To construct sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, between Riverside drive and Broadway; and it is hereby further

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

BROOKLYN UNION ELEVATED RAILROAD COMPANY.

In the matter of the construction of a bridge over the tracks and right of way of the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company at its intersection with Lincoln place, Borough of Brooklyn, as requested by resolution adopted by this Board June 26, 1908, approved by the Mayor June 30, 1908.

At the meeting of September 18, 1908, a communication was received from the Railroad Company, stating its decision with regard to construction of said bridge, together with a report from the Chief Engineer, and the matter was laid over pending receipt of opinion from the Corporation Counsel.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—A communication bearing date August 3, 1908, inclosing copy of proceedings taken by you relative to bridge over the Brighton Beach Railroad tracks at Lincoln place, in the Borough of Brooklyn, together with the objections filed by the Brooklyn Union Elevated Railroad Company, has been received.

You ask to be advised whether those objections are tenable.

The Coney Island and East River Railway Company was incorporated about 1875 under and in pursuance of chapter 140 of the Laws of 1874. (See copy of certificate of incorporation on file in Division of Franchises, Board of Estimate). Under subdivision 5 of section 28 of this act:

"Nothing in this act contained shall be construed to authorize * * * the construction of any railroad not already located in, upon or across any streets in any city, without the assent of the corporation of said city."

The assent of the City of Brooklyn was given to the said Coney Island and East River Railway Company on October 6, 1876 (Min. of B. of A., 1876, Vol. 3, p. 373), to cross Eastern parkway, President, Union, Degray (Lincoln place), Douglass and Butler streets, in said city, upon condition, "that said Railway Company will, previous to commencing to construct said tunnel, give to said city its bond in the penal sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), conditioned that it will, within ninety days after demand by said city, construct across the said several streets herein above named good and substantial iron bridges, with such suitable foundations and retaining walls as shall be necessary," etc.

While several of the streets mentioned were not physically opened at the point of crossing, they were physically opened for a long distance, in said City of Brooklyn, and were laid down on the maps as streets at the point of crossing when the assent was given. The railway company accepted its franchise upon the condition that the streets specifically named would be bridged when the city demanded it. The assent of the city was necessary and the city, having the right to withhold it, could impose reasonable conditions. Such conditions were imposed and accepted by the railway company and in part performed.

The contention is made that under the wording of the franchise, the condition imposed was the giving of a bond and not the performance of the work upon which payment under the bond was conditioned. In support of this, it is stated that the things required to be done under the condition were already prescribed by the law. While the things required to be done as a condition of giving the assent were within the purview of the Railroad Law, the time and manner of doing them were proper matters of stipulation by the city authorities.

The condition of giving the assent was the performance by the railway company of the acts set forth in the franchise. The bond was simply a guaranty that the condition would be performed and the waiver of the guaranty in no way impaired the primary obligation.

A further contention is made that subsequent legislation has modified the original obligation imposed upon the railway company.

Chapter 507, of the Laws of 1903, as amended by chapter 635, of the Laws of 1905, and chapter 745, of the Laws of 1907, does not affect the original obligation imposed under this franchise. It is not inconsistent with the original contract, nor does it in words repeal it; both, therefore, remain in force. I am therefore of opinion that the obligations of the railway company are not tenable.

In the absence of instructions to the contrary, proceedings will be commenced to enforce the action of your Honorable Board.

Kindly consider this communication as answering yours of September 3, 1908, in reference to same matter.

I return herewith the papers forwarded with your communication.

BRISTOL-MYERS COMPANY.

A communication, dated September 22, 1908, was received from the Mayor's office, returning, duly approved by the Mayor, resolution adopted September 18, 1908, granting permission to Bristol Myers Company to construct, maintain and use a tunnel under and across Clifton place, between Grand and Classon avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, to connect the buildings of the company on both sides of said street, and to be used to contain steam pipes and electric conduit, and as a passageway for employees and for transferring goods between said buildings.

Which was ordered filed.

NEW YORK, WESTCHESTER AND BOSTON RAILWAY COMPANY.

In the matter of the applications of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for a change in the line of its route and for certain modifications in the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904.

At the meeting of September 25, 1908, this Board tentatively approved a form of contract granting the petitions, and referred the form of contract to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

A communication was received from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, transmitting communication from the property owners at Clasons Point, requesting that no further extension of time for the completion of the Clasons Point branch of the railway be authorized.

The Secretary presented the following:

Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

DEAR SIRS—I have received the following communication from you dated September 25, 1908, signed by Joseph Haag, Secretary:

"I transmit herewith certified copy of resolution this day adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, referring to the Corporation Counsel, for his approval as to form, a contract containing terms and conditions to be imposed in granting the consent of the City to certain modifications and alterations in the line of the route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, in the Borough of The Bronx, and for certain modifications of the terms and conditions of the ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen July 26, 1904, and approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904.

"I also inclose form of contract, with the request that you approve same as to form, and incorporate therein such matter as in your opinion would seem advisable to fully protect the interests of the City."

The said resolution of September 25 was as follows:

"Resolved, That the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form of a contract containing terms and conditions to be imposed in the grant of the said modifications and alterations, and to incorporate therein such matter as, in his opinion, would seem advisable to fully protect the interests of the City."

I have examined carefully the proceedings that have been had in this matter, and as a result thereof, the following facts appear:

The New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company has two applications pending before your Board, one for a change of route, and the second for a modification of the terms of its original franchise grant from the City, whereby it will be enabled to use an overhead system of electrical conductors, have additional time in which to complete the construction of its railroad and be authorized to construct two connections with other railways, which connections were authorized generally by the terms of the original franchise. The form of contract sent me for approval is intended to cover both of such pending applications.

Taking up the form of contract proposed, I have the following suggestions and amendments to make:

The words "as amended" should be inserted in the first line of the fourth paragraph of the preamble, such line then reading, "Whereas, in and by said ordinance and resolution, as amended, the consent of," etc.

In the fifth line of the fifth paragraph of the preamble, the words "as amended by said consent of 1905" should be inserted, so that said line will read, "the route of said company, as amended by said consent of 1905 and changing the southern terminal," etc.

In the third line of the sixth paragraph of the preamble, "June 17, 1908," should be changed to "June 18, 1908," and the same change should be made in the third line of the seventh paragraph of the preamble.

The fifth line of said paragraph should be changed to read, "Mayor, August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, to wit," etc.

