete the same after the failure of the Church Construction Company, our former contractors, is certainly going about this work with a vim, and hopes to complete the contract before the year 1908 is ended.

At a recent meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an appropriation of \$50,000 was made to buy furniture, etc., for this building. Said action was also approved a few days later by the Board of Aldermen. A request to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for \$25,000 to equip this building with a new and complete fumigating plant will be considered later by said Board.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to herewith submit my report for the three months ending June 30, 1908.

The number of children remaining in institutions as public charges March 31, 1908, were one hundred and seventy-six (176).

The number of applications for the commitment of children during the quarter were thirty-five (35). Of this number twenty-two (22) were approved, and thirteen (13) disapproved for commitment. Of the number of approved applications, parents did not reply in two instances, making the total number of children (public charges) in institutions during the quarter, one hundred and ninety-six (196). Of this number six (6) were discharged to the custody of parents, one (1) to a "Free Home," and three (3) were deported to the State of Massachusetts by the State Board of Charities. Thus the number of children (public charges) remaining in institutions June 30, 1908, were one hundred and eighty-six (186).

The number of reinvestigations of children (public charges) in institutions for reacceptance were twenty-nine (29). Of this number sixteen were approved to remain for a year, six (6) were approved for a longer period, and seven (7) were disapproved for further retention as public charges.

The number of children (public charges) boarding in families March 31, 1908, were sixteen (16), and none have been committed since March 31, 1908. Of this number four (4) were discharged, to wit: one became of age, and employment was secured for him as an apprentice in the ship joiner's trade, and three (3) were deported to Porto Rico by the State Board of Charities. Thus the total number of children in institutions and families during the quarter were two hundred and twelve (212).

The total number of children remaining in institutions and families June 30, 1908, were one hundred and ninety-eight (198).

The children boarding in families and those provided with "free homes," were visited once each month.

The number of complaints in abandonment and non-support proceedings were twenty-nine (29), and the number of complaints in bastardy proceedings were five (5).

Represented Department in Court thirty-four times.

Miscellaneous visits and G. A. R. investigations were seventy-seven (77).

The insane examinations during the quarter were fourteen (14).

The number of permits issued for admission of destitute to New York City Farm Colony were thirty-six (36).

The number of burial permits issued for the interment of poor and strangers in Potter's Field, Borough of Richmond, were twenty (20).

The number of applicants referred to the Bureau of Dependent Adults, Borough of Manhattan, who could not be treated by the hospitals in this Borough were seven (7).

The road leading to the cottages, about 2,300 feet long and 20 feet wide, has been completed.  
At the reservoir a new shingle roof has been built and received two (2) coats of paint.  
A sidewalk has been laid 515 feet long of flagging collected around the grounds, beginning at the main entrance and ending at the back road.  
At the main dormitory the dining room and hospital ward have been screened.  
At the storehouse an ice box has been built for the storing of butter, eggs and cheese.  
At the main entrance from Manor Road a retaining wall has been built on each side, with the name of the institution and the road being painted on, presenting a neat appearance to the Colony.  
All fire hose has been tested and found in good condition.  
A lawn has been laid, 105 feet by 25 feet, between the main dormitory and stable.  
New wagon shed painted with two (2) coats of paint.  
The house where the baker and family lives has been moved 200 feet, it being on the inside of building line of the new hospital, also 12 new brick pier foundations built to support house, which was in a very unsafe condition.  
The foundation of the water tower on the hill has been repaired and the tower is now in a safe condition.  
The following list of products has been shipped to Blackwells Island this quarter. First shipment on April 22, 1908:  
Parsley, 4,885 bunches; rhubarb, 105 bunches; radishes, 1,796 bunches; turnips, 10,850 pounds; lettuce, 6,696 heads; spinach, 1,166 pecks; strawberries, 90 quarts; green peas, 1,056 quarts; kale, 225 pecks.

BOROUGHES OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS.  
REPORT OF THE CENTRAL OFFICE.

June 30, 1908.

Hon. ROBERT W. HEBBERD, Commissioner of Public Charities, New York, N. Y.:  
Sir—I submit herewith the report of the work of the Central office, Brooklyn, for the quarter ending June 30, 1908.

