MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,
No. 61 Elm Street,
New York City, January 24, 1906.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday morning, January 24, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

All the Commissioners were present.

A public hearing was held on the matter of amending the classification of positions in the exempt class in the Municipal Court by changing the lines, "Deputy Clerk for each district in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and the First District of Queens," and "Assistant Court Clerk," to read, "Assistant Clerk for each district in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens."

Hon. William Rasquin, Jr., Justice of the Municipal Court, Borough of Queens, Second District, addressed the Commission in behalf of the proposed amendment.

Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also addressed the Commission. The hearing then closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of Civil Service Rule VII., clause 1, by adding thereto, after the words "shall be" in the third line, the words "announced to the various departments," and by striking therefrom, in the same line, the words "published at the beginning of each year," so that the same would read:

"So far as practicable, examinations for admission to positions in a graded service shall be held periodically, and the dates thereof shall be (announced to the various departments), with such information with reference to the conditions of each as can be given."

Mr. Elliot H. Goodwin, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, addressed the Commission in opposition to the amendment. The hearing then closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session the minutes of the meeting held January 20 were approved.

The Commission having been informed of the death of Mr. Peter D. Byrne, No. 207 President street, Brooklyn, N. Y., an Examiner in its office, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the Commission records with regret the death of one of its most faithful and efficient employees.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the salary of Mr. Charles R. Miles, Junior Clerk in the office of the Commission, be and the same is hereby fixed at the rate of \$900 per annum, to take effect February 1, 1906.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the name of Mr. David Marks, who was appointed by the Commission an expert to conduct an examination for Riveter, be and the same hereby is removed from the Commission's roster of Expert Examiners.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the exempt class in the Municipal Court, as fixed by the Civil Service rules, be and the same is hereby amended as follows:

By eliminating the lines, "Deputy Clerk for each district in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and the First District of Queens," and "Assistant Court Clerk," and substituting therefor the following:

"Assistant Court Clerk for each district in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Queens."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That action on the proposed amendment of Civil Service Rule VII., clause 1, be and the same is hereby postponed.

Mr. Alfred J. Stuart, No. 706 Union avenue, Brooklyn, who had been notified by the Commission that he would be given an opportunity to be heard as to why his name should not be stricken from the list for promotion to Assistant Foreman in the Fire Department, for the reason that he had been dismissed from the position of Fireman on April 28, 1905, then addressed the Commission. Mr. Stuart stated that he had appealed to the courts for reinstatement in the position of Fireman and that his case was then before the Appellate Division for adjudication, and requested that the Commission take no action with reference to striking his name from the said list for Assistant Foreman until the courts had decided his case. A communication was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated January 17, recommending that Max Lipzig, No. 55 Johnson avenue, Brooklyn, candidate for Sweeper in the Department of Street Cleaning, be summoned for a re-examination. The Labor Clerk stated that the candidate had filed an application for the said position and it seemed evident that he had passed the examination; but that through some mistake his application blank had been mislaid. The recommendation of the Labor Clerk was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, forwarding the application of Mr. J. B. Z. Raucher, for reinstatement in the position of Monitor in the Civil Service Commission, together with the statement that the candidate was asked to resign through a misapprehension of the duties he was performing, the Chief Examiner being under the impression that he was a teacher in the City College, and that therefore, his name could not remain on the list of Monitor; but that such was not the fact, and stating further that the candidate's services had been satisfactory. The reinstatement was approved and the Secretary was instructed to issue the certificate.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, stating that it appeared from a report of Mr. Byrne, Examiner, that Meyer G. Levine, No. 85 Sixteenth street, Brooklyn, candidate for Office Boy, was ineligible for certification for appointment to that position, he being over eighteen years of age, the maximum age limit for the same.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to remove the name of Meyer G. Levine, No. 85 Sixteenth street, Brooklyn, from the eligible list for Office Boy, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII., paragraph 14, the candidate having been ineligible to enter the said examination, for the reason that he was over eighteen years of age, the maximum age prescribed for candidates for that position.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, stating that from a report of Mr. Byrne, Examiner, it appeared that Richard P. Keelon, No. 563 East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, candidate for the position of Office Boy, was ineligible for certification for appointment to that position for the reason that he was over the maximum age prescribed for candidates in that examination.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to remove the name of Richard P. Keelon, No. 563 East One Hundred and Fiftieth street, from the eligible list for Office Boy, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII., paragraph 14, the candidate having been ineligible to enter the said examination, for the reason that he was over eighteen years of age, the maximum age prescribed for candidates for that position.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 11, stating that Henry Bluementhal, No. 109 Ridge street, candidate for Apothecary, pointed out no error or mistake of marking in his appeal for a rerating of his papers, and that the same, therefore, did not come within the provisions of Civil Service Rule IX. The appeal was denied.