I have consulted with the attorneys of the company in this matter, and they have requested the insertion of the following paragraph in the preamble:

"Whereas, The said Board has made inquiry as to the proposed modifications and amendments of said ordinance and has adopted a resolution that the said modifications and amendments are desirable and in the public interest, and that the causes stated by said Westchester Company why the conditions contained in said ordinance in regard to the completion of said road cannot be performed prior to the time therein stipulated are, in its opinion, for causes over which the grantee had no control, and is in no wise responsible."

In my opinion, there is no objection to the insertion of this clause, which might properly follow after the eighth paragraph of the preamble, and if this be done, such clause should also be included in the form of resolution adopted by your Board.

The ninth line of the present ninth paragraph of the preamble should be amended to read, "modifications in the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905," etc.

In the description of the branch line, in section 1, the following words should be added:

"All of the above mentioned streets crossed by said branch line except Wyatt avenue, Tremont avenue (East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street), Westchester avenue, Clasons Point road, Ferris avenue, Morris lane, Old Ferry road and Fort Schuyler road, are proposed streets, as shown on the City layout of streets."

The balance of section 1, beginning "connection with the present subway elevated road," should be omitted from such section.

Subdivision 3 of paragraph "First" of section 2 should be amended by adding thereto the following clause:

"The said Westchester Company is hereby permitted to make the following two connections under this section:"

—and then insert the description omitted from section 1, beginning, "connection with the present subway elevated road," and ending, "for its successors in authority."

A new section 3 should be inserted, in form, as follows:

"Section 3. The Westchester Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish and does hereby abandon and relinquish to the City all of its rights and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon or across the streets on the portions of the route described in the said ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and which are not covered by the description of the new and amended route as herein described and which are not shown on the map of the amended route, dated June 17, 1908, entitled, 'Survey map and profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for New York County, New York, Section 1, Section 2 and Section 3,' which map was filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on June 17, 1908."

The present section 3 should then be numbered "Section 4."

The contract as amended along the lines proposed will have my approval as to form.

I beg to advise you further that your Board has full power to consent to the said change of route, the injunction granted in the suit of Robinson against New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company having no application. This clearly appears from the following letter received by me from the law firm of Stetson, Jennings & Russell, dated September 30, 1908:

"Referring to the application of New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for a change of route and certain modifications to the ordinance granted to it by the Board of Aldermen on the 26th day of July, 1904, signed by the Mayor, August 2, 1904, we beg to state that this application for change of route and for certain other amendments is in no way covered by the injunction in the suit of Robinson against New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company. That suit was brought by a minority stockholder of the Westchester Company to prevent the directors of that company from entering into a contract with the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company, the result of which would permit the Port Chester Company to change its route so that the same should coincide in part with that of the Westchester Company. At the time the injunction was granted the New York and Port Chester Company had made such an application for change of its route to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the injunction in effect prevented the New York and Port Chester Railroad Company from continuing that application.

"The present application is on behalf of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, and not on behalf of the Port Chester Company; and, moreover, the change of route asked for does not affect the portion of the route referred to in the injunction in the Robinson case. The very object of the present application is to permit the Westchester Company to proceed to construct under its own charter."

Whereas, The City of New York, by an ordinance adopted by the Board of Aldermen July 26, 1904, and approved by the Mayor, August 2, 1904, granted to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to construct, maintain and operate a four-track railroad upon certain routes, particularly set forth in section 1 of

said ordinance, and which ordinance, including all the terms and conditions thereof, was accepted by said company by an instrument in writing duly filed with the Comptroller of The City of New York on August 13, 1904; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, by resolution adopted July 14, 1905, and approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, consented to certain modifications or alterations in the aforesaid routes; and

Whereas, The said company has petitioned the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of June 18, 1908, for the consent of The City of New York to certain modifications and alterations in said routes, and to certain modifications and alterations in the terms and conditions of the aforesaid ordinance, as is fully set forth in said petitions; and

Whereas, Section 92 of the Railroad Law, and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 639 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on June 26, 1908, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as September 18, 1908, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the New York "Tribune" and the "North Side News," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and such public hearing was on that date continued to September 25, 1908, and was concluded on said day; and

Whereas, The said Board has made inquiry as to the proposed modifications and amendments of said ordinance and has adopted a resolution that the said modifications and amendments are desirable and in the public interest, and that the causes stated by said Westchester Company why the conditions contained in said ordinance in regard to the completion of said road cannot be performed prior to the time therein stipulated are, in its opinion, for causes over which the grantee had no control and is in no wise responsible; now therefore it is

Resolved, That the following form of resolution for the consent of right applied for by the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby consents to certain changes, alterations and amendments in the route of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, as granted by an ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, and the right to cross certain streets, avenues, highways and public places, and to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways and public places on such amended route of said railroad, and that the said Board also consents to certain modifications in the terms and conditions of the said ordinance; such changed, altered or amended route, and such modified terms and conditions being fully set forth and described in the following form of proposed contract for the granting thereof, embodying such terms and conditions as modify or alter said ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, which said ordinance otherwise remains unchanged as to all the other terms and conditions expressed therein, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT FOR ALTERATION OF ROUTE AND MODIFICATION OF ORDINANCE.

This contract, made the _____ day of _____, 190____, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, a domestic railroad corporation (hereinafter called the Westchester Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The City of New York, by ordinance approved by the Mayor on August 2, 1904, granted to the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company the right to cross certain streets and highways, and the privilege to construct and operate a four-track railroad upon certain routes particularly set forth in section 1 of said ordinance, and as shown on certain maps and profiles therein referred to and filed in the office of the County Clerk of the City and County of New York, on the 23d day of June, 1904, or any lawful amendment thereof consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; and

Whereas, The Board did on July 14, 1905, adopt a resolution which was approved by the Mayor on July 21, 1905, consenting to a change in the route of the Westchester Company; and

Whereas, In and by said ordinance and resolution, as amended, the consent of the City was granted to the Westchester Company for the construction, maintenance and operation of the said railroad across certain enumerated streets, avenues or highways, either above or below the grade thereof, within said City, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

Whereas, On the seventeenth day of June, 1908, the Board of Directors of said Westchester Company, at a meeting of said Board duly held on said date, and by a vote of two-thirds of all the directors of said company, passed a resolution altering and amending the route of the said company, as amended by said consent of 1905, and changing the southern terminal thereof, from a point on the Harlem River, between Third avenue and Lincoln avenue, to a point on the Harlem River near the point where Lincoln avenue intersects the north bank of the Harlem River, and which alterations and amendments and change of terminal are shown upon a certain map, dated June 17, 1908, entitled:

"Survey Map and Profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for New York County, New York, Section one, Section two and Section three,"

—and signed by the chief engineer, president, secretary and ten directors; which map was filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on June 17, 1908; and

Whereas, The said Westchester Company has applied to the Board, as the local authority of The City of New York, by a verified petition, dated June 17, 1908, for the consent of such local authority for such change, alterations and amendments to the route of said railroad, and for the right to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways and public places on said amended route, and for the modification of the said ordinance and resolution in accordance therewith; and

Whereas, The said Westchester Company has applied to the Board, as the local authority of The City of New York, by a second verified petition, dated June 17, 1908, for the consent of such local authority to certain other modifications in the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, to wit:

1. By striking out in section 1 the following words: "except the overhead trolley system."

2. By striking out in section 2, paragraph 15, the following words: "except the overhead trolley system."

3. By striking out the whole of section 2, paragraph 16, and substituting therefor the following: "In any conduits laid by the company, or on any poles erected by the company for the transmission of power for its own use, provision shall be made to carry three cables for the use of the police, fire and ambulance service of the City without charges therefor."

4. By striking out in section 1, paragraph third, the words, "one thousand (1,000) feet," and substituting therefor the words "two thousand five hundred (2,500) feet."

5. By the addition of a clause permitting the construction and maintenance of connections with:

(a) The present subway-elevated system at or near the present station thereof, at West Farms road.

(b) The projected Southern boulevard and Westchester avenue subway route at Westchester avenue, at or near Home street.

6. By striking out in section 5, paragraph 1, the words "the intersection of the Southern boulevard and Westchester avenue," and substituting therefor the words, "One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street."

7. That the time named in said section 5, paragraph 1, for the completion of a four-track railroad upon the main line from the northerly line of the City as far south as One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street be extended to August 2, 1911.

8. By striking out the whole of section 5, paragraph 4, and substituting therefor the following:

"Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation prior to the second day of August, 1913, shall be deemed to have been abandoned and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railway shall cease and determine, except that south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, if the railway company shall have constructed less than four tracks within said period, it shall only be deemed to have abandoned its right to construct any additional tracks south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street. And in the event that the said railway company shall not, prior to the 2d day of August, 1913, construct its main line south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and to the Harlem River, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in office, may fix and finally determine such additional compensation as shall be imposed upon said railway company because of such failure"; and

Whereas, On the eighteenth day of September, 1908, the Board held a public hearing upon the proposed modifications, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, such hearing being held after due publication; and

Whereas, Said public hearing was continued to the twenty-fifth day of September, 1908, and was concluded on said day; and

Whereas, The said Board has made inquiry as to the proposed modifications and amendments of said ordinance and has adopted a resolution that the said modifications and amendments are desirable and in the public interest and that the causes stated by said Westchester Company why the conditions contained in said ordinance in regard to the completion of said road cannot be performed prior to the time therein stipulated are, in its opinion, for causes over which the grantee had no control and is in no wise responsible; and

Whereas, On the day of , 190 , the Board, as the local authority of The City of New York, adopted a resolution granting to the Westchester Company the right to make such changes, alterations and amendments to the route of said railroad, and the right to cross certain streets, avenues, highways and public places, and to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways and public places on such amended route of said railroad, and gave its consent to the other modifications by the ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by ordinance approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, and authorized the Mayor to execute and deliver a contract granting such rights in the name and on behalf of the City, which resolution was approved by the Mayor on the day of , 190 ;

Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants herein contained, the parties do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Westchester Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right to make such changes, alterations and amendments to the route of said railroad, and the right to cross certain streets, avenues, highways and public places, and to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon and across the streets, avenues, highways and public places on such amended route of said railroad, which amended route is shown upon the map heretofore referred to, and is more particularly described as follows:

Main Line.

Beginning at a point on the Harlem River near the point where Lincoln avenue intersects the north bank of the Harlem River in the Borough of The Bronx, and crossing Lincoln avenue between the Harlem River and One Hundred and Thirty-second street; thence running easterly substantially parallel to One Hundred and Thirty-second street between One Hundred and Thirty-second street and the Harlem River; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-second street at or near its intersection with Willow avenue; thence crossing One Hundred and Thirty-third street, One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, One Hundred and Thirty-seventh street and One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between Willow avenue and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence northerly parallel to the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad and crossing One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, One Hundred and Fortieth street and One Hundred and Forty-first street, between Southern boulevard and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence northerly parallel to the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad to Westchester avenue, and crossing One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, Leggett street, One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Longwood avenue, Lafayette avenue, Tiffany street, Barretto street, Hunts Point road, Faile street, Bryant street, Longfellow street, proposed Ludlow avenue and Whittier street, between Whitlock avenue and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence crossing Westchester avenue at or near its intersection with Edgewater road; then running northerly substantially parallel to the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad to One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-second street, between the Bronx River and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence crossing One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and Van Nest avenue, between Devoe avenue and the Harlem River and Port Chester Railroad; thence running northerly substantially parallel to Devoe avenue and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, Wyatt street and Walker avenue (West Farms road), between Devoe avenue and Berrian street; thence crossing One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street and Lehmann street, between Devoe avenue and Berrian street; thence crossing One Hundred and Eightieth street and Berrian street, at or near their intersection; thence crossing Adams street, between Morris Park avenue and the easterly line of Bronx Park; thence crossing Berrian street, between Morris Park avenue and Bronx Park; thence to and crossing Unionport road, between Miama street and Birchall avenue; thence crossing Oakley street, between Miama street and Sagamore street; thence crossing White Plains road, at or near the intersection of Sagamore street; thence crossing Brown avenue and Sagamore street, at or near their intersection; thence crossing Hunt avenue and Bear Swamp road at or near their intersection; thence crossing Bronx and Pelham parkway and Williamsbridge road at or near their intersection; thence crossing Saw Mill lane, between Williamsbridge road and Eastchester road; thence crossing Eastchester road near its intersection with Syracuse avenue; thence crossing Birch street at or near its intersection with Syracuse avenue; thence crossing Cedar street, Oak street and Walnut street, between Kingston avenue and Syracuse avenue; thence crossing Chestnut street and Kingston avenue at or near their intersection; thence crossing Ash street, between Kingston avenue and Cornell avenue; thence crossing Boston road at or near its intersection with Schieffelin lane; thence crossing Fifth avenue or Dyre avenue, between Boston road and Kingsbridge road; thence continuing to a point in the northerly line of The City of New York, between Fifth avenue and the road to White Plains (Columbus avenue).

