RESOLUTIONS.

That the Department of Public Works be respectfully requested and directed to cause the plots or parcels of land lying between and bounded by Ninety-second and One Hundred and Ninth streets, and Third avenue and East River, to be drained by other means than by sewers, under and by virtue of the provisions of chapter 566, of the laws of 1871.

That the Board of Police be respectfully requested to detail twenty additional men to prevent the dumping of manure at the foot of Thirty-eighth street and North River, and on East river, between Forty-third and Forty-sixth streets.

That the Finance Committee be authorized to purchase such quantities of chloride of zinc as may be necessary for the present work of the Disinfecting Corps, at a price, delivered at the disinfecting depot, not to exceed eleven cents per gallon of 25° Remeaur.

That the Sanitary Superintendent be directed to detail Assistant Sanitary Inspector Strong to make the necessary inspections above One Hundred and Tenth street, and west of Sixth avenue, and that he be allowed \$20 per month for traveling expenses.

That the attorney be instructed to furnish an opinion at the next meeting of the Board as to whether the existing contract with the New York Rendering Company could legally be annulled and set aside in the event of their failure to remove on and after July 10th, 1873, offal and dead animals as therein provided, and what steps should be taken in such case to terminate such contract.

That Col. W. P. Prentice, be appointed the Attorney of this Board.

That the Department of Docks be requested to dredge out the slips at the foot of West Thirty-eighth street.

SANITARY BUREAU.

Record of the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 5, 1873.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was fifteen hundred and fifty, as follows: Six public buildings, five hundred and sixty-one tenement-houses, seventy-seven private dwellings, one hundred and seventy-six other dwellings, six manufactories and workshops, forty-three stores and warehouses, forty-seven stables, one market, fifteen fat-rendering establishments, fifty slaughter houses, one lime kiln, one brewery, seven gut cleaning establishments, forty sunken and vacant lots, seven manure dumps, six public sewers, sixty-nine yards, courts and areas, one hundred and fourteen cellars and basements, forty-five waste pipes and drains, one hundred and nine privies and water closets, one hundred and forty-four streets, gutters and sidewalks, five cisterns and cesspools, four dangerous

stairways, fifteen other nuisances. One visit of Sanitary Inspector to a case of contagious disease was made.

Six hundred and twenty reports were received from the Sanitary and the Assistant Sanitary Inspectors.

During the past week one hundred and ninety-two complaints have been received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Eighty-nine permits have been issued to the consignees of vessels for the discharge of cargoes, on vouchers from the Health officer of this port.

Fifty-nine orders for the abatement of nuisances previously served were returned as complied with.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported for the week ending July 5, 1873: Typhus fever, 1; scarlet fever, 58; measles, 34; diphtheria, 25.

During the week ending July 5, 1873, twenty-five miles of street gutter in Thompson street, Stewart's alley, and in Eighth, Tenth, Thirteenth and the lower portion of the Fourteenth Ward, were disinfected at a cost of \$151.50.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending July 5, 1873, was: Carcasses of veal (bob) 2; veal, 50 pounds; beef, 318 pounds; mutton, 330 pounds; poultry, 333 pounds; lamb, 229 pounds; fish, 2,190 pounds.

Four hundred and sixty-seven loads of night soil were removed by night scavengers from the privy vaults of the city during the week ending July 6, 1873.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending July 5, 1873, 630 burial permits for city deaths, 47 burial permits for bodies in transit, 40 burial permits for still-born infants, and 1 permit to disinter a body were granted; 630 deaths, 135 marriages, 426 births, 40 still-births, and 47 applications for transit permits, and 55 Coroner's certificates; 20 searches of the records of marriages, births and deaths were made, and 17 transcripts of deaths, 2 of marriages, and 3 of births from said records were issued.

To the Board of Assistant Aldermen:

Your attention is called to the following provisions of law relative to official advertising, and you are requested to conform strictly to their requirements in regard to all advertisements of your Department.

Section 111 of Chapter 335 of the laws of 1873, provides for the publication of an official paper, to be known as THE CITY RECORD, in which—

"All advertising required to be done for the city, and all notices required by law or ordinance to be published in Corporation papers, shall be inserted, at the public expense, only in THE CITY RECORD, and a publication therein shall be a sufficient compliance with any law or ordinance requiring publication of such matters or notices; but there may be inserted in two morning and two evening and two weekly papers published in the English language, and in one newspaper published in the German language, all in said city, to be designated by the Mayor, Corporation Counsel and Commissioner of Public Works, annually, brief advertisements calling attention to any contracts intended to be awarded or bonds to be sold, and referring for full information to said CITY RECORD. No money shall be paid from the City Treasury for advertising hereafter done except such as is herein authorized, and no action shall be maintained or judgment obtained against the city for any advertising hereafter done except such as is herein authorized."

By Section 3 of Chapter 758 of the Laws of 1873, it was also provided that "Nothing contained in Section 111 of Chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873 shall prevent the publication of any advertisement required by law, provided, however, that no such publication shall be made, unless the same is authorized by a concurrent vote of the Mayor, Corporation Counsel and Commissioner of Public Works."

Section 91 of said chapter contains the following provision:

"And all contracts shall be entered into by the appropriate heads of departments, and shall, except as herein otherwise provided, be founded on sealed bids or proposals, made in compliance with public notice duly advertised in THE CITY RECORD, said notice to be published at least ten days."

SEC. 2. It is hereby ordained that all officers appointed under the city government shall receive a fixed and stated salary, the amount of which shall be established as by law provided.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to prevent vendors from using lights to exhibit their goods, unless properly enclosed to prevent injuries to the clothing and persons of pedestrians.

It shall not be lawful for any vender, pedlar or other person to use any description of lamps, or other lights to exhibit their goods or wares in any avenue, street, lane, highway or public place, within the Corporate limits of the City of New York, unless such lamp or other light shall be securely enclosed in a glass globe, of sufficient size to prevent the flame from said lamp or other light from appearing above the top of such glass globe under a penalty of ten dollars for every violation of the provision of the ordinance.

Sec. 2. The Commissioners of Police are hereby directed to carry into effect the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
