The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Ianuary 27, 1877: The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,187, as follows, viz.: I public building, 630 tenement-houses, 33 private dwellings, 53 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 38 stables, 64 slaughter-houses, 1 dumping-ground, 4 dangerous chimneys, 1 cesspool, 7 sunken and vacant lots, 40 yards, courts, and areas, 43 cellars and basements, 79 waste-pipes and drains, 96 privies and water-closets, 5 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 17 other nuisances, 4 dangerous stairways, together with 46 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious and infectious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary Inspectors was 360.

During the past week 62 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

27 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

16 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 42 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 38 houses, 38 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of small-pox was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending January 27, 1877, there were issued from this bureau 441 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transitu, and 51 for the interment of still-born intants. There were recorded 441 deaths, 116 marriages, 464 births, 51 still-births, and 45 returns from Coroners. There were 28 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth record, 6 transcripts of marriage, and 21 of death were issued from this Bureau.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent:

Sir—We have the honor to report that, at the request of the President of the Board of Health, we visited the farm of Mr. Charles Mulford, in the neighborhood of Guymard, Orange Co., N. Y., about 80 miles from New York. We reached there on the afternoon of Saturday, December 23, 1876, and were present at the evening's milking.

His herd consists of some 22 cows, of which but four were at that time regular milkers; eight were "strippers," or cows that were nearly dried up, and the rest were dry. Only the regular milkers were milked that evening.

The cow Charley was stated to be half Ayrshire; all the others were of the common breed, That evening, after all had retired, Mr. T. C. Doremus and his friend Mr. Root arrived, and the next morning (December 24) the cows were milked in our presence, and the mtlk tested with the lactometer, both by the above-named gentlemen and by ourselves. The results were as follows:

With the exception of the Black cow, all of the strippers were with calf, and were expected to be delivered in about two or two and a half months. The Black cow had never yielded much milk since her calf was taken from her, and was to be fatted and killed for beef. Her milk looked very thin and watery, and was full of stringy curds which clogged the strainer. Indeed the product from all the strippers was not true milk, and was in no way suitable for domestic use. The product from the pregnant rows was essentially colostrum.

The total yield of the four regular milkers for the evening and morning together, was 34½ quarts, an average of 85% quarts per day from each cow, which is considered a fair average yield for the winter season.

The total yield from the eight strippers was 12½ pints, or an average of 1½ pints per day.

The food of the cows, so far as we saw, was out straw only.

Mr. Mulford stated that after that morning he should not again milk the strippers Fanny, Star,
Andrew, Mooly, Spot, or Black, until after calving.

Samples of the milk from Fanny, Mooly, and the Black cow, all whose milk stood below 100
on the lactometer, were taken, and on reaching New York, they were submitted to examination.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR-441 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, January 27, which was an increase of 25 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 90 less than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the

week ending January 20, was 410, which is 148.2 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 19.92 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,070,276.

The increase in the mortality of the past, compared with the previous week, was from the following causes, viz.: Scarlatina 9, whooping cough 3, typhus fever 1, diarrhead diseases 9, bronchitis 6, diseases of the heart 5, marasmus and scrofula 2, and diseases of the nervous system 14; there was a decrease, however, of 2 deaths from measles, 2 from diphtheria, 3 from cancer, 4 from phthisis pulmonalis, 2 from pneumonia, and 15 from Bright's disease and nephritis.

The deaths for the week included 25 from scarlatina, 18 from diphtheria, 9 from membranous croup, 7 from whooping cough, 1 from 19phus fever, 2 from typhoid fever, 6 from puerperal diseases, 81 from phthisis pulmonalis, 52 from pneumonia, 27 from bronchitis, and 14 from Bright's disease and nephritis.

Of the total mortality for the week, 99 were children under 1 year, 131 under 2 years, 166 under 5 years, and 43 were 70 years and upwards; 82 were in institutions, 124 were in houses containing 3 families and less, 218 were in tenement-houses, 9 were in hotels and boarding-houses, and the balance in the streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 81 on the first, 127 on the second, 73 on the third, 49 on the fourth, 12 on the fifth, and 2 on the sixth.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 20, is distributed in the following wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 0; Third, 1; Fourth, 13; Fifth, 2; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 9; Eighth, 8; Ninth, 14; Tenth, 24; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth 23; Thirteenth, 11; Fourteenth, 10; Sixteenth, 17; Seventeenth, 35; Eighteenth, 22; Nineteenth, 60; Twentieth, 28; Twenty-first, 25; Twenty-second, 43; Twenty-three, 5; Twenty-fourth, 7.
