PROCLAMATION.

\$1,000 REWARD.

MAYOR'S OFFICE,
NEW YORK, September 6, 1875.

Whereas, JAMES H. NOE was brutally assaulted at his place of business, at No 275 Greenwich street, in this city, on the 22d day of August, 1875, by one or more persons attempting a burglarious entry of his premises, and died from the effect of the wounds then received, on the 26th day of August, 1875; now,

I, WILLIAM H. WICKHAM, Mayor of the City of New York, do hereby offer a reward of one thousand dollars for the discovery and conviction of the party or parties who may have committed the deed, the said reward to be paid on the conviction of the said party or parties, and the certificate of the District Attorney that such conviction was had upon the testimony of the person or persons claiming the reward. But all claims not presented to the Mayor within twenty days after such conviction shall be disregarded.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

WEDNESDAY, September 22, 1875.

The Board of Education held an adjourned session on Wednesday, September 22, at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—Wm. H. Neilson, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Dowd, Fuller, Halsted, Herring, Jenkins, Klamroth, Lewis, Man, Patterson, Townsend, Traud, West, Wetmore, and Wood—17.

Absent—Commissioners Kelly, Mathewson, Schell, and Vermilye—4.

The consideration of the minutes of the preceding session was postponed until the next meeting of the Board.

The President announced that this was an adjourned session of the Board, held specially to consider the Financial Estimate for the year 1876, submitted at the last meeting (see CITY RECORD, September 21, page 1540).

Commissioner Wood offered a resolution that, after the special business was considered, the Board proceed to take up any other matters ready for its action. Adopted.

THE FINANCIAL ESTIMATE.

Commissioner Beardslee moved that the Estimate reported by the Finance Committee be adopted.

Commissioner Wood moved to amend by adding \$168,600 for salaries of additional Teachers in the Primary Schools. Lost.

The President put the question on the adoption of the Estimate as reported, and it was adopted. The President laid before the Board the following

COMMUNICATIONS.

From the Trustees of the Sixth Ward, nominating a Teacher of Grammar in English for the Evening School. Referred to the Evening Schools Committee.

From the Trustees of the Fourteenth Ward, relative to Teachers in the Ward. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Trustees of the Sixteenth Ward, asking for an appropriation of \$625.04, to pay sundry bills for repairs, etc. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Trustees of the Twentieth Ward, relative to the appointment of Principal for the Evening School. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Trustees of the Twentieth Ward, asking for a new piano for Primary Department, Grammar School No. 33. Referred to the Committee on School Furniture.

From Mlle. Marie Verel, applying for appointment as Teacher of French. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From John J. Hunt and John K. Sharkey, for appointment as Agents of Truancy. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

From Hon. P. G. Duffy, resigning his position of Principal of Grammar School No. 29. Accepted, and ordered on file.

From James Coms, late Janitor of Grammar School No. 64. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Commissioner Wetmore presented a report from the Committee on Nomination of Trustees, submitting the following resolution :

Resolved, That the resignation of Charles F. MacLean, as Trustee of Common Schools for the Fifteenth Ward, and of W. C. Whitney, as Trustee of Common Schools for the Twenty-first Ward, be and the same are hereby accepted ; and that John M. Knox, residence No. 40 Great Jones street, be and he is hereby appointed Trustee of Common Schools for the Fifteenth Ward, *vice* MacLean, resigned, to hold office until the first day of January (1879), eighteen hundred and seventy-nine ; and that Joseph B. Skidmore, residence No. 33 East Thirty-eighth street, be and he hereby is appointed Trustee of Common Schools for the Twenty-first Ward, *vice* Whitney, resigned, to hold office until the 1st day of January (1876), eighteen hundred and seventy-six ; said appointments being made by and in pursuance of the authority conferred upon this Board by the 6th section of the Act of March, 1873, as amended by chapter 112 and 215 of the Laws of 1873. Adopted.

Commissioner Jenkins presented a report from the Committee on Evening Schools, recommending the transfer of the Evening School from Grammar School No. 46 to Grammar School No. 43. Adopted.

Also, nominating additional Teachers for Evening Schools. Adopted.

Commissioner Man presented a report from the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, as follows :

To the Board of Education :

The Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, in the matter of the communications from the Deputy Comptroller relative to certain payments due under contracts, and inquiring "if any reason exists why the penalty in the several cases should not be enforced," respectfully report :

That it has not been customary for the Board of Education heretofore to enforce penalties, unless in case of bad faith on the part of the contractors, or of actual detriment to the public interest ; and in the cases named in the communication of the Deputy Comptroller, it does not appear that there has been either bad faith on the part of the contractors, or actual detriment to the public interest ; but it does satisfactorily appear, by the certificate of the Superintendent of School Buildings, that there has been neither ; and this Committee consider that such certificate of the performance of the work should be satisfactory evidence to the Comptroller ; and unless moneys are paid promptly upon the presentation of the usual audit of the officers of the Board of Education, and the certificate of the Superintendent of School Buildings, the public interest must inevitably suffer.

Commissioner Halsted presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, nominating Wm. Seiberg for Principal of Grammar School No. 43. Adopted.

Also, nominating Thomas S. O'Brien for Principal of Grammar School No. 29. Adopted.

Also, to withdraw nominations in the Thirteenth Ward of Principal and Vice-Principal. Adopted.

Commissioner Herring presented a report from the Committee on Course of Study and School Books, recommending that sundry books, maps, etc., be added to the list of supplies, etc. Laid on the table.

Also, that the communication from the Thirteenth Ward, asking that Branch Primary School No. 4 be made a full Primary be referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools. Report adopted, and application referred.

Commissioner Wood presented a report from the Committee on Normal Schools, to accept the resignation of Miss Helen G. Morgan, as an Instructor at the Saturday Sessions of the Normal College, and recommending that Prof. J. A. Gillett and Arthur McMullin be appointed to full time at the Saturday Sessions of the College. Adopted.

Also, for an appropriation of \$1,000 for flagging, laying out the grounds, etc. Referred to Finance Committee.

Commissioner Wood gave notice of a proposed amendment to the By-laws.

The inquiry relative to the lots on Lexington avenue, between Sixty-seventh and Sixty-eighth streets, on motion of Commissioner Patterson, was referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools.

Commissioner Herring gave notice that at the next meeting of the Board he should call up the German question.

On the call for information, made by Commissioner Wood, relative to the question pending in regard to the control and disbursement of the School moneys by the Board, the President gave the Board the information called for.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, on Wednesday, September 22, 1875, at 2:50 o'clock P. M.

Present—Andrew H. Green, Comptroller, and William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.

Absent—John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held August 2, 1875, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists, transmitted by the Board of Assessors with communication dated August 31, 1875, viz.:

1. Ninety-fifth and Ninety-eighth streets, sewers, between First and Third avenues ; and in First avenue, between Ninety-fifth and One Hundredth streets, with branches.
2. Greenwich street, sewer, between Clarkson and Leroy streets.
3. Hudson street (west side), sewer, between Spring and Vandam streets.
4. Hudson street (west side), sewer, between Charlton and King streets.
5. Sheriff street, sewer, between Grand and Broome streets.
6. Greenwich street, sewer, between Charlton and King streets.
7. Hudson street (east side), sewer, between Charlton and King streets.
8. Greenwich street, sewer, between King and West Houston streets.
9. Washington street, sewer, between West Tenth and Charles streets.
10. Tenth avenue (west side), basin, between Twenty-fifth and Twenty-sixth streets.
11. Stuyvesant street and Second avenue, basin, on northwest corner of.
12. One Hundred and Seventeenth street and Sixth avenue, basin, on southwest corner of.
13. One Hundred and Eleventh street and Avenue St. Nicholas, basin, on southwest corner of.
14. One Hundred and Twelfth street and Avenue St. Nicholas, basin, on southwest corner of.
15. Cherry street, basins, between New Chambers and Roosevelt streets.
16. One Hundred and Sixteenth street, regulating and grading, from Seventh to Eighth avenue.
17. Sixty-seventh street, regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter, and flagging, from Fourth to Fifth avenue.
18. Fifty-fifth street, regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter, and flagging, between Eleventh avenue and North river.
19. Thirty-fourth street (south side), flagging, between 1st avenue and East river.
20. Eleventh avenue, paving with stone blocks, from Fifty-second to Fifty-ninth street.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed thereto, on motion of the Comptroller they were severally confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for building sewer in Manhattan street, between Twelfth and St. Nicholas avenues, received from the Board of Assessors with communication of July 22, 1875, and having objections filed to the same, by Mary G. Pinkney and Martin Zborowski, was also presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

A communication from the Commissioner of Public Works, inclosing report of the Engineer in charge of sewers upon the objections of Mary G. Pinkney, was also transmitted by the Board of Assessors with the assessment list.

Mr. Martin Zborowski was heard in relation to the objections filed by him to said assessment list.

After consideration of the objections and the accompanying papers, on motion of the Comptroller, the objections were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for regulating and grading Eighty-sixth street, from Eighth to Tenth avenue, received from the Board of Assessors with communication of July 20, 1875, and having objections filed to the same by Mr. Martin Zborowski, was presented to the Board.

After hearing Mr. Zborowski, on motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment list was laid over.

At 3:35 P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.