A report was presented from Mr. P. D. Byrne, Examiner, upon the complaint of the International Union of Steam Engineers to the effect that various persons in the employ of the City Departments, who were carried on the pay-rolls as Stokers, were performing the duties of Engineers, in violation of the Civil Service Law and section 342 of the Greater New York Charter; which matter had been referred to him for investigation. It appeared from Mr. Byrne's report that the majority of the persons whose employment was complained of, were operating low-pressure plants, the pressure maintained being not over ten pounds, and that the heads of the Departments therefore did not feel justified, in the interests of economy, to assign Engineers to care for same; that several of the persons whose employment was complained of, had been regularly appointed from the list for Engineman, and that the other positions were included in the non-competitive class and that they were appointed by the heads of their Departments direct. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the International Union of Steam Engineers and state that the Commission had carefully considered the matter, but could not find any grounds on which to withhold its certificate from the pay-rolls of the persons whose employment was complained of.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, with reference to the case of Mary Leahy, candidate No. 73 for Police Matron, and submitting a report from Mr. Byrne, Examiner, in reference thereto. It appeared from the said report that the candidate had been disqualified upon the eligible list because of her failure to submit proof as to the date of her birth, the same having been rendered necessary because of the fact that during the course of the examination she made several statements regarding the same. Mr. Byrne stated that the candidate had now submitted an extract from the baptismal register of the Church of Mitchelstown, Ireland, from which it appeared that she was baptized on February 4, 1856, also a letter from the pastor of the church referred to. The proof submitted being satisfactory to the Commission, the Secretary was instructed to remove the disqualification from the candidate's name.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, in answer to the request of the Commission for information as to the exact date upon which the rating of the examination papers submitted by candidates in the examination

for Roundsman of Police, held in December, 1903, was completed and the marks forwarded to the Secretary to be registered upon the eligible list, stating that the papers were completed on April 26, 1904.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for promotion to the rank of Roundsman in the Police Department resulting from the examination held on December 22, 1903, be and the same is hereby established by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as of April 26, 1904.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, transmitting a report of Mr. Byrne, Examiner, with reference to the record of John M. Conant, Assistant Clerk in the Department of Education. It appeared from said report that the record of the Department of Education showed that the candidate was appointed on October 1, 1887, but that for some unaccountable reason the records in the office of the Commission show the date of the candidate's appointment to be October 1, 1897; that upon an investigation of the matter it appeared that the former date was the correct one and that the roster of the Civil Service, on file in the Commission's office, was incorrect so far as it related to the date of Mr. Conant's appointment. The Secretary was instructed to correct the said date on the roster to October 1, 1887.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, transmitting a report of Mr. Byrne, Examiner, with reference to the case of David A. Hennesy, candidate for Stationary Engineman. It appeared that the candidate signed the names of four vouchers to his application, under a misapprehension of the rules, and requested permission to submit a duplicate application, properly filled out, in accordance with the requirement of the Commission. The same was accepted.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 18, with reference to the appeal of Fred. H. Parsons, candidate for Assistant Engineer, Board of Water Supply, for a rerating of his papers. It appeared from the said report that an examination of the rating sheets of the two Examiners who rated the candidate's papers disclosed such a remarkably close correspondence in their ratings on the several questions, as to preclude any idea that an error was made. The appeal was denied.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 18, with reference to the appeal of G. L. Christian, candidate for Assistant Engineer, Board of Water Supply, stating that on the specific question to which the candidate referred in his appeal, an error in transcribing was made, which, when corrected, would make the mark on that particular question 95, instead of 45; but, after allowing that increase, the candidate's mark on the technical paper would not be more than 57 per cent., and that no other error was made in his rating. The Secretary was instructed to direct the Chief Examiner to give the candidate credit for the mark of 95 on the particular question in which an error was made, and to amend his percentage accordingly; and to further communicate with the candidate and inform him that as no other errors were made in the rating of his papers, his mark was not sufficient to entitle him to a place upon the eligible list.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 19, stating that the examination for Junior Clerk was completed on January 17.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for the position of Junior Clerk be and the same is hereby established by the Civil Service Commission as of January 17, 1906, and the Secretary is hereby directed to certify names from said list in answer to all requisitions for same.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 20, stating that the application of William A. Stoutenbergh, No. 2122 Arthur avenue, candidate for Financial Clerk, had been rejected under Rule VII., paragraph 14, on account of a false statement contained therein. The action of the Chief Examiner was sustained.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, stating that the applications of Edward Greene, No. 243 Clinton street, candidate for Measurer, and Richard E. Mahoney, No. 806 Bergen street, Brooklyn, candidate for Prison Keeper, had been rejected by him under Rule VII., both persons having been dismissed from the City service. It appeared from the report of an investigation made by Mr. P. D. Byrne, Examiner, that Mr. Greene had been dismissed from the Bureau of Buildings, Borough of Manhattan, on the charge of having violated the rules of that Department by indorsing a patent article; and that the second-named candidate had been dismissed from the Police Department by reason of charges which had been preferred against him. After an investigation of both cases, the application of Edward Greene was accepted, and the action of the Chief Examiner in rejecting the application of Richard E. Mahoney was sustained, in view of the character of his record in the Police Department.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, asking for instructions with reference to the case of Michael J. Hurley, candidate for Office Boy, and submitting a report from Mr. Byrne, Examiner, with regard to the matter. It appeared that one of the vouchers procured by the candidate was his brother, whose signature he had requested without knowing that the relationship disqualified him as a voucher. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the candidate and request him to submit an additional voucher in place of the one which could not be accepted by the Commission.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 16, asking instructions from the Commission with reference to the case of Allen F. Coleman, candidate for Stationary Engineman, together with a report from Mr. Byrne regarding the same. It appeared that the candidate submitted a firm name as one of his vouchers, contrary to the requirements of the Commission. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the candidate and request him to furnish another voucher in place of the improper one.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 19, asking instructions from the Commission as to whether the application of Harrison M. Luzzi, candidate for Office Boy, should be accepted, in view of the statement made by the candidate in answer to question 6 of the preliminary sheet, to the effect that his father had had the voucher's signatures attached to his application, and that he could not recall same. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the candidate and request him to submit a duplicate application filled out in accordance with the printed instructions on the application blank.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated January 19, stating that the applications of Edward Owens, No. 2204 Arthur avenue, and Joseph Kinsler, No. 43 Grand street, candidates for Probation Officer, had been rejected under Rule VII., on account of bad character. After investigation of the matter the action of the Chief Examiner was sustained.

The application of Emil E. Fischer, candidate for Financial Clerk, was rejected for the reason that the candidate was not 21 years of age, the minimum age prescribed for that position.

A communication was presented from Mr. P. D. Byrne, Examiner, dated January 13, with reference to the case of Maurice J. Fahey, candidate for Patrolman. It appeared that the candidate stated in his application that he was born on April 6, 1876, and that at the time of his physical examination he stated that the date of his birth was April 6, 1874, which date, if correct, would render him ineligible for appointment. Mr. Byrne stated that he had requested the candidate to submit more proof as to the date of his birth, but all he had produced was a policy of industrial insurance from which it appeared that he had not yet attained his thirtieth year, but that as the same was issued in October last, the Examiner doubted its value in determining the candidate's age, and requested instructions from the Commission as to the determination of the matter. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Fahey and request him to appear before the Commission on Friday, February 2, 1906, to show cause why his name should not be stricken from the list for Patrolman under the provisions of Rule VII., paragraph 14.

A communication was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated January 11, requesting that the Commission consider a request from the Superintendent of Highways, Borough of Queens, for approval of the reinstatement of William Ordemann, Rammer in that Department, who was dropped from the pay-roll on December 27, 1905, for failing to report for duty. It appeared that the request had been denied by the Commission for the reason that Mr. Ordemann had been dropped from the pay-roll by order of the present Superintendent's predecessor; but in view of the statements contained in a communication from the Hon. Joseph Bermel to the effect that the candidate's absence from duty was caused by illness, and that the same was unavoidable, the Commission reconsidered its determination in the matter and instructed the Secretary to communicate with the President of the Borough of Queens and state that the reinstatement would be approved upon the production of a doctor's certificate setting forth the facts in the case.

A communication was presented from Mr. H. B. Boudinot, Clerk, dated January 16, with reference to the necessity of requiring applicants for Civil Service positions who are not citizens by birth, to furnish proof of their citizenship; and stating further that the applicants for Patrolman and Fireman are now required to do so, but that said requirement had not been applied to other positions. The Secretary was instructed to direct the Application Clerk to require candidates for admission to all examinations who are not citizens by birth to furnish proof of their citizenship before accepting their applications.

The application of Thomas F. Curran, No. 56 Hale avenue, Brooklyn, candidate for Probation Officer and Special Parole Officer, was rejected, for the reason that the candidate had been retired from the Police Department for disability.

The application of John S. Clancy, No. 994 Dawson street, The Bronx, candidate for Probation Officer and Special Parole Officer, was rejected for the reason that he was retired from the Police Department for disability.

A report was presented from Miss Mildred G. Smith, Examiner, with reference to the direction of the Commission that James A. Graham, candidate for promotion to first grade Clerk in the Department of Finance, be given credit for two words on his spelling paper that appeared to the Commission to be spelled correctly, but for which he received no credit. Miss Smith stated in her report that the word "received," which the Commission thought was spelled correctly, had been dictated "retrieved," therefore the candidate had not been given credit for same. In view of that fact, the Secretary was instructed to direct the Examiner to give the candidate credit for the one word which he had spelled correctly.

A communication was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, dated January 16, stating the disposition of the following resolutions of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, which had been forwarded to it for approval:

Amending the classification of positions in the competitive class, Part I, by including therein the title "Sealer of Weights and Measures." Approved.

Amending the classification of positions in the exempt class, in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, by substituting for the title "Chief Engineer of Surface Construction" the title "Chief Engineer of Light and Power." Approved.

Amending clauses 2, 3, 4 and 10 of Rule XIX. Approved.

Amending the classification of positions in the exempt class, in the Court of Special Sessions, by adding thereto the title "Male Probation Officer in the First Division." Laid over.

Amending the classification of positions in the Labor Class, Part II, by adding thereto the title "Climber and Pruner." Continued on the calendar for the next meeting.

Amending the classification of positions in the exempt class, in the Board of Water Supply, by including therein the following titles:

Four Division Engineers (additional).

Six Department Engineers.

Three General Engineering Inspectors.

Three Designing Engineers.

One Private Secretary to the Chief Engineer.

Approved so far as it relates to the position of one Private Secretary to the Chief Engineer. So far as it relates to the other positions, continued on the calendar.

The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the State Civil Service Commission, dated January 20, transmitting an opinion from the Attorney General, dated January 11, in relation to the proper classification of the Court of General Sessions, New York City, and requesting that the Civil Service Commission of New York City "strike from its rules and classification all reference to the Court of General Sessions, to the end that the said Court might then be added to the classification of the State Commission." The matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated January 20, requesting approval of the provisional appointment of Messrs. C. F. O'Neill, Philip J. Arendes, Charles Sickels and Louis E. Sowell as Topographical Draughtsmen, and George Rookey, Harold Fackner and John J. Corrigan as Axemen, pending the establishment of eligible lists for those positions, in accordance with Rule XII, paragraph 3. The request was granted, and the Secretary was instructed to direct the Chief Examiner to conduct a non-competitive examination of the candidates.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, Richmond, dated January 22, requesting the Commission to conduct a special examination for the position of Steam Roller Engineman for the purpose of establishing an eligible list from which persons could be selected to serve in that capacity, and stating the difficulty that department had experienced in securing persons from the list for Stationary Engineman who were willing to operate a steam roller. After consideration of the matter, it appearing that the title Steam Roller Engineman did not appear in the classification, the Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the matter of classifying the said position in Part I. of the competitive class, to be held on Friday morning, February 2, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

A communication was presented from the Fire Commissioner, dated January 19, stating that the following additional positions would be necessary in his department in view of the increased work in the new Repair Shops:

Coremaker, Moulder, Carriage Body Maker, Rubber Tire Repairer and Patternmaker or Machine Wood Worker,

—and requesting that said positions be appropriately classified. The Secretary was instructed to order a public hearing on the proposed amendment to be held on Friday morning, February 2, 1906, at 10 o'clock.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Fire Department, dated January 20, notifying the Commission of the reinstatement of Thomas B. Madigan in the position of Assistant Foreman in that department, pursuant to an order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, dated December 29, 1905, and in accordance with an opinion of the Acting Corporation Counsel, dated January 16, 1906. The Secretary was instructed to certify Mr. Madigan's pay-roll when presented.

A communication was presented from Comptroller Metz, dated January 15, requesting that the name of Louis E. Felix be restored to the list for Law Clerk, and stating that Mr. Felix, who was certified to his department for appointment to that position in July, 1905, was out of town when the notice was sent him and he therefore was unable to reply to same within the four days prescribed by the rules, but that he had subsequently called at the Department of Finance and had declined appointment to the position offered him for the reason that the salary was but \$1,200 per annum. The Secretary was instructed to correct his records to show that Mr. Felix declined appointment to the position of Law Clerk in the Finance Department on the score of insufficient compensation.

A communication was presented from Comptroller Metz, dated January 15, requesting approval of a leave of absence, without pay, for three months from January 1, 1906, granted Joseph Flynn, Clerk in the Bureau for the Collection of Taxes, Borough of Manhattan. It appearing from the physician's certificate furnished that the leave of absence was granted on account of illness, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 22, requesting the Commission to cancel the examination for promotion from Assistant Engineer to Principal Assistant Engineer in that department scheduled for January 26.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the examination for promotion from Assistant Engineer to Principal Assistant Engineer in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, which examination was ordered by the Commission on November 2, 1905, be and the same is hereby canceled.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 15, stating that he had rescinded the notice of suspension given Messrs. A. Ingvall and C. F. Kelly, Inspectors of Regulating, Grading and Paving in the Bureau of Highways of his department, notice of which had been forwarded to the Civil Service Commission on the 9th inst. It appearing that the said persons were Nos. 21 and 29 on the preferred list for Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and state that the Commission could not recognize his action.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 17, requesting an amendment of the classification of positions in the exempt class, under the heading "Bureau of Buildings in each Borough," by changing the line, "Chief Inspector," to read "2 Chief Inspectors." The Secretary was in-

structed to arrange a public hearing on the matter to be held Friday morning, February 2, at 10 o'clock.

A communication was presented from the Librarian of the Queens Borough Library, dated December 16, stating that at a meeting of the Board of Trustees of that institution held January 12 it was resolved that the Civil Service Commission be requested to prepare an eligible list for Junior Assistant Librarian, and that pending the establishment of such a list they be authorized to make six provisional appointments under the provisions of Rule XII, paragraph 3. The Secretary was instructed to request the Chief Examiner to conduct an open competitive examination for the position of Junior Assistant Librarian, and also to arrange a non-competitive examination for the six candidates named by the Queens Borough Library to qualify them for provisional employment until such time as permanent selections could be made from the new eligible list.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated January 22, requesting that the name of Mr. Joseph L. Baxter, Commander of U. S. Grant Council, No. 1, of the Union Veterans' Association, relative to the employment of Charles H. Caldwell, Watchman in the Department of Docks and Ferries. Mr. Collins stated that a thorough investigation of the matter had been made and the facts showed no basis for the complaint; that Mr. Caldwell's record in the department was a very bad one, he having been charged with absence from post and various misdemeanors, and that he would have been discharged but for the fact that he was dealt with leniently in view of being a veteran of the Civil War. The Secretary was instructed to forward a copy of Mr. Collins' communication to the Union Veterans' Association.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated January 16, requesting the Commission to authorize a continuation of the employment of Daniel H. Weisner, M. D., Oculist, for a period not exceeding two and one-half months, with compensation at the rate of \$100 a month. NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 430 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Council, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
