AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, March 26, 1890, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Present—The Comptroller, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Howe.

The minutes of stated meeting of March 19, 1890, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills contained in Vouchers Nos. 5728 to 5743, inclusive, amounting to \$1,100.

On motion of Commissioner Howe, the same were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the resignation of Assistant Engineer Edward F. Playle, and recommended that the same be accepted, to take effect on April 12, 1890.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was accepted.

The Committee also presented the resignation of James J. Chrystal, Chairman, and recommended that the same be accepted, to take effect on April 1, 1890.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the same was accepted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That upon the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, the contract for furnishing two complete portable hoisting plants, for use on the New Aqueduct, be and the same is hereby awarded to the West Point Manufacturing Company, Limited, at their bid of \$3,900 each, it being the only bid received, and less than the estimate of the Chief Engineer for doing said work.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker Scott and Howe—5.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following preamble and resolutions: Whereas, The Chief Engineer of this Commission has certified in writing that, in his opinion, Brown, Howard & Co. have completely performed and carried out the provisions of the contract made with this Commission on the 20th day of December, 1884, for constructing Section 3 of the New Aqueduct, and has stated from actual measurements the whole amount of work done and materials furnished under and according to the terms of said contract, and of the true value thereof; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Aqueduct Commissioners do accept the work done and materials furnished by Brown, Howard & Co., under the contract made by them with this Commission on the 20th day of December, 1884, for constructing Section 3 of the New Aqueduct, and that a proper voucher for the final payment for work done and materials furnished under said agreement be approved by the Commissioners and certified to the Comptroller for payment.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby requested to withhold payment upon the final estimate for Section 3, when transmitted to him, until the receipt of the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation or of the special counsel retained by him, upon the question as to the deduction of damages for overtime submitted on May 27, 1889, relative to the order for lining the whole conduit with masonry.

On motion of the Comptroller, the same were laid on the table.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That an additional appropriation of \$1,000 be and the same is hereby made, to provide for paying salaries of the Machinists and Laborers employed on all the submerged portions of the New Aqueduct, and to meet such contingencies as may arise in testing the said New Aqueduct.

The same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, and Commissioners Duane, Tucker, Scott and Howe—5.

On motion of the Comptroller, the Chief Engineer was directed to make a report to the Committee on Construction at its next meeting of the expenditures already made from the appropriation heretofore made for testing the Aqueduct.

The Committee also presented the following:

The Construction or Executive Committee report:

That they have examined the claim of Francis W. Mahon, recently employed as an Inspector of Masonry, to be allowed pay for time deducted from his salary from January 1 to 21 and from April 17 to May 3, 1889, and being satisfied that he is not entitled to pay for said time, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the claim of Francis W. Mahon, above referred to, be and the same is hereby denied.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the report was adopted.

The Committee also presented the following:

The Construction or Executive Committee report:

That they have examined into the matter of the request of James N. Drake to have a portion of the sidewalk in front of his premises restored to its proper condition, the same having been destroyed by the contractors for Section 16 in laying pipe in Ninth avenue, between One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Hancock place; and the Chief Engineer having examined into the matter, and having recommended that said request be complied with, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Chief Engineer be and he is hereby directed to have the sidewalk over the stop-cock vault built in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, opposite the premises of James N. Drake, restored to its former condition by the MacKnight Flintic Stone Company on such terms as may be arranged with said company.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the report was referred back to the Committee on Construction.

Commissioner Scott, from the Special Committee appointed on March 19, 1890, presented the following:

Commissioner Scott, from the Special Committee appointed to oppose any proposed legislation providing for the trial of contractors' claims in other than the regularly constituted tribunals of this State, reported that he had received from Albany a copy of the bill, which is herewith submitted, which was introduced by Senator Erwin and referred to the Committee on Judiciary; that he has notified the Counsel to the Corporation of the fact that such a bill had been introduced, and of its general provisions, and had requested his co-operation in opposing it; and herewith submits, as a part of this report, a copy of the letter so addressed to the Counsel to the Corporation as the most convenient form of presenting a brief summary of the bill. He also reported that Mr. John O'Brien, who professed to be the promoter of the bill, had stated at the meeting of the Construction Committee that a hearing upon the bill would be had on Thursday, March 27, 1890, at half-past two o'clock; that it would be impossible for the Special Committee appointed at the last meeting of the Board to prepare at such short notice to make the proper presentation of the objections to such a bill, and thereupon offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Judiciary Committee of the Senate be and hereby are requested to appoint a day subsequent to the present week for a hearing upon the bill introduced by Senator Erwin, entitled "An Act to provide for the speedy determination and settlement of all claims arising out of and relating to the construction of the New Croton Aqueduct, new reservoirs and dams, with the appurtenances thereto, for the purpose of supplying the City of New York with an increased supply of pure and wholesome water;" and that said committee be requested to notify this Commission of the date that may be fixed for said hearing.

AN ACT to provide for the speedy determination and settlement of all claims arising out of and relating to the construction of the New Croton Aqueduct, new reservoirs and dams, with the appurtenances thereto, for the purpose of supplying the City of New York with an increased supply of pure and wholesome water.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Any person having a claim against the City of New York for work, labor and services performed for or upon or for materials furnished to or for the New Croton Aqueduct, new reservoirs and dams, in pursuance of chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883, of the State of New York and the acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, may any time after the said work, labor and services shall have been performed or said materials shall have been furnished, serve or cause to be served upon the Board of Aqueduct Commissioners created by said chapter 490 of the Laws of 1883 of the State of New York and all acts amendatory thereof or supplementary thereto, and upon the Comptroller of the City of New York, an itemized statement of his claim which shall specify the kind or class of work performed and the materials furnished and the reasonable value thereof, and by whose authority said work, labor and services were performed or said materials were furnished. Said statement shall be verified by the oath of the claimant before a person duly authorized to administer the same under the Laws of the State of New York, which said verifications shall be to the effect that the said claimant has duly rendered and performed said work, labor and services or duly furnished said materials, and as to the reasonable value thereof, and at whose instance, order or request the same were rendered, performed or furnished, and whether any part thereof has been paid.

Sec. 2. The said Board of Aqueduct Commissioners shall, within thirty (30) days after the receipt of said verified statement or claim as hereinbefore provided, notify said person or claimant in writing as to whether said claim or any part thereof is allowed or rejected, designating specifically which part thereof is allowed or rejected.

Sec. 3. The said Board of Aqueduct Commissioners, upon the allowance of any claim or any part thereof as hereinbefore provided, shall within ten (10) days after the same shall have been so allowed, audit said claim and certify the same to the said Comptroller, and said Comptroller shall within five (5) days thereafter cause said claim so allowed to be paid to the said claimant upon said claimant signing a proper voucher therefor.

Sec. 4. In case any claim or part thereof served as hereinbefore provided shall have been rejected, or said Board of Aqueduct Commissioners shall have neglected to act in regard thereto or shall have failed to carry out the foregoing provisions, then and in that case the claimant, his executors, administrators or assigns may, if he or they so elect, after first giving the notice required in the next section of this act, apply to the Supreme Court at a Special Term thereof to be held in the Second Judicial District, for the appointment of one or more disinterested and competent persons (not exceeding three) as arbitrators, who shall be citizens and freeholders of the State of New York. Upon such application he shall present to the Court a petition duly signed and verified by said applicant, according to the practice of said Court, setting forth the matters and acts required in the foregoing sections, and shall annex thereto a true copy of his claim as served upon the said Board and Comptroller, and praying for the appointment of said arbitrators.

Sec. 5. The applicant shall, at least eight days before the date when said petition is to be presented to the Special Term of the said Supreme Court in the Second Judicial District, serve or cause to be served on the said Board of Aqueduct Commissioners and the Mayor of the City of New York a copy of the said petition, with any papers which may be attached thereto, together with a notice stating the time and place where the said petition will be presented to said Court.

Sec. 6. At the time and place mentioned in said notice, unless the said Court shall adjourn said application to a subsequent day, and, in that event, at the time to which the same may be adjourned, the Court, upon due proof to its satisfaction of the due service of the papers required in section 5, and upon the filing of the said petition, shall make an order appointing one or more (not exceeding three) disinterested and competent citizens and freeholders of the State of New York as arbitrators, who shall try, hear and determine all matters referred to in the said petition and claim thereto annexed. Such order shall fix the time and place for the first meeting of the said arbitrators.

Sec. 7. Each of the said arbitrators shall take and subscribe the oath required to be taken by referees appointed by the Supreme Court, to hear, try and determine, and shall cause the same to be attached to their report.

Sec. 8. Any one of the said arbitrators may issue subpoenas and administer oaths to witnesses, and they or any of them in the absence of the others, may adjourn the proceedings from time to time in their discretion, but they shall continue to meet from time to time as may be necessary to hear, try, consider and determine upon all claims which may be presented to them under this act. In case of the death, resignation, refusal or neglect to serve of any or all of said arbitrators, the petitioner or applicant may apply upon the like notice and in the like manner as provided in sections 5 and 6 of this act for the appointment of enough arbitrators to fill the vacancies caused by said death, resignation, refusal or neglect to serve. The said arbitrators shall hear the proofs and allegations of the claimants and all other proofs which may be offered in their behalf relating to said claims, and also such proofs as may be offered on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York. They shall reduce the testimony, if any, taken before them, to writing, and after the testimony is closed, they or a majority of them, all having considered the same and having an opportunity to be present, shall without unnecessary delay, ascertain and determine the amounts of money, if any, to be paid by the City of New York to the said claimants or applicants; or if the said arbitrators or a majority of them shall find that the said claimants are justly indebted to the said City of New York, they shall ascertain and determine the amounts which said claimant shall pay to the said City of New York. The said arbitrators shall make a report of their proceedings to the Supreme Court as in the next section provided, with the minutes of the testimony taken by them, if any; and they shall be entitled each to receive for their services the sum of ten dollars per diem, besides their traveling expenses, to be paid by the successful party; and which amount shall be allowed and taxed by the Court as against the unsuccessful party.

Sec. 9. The said arbitrators or a majority of them shall prepare a report stating the amounts which they find due and to whom to be paid, and they or a majority of them shall sign said report and shall file said report in the office of the Clerk of the County of Westchester, and a copy thereof in the office of the County of New York. The arbitrators or a majority of them shall notify in writing the successful party or their counsel as soon as the said reports are filed.

Sec. 10. Any person interested in the said proceedings, after receiving notice of such filing, may give notice that the said report will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court at a Special Term thereof, to be held in the Second Judicial District, at a time and place to be specified in said notice, which time shall not be less than eight days from the date of service of said notice, which said notice shall also contain a statement of the time and place of the filing of the report and of the copy thereof.

Sec. 11. The application for the confirmation of the said report shall be made to the Supreme Court, at a Special Term thereof, held in the Second Judicial District.

Upon the hearing of the application for the confirmation thereof, the said Court shall, after hearing the counsel for the respective parties, if there be no substantial errors shown, confirm said report and make an order to that effect, and shall direct to whom the sums of moneys therein confirmed shall be paid.

Such report, when so confirmed, shall be absolutely final and conclusive, as well upon the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York as upon the claimant and all other persons interested, and also upon all other persons whomsoever.

If, however, upon the hearing of the application for the confirmation of the said report, the said Court shall find that substantial errors have been committed, the said Court may make an order appointing a like number of new arbitrators, who shall proceed in like manner, as hereinbefore provided, and the report of these said arbitrators shall be final and conclusive upon all the parties interested, and upon a like application to the said Court for a confirmation of their report, the said Court shall make an order confirming the same and directing to whom the moneys shall be paid.

Sec. 12. The said City of New York shall, within two calendar months after the confirmation of the report of the arbitrators, pay to the respective persons mentioned or referred to in said report, in whose favor any sum or sums of money shall be reported by said arbitrators the respective sum or sums so reported in their favor respectively, with lawful interest thereon, from the date of filing the reports and certified copies thereof, as by the ninth section of this act required. And in case of neglect or default in the payment of the same within the time aforesaid, the respective person or persons in whose favor the same shall be so reported, his, her or their executors, administrators or assigns, at any time or times after application first made by him, or them, to the Comptroller of the City of New York for payment thereof, may sue for and recover the same, with lawful interest as aforesaid and the costs of suit, in any proper form of action against the said Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, in any Court having cognizance thereof, and in which it shall be sufficient to declare generally for so much money due to the plaintiff or plaintiffs therein by virtue of this act as in said report contained, and the report of said arbitrators, with proof of the right and title of the plaintiff or plaintiffs to the sum or sums demanded shall be conclusive evidence in such suit or action.

Sec. 13. If the said report shall declare that a sum of money is due from the claimants to the City of New York, the same may be recovered and collected in the same manner from said claimants as is provided by law in actions arising on contract.

Sec. 14. This act shall take effect immediately.

NEW YORK, March 26, 1890.

Hon. WILLIAM H. CLARK, Counsel to the Corporation:

SIR—I have just received a copy of a bill introduced in the Senate last week by Senator Erwin, entitled "An Act to provide for the speedy determination and settlement of all claims arising out of and relating to the construction of the New Croton Aqueduct, new reservoirs and dams, with the appurtenances thereto, for the purpose of supplying the City of New York with an increased supply of pure and wholesome water."

The bill is quite a long one, and I am now having it copied, and will send a copy to you as soon as made.

In brief, it proposes to apply to the trial and determination of the contractors' claims a method of procedure similar to that now provided in the case of condemnation of lands. Under its provisions all claims are to be submitted in the first instance to the Aqueduct Commissioners, who are given thirty days within which to pass upon them. All claims allowed by them are to be paid by the Comptroller within five days after such allowance. As to claims not allowed by them, the claimant may, at his option, apply to the Supreme Court at a Special Term thereof, to be held in the Second Department, for the appointment of arbitrators, not exceeding three in number, who are to proceed to hear, try and determine all claims thus presented. They shall report thereon to the Supreme Court in the Second Department, and it shall be offered for confirmation at a Special Term in that Department. If there be no substantial errors shown, the Court is required to confirm the report, which it is declared shall be absolutely final and conclusive upon the City and all other persons. If the Court shall find any substantial error, it is required to refer the matter again to other arbitrators whose decision shall be final and conclusive, and must be confirmed by the Court upon application. Within two months after the final report and its confirmation, the City is required to pay the amount so reported with interest and costs.

You will observe that this Act undertakes to prevent any appeal to the General Term or Court of Appeals in any contingency or any submission of the second report to any Court whatever for examination, no matter how glaring or numerous the errors may have been.

You will also observe that it, in effect, repeals, so far as this class of claims is concerned, the provision of law now existing whereby actions against the City must be brought within the First Department.

Commissioner Howe and myself have been appointed by the Aqueduct Board a Special Committee to oppose this bill before the Legislature, but of course it is desirable that the City should be officially represented otherwise than by us. We have received no official notification of any hearing on the subject, but Mr. John O'Brien, of the firm of O'Brien & Clark, who acknowledges himself to be the promoter of the bill, and who announces publicly that he has matters so arranged as to insure its passage, informed the Board this morning that a hearing would be had upon the bill to-morrow afternoon, and that it would be immediately reported to the Senate and passed.

It will be quite impossible for Mr. Howe and myself to appear before the Committee at so short notice prepared to suggest the numerous objections which are apparent, and we propose to telegraph to-day to the Chairman of the Judiciary Committee, asking that a day for the hearing be fixed for next week.

Will you not add to our appeal the weight of a special request from yourself that the hearing should be postponed for a reasonable time to give the opponents of the measure an opportunity to be heard.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the hearing of the order to show cause by Heman Clark, contractor for the construction of Section 10B of the New Aqueduct, why the further work of construction of said section should not be discontinued, owing to the fact that the work is unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed, and for his failure to comply with the directions and orders of the Chief Engineer, and the further completion of said section done under the direction and supervision of the Aqueduct Commissioners, as provided in Clause P of the contract for the construction of said section, adjourned to this day, was postponed until Wednesday next, April 2, 1890, at 3 o'clock P. M.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR FURNISHING the gas or other illuminating material for, and lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing and maintaining the public gas-lamps on the streets, avenues, piers, parks and public places in the City of New York, for the period of one year, commencing on May 1, 1890, and ending on April 30, 1891.

Estimates for the above will be received at the office of the Commissioner of Public Works, No. 37 Chambers street, in the City of New York, until 12 o'clock M. of Monday, April 7, 1890, at which place and time they will be publicly opened by said Commissioner and read.

Any person making an estimate for furnishing the gas or other material shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing the Illuminating Material for, and Lighting, Extinguishing, Cleaning, Repairing and Maintaining the Public Lamps," and any person making an estimate for furnishing, operating and maintaining electric-lamps, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing, Operating and Maintaining Electric-lamps," and also with the name of the person making the same and the date of its presentation.

Bidders are required to state, in their estimates, their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, they shall distinctly state the fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same supplies and work, and that it is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and, also, that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the same, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the bid or estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he or they shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he or they would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith and with an intention to execute the bond required by law.

Bidders proposing to furnish illuminating gas are required to state in their estimates the district or several streets, avenues, piers, parks and places, or parts of streets, avenues, piers, parks and places in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, and also the illuminating or candle-power of the gas they propose to furnish, when tested at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture; and bidders proposing to furnish any illuminating material other than illuminating or coal gas, must state distinctly what kind of material they propose to furnish, and the illuminating power of the light they propose to furnish.

Bidders are also required to state the price per year for which they will furnish the gas (of not less than eighteen-candle power by photometric test at a distance of not less than one mile from the place of manufacture) or other illuminating material for each lamp, including the lighting, extinguishing, cleaning, repairing, reglazing, and painting lamp-posts and lanterns, and replacing the cocks, tubes, burners, cross-heads, lamp-irons, and lanterns thereto, for the period from May 1, 1890, to April 30, 1891, both days inclusive; stating the price, for the above-named period of one year, for each lamp.

Bidders for gas-lamps are also required to state a price for which they will repair lamp-posts, including straightening and releading, and for each new lamp fitted up, as follows:

For each lamp-post straightened, stating the price per post.
For each column releaded, stating the price per post.
For each column refitted, stating the price per post.
For each service-pipe refitted, stating the price per post.
For each stand pipe refitted, stating the price per post.
For each lamp-post removed, stating the price per post.
For each lamp-post reset, stating the price per post.
For each new lamp fitted up, stating the price per post.
The total number of public gas-lamps to be contracted for is about 26,000, but bidders may bid for any portion of the same, naming their location as to districts, streets, avenues, piers, parks and public places, or parts thereof.
The burners for illuminating gas are to be of a capacity to burn three cubic feet of gas per hour under a pressure of one inch, and in case the illuminating material shall be oil or naphtha, then the burners to be used for such illuminating material shall give a light (by photometric test) equal to the light given by the gas-burners in use in the public lamps in the City of New York.

Should any alteration or any attachment be required to any portion of the lamps for which estimates are made in consequence of the use of illuminating material other than gas, then such alteration shall be done and such attachment placed on the lamps without expense to the City.

The number of hours the gas or naphtha lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 4,000. The electric-lamps are to be kept lighted 3,950 hours.

The amount of security required on any contract for lighting the public gas-lamps which will amount to \$400,000 and upwards, shall be \$150,000; on any contract which will amount to \$300,000 and less than \$400,000 shall be \$125,000; on any contract which will amount to \$200,000 and less than \$300,000 shall be \$100,000; on any contract which will amount to \$100,000 and less than \$200,000 shall be \$75,000; on any contract which will amount to \$80,000, but is less than \$100,000, \$50,000; on

any contract which will amount to \$60,000, but is less than \$80,000, \$36,000; on any contract which will amount to \$40,000, but is less than \$60,000, \$24,000; on any contract which will amount to \$20,000, but is less than \$40,000, \$12,000; on any contract which will amount to \$10,000, but is less than \$20,000, \$6,000; on any contract which amounts to less than \$10,000, \$5,000.

Bidders for electric-lamps are required to state in their estimates the several streets, avenues, parks and public places, or parts of streets, avenues, parks and public places in which they propose to perform the requirements herein contained, giving in detail the number of lamps which it is proposed to furnish for lighting each street, etc., and in case the streets or any portion of the streets which are contemplated in the bid are not lighted by the bidder with electric arc lamps at the time of the making of the bid, then a map or sketch showing clearly the proposed locations of lamps, poles and conducting wires in such streets must be submitted with the bid.

Bidders must state the kind or system of light they propose to furnish.

Bidders are required to state the price per night for each lamp at which they propose to furnish, operate and maintain a light in accordance with the requirements of the specifications and for the period mentioned in the agreement.

Bidders are required to state the number and locations of the central stations at which the electric current is to be generated, and what provision, if any, will be made against the accidental extinction of the lights on account of damages to the central station by fire.

The amount of security required on electric-light contracts is Twenty-five Thousand Dollars.

No estimate will be received or considered unless accompanied by either a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the security required for the faithful performance of the contract. Such check or money must not be inclosed in the sealed envelope containing the estimate, but must be handed to the officer or clerk of the Department who has charge of the estimate-box, and no estimate can be deposited in said box until such check or money has been examined by said officer or clerk and found to be correct. All such deposits, except that of the successful bidder, will be returned to the persons making the same, within three days after the contract is awarded. If the successful bidder shall refuse or neglect, within five days after notice that the contract has been awarded to him, to execute the same, the amount of the deposit made by him shall be forfeited to and retained by the City of New York, as liquidated damages for such neglect or refusal; but if he shall execute the contract within the time aforesaid, the amount of his deposit will be returned to him.

No bid or estimate for electric-lamps will be considered from any company, corporation or individual not authorized and empowered either by the Common Council or by the Board of Electrical Control, to lay, erect and construct, and which has not (except where electric-light conduits are laid) suitable wires or other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures, in, on, over and under streets, avenues and public parks and places of the City of New York, for conducting and distributing electricity to do the lighting bid for; and that does not possess a sufficient central station, with suitable appliances therein, for generating the electric current required for the purposes of accomplishing the work specified in the bid or estimate.

The award of any contract, if awarded, will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Should the person or persons to whom any contract is so awarded neglect or refuse to accept the contract within five days after written notice that the same has been awarded to his bid or estimate, or if he accept, but does not execute the contract and give the proper security, it may be readvertised and relet as provided by law and ordinance.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed.

The bidders are required to write out the amount of their bids in their estimates, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

The right is reserved, whatever may be the illuminating material named in the estimate, when an estimate is made containing bids for lamps in one or more streets, avenues, piers, parks or places, to accept from such estimate or bid so much thereof as may be the lowest per lamp in any one or more of such streets, avenues, piers, parks or places, and to reject the remainder of such estimate or bid which may not be the lowest as aforesaid. The right is also reserved to determine what streets or parts of streets and public places shall be lighted by electric-lights. The contract for lamps in any particular street, avenue, park or place, will be awarded, if awarded, to the lowest bidder per lamp in such particular street, avenue, park or place.

The right is also reserved to determine and designate in any locality, after the estimates are opened, what illuminating material shall be used in the public lamps, or any number of them, in such locality, during the period above mentioned; also upon such determination, to decline any estimate or part thereof for lighting such locality with illuminating material other than that so determined upon. Also to decline all estimates if deemed for the best interests of the City. No estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as security or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

The right is also reserved to regulate the number of electric lamps which may be erected and their location and disposition, in order to best illuminate the streets, parks or other public places for the lighting of which bids may be received.

If the estimate of any bidder shall include any streets or parts of streets, parks, or public places not lighted by electric arc lamps, or not so lighted by the bidder at the time of the making of the bid, and a contract for furnishing, operating and maintaining lamps in such streets, or parts of streets, parks or public places shall be awarded to such bidder, in that case, thirty days from the date of the execution of such contract, and such further time, not exceeding thirty days, as may be deemed reasonable by the Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioner of Public Works shall be allowed to such bidder in which to erect poles and lamps and establish conducting wires, all of which shall be done by the party of the second part without expense to the City.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
