DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH.

REPORT FOR WEEK ENDING MAY 30, 1914.

RESULTS OF CLEAN-UP WEEK.

The Department of Health has every reason to be satisfied with the results of Clean-Up Week, and takes this opportunity of expressing its appreciation of the hearty co-operation of all concerned. The greatest burden, naturally, fell on the Department of Street Cleaning, and it is because of the intelligent and effective work of the officers of that Department, that the plans worked out so smoothly and that there was no blocking of thoroughfares with the enormous amount of rubbish removed.

The Clean-Up campaign was conducted in record-breaking time. It commenced at a conference held at the Department of Health on April 29. On May 1 \$15,000 was set aside for special clean-up purposes for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning. The week of May 11 to 17 was devoted to an energetic campaign of publicity and the actual removal of accumulated rubbish was accomplished from May 18 to May 23.

Altogether 1,750,000 circulars of information were distributed throughout the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn. These circulars were printed in English on one side and Yiddish and Italian on the other side. Eight hundred thousand of them were distributed by the agents of the Metropolitan and Prudential Life Insurance Companies and as many more were distributed through the public and parochial schools. The circulars of information stated that an official notice would follow, naming the exact day on which householders should have their rubbish ready for removal. These official notices of the date of removal, 1,500,000 in number, were distributed through the Police Department two days before the actual clean-up began.

In this connection, it may be well to call attention to the new spirit of municipal interest infused into the Police Department by the present administration. This manifested itself by the very efficient manner in which the individual members of the police force taught the householders the intention of the campaign and how they might best carry out its measures.

A large bill posting firm posted notices calling attention to clean-up week, and posted these on all the wagons of the Street Cleaning Department; 800 moving-picture theatres in the City displayed special slides supplied by the Department of Health, announcing "Clean-Up Week," and the newspapers rendered valuable assistance by printing press notices sent out by the Department of Health.

Daily inspections of the sections from which rubbish was being removed showed that the amount placed out for removal was very much less than during the "clean-up" of 1913. In all probability this was due to several factors:

1. The general public have been educated by "Clean-Up" week, and have put out material every week in the year and have not waited until one special week.

2. When the posters appeared on the ash carts in the three Boroughs on May 11, the people living in the poorer quarters immediately began putting out material in excess of the usual amount and in this they were encouraged by the Street Cleaning Department.

It is interesting to compare these totals with those for the Clean-Up Week in 1913: Manhattan, 6,779; The Bronx, 1,589; Brooklyn, 9,347; total, 16,715.

While such clean-up campaigns are undoubtedly of great value both directly in removing the accumulated rubbish and indirectly in educating the public in matters of public health, it seems worth considering whether we should not begin at once to maintain the clean conditions as established now and contrive that each week throughout the year should be "Clean-Up Week."

New York has already made considerable progress in this direction, but it still lags far behind some of the European cities.

PASTEURIZING NEW YORK'S MILK SUPPLY.

The situation regarding the compulsory pasteurization of all except the highest grade of milk sold in this City is extremely satisfactory, at the present time about 99 per cent. of the City's supply being effectively pasteurized. This represents an enormous improvement over conditions a year ago, and should make milk-borne disease a rarity in this City.

The change has been accomplished with a surprisingly few number of arrests and prosecutions. Where the department encountered undue delay on the part of milk dealers in complying with the pasteurization regulations, civil suits were brought to recover judgment. This mode of procedure proved highly efficacious. It undoubtedly has many advantages in certain circumstances over the criminal proceedings brought by other cities in the United States for the same purpose. If the facts are proved in a civil suit, there is no such thing as a "suspended sentence."

The pasteurizing plants are subject to close supervision by the Department of Health, and large numbers of samples of milk are being examined bacteriologically to check up the efficiency of their operation.

The Department has had the cordial co-operation of all the large milk dealers and of nearly all the smaller ones, and there is every reason to believe that at the present time the milk supply of this City is of better quality than that of any other large city in the world.

OUR FOREIGN-BORN POPULATION AS A FACTOR IN THE TUBERCULOSIS PROBLEM.

In an interesting paper presented at the annual meeting of the American San-

atorium Association last week, Dr. Walter Rathbun, Physician in Charge of the Otisville Sanatorium, called attention to the fact that out of 1,197,892 immigrant aliens admitted to this country at Ellis Island during the year ending January 30, 1913, only 38 were debarred on account of having tuberculosis. That this small number represents but a small fraction of immigrants actually tuberculous, will hardly be doubted by any one familiar with the social aspect of this disease. Nor is the failure to recognize a larger number of infected individuals at all surprising in view of the very great number of immigrants to be examined and the wholly inadequate staff of examining physicians.

The following sanatorium and hospital figures giving the proportion of alien patients in typical institutions may be of interest.

Bedford Hills Sanatorium, 84 per cent. foreign-born patients, most of them aliens.
Metropolitan Hospital, 51 per cent. foreign-born patients, 15 per cent. of them aliens.

Bellevue Hospital, 48 per cent. foreign-born patients, 25 per cent. of them aliens.
Riverside Hospital, 45 per cent. foreign-born patients.
Otisville Sanatorium, 42 per cent. foreign-born patients.
Seton Hospital, 39 per cent. foreign-born patients.

The population of New York City includes 40 per cent. of foreign-born people. The proportion of foreign-born patients in the institutions mentioned above is considerably more than it should be. According to Dr. Rathbun, a stricter examination should be made of all immigrants on arriving, and in every instance the chest of these individuals should be examined by physicians skilled in the diagnosis of pulmonary tuberculosis. Dr. Rathbun suggests that the Federal Government appoint a commission of experts to study the situation and to outline a more thorough system of examination.

A NEW BUREAU OF PUBLIC HEALTH EDUCATION.

On May 26, 1914, the Board of Aldermen by a vote of 54 to 4, recorded its approval of a proposal made by the Commissioner of Health, and subsequently endorsed by the Board of Health and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to establish in the Department of Health a Bureau of Public Health Education.

The Civil Service position of Director of the Bureau of Public Health Education has been established at a salary of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars per annum, and it is understood that the appointee will devote his time and attention to the work of the Bureau to the exclusion of all conflicting professional interests. Pending the appointment of a permanent director of the new bureau, Dr. Charles F. Bolduan, formerly assistant to the General Medical Officer of the Department, has been directed to organize a Division of Public Health Education, with such means as are available; Dr. Bolduan has been designated temporarily Chief of Division and has been made directly responsible to the Commissioner.

Among the suggested functions of the proposed Bureau of Public Health Education are the following:

1. To prepare and publish popular leaflets dealing with various matters of public health; to issue press bulletins; and to edit the regular publications of the Department of Health, including the Weekly Bulletin, the Monthly Bulletin, and Staff News, and such other publications as may hereafter be issued.
2. To organize and direct public health lectures, both independently and in connection with the existing educational, social, medical and civic agencies.
3. To prepare traveling exhibits to be shown in various parts of the City, designed to educate the public in various phases of public health.
4. To prepare and exhibit moving picture films dealing with public health work.
5. To administer the library of the Department of Health and conduct in connection therewith a Journal Club for the study by Department officials of public health literature.
6. To assist in the organization of a school of sanitary science or in the preparation of practical courses in public health in conjunction with medical schools and colleges.
7. To organize educational lecture and study courses within the Department for the training of various groups of workers.

WOOD ALCOHOL A DANGEROUS ADULTERANT.

Many states specifically forbid the use of wood alcohol for foods, drink and medicinal preparations, while some forbid it even in preparations for external use. New Jersey forbids it entirely in preparations intended for human use. New York forbids it for internal use and requires preparations for external use to be properly labeled. The result is that some manufacturing concerns in New York City make two kinds of preparations for external use, one for New York containing wood alcohol, and another for New Jersey without it.

The Sanitary Code of 1912 (Sec. 66A) forbade the use of wood alcohol in all preparations for human use. In 1913 this section was amended so as to allow wood alcohol in preparations for external use, provided it was properly labeled. It would appear from a year's trial of this amended law that it is not working satisfactorily. Since July 1, 1912, there has been a large use of wood alcohol in toilet waters, bay rums, hair tonics, cologne, etc., sold in New York City. It is difficult to see how such labeling will, for example, help the patron of a barber shop, for it is manifestly quite impossible for him to read the labels from his chair. Moreover, it is well to remember that the use of preparations of this nature may be the cause of dermatitis, or more serious affections.

From July 1, 1913, the Department of Health has examined 233 toilet preparations intended for external use. The table shows the results of these analyses. It should be added that the presence of wood alcohol was not stated on the label of any of the preparations found to contain wood alcohol.

That is, more than one-third of these preparations intended for external use contained wood alcohol. It is interesting to know that so far as the experience of the Health Department is concerned, there is at present little general use of wood alcohol in New York City in manufactured beverages.

On June 7, 1906, Congress passed an act known as the "Denaturing Act" which, for the purpose of supplying tax-free alcohol for technical purposes, allowed various substances to be added to grain alcohol in order to render it unfit for drinking. Such mixtures are not subject to the internal revenue tax.

In order to make what is termed "completely denatured alcohol," the United States Internal Revenue Law provides that "to every 100 parts of volume of grain alcohol there shall be added 10 parts by volume of approved methyl alcohol and one-half of one part by volume of approved benzene." The wood alcohol used must be only partially purified. Under certain conditions special denaturation is also permitted, and in such cases wood alcohol alone may be used as the denaturant in the proportion of 5 parts by volume of approved wood alcohol to 100 parts of volume of grain alcohol. This is a very dangerous mixture for there is nothing to prevent its use as a beverage. Unless it can be shown that this form of denaturation is absolutely indispensable, it would appear wise to prohibit it.

From what has been said it seems clear that wood alcohol should not be allowed in preparation even for external use, for authenticated statistics now available show that cases of serious poisoning have occurred from the external application of these preparations. Denatured alcohol is a most useful agent in the arts and sciences, but only those substances should be allowed as denaturants that are so offensive and nauseating as to make it impossible to use the mixture in or on the human body.

It is due the people of New York City, not only to be warned of the dangers of wood alcohol, but to be protected as well. This dangerous substance has no legitimate place in any preparation intended for human use internally or externally, and it should be therefore absolutely prohibited for such purposes. Legislation designed to accomplish this end is now under consideration.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, the same being a chapter of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Garages.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 370a is hereby added to the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, reading as follows:

Sec. 370a. No garage permit for the storing of motor vehicles containing volatile inflammable oil in their fuel tanks shall be issued for any building, shed or enclosure, unless that portion of such building, shed or enclosure in which such motor vehicles are stored is constructed of fire-resisting material; the provisions of this section to apply only to premises where no volatile inflammable oil is stored, and which are situated:

(a) Within 25 feet of the nearest wall of a building occupied as a tenement house, church, hotel, place of public amusement or assembly, school, wholesale drug store, premises where dry goods or other highly inflammable materials are manufactured or kept for sale, cleaning and dyeing establishments, or any premises where combustible fibres are stored.

(b) Within 50 feet of any premises where ammunition or fireworks are manufactured or stored; where inflammable or combustible mixtures, paints, varnishes, lacquers or matches are manufactured or stored in wholesale quantities; where nitro-cellulose products are used for further manufacture, or where inflammable motion picture films are manufactured or stored in quantities aggregating more than 10,000 feet.

(c) Within 100 feet of any premises where calcium carbide is manufactured or stored in quantities exceeding 120 pounds; or where gases under pressure are manufactured or stored in quantities greater than 250 cubic feet.

(d) Within 200 feet of a magazine for the storage of explosives, of the First, Second, Third or Fourth Class.

Section 97 is hereby amended to read as follows:
Section 97. Dumbwaiter Shafts.—All dumbwaiter shafts hereafter created in any building, except such as do not extend more than three stories above the cellar or basement in dwelling houses, shall be inclosed in suitable walls of brick or with burnt-clay blocks, set in iron frames of proper strength, or fireproof blocks, strengthened with metal dowels, or such other fireproof material and form of construction as may be approved by the [Commissioner] Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction. Said walls or construction shall extend at least three feet above the roof and be covered with a skylight at least three-fourths the area of the shaft, made with metal frames and glazed. All openings in the inclosure walls or constructions shall be provided with self-closing fireproof doors. When the shaft does not extend to the floor level of the lowest story, the bottom of the shaft shall be constructed of fireproof material.
In all existing buildings where the dumb-waiter shaft extends into the cellar or lowest story, it shall be inclosed in that story with walls of brick eight inches thick; all openings in said walls shall be provided with self-closing fireproof doors.
All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE regulating fences, signs, billboards, roof signs, advertisements and other structures in The City of New York.
Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. All fence, billboard and sign structures erected upon the ground and all roof sign structures shall be erected entirely within the building line and be properly secured, supported and braced and shall be so constructed as not to be or become dangerous.
Section 2. Ground Sign Structures—(1) No ground fence, billboard or sign structure within the fire limits of The City of New York as now or hereafter constituted, shall be at any point over twelve feet above the adjoining ground, except that when the face of any such structure, excepting the ornamental moulding thereof, shall be constructed entirely of metal or of wood covered on all sides with sheet metal, such structure shall not be at any point over twenty-four feet above the adjoining ground.
(2) Any person, firm or corporation that shall occupy any vacant lot or premises with a billboard or other advertising ground structure or device, shall be subject to the same duties and responsibilities as the owner of such lot or premises with respect to keeping the same clean, sanitary, inoffensive and free and clear of all noxious substances in the vicinity of such billboard, structure or device; and with respect to the removal of snow from the sidewalk and curb in front thereof.
Section 3. Roof Sign Structures—(1) All roof sign structures shall be so constructed as to leave a clear space of at least seven feet between the roof level and the lowest part of such structure and at least five feet between the vertical supports thereof; such structures shall be set back at least six feet from the face of the front and rear walls and shall not interfere with any openings in the roof or with any fire escape. Such structures, excepting the ornamental surface moulding thereof, shall be constructed entirely of metal, including the uprights, supports and braces for same, and shall be required to bear a wind pressure of not less than thirty pounds to the square foot of area subject to wind pressure.
(2) No roof sign structure having a tight, closed or solid surface shall be at any point over thirty-one feet above the roof level. Roof sign structures not having a tight closed or solid surface may be erected upon fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding seventy-five feet above the roof level, and upon non-fireproof buildings to a height not exceeding fifty feet above the roof level, but the portions of such structures covered and exposed to wind pressure shall not exceed thirty-five per cent. of the total area.
Section 4. Signs on Walls of Buildings—(1) No sign shall be so erected as to cover the doors or windows of any building or otherwise prevent free ingress or egress to or from any window, door or fire escape on any building in The City of New York.
(2) No sign shall be erected upon the front, rear or side wall of any building so as to project above either the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall; except that a sign erected at a right angle to the building wall, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to such wall does not exceed two feet may be erected to a height not exceeding two feet above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall. A sign attached to a corner and parallel to the vertical line of such corner, shall be deemed erected at a right angle to the building wall.
(3) No electric sign as defined in the Electric Sign Ordinance approved July 24th, 1912, the horizontal width of which sign parallel to the building wall shall exceed two feet, and no part of or appendage to any such sign shall project more than three feet beyond the building line.
Section 5. Unlawful Structures—Upon the adoption of this ordinance the fire department of The City of New York shall notify by registered mail the owner or lessees of any sign structure attached at other than a right angle to the wall of the building and extending outside the building line and projecting above the roof cornice or parapet wall or above the roof level where there is no cornice or parapet wall, and of any sign structure which shall be so erected as to prevent free ingress and egress to and from any door, window or fire escape of any building, to remove or alter such structures so as to comply with this ordinance. If such order is not complied with within sixty days, The City of New York shall remove such structure at the expense of such owner or lessee.
Section 6. Permits—(1) No ground-sign or roof-sign structure shall be erected unless plans and specifications, showing the dimensions, material and details of construction, accompanied by the written consent of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees of the property upon which it is to be erected, shall have been filed with the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction, nor until all of the provisions of Section 4 of the Building Code of The City of New York relating to such structures shall have been complied with, nor until a permit for its erection shall have been obtained from such Superintendent of Buildings. In the case of a sign structure illuminated by electricity, a certificate must also be procured from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, certifying that the electric wiring and electric appliances of the proposed sign are in conformity with the rules and regulations of that department.
(2) Before any permit shall be issued under this ordinance, a permit fee shall be paid to the Bureau of Buildings as follows: For ground structures, \$2; for roof structures having a tight, closed or solid surface, \$5; for roof structures not having a tight, closed or solid surface, \$10. Every structure for which a permit is issued shall be inspected at least once in each calendar year by the Bureau of Buildings.
Section 7. Registration and Identification—Every ground-sign and roof-sign structure, existing or hereafter erected, shall be registered with the Bureau of Buildings of the Borough in which such structure is situated by the person, firm or corporation maintaining the same, and shall have displayed upon the front thereof the name and address of such person, firm or corporation, and the serial number of the permit issued for such structure. The Bureau of Buildings may issue permits in several series so as to distinguish between existing structures and new structures erected in conformity with this ordinance, or between various classes of structures, and may prescribe suitable regulations not inconsistent herewith concerning the form and contents of the applications for various classes of permits. Permits shall be issued for existing structures not conforming to the requirements of this ordinance, provided such structures are erected in conformity with the legal requirements in effect when they were erected, but no fees shall be charged for permits or registration for such existing structures.
Section 8. Unsafe Structures—Should any fence, sign, bill board or roof-sign structure be or become insecure or in danger of falling or otherwise unsafe, in the opinion of the Bureau of Buildings, the owner thereof or the person maintaining the same shall upon notice from said bureau, immediately in case of immediate danger and in any case within ten days, secure the same under the supervision of and in the manner to be approved by said Bureau in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance.
Section 9. Alteration of Existing Sign Structures—No existing fence, sign, billboard or roof-sign structure shall be enlarged, rebuilt, structurally altered or relocated unless or until it shall comply with the provisions of this ordinance. This shall not apply to the relettering or rewiring of illuminated signs.
Section 10. Exceptions—(1) No part of this ordinance shall apply to walls constructed wholly or principally of stone, marble, brick, terra cotta, concrete or other like material composing a masonry or monolithic wall, back yard fences on the ground in the interior of a court, picket fence and ornamental metal fences.
(2) No part of this ordinance except section 4 shall apply to signs, showbills and other boards permitted by and erected in compliance with section 260 of the General Ordinances of The City of New York or to electric signs permitted by and erected in compliance with the provisions of the Electric Sign Ordinance approved July 24th, 1912.
Section 11. Penalty and Abatement—(1) No fence, sign, billboard or roof-sign

structure shall be erected in The City of New York except as in this ordinance provided under a penalty of \$100 for each offense. No such structure shall be maintained in The City of New York contrary to the provisions of this ordinance under a penalty of \$10 for each day or part of a day the same shall be so maintained.

(2) In addition, any fence, sign, billboard or roof-sign structure erected or maintained in violation of this ordinance shall be subject, upon notice, to abatement by the Bureau of Buildings having jurisdiction.

Section 12. Except as expressly hereinbefore provided in section 5 hereof, this ordinance shall have no retroactive effect.

Section 13. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 14. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

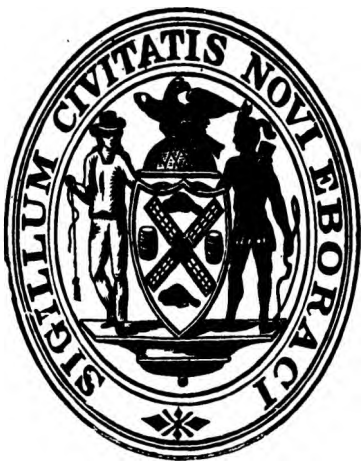

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health, held May 27, 1914, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That Section 165 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to take effect immediately:

Section 165. No person shall allow to be retained unburied the dead body of any human being for a longer time than four days or where death has resulted from small pox, diphtheria (croup), scarlet fever, epidemic cerebro-spinal meningitis, acute poliomyelitis, yellow fever, typhus fever, plague, Asiatic cholera or measles, for a longer time than twenty-four hours, after death of such person, without a permit from the Sanitary Superintendent or an Assistant Sanitary Superintendent, which permit shall specify the length of time during which such body may be retained unburied.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in

the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beams, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
