Upon motion, the matter of Brook avenue was laid over to the next meeting of the Board.
Mr. O'Gorman addressed the Board in favor of the opening of Stebbins avenue, from Westchester avenue to Boston avenue.

Upon motion, this matter was laid over.

That on April 21st instant he transmitted to the Department of Public Parks grade and monument maps, plans and profiles of certain streets and avenues in the Fordham Heights District, together with a copy of a resolution adopted by this Board on April 14 last, requesting said Department to furnish this Board with five maps similar in all respects to the maps transmitted; that on April 21st instant, he transmitted to the Department of Public Parks plan and profile map of Bremer avenue and Devoe street with a copy of a resolution adopted by this Board on April 14 last, requesting said Department to furnish this Board with five maps similar in all respects to the map transmitted; that on April 21st instant, he transmitted to the Department of Public Parks a plan and profile map of East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street, from Jerome avenue to Webster avenue, together with a copy of a resolution adopted by this Board on April 14 last, requesting said Department to furnish this Board with five maps similar in all respects to the map transmitted; that on April 14 last, he transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation copies of resolutions adopted by this Board on April 14 last, requesting him to take the necessary proceedings to acquire title for the use of the public to Sedgwick avenue, from Twenty-third Ward line to Fordham Landing road, and to Rider avenue, from One Hundred and Thirty-sixth to One Hundred and Forty-fourth street; also copy of a resolution protesting against the passage by the Legislature of any bill imposing any part of the assessment for the opening of a public park or public place in the City of New York upon said city; also copy resolution requesting him to prepare and urge the passage by the Legislature of an act repealing all laws now in force which make any portion of the amount awarded for damages and the expenses attending the opening of any street, avenue or road in the City of New York a charge upon said city; also copy resolution requesting his opinion upon the power of this Board to close what is known as Highbridge Park, in the Twelfth Ward of the City of New York.
