REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1907.

Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, Litchfield Mansion, Prospect Park, Brooklyn, July 1. 1907.

STATEMENT OF WORK PERFORMED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS OF THE BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS, DURING THE THREE MONTHS FROM APRIL 1 TO JUNE 30, 1907.

During the quarter just closed an unusually large amount of work was done throughout the system along lines of permanent improvement and betterment, besides attending to the ordinary maintenance of the parks and parkways.

Prospect Park received special attention. Large areas of lawns were resoiled, spaded, seeded and sodded. This includes the section fronting on the new boathouse, the area surrounding the main entrance, the vicinity of the new granite steps on the Fifteenth street side of the park, and considerable grading and shaping up of the

Beds for the summer flowering plants were prepared in all the parks, and the planting was done early in the season. In Prospect Park the gardeners set out 32.825 plants, while the smaller parks were provided with 47,556 flowering plants. The borders surrounding the flower garden in Prospect Park were replenished with flowering shrubs to the extent of 600, consisting mainly of rhododendrons, kalmias and azaleas, the resultant display during the month of May being an exceptionally fine one.

The removal of the dead chestnut and other trees in Prospect Park continued from time to time. To restore the tree plantations, 570 trees were set out and 1,000 shrubs were planted throughout the park. Over 20,000 square feet of grass sod were laid. Other planting to a considerable extent was done on the Ocean parkway between Avenue E and Eighteenth avenue and between Coney Island creek and the Concourse, Eastern parkway between Flatbush and Bedford avenues, Prospect Park West, First and Fifteenth streets, Fifteenth street between Ninth avenue and Coney Island avenue, Coney Island avenue between Fifteenth street and the Park Circle, and Seaside Park at Coney Island at Coney Island.

On the Ocean parkway the work consisted in the removal of 168 silver maples planted when the parkway was originally laid out, and which had outlived their usefulness. Tree holes of considerable size were dug and each filled with six cubic yards of selected topsoil. Altogether 526 young and healthy specimens of trees were planted on this parkway. The borders between the cycle paths and the curb were raised, graded, topsoiled, seeded and sodded.

On the Eastern parkway the planting spaces received similar treatment, and 68

Sixtieth streets, was thoroughly gone over, and altogether 1,270 fine shrubs set out. Red Hook Park received a top dressing of 2,000 cubic yards of selected topsoil, which was spread, graded and seeded. The trees and shrubs were cleared and other improvements made. Carroll Park also received considerable topsoil during the last quarter. This was spread and 6000 square feet of grass sod laid. The trees and shrubs were cleared of dead wood and insects and otherwise cared for and greatly improved.

Considerable attention was devoted toward restoring the roadways throughout our parks and parkways. The wear and tear on the surface of our macadam and gravel roads is such that the life of the roadway scarcely exceeds one season. As a result a large force of men were kept busy throughout the quarter making repairs and resurfacing the roads and bridle paths.

In Prospect Park the roadways on Breeze Hill were entirely rebuilt. The West drive from the Centre drive to Fifteenth street gate, the Well House drive from the Centre drive to Breeze Hill, the West drive from Well House drive to Coney Island gate, and the Centre drive from the Three Arch Bridge to the Woodland drive were resurfaced with a layer of Hudson river gravel 4 inches in thickness, thoroughly compacted by steam rollers. The remainder of the roads throughout the park were carefully gone over and repairs made wherever necessary. The bridle paths were cleaned and harrowed, and are in good condition.

Plans and specifications have been prepared and a contract advertised for the rebuilding of a large portion of the paths and walks in Prospect Park, as well as a number of the smaller parks. It is proposed to replace the broken and cracked tar and asphalt pavements in Prospect Park and the cinder and gravel paths in the smaller parks with a modern asphalt tile pavement. It is expected that all this work will be completed before the end of the summer.

The work of completing and emplacing the screens and winter doors, the installation of a marble fountain and the

A contract was likewise awarded for 400 chairs and 100 tables. The entire building is now complete, and will be ready for occupancy in a fortnight.

resumed, and on June 30 was almost completed, there remaining but the work of placing the hardware and cleaning up to be accomplished.

The work of finishing and completing the granite steps on the Fifteenth street side of Prospect Park was carried to completion, and it adds greatly to that section of the

park.

The work of connecting up the new comfort station at the main entrance to Prospect Park with the sewer in Park plaza was started and completed during the quarter just ended.

The work of cleaning up, grading and enclosing the Willink entrance addition to Prospect Park was resumed, and is now almost completed.

Highland Park.

The drives in Highland Park were rerolled, repaired, cleaned and placed in good condition. The flower garden in this popular park received the addition of several thousand new plants, and was much admired during the spring season. A small lake has been constructed adjoining the flower garden, wherein it is proposed to give a display of aquatic plants during the summer season.

Forest Park.

The golf links were thoroughly gone over and opened to the public on the 1st of May. The golf house has been ready for the public use for some time, but it has been impossible to get an adequate water supply. I have now installed an electric pump and temporary tank on the top floor of the house, and expect to have water introduced before the end of July, when this new building may be thrown open to the public.

The greenhouse and nursery were largely drawn upon for the floral displays in Prospect Park and the various small parks, and the product of the same has been a credit to the Department and was greatly admired by the general public.

Small Parks.

The small parks throughout the two boroughs received a great deal of attention, the usual spring preparations, such as the cleaning up of the parks, pruning, clearing out of trees and shrubbery, was completed, and the parks turned over to the public in

an attractive condition.

The work of completing the locker contracts for the Forest Park golf house and parade ground building was finally completed, but has not yet been accepted by this

Department.

Work on a new shelter house at Sunset Park was started and rapid progress has been made. The house at the end of the quarter is about 50 per cent, finished. A contract was prepared and advertised for paving all of the walks in Sunset Park with asphalt tiles. This work will be prosecuted without delay.

The work of constructing McLaughlin Park was resumed. The entire sidewalks on the outside of the Parks, all of the walks within the park and the railing around the park and playgrounds have been constructed. There remains very little to be done in this park to make it a completed project.

The work of laying cement sidewalk on the north side of Coney Island concourse, which was started last year and closed down owing to the weather conditions, was

resumed and the work entirely finished.

Work on the timber jetty at Coney Island, a contract for which was let in the previous quarter, was resumed, and at the close of the present quarter was about onethird finished.

Fifty per cent. of the work of emplacing stone in the bulkhead at the foot of the Ocean parkway, with additional work for same, was done at the end of the present quarter

The contract for repaving Pennsylvania avenue was started and finished during the

month of June.

Contracts were also prepared and advertised for cement sidewalks around Kings Park, Jamaica, and for the erection of a three-rail post and pipe fence around Green-point Park. Work on the former is well under way, but on the latter it has not been started.

A contract was also prepared for asphalt tile walks in Kings Park, Jamaica, and bids were received thereon. Owing to the amount of the bid received exceeding the

appropriation, the work was readvertised at a later date.

The mechanical forces were engaged in the repairing of the various buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department, painting the houses, fences and railings, the erection of a potting shed and pump house in Forest Park, the building of a number of tool houses and boxes, the repairs to the rustic work throughout Prospect Park, and numerous other repair work, plumbing, gymnasium apparatus, rolling stock, sprink-

Music.

The concert season in Prospect Park opened on Sunday, June 2, under unfavorable conditions. The United German Singers were to have sung, but it rained hard throughout the day, and that part of the programme was abandoned, a regular band concert being given instead. On the following Sunday, June 9, the singers provided an excellent concert, which was listened to by a large crowd. Concerts have been arranged for every Saturday and Sunday until October in Prospect Park, and in the small parks music will be given on Sundays during July and August.

On the Eastern parkway the planting spaces received similar treatment, and os new trees were planted.

Along Prospect Park West, Fifteenth street and Coney Island avenue, 116 trees were planted after the dead trees had been removed in many instances and other preparations made for the proper planting of these trees.

On the Bay Ridge parkway, between First and Fourth avenues, 50 trees were planted. Around Fort Hamilton Park 74 trees and 93 shrubs were set out, while Seaside Park received 41 new trees and 50 shrubs. Fourth avenue, between Third and

In the Borough of Brooklyn the destruction of the egg masses that would otherwise hatch into caterpillars in June, as well as light trimming and the removal of dead wood, were the principal features of the three months' work. The egg clusters were in great abundance in sections where no systematic cleaning has been done in the past, and all preparations were made to commence spraying at the earliest possible season. The spraying of the 1263 trees given in the above summary represents work done partly on the Tussock moth and partly on scale insects that had to be treated in early spring

As soon as the weather became warm enough a good beginning in the cleaning and cementing of diseased cavities was made. This work, which was done on an extensive scale last summer, has now shown the method of treatment to be an assured success.

The transplanting of 85 trees in Flatbush, Bath Beach and Borough Park has saved

them from destruction by those who are reconstructing the streets.

A new feature of the work during the past three months is the frequent call upon this Department for advice or special treatment of a technical nature on the street trees.

Proper treatment administered at the right time has saved many trees that have been

speedily dying.

In Queens and Hollis trees were trimmed on all the important streets. Large sections in Ozone Park, Woodhaven, Flushing, Jamaica and Richmond Hill also received considerable attention, and work was done in Whitestone and College Point. All the elm trees in Flushing were sprayed twice for the elm leaf beetle.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'clock a. m., on Monday, August 5, 1907.

The Chair called for a hearing, the matter of the request of the Commissioner of Docks, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of an agreement to be entered into between his department and the owners of property between the centre line of Twenty-eighth street prolonged, the southerly line of Thirty-sixth street prolonged, the westerly line of Second avenue and the pierhead line; also the property between the centre line of Fifty-ninth street prolonged, the westerly line of First avenue, the centre line of Sixty-first street, prolonged, and the pierhead line.

pierhead line until it intersects the westerly prolongation of the centre line of Twenty-eighth street; thence easterly and along the westerly prolongation of and along the centre line of said Twenty-eighth street to the point or place of beginning.

Under date of May 7, 1907, the Comptroller submitted to this Department a report made by one of his Appraisers of Real Estate, in which he refers to an offer made by J. Inquiries among experts in Brooklyn real estate indicate that this price is a low one and the general opinion among them is that the property is worth considerably

Taking into consideration the prices paid by the City for similar property where condemnation proceedings had been completed, in my opinion, which is concurred in by the Comptroller, a better arrangement can be made with the owners of these premises by private agreement than by the institution of condemnation proceedings.

The property comprised in the two lots above described is required by the Department to carry into effect the plan as shown on the accompanying map by the erection of seven piers, building of the bulkhead wall and the construction of a marginal

The demands of steamship lines for additional wharfage room capable of accommodating deep draught vessels, and the congested condition of that section of the water front of the Borough of Manhattan suitable for such purpose leads me to believe that accommodations must be secured, and at once, along the Brooklyn water front. The most available sites in my opinion for water front improvement are those indicated upon the accompanying map; and in order to complete this work of water front improvement the properties above described must be acquired by the City.




