MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Wednesday, Jan. 23, 1918, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—James E. MacBride, President; Morris Cukor and William Drennan, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Municipal Court," by including therein the following: Clerk to each District; Deputy Clerk to each District; 44 Assistant Clerks. Aaron J. Levy, President-Justice, Municipal Court; John R. Davies, Justice, 7th District Municipal Court, Manhattan; William C. Wilson, Justice, 9th District Municipal Court, Manhattan, and Harry Robitzek, Justice, Municipal Court, Bronx, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. Frederick Spiegelberg, Justice, 5th District Municipal Court, Brooklyn, and George T. Keyes, Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also addressed the Commission. Jeremiah J. O'Leary, Clerk, 5th District Municipal Court, Brooklyn, appeared in opposition. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

In connection with the public hearing called on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Competitive Class, by transferring the titles of Assistant Court Clerk and Deputy Court Clerk from Part V, the Legal Service, to Group I of Part II, the Clerical Service, the Acting Chief Examiner presented a report dated Jan. 19 relative to a communication dated Dec. 31, 1917, and a memorandum dated Jan. 14, 1918, from the Clerk of the City Court, and recommended the following changes in the Municipal Civil Service classification:

(a) By striking from Part V (the Legal Service) the titles Assistant Court Clerk; Deputy County Clerk. (b) By striking from Part II (the Clerical Service), Group 3, Stenographers, the title Court Stenographer. (c) By striking from Part I (Ungraded Positions), Group 3 (Positions of a Special or Miscellaneous Character), the titles Interpreter; Court Attendant—and by adding to Part II (the Clerical Service) the following: Group 5, Court Positions: Court Clerk; Deputy Court Clerk; Assistant Court Clerk; Court Stenographer; Interpreter—and by including in Part VI (the Attendance Service) the title Court Attendant. The Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing on the proposed amendments for Jan. 30.

The Commission then went into regular session.

The matter of the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Exempt Class by including under the heading "Municipal Court" the titles: Clerk to each District; Deputy Clerk to each District, 44 Assistant Clerks, was laid over.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That in the absence of James E. MacBride, President of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Morris Cukor, Commissioner, be and he is hereby designated Acting President.

Otto H. Schultze, Charles Norris and Douglas Symmers appeared, as directed, to show cause why their names should not be removed from the eligible list of Chief Medical Examiner of the City of New York, under the provisions of Clause 14 of Rule VII, and why such eligible list should not be cancelled, and requested an adjournment of the matter in order that they might be represented by counsel. The request was granted.

Stanley L. Wang, Acting Medical Superintendent, Sea View Farms, and Clifford J. Gordon, Clerk, Department of Public Charities, appeared and requested approval of the employment, under the provisions of Clause 11 of Rule XVIII, of Harry F. Ary, Physician, who did not possess a license to practice medicine in the State of New York, which appointment was disapproved by the Commission on Dec. 12. The request was denied, and the Secretary was instructed to request the department to terminate the services of the said employee forthwith.

Ruth Oppenheimer, 1st ave. and 26th st., Manhattan, failed to appear, as directed, in connection with her application for employment, under the provisions of Clause 11 of Rule XVIII, as Assistant Pathologist in Bellevue Hospital, and the Secretary was instructed to summon her for the next regular meeting of the Commission.

Nathan Schwartz, 251 W. 34th st., Manhattan, appeared in connection with his request that the position of Chief of the Bureau of Industrial Hygiene in the Department of Health be filled as the result of an open competitive instead of a promotion examination. The Secretary was instructed to request the Commissioner of Health to have a representative appear at the next meeting of the Commission to state his views in the matter.

Edward N. Lennon, 311 W. 121st st., Manhattan, appeared in connection with his appeal that the Commission accept and rate three sheets of answers in the examination for promotion to Lieutenant, Police Department, held July 12, 1917, which he had inadvertently neglected to deliver to the monitor and which he had discovered on his desk after the noon recess. Captain William J. McGrath and Sergeant Charles J. Donovan also appeared in connection with the appeal. The appeal was granted.

Walter Kunze failed to appear, as directed, to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list of Patrolman, under the provisions of Clause 14 of Rule VII, for physical disability. On motion, it was



All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either included in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department