Branch Line.

Beginning at a point on the main line near the junction of Walker avenue (West Farms road) and Devoe avenue; thence running southerly, crossing Wyatt street and Tremont avenue, between Devoe avenue and Berrian street; thence crossing Van Nest avenue and the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, between One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and Tremont avenue; thence running between Craighill and Chanute avenues and crossing Bronx River avenue, Benson avenue, Randolph avenue, Westchester avenue, Watson avenue, Ludlow avenue, Story avenue and Lafayette avenue; thence crossing Craighill avenue and Morrison avenue, between Lafayette avenue and Seward avenue; thence crossing Seward avenue, between Morrison avenue and Harrod avenue; thence crossing Harrod avenue, Metcalf avenue and Fiteley avenue, between Seward avenue and Randall avenue; thence crossing Randall avenue at or near its intersection with Croes avenue; thence crossing Noble avenue, Rosedale avenue and Commonwealth avenue, between Randall avenue and Lacombe avenue; thence crossing Lacombe avenue, between Commonwealth avenue and St. Lawrence avenue; thence crossing St. Lawrence avenue, Beach avenue and Taylor avenue, between Lacombe avenue and Patterson

avenue; thence crossing Patterson avenue at or near its intersection with Thieriot avenue; thence crossing Leland avenue, between Patterson avenue and O'Brien avenue; thence crossing O'Brien avenue and Gildersleeve avenue, between Leland avenue and Underhill avenue; thence crossing Underhill avenue and Cornell avenue at or near their intersection; thence crossing Bolton avenue, White Plains road, Newman avenue and Stephens avenue, between Cornell avenue and Bronx River avenue; thence crossing Clasons Point road, between Stephens avenue and Pugsley avenue; thence crossing Cornell avenue and Pugsley avenue at or near their intersection; thence crossing Husson avenue, between Gildersleeve avenue and Cornell avenue; thence northerly between Husson avenue and Betts avenue and crossing Gildersleeve avenue and O'Brien avenue; thence crossing Compton avenue and Pugsley avenue; thence crossing Barrett avenue, between Trask avenue and Serevin avenue; thence crossing Serevin avenue, between Lacombe avenue and Barrett avenue; thence crossing Lacombe avenue and Olmstead avenue at or near their intersection; thence crossing Torry avenue, Howe avenue, Castle Hill avenue, Turner avenue, Effingham avenue and Havemeyer avenue, between Lacombe avenue and Randall avenue; thence crossing Allaire avenue and Farrington avenue, between Randall avenue and Zerega avenue; thence crossing Zerega avenue near its intersection with Randall avenue; thence easterly, crossing Westchester Creek, Ferris avenue and Baxter Creek; thence crossing Morris lane near its intersection with Fort Schuyler road; thence crossing Fort Schuyler road and Old Ferry road at or near their intersection; thence between Fort Schuyler road and East River to a point near the United States Government Reservation. All of the above mentioned streets crossed by said branch line, except Wyatt avenue, Tremont avenue (East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street), Westchester avenue, Clasons Point road, Ferris avenue, Morris lane, Old Ferry road and Fort Schuyler road, are proposed streets, as shown on the City layout of streets.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—All the terms, provisions and conditions contained in the said ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, and the said resolution of the Board approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905, shall remain unchanged and shall apply to the routes herein authorized with the same force and effect as when they applied to the routes described in said contract, and as though the routes herein authorized had been specifically described in said contract, except as follows:

1. Section 1 of the said ordinance is hereby amended by striking out therefrom the words, "except the overhead trolley system."

2. The description of the route as hereby amended and described above shall be substituted for the description of the route as contained in the ordinance, approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, and as contained in the resolution of the Board approved by the Mayor July 21, 1905.

3. Section 1, paragraph Third-General, of the said ordinance is hereby amended by striking out therefrom the words, "one thousand (1,000) feet" and substituting therefor the words "two thousand five hundred (2,500) feet." The said Westchester Company is hereby permitted to make the following two connections under this section:

Connection with the Present Subway-Elevated Route at West Farms Road.

Beginning at a point on the main line of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company at or near Lebanon street; thence running southerly crossing Devoe avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-ninth street at or near their intersection; thence crossing Bronx street at or near its intersection with Walker avenue; thence crossing Walker avenue, between Bronx street and Boston road; thence crossing West Farms road, between Boston road and Rodman place; thence to a connection with the Interborough Rapid Transit Railroad on Boston road, between Bryant and Tremont avenues.

Connection with the Projected Southern Boulevard and Westchester Avenue Subway Route.

Beginning at a point on the main line of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, between Westchester avenue and One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, and running southerly and crossing One Hundred and Seventy-second street and Edgewater road; thence to a connection with the proposed Broadway-Lexington avenue subway at or near the intersection of Westchester avenue and Home street, all as shown on a map entitled:

"Survey Map and Profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company, for New York County, New York, Section one, Section two and Section three."

—adopted by the Board of Directors of said company on the 17th day of June, 1908, and signed by Allen Wardwell, president; Mace Moulton, chief engineer, and Ralph Polk Ruell, secretary, under the seal of the corporation, which map and profile were filed in the office of the County Clerk of the County of New York on the said 17th day of June, 1908, or any lawful amendment thereof which may be consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority.

4. Section 2, clause fifteenth of the said ordinance is hereby amended by striking out therefrom the words "except the overhead trolley system."

5. Section 2, clause sixteenth of the said ordinance shall be stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"In any conduits laid by the company, or on any poles erected by the company for the transmission of power for its own use, provision shall be made to carry three cables for the use of the police, fire and ambulance service of the City without charges therefor."

6. Section 5, paragraph 1, of the said ordinance is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Said railroad company shall commence actual construction within one year from the date of the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor, and shall complete a four-track railroad upon the main line, from the northerly line of the City as far south as East One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street by the 2d day of August, 1911, otherwise this grant shall cease and determine."

7. Section 5, paragraph 4, of the said ordinance shall be stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"Any portion of the route covered by this grant which shall not be completed and in full operation prior to the 2d day of August, 1913, shall be deemed to have been abandoned and all rights hereby granted in and to such portions of said railway shall cease and determine, except that south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street, if the railway company shall have constructed less than four tracks within said period, it shall only be deemed to have abandoned its right to construct any additional tracks south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street. And in the event that the said railway company shall not, prior to the 2d day of August, 1913, construct its main line south of One Hundred and Seventy-fourth street and to the Harlem River, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in office, may fix and finally determine such additional compensation as shall be imposed upon said railway company because of such failure."

Second—The Westchester Company hereby agrees to assume all liability to any person or company by reason of the execution of this contract by the City, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever either to persons or companies on account of the same, and the Westchester Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City may be compelled to pay by reason of this contract.

Sec. 3. The Westchester Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish and does hereby abandon and relinquish to the City all of its rights and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon or across the streets on the portions of the route described in the said ordinance approved by the Mayor August 2, 1904, as amended by the ordinance approved by the Mayor, July 21, 1905, and which are not covered by the description of the new and amended route as herein described and which are not shown on the map of the amended route dated June 17, 1908, entitled "Survey map and profile of the New York, Westchester and Boston Railway Company for New York County, New York, Section 1, Section 2 and Section 3," which map was filed in the office of the County Clerk of New York County on June 17, 1908.

Sec. 4. The Westchester Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf, to conform to and abide by all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part

by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.

Sir—The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, by Ira A. Place, Vice-President, has presented a petition dated September 29, 1908, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, requesting an extension of time in which to complete the proposed foot bridge over and across Tenth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, at Thirtieth street, from the northeasterly to the southwesterly corner thereof, until January 1, 1909.

In accordance with the resolution adopted January 17, 1908, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 27, 1908, authorized the execution of an agreement with the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for the construction of a foot bridge at Tenth avenue and West Thirtieth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, across the tracks of said company, the agreement providing that the company should construct and complete the bridge within sixty days after the execution of the agreement.

In response to a communication from the railroad company dated June 9, 1908, the Board adopted a resolution on June 12, amending the resolution of January 17, so as to provide for the completion of the bridge by October 12, 1908.

The present petition before the Board recites that the railroad company will be unable to complete the construction by October 12, owing to the delay on the part of the contractor to furnish the steel, and through no fault or neglect on the part of the company, and that the petitioner will make every effort to complete the bridge on or before December 1, 1908.

In view of the fact that the steel is not on hand, it is manifestly impossible for the bridge to be completed by October 12.

There appears to be no reason why the time should not be extended for a short period, and as the petitioner states that every endeavor will be made to complete the work by December 1, I would suggest that the petition be granted, and the time for completion extended to January 1, 1909.

(1) The Secretary presented a communication, dated September 28th, from Joseph Stewart, Chairman, Sub-Committee, Pneumatic Tube Commission, which was referred to the Counsel and the Chief Engineer, and was as follows:

Sir—The Commission appointed by the Postmaster General to investigate and report to him with reference to the feasibility and desirability of the Government purchasing or installing the equipment for pneumatic tube mail service and opening the same, etc., appointed a sub-committee to take up the investigation and details of the inquiry as provided by law. Accordingly, we have to submit to you the following:

The Postmaster General has contracted with the New York Pneumatic Service Company, a corporation organized under the laws of the State of New York, for the installation of pneumatic tubes and necessary power plants and operating machinery and the operation of pneumatic tube mail service as contractor with the United States in the cities of New York and Brooklyn, for the period from November 1, 1906 to June 30, 1916.

In the act of March 27, 1908, making appropriations for the service of the Post Office Department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1908, Congress provided as follows:

"And the Postmaster General is hereby authorized and directed to investigate and report to Congress not later than January 1, 1909, the feasibility and desirability of the Government purchasing or installing the equipment for pneumatic tube service, and thereafter operating the same in the cities where such service is now in operation, and also ascertain and report the approximate cost of purchase and likewise of installation and the cost of maintenance and operation."

The question has arisen as to the probability of installing pneumatic tubes for mail purposes in existing or proposed subways in New York and Brooklyn, and we desire to be informed what the probable attitude of the Public Service Commission would be toward such installation and operation and, if such installation were regarded as practicable and desirable, under what conditions such installation would be allowed by the Public Service Commission and how the permission to install such tubes would be obtained.

As our report to the Postmaster General must be made at an early date, I have the honor to request as early a reply as practicable.

(2) Whether said Company should be directed not to operate freight trains during certain hours of the day on Eleventh Avenue;

(3) Whether said Company should be directed not to operate any freight trains from the 60th Street yard for the 30th Street yard until it is known at the 60th Street yard that there will be room in the 30th Street yard for the reception of said trains; also not to operate any trains from the 30th Street yard for the 60th Street yard until it is known at the 30th Street yard that there will be room at the 60th Street yard for the reception of said trains;

(4) Whether said Company should be directed to increase the number of trainmen employed upon its freight trains operated on Eleventh Avenue in the City of New York;

(5) Whether said New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company should be directed to make other changes in its regulations, practices, service, equipment, or appliances in connection with the operation of freight trains on Eleventh Avenue in the City of New York.

The Chairman designated Commissioner Eustis to conduct the hearing.

Commissioner Maltbie—"A complaint was recently made by the Retail Dry Goods Association against the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company. The Association demanded that the Commission should issue an order against the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company for the repaving of Sixth Avenue with asphalt between 14th Street and 23rd Street.

"After reply was made to the complaint, a hearing was fixed, at which the complainant started to present testimony to show that the repaving could be done immediately; but while the hearings were going on an arrangement was made between the complainant and the defendant whereby an order was issued by the Borough President against the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company directing and authorizing this Company to repave the street. The Company had stated sometime previously that if such an order were issued so that it would be exempted from any responsibility therefor, it would repave immediately. This order having been issued and the work begun, the complainant asked that the complaint be dismissed.

"I move that a discontinuance order be issued."

The grounds of the appeal are as follows, to wit:

First—In and by said supplementary contract, it was, by way of change of said first mentioned contract, agreed between the parties, that in the territory involved in the work embraced in the bill above mentioned, the lines and grades of the tracks and the size and dimension of the subway structure shall be changed and the railroad contemplated in the contract first hereinabove referred to shall be constructed under and in accordance with said supplementary agreement and the plans and drawings thereto annexed which are eighteen in number, bear date 28th of January, 1908, are each countersigned by the Chief Engineer, are stamped with the seal of the Commission, and bear the general title "Public Service Commission for the First District Proposed changes of Contract 9-0-2" and which are marked as in said supplementary contract referred to and the work for which said bill was rendered was work not within said plans or any of them but wholly extraneous thereto and additional to the work called for by said plans.

Second—That under the first above mentioned contract it was provided that said subway structure in the territory in question was to be of a depth requiring the excavation of the ground for the excavation of which said bill was rendered and thereafter, and by said supplementary agreement it was agreed between the parties that the said structure should be erected at a less depth requiring less excavation for the omission of which a deduction was made by the undersigned to the City of New York and the decision of the Chief Engineer in effect permits the City of New York to secure a large deduction in price from the undersigned by going through the formality of entering into a contract for a smaller amount of excavated work and thereafter to nevertheless require the undersigned to excavate such omitted work without receiving any compensation therefor.

Third—The work for which additional compensation is requested as per such bill is not part of the work called for by the contract between the City of New York and the undersigned and was not included in the estimate for September and the Chief Engineer held in his determination that it was part of such work and was so included.

Fourth—That the work embraced in said bill is not regular work called for by the contract first above mentioned on pages 37, 38 and 39 and said Chief Engineer erred in holding that it was.

Fifth—That the work embraced in said bill was not regular work called for by the first above mentioned contract in the provisions thereof on page 40 under the heading "Plans and Contract Drawings" and the said Chief Engineer erred in holding that it was.

Sixth—That the work embraced in said bill was not regular work called for by the first above mentioned contract in the provisions thereof on page 53 under the note, "Depth of Trenches," and the said Chief Engineer erred in holding that it was.

Seventh—That before entering into said supplementary contract the City of New York knew that the sub-surface conditions in the territory in question were moist and boggy and the undersigned was also apprised of such fact and for the purpose of making provision for such condition of the sub-surface the City of New York in the plans forming part of said supplementary contract, provided for special heavy beams throughout the bottom of the structure in said territory which distributed the load uniformly over the underlying material in said territory, and which said heavy beams were designed to meet the said conditions and were adequate therefor.

The precise award or redress desired is an award for the payment of the sum of \$4,889.70 for extra excavation and backfilling below sub-grade on Centre Street between Pearl and Worth Streets down to September 1, 1908, and the undersigned does hereby, pursuant to the provisions of the first above mentioned contract as amended by said supplementary contract appoint Frederick S. Parker of the City of New York, as the arbitrator of the undersigned to act for and on its behalf in the arbitration and questions raised by this appeal under and pursuant to the provisions of said first mentioned contract under the heading "Arbitration between City and Contractor."

CONTRACT NO. 2—BROOKLYN BRIDGE STATION—REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

Commissioner Maltbie, Chairman of the Committee on the Manhattan Loop Lines, presented the following report:

To the Public Service Commission for the First District:

SIR—The recommendations of the Chief Engineer, which have been referred to this Committee, provide for the construction of the Brooklyn bridge station upon a level somewhat lower than had originally been planned. This change will make it possible to construct a mezzanine floor throughout the entire station, which will facilitate very considerably the movement of passengers. It will make possible the elimination of escalators and sub-passageways, which is very desirable. It will necessitate, however, the construction of a special sewer. The additional expense of these changes is estimated by the Chief Engineer to be approximately Forty-five thousand dollars, but the changes are so advantageous that, in the opinion of your Committee, they are extremely desirable, and their approval is recommended.

It should be stated that the lowering of the level of the station will not interfere with a possible connection in the future with the Brooklyn bridge. It will also be possible to extend all of the tracks in a double-level subway down Nassau Street, or to extend two down Nassau Street and two down William Street. This feature of the situation is considered very important, for the extension of the loop lines at some future time is very probable.

Your committee recommends, therefore, that the base of rail in the Brooklyn bridge station be lowered as indicated in the plans transmitted herewith.

On motion, duly seconded, the Chairman was authorized to send the following letter to operating companies:

DEAR SIR—With the close of the summer season, the Commission finds it necessary to call your attention to certain matters requiring special efforts to secure improvements. First, however, it is important to call your attention to the fact that the files of the Commission show that a great many complaints are filed alleging inadequacy or inattention on the part of the companies. Thereupon it becomes necessary for the Commission, under the Act, to institute proceedings which require not merely the time of inspectors and officers of the Commission, but also to too great an extent the attendance at hearings before the Commission of important operating officials of the companies, who should be devoting all their available time to the problems of the public service required of their companies. The Commission will not and cannot refrain under the law from instituting such proceedings if complaints are made by aggrieved parties, consequently reduction in the number of proceedings can only come from a reduction of the causes of complaint. It therefore urges that such increased care be given to the operation of your lines as will afford the best service to the public with as little unnecessary friction or inconvenience as possible. Frequently the lack of courtesy or of attention to rules on the part of employees causes irritation to a class of patrons that is wholly unnecessary.

In accordance with the above suggestions, the Commission therefore asks your immediate attention to such matters as:

1. Inadequate service during non-rush hours, particularly theatre hours and church hours on Sunday.
2. Too protracted operation of open cars.
3. Irregular headways of cars or trains.
4. Unnecessary transferring of passengers to "car ahead" or "car behind" because of irregular headways or for no sufficient operating reason.
5. Lack of proper heat in cars.
6. Insufficient ventilation, arising in part and in some cases from attempting to keep up the heat in cars by the presence of passengers.
7. Inadequate light in cars.
8. Lack of shelter on station platforms and at transfer points.
9. Smoking and spitting in stations and cars.

These were during last fall and winter prolific sources of complaints. They are believed by the Commission to be so capable of improvement by action of the companies themselves without orders from the Commission as to produce a noticeable change of public opinion.

While calling attention to these specific causes of frequent complaints, the Commission refers you to the provisions of the Public Service Commissions Law, requiring the furnishing of adequate service, and to the utmost importance of running during the rush hour periods of cars and trains to the maximum physical capacity of the lines.

On motion made and duly seconded, a Hearing Order (No. 755) was adopted, directing a hearing on October 8th at 3:30 o'clock p. m. to inquire:

- (1) Whether the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company should be directed to restore its service between 30th Street Ferry and Ulmer Park, via Second Avenue, 65th Street, Third Avenue, Bay Ridge Avenue, Thirteenth Avenue, 86th Street and 25th Avenue, or other street or streets, as said service existed prior to the 1st day of July, 1908, or to establish a service substantially similar to such service as existed between 30th Street Ferry and Ulmer Park prior to said 1st day of July, 1908.
- (2) Whether said Company should be directed to give the right of way to cars operated on said service between 30th Street Ferry and Ulmer Park, in each direction, so that cars shall not be held up by the switching of Third Avenue cars at Third Avenue and 65th Street or by the Hamilton Avenue cars at 67th Street.

The Chairman designated Commissioner Bassett to conduct the hearing.

(7) DISMISSAL ORDER (No. 756).

On motion made and duly seconded, a Dismissal Order (No. 756) was adopted, dismissing the proceedings instituted by Order No. 725 upon the complaint of William A. Dwinell against the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company in the matter of the discontinuance of the 30th Street Ferry-Bay Ridge Avenue Line.

- (8) Commissioner Maltbie presented the following opinion in the matter of the hearing on motion of the Commission on the question of improvements to be adopted by Gas Corporations within the jurisdiction of the Commission:

OPINION.

"Growing out of the experience of the Commission, and particularly the work of the Bureau of Gas and Electricity which handles the complaints of consumers against the gas companies, an order for a hearing was adopted by the Commission upon August 14th. The formal hearing was held upon August 27th, followed by an informal conference upon September 4th. After hearing the facts presented by the companies it seems advisable to recommend certain modifications of the proposed order, as indicated by the final orders transmitted herewith. The first order, relating to the removal of meters regarding which complaint shall have been made to the companies, will enable the Commission to settle certain complaints which in the past it has been unable to remedy, owing to the removal and reaping of the meter complained of between the time when the complaint was made to the company by the consumer and the date of his application to this Commission for an adjudication of his case. The order virtually provides that pending such an adjudication the meter may not be removed without a test by the Commission, unless a considerable period shall have elapsed during which the consumer has failed to complain to the Commission.

"The other order relates to meters that have been set upon the premises of a consumer for more than seven years. In the hearing order it was proposed that all gas meters having been in use for more than five years should be removed within four months. In each case, of course, the consumer would be furnished with a meter which had the seal of the Public Service Commission upon it.

"It developed at the hearing that the number of meters which had been in place for seven years or more was very much larger than had been expected. Certain of the companies had a small number, but several had an unusually large percentage. Confining the returns for all of the companies, it was found that nearly seven hundred had been in place for more than seven years upon June 30, 1908, or approximately eight per cent. of the total number in use. To remove, overhaul and replace all of these meters within a few months would be practically impossible, for the companies do not have the facilities or the men for handling such a large number in a short time and probably could not obtain them without very great expense. In view of all the circumstances, it is my opinion that July 1, 1909, is the earliest date by which the companies could reasonably be expected to remove all of their seven-year meters.

"It also appeared at the hearing that over 11,000 meters, or approximately nine per cent. of the entire number, had been in place between five and seven years. In view of this large number and of the extreme difficulty of removing these meters until the seven-year meters have been taken care of, I have made no recommendation for an order regarding the five-to-seven-year meters. Other public authorities have established the requirement that no meter shall remain continuously in use without examination and repair for more than five years. Some such period should in my opinion, be established by this Commission, but until the work of overhauling the seven-year meters shall have been well under way, it will be impracticable to fix a date at which a lower limit of use can be reasonably established. After a few months have elapsed, this phase of the matter should be again considered, but I have withheld any recommendation at this time."

Thereupon, on motion of Commissioner Maltbie, duly seconded, two Final Orders were adopted.

- (2) That every gas corporation within the jurisdiction of the Commission shall give to every consumer who requests that his meter be tested, or whose complaint as to the amount of his gas bill is not immediately adjusted to his satisfaction, a copy of said notice, the blanks therein having been properly filled out.

(3) That in case a consumer shall have made a complaint involving the question of the accuracy of his meter, to any gas corporation within the jurisdiction of the Commission, said meter shall not be removed, unless (a) said consumer shall have made application, in the form above provided, to said gas corporation to test his meter; or (b) fifteen days shall have elapsed since said notice shall have been sent to said consumer; or (c) an order from the Commission, directing that said meter be removed for test, shall have been received by said gas corporation.

Said order to take effect immediately and to continue in force for a period of two years.

FINAL ORDER (No. 758)

directing:

(1) That prior to the 1st day of July, 1909, all gas corporations within the jurisdiction of the Commission remove and submit to the Commission for test any and all gas meters which shall have been in use for more than seven years;

(2) That after the 1st day of July, 1909, no meter shall be continued in use by any gas corporation within the jurisdiction of the Commission which shall have been in service untested for more than seven years, and no such gas meter shall again be set for use until tested and approved by the Commission.

This order to take effect immediately and continue in force for a period of three years.

FORT GEORGE STREET RAILWAY COMPANY—EXTENSION OF TIME FOR CONSTRUCTION.

The Secretary presented a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on September 25, 1908, approved by the Mayor September 28, 1908, granting to the Fort George Street Railway Company an extension of time up to and including April 1, 1909, in which to complete the construction of its railway authorized by contract dated May 31, 1907, which was ordered filed.

Commissioner Eustis presented the following opinion in the matter of the complaint of J. W. Thorne against the American Express Company for excessive and unreasonable charges upon crated furniture between points within New York City:

Under date of July 22, 1908, one J. W. Thorne filed with the Commission a complaint against the American Express Company alleging excessive charges for transporting crated furniture from one point to another within the City of New York. The Express Company filed an answer and also a formal motion to dismiss, and on the hearing renewed its motion to dismiss. The motion to dismiss was put upon the grounds that

"1. This Commission has no jurisdiction of the subject matter, or power to proceed against the defendant.

"2. That the complaint sets forth no matter which is cognizable by the Commission or about which it is given authority to make any order or finding."

Upon this motion decision was reserved.

Section 5 of the Public Service Commissions Law which prescribes the extent of the jurisdiction of each Commission, provides in part that the jurisdiction, supervision, powers and duties of the Commission in the First District shall extend under the Act:

"To any common carrier operating or doing business exclusively within that district."

Pub. Serv. Com. Law, §5, Subd. 4.

Express Companies fall within the definition of the term "common carrier" as used in the Act. The language is:

"The term 'common carrier', when used in this act, includes all railroad corporations, street railroad corporations, express companies, car companies, sleeping car companies, freight companies, freight-line companies, and all persons, whether incorporated or not, operating such agencies for public use in the conveyance of persons or property within this state."

Pub. Serv. Com. Law, §2.

This Commission would, therefore, have jurisdiction over any express company operating or doing business exclusively within the First District. As the American Express Company does not operate or do business exclusively within the First District, the question presented is whether this Commission has any jurisdiction over this company. I find no provision whereby such jurisdiction has been conferred. Indeed, it seems to me that the provisions of Section 5 of the Public Service Commissions Law, taken singly and together, have distributed the jurisdiction of the Commissions in clear and comprehensive terms, and that the complaint now presented could be considered and disposed of on the merits by the Commission of the Second District.

The American Express Company takes the position that as it does not operate or do business exclusively within the First District this Commission has no jurisdiction over it. I am of the opinion that this position is well taken and that the complaint should be dismissed.

DISMISSAL ORDER (No. 744).

Thereupon on motion of Commissioner Eustis, duly seconded, a Dismissal Order (No. 744) was adopted, dismissing the above complaint for want of jurisdiction.

Appropriating the sum of eleven thousand four hundred and forty-six dollars and ten cents (\$11,446.10) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, to be issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the revised Charter, application for the issue of which is hereby made; said sum to be applied to the payment of the awards (and interest thereon), costs, charges and expenses, including expert witnesses and searches, as confirmed by the Court, in the proceeding for the acquisition of lands and premises situated on the easterly side of West Third street, south of Sheephead Bay road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as a site for school purposes; requisition for said sum being hereby made upon the Comptroller.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Supplies in appointing Albert Marmorstein, of No. 300 East Fifth street, Manhattan, who was certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for appointment, as Stenographer and Typewriter in the Bureau of Supplies, the appointment taking effect August 1, 1908, and the compensation to be at the rate of \$900 per annum.

Amending section 1089 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901 by striking out the sixteenth sentence thereof, reading as follows:

"Licenses to teach shall be issued by the City Superintendent of Schools for a period of one year, which may be renewed without examination in case the work of the holder is satisfactory to the City Superintendent for two successive years."

—and by inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Licenses to teach shall be issued by the City Superintendent of Schools for a trial of one year, provided such year of trial, except in the case of Principals' licenses, shall begin within four years from the date of the placing of the name on the eligible list; and all licenses so issued may be renewed without examination in case the work of the holder is satisfactory to the City Superintendent for two successive years."

Reason—The present provision is ambiguous. If construed literally it would lead to endless confusion and would mean that no Teacher could be appointed after one year had elapsed from the issuing of said Teacher's license, unless a new license were issued. The reason for excepting Principals' licenses is that a Principals' eligible list is likely not to be exhausted within the period of four years, and it is highly desirable that the laudable ambition of a Teacher to become a Principal should be encouraged rather than discouraged.

Appropriating the sum of one hundred and seventy-one dollars (\$171) from Corporate Stock, issued by the Comptroller pursuant to sections 47 and 169 of the revised Charter, said sum to be applied in payment of bills incurred by the Committee on Sites, with the following named person:

Setting aside the sum of fourteen thousand one hundred dollars (\$14,100) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock of the special issue authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 3, 1908, and as amended April 10, 1908, for the permanent betterment of public school buildings by providing fire protection, Borough of Manhattan, for expenditure by the Committee on Buildings in sums not exceeding \$1,000 in any one instance.

Rescinding and returning the sum of one hundred and nineteen thousand nine hundred and ninety-seven dollars and twenty-three cents (\$19,997.23) heretofore set aside for expenditure under the direction of the Committee on Buildings from the Special School Fund for the current year and from the item contained therein entitled General Repairs, Borough of Manhattan, the sum of four thousand one hundred and ninety-one dollars (\$4,191) to the fund from which it was originally appropriated.

Requesting the Corporation Counsel to institute a search, at the expense of the Board of Education, as to the ownership of the title to that portion of Pulaski street, Middle Village, Borough of Queens, on the south side of Public School 87, and to draw up the necessary agreement with the owner or owners of said street, so that the same may be excavated sufficiently to make a sidewalk at the official grade, and thereby secure adequate egress and ingress at the proposed addition to said school building, and authorizing the Chairman of the Committee on Buildings to execute the said above-mentioned agreement on behalf of the Board of Education, and to affix its corporate seal thereto.

Concurring in the action of the Committee on Buildings taken August 12, 1908, in deciding that the work under the contract of L. F. Benn for electric equipment of Public School 16, Borough of Queens, is unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed; that said contractor is wilfully violating the conditions and covenants of said contract and that the work is not being done according to the terms thereof; declaring the contract of L. F. Benn for electric equipment of Public School 16, Borough of Queens, the Bankers' Surety Company, sureties, voided and forfeited for non-compliance with the terms thereof; authorizing the Chairman of the Committee on Buildings to serve formal notice to the foregoing effect upon the said L. F. Benn and his sureties, and authorizing the Superintendent of School Buildings to take possession of the said above-mentioned work and to advertise for proposals for the completion of the same.

Authorizing the Superintendent of School Buildings to take possession of the work under the contract of Alfred Nugent's Son for the general construction of Public School 16, Addition, Borough of The Bronx, which contract was declared voided and

forfeited on July 22, 1908 (see Journal, page 1319), and to advertise for proposals for the completion of the said work.

Granting the Chiefs and Assistant Chiefs of Divisions, as designated by the Superintendent of School Buildings, in the Bureau of School Buildings, leaves of absence for thirty working days during the "working period," beginning with July 1 and ending with the June 30 next following, said thirty days to cover the regular summer vacation and any and all other absences, including tardiness; that the Draughtsmen, Inspectors and other employees (exclusive of mechanics paid per diem wages) not included in the above paragraph or affected by the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on May 9, 1906 (see Journal, page 749), be granted leaves of absence for twelve working days during the "working period" beginning with July 1 and ending with the June 30 next following, said twelve days to cover the regular summer vacation and any and all other absences, including tardiness; that all additional absence and tardiness beyond said allowance of thirty or twelve working days, respectively, shall be charged against and deducted proportionately from the salaries of persons thus absent, unless the Committee on Buildings shall excuse the same by reason of the existence of special or unusual circumstances, but that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to permit of the absence of employees at any time, unless with the permission of the Committee on Buildings or of the Superintendent of School Buildings, and for reasons deemed satisfactory; and that credit for deferred vacations will not be extended beyond the succeeding "working period," and may not be consolidated without the special permission of the Superintendent of School Buildings.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to recommend to the Board of Aldermen that the salaries of the following positions in the Department of Education be fixed at the amount indicated in each instance:
