AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, March 10, 1886, at 3 o'clock, P., M.

Commissioners present—The Comptroller, Commissioners Spencer, Dowd and Baldwin.

Also Chief Engineer Church, and Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams, of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the special meeting of March 6, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in vouchers Nos. 1542 to 1571; also of the monthly estimates for work done by the contractors during the month of February, included in vouchers 1531 to 1541, and amounting to \$365,216.18; and, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, all of said vouchers were approved by the Commissioners, and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 6, 1886, was 746, which is 5.0 below the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.21 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,425,702.
