Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the above resolution and fixes the salaries of said positions as set forth therein.

BUDGET FOR 1914.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, the total amount appropriated being:

One hundred and ninety-two million nine hundred and ninety-five thousand five hundred and fifty-one dollars and sixty-two cents (\$192,995,551.62), divided as follows:

First—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, to meet the debt charges of said City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and to meet a direct State tax levied upon the City for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

One hundred and eighty-three million three hundred and forty-five thousand three hundred and seventy dollars and ninety cents (\$183,345,370.90).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1913, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter:

Two million five hundred thousand dollars (\$2,500,000).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the assessments levied against the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Five hundred and twenty thousand and fifteen dollars and six cents (\$520,015.06).

Fourth—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Bronx, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen:

Six million six hundred and thirty thousand one hundred and sixty-five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,630,165.66).

Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—

- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Regular Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages Temporary Employees."
- That no transfers shall be made from or to appropriations classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers" or "Hire of Automobiles," except to or from an appropriation classified as "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers," or "Hire of Automobiles."
- That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions" to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees and Commissions."
- That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden, or in cases where appropriations were made under the classification of "General Repairs" if, upon the written statement of the Department Head, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment finds that the repair work can be done more economically by departmental labor.
- That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification where the title of the appropriation prohibits such transfer or when the appropriation is made conditional upon the purchase of some stated article or articles or for the payment of insurance or taxes, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the Budget resolutions in the Budget for 1914.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County governments in the schedules of "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees," "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

- In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries Regular Employees."
- In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the whole year.

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1914 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth—

- That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules, entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees," "Fees and Commissions," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual

compensation agree with such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

- That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payrolls is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedule supporting any such appropriations or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.
- That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.
- That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.
- That on all payrolls against schedules entitled, "Salaries Regular Employees," and "Wages Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.
- That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall transmit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing, firstly, the aggregate liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have been transmitted to the Department of Finance, and, secondly, all additional liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have not as yet been transmitted.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies," "Purchase of Equipment," "Materials," "Contract or Open Order Service," "Contingencies" or "Fixed Charges and Contributions" is supported by a schedule, such schedule shall be conclusive as to the amount allowed for each function or subdivision, and the heads of departments shall submit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing the amounts consumed the previous month chargeable against each supporting schedule line of the appropriation, which monthly amount, in the aggregate, shall not exceed the amount specified in the schedule, unless modified by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage already approved or hereafter to be approved by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications.

—Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Wages Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees" and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries Regular Employees," "Salaries Temporary Employees," "Wages Regular Employees," "Wages Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all departments of City and County Government, for which appropriations for food supplies have been made in the Budget for 1914, shall make an inventory on January 1, 1914, to determine the number of units of each article of food in stock, either in stores or in the institution and the cost value thereof, and shall thereafter keep an accurate record showing the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total cost of all articles of food purchased in each month; that such departments shall keep an accurate record of the quantities of food supplies consumed by patients or inmates, such record to be entirely separate and distinct from the consumption of food supplies by employees or persons other than patients and inmates; and such departments shall keep an accurate record of the number of units of food supplies and the cost therefor consumed by the employees, such record to be entirely distinct from the record of food consumption by patients and inmates and such departments are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the first of each month, a statement on budget accounting forms to be submitted by the Comptroller showing

Allowances Made on Cost Data Basis—

Resolved, That the following terms and conditions shall govern the administration of the cost data budget and supporting schedules for the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Street Cleaning, } Office of the President, Borough of Richmond, for the year 1914.

(1) The nature of all expenditures shall fall within the scope of the work classifications specified in the supporting schedules.

(2) The total cost allowances shown therein for any quarter shall not be exceeded within that quarter.

(3) The total allowance for capital investment shall not be exceeded during the year.

At the end of each quarter of the year there shall be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to the Department of Finance, a detailed statement of all the operations of the above mentioned bureaus and the cost thereof, together with a reconciliation schedule showing the relation between total costs of work and total expenditures, in such form as may be prescribed by the Board. Such reports, when made, shall show separately for each item cost the several elements that make up the item cost, including labor, vehicular transportation (hired and departmental), foreman, supervision, inspection, administrative supervision, materials, supplies, equipment and plant charges. At the same time requests for modifications of the remaining schedules may be presented for consideration and action of the Board, but no change shall be made in the work programme until first approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The quarterly reports of the Bureau of Highways shall show in detail the character and the quantities of the work done and shall include the names of the streets and the quantities of work performed on each street.

The quarterly reports of the Bureau of Sewers shall give the location of basins and sewers cleaned and the character and quantities of work performed for each location.

The quarterly reports for the Bureau of Street Cleaning shall contain the character and quantities of work done and shall include the names of the streets and the quantities of work done on each street.

At the beginning of each quarter the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning shall furnish to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Department of Finance schedules of work planned for the succeeding quarter.

The Board shall be notified in advance of the commencement and cessation for all regular work covered by the supporting schedules.

The quantity of any item of work performed in a given quarter shall not exceed or underrun by more than 10 per cent. the quantity specified for that item in the supporting schedules, without advance notification to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

That the positions and grades of positions and rates of compensation therefor appearing in the following schedules be established respectively in the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers and Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, for the number of incumbents specified therein.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Fixed Charges and Contributions—

Care of Dependents in Private Institutions—

Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.

Preamble—

All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:

1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution as follows:

- Food stuffs.
- Clothing.
- Linen and bedding.
- Fuel.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
- Other supplies.
- Salaries and wages.
- Professional services.
- Light.
- Forage and care of animals.
- Telephone.
- Printing, stationery and advertising.
- Postage and telegrams.

- o. Hospital and Sanitarium charges.
- p. Funerals.
- q. Recreation expense.
- r. Miscellaneous expenses.
- s. Expense for boarded-out children.
- B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:
 - a. Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
 - b. Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
 - c. Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate, used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable, such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges, but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities, by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.

4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous fiscal year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriations shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget, notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities of any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which pays any salary to, gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by, has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from any officer or trustee or member of its board of managers, or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction except that for abnormal or atypical children a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in The City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution shall give to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care City or county funds are to be received within twenty-four hours after his arrival at or discharge from the institution.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in general hospitals under the age of five (5), per day \$0 45
 For dependent children from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week 2 50
 For delinquent children, per annum 150 00
 For children in cottage villages, not to exceed 30 inmates in each cottage, or under such conditions of segregation as may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, additional, per week 50
 For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the courts, per annum 150 00
 For inmates in homes for unfortunate and friendless females, per annum 110 00
 *For homeless mothers nursing infants, per month 12 00

AN ORDINANCE to amend the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, the same being a chapter of the Code of Ordinances, relating to various matters covered by said regulations.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 22 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 22. By the term *volatile inflammable oil* is meant, any oil or liquid that will generate an inflammable vapor at a temperature below 100 degrees Fahrenheit when tested IN A TAGLIABUE OPEN CUP TESTER.

Section 2. Section 23 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 23. By the term *kerosene* or *kerosene oil* is meant, any liquid product of petroleum, commonly used for illuminating purposes, which does not emit an inflammable vapor below a temperature of 100 degrees Fahrenheit when tested IN A TAGLIABUE OPEN CUP TESTER.

Section 3. Section 23a is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 23a. BY THE TERM *FUEL OIL* IS MEANT ANY LIQUID MIXTURE, SUBSTANCE OR COMPOUND DERIVED FROM PETROLEUM, WHICH DOES NOT EMIT AN INFLAMMABLE VAPOR BELOW A TEMPERATURE OF 125 DEGREES FAHRENHEIT WHEN TESTED IN A TAGLIABUE OPEN CUP TESTER.

Section 4. Section 24 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 24. By the term *inflammable mixture* is meant, any liquid mixture, or substance, or compound, which contains more than 10 per cent. of volatile inflammable oil, or which mixture will emit an inflammable vapor at a temperature below 100 degrees Fahrenheit, when tested IN A TAGLIABUE OPEN CUP TESTER.

Section 5. Section 25 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 25. By the term *combustible mixture* is meant, any liquid OR SOLID mixture, or substance, or compound, which does not emit an inflammable vapor at a temperature below 100 degrees Fahrenheit, when tested IN A TAGLIABUE OPEN CUP TESTER, but which may be ignited and caused to burn.

Section 6. Section 26 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 26. By the term *motor vehicle* is meant, a vehicle or other conveyance having more than two running wheels, and using a volatile inflammable oil as fuel for generating motive power, excepting such vehicles as HAVE A STORAGE TANK OF A CAPACITY OF LESS than two gallons of a volatile inflammable oil.

Section 7. Section 27a is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 27a. A *PUBLIC GARAGE* IS A GARAGE WHEREIN MOTOR VEHICLES CONTAINING VOLATILE INFLAMMABLE OIL ARE STORED OR HOUSED FOR PAY, OR KEPT FOR SALE, RENT OR HIRE.

Section 8. Section 27b is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 27b. A *PRIVATE GARAGE* IS A GARAGE WHEREIN MOTOR VEHICLES CONTAINING VOLATILE INFLAMMABLE OIL ARE STORED, HOUSED OR KEPT, AND WHICH ARE NOT FOR SALE, RENT OR HIRE, OR SUBJECT TO CHARGES FOR STORAGE.

Section 9. Section 34 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 34. By the term *oil and fats* is meant any oil, fat or grease, of animal, vegetable OR MINERAL origin, except essential oils.

Section 10. Section 34a is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 34a. BY THE TERM *LUBRICATING OIL* IS MEANT AN OIL USED TO REDUCE FRICTION, WHETHER OF ANIMAL, VEGETABLE OR MINERAL ORIGIN, OR A COMPOUND THEREOF.

Section 11. Section 34b is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 34b. BY THE TERM *ESSENTIAL OIL* IS MEANT AN OIL USED FOR FLAVORING OR PERFUMING PURPOSES.

Section 12. Section 38 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 38. By the term *combustible fiber* is meant, any finely divided vegetable or animal fiber AND SHALL INCLUDE PAPER AND CLOTH IN THE FORM OF SCRAPS OR CLIPPINGS, HAY, STRAW, EXCELSIOR, DRIED MOSS, EXCEPTING MOSS USED FOR MEDICINAL PURPOSES, GRASSES AND SIMILAR SUBSTANCES.

Section 13. Section 38a is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 38a. BY THE TERM *FIRE RESISTING MATERIAL* IS MEANT (1) ALL NON-COMBUSTIBLE MATERIAL; (2) ALL COMBUSTIBLE MATERIALS USED IN THE CONSTRUCTION OF ANY BUILDING, PREMISES, OR PART THEREOF, WHEN COVERED WITH METAL, PLASTER, CONCRETE, ASBESTOS OR OTHER NON-COMBUSTIBLE SUBSTANCE, OR TREATED WITH AN APPROVED FIREPROOFING PROCESS WHICH PREVENTS, DELAYS OR RETARDS COMBUSTION.

Section 14. Section 38b is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 38b. THE TERM *PERSON* AS USED IN THESE REGULATIONS INCLUDES FIRMS, CORPORATIONS AND ASSOCIATIONS.

Section 15. Subdivision (b) of section 41 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 41. * * * (b) HAVE A REASONABLE UNDERSTANDING OF the English language and BE ABLE to answer such questions as may be asked him upon examination.

Section 16. Section 49 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 49. A permit is not transferable EXCEPTING IN CASES WHERE THE BUSINESS IS TRANSFERRED TO A NEW LOCATION UNDER THE SAME OWNERSHIP; IF a business conducted under a permit changes ownership, the new OWNER, before assuming control of such business, shall obtain a new permit.

Section 17. Section 50 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 50. Unless otherwise specifically provided, all permits, certificates OF FITNESS AND CERTIFICATES OF REGISTRATION issued pursuant to these regulations shall be valid for one year from date of issue; but CERTIFICATES OF APPROVAL OF A TYPE, CLASS, ARTICLE, APPARATUS, SYSTEM OR THING SHALL NOT REQUIRE RENEWAL. The Fire Commissioner may, HOWEVER, at any time modify, suspend or revoke any permit or certificate.

Section 18. Section 53 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 53. The Fire Commissioner may, by special permit, authorize the CONTINUANCE OF ANY BUSINESS, OR THE storage, SALE or use of any article, APPARATUS or thing WHICH WAS ORIGINALLY AUTHORIZED BY A PERMIT ISSUED UNDER THE REGULATIONS IN FORCE ON JANUARY 1, 1912, OR HE MAY WAIVE THE OPERATION OF THESE REGULATIONS, OR ANY PORTION THEREOF, IN SPARSELY POPULATED DISTRICTS.

Section 19. Section 53a is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 53a. WHEN THE CIRCUMSTANCES, CONDITIONS, LIMITATIONS OR SURROUNDINGS OF ANY BUSINESS OCCUPATION, TRADE OR INDUSTRY ARE UNUSUAL OR SUCH THAT IT IS IMPRACTICABLE TO ENFORCE ALL REGULATIONS OTHERWISE APPLICABLE THERETO, A SPECIAL PERMIT MAY BE ISSUED, WITH SUCH MODIFICATIONS OF REQUIREMENTS AS MAY BE DEEMED PROPER.

Section 20. Section 62 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 62. Nothing contained in these regulations shall be construed as applying to the transportation of any article or thing shipped in conformity with the regulations prescribed for such shipments by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Section 21. Section 64 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 64. For a special permit, the applicant shall pay the fee fixed by the Municipal Explosives Commission at the time of authorizing such permit.

Section 22. Section 65 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 65. For a certificate of fitness, the applicant shall pay an annual fee of five dollars, EXCEPT THAT IN THE CASE OF A CERTIFICATE OF FITNESS AS A MAGAZINE KEEPER, THE APPLICANT FOR WHICH SHALL PAY AN ANNUAL FEE OF TWO DOLLARS.

Section 23. Section 69 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 69. For a permit to transport and deliver explosives by ANY CONVEYANCE within The City of New York, as provided for in section 141 of these regulations, the applicant shall, for each CONVEYANCE so used, file a bond in a penal sum OF not less than five thousand dollars, and shall pay an annual fee of fifty dollars.

Section 24. Section 73 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 73. For a permit allowing the storage AND SALE of electric fuses AND BLASTING CAPS, as provided for in section 192 of these regulations, the applicant shall pay an annual fee of twenty-five dollars.

Section 25. Section 74 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 74. For a permit allowing the storage of black powder, blasting powder, or smokeless powder, as provided for in section 203 of these regulations, the applicant shall pay an annual fee of TEN dollars.

Section 26. Section 75 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 75. For a permit allowing the storage of black powder, blasting powder or smokeless powder, as provided for in section 205 of these regulations, the applicant shall pay an annual fee of FIVE dollars.

Section 27. Section 77 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 77. For a permit allowing the storage and sale of ammunition, as provided for in section 213 of these regulations, the applicant shall pay an annual fee of fifty dollars; AND FOR A PERMIT ALLOWING THE STORAGE AND SALE OF AMMUNITION IN QUANTITIES NOT EXCEEDING TWENTY-FIVE PER CENTUM OF ANY ITEM SPECIFIED IN SECTION

215, THE APPLICANT SHALL PAY AN ANNUAL FEE OF TEN DOLLARS. Section 28. Section 87 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 87. For a permit allowing the storage and sale of matches within The City of New York, in quantities aggregating not more than five hundred matchman's gross (14,400 matches each gross), the applicant shall pay an annual fee of FIVE dollars.

Section 29. Section 88 of the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 88. For a permit allowing the storage and sale of matches in quantities not exceeding five thousand matchman's gross at any time, the applicant shall pay an annual fee of TEN dollars.

Section 30. Section 95a is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 95a. FOR A PERMIT ALLOWING THE STORAGE AND USE OF FUEL OIL IN EXCESS OF FIVE BARRELS, THE APPLICANT SHALL PAY AN ANNUAL FEE OF FIVE DOLLARS.

Section 31. Section 95b is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sir—Pursuant to your direction, I submit herewith a report covering the operations of this Bureau for the first six months of the current year. This report covers the first quarter ending March 31, and the second quarter ending June 30. The data is given under separate quarters for the reason that no report was made at the end of the first quarter:

City Hall.

First Quarter—Shored up and rebuilt floor under reporters' room. Painted quarters of Traffic Squad, Police Department; painted quarters of Mayor's Chief Clerk; painted quarters of Aldermanic Minority Committee room; painted quarters of reporters' room; painted quarters of Bureau of Weights and Measures and laid linoleum on floor of same. Reinforced old wooden beams of reporters' room and metal ceiling. Altered old Bureau of License room to accommodate Bureau of Weights and Measures. Partitioned passageway to Mayor's vault room from his Stenographer's room, and removed old wall cases from Mayor's Stenographer's room and repaired old woodwork in same; also repaired old Bureau of Weights and Measures office for temporary Aldermanic Committee room and room of Aldermanic Minority Chairman. Installed electrical radiators in Janitor's apartments. Changed lighting system in Mayor's Stenographer's room, repaired roof temporarily and relined toilet cisterns. Installed additional radiators in Art Commission room.

Second Quarter—Overhauled all plumbing throughout building, installing new fixtures, tanks and other parts, where necessary, and examining all connections to lead soil lines. Made and installed twenty-four new awnings. Made and installed new shades throughout building. Cleaned dead pipes, etc., out of tunnel. Repaired some very bad leaks in roof and painted same after fire walls were built. Cleaned out bird nest which blocked rain leader on east side.

Contract work under supervision of Architect Grosvenor Atterbury progressing slowly, but nearing completion. Board of Estimate chamber done; corridors and dome completed; Aldermanic Committee room started.

County Court.

First Quarter—Painted annex to room No. 9; laid about 500 square feet of concrete floor in cellar. Installed electric motor in place of engines for ventilation fans in cellar. Installed electric power for wood working machine. Overhauled exhaust fan, Judge's kitchen; maintained light fans and elevators. Prepared plans and specifications for the installation of electric lighting equipment in attic of County Court House. Prepared plans and specifications for improved lighting in County Clerk's office.

Second Quarter—Built brick walls around squad toilet in cellar; painted same; installed partitions and plumbing fixtures complete. Painted a large number of signs throughout building. Fitted up toilet and shower room in cellar for squads, etc. Installed lighting for County Clerks in annex and Room No. 9, known as Room 111. Installed electrical lighting on fourth and fifth floors for County Clerk's records. Judges' elevator started. Installed new directory board giving location of all offices in building and renumbered each room systematically, according to modern system of office building numbering, from first to fourth floor, inclusive.

Criminal Court.

First Quarter—Painted Judge Crain's private chambers. Overhauled engine.
Second Quarter—Built scaffold to clean marble; repaired louvers at prison pen; finished repair of tile roof. Erected shelving in Appeal Bureau of District Attorney's office.

City Court.

First Quarter—Reconstructed bookcases in library so as to accommodate more books.
Second Quarter—Elevator tank placed on elevator system of Hall of Records to improve operation of City Court elevator. Utilized air tank to better the operation of hydraulic elevators and reduce shock and high pressure in the system, according to plans of Bureau of Buildings. Prepared specifications for alteration to pressure system of elevators.

East Fifty-seventh Street Court.

First Quarter—Checked work on alterations being done by contract; prepared to complete repairs not included in contractor's layout.
Second Quarter—Painted two rooms in Janitor's quarters; painted walls and ceilings of Judge's stairway; installed sink in women's pen; installed sink in fire room and drain in prison pen. Built shelves in Janitor's storeroom. Laid new flooring in Probation Officers' room; stiffened treads of main stairs; relighted men's public toilet; installed new heating equipment required for new and altered rooms. All work completed so that building is to be used by Courts beginning July 1.

Hall of Records.

First Quarter—Built a scaffold for Janitor to clean marble. Relined two boilers. Installed new lighting system in room No. 9, second floor; changed inefficient chandelier lights to efficient by reversing brackets and installing special shade holders. Substituted a number of O. C. white desk lights for original bronze desk lights, producing more efficient illumination. Overhauled elevator signals. Installed new lighting system in Rooms 3, 4 and 6 on third floor. Installed new lighting system in Register's office on mezzanine floor, Chambers st. side. Installed annunciator system for Surrogates' offices. Tightened wall brackets in Surrogates' Court room. Repaired leaks in interior Court skylight. Repaired blow-off line. Supervised operation of Hall of Records plant in connection with power plant test. Changed arrangement of refrigerating plant to operate on exhaust steam. Overhauled and cleaned refrigerating plant. Repaired Watertown engine; covered piping and tanks to decrease loss from radiation of heat. Made many piping changes necessary for installation of meters for test purpose. Installed water meters. Installed return tank and piping for receiving heating returns. Installed automatic non-return boiler stop valves for protection of boiler plant in case of accident. Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation.

Second Quarter—Ground down two commutators. Gave constant attention to exterior electric clock and clocks in Corporation Counsel's office. Installed automatic smoke recorder to indicate and record when smoke is produced in boiler plant. Overhauled Corliss engine valves to increase economy of operation. Overhauled mechanical indicators of elevator system. Tested electrical meters measuring energy to different services in Hall of Records, City Court, County Court and City Hall. Installed motor driven air compressor to replace inefficient steam driven compressors. Elevator gate locks made secure to prevent accident to passengers.

Harlem Court.

First Quarter—Relined one boiler; erected new storm doors at main entrance; repaired skylight over elevator and repaired roof in general. Installed new radiator on mezzanine floor. Installed new automatic scales, with necessary formation of pit in boiler room, to measure amount of coal consumed in operation of plant.

Second Quarter—Installed door at top of elevator shaft to render machinery accessible. Installed new elevator annunciator cable.

Madison Street Court.

First Quarter—Painted and varnished Judges' chambers throughout. Installed new cover on water tank on roof. Installed new lighting system in basement record room. Repaired all roof skylights; installed louver door in dome at roof. Erected partitions for new Judge's chambers.

Second Quarter—Divided all outside large lights of glass in two, so as to reduce breakage from wind.

Sixth District Municipal Court.

First Quarter—Nothing done here, as Court is to be moved from old quarters on 83d st. to new quarters on 88th st.

Second Quarter—Moved all furniture, books and records from old to new Court House. Took up linoleum in old Court rooms and relaid same in new rooms, and furnished new where necessary. Varnished complaint desk and other furniture of Clerk's office built by Carpenters. Set up Clerk's desk; built shelving in vault and cellar for storage of records.

Fifth District Municipal Court, 96th St. and Broadway.

First Quarter—Moved Court from southwest to northwest corner and erected desks and shelving, repairing same where necessary.

Ninth District Municipal Court, 59th St.

First Quarter—Installed new lighting system and repaired electric fans.

Children's Court, 11th St. and 3d Ave.

First Quarter—Made temporary repairs to entire roof and painted same. Very little repair work done, as new Children's Court has been started and this building will be abandoned as soon as possible.

Second Quarter—Little repair work done for same reason as above.

Jefferson Market Court.

First Quarter—Repaired roof over Municipal Court hallway. Cleaned out great accumulation of rubbish from attic and repaired roof. Reset smoke stack on new boiler.

Second Quarter—Made alterations to comply with violation order placed by Fire Prevention Bureau.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court.

First Quarter—Repaired skylights; painted west roof; installed new overhead automatic track scales with computing apparatus. Removed inefficient steam engine running large exhaust fan, and installed an efficient electric motor with silent chain drive.

Second Quarter—Repaired skylights over Police Court hallway; completed bridge connecting complaint room with prison pens.

Fourth District Municipal Court; East Thirty-second Street Court.

First Quarter—Installed new grates. Bought and installed carpets and linoleum, as required. Erected new file cases for Court records.

Second Quarter—Built and installed new cabinet to file stationery.

Prince and Wooster Street Court.

First Quarter—Installed radiator in Probation Officers' room and overhauled feed water heater.

Second Quarter—No more repair work done on this building, as Courts are to go back to E. 57th st. on July 1.

Allen Street Bath.

First Quarter—Repaired outside lamps; overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation.

Second Quarter—Painted and varnished bath inside throughout. Cleaned down part of outside of building. Installed ventilators in skylights and readjusted screws over skylights. Ten-horsepower engine substituted for the electric motor driving the ventilating fan, in order to eliminate running thirty-five horsepower dynamo engine during day time, solely for said motor. Result of change will be a saving in coal which will soon repay this expenditure by reducing operating cost of plant.

Carmine Street Bath.

First Quarter—Renewed all three-inch and part of two-inch hot water supply pipes and installed pressure regulating valve. Placed fifteen locks in shower room doors; installed screens over gymnasium ceiling lights; installed steam driven air compressor and altered return line to feed water heater. Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation. Took up with Art Commission plans and specifications for installation of swimming pool, had same modified and resubmitted.

Second Quarter—Covered all hot and cold water pipes with asbestos covering. Put shower doors in good repair. Changed feed water piping to increase efficiency of feed water heater. Repaired slate roof. Installed grate bars in boilers. Specifications drawn for the installation of direct connected engine to replace electric motor for increased efficiency, as in Allen Street Bath. Art Commission approved modified plan for swimming pool. Architect Armstrong requested to redraft his specifications accordingly.

West Sixtieth Street Bath.

First Quarter—Installed new three-inch return line from hot water heaters. Removed flooring in entrance room and replaced same with ceramic floor tile. Erected partitions between waiting rooms. Removed sidewalk vault lights and replaced same with new. Covered water filters and piping in power plant. Removed interior tubes of Davis heater and expanded new tubes into head. Repaired fire boxes and door seams of boilers.

Second Quarter—Rearranged pool floor showers, so half will be warm and half will be cold. Put new head on steam end of Davis hot water heaters. Shifted steam gauges over respective boilers. Installed galvanized iron wire screen over skylights of roof. Covered water filters and piping in power plant.

East Twenty-third Street Bath.

First Quarter—Rewired No. 5 circuit. Repaired six sockets on No. 7 circuit. Repaired blow-off pipe. Constructed and erected two copper covered doors. Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation. Installed new alum tanks for filters.

Second Quarter—Repainted and varnished bath throughout, except engine room and Engineer's living quarters. Installed new doorway, men's toilet in engine room. Made numerous repairs to roof. Cut new door to boiler room from men's shower room, so as to avoid going long way through pool room.

East Seventy-sixth Street Bath.

Second Quarter—To improve ventilation: Installed new window in front of bath at head of engine room stairs. Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation.

East One Hundred and Ninth Street Bath.

First Quarter—Repaired drip lines from pump.

Second Quarter—Painted and varnished bath throughout. Installed new blow-off pipe. Placed roof in repair. Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation.

Rutgers Place Bath.

First Quarter—Painted all plaster and iron work on roof. Temporary shifting of wires and switchboard to accommodate alterations. Installed screens over gymnasium ceiling lights. Began installation of pool under contract, supervised by Architect Armstrong.

Second Quarter—Installed two new windows in locker rooms of gymnasium, to improve ventilation. Calked all joints of marble. Swung doors outward to conform to Fire Department orders. Set up lockers in rooms outside of gymnasium and made rooms more satisfactory as locker rooms. Supervised and reported on installation of new swimming pool and alterations under Mr. Armstrong. Prepared plans and specifications for removing the boiler equipment and old boilers and installing new high pressure boilers, with necessary piping and equipment. Installed new exhaust head on roof. Prepared plans and specifications for lighting pool and new shower compartments not included in Armstrong's contract.

East Eleventh Street Bath.

First Quarter—Repaired 22 shower doors, including hinges. Repaired flanged unions in boilers. Installed two-inch gate valve in overflow line from air separator tank; also three-inch gate valve in vapor pipe. Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation.

Second Quarter—Relocated blow-off tank and installed proper safety valves in boilers. Retubed worn-out hot water generator for showers. Made temporary repairs to entire roof and painted same.

East Fifty-fourth Street Bath.

First Quarter—Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation. Checked C. G. Armstrong's plans for installation of swimming pool.

Second Quarter—Prepared specifications for repairs and addition to power plant. Plans and specifications drawn for new outside lights and approved by Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. Prepared plans and specifications for additional plumbing and electric wiring made necessary by proposed installation of pool, but not included in these specifications.

West Forty-first Street Bath.

First Quarter—Repaired gutter and installed new flashing in place of stolen flashing, and installed ventilators and skylights. Overhauled and repaired Johnson system of temperature regulation. Prepared plans and specifications for alterations and additions to power plant, giving increased coal storage capacity.

Second Quarter—Plans and specifications under way for shifting dynamos, engines and appurtenances, in order to measure capacity of coal bunker and otherwise increase efficiency in operation of plant.

Cherry and Oliver Streets Bath.

First Quarter—Placed wire grills over Gymnasium Director's room. Renewed Tobin return line. Rearranged filter piping, resulting in the saving of a large quantity of water when washing filters.

Second Quarter—Replaced stolen roof flashing.

Rivington Street Bath.

First Quarter—Repaired skylight temporarily and made small repairs to roof. Other work not done because of beginning work on installation of pool, which necessitated demolishing half the building.

Second Quarter—Plans and specifications for the installation of the necessary additional steam heating and plumbing apparatus, to secure economy in operation and facilitate the handling of the increased number of bathers in new pool. Repaired bathroom doors on second floor. Checked progress on pool construction. Prepared plans and specifications for additional electric lighting in connection with new pool not included in Armstrong contract.

Bath Patronage.

Herewith is submitted a schedule showing the patronage of the various interior baths for the first and second quarters:

Free Floating Baths.

First Quarter—Prepared plans and specifications for caulking pontoons; carpenter work and painting in six baths which were used last summer.

Second Quarter—Carpenter work, \$763; pontoon repairs, \$1,168, and painting, \$1,364, finished in good season and baths put in commission on following dates: Battery No. 2, June 18; Battery No. 1, June 21; E. 96th st., No. 12, June 25; W. 51st st., No. 10, June 28; Pike st., No. 15, will be ready by July 5 and E. 5th st., No. 14, shortly thereafter. The latter is to be used for experimental purposes described in detail in a separate paragraph.

Various Public Baths.

First Quarter—Check orders to repair marble work in public baths to the amount of \$240 for each month. This work is being done by an expert Marble Worker who is going from bath to bath until he completes the circuit and repairs all broken marble.

Second Quarter—Framed rules and regulations; distributed a number of unused lockers from Carmine Street Bath to various baths for use of Attendants. Check orders to repair marble work in public baths, to the amount of \$240 for each month continued as noted under first quarter.

Bureau of Buildings, 220 4th Ave.

First Quarter—Handled various minor requisitions for squad repairs.

Second Quarter—Insulated steam pipe with shield so as to make clerical force more comfortable.

300 Mulberry Street.

First Quarter—Painted new quarters of Magistrates' Probation Officers and rooms of ambulance service. Installed new electric lighting system in five rooms on second floor.

Second Quarter—Installed new toilet, third floor. Installed new tanks, etc., for finger print photo service for Magistrates' Courts.

Judges' Chambers, 51 Chambers St.

First Quarter—Painted all concrete floors in hallways. On retirement of Judge McCall made various changes of furniture from room to room to readjust chamber assignments.

Second Quarter—Supplied rugs and runners for all concrete floors in hallway. After death of Judge Bischoff again rearranged offices and furniture to readjust chambers to accommodate new Judge.

Exempt Firemen's Headquarters, E. 59th St.

Second Quarter—Removed sidewalk violation by taking down old stoop and building concrete steps and railing. Filled in old areaway and laid concrete sidewalk. Highway Storeroom, Ridge and Delancey Sts.

First Quarter—Altered old school building for purposes of highway storeroom. Strengthened floor. Removed old plumbing and fixtures and installed new toilet, built two new doorways and reglazed all windows; braced up floor, stalled door and made rooms suitable for storage of highway material and old P. B. & O. second hand furniture.

Finance Department.

Second Quarter—Installed new shades and awnings in Rooms Nos. 150 and 155, 280 Broadway. Erected shelving in Adamson's division.

Chatham Square Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Overhauled rearranged heating system which had deteriorated since original installation. With the added improvement the change resulted in greater comfort to the public at more economical operation.

Second Quarter—Painted station interior complete. Arranged for storeroom by removing some fixtures, capping rail lines, plastering wainscot and laying concrete floor. Began installation of ventilating system.

Mail Street Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Painted interior of station throughout. Began plans and specifications for new efficient lighting and motor for ventilation.

Second Quarter—Started installation of new lighting system and improvements on ventilating system.

Battery Park Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Completed installation of new boiler and rearrangement of heating system, changing from steam to hot water heating, the latter being the proper one for a station of that size, exposed on all sides. The old boiler was obsolete and had to be replaced anyway. The change resulted in simpler and more economical operation and increased comfort to the public.

Greeley Square Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Overhauled heating system.

Second Quarter—Repaired roof and sidewalk over station and installed three drip pipes to take water from parkway above. Painted station throughout. Began installation of new ventilating system.

Hanover Square Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Renewed water supply lines throughout. Installed a new sewage pump. Completed overhauling and rearrangement of heating system for greater comfort to the public and more economical operation. Made numerous repairs to electrical pump and changed location of motor.

Second Quarter—Renewed most of plaster on men's side. Painted interior of station complete. Made numerous repairs to pump motor which was repeatedly clogged by waste materials. Prepared plans for new ventilating system.

Long Acre Square Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Completed overhauling and rearrangement of old and deteriorated heating system; also installation of hot water supply equipment.

Second Quarter—Overhauled stairway and put new marble treads and risers where necessary. Rebuilt large section of sidewalk above station, replacing underfill with concrete. Painted station throughout. Prepared plans for new ventilating system.

Willis Avenue Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Installed shaker grate. Installed eight pet cocks to improve circulation.

Sheriff and Delancey Sts. Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Completed overhauling and rearrangement of heating system which had deteriorated since original installation until it had become inadequate in service and wasteful in operation.

Second Quarter—Reconstructed all window sashes and installed wire glass to stop breakage. Prepared plans for installation of new ventilating fans.

125th Street and Park Avenue Comfort Station.

First Quarter—Completed overhauling and rearrangement of heating system, which had deteriorated since original installation. This work was similar to that done at Long Acre square and Sheriff and Delancey sts. stations, and resulted in the same benefit.

Washington Market.

First Quarter—Extensive floor repairs made as needed. Made repairs to various doors. Made extensive repairs to tin roof, including painting, also show window roofs and main roof leaders. Closet in comfort station for Market Attendant. Began preparation of plans and specifications for new concrete floor, with modern drainage system.

Second Quarter—Renewed three leaders and installed one new one. Continuous repair of flooring as needed. Set up sewage meter. Made a number of roof repairs and skylight repairs. Had various conferences with Washington Market Association regarding needed improvements. Prepared plans and specifications for floor, drainage, refrigeration, counters, etc.

West Washington Market.

First Quarter—Extensive sash chain repairs. Repaired number of leaks in roof gutters.

Second Quarter—Rebuilt burned part of market at cost of \$10,185. Job about two-thirds finished. Repaired gutters and sheds and made few repairs on roof, also repaired iron rolling shutters in front of various stalls.

Fulton Market.

First Quarter—Installed wire screens under broken skylight. Made extensive temporary roof repairs. Only imperative work done owing to lack of funds and loss of patronage in market.

Second Quarter—Placed wire screen under broken skylight glass. Made a number of temporary roof repairs; but no extensive work undertaken for reason given under first quarter.

Jefferson Market.

First Quarter—Painted roof on 6th ave. side.

Second Quarter—Swung doors outward as required by Fire Prevention Bureau. Began plans and specifications for repair of tower and roof.

Asphalt Plant.

Second Quarter—Plans and specifications completed; contract let; work begun and progressing in satisfactory manner. All architectural and supervisory work being done by Department Engineers.

Contract Work.

In addition to the work of the squads and the supervisory work of the Bureau Engineers detailed above, I beg to submit the following progress report of work being done by contract under the jurisdiction of the Bureau:

1. The alterations to the East 57th st. Court, which were outlined in our annual report for 1912, have been completed.

This court building, Nos. 151-153 E. 57th st., was erected in 1863. In the early part of 1912, and for several years preceding, it was occupied by a Magistrates' Court, a Domestic Relations Court and two Municipal Courts; each court room having a separate clerical force and set of offices. In connection with the Magistrates' court room there were two detention pens on the second floor. The rear portion of the

building below the top story was originally constructed, used, and is now used for prison cells, which are under the jurisdiction of the Department of Correction.

The court business in this district had increased to such an extent that the building was not large enough to handle the business properly; and Chief Magistrate McAdoo and President McAneny took steps to improve the conditions. As a result, it was arranged for the Municipal Court to move out of the building to a newly leased building, at No. 207 E. 32d st.; leaving the E. 57th st. building to be used only for a Magistrates' Court and a Domestic Relations Court.

Alterations were then undertaken to accommodate these two courts more advantageously; and in order to carry out these alterations, the Domestic Relations Court was moved, temporarily, to the Prince and Wooster Streets Court Building, and the business of the Magistrates' Court was distributed among the three Magistrates' Courts, at 121st st. and Sylvan place, W. 54th st. and 1st st. and 2d ave.

The alterations involved principally the reconstruction of the Municipal Court room for a Magistrates' Court room, and removing the Magistrates' Court room from the second story rear to the front. The rear court room abutted on a theatre, the noise from which in warm weather, when the windows were opened, was such as to render difficult the carrying on of court proceedings. The detention pens, which were on the second floor, were relocated near their original position, and reconstructed in iron, in place of wood and plaster. A new iron stairway was constructed in the interior courtyard to furnish means for taking prisoners to and from detention pens to the prison department. This new iron stairway took the place of a dark, winding and dangerous stairway. The rear room on the second floor, formerly occupied by the Magistrates' Court, was converted into several rooms, consisting of a day complaint room, night complaint room, a complaint record room, an Assistant District Attorney's room, a Probationary Officers' room and a Night Clerk's private office. On the second floor also there was provided a room for the Children's Society, and also a Court Attendant's room. The room arrangement was so laid out as to bring the prisoners from the prison department to the detention pens and thence into the Magistrates' Court room in such a way as to prevent contact with the public.

On the first floor, the alterations consisted of changing the Domestic Relations Court room into a complaint room and waiting room, and altering the offices adjacent thereto on the west side of the building into suitable offices for the clerical force attached to the Domestic Relations Court. The rooms on the first floor on the east side of the building, formerly occupied by the Municipal Court's Clerks, were altered into a new Domestic Relations Court room.

In connection with these alterations, old toilet rooms were overhauled and modernized; new toilet rooms installed and the entire building was rewired and relighted, and new hardware and a new steam heating system installed throughout, and the entire building cleaned and repainted.

As a result, in place of bringing the prisoners to the court building in a van and taking them through the prison department on the west side of the building, it will be provided that the prisoners will be taken from the van in the east courtyard directly to the iron stairs which lead up to the detention pens.

2. The contract for the new Children's Court, at E. 22d st., was let on February 18, and work was ordered on the 24th. It was found that it would be necessary to go much deeper to secure rock foundation than had been indicated by the borings. This necessitated a delay of several weeks, but the foundations are now practically all in, and the erection of the side walls has been started. It is planned to lay the cornerstone about the first of August.

3. The work of installing a pool in Rutgers Place Baths is being pushed with all possible speed. The additional shower rooms are completed and the pool is to be opened to the public in July. There was some trouble with the filtration plant, but this has been corrected, and as soon as a few minor repairs and alterations have been made by the contractor, the bath will again be in full operation, greatly augmented by its additional accommodations for showers and swimming.

4. The installation of a pool in the Rivington Street Bath has also been delayed by reason of the necessity for sinking piles for a foundation to support the additional structure. It was at first thought that the old foundations would be sufficiently strong, but after demolishing the walls and making borings, it was discovered that they were insecure and that it would be necessary to drive piles to solid rock to support the new structure. Since the passage of that delay, the work has gone on more rapidly, and the contractor claims that he will finish within the time limit specified in the contract; that would be about October 1, taking into account the necessary extensions of time.

5. The contract for the comfort station at Abingdon Square has not yet been let, but bids have been received, and the contract will be let at an early date. This building should be completed before the end of the year. The station at 129th st. and 3d ave. is also included in the same advertisement, and the contract will be let and the work finished at about the same time.

6. The contract for the construction of a new bath and gymnasium on W. 28th st. was let on June 17, and work ordered on shortly thereafter. Practically nothing has been done up to the present time except to begin the excavation. This job is one of the most important now under way, but we hope to have it well started before the end of the year. The contract provides that the work will be completed within two hundred and ten (210) working days, and the Architect, William Emerson, assures us that every effort will be made to complete it within that period.

7. We are not yet in position to say when we will move into the new Municipal Building. The Bridge Department has moved in and is now occupying the 18th floor. It is apparent, however, that they have done so at great inconvenience to themselves and the public dealing with them. Our department is to occupy the 20th and 21st floors, and we are urging the Bridge Commissioner to make every effort to get these floors in such shape as to make it possible for us to occupy them by October 1, when our lease in this building expires. We have prepared a tentative plan for the organization of the operating force, which is attached hereto. On April 21, we requested an appropriation of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$121,519, to cover operating expenses for the remaining six months from July 1. On May 9, the Aldermen voted \$60,759.80, the reduced amount being based upon the fact that we could not possibly get into the building until after July 1. On June 26, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approved the issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$50,834.90, the further reduction being made on the still further delay in the completion of the building. The necessary claims and supporting schedules for the operating force have been approved by both the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and we are ready to undertake the operation of the building as soon as it is turned over to us. I have had a conference with the Bridge Commissioner, and he is anxious to have us undertake the care and maintenance of each floor of the building as it is completed and occupied, if the necessary arrangements can be made with the general contractor, the Comptroller and the Corporation Counsel.

8. As indicated in our annual report for 1912, probably the most complete power plant test ever made is now being conducted at the plant in the Hall of Records. This test was started December 16, 1912, and is to extend over a period of one year in order that results may be obtained which will be accurate for all different conditions which may exist. The object of the test is the determination of data by means of which the actual cost of operation of the plant, including fixed and overhead charges, may be obtained and contrasted with the probable cost of operation when using electrical energy from the New York Edison Company, supplemented perhaps with a purchased supply of steam from the New York Steam Company. The general direction of the test is in the hands of the Bureau of Municipal Research with a board of six advisory engineers representing that Bureau, the Borough President, the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and the New York Edison Company.

The readings obtained from all meters installed for test purposes are worked up in final form by Professor Diederichs, of Cornell University, who forwards the results each month to the members of the Board of Engineers. At the conclusion of the test, all data obtained will be submitted to certain accountants representing the different interested parties for the determination of the actual costs obtained. Until that time no results will be made public.

The New York Edison Company has contributed \$10,000 towards the expenses of the test to be used for payment for services of experts and the permanent observers and this Bureau has already expended in excess of that amount for the installation of testing apparatus, changes in piping and plant appliances.

The plan in question furnishes light, heat and power to the Hall of Records, and, by means of underground connections under Chambers st., supplies these services to the City Hall, County Court House and City Court House, in City Hall Park. As the test period is only half completed, no conclusions should, as yet, be drawn.

9. In accordance with the proposed plan suggested in our annual report of 1912, Floating Bath No. 14 has been equipped with a solid tank for the use of fresh water. The work will be completed about the middle of July, and the bath moored at the foot

of East 5th st. The plan is to have it connected with a Croton hydrant, and fresh water forced into it in sufficient quantities to keep it healthy. Periodical tests are to be made under the supervision of the Health Department.

The following statement showing comparative cost of coal used in the operation of interior baths during the first quarter of 1912, as against the first quarter of 1913, should be of interest, as it shows the still further economy over that recorded in our last annual report:

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, November 5, 1913, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Present—President Frank Gallagher and Commissioners Alexander Keogh and Richard Welling. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of rule 3 (Organization and Powers of the Commission) by changing paragraph 3 to read as follows:

"3. The Secretary, the Chief Examiner, the Assistant Chief Examiners and such Examiners as may be designated by the Commission, shall constitute an Advisory Board, for the discussion of methods of examination and rating, and of such other matters as the Commission may refer to them. The Commission may, whenever necessary, secure the assistance of experts in an examination of a special or technical character. An examination of candidates for the position of Civil Service Examiner shall be conducted by the Commission or by experts employed therefor; but no person shall at any time be employed as an examiner for positions in the Competitive Class who is a public officer, other than a Notary Public or a Commissioner of Deeds, or who is employed in any other department of the City government."

There were no appearances.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service classification by including in the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Public Charities, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," the following: Examining Physician, Sea View Hospital, \$1,800 per annum, with maintenance; Pathologist, Sea View Hospital, \$1,500 per annum, with maintenance. The following named persons appeared in behalf of the proposed amendment: Dr. John F. Fitzgerald, General Medical Superintendent of the Department of Public Charities; J. McKee Borden, Esq., Secretary of the Department of Public Charities; Dr. Edward S. McSweeney, Medical Superintendent of Sea View Hospital, Department of Public Charities; Dr. George O'Hanlon, General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals; Dr. Charles Norris, Director of Laboratories, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Robert W. Belcher, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the amendment in so far as it related to the position of Pathologist and endorsed the same in so far as it related to the position of Examining Physician, Sea View Hospital. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service classification by striking from the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Education, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," all reference to the Nautical School. There were no appearances.

The Commission then resumed the public hearing on the application of the Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan, that the requirement of competition be suspended in the case of Howard Gray and his appointment as Elevator Constructor at \$5.50 per day approved under clause 5 of rule 12, which hearing had been ordered continued at the previous meeting of the Commission. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session, and the minutes of the meetings held October 29 and 30 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the rules of this Commission be and they hereby are amended by changing paragraph 3 of rule 3, to read as follows:

"3. The Secretary, the Chief Examiner, the Assistant Chief Examiners, and such other Examiners as may be designated by the Commission, shall constitute an Advisory Board, for the discussion of methods of examination and rating, and of such other matters as the Commission may refer to them. The Commission may, whenever necessary, secure the assistance of experts in an examination of a special or technical character. Pathologist, \$1,500 per annum.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the Non-Competitive Class, under the heading "Positions in the Department of Education, at compensations not exceeding the amounts set forth below," all reference to the Nautical School.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the provision of the Municipal Civil Service Rules requiring competition be suspended in the case of Howard Gray, of 1635 Croysey ave., Brooklyn, and his appointment in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works as Elevator Constructor in the Municipal Building at \$5.50 per day be and the same hereby is authorized under clause 5 of rule 12, it appearing that Mr. Gray is a person of high and recognized attainments in the desired qualities and that competition in this case is impracticable.

Daniel B. Shea, of 722 E. 180th st., New York City, appeared, as directed, to explain an inaccurate statement made by him in connection with his examination for promotion to the position of Pilot in the Department of Docks and Ferries. Joseph J. Monaghan, of 160 E. 102d st., New York City, a candidate in the examination for promotion to Lieutenant, Fire Department, appeared, as directed, in connection with his appeal for a rerating of his papers. The matter was referred to the Committee on Appeals.

Julius Mishkin, of 974 Aldus st., New York City, appeared, as directed, in connection with his request that his name be restored to the eligible list of Lay Sanitary and Tenement House Inspector, from which it was removed on August 13, 1913, by reason of false statements in his experience sheet. 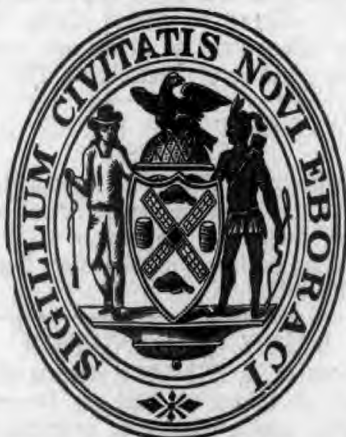

Amendment to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held December 9, 1913, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 108 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended to take effect January 1, 1914, so as to read as follows:

Section 108. It shall be the duty of every owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or person in charge of any and every building or place of business in the generally built-up portions of The City of New York forthwith to provide or cause to be provided, and at all times thereafter to keep and cause to be kept and provided, within such building or place of business, and for the exclusive use of such building or place of business, separate receptacles for receiving and holding, without leakage, all the ashes, garbage and liquid substances that may accumulate during thirty-six hours, from said building or place of business, or the portion thereof of which such person may be the owner, tenant, lessee, occupant or in charge, and every such receptacle designed and used to hold ashes shall be made of or lined with some suitable metal.

And it shall be the duty of every owner, lessee or agent of any such building or place of business to cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles all such materials and substances, and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

And such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area, or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure in front of any building and not upon the sidewalk, and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly banded, packed or otherwise secured.

Any receptacle containing garbage or liquid substances, which shall be placed outside of a building in the area or within the stoop line, fence or other enclosure shall be covered and kept covered until such removal, as aforesaid.

The foregoing provisions are applicable throughout The City of New York, except that in the

Borough of Richmond ashes from house furnaces shall be kept in a receptacle separate and apart from the remainder of the household waste, and no material other than furnace ashes shall be placed in said receptacle.

Other household waste materials, including garbage, kitchen ashes, sweepings, soiled paper or rubbish shall be placed in a separate metal or metal lined receptacle, which when placed outside of a building for removal shall be covered and kept covered with a tight fitting cover.

No receptacle shall when filled contain more than two cubic feet of material nor weigh more than one hundred pounds, and a sufficient number of receptacles shall be provided by the owner, lessee or occupant of a building to hold whatever ashes or other waste materials may accumulate thereat during sixty hours next preceding the removal thereof.

Newspapers, wrapping paper and other light rubbish likely to be blown or scattered about the street shall be securely banded, tied or packed before placed for removal. Yard sweepings, hedge cuttings, grass, leaves, earth, stone bricks or trade waste shall not be mixed with household waste.

Accumulations of household refuse resulting from failure to take advantage of the regular collection service shall be removed at the expense of the person or persons concerned.

Whereas, Bichloride of mercury, otherwise corrosive sublimate, a poison, has frequently been taken by mistake and loss of life has resulted therefrom, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended by the adoption of an additional section to be known as section sixty-seven (a), to take effect March 1, 1914, and to read as follows:

Section 67a. Bichloride of mercury, otherwise known as corrosive sublimate, shall not be held, kept, sold or offered for sale at retail in the dry form except in colored tablets individually wrapped, the wrapper to have the word "Poison" in plain letters conspicuously placed, and dispensed in sealed containers of glass, conspicuously labeled with the word "Poison" in red letters.

This section does not apply to tablets containing one-tenth of a grain or less of bichloride of mercury.

Proposed Form of Contract.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of , 1913, by and between

The City of New York, (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part; witnesseth:

Whereas, By a contract dated July 10, 1912, the Company was authorized to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon and along Desbrosses, Vestry, Washington, Greenwich and Canal streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, to and across the Manhattan Bridge, and upon and along Flatbush Avenue Extension and other streets in the Borough of Brooklyn, from the Desbrosses Street Ferry, Borough of Manhattan, to the Long Island Railroad Depot, Borough of Brooklyn; and

Whereas, By a contract dated , 1913, said contract of July 10, 1912, was amended by extending the times for commencement and completion of construction; and

Whereas, The Company has by a petition dated September 25, 1913, applied to the Board for certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated , 1913, to wit:

First—By substituting for that portion of the route authorized by said contract of July 10, 1912, upon and along Rockwell place, Flatbush ave. from Rockwell place to 4th ave., 4th, Atlantic and 3d aves., in the Borough of Brooklyn, the following routes:

(a) An additional single track upon and along Fulton st. from Flatbush Avenue Extension to Rockwell place; thence by double track upon and along Fulton st. and Ashland place from Rockwell place to Hanson place.

(b) A single track upon and along Lafayette ave. and Flatbush ave. from the above described route on Ashland place to and connecting with the existing route of the Company in Flatbush ave. between 3d ave. and Livingston st.

Second—By amending Section 2, sixth of said contract of July 10, 1912, by permitting the use of overhead electric power upon the Manhattan Bridge, its terminals and approaches.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, to certain modifications and amendments in and to said contract of July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract of , 1913; said modifications and amendments to be as follows:

1. So much of section 1, first (2) of said contract dated July 10, 1912, reading as follows: "thence by single track in and upon Fulton street to Rockwell place, thence by single track in and upon Rockwell place to Flatbush avenue, thence by single track in and upon Flatbush avenue to 4th avenue, thence by single track in and upon 4th avenue to Atlantic avenue, thence by single track in and upon Atlantic avenue to 3d avenue, thence by single track in and upon 3d avenue to Flatbush avenue,"

—is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor: "thence by double track in and upon Fulton street to Ashland place, thence by double track in and upon Ashland place to the northerly side of Hanson place. 2. By adding at the end of Section 1-First of said contract of July 10, 1912, a new paragraph reading as follows:

"The said substituted routes with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized are shown upon a map entitled: 'Map Showing Proposed Substitute Route of the Manhattan Bridge Three Cent Line in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York,' to accompany petition to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated September 25, 1913, and signed by Frederick W. Rowe, President, and J. C. Brackenridge, Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, it to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board."

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—All the terms, provisions and conditions contained in said contract dated July 10, 1912, as amended by said contract dated , 1913, excepting those which are herein amended or modified, shall remain unchanged, and shall apply to the route herein described in Section 1 of this contract, with the same force and effect as when they applied to the route described in said contract dated July 10, 1912, and as though the route herein described had been specifically described in said contract.

Second—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on the routes herein described in and upon Fulton street, Ashland place, Lafayette avenue and Flatbush avenue, to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the company within six (6) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the company shall, within said six (6) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and determine.

Third—The Company shall within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of section 184 of the Railroad Law for the abandonment of that portion of the route granted by said contract dated July 10, 1912, shown in yellow upon the map attached hereto, and more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at the intersection of Rockwell place and Fulton street, thence by single track in and upon Rockwell place to Flatbush avenue, thence by single track in and upon Flatbush avenue to 4th avenue, thence by single track in and upon 4th avenue to Atlantic avenue, thence by single track in and upon Atlantic avenue to 3d avenue, and thence by single track in and upon 3d avenue to Flatbush avenue.

PART OF THE SEVENTH AVENUE-LEXINGTON AVENUE RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD.

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION FOR the First District (hereinafter called the "Commission") invites proposals to construct Section No. 6 of Routes 4 and 38, a part of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within The City of New York between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows: Section No. 6—Beginning at a point under 7th ave., in the Borough of Manhattan, about seventy-five (75) feet north of the northerly building line of W. 30th st., and extending thence northerly under 7th ave. to a point about one hundred (100) feet south of the southerly building line of W. 43d st.

The general plan of construction calls for a subsurface railroad having four and five tracks. The details of the construction of the railroad and appurtenances are more particularly indicated on the contract drawings.

Bidders will not be required to provide or lay tracks, ties or ballast, nor to do station finish work.

The work of construction under the contract will include the construction of all necessary sewers and connections along or off the route of the railroad; also the necessary support, maintenance, readjustment and reconstruction of vaults adjacent to buildings, pipes, tubes, conduits, subways or other subsurface structures; the support and care, including underpinning or the maintaining, protecting and securing, where necessary, of all buildings, monuments, surface and subsurface railroads and other surface, subsurface and overhead structures of any kind, etc., affected by or interfered with during the construction of the work; also the restoration of the sidewalks and roadways.

The method of construction will be by trench excavation under cover, unless otherwise permitted by the Commission, as set forth in the form of contract.

A fuller description of the work to be done is set forth, and other requirements, provisions, details and specifications are stated, in the printed form of contract and in the contract drawings therein referred to. The contract drawings may be inspected at the same office, and copies thereof may be purchased by prospective bidders on payment of five dollars (\$5). The printed form of contract and the contract drawings are to be deemed a part of this invitation.

The City and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company will both be parties to the contract; the Interborough Rapid Transit Company being a party for the purpose of disbursing part of its contribution toward the cost of construction as provided in the contract dated March 19, 1913, between The City of New York, acting by the Commission, and Interborough Rapid Transit Company for the equipment, maintenance and operation of additional rapid transit railroads. The liability of Interborough Rapid Transit Company under the contract for which bids are now invited will be limited to an amount equal to ninety-five (95) per centum of the aggregate sum arrived at by multiplying the estimated approximate quantities by the unit prices, as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. The contractor is to accept the obligation of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company to make payments to the amount and in the manner provided in the contract, and is to agree not to look to the City except to the extent that the amounts earned under the contract may exceed the amount for which the Interborough Rapid Transit Company is liable.

The Commission is informed by the Department of Docks and Ferries that docks and bulkheads along the East River or along the North River may be available for dumping purposes. Information in regard thereto may be obtained by any intending bidder upon inquiry at the office of the Department of Docks and Ferries with whom all arrangements must be made with respect to utilizing such docks and bulkheads as may be available.

Partial payments to the contractor will be made monthly as the work proceeds, as provided in the form of contract.

The contractor will be required to complete the work as soon as practicable and within a period of thirty-six (36) months from the date of the delivery of the contract.

Sealed bids or proposals will be received at the office of the Commission at No. 154 Nassau street, Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, until the 29th day of December, 1913, at twelve fifteen (12.15) o'clock p. m., at which time, or at a later date to be fixed by the Commission, the proposals will be publicly opened.

A statement based upon estimate of the Engineer of the quantities of the various classes of work and of the nature and extent as near as practicable of the work required is to be found in the schedule forming a part of the form of contractor's proposal. The quantities given in such schedule are approximate only, being given as a basis for the uniform comparison of bids, and no claim is to be made against the City on account of any excess or deficiency, absolute or relative, in the same, except as provided in the specifications and form of contract.

All proposals must, when submitted, be enclosed in a sealed envelope endorsed "Proposal for Constructing Part of Rapid Transit Railroad—Routes Nos. 4 and 38, Section No. 6," and must be delivered to the Commission or its Secretary; and in the presence of the person submitting the proposal, it will be deposited in a sealed box, in which all proposals will be deposited. No proposal will be received or deposited unless accompanied by a separate certified check drawn upon a national or state bank or trust company having its principal office in The City of New York satisfactory to the Commission and payable to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York for the sum of Fifteen

Thousand Dollars (\$15,000). Such check must not be enclosed in the envelope containing the proposal.

The unit prices must not be improperly balanced, and any bid which the Commission considers detrimental to the City's interests may be rejected.

No proposal, after it shall have been deposited with the Commission, will be allowed to be withdrawn for any reason whatever.

The award of the contract will be made by the Commission as soon as practicable after the opening of the proposals.

Bidders whose proposals are otherwise satisfactory, in case the sureties or securities named by them are not approved by the Commission, may substitute in their proposals the names of other sureties or securities approved by the Commission, but such substitution must be made within five (5) days after notice of disapproval, unless such period is extended by the Commission.

A bidder whose proposal shall be accepted shall, in person or by duly authorized representative, attend at the said office of the Commission within ten days after the delivery of a notice by the Commission that his proposal is accepted and that the contract is consented to by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and such bidder shall then deliver a contract in the form referred to, duly executed and with its execution duly proved.

At the time of the delivery of the contract the contractor will be required to furnish security to the City by giving a bond for two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000). At the option of the successful bidder, cash or approved securities may be deposited instead of giving a bond. If securities are deposited in place of a bond under the contract, they must be of the character of securities in which savings banks may invest their funds and must be approved by the Commission.

The contractor's bond must be in the form annexed to the form of contract.

In addition and as further security, fifteen (15) per centum of the amounts certified from time to time to be due to the contractor will be deducted until the amounts so deducted and retained shall equal ten (10) per centum of the sum of the amounts resulting from the product of the estimated approximate quantities and the unit prices, as contained in the schedule of unit prices in the contractor's proposal. TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