You will notice by the statistics that the number of county wards is steadily increasing, and this increase is accounted for by the lack of employment, as the parents have been obliged to apply for the commitment of many children owing to their being deprived of their employment and inability to secure work elsewhere. There is considerable distress among the poor of the City, due to the general curtailment in all lines of business, and until times improve, this Department will have its hands full providing homes for the sick and destitute.

Improvements.

During the past quarter the efficiency of the ambulance service of this Department has been wonderfully improved by the addition of the two new automobile ambulances which have been put in service at the Kings County Hospital.  
These two machines enable the Department to take all hospital and insane cases from the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the Kings County Hospital with quickness, comfort and dispatch, and from a humane standpoint I consider them the most valuable addition to the hospital plant in many years.  
They have done everything asked of them, and done it well, and the poor patients taken to our hospital are conveyed from their homes in conveyances which even the rich cannot obtain from private institutions.

Needs.

Additional Examiners are required in both the Bureau of Dependent Adults and the Children's Bureau.  
From the present outlook the Home for the Aged and Infirm will be inadequate to the demands that are likely to be made upon it during the coming winter, and steps will have to be taken at once to relieve the institutions at Flatbush by providing additional accommodations there or elsewhere.  
An up to date fire alarm system is one of the most necessary requirements at the institutions in Flatbush, and the sooner we can get one installed the better it will be for every one connected with the Department.

The Manufacturing Bureau has prepared for the several institutions 606 gallons fluid extracts and tinctures, 1,342 gallons liniments, 705 gallons mixtures, 666 gallons elixirs and syrups, 515 pounds ointments and numerous other articles.

The preparation of sterilized catgut for the hospitals has been continued, and numerous analyses have been made of supplies received and of materials submitted by the General Storekeeper.



THE THIRD AVENUE RAILROAD COMPANY.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City,) party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Third Avenue Railroad Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth: In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double-track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, upon the following route: Beginning and connecting with the existing double-track street surface railway on Amsterdam avenue at or near the intersection of said avenue with Fort George avenue; thence northerly, westerly and southerly in, upon and along said Fort George avenue as it winds and turns to its intersection with Audubon avenue, with a loop terminal at said intersection, to be constructed with-

nue. The said route, with switches, crossovers and terminal loop hereby authorized, are shown upon a map entitled: "Amended map showing proposed railway of the Third Avenue Railroad Company in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, of June 2, 1908," and signed by F. W. Whitridge, Receiver, Edward A. Maher, General Manager, and T. F. Mullany, Chief Engineer, dated New York, November 27, 1908, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed; provided, that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description and the provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within thirty (30) days from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time the Company shall, within one month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for a term not exceeding three (3) years, provided that if the Company shall make application to the Board, then the Board may extend the term of said right and privilege upon the same terms and conditions herein fixed for a further period not exceeding two (2) years.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the term of this grant, whether for a term of three years or an extension of such term for a further period of two years, on application of the Company, as herein provided, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand one hundred dollars (\$1,100), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand one hundred dollars (\$1,100).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross earnings of the Company from all sources as shall bear the same ratio to its whole gross earnings as the length of the route hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation.

The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

The fiscal year shall end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law, as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract, shall be strictly complied with.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this contract or extension thereof as herein provided, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege, upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways.

The use of said railway which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or

any structures, in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways, for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall not exceed the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway so used.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Eighth—Said railway shall be operated by underground electric power substantially similar to the system of underground electric power now used by the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, provided that any other power may be used, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be lawfully used, approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Ninth—No wires for the transmission of power shall be permitted unless they be placed in conduits underneath or along the side of the railway. When such conduits are constructed the Company shall provide two conduits not less than 3 inches in diameter each, for the exclusive use of the City. The Company hereby agrees that such conduits shall be used only by the Company and the City, as above.

Tenth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within thirty (30) days from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within three (3) months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Twelfth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of the Company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this contract.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railway shall not exceed 5 cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than 5 cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized other than passenger cars, and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight or express cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway; and the tracks hereby authorized shall not be used for the storage of cars.

Fifteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require or as may be directed by the Board.

Sixteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Seventeenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Eighteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered, at least three times every twenty-four hours when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Nineteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Com-

missioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as the said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street, avenue or highway the Company shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue or highway, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewal or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets; required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route written permits shall be obtained from the President of the Borough of Manhattan and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Twenty-fourth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Twenty-fifth—Should the grades or lines of the streets, avenues or highways in which the franchise is hereby granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract the Company shall change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets, avenues or highways the Company shall take care of and protect the track and appurtenances at its own expense; all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, or at any other time upon request of the Board, which shall state:

- 1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-seventh—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-eighth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-ninth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250), as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided.

Thirtieth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability

whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-first—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company, through its President, to appear before him on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-second—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-third—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-fourth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held this day, the following proceedings were had:

Whereas, The Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company has, under date of September 19, 1907, made application to this Board for a grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate an extension to its existing street surface railway system upon and along Metropolitan avenue, from Dry Harbor road to Jamaica Plank road, in the Borough of Queens; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on October 18, 1907, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as November 15, 1907, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in the "Brooklyn Daily Eagle" and the "Brooklyn Citizen," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, At a meeting of this Board held June 26, 1908, the Select Committee to whom the matter had been referred, submitted a report containing proposed conditions and a form of contract, and a resolution was adopted fixing September 18, 1908, as the date for the final public hearing; and

Whereas, At the meeting of the Board held September 18, 1908, a communication was received from the Company objecting to certain of the terms and conditions contained in the form of contract reported by the Select Committee, and an opinion was received from the Corporation Counsel stating that the matter should be referred back to the Select Committee, and such reference was accordingly made; and

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board held November 20, 1908, a further report was presented from said Select Committee recommending certain amendments in the form of contract previously presented, and the Chief Engineer was thereupon directed to prepare a contract in accordance with such recommendations, which amended form of contract has this day been received; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of the City of New York, as follows, to wit:

BROOKLYN, QUEENS COUNTY AND SUBURBAN RAILROAD COMPANY.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made this ..... day of 1909, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board); and the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad Company, incorporated for the purpose of building, maintaining and operating a railroad (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth: In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway by the overhead electric system similar to that now used by the Company in the Borough of Queens, with the necessary wires and equipment, for public use in the conveyance of persons and property in the Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, upon the following route: Commencing at the intersection of Metropolitan avenue and Dry Harbor road, thence easterly in and upon Metropolitan avenue to a point where the said Metropolitan avenue intersects the Jamaica plank road, in the Village of Jamaica, together with the right to connect the aforesaid tracks with the existing tracks of the petitioner on Jamaica plank road.

The said route and connections hereby authorized are more particularly shown upon a map entitled: "Map showing the proposed extension in the routes of the Brooklyn, Queens County and Suburban Railroad, in the Borough of Queens, to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated September 19, 1907," signed and approved by T. S. Williams, Vice-President, and W. S. Menden, Chief Engineer, which map is attached hereto, is made a part of this contract, it is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional switches, crossovers and spurs which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this franchise may be permitted by resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property, bounded on said streets and avenues, to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the Company within six months of the signing of this contract by the Mayor and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained, the Company shall within two months thereafter,

make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railroad ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railway, as herein described, shall be held and enjoyed by the Company, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five (25) years from the date when this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair reevaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two years and not later than one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the reevaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound, upon request of the other, to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the reevaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If, in any case, the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

The sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

During the first five (5) years after the commencement of operation of the extension herein provided for, annually on November 1, three (3) per cent. of its gross receipts for and during the year ending September 30 next preceding, and after the expiration of such five (5) years make a like annual payment into the treasury of the City of five (5) per cent. of its gross receipts. The Company shall pay such percentages only upon such portion of its gross receipts as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of such extension shall bear to the entire length of its line.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any other cause, or upon the dissolution of the company before such termination, the tracks and equipment of the company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and highways of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant, as above, the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice, in writing, from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of the contract hereby granted, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railroad company providing for payments for railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways, and the right to make the

requisite and necessary connections with the tracks of the Company, its successors or assigns, which shall be constructed under this contract.

Eighth—The railway to be constructed under this contract may be operated by overhead electric power, substantially similar to the overhead electric traction now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Ninth—The Company shall begin construction of the extension herein authorized within the time prescribed by the Railroad Law of the State of New York, and such extension shall be completed and shall be in operation on or before December 31, 1909; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Tenth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided in the Charter of the City; and the Company agrees to make application to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for permission to string and maintain its electrical conductors in the streets covered by this grant.

Eleventh—The said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction and operation, and the railway and property of the Company shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this contract.

Twelfth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Thirteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Fifteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of its tracks in any street or highway covered by this grant, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such street or highway between its tracks and the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities and whenever required by them to do so and in such manner as they may prescribe. In case of neglect by the Company to make pavements or repairs after the expiration of thirty days' notice to do so, or within thirty days after the publication of such notice in the City Record, the local authorities may make the same at the expense of such corporation, and such authorities may make such reasonable regulations and ordinances as to the rate of speed, mode of use of tracks and removal of ice and snow as the interest or convenience of the public may require.

Sixteenth—Any alteration which may be required to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any subsurface structures, pipes, conduits, etc., laid in the streets, on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Seventeenth—Should the grades or lines of the streets in which franchises herein granted be changed at any time during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street the Company shall take care of and protect the track at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the President of the Borough of Queens.

Eighteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from the privileges granted under this contract. The Company shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of The City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts from operation of the railway, together with such other information and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company, giving the Company notice and the right to intervene in any action or proceeding wherein such damages may be sought.

Twentieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall file with the Comptroller of The City of New York a bond in the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), with a surety or sureties to be approved by him, which bond shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual percentages for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railroad; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice, in writing, to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel-guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters. In the event of the forfeiture of the franchise for failure to complete the construction of the said extension and operate same on or before December 31, 1909, as herein provided, the said bond shall be returned to the Company.

Twenty-first—No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others

may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Twenty-second—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing. The Company agrees that notice printed in the CITY RECORD shall constitute sufficient notice within the meaning of this contract.

Twenty-third—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-fourth—This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of Article IV. of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the streets and highways and the surface railroads operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.

The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000) in cash within four (4) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done to exercise the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand two hundred dollars (\$2,200).

During the second term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand dollars (\$4,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000).

During the third term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500).

During the fourth term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500), and which shall be equal to six (6) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of five thousand five hundred dollars (\$5,500).

During the remaining term of five years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than six thousand two hundred dollars (\$6,200), and which shall be equal to six (6) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of six thousand two hundred dollars (\$6,200).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the gross earnings of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City. The payment of such minimum sums shall begin from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All such sums as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding.

Whenever such percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid to the said Comptroller on or before November

1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding. The fiscal year shall, end on September 30 next preceding said date of payment, and provisions of the Railroad Law as it now exists, or as it may hereafter be amended, relating to the manner of payments and statements of percentages of gross receipts of street railway companies not inconsistent with this contract, shall be strictly complied with.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets, avenues and highways shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this grant as above, the City (by the Board) shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract, and the said streets, avenues and highways shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Fifth—The annual charges or payment shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payments for railway or railway rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets, avenues or highways.

The use of said railway which shall be constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment, or any structures in public streets and avenues owned by the Company and used in connection therewith, shall be permitted by the Company to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets, avenues or highways for street railway purposes, for a distance not exceeding six thousand (6,000) feet of street, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall be equal to the legal interest on such proportion of the whole cost of the construction of such railway and structures and of the cost of keeping the tracks and track equipment in repair, as the number of cars operated by such company or individual shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation and the cost of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice, and all the other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract, in connection with the maintenance or the operation of the said railway so used. Provided, however, that if in the opinion of the Company the legal rate of interest of the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to pay for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board, and the Board may fix a percentage of the cost to be paid to the Company at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if in its opinion such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Eighth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, at any time after the first ten years of this contract, upon giving to the grantee one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or upon any portion of its route, by underground electric power substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system, and to remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose from the streets, avenues and highways of the City.

Ninth—Upon six months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two ducts not less than 3 inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Tenth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within six months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are obtained, or from the

date upon which the decision of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that such railway ought to be constructed is rendered in lieu of such consents, and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within eighteen months from the date of obtaining such consents or such decision, otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that such periods may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six months each; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company; and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Eleventh—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

Twelfth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon such railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board; provided, however, that the Company, during the first five years of this contract, shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board shall determine, after a hearing had thereon, that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Sixteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Seventeenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Eighteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three times every twenty-four hours when the temperature is above thirty-five degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed 60 feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only 60 feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Nineteenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by the Board.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets, avenues or highways upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the President of the Borough of Queens, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street, avenue or highway, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street, avenue or highway in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street, avenue or highway, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—Before any construction shall be commenced upon any portion of the route, written permits shall be obtained from the President of the Borough of Queens, and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the Company shall comply with any conditions which those officials may impose, as a condition upon which such permit is granted, provided such conditions are imposed for the purpose of protecting the structures over which those officials have jurisdiction.

Twenty-fourth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface rail-

way shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in a manner as directed by the President of the Borough of Queens.

Twenty-fifth—Should, in the opinion of the President of the Borough of Queens, the present roadway or any of said streets, avenues or highways be of insufficient width to accommodate both railway and other vehicular traffic, the Company shall widen such roadway under the direction of the President of the Borough of Queens to a width sufficient to accommodate such traffic, provided that no roadway shall be widened beyond the total width of the street, avenue or highway.

Twenty-sixth—Should, in the opinion of the Board at any time before or during construction of the railway, any of said streets, avenues or highways be of insufficient width to accommodate both railway and other vehicular traffic, the Company shall either construct and operate its railway upon a private right of way outside of the lines of such streets, avenues or highways, or shall purchase and cede to the City a strip of land adjacent thereto, for the purpose of widening the same to a width sufficient for the use of a street surface railway and for the accommodation of other vehicular traffic. If such street, avenue or highway is so widened, the Company shall grade the roadway thereon as directed by the President of the Borough of Queens.

Twenty-seventh—Where the bridges, viaducts or culverts encountered in the route are of insufficient width to carry the roadway as the same may be widened, as herein provided, or of insufficient strength to bear the additional load of a street surface railway, the Company shall either carry its tracks upon new structures independent of the existing ones, so as not to interfere with the present and future use by the City of such bridges, viaducts or culverts, or shall, without cost to the City, construct new bridges, viaducts or culverts sufficiently wide to carry the roadway as the same may be widened, as herein provided.

Twenty-eighth—The Company agrees to comply with any and all the rules which may be made by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for the purpose of preventing the destruction of the pipes or structures in the street by electrolysis, which may be caused by the electric current used by the Company, whether such rules affect the method of the original construction of said railway or any reconstruction, maintenance or repairs upon such railway at any time during the term of this contract.

Twenty-ninth—The Company hereby agrees that if the City is or shall become entitled to acquire, and shall at any time during the term of this contract acquire, or otherwise come into possession of any of the property on which this Company shall construct railway tracks, on the route herein described, no compensation shall be awarded for the right to have railway tracks thereon.

Thirtieth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, or at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
  2. The amount paid in as by last report.
  3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
  4. The funded debt by last report.
  5. The total amount of funded debt.
  6. The floating debt as by last report.
  7. The total amount of floating debt.
  8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
  9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
  10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
  11. The total amount expended for same.
  12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
  13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
  14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
  15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
  16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
  17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
  18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.
- and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Thirty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Thirty-second—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Thirty-third—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the

cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Thirty-fourth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within four (4) months after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the roadway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Comptroller of the City, on complaint made, shall, in writing, notify the Company through its President, to appear before him on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why it should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Comptroller to be in fault, said Comptroller shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of such penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to him to be just, and without legal procedure withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, in writing, pay to the Comptroller of the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be annulled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Thirty-sixth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets, avenues and highways in which the Company is authorized to operate.

Thirty-seventh—The words "notice" of "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-eighth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Sec. 3. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law, applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may be adopted affecting the surface railways operating in the City, not inconsistent with the terms and conditions hereinbefore fixed, shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Hon. FRANCIS K. PENDLETON, Corporation Counsel:

DEAR SIR—I transmit herewith a report of the Bureau of Street Openings for the quarter ending September 30, 1908.

Six (6) reports in street opening proceedings were confirmed in which the awards aggregated \$417,855.08, and the assessments for benefit \$193,691.92. The streets acquired cover 11,344.09 linear feet in length, or slightly over 2 miles.

Ten (10) reports were moved for confirmation, in which the awards amount to \$524,097.52, and the assessments for benefit to \$622,667.33, and the length of streets to be acquired covers 12,634.35 linear feet, or about two and two-fifths miles.

Of the 263 reports on which the Commissioners have been engaged in the whole Bureau, 22 have been completed and 241 have reached the stages enumerated below:
